Xander Schauffele

- World No. 3 has one top-10 finish in nine starts this season (T8/Masters Tournament)
- Owns nine victories on the PGA TOUR; most recent: 2024 Open Championship
- Has made 65 consecutive cuts dating back to the 2022 Masters Tournament, the longest active streak on TOUR and sixth-longest streak in TOUR history (Tiger Woods/142; Byron Nelson/113; Jack Nicklaus/105; Hale Irwin/86; Dow Finsterwald/72)
- In the first two majors of the 2025 season, he finished T8 (Masters Tournament) and T28 (PGA Championship)
- Two-time major champion (2024 PGA Championship, 2024 Open Championship)
- Looks to become the third active player with three legs of the Career Grand Slam (Phil Mickelson/U.S. Open; Jordan Spieth/PGA Championship)
- Has finished in the top 14 in each of his eight appearances at the U.S. Open; best finish: T3/2019; his seven top-10s are the most of any player at the U.S. Open since 2017
- Shares the U.S. Open 18-hole scoring record (62/2023/R1/The Los Angeles Country Club); other instance: Rickie Fowler (62/2023/R1/The Los Angeles Country Club)

Justin Thomas

- One win in 13 starts this season (RBC Heritage); five additional top-10 finishes (2nd/The American Express; T6/WM Phoenix Open; T9/The Genesis Invitational; 2nd/Valspar Championship; T2/Truist Championship)
- Owns 16 victories on the PGA TOUR dating back to the 2015-16 season, tied for the second most in that span (Rory McIlroy/18, Scottie Scheffler/16)
- Two-time major champion (2017 PGA Championship, 2022 PGA Championship)
- In the first two majors of the 2025 season, he finished T36 (Masters Tournament) and MC (PGA Championship)
- Two top-10 finishes in 10 appearances at the U.S. Open (T8/2020, T9/2017)
- Third-round 63 in 2017 marks the lowest third-round score in U.S. Open history

Rory McIlroy

- World No. 2 has three wins in 2025 (AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament), tied for the most among all players (Scottie Scheffler)
- Owns 29 victories on the PGA TOUR; eight consecutive seasons with a win, the longest active streak on TOUR; four consecutive multi-win seasons (3/2021-22; 2/2022-23; 2/2024; 3/2025)
- Became the sixth player in history to complete the Career Grand Slam with his win at the 2025 Masters Tournament (Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Gary Player, Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods)
- Five-time major champion (2011 U.S. Open, 2012 PGA Championship, 2014 Open Championship, 2014 PGA Championship, 2025 Masters Tournament)
- Looks to become the first player since Xander Schauffele (2024 PGA Championship; 2024 Open Championship) to win multiple majors in one year
- 2011 U.S. Open champion (Congressional Country Club); 17th appearance in 2025; six consecutive top-10 finishes at the U.S. Open (T9/2019; T8/2020; T7/2021; T5/2022; 2nd/2023; 2nd/2024)
- Coming off back-to-back runner-up finishes at the U.S. Open, seeks to become the first player to finish runner up and go on to win the following year's U.S. Open since Dustin Johnson in 2016 at Oakmont
- Owns the U.S. Open 72-hole scoring record (268/Congressional Country Club/2011)

Collin Morikawa

- Three top-10 finishes in 11 starts this season (2nd/The Sentry; 2nd/Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard; T10/THE PLAYERS Championship)
- Owns six victories on the PGA TOUR; most recent: 2023 Baycurrent Classic
- In the first two majors of the 2025 season, he finished T14 (Masters Tournament) and T50 (PGA Championship)
- Two-time major champion (2020 PGA Championship, 2021 Open Championship)
- Looks to become the third active player with three legs of the Career Grand Slam (Phil Mickelson/U.S. Open; Jordan Spieth/PGA Championship)
- Looks to become the 11th player to win the PGA Championship, U.S. Open and Open Championship (Rory McIlroy, Tiger Woods, Lee Trevino, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player, Ben Hogan, Gene Sarazen, Tommy Armour, Jim Barnes, Walter Hagen)
- Two top-10 finishes in six appearances at the U.S. Open (T4/2021, T5/2022)

