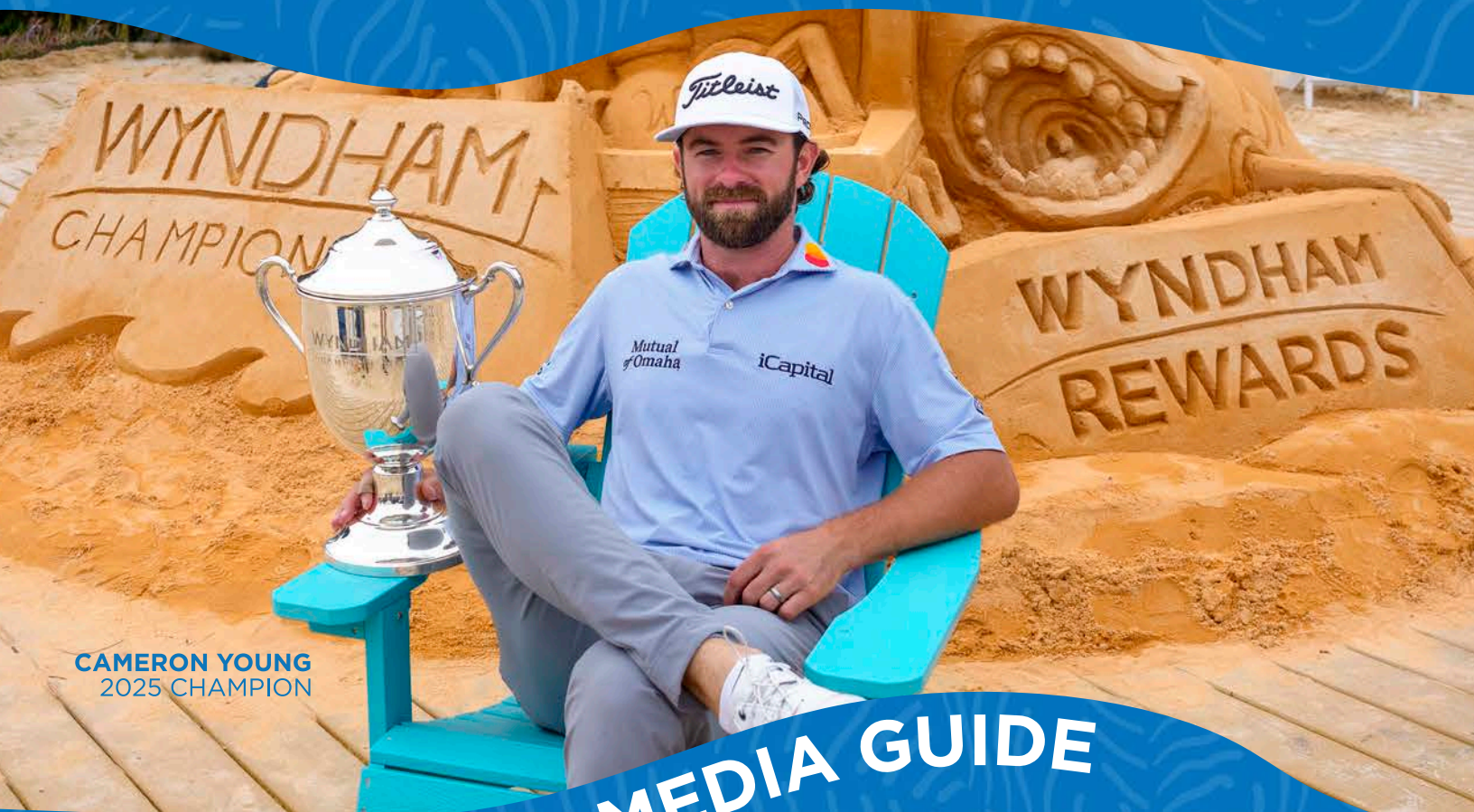

FIELD:	The starting field of 144 players is determined by the PGA TOUR. The Wyndham Championship has eight sponsor exemptions, and the top four finishers in the qualifying tournament Monday, August 3, 2026, will complete the field.	
FORMAT:	Play will be contested over 72 holes of stroke play. The low 70 golfers and ties will make the 36-hole cut. Should there be a tie for the lead following the final round, a sudden-death playoff will occur.	
2025 TOURNAMENT RECAP:	Cameron Young won the 86th Wyndham Championship finishing atop a field widely considered among the strongest in modern tournament history. Players entered striving to improve their position in the regular season's final top 10 or get into the top 10 for a shot at \$60 Million in bonus money, secure a spot in the top 50 after the second playoff event to qualify for the 2026 signature events or secure a spot in the top 70 to qualify for the FedExCup Playoffs. Young was looking for his first PGA TOUR win after seven runner-up finishes. The Wake Forest University alumnus was tied for third after the first round with a 7-under par 63 trailing first-round leader Joel Dahmen by two strokes. A second-round 62 gave Young a three stroke lead; his 63-62 start put him 15-under par tying the 36-hole tournament record. A third-round 5-under 65 gave him a 5-stroke lead; his 54-hole total of 190 was his career best and set the tournament record. Young cruised to a six-stroke victory with a final round 2-under 68. His 72-hole total of 258 was his career best and tied the tournament record. He became the 1,000th unique winner in PGA TOUR history, the fourth Wyndham Championship winner from Wake Forest and the tournament's 23rd first-time winner. He jumped from 40th to 16th in FedExCup points and from 44th to 21st in the Official World Golf Rankings. Amateur Jackson Koivun finished tied for fifth tying Luke Clanton's mark for highest finish by an amateur.

The Wyndham Championship is hosting a 50/50 raffle this year benefitting the tournament's backpack program partners and First Tee-Triad. Wyndham Rewards supports talented junior golfers who lack the financial resources to play a national junior golf schedule through the Liberty National Achieving Competitive Excellence (ACE) grant. This grant helps fulfill the AJGA's mission of developing young men and women who aspire to earn college golf scholarships through competitive junior golf. In addition, the Wyndham Championship annually hosts the AJGA Wyndham Invitational presented by Odyssey, a major on the AJGA schedule played at Sedgefield Country Club. REMEMBERING IRWIN SMALLWOOD



