**Matt Fitzpatrick**

- RBC Canadian Open runner-up is the new FedExCup leader, moving up from No. 3 in the standings; marked his sixth top-10 in 14 starts this season, including his three victories
- 2022 U.S. Open champion will be making his 45<sup>th</sup> major championship start
- In 44 career starts in major championships, has 17 top-25 finishes and six top-10s, including one win (2022 U.S. Open)
- Most recent international winner of the U.S. Open (2022)
- Making his 12<sup>th</sup> start in the U.S. Open; in addition to his win, has top-25 finishes in 2018 (T12 at Shinnecock Hills), 2019 (T12) and 2023 (T17)
- Only three-time winner on TOUR this season: Valspar Championship, RBC Heritage, Zurich Classic of New Orleans

**Wyndham Clark**

- 2023 U.S. Open champion is making his 19<sup>th</sup> major championship start
- Closed with an 11-under 60 to win the 2026 CJ CUP Byron Nelson, his fourth PGA TOUR victory
- One of four players on record to post a final-round 60 or better on the TOUR and go on to win – and the only player to achieve this feat twice: David Duval/1999 American Express (59), Stuart Appleby/2010 Greenbrier Classic (59), Tommy Gainey/2012 RSM Classic (60), Clark/2024 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am (60)\* and 2026 CJ CUP Byron Nelson (60): \*54 holes due to weather
- Only other top-10 finish this season came at the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday (3<sup>rd</sup>)
- Victory in 2023 marks his only top-10 finish in five U.S. Open starts (MC/2021, MC/2022, 1<sup>st</sup>/2023, T56/2024, MC/2025)
- Finished T11 last week at the RBC Canadian Open; currently No. 18 in the FedExCup standings

**Jackson Koivun**

- World No. 1 amateur set to make his professional debut in two weeks at the John Deere Classic
- Recently announced he is accepting PGA TOUR membership via PGA TOUR University Accelerated; is the third player to earn TOUR card via the Accelerated program, joining Vanderbilt's Gordon Sargent and Florida State's Luke Clanton
- Led Auburn University to its second national championship title in three years; won six times in 13 collegiate starts this season, with all six coming in his last 10 starts; became the first player in collegiate golf history to win all three Player of the Year awards (Haskins, Hogan, Nicklaus)
- Exempt into the U.S. Open as last year's McCormack Award winner as the leading player in the World Amateur Golf Ranking
- Has made nine starts as an amateur on TOUR, with four consecutive finishes of T11 or better in his most recent starts (2025 John Deere Classic/T11, 2025 ISCO Championship/T6, 2025 Wyndham Championship/T5, 2025 Procore Championship/T4)
- Missed the cut in his only other U.S. Open start (2025)

### **Rory McIlroy**

- Winner of the 2026 Masters Tournament; only six players have won the Masters and U.S. Open in the same year: Craig Wood (1941), Ben Hogan (1951, 1953), Arnold Palmer (1960), Jack Nicklaus (1972), Tiger Woods (2002) and Jordan Spieth (2015)
- Six-time major champion (2011 U.S. Open, 2012 PGA Championship, 2014 Open Championship, 2014 PGA Championship, 2025, 2026 Masters Tournament)
- World No. 2 has 30 PGA TOUR victories, the most of any player in the field
- Three top-10s in eight starts this season (1<sup>st</sup>/Masters Tournament, T2/The Genesis Invitational, T7/PGA Championship)
- Most recent player to defend a title on TOUR (2026 Masters Tournament)
- Nine consecutive seasons with a win, the longest active streak on TOUR
- Seeking his fifth consecutive multi-win season (3/2021-22; 2/2022-23; 2/2024; 3/2025)
- Became the sixth player in history to complete the Career Grand Slam with his win at the 2025 Masters Tournament (Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Gary Player, Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods)
- 2011 U.S. Open champion at Congressional Country Club is making his 18<sup>th</sup> appearance in 2026; T19 in 2025 snapped a streak of six consecutive top-10 finishes at the U.S. Open (T9/2019; T8/2020; T7/2021; T5/2022; 2<sup>nd</sup>/2023; 2<sup>nd</sup>/2024); missed the cut at Shinnecock Hills in 2018 with rounds of 80-70
- First-round 80 in 2018 at Shinnecock Hills is tied for the highest score of his PGA TOUR career (2010 Open Championship/R2, 2011 Masters Tournament/R4)
- Owns the U.S. Open 72-hole scoring record (268/Congressional Country Club/2011)

