COMPLETED Third-Round Notes – Sunday, July 13, 2025

Saturday weather: Partly cloudy with thunderstorms. High of 92. Wind SW at 5-10 mph, gusting to 20 mph.

Sunday weather: Partly cloudy. High of 90. Wind WSW 6-10 mph.

Saturday suspension summary: Due to lightning in the area, play was suspended at 1:24 p.m. ET and resumed at 3 p.m., a delay of 1 hour, 36 minutes. Play was again suspended due to lightning at 5:10 p.m. and resumed at 7:05 p.m., an additional delay of 1 hour, 55 minutes for a total delay of 3 hours, 31 minutes. Darkness stopped play at 9:00 p.m. with 12 players remaining.

Sunday: The third round resumed at 7:59 a.m. and was completed at 9:13 a.m. Final-round tee times are scheduled from approximately 11:30 a.m. – 1:30 p.m. in groups of three off Nos. 1 and 10 tees.

Note: Since its inception in 2015, the ISCO Championship has experienced a weather delay in all but one year (2024).

Paul Peterson (1st/-8)

- 37-year-old PGA TOUR rookie and two-time DP World Tour winner finishes with back-to-back bogeys to hold a one-stroke lead over two-time PGA TOUR winner Luke List
- Holds his first 54-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR: previously held the lead/co-lead once after any round on the PGA TOUR (T1/R1/2025 Sony Open in Hawaii/T10)
- Posted his first and only top-10 on TOUR in his first start as a PGA TOUR member (T10/2025 Sony Open in Hawaii)
- Makes his 20th PGA TOUR start and first at the ISCO Championship
- With a victory, would become the first left-handed player to win the ISCO Championship
- Looks to become the 10th first-time winner on TOUR this season (most recent: Aldrich Potgieter/Rocket Classic)
- Would be the fifth consecutive winner of the ISCO Championship to be a first-time winner on TOUR (2024/Harry Hall, 2023/Vincent Norrman, 2022/Trey Mullinax, 2021/Seamus Power)

Additional notes

- 18-under (2016/Aaron Baddeley) is the highest winning score in relation to par at the ISCO Championship, while 26-under (2019/Jim Herman) is the lowest
- Two-time PGA TOUR winner **Luke List** (T2/-7) is bogey-free in his last 36 holes; owns two top-20 results in two prior appearances at the ISCO Championship (T20/2016, T5/2021)
- Norway's **Kris Ventura** (T2/-7) looks to become the fifth international winner at the ISCO Championship: Aaron Baddeley (2016/Australia), Seamus Power (2021/Ireland), Vincent Norrman (2023/Sweden), Harry Hall (2024/England)
- After making two consecutive bogeys on Nos. 11 and 12 before play was suspended due to darkness on Saturday, **Chan Kim** (T4/-6) makes back-to-back bogeys on holes 13 and 14 upon the resumption of play

on Sunday; cards two birdies, one par and six bogeys on the back nine; best finish on TOUR: T5 (2025 Valero Texas Open)

- English duo of **Callum Tarren** (T4/-6) and **David Skinns** (T4/-6) attempt to become the second consecutive ISCO Championship winner from England (Harry Hall/2024)
- Lexington, Kentucky native **Vince Whaley**, (T4/-6) shoots 70 to card his 22nd consecutive round of par or better on TOUR, the longest active streak
- Auburn University sophomore **Jackson Koivun's** (T16/-3) best finish in six starts on TOUR is T11 at last week's John Deere Classic; best finish by an amateur at the ISCO Championship: T3/Robby Shelton/2015