Irwin Smallwood was a golf writer, sports editor and managing editor of the Greensboro News & Record, formerly the Greensboro Daily News, where he worked for more than four decades. Smallwood passed away March 9, 2024 at the age of 98. The Wyndham Championship media center was named in his honor in 2004.

Smallwood pioneered golf writing in North Carolina, but he did not limit himself to PGA TOUR events. He was also enthusiastic about junior tournaments and other amateur events, but the Wyndham Championship was a big part of his life. Smallwood was at Sedgefield in 1961 when Charlie Sifford broke the color barrier becoming the first African American golfer to play in a PGA TOUR tournament in the “old south.” He assured Sifford that he would be treated fairly. Smallwood once personally delivered a telegram to Gary Player telling him he’d become a father.

His diligence and writing flare earned the Greensboro native three National Golf Writers Association awards and numerous other honors including being named the 1959 National Sports Media Association North Carolina Sportswriter of the Year; he was the first in North Carolina to win the award. Smallwood was promoted to Managing Editor and spent 18 years on the news side of the business prior to five years as executive sports editor before retiring in 1989.

Smallwood was passionate about gender equity and fought for equal access for female writers and reporters so they, too, would have locker-room access like male reporters. He co-founded the Carolinas Golf Writers Association, an organization created so writers would play new golf courses and write about them to grow the game.

Smallwood observed the Wyndham Championship, founded in 1938 as the Greater Greensboro Open, one way or another starting in the late 1940s and was said to have attended more than 70 tournaments as a fan, writer or tournament dignitary; he was the tournament’s honorary chairman in 1999. Many share Smallwood’s love for the Wyndham Championship, but few, if any, could equal his knowledge and passion for the event.

Nearly Nine Decades of Great Golf, Memorable Tournaments

In 2008, the Wyndham Championship moved back to Sedgefield Country Club and became the only regular-season event on the PGA TOUR contested on a course originally designed by the legendary Donald Ross. The Wyndham Championship is the seventh-oldest event on the PGA TOUR, excluding the Majors, and the 2019 tournament is the 84th renewal of North Carolina's oldest professional golf event. The tournament enjoys a rich history that few PGA TOUR events have.

