

## Alejandro Tosti Sunday, December 14, 2025 Final Round – PGA TOUR Q-School presented by Korn Ferry (Final Stage)

On his round and what he was feeling...

"Lot of emotions for sure. I struggled my whole week with the putting. It's been really challenging reading the greens with the grain and the wind, and the pressure, of course, is a factor. I'm really happy to be back on the (PGA) TOUR in 2026. I had a lot of questions in the last couple months, and I really want to thank Srixon for helping me out, set up my clubs for this tournament. It's been an amazing ride, and I'm really excited for 2026."

On earning PGA TOUR membership through PGA TOUR Q-School presented by Korn Ferry for a second consecutive year...

"I would say just being able to play this course so many times. I live not too far from here. I played a college event four times, and I love the (Dye's) Valley Course. It's one of my favorites. I know how to get around it, and I was really excited I was able to put it together at the end of the round today, make a couple putts down the stretch, and get my job done."

On what this week is like with only five PGA TOUR cards available...

"Coming into this week, I haven't competed in a couple months. Just coming here, 175 players and just five cards handed out... it was cool for me. I knew I did it last year. Just knowing you can do it, it's possible. That was my whole attitude the whole week. One thing I checked about last year was that I had 15 mistakes. I said, 'Well, if I can stay a little below that, it will be a little bit easier.' I kind of did. I had, I think, 12 or 13 mistakes. Really happy with that. Just being able to get one of those five (PGA TOUR cards) is really impressive."

On what counts as a mistake...

"Any mental bad decision, a bogey, a three-putt, just simple stuff that should not be made by a tour professional."

On his eagle putt on No. 16...

"It was like a rollercoaster. I was aiming maybe 15, 20 feet out. I don't even know how to explain it. I just hit a perfect pace, put the ball where I wanted to leave it. I didn't think it was going to get to the hole. It just kept rolling, and it was amazing to see it disappear."

On how he came back down from such an exhilarating moment...

"I was really calm. I missed a lot of putts in the beginning of the round, and I had a three-putt on No. 6, had a lip-out on No. 8. The putts were not really going in. I said, 'Stay patient, one is going to drop.' It's just crazy how the mind works."

On what he's looking forward to the most being back out on TOUR next year...

"Not being stressed about the starts. I just heard the Q-School (graduates) will play a bunch of tournaments. Last year... the first tournament I had to go Monday qualify (for the Sony Open) in Hawaii. Knowing we're going to be playing most tournaments is relieving. I'm excited to go back to play the same courses with a little more experience."
