presented by Coca-Cola. Green leads Charles Schwab No. 2 Steven Alker by one stroke at the halfway point of
the season's first major on PGA TOUR Champions.

Richard Green, 63-68 - 131 (-13)

- The 54-year-old seeks his first win on PGA TOUR Champions (63rd start)
 - Best finish 2nd/T2 (six times)
 - 2nd (2023 Dominion Energy Charity Classic) lost in a playoff
 - 2nd (2024 Senior PGA Championship) 72-hole event
 - 2nd (2024 Senior Open Championship) 72-hole event
 - 2nd (2024 Rogers Charity Classic)
 - 2nd (2024 Sanford International) lost in a playoff
 - T2 (2024 Charles Schwab Cup Championship) 72-hole event
- This is his second time leading/co-leading after the second round on PGA TOUR Champions (0-for-1)
 - Led at the 2024 Rogers Charity Classic (finished 2nd) 54-hole event

 The solo leader after each of the first two rounds, he looks to become the first wire-to-wire
- The solo leader after each of the first two rounds, he looks to become the first wire-to-wire (no ties) winner on PGA TOUR Champions since the 2023 SAS Championship (Rod Pampling)
 - Most recent major with a wire-to-wire winner: 2022 Regions Tradition (Steve Stricker)
- Looks to become the fourth first-time winner of the 2025 season on PGA TOUR Champions
 - Previous: Justin Leonard (Chubb Classic), Steve Allan (The Galleri Classic), Ángel Cabrera (James Hardie Pro Football Hall of Fame Invitational)
- Making his eighth start of the 2025 season, he has three top-10 finishes
 - Best finish of 2025: T4 (Chubb Classic)
 - Entered the week No. 18 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings
- Making his third appearance at the Regions Tradition, he has finished T11 (2023) and T14 (2024)
- Looks to earn the 38th win by an Australian player on PGA TOUR Champions

Other Notes

- 2024 Regions Tradition runner-up **Steven Alker**, who entered the week No. 2 in the Charles Schwab Cup standings, posted 67 and sits in 2nd at 12-under.
 - Alker, who won the Cologuard Classic earlier this year, looks to become the second multiple winner of the 2025 season, joining Miguel Angel Jiménez (2).
 - The 53-year-old seeks his 10th win overall on PGA TOUR Champions (83rd start).
 - Alker seeks his second major victory on PGA TOUR Champions (previous major win: 2022 Senior PGA Championship).
- 2009 PGA Championship winner **Y.E. Yang** is T3 at 9-under after shooting 68 in the second round. The 53-yearold seeks his second win on PGA TOUR Champions (89th start).
 - o Last win: 2024 Stifel Charity Classic
- Chris DiMarco carded the low round of the day with 7-under 65 and sits T3 at 9-under. The 56-year-old seeks his first win on PGA TOUR Champions (142nd start).
 - Best finish: T4 (2020 Ally Challenge)
- 2021 Regions Tradition champion **Alex Cejka** (T3) posted 69 and enters the weekend at 9-under. The 54-yearold seeks his fourth win on PGA TOUR Champions (101st start).
 - Each of his previous three wins came in majors (2021 Regions Tradition, 2021 Senior PGA Championship, 2023 Senior Open Championship).
 - With a win on Sunday, he would become the 14th player in PGA TOUR Champions history to win four or more majors.