The Greensboro Jaycees were barely a year old when the idea of a golf tournament began to take life. Dr. Alex Stanford had founded the chapter in 1936 and lawyer Ed Kuykendall Jr. was president in '37 when Greensboro Daily News sports editor Laurence Leonard began pushing the idea, along with Starmount Forest County Club pro George Corcoran. Starmount owner Edward B. Benjamin was solidly behind the notion and had been ever since Starmount had hosted the Carolinas Open of 1932, when Henry Picard beat the legendary Walter Hagen in a classic playoff. As would be repeated later in the life of the tournament, it was the Greensboro business community that finally came to the rescue of the ambitious project. At an August 1937 meeting at the old O. Henry Hotel, attended by the core of the business and civic leadership of the city – including Joseph M. Bryan – the financial (\$5,000) underpinning for the tournament was finalized. Later that evening Fred Corcoran, PGA tournament manager, awarded Greensboro tour dates for the spring of 1938 and the Greater Greensboro Open was born. (It is important to note also that Starmount pro George Corcoran was a brother of the PGA's Fred Corcoran, for this connection played a major role in the securing of the GGO's original dates).

The GGO was given a spectacular boost into the national golf picture, from these modest beginnings, through its earliest champions – three of the first four tournaments were won by Sam Snead ('38), Ben Hogan ('40) and Byron Nelson ('41), who for years would dominate the game and remain among the all-time greats in golf. The first five events were played at both Starmount and Sedgefield. After skipping 1943 and '44 for World War II, the tournament resumed at Starmount Forest Country Club in 1945. For the next 13 years, the Greater Greensboro Open alternated between Starmount and Sedgefield. The tournament then moved to Starmount for three straight years.

Alternating between Sedgefield and Starmount was a popular arrangement that suited almost everybody until the 1960 tournament, which followed a hard winter and found Starmount not in the best condition. After winning the tournament for the seventh time, Sam Snead, who for years was said to have buried his money in tomato cans in his back yard, jokingly suggested that Edward Benjamin, who owned Starmount, dig up a few of his tomato cans and fix the course before the next tournament. Benjamin was not amused. He banned Snead from Starmount for life and created a serious problem for the host courses, but with the event growing rapidly, it turned out to be a blessing. Sedgefield, with vastly more space to handle the crowds, became the sole home of the tournament beginning in 1967 and was a major contributor to its development during the next 10 years.

By the late 1970s, however, it was becoming increasingly evident that the tournament needed more space, and Sedgefield did not have it. The membership at Sedgefield, and some of the residents around the course, were becoming less enchanted with the annual invasion of their club. It was an agonizing and controversial decision, but the tournament moved to Forest Oaks Country Club beginning with the 1977 event. The tournament would be played at the Southeast Greensboro course for 31 consecutive years. As it turned out, the move was a good one. Larger galleries and more sponsors than ever enabled the tournament to continue its growth, and the second tournament at Forest Oaks turned up the largest profit in GGO history, a whopping \$174,219. A decade and a half later the profits would reach \$1 million.

In addition to the course rotation, the tournament has endured numerous name changes. It began in 1938 as the Greater Greensboro Open. That name held until 1998 when K-Mart joined the event as title sponsor. The tournament then became the K-Mart Greater Greensboro Open. After an eight-year relationship with K-Mart, Daimler-Chrysler became the title sponsor, and the tournament became the Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic. 2003 was a year of change as the Forest Oaks course was redesigned by Davis Love III and his design company. With the revamped course came new October tournament dates and the debut of the next event name, the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro. In 2006, Daimler-Chrysler made a business decision to end its 11-year association with the Piedmont Triad's PGA TOUR event. Wyndham Rewards signed on as the new title sponsor, and the Wyndham Championship debuted in 2007.

STAR-STUDED TOURNAMENT

Probably never in the history of sport has an athlete bonded with a city not of his birth the way Sam Snead and Greensboro became intertwined through the years. If there is, indeed, a defining moment in the life of a tournament, Greensboro's was when Snead began to call it "my second home." In 1965, Sam Snead was about ready to take his place as a relic of the past. He was being honored on the occasion of his 25th appearance in the GGO, which that year had one of the strongest PGA TOUR fields of the year, including Arnold Palmer, Gary Player, Billy Casper and Julius Boros. He proceeded to win the event by five shots with four sub-70 rounds, and at age 52 years, 10 months and 8 days became the oldest player ever to win a PGA TOUR event – the record still stands today.

