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William Mouw

- Earned his first win in his 20th start on TOUR at this event last year; before the victory, his lone top-10 finish on TOUR was T6 (2025 Puerto Rico Open)
- One of three past winners of the ISCO Championship in the field this week: **Scott Piercy** (2015), **Troy Merritt** (2018)
- Final-round 61 marked the low finish by a PGA TOUR winner in 2025; became the first to have a bogey-free final round en route to victory at the ISCO Championship
- Seven-stroke comeback en route to victory marked the largest final-round comeback at the ISCO Championship (previous: 3 strokes; three times)
- Became the first player to earn his first PGA TOUR win in a final-round comeback of seven or more strokes since Smylie Kaufman (7 strokes/2015 Shriners Children's Open)
- Final-round 61 marks his low 18-hole score on TOUR
- Became the fifth consecutive winner of the ISCO Championship to be a first-time winner on TOUR (2024/Harry Hall, 2023/Vincent Norrman, 2022/Trey Mullinax, 2021/Seamus Power) and the third consecutive winner of the ISCO Championship to win in his tournament debut (2024/Harry Hall, 2023/Vincent Norrman)
- One of 17 first-time winners from the 2025 PGA TOUR season
- 10-under 270 total marks the highest winning score in relation to par in the 10-year history of the ISCO Championship
- Lone top-10 in 16 starts this season: T6/Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches

Drew Doyle

- Louisville native claimed his first title on PGA TOUR Americas last month, posting 66-67-68-69—270 (-18) at the Inter Rapidísimo Golf Championship in Bogotá, Colombia to win by one stroke
- Has made seven cuts in seven starts on PGA TOUR Americas this season
- Shot 64 at open qualifier for this event in 2025 to earn a spot in the field (72-71—MC)
- Older brother, Brendon, made his PGA TOUR debut as a sponsor exemption at this event in 2025 (73-72—MC)
- Grandfather, Moe Demling, and great uncle, Buddy Demling, are both members of the Kentucky Golf Hall of Fame

Miles Russell

- 17-year-old Florida State commit makes his seventh PGA TOUR start, having made two starts each in 2024, 2025 and 2026, making two cuts in six prior starts, both this year
- Finished T50 at the 2026 Puerto Rico Open with four under-par rounds before notching a T39 finish at the 2026 U.S. Open after successfully advancing through sectional qualifying with fellow Florida State commit Charlie Woods as his caddie; played the final two rounds at Shinnecock Hills with Jackson Koivun (also in the field this week); was one of five amateurs to make the cut at the 2026 U.S. Open
- Missed the cut with rounds of 70-73 at the 2025 ISCO Championship
- Lefthander from Jacksonville Beach, Florida, became the youngest player to make the cut in Korn Ferry Tour history when he finished T20 at the 2024 LECOM Suncoast Classic (15 years, 5 months, 18 days)

- Won the 2023 American Junior Golf Association Player of the Year title and was named the winner of the same title again in 2025, becoming just the seventh player ever to receive the honor twice, joining Tiger Woods, Phil Mickelson, Brian Harman, Peter Uihlein, Noah Goodwin and Tracy Phillips

Jackson Koivun

- Former No. 1 ranked player in the World Amateur Golf Ranking, is making his 12th PGA TOUR start and second as a professional; missed the cut at last week's John Deere Classic in his professional debut with rounds of 73-70
- Was exempt into the 2026 U.S. Open (T23) as last year's McCormack Award winner as the leading player in the World Amateur Golf Ranking, where his final-round 68 marked his last as an amateur; shared low amateur honors with Ryder Cowan at the 2026 U.S. Open with 5-over 285 at Shinnecock Hills
- Made 10 starts as an amateur on TOUR, which included a stretch of four consecutive finishes of T11 or better (2025 John Deere Classic/T11, 2025 ISCO Championship/T6, 2025 Wyndham Championship/T5, 2025 Procore Championship/T4)
- Opened the 2025 ISCO Championship with a 3-over 73 to sit T105: followed with rounds of 66-68-68 to finish T6
- Recently accepted PGA TOUR membership via PGA TOUR University Accelerated, becoming the third player to earn a TOUR card via the Accelerated program, joining Vanderbilt's Gordon Sargent and Florida State's Luke Clanton
- Led Auburn University to its second national championship title in three years; won six times in 13 collegiate starts this season, with all six coming in his last 10 starts; became the first player in collegiate golf history to win all three Player of the Year awards (Haskins, Hogan, Nicklaus) twice – first as a freshman in 2024 and again as a junior in 2026

Max Homa

- Six-time PGA TOUR winner seeks first title since 2023 Farmers Insurance Open
- Enters the week coming off a solo-second finish at last week's John Deere Classic, his best finish on TOUR since the 2023 Genesis Invitational where he also finished runner-up
- Tied with Lucas Glover for most PGA TOUR wins by any player in the field this week (6)
- Five top-25 finishes in 16 starts this season, including two top-10s: T9/Masters Tournament, 2nd/John Deere Classic
- Last year, finished No. 111 in the FedExCup standings at the end of regular season, his first time outside the top 100 since 2017; currently sits No. 49 in the FedExCup
- Finished 71st in his only prior appearance at the ISCO Championship (2017)