Scottie Scheffler

- FedExCup leader has three wins in 2025, all in his last four starts (THE CJ CUP Byron Nelson, PGA Championship, the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday), tied for the most among all players (Rory McIlroy)
- Owns 16 victories on the PGA TOUR, all since 2022; four consecutive multi-win seasons (4/2021-22; 2/2022-23; 7/2024; 3/2025)
- Three-time major champion (2022 Masters Tournament, 2024 Masters Tournament, 2025 PGA Championship)
- Looks to become the third active player with three legs of the Career Grand Slam (Phil Mickelson/U.S. Open; Jordan Spieth/PGA Championship)
- Looks to become the ninth player to win the Masters Tournament, PGA Championship and U.S. Open (Gene Sarazen, Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player, Raymond Floyd, Tiger Woods, Rory McIlroy)
- Looks to become the first player since Jordan Spieth (2015 Masters Tournament; 2015 U.S. Open) to win consecutive majors
- Looks to become the first player since Xander Schauffele (2024 PGA Championship; 2024 Open Championship) to win multiple majors in one year
- Eighth appearance at the U.S. Open; best finish: T2 (2022); top-10 finishes in three of last four appearances (T7/2021; T2/2022; 3rd/2023; T41/2024)
- World No. 1 for the 108th consecutive week, third-longest streak all-time (Tiger Woods/281; Tiger Woods/264); 143rd week overall as No. 1, third-most all-time (Tiger Woods/683; Greg Norman/331)

U.S. Open notes:

- Third major of the 2025 season (Rory McIlroy/Masters Tournament; Scottie Scheffler/PGA Championship)
- 125th playing of the U.S. Open, dating back to 1895
- Oakmont Country Club (Oakmont, Pennsylvania) will host the U.S. Open for the record-extending 10th time (1927/Tommy Armour; 1935/Sam Parks Jr.; 1953/Ben Hogan; 1962/Jack Nicklaus; 1973/Johnny Miller; 1983/Larry Nelson; 1994/Ernie Els; 2007/Angel Cabrera; 2016/Dustin Johnson)
- Oakmont Country Club opened in 1903; designed by Henry Fownes; underwent a bunker restoration by Gil Hanse in 2023

- A record number of 10,202 entries for qualifying were accepted for the 2025 U.S. Open; qualifying is open to any professional or amateur whose Handicap Index® does not exceed 0.4
- 25th anniversary of Tiger Woods' major championship-record 15-stroke victory at the U.S. Open (Pebble Beach Golf Links)
- Johnny Miller's final-round 63 at Oakmont Country Club en route to victory at the 1973 U.S. Open remains the lowest 18-hole score in a U.S. Open played at Oakmont; tied for the lowest final-round score in U.S. Open history (Tommy Fleetwood/2018, 2023)
- Adam Scott is scheduled to make his 96th consecutive major championship appearance, dating to the 2001 Open Championship; only Jack Nicklaus (146) has played in more than 100 straight majors
- World No. 32 Ryan Fox won last week's RBC Canadian Open on the fourth hole of a sudden-death playoff over Sam Burns, moving him inside the top 60 in the Official World Golf Ranking to qualify for the U.S. Open; it marked Fox's second title of the PGA TOUR season (ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic)
- Defending champion **Bryson DeChambeau** is one of two players to finish in the top five in each of the first two majors of the year (T5/Masters Tournament, T2/PGA Championship); other: Scottie Scheffler (4th/Masters Tournament, 1st/PGA Championship); looks to become the seventh player to win three U.S. Open titles (Jack Nicklaus/4; Ben Hogan/4; Bobby Jones/4; Willie Anderson/4; Tiger Woods/3; Hale Irwin/3) and first to go back-to-back since Brooks Koepka (2017-2018)
- 32 players in the field competed in the 2016 U.S. Open when it was last played at Oakmont Country Club, including three who finished inside the top 10: (**Dustin Johnson**/1st, **Shane Lowry**/T2, **Jason Day**/T8)
- The winners of the last 10 U.S. Opens are in the field (2024/2020/Bryson DeChambeau; 2023/Wyndham Clark; 2022/Matt Fitzpatrick; 2021/Jon Rahm; 2019/Gary Woodland; 2018/2017/Brooks Koepka; 2016/Dustin Johnson; 2015/Jordan Spieth)
- Field headlined by 49 of the top 50 players in the Official World Golf Ranking (No. 26 Billy Horschel)

PGA TOUR Season notes:

- Eight first-time winners in 2025: Thomas Detry (WM Phoenix Open), Brian Campbell (Mexico Open at VidantaWorld), Joe Highsmith (Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches), Karl Vilips (Puerto Rico Open), Min Woo Lee (Texas Children's Houston Open), Ben Griffin/Andrew Novak (Zurich Classic of New Orleans), Ryan Fox (ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic)
- International players have won 15 of the first 26 events this season: Hideki Matsuyama/Japan, Nick Taylor/Canada, Sepp Straka/Austria/2, Rory McIlroy/Northern Ireland/3, Thomas Detry/Belgium, Ludvig Åberg/Sweden, Karl Vilips/Australia, Viktor Hovland/Norway, Min Woo Lee/Australia, Garrick Higgo/South Africa, Ryan Fox/New Zealand/2