But that was not the end of Greensboro's love affair with Snead. Twenty-three years later he would return to help celebrate the tournament's 50th anniversary, to see the street leading to Starmount Forest Country Club renamed Sam Snead Drive. On the 60th anniversary of the tournament, he returned again to celebrate the establishment of the Sam Snead Cup, which goes now to the winner of the tournament. Slammin' Sammy won the then Greater Greensboro Open eight times from 1938 to '65; the record is still the TOUR mark for victories at an event. Other notable winners include Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, Julius Boros, Gary Player, Al Geiberger, Billy Casper, Gene Littler, George Archer, Chi Chi Rodriguez, Davis Love III, Mark O'Meara, Larry Nelson, Seve Ballesteros, Lanny Wadkins and Raymond Floyd.

HISTORICAL MOMENTS

1940

Ben Hogan arrived in Greensboro after winning the North/South Open in Pinehurst, the first of win his career, and won a tournament that was delayed three days by snow. After playing the first round at Starmount, some three inches of snow fell in Greensboro. Once the snow melted, play resumed at Starmount before moving to Sedgefield, where Hogan played 36 spectacular holes to win by nine strokes. After the tournament, Hogan went to Asheville and won the Land of the Sky Open for his third consecutive win.

1942

Sam Byrd, former backup player for Babe Ruth and the New York Yankees, produced a final-round rally to win the tournament. Byrd is still the only Major League Baseball player to win a PGA TOUR event.

1945

Byron Nelson won the tournament at Starmount Forest. It was the third of his record-setting streak of 11 straight PGA TOUR wins. He defeated Sam Byrd by eight strokes.

1947

Tall Vic Gheszi played the ball and the mud with equal skill to win the event in which no one broke par in 72 holes of play.

1950

With what PGA TOUR officials called the largest crowd ever on the winter tour watching, Sam Snead won with rounds of 66-70-66-67 in perfect springtime weather at Sedgefield. The tournament actually ran out of tickets, and officials went to Cone Mills to print more for the weekend.

1952

Sam Snead finished tied for first with Dave Doyle and seemed headed to a playoff. However, the playoff never happened because the tournament was settled after a rules discussion regarding Snead's second shot at the 17th hole at Starmount. At the par-3, Snead's tee shot landed in the creek, and he incorrectly played the ball on the green side of the creek. Long after play was complete, he was assessed a two-stroke penalty, giving him a new four-round total of 279. The resulting penalty moved Snead from a tie for first place to third, two strokes behind Doyle, who shot 277 and was declared the winner.

1960

Since its inception in 1938, the tournament alternated between Sedgefield and Starmount Forest. The 1960 tournament followed a hard winter, and at tournament time, Starmount wasn't in the best of conditions. After winning the GGO for the seventh time, Snead jokingly suggested that Starmount owner Edward Benjamin spend some of his money to fix up the course before the next event. Benjamin was not amused and banned Snead from Starmount for life, making Sedgefield the then-permanent home of the tournament. Also in 1960, Thorne Wood fired a first-round 66 and became the first left-handed golfer in PGA TOUR history to lead an official event.

1961

When Mose Kiser Jr. and his colleagues began preparations for the 1961 GGO, the Civil Rights Act was still some four years down the road and the impact of the Feb. 1, 1960, Greensboro Sit-Ins at Woolworth's was just beginning to be felt across the nation. With full support from the host club, Sedgefield, the tournament decided it was time to open its arms across the racial divide and issued a personal invitation to Charlie Sifford to participate. Sifford, a seasoned and accomplished competitor who grew up caddying in Charlotte, graciously accepted, becoming the first African-American to play in a PGA TOUR event in the Old South. He had already played in a TOUR event in California. Sifford led the first round at Greensboro with a 68, trailed by only three strokes after three rounds and wound up tied for fourth behind winner Mike Souchak, Sam Snead and Billy Maxwell. There were some racial hecklers along the way, but, for the most part, he was welcomed in a dignified manner. Six months later, the Caucasian Clause came out of the PGA TOUR bylaws.

1965

Sam Snead won his PGA TOUR record-setting eighth Greater Greensboro Open. He won the first GGO in 1938, and when he won his eighth 27 years later, he became the TOUR's oldest tournament winner at age 52 years, 10 months and eight days. The tournament hosted its first champion's banquet and honored Snead's 25th appearance in the GGO. Ed Sullivan was the Toastmaster.

