Scottie Scheffler

- 2025 PGA Championship winner seeks to become the first player to successfully defend since Brooks Koepka (2019)
- Claimed a five-stroke margin of victory last year at Quail Hollow Club, the largest in the event since 2012 when Rory McIlroy won by eight
- 2025 title is one of four major championship victories: 2022 Masters Tournament, 2024 Masters Tournament, 2025 PGA Championship, 2025 Open Championship
- Finished T8 or better in five of six career starts in the PGA Championship: T4/2020, T8/2021, MC/2022, T2/2023, T8/2024, Won/2025
- Top-10 finishes in 16 of his last 20 starts in major championships (dating back to start of 2021 season), including each of his last six appearances
- World No. 1 enters the week coming off solo-second finishes in each of his last three starts (Masters Tournament, RBC Heritage, Cadillac Championship); the only players to top Scheffler in his last three starts are World No. 2 Rory McIlroy (Masters Tournament), No. 3 Cameron Young (Cadillac Championship) and No. 4 Matt Fitzpatrick (RBC Heritage)

Keegan Bradley

- Won the 2011 PGA Championship at Atlanta Athletic Club in his first career start in a major championship
- Eight-time PGA TOUR winner seeking his first win since the 2025 Travelers Championship
- In 15 career starts in the PGA Championship, owns six top-25 finishes, three top-10s and one win
- Finished T8 in 2025, his first top-10 in a major championship since the 2022 U.S. Open (T7)
- Won the 2018 BMW Championship at Aronimink Golf Club, defeating Justin Rose in a playoff
- In 50 total major championship starts, has finished inside the top 10 five times (2011 PGA Championship/Won, 2012 PGA Championship/T3, 2014 U.S. Open/T4, 2022 U.S. Open/T7, 2025 PGA Championship/T8)

Matt Fitzpatrick

- In 10 career starts in the PGA Championship, owns three top-25 finishes and two top-10s (T5/2022, T8/2025)
- Only three-time winner on TOUR this season: Valspar Championship, RBC Heritage, Zurich Classic of New Orleans
- Has recorded three wins and one runner-up finish (THE PLAYERS Championship) in his last six starts
- Finished T52 at last week's Truist Championship in his bid to become the first player to win in three consecutive starts on TOUR since 2017 (Dustin Johnson)
- In 43 career starts in major championships, has 16 top-25 finishes and six top-10s, including one win (2022 U.S. Open)

Brooks Koepka

- Five-time major championship winner with three PGA Championship titles: 2018 (Bellerive Country Club), 2019 (Bethpage Black) and 2023 (Oak Hill Country Club)
- 2023 PGA Championship marks his most recent top-10 finish in a major championship; best finish in 11 starts in majors since then is T12 (2025 U.S. Open and 2026 Masters Tournament)
- One of six players with three or more wins in the PGA Championship (Walter Hagen/5, Jack Nicklaus/5, Tiger Woods/4, Gene Sarazen/3, Sam Snead/3)
- In 13 career starts in the PGA Championship, owns 12 made cuts, eight top-25s, six top-five finishes and three wins

Rory McIlroy

- Two-time PGA Championship winner: 2012 at Kiawah Island's Ocean Course and 2014 at Valhalla Golf Club
- In 17 career starts in the PGA Championship, owns 11 top-25 finishes, eight top-10s and two wins
- World No. 2 has finished inside the top 10 in 34 of 68 career starts in major championships
- 2026 Masters Tournament winner joined Jack Nicklaus (1965, 1966), Nick Faldo (1989, 1990) and Tiger Woods (2001, 2002) as the only players to successfully defend their title at the Masters
- 30-time PGA TOUR winner, tied with Horton Smith for the 16th most all-time

Collin Morikawa

- Seven-time PGA TOUR winner, including the 2020 PGA Championship at TPC Harding Park
- In six career starts in the PGA Championship, owns three top-10s including his win
- 10 top-10 finishes and seven top-fives in 25 career starts in major championships
- Has finished T7 or better in five of his last seven starts entering the week: Won/AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, T7/Genesis Invitational, 5th/Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, T7/Masters Tournament, T4/RBC Heritage

Justin Rose

- In 23 career starts in the PGA Championship, owns 13 top-25 finishes, including seven top-10s (best: T3/2012)
- Won the 2010 Quicken Loans National at Aronimink Golf Club, one of 13 career PGA TOUR wins
- In 86 career starts in major championships, has 24 top-10 finishes and one win (2013 U.S. Open)
- One of three players 40 and over to win on TOUR this season (Gary Woodland/Texas Children's Houston Open, Brandt Snedeker/ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic)

Xander Schauffele

- 10-time PGA TOUR winner and 2024 PGA Championship winner at Valhalla Golf Club
- In nine career starts in the PGA Championship, owns five top-25 finishes and two top-10s (T10/2020, Won/2024)
- In 35 career starts in major championships, has 18 top-10 finishes
- Finished inside the top 10 in seven of his last nine major championship starts
- Two-time major champion with the other win coming at the 2024 Open Championship

Jordan Spieth

- In 13 career PGA Championship starts, owns four top-25s, including two top-three finishes (2nd/2015, T3/2019)
- With titles at the 2015 Masters Tournament, 2015 U.S. Open and 2017 Open Championship, seeks to become the seventh player to complete the Career Grand Slam
- Making his 10th attempt at competing the Career Grand Slam; one top-10 finish in his previous nine attempts (T3/2019)
- 14 top-10 finishes in 52 career starts in major championships (most recent: T4/2023 Masters Tournament)
- 13-time PGA TOUR winner seeking his first win since the 2022 RBC Heritage