Additional Player Notes

- **Patrick Rodgers** makes his 332nd PGA TOUR start, the most of any active player seeking their first victory; owns four runner-up finishes among 31 top-10 results on TOUR; makes fourth ISCO Championship appearance with T5 in 2021 his best result
- Along with **Patrick Rodgers** (332nd start), the next active player in the field with the most PGA TOUR starts without a victory on TOUR: **Beau Hossler** (248th start)
- **Zac Blair** made 21 birdies en route to a T28 (-1) finish at the 2025 ISCO Championship, the most of any player; also made three triple bogeys, the most of any player
- **Chan Kim** held a 4-stroke lead after a first-round 61 at the 2025 ISCO Championship, tied for the largest 18-hole lead on TOUR in 2025 (Jake Knapp/Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches)
- 44-year-old Campbellsville, Kentucky native and five-time PGA TOUR winner **J.B. Holmes** is making his second appearance at the ISCO Championship (MC/2025) and his second PGA TOUR start this season (MC/U.S. Open)
- **Adam Hadwin** makes 309th career start on TOUR and second at the ISCO Championship (MC/2025); Canadian played four seasons at the University of Louisville (2005-09); captured his lone collegiate title at the 2009 BIG EAST Conference Championship, winning the individual title by three strokes and leading Louisville to the team title
- Auburn University standout and Australian native **Josiah Gilbert** is set to make his PGA TOUR debut as a sponsor exemption; competed as a member of the U.S. team in last week's Palmer Cup in Ireland
- **Preston Stout** makes fifth PGA TOUR start: MC/2025 3M Open, MC/2026 CJ CUP Byron Nelson, MC/2026 U.S. Open, T15/2026 John Deere Classic; a rising senior at Oklahoma State, he won the 2026 NCAA Individual title in June to close his season with five wins, the most by a junior in program history; currently No. 2 in World Amateur Golf Ranking and expected to move to No. 1 on July 8 when Jackson Koivun is removed from the ranking

ISCO Championship notes

- The ISCO Championship debuted on the PGA TOUR in 2015 and had been played at Keene Trace Golf Club in Lexington since 2018. The tournament's move to Hurstbourne Country Club in Louisville in 2025 marked the first time a non-major event on the PGA TOUR had been staged in Louisville since the Kentucky Derby Open was held at Seneca Golf Course in the late 1950s, where Gary Player captured his first career victory on the PGA TOUR in 1958.
- As part of the Strategic Alliance between the PGA TOUR and the DP World Tour, the ISCO Championship features a field of 144 players including 50 players from the DP World Tour with the winner receiving benefits on each Tour:

- **FedExCup points:** 300
- **DP World Tour Race to Dubai points:** 585
- **PGA TOUR exemption (for current PGA TOUR members):** thru 2028
- **PGA TOUR exemption (for non-members):** thru 2027
- **DP World Tour exemption:** thru 2028
- In 2024, the 36-hole cut at the ISCO Championship was 8-under, the lowest 36-hole cut relative to par in an individual stroke-play event on the PGA TOUR (1970-present); at the 2025 event, the 1-over cut was the highest cut (in relation to par) in the 10-year history of the ISCO Championship
- The field made more bogeys (1,500) than birdies (1,399) at Hurstbourne CC in the 2025 ISCO Championship
- This week is the 11th edition of the ISCO Championship; aside from Scott Piercy's three-stroke victory in the inaugural event in 2015, the ISCO Championship has been decided by one stroke or a playoff in each of the nine editions since
- Winners in their debut appearance at the ISCO Championship: Scott Piercy (2015), Grayson Murray (2017), Jim Herman (2019), Vincent Norrman (2023), Harry Hall (2024), William Mouw (2025)
- Six players (five straight) have made the ISCO Championship their first TOUR title: Grayson Murray (2017), Seamus Power (2021), Trey Mullinax (2022), Vincent Norrman (2023), Harry Hall (2024), William Mouw (2025)
- Four international winners at the ISCO Championship: Aaron Baddeley (2016/Australia), Seamus Power (2021/Ireland), Vincent Norrman (2023/Sweden), Harry Hall (2024/England)

TOUR season notes

- The ISCO Championship is the 29th event of the FedExCup Regular Season, with only four weeks remaining until the start of the FedExCup Playoffs; only two players in the field enter the week inside the top 70 in the FedExCup standings: **Max Homa** (No. 49), **Patrick Rodgers** (No. 56)
- Four of the five players to finish T3 or better last week's John Deere Classic are in the field this week: **Max Homa** (2nd), **Lee Hodges** (T3), **Lucas Glover** (T3), **Ben Kohles** (T3)
- There have been five first-time winners in the first 27 events on TOUR this season: Jacob Bridgeman (The Genesis Invitational), Ricky Castillo (Puerto Rico Open), Alex Fitzpatrick (Zurich Classic of New Orleans), Kristoffer Reitan (Truist Championship), Bud Cauley (RBC Canadian Open); six players, including the last five straight, have made the ISCO Championship their maiden title
- The 54-hole leader/co-leader has gone on to win 10 of 26 individual stroke-play events on TOUR this season