1966

While corporate sponsorship was something tournament organizers wanted to avoid, it was taking hold and threatening independent tournaments. Officials finally decided to take at least a partial step toward commercial help. The decision came when Allied Chemical, a major supplier of the textile industry, approached GGO officials about becoming a limited partner in the tournament sponsorship. This first for the Triad's TOUR event eventually led to a title sponsor, though that would not come until two decades later.

1968

Billy Casper won the tournament at Sedgefield, his second victory in this event. The final round was postponed due to the April 4 assassination of Martin Luther King Jr.

1969

Four players competed in a five-hole sudden-death playoff, the largest playoff in tournament history. Gene Littler sank a curling 12-foot putt at the 15th hole to defeat Julius Boros, Orville Moody and Tom Weiskopf.

1970

Arnold Palmer was the leader or tied for the lead after each of the first three rounds of the tournament. Gary Player fired a final-round 65 to win the tournament by two strokes at Sedgefield Country Club; it was the lowest final-round score by a tournament winner at Sedgefield. Palmer finished tied for fifth, five shots back.

1972

Arnold Palmer held a two-stroke lead in the final round when he teed off on the par-three 16th hole at Sedgefield and appeared headed to an easy victory. Palmer put his tee shot into the creek beside the 16th green and tried to play out of the shallow water there. That decision cost him the tournament as he recorded a triple-bogey 6 and finished third. George Archer defeated Tommy Aaron on the second hole of the playoff to win the tournament.

1976

Al Geiberger won the Greater Greensboro Open in what was then the last tournament at Sedgefield Country Club. Geiberger defeated Lee Trevino by two strokes to claim the \$46,000 first-place check. The tournament moved to Forest Oaks Country Club the following year where it stayed for 31 years.

1978

Playing in his first United States tournament, Spain's Seve Ballesteros won the Greater Greensboro Open at age 20 years and 11 months. Ballesteros would return the next year and finish tied for 12th. In 1981, he made his final appearance and tied for 45th.

1979

Fayetteville's Raymond Floyd defeated George Burns and Gary Player in a playoff at Forest Oaks and became the first North Carolina native to win the event. Three-time winner Davis Love III and 2011 champion Webb Simpson are the only other native North Carolinians to win it.

1988

The GGO's 50th anniversary was marked by the tournament's first step into the world of corporate sponsorship. K-Mart came aboard as the title sponsor, enabling the tournament to return to the level of the PGA TOUR elite with a \$1 million purse – for the four previous tournaments, the purse fell below the TOUR average. Now it was above the average by more than \$200,000. The 50th anniversary also turned into a major homecoming. Snead returned, as did two-time winner Byron Nelson and a long line of other past winners. Snead, Nelson, Raymond Floyd and Lanny Wadkins were featured speakers at the celebration banquet, following a special nine-hole pro-am at Sedgefield for former champions and GGO regulars from earlier days. Sandy Lyle won the K-Mart Greater Greensboro Open in a sudden-death playoff with Ken Green, who was best known for his green golf shoes.

1992

There have been many stirring finishes to the GGO, KGGG, GGCC, Chrysler Classic of Greensboro and now the Wyndham Championship. But, perhaps the one that many now refer to as the granddaddy of them all occurred in 1992. Davis Love III started the final round three shots behind, yet won the tournament by a whopping six strokes, posting a course-record 31-31-62 that included two eagles on holes where he did not even have to putt. After birdies at the first two holes, he hit a 117-yard wedge to the seventh that landed about six inches behind the pin and backed up into the cup for an eagle two. When he came to the par-five 15th, he had birdied three more times and was comfortably in the lead. But his heroics were not over. He smashed a 310-yard drive onto the flat of the distant hill, then sailed a 1-iron over the green and into the back bunker. Not to worry; he blasted out perfectly – right into the cup for an eagle three. The crowd erupted into a celebration seldom, if ever, equaled in the history of the tournament.

1993

The tournament announced a purse increase to \$1.5 million and a new logo for the event.

1994

Rocco Mediate and 1990 champion Steve Elkington went head-to-head for four playoff holes following regulation play. Mediate pulled out the win earning his second-career PGA TOUR win.

1996

The tournament purse increased to \$1.8 million; the Daimler-Chrysler Corporation assumed title sponsorship.