Cameron Young

- FedExCup leader owns six top-10 finishes and two wins in his last seven starts on TOUR: T7/Genesis Invitational, T3/Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, Won/THE PLAYERS Championship, T3/Masters Tournament, T25/RBC Heritage, Won/Cadillac Championship, T10/Truist Championship
- In four career starts in the PGA Championship, owns three made cuts and one top-25 finish (T3/2022)
- After zero wins in his first 93 starts on TOUR, has won three times in his last 15 starts (2025 Wyndham Championship, 2026 PLAYERS Championship, 2026 Cadillac Championship)
- Enters the week No. 3 in the Official World Golf Ranking, the best position of his career
- Seven top-10 finishes in 19 career starts in major championships (best: 2nd/2022 Open Championship)

PGA Championship notes:

- 156-player field will see a 36-hole cut, with the low 70 players (and ties) advancing to the weekend
- Founded in 1896, Aronimink Golf Club will host the PGA Championship for the second time in its history and first since 1962 (won by Gary Player). Aronimink also hosted the 2003 Senior PGA Championship and 2020 KPMG Women's PGA Championship. Originally designed by the legendary golf course architect Donald Ross, Gil Hanse completed a restoration of the course in 2018.

- No international player has won the PGA Championship since 2015 (**Jason Day**, Australia)
- **Adam Scott** is making his 99th consecutive start in a major championship (one major title: 2013 Masters Tournament); in 25 career appearances in the PGA Championship, has 14 top-25 finishes, including six top-10s (best: 3rd/2018); only Jack Nicklaus (146) has played in more than 100 straight majors
- Truist Championship winner **Kristoffer Reitan** will make his PGA Championship debut; PGA TOUR rookie became the second player from Norway to win on the PGA TOUR and the second player to win a Signature Event for his first career PGA TOUR title (Jacob Bridgeman/The Genesis Invitational); finished No. 3 in the 2025 DP World Tour Top 10 to earn his TOUR card for the 2026 season
- 2026 U.S. Presidents Cup Captain **Brandt Snedeker** claimed his 10th PGA TOUR title at the ONEflight Myrtle Beach Classic – his first since the 2018 Wyndham Championship – to qualify for his first PGA Championship since 2020; marks his first start in a major championship since the 2021 Open Championship
- In search of his first major championship title, **Rickie Fowler** enters the week with three consecutive top-10 finishes on TOUR (T8/RBC Heritage, T9/Cadillac Championship, T2/Truist Championship); best finish at the PGA Championship is T3 (2014)
- Field features:
 - 93 PGA TOUR winners who have combined for 445 titles, led by **Rory McIlroy** (30)
 - 31 players in the field have won at least one major championship, led by **Rory McIlroy** (6), **Brooks Koepka** (5) and **Scottie Scheffler** (4)
 - 30 players in the field competed in the 2018 BMW Championship when it was hosted at Aronimink Golf Club, highlighted by all of the top five finishers: **Keegan Bradley** (Won), **Justin Rose** (2nd), **Billy Horschel** (T3), **Xander Schauffele** (T3), **Rory McIlroy** (5th)
 - 26 different countries are represented in the field, with 100 of those players coming from either the United States (85) or England (15); next most is Australia (six)
 - 14 past PGA Championship winners: **Keegan Bradley, Jason Day, Jason Dufner, Pádraig Harrington, Martin Kaymer, Brooks Koepka, Rory McIlroy, Shaun Michael, Collin Morikawa, Xander Schauffele, Scottie Scheffler, Justin Thomas, Jimmy Walker and Y.E. Yang**
 - 10 PGA TOUR rookies: **Chandler Blanchet, Dan Brown, Alex Fitzpatrick, Rasmus Neergaard-Petersen, John Parry, Marco Penge, Kristoffer Reitan, Adrien Saddier, Jordan Smith, Sudarshan Yellamaraju**

PGA TOUR season notes

- **First-Time Winners:** Through 19 events of the 2026 PGA TOUR Season, there have only been four first-time TOUR winners (Jacob Bridgeman/The Genesis Invitational, Ricky Castillo/Puerto Rico Open, Alex Fitzpatrick/Zurich Classic of New Orleans, Kristoffer Reitan/Truist Championship); Matt Fitzpatrick is the last player to win a major championship for his first career PGA TOUR title (2022 U.S. Open)
- **Close calls:** 12 of the last 16 events on TOUR have been decided by one stroke or in a playoff; three of the last 10 PGA Championships have been decided by one stroke or in a playoff (most recent: 2024/Xander Schauffele by one stroke over Bryson DeChambeau)
- **40 and over:** Brandt Snedeker, 45, became the third player in his 40s to win on TOUR this season, joining Justin Rose (Farmers Insurance Open) and Gary Woodland (Texas Children's Houston Open); since 1980, only four players over 40 have won the PGA Championship (Jack Nicklaus/1980/40, Lee Trevino/1984/44, Vijay Singh/2004/41, Phil Mickelson/2021/50)
- **54-hole leaders:** Eight of 19 players with the 54-hole lead/co-lead on TOUR have gone on to win this season (including Matt and Alex Fitzpatrick at the Zurich Classic of New Orleans); six of the last 10 54-hole leaders/co-leaders at the PGA Championship went on to win, including the last two (Scottie Scheffler/2025, Xander Schauffele/2024)
- **Multiple Winners in 2026 (3):** **Matt Fitzpatrick** (Valspar Championship, RBC Heritage, Zurich Classic of New Orleans), **Chris Gotterup** (Sony Open in Hawaii, WM Phoenix Open), **Cameron Young** (THE PLAYERS Championship, Cadillac Championship)