### **Scottie Scheffler**

- World No. 1 seeks to become the seventh player in history to complete the Career Grand Slam (Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Gary Player, Jack Nicklaus, Tiger Woods, Rory McIlroy)
- 20-time PGA TOUR winner is in search of his second victory of the season (The American Express); making his first start since a T12 at the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday
- Leads the TOUR in Greens in Regulation Percentage (71.99%) and Par 4 Scoring Average (3.88)
- Has made 76 consecutive cuts, the longest active consecutive cuts made streak on TOUR; last missed cut came at the 2022 FedEx St. Jude Championship
- Four-time major champion (2022 Masters Tournament, 2024 Masters Tournament, 2025 PGA Championship, 2025 Open Championship)
- Most recent player to win multiple majors in one year (2025 PGA Championship, 2025 Open Championship)
- Ninth appearance at the U.S. Open; best finish: T2 (2022); top-10 finishes in four of last five appearances (T7/2021; T2/2022; 3<sup>rd</sup>/2023; T41/2024, T7/2025)

### **Adam Scott**

- Scheduled to make his 100<sup>th</sup> consecutive major championship appearance, dating to the 2001 Open Championship; only Jack Nicklaus (146) has played in more than 100 straight majors
- Has 20 top-10 finishes in major championships, led by his win at the 2013 Masters Tournament
- Has three top-10 finishes in 24 prior U.S. Open starts (T4/2015, T7/2019, T9/2014); missed the cut at Shinnecock Hills at the 2004 (75-75) and 2018 (78-75) U.S. Open
- Sat T2 entering the final round of the 2025 U.S. Open before posting 79 to finish T12
- 14-time PGA TOUR winner (437 starts); most recent win came at the 2020 Genesis Invitational
- Eight top-25 finishes in 12 starts this season, led by a fourth-place finish at the Genesis Invitational and T4 at the Cadillac Championship; currently No. 25 in the FedExCup standings

### **J.J. Spaun**

- Winner of the 2026 Valero Texas Open, his third PGA TOUR victory; currently No. 21 in the FedExCup standings
- Enters the week with top-15 finishes in four of his last five starts on TOUR (T14/Cadillac Championship, T5/Truist Championship, MC/PGA Championship, T6/Charles Schwab Challenge, T12/the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday)
- Third in Strokes Gained: Approach the Green this season (0.762)
- Holed a 65-foot putt on the 72<sup>nd</sup> hole to win the 2025 U.S. Open by two strokes over Robert MacIntyre; at 1-under 279, was the lone player to finish under par for the week
- Victory in 2025 marks his only top-10 finish in 12 major championship starts; missed the cut in his only other U.S. Open appearance (2021)
- Seeking to become the first player to successfully defend at the U.S. Open since Brooks Koepka in 2018

### **Cameron Young**

- With wins at THE PLAYERS Championship and Cadillac Championship, is one of three multiple winners this season (Matt Fitzpatrick/3, Chris Gotterup/2); currently No. 3 in the FedExCup standings
- Making his seventh U.S. Open appearance (best: T4/2025)
- Runner-up at the 2022 Open Championship marks his best finish in 20 major championship starts
- Enters the week eighth in Strokes Gained: Off the Tee (0.576) this season