2001

The Chrysler Classic of Greensboro hired Tournament Director Mark Brazil to bring consistency to the tournament. Brazil would work closely with the Greensboro Jaycees to stage the tournament each year.

2003

In 2003, the tournament moved from its traditional spring date to the fall and became the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro. With the new name came a renewed Forest Oaks Country Club. The original Ellis Maples course was redesigned by Davis Love III and his course design company. The new design added length and “bite” to the course increasing total yardage to 7,311. Daimler-Chrysler increased its involvement as the tournament purse grew to \$5 million making the Chrysler Classic the most lucrative stop in the Tour's “Fall Finish.”

2005

In 2005, the Greensboro Jaycees Charitable Foundation Board was formed to oversee tournament operations. Immediately after the formation of the board, tournament director Mark Brazil began reporting directly to the Greensboro Jaycees Charitable Foundation Board rather than the Greensboro Jaycees. When the PGA TOUR announced its re-alignment, the Piedmont Triad's PGA TOUR event earned a coveted date during the FedEx Cup portion of the season starting in 2007. The Triad's PGA TOUR stop become the last regular-season event before the four-tournament FedEx Cup Championship series.

2006

In January, the tournament learned that the Daimler-Chrysler Corporation would not return as the title sponsor in 2007, making 2006 the final year of the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro. Just prior to the 2006 tournament, Wyndham Rewards was introduced as the new title sponsor of the Piedmont Triad's PGA TOUR event. The tournament would be called the Wyndham Championship starting in 2007 removing Greensboro from the tournament's name for the first time. Davis Love III became just the eighth multiple winner of the Piedmont Triad's PGA TOUR event when he won the 2006 tournament, recording four rounds in the 60s.

2007

In the first tournament played in August, PGA TOUR rookie Brandt Snedeker won the inaugural Wyndham Championship and became the 13th first-time winner in tournament history. Also in 2007, the board that oversees tournament operations was renamed the Piedmont Triad Charitable Foundation Board, reflecting the continued regionalization of the Piedmont Triad's PGA TOUR event. In addition, the Donald Ross-designed course at Sedgefield Country Club was restored to its original design and modernized for today's PGA TOUR players.

2008

The Wyndham returned to Sedgefield Country Club beginning with the 2008 tournament. In a Feb. 20 news conference, tournament officials cited a restored Donald Ross original golf course, close proximity to the Grandover Resort where most players and sponsors stay as well as a course located much closer to the center of the Piedmont Triad as reasons for moving the tournament. After 31 years at Forest Oaks, the Wyndham would again be contested on one of the courses where the tournament began in 1938. NC State alumnus Carl Pettersson won the 2008 tournament, posting four rounds in the 60s for a then-record-setting 72-hole score of 259, 21-under-par.

2011

One of the best fields in tournament history challenged Sedgefield Country Club in 2011, but for the 16th time in tournament history, the Wyndham produced a first-time winner in Wake Forest alumnus Webb Simpson. Despite the all-star cast, Simpson – the Raleigh, N.C., native – was the star of the show, navigating the Donald Ross-designed course in 18-under-par 262 on his way to finishing second in the final FedExCup point standings.

2013

Patrick Reed won a sudden-death playoff on the second extra hole to outlast Rookie of the Year Jordan Spieth. Both made par on the first playoff hole at No. 18. On the second playoff hole, the par-4 10th, Reed played a miraculous second shot from the trees on the right side of the fairway to seven feet, with Spieth already safely on the green. Spieth narrowly missed his birdie putt. Reed calmly rolled his putt up the hill and made birdie to earn his first TOUR victory in his 38th start at 23 years of age. Reed was the first player to win on TOUR with his wife (Justine) as his caddie since Steve Stricker won the 1996 BMW Championship with his wife (Nicki) caddying.

2014

The Wyndham celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2014 with former champions Bob Goalby (1958), Dow Finsterwald (1959), Lanny Wadkins (1983), Rocco Mediate (1993 and 2002) and Davis Love III (1992 and 2006) returning for the festivities. Mediate and Love played in the tournament; Goalby, Finsterwald and Wadkins made special appearances. In addition, Weldon Fields, a tournament volunteer at the inaugural Greater Greensboro Open in 1938, returned shortly after his 100th birthday to take part in the festivities. The field included 21 Major championship winners, seven former tournament winners and multiple international stars including World Golf Hall of Famer Ernie Els. Colombian golfer Camilo Villegas became the third international golfer in the previous five years to win the Wyndham.

