Frankie Capan III

- Stillwater, Minnesota native spent summers in Minnesota, but relocated to Arizona for the school year
- Made 3M Open debut in 2023 playing on a sponsor exemption and finished T62 with rounds of 68-68-73-71
- Has one top-10 in 20 starts this season: 3rd/Zurich Classic of New Orleans with partner Jake Knapp
- Owns one Korn Ferry Tour title: 2024 Nationwide Children's Hospital Championship
- Played two seasons at University of Alabama (2018-20) and two seasons at Florida Gulf Coast University (2020-22)

Tony Finau

- Won the 2022 3M Open by three strokes, earning his third career PGA TOUR title in his 212th career start
- Holds the largest come-from-behind victory in tournament history; entered the final round trailing Scott Piercy by five strokes
- Has five top-25s in 17 events this season, highlighted by a T5 at The Genesis Invitational
- Finished T56 at last week's Open Championship
- Most recent of six PGA TOUR victories came at the 2023 Mexico Open at VidantaWorld
- Enters the week No. 59 in the FedExCup; has qualified for the TOUR Championship in eight consecutive seasons, tied for the longest active streak with Xander Schauffele

Chris Gotterup

- Claimed the Genesis Scottish Open for his second career PGA TOUR victory (2024 ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic) to earn a spot in The Open Championship where he finished solo third
- No. 23 in the FedExCup after moving up 55 spots over the past two weeks
- Has finished inside the top 25 in 11 of his 23 events played this season
- Earned his card as a First-Year Member for the 2024 PGA TOUR Season after finishing No. 23 in the 2023 Korn Ferry Tour Points List; went on to finish No. 119 in the 2024 FedExCup Fall standings
- New Jersey native spent three seasons at Rutgers University before transferring to the University of Oklahoma

Jhonattan Vegas

- Won the 2024 3M Open by one stroke over Max Greyserman, earning fourth career PGA TOUR title in his 299th start
- Became the first international winner of the event and the first player in tournament history with a win and runner-up (2021)
- Seeks to become the first repeat winner in tournament history
- 2024 victory moved him from No. 147 to No. 66 in the FedExCup and qualified for the FedEx St. Jude Championship two
 weeks later
- Two top-10s in 18 starts this season (4th/The Sentry, T5/PGA Championship) and enters the week at No. 53 in the FedExCup standings with two weeks remaining until the FedExCup Playoffs

Michael La Sasso

- Sponsor exemption making his fifth PGA TOUR start (MC: U.S. Open, Rocket Classic, John Deere Classic, Barracuda Championship)
- Rising senior at the University of Mississippi recorded the lowest single-season scoring average in program history last season (69.48)
- Won the individual title at the 2025 NCAA Championship, joining Braden Thornberry (2017) as the only players in program history to win the individual title

- Accolades from 2024-25 season include: PING First Team All-American, Golfweek First Team All-American, First Team
 All-SEC and finalist for the Haskins Award and Jack Nicklaus Player of the Year Award
- Raleigh, North Carolina native played one year at North Carolina State before transferring to the University of Mississippi
- No. 3 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking only behind Auburn's Jackson Koivun (No. 1) and Virginia's Ben James (No. 2)

Haotong Li

- Playing in the final pairing of last week's Open Championship with winner Scottie Scheffler, finished T4 to earn a spot in the field at the 3M Open
- 29-year-old from Hunan, China is a DP World Tour member with 48 career starts on the PGA TOUR
- Following his T4 at The Open, moved to No. 1 in the DP World Tour Top 10, which offers PGA TOUR membership to the leading 10 players in the final Race to Dubai Rankings, not otherwise exempt
- Solo-third finish in his debut appearance at The Open Championship in 2017 marks the best finish on the PGA TOUR by a player from China
- Will make his 3M Open debut
- Four-time winner on the DP World Tour, most recently at the Commercial Bank Qatar Masters in February

3M Open notes:

- The PGA TOUR returns to Minnesota for the seventh straight season, which debuted in 2019 as the TOUR's first non-major event in Minnesota since the 1969 Minnesota Golf Classic (won by Frank Beard at Braemar Golf Club) and first official PGA TOUR event in the state since the 2009 PGA Championship (won by Y.E. Yang at Hazeltine National Golf Club)
- TPC Twin Cities was designed by World Golf Hall of Fame member Arnold Palmer, who worked in consultation with Minnesota native and PGA TOUR veteran Tom Lehman
- 10 players in the field have competed in all six previous editions of the 3M Open: Cam Davis, Tony Finau, Brice Garnett, Chesson Hadley, Tom Hoge, Beau Hossler, Patton Kizzire, Peter Malnati, Troy Merritt, Sam Ryder
- Four past champions of the 3M Open in the field: Cameron Champ (2021), Tony Finau (2022), Lee Hodges (2023),
 Jhonattan Vegas (2024)
- 37 players in the field at the 3M Open competed at last week's Open Championship including three that finished inside the top 10 (Chris Gotterup/3rd, Haotong Li/T4, Wyndham Clark/T4) and 17 that made cut
- At No. 85 in the FedExCup, **Adam Scott** will make his tournament debut at the 3M Open; Scott's best finish in 15 starts this season is a T12 at the U.S. Open
- Maverick McNealy is the highest-ranked player in the field at No. 18 in the Official World Golf Ranking; has six top-10s this season, highlighted by a runner-up at The Genesis Invitational

PGA TOUR season notes

- Following next week's Wyndham Championship (July 31–Aug. 3), the top 70 players in the FedExCup standings will earn a spot in the FedExCup Playoffs
