Min Woo Lee (Won/-20)

- Wins first PGA TOUR victory in 56th career TOUR start at the age 26 years, 8 months, 3 days
- Converts first career 54-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR into one-stroke victory over Gary Woodland and Scottie Scheffler
- Sets career-low 72-hole score (260) and 54-hole score (193)
- Records the low 72-hole score at the Texas Children's Houston Open (previous: 264/Tony Finau/2022)
- Fifth first-time winner this season and first since Karl Vilips (Puerto Rico Open)
- 17th first-time winner at the tournament and third since the event moved to Memorial Park Golf Course in 2020 (Carlos Ortiz/2020, Stephan Jaeger/2024)
- Wins in tournament debut, becomes first player since Paul Casey (2009) to win in his first start at the event
- 38th Australian to win on TOUR and second this season (Karl Vilips/Puerto Rico Open)
- Eighth Australian winner (10 wins) of the Texas Children's Houston Open and first since Matt Jones (2014)
- Nine of the 14 events on TOUR this season have been won by international players
- Earns 500 FedExCup points and moves from No. 60 to No. 16 in the FedExCup standings, his career-high rank
- Projected to move from No. 55 to No. 22 in the Official World Golf Ranking, his career-high rank and first time inside the top 25

Gary Woodland (T2/-19)

- Four-time PGA TOUR winner earns best finish on TOUR since most recent victory (2019 U.S. Open)
- Marks 11th runner-up finish on TOUR and first since the 2019 Sentry
- Records final-round 8-under 62, his lowest 18-hole score on TOUR since 2018 (61/2018 CIMB Classic/R2)
- The 2025 PGA TOUR Courage Award winner underwent surgery to remove a brain lesion in September 2023 and returned to competition at the 2024 Sony Open in Hawaii
- Second top-10 in 34 starts since surgery (T9/2024 Shriners Children's Open)

Scottie Scheffler (T2/-19)

- World No. 1 records 10th runner-up finish on TOUR and third at the event (T2/2021, T2/2024, T2/2025)
- Third top-10 in six starts on the season (T3/The Genesis Invitational, T9/AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am)

Miscellaneous notes

- Players in the field that qualified for the Masters Tournament via top 50 players in the Official World Golf Ranking: No. 28 **J.J. Spaun**, No. 42 **Stephan Jaeger**, No. 50 **Michael Kim**; the winner of the next week's Valero Texas Open will also qualify for the Masters if not yet exempt

Aon Swing 5 and Aon Next 10

- The Aon Next 10 and Aon Swing 5 are eligibility pathways for players, not already qualified, to play their way into Signature Events via the FedExCup standings
