Notable

- The last PGA Championship at Quail Hollow (2017) was in August and the Presidents Cup (2022) was in September.
- According to the PGA of America this is just the 2nd PGA Championship to be played on overseed in recent history (Kiawah Island in 2021).
- The 9th hole has been lengthened by 25 yards.
- Greens and tees were regressed and bunkers rebuilt in 2023.
- This is the first major championship for 95% of the maintenance staff, but most have been a part of a Presidents Cup and regular PGA Tour stop (Truist Championship).
- The volunteer staff includes 22 former Quail Hollow Club employees and 53 returning volunteers.

- Justin Thomas won the 2017 PGA Championship at Quail Hollow Club at 8-under par.

- Course typically hosts the now Truist Championship, but it was moved to Philadelphia Cricket Club this year and was moved to TPC Potomac at Avenel Farm in 2022 due to the Presidents Cup.

Note: Heading into the tournament the greens, approaches, tees and fairways are around 50/50 mix of overseed and the underlying bermudagrass but can be considered overseed surface areas. The rough is 90/10 overseed.