## Brooks Koepka

- Has five wins in 48 major championship starts (2017, 2018 U.S. Open; 2018, 2019, 2023 PGA Championship)
- Is the most recent player to successfully defend at the U.S. Open (2018; one-stroke win over Tommy Fleetwood)
- Makes his 13<sup>th</sup> start on TOUR since becoming eligible via the Returning Member Program, which allows players who have achieved levels of elite performance-based criteria an alternative path back to the PGA TOUR; best finish this season is T9 at the Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches
- Nine-time winner makes his 199<sup>th</sup> PGA TOUR start; withdrew prior to the final round of last week's RBC Canadian Open with a hand injury

## Miles Russell

- Florida State commit and Jacksonville Beach, Florida native advanced through final qualifying at BallenIsles Country Club in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida with rounds of 71-67; will mark his major championship debut
- 17-year-old is two-time AJGA Player of the Year; was the youngest to win the award in 2023 at 15 years old
- Ranked 11<sup>th</sup> in the World Amateur Golf Ranking
- Has one made cut in five previous PGA TOUR starts (T50/2026 Puerto Rico Open)
- Has two top-20 finishes in seven Korn Ferry Tour starts (T15/2026 Club Car Championship at The Landings & Athletic Club, T20/2024 LECOM Suncoast Classic); became the youngest player to make the cut in Korn Ferry Tour history at the 2024 LECOM Suncoast Classic as a 15-year-old

## U.S. Open notes:

- Third major of the 2026 season (Rory McIlroy/Masters Tournament; Aaron Rai/PGA Championship)
- 126<sup>th</sup> playing of the U.S. Open, dating to 1895
- The 2026 U.S. Open will be the 76th USGA championship and 21<sup>st</sup> U.S. Open conducted in New York
- Shinnecock Hills Golf Club is the lone course to have hosted the U.S. Open in three different centuries; founded in 1891, is the oldest incorporated golf club in the United States; is one of the five founding member clubs of the USGA, which was established in 1894 and conducted its first championships in 1895
  - In 1896, Shinnecock Hills hosted the second U.S. Open (35 total players) and second U.S. Amateur (58 total players)
  - The 2026 U.S. Open is the 10th USGA championship to be conducted by the club and the sixth U.S. Open (1896/James Foulis, 1986/Raymond Floyd, 1995/Corey Pavin, 2004/Retief Goosen, 2018/Brooks Koepka)
  - Shinnecock Hills Golf Club will also host the 2036 U.S. Open and 2036 U.S. Women's Open
- The USGA accepted 10,201 entries for the 2026 U.S. Open at Shinnecock Hills Golf Club, one entry shy of the record 10,202 entries accepted for the 2025 U.S. Open at Oakmont (Pa.) Country Club; marks the fifth time in championship history that the number of entries exceeded 10,000
- The field will be cut after 36 holes to the low 60 and ties
- In the event of a playoff, a two-hole aggregate playoff will take place following the completion of Sunday's final round
- What the winner receives:
  - U.S. Open exemption for the next 10 years
  - A five-year invitation to the Masters Tournament, Open Championship, PGA Championship and THE PLAYERS Championship
  - Exempt status on the PGA TOUR for five years
- Qualifying for the other majors: The top-10 finishers (and ties) are exempt into the following year's U.S. Open; the top four finishers (and ties) are invited to the following year's Masters Tournament
- The field includes:
  - 61 of the top 70 in the FedExCup standings; Eric Cole (No. 38) is the highest-ranked player in the FedExCup who is not in the field
  - 49 of the top 50 in the Official World Golf Ranking (Marco Penge)
  - Past U.S. Open champions (2025/**J.J. Spaun**; 2024/2020/**Bryson DeChambeau**; 2023/**Wyndham Clark**; 2022/**Matt Fitzpatrick**; 2021/**Jon Rahm**; 2019/**Gary Woodland**; 2018/2017/**Brooks Koepka**; 2016/**Dustin Johnson**; 2015/**Jordan Spieth**; 2013/**Justin Rose**; 2011/**Rory McIlroy**; 2010/**Graeme McDowell**)
  - Every PGA TOUR winner this season with the exception of Ricky Castillo and Brandt Snedeker
  - All seven Signature Event winners this season: **Collin Morikawa** (AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am), **Jacob Bridgeman** (The Genesis Invitational), **Akshay Bhatia** (Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard), **Matt Fitzpatrick** (RBC Heritage), **Cameron Young** (Cadillac Championship), **Kristoffer Reitan** (Truist Championship), **J.T. Poston** (the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday)
  - All three multiple winners this season: **Matt Fitzpatrick** (3), **Cameron Young** (2), **Chris Gotterup** (2)
  - Four of five first-time winners in 2026: **Jacob Bridgeman** (The Genesis Invitational), **Alex Fitzpatrick** (Zurich Classic of New Orleans), **Kristoffer Reitan** (Truist Championship), **Bud Cauley** (RBC Canadian Open)
  - Last week's RBC Canadian Open winner **Bud Cauley** moved from No. 68 to No. 40 in the Official World Golf Ranking to qualify via the Top 60 OWGR cutoff
- Thirty-six players in the field competed in the 2018 U.S. Open when it was last played at Shinnecock Hills, including eight who finished inside the top 10: **Brooks Koepka** (1<sup>st</sup>), **Tommy Fleetwood** (2<sup>nd</sup>), **Dustin Johnson** (3<sup>rd</sup>), **Patrick Reed** (4<sup>th</sup>), **Daniel Berger** (T6), **Tyrrell Hatton** (T6), **Xander Schauffele** (T6), **Justin Rose** (T10)
- **Xander Schauffele** has finished in the top 14 in each of his nine appearances at the U.S. Open; best finish: T3/2019; most recently finished T12 in 2025

- 2018 U.S. Open runner-up and World No. 6 **Tommy Fleetwood** has six top-10s in 12 starts this season (best: T4/the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday, AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am); coming off a T11 at last week's RBC Canadian Open

#### PGA TOUR season notes

- **Matt Fitzpatrick** claimed the FedExCup standings lead with a runner-up finish at the RBC Canadian Open; holds a six-point lead over **Scottie Scheffler**
- **Justin Rose** (Farmers Insurance Open) and **Cameron Young** (Cadillac Championship) are the only players to win wire-to-wire on TOUR this season; Martin Kaymer (2014) is the last wire-to-wire winner of the U.S. Open
- There have been five first-time winners in the first 24 events on TOUR this season: **Jacob Bridgeman** (The Genesis Invitational), **Ricky Castillo** (Puerto Rico Open), **Alex Fitzpatrick** (Zurich Classic of New Orleans), **Kristoffer Reitan** (Truist Championship), **Bud Cauley** (RBC Canadian Open); the last player to make the U.S. Open his first TOUR title is **Matt Fitzpatrick** (2022)
- The 54-hole leader/co-leader has gone on to win eight of 23 individual stroke-play events on TOUR this season (most recent: J.T. Poston/the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday); the 54-hole leader/co-leader has won three of the last four U.S. Opens (**Matt Fitzpatrick/2022**, **Wyndham Clark/2023**, **Bryson DeChambeau/2024**); in 2018, Brooks Koepka shared the 54-hole lead with Tony Finau, Dustin Johnson and Daniel Berger
- **Si Woo Kim** leads the TOUR in top-10 finishes this season with eight; surpassed Scottie Scheffler (7) with his T10 at the Memorial Tournament presented by Workday; two runner-up finishes this season came at the Farmers Insurance Open (T2) and THE CJ CUP Byron Nelson (2<sup>nd</sup>)
- Aon Next 10: The top 10 players in the FedExCup standings not otherwise exempt following the U.S. Open will qualify for next week's final Signature Event at the Travelers Championship