2015

2016 Ryder Cup Captain Davis Love III won the 76th annual Wyndham Championship and captured a third Sam Snead Cup. Only the man for whom the trophy is named has more wins (eight) at this event. Record crowds attended the Wyndham to see a world-class field that included six former world No. 1 golfers, including Tiger Woods. The 14-time major-championship winner made his first Wyndham appearance and the “Tiger Effect” was in full swing with record-setting crowds following him all weekend. He finished tied for 10th. The Wyndham Championship set records in attendance, merchandise sales, concessions sales and international media impact.

2018

This tournament will forever be remembered for Brandt Snedeker opening with a course-record 59 and becoming just the ninth golfer in PGA TOUR history to post a sub-60 score. Snedeker started his round with a bogey on the par 4 10th hole and went on to make four birdies and turn at 3-under par, but he blistered Sedgefield’s front side, shooting 27 – 8-under par. His birdie at the ninth hole clinched the 59 and a fitting celebration followed; he would finish the opening round with a four-stroke lead over 2009 champion Ryan Moore. On the 18th tee, Snedeker had a two-stroke lead he didn’t know he had until after he hit his approach to the 18th green. He rolled in a 20-footer for birdie, dropped the putter and began celebrating with his wife and kids. His 59 set the course record and the tournament record, and the win moved him from 80th to 30th in the FedExCup point standings.

2019

The Wyndham Rewards Top 10 made its debut in 2019 with Wyndham Rewards paying \$10 Million to the top-10 finishers in the final regular season FedExCup point standings – the Wyndham Rewards Top 10. J.T. Poston won the 80th annual Wyndham Championship and became the fifth North Carolina native to win the tournament. The Hickory native played 72 holes without a bogey making him the first bogey-free champion on TOUR since Lee Trevino did it in 1974. The Western Carolina University alumnus clinched the title with a final-round 62 that tied the tournament mark for the lowest final-round score for a Wyndham Championship winner.

2020

The 81st annual Wyndham Championship was a tournament like none other in its eight-decade history. With the COVID-19 pandemic plaguing the entire world, the 2020 Wyndham was played without fans for the first time ever. Only a skeleton crew of volunteers, a small number of media, a reduced production crew from CBS Sports and a few tournament guests were on hand as Jim Herman claimed the Sam Snead Cup after earning his third PGA TOUR victory. 2016 Champion Si Woo Kim fired a third round 62 to take a two-stroke lead into the final round, but the round of the day belonged to Herman who fired a 9-under par 61 and moved into a tie for fifth after 54 holes. Herman continued his stellar play on Sunday shooting 7-under par 63 to finish the tournament at 21-under par and the leader in the clubhouse. Horschel, who was three strokes back entering the final round, had a birdie putt to tie Herman, but it slipped past the hole making Herman the champion. Herman's weekend total of 124 tied the mark for lowest final 36 holes by a winner in PGA TOUR history.

2021

For the first time in tournament history, a six-man playoff decided the Wyndham Championship. Russell Henley opened the tournament with a brilliant 8-under par 62 and took a two-stroke lead over seven players into the second round. In the third round, Henley maintained his lead with a 1-under par 69 and led the field by three putting himself in position to become the first wire-to-wire winner since Brandt Snedeker in 2018. The six-man playoff tied the record for the largest playoff in PGA TOUR history. Branden Grace, 2016 champion Si Woo Kim, Kevin Kisner, Adam Scott and Roger Sloan were all tied at 15-under par following regulation play. Henley missed a par putt at the 72nd hole and missed the playoff after leading since Thursday. The six-some played the 18th hole again with Adam Scott having a four-foot putt to win with the birdie, but it slid past the hole. On the second playoff hole, also the 18th, Kevin Kisner rolled in a three-footer for birdie to win the playoff and hoist the Sam Snead Cup.

2023

Lucas Glover won the 84th Wyndham Championship conquering a field that was arguably among the strongest in modern tournament history. With the number of players qualifying for the FedExCup playoffs reduced to 70, the Wyndham Championship became a must-play event for anyone ranked 50th to 100th in points. With the list of 50 players qualifying for the 2024 \$20 Million signature events being determined following the opening playoff event, the Wyndham Championship became the place to be for anyone ranked 40th to 100th in points - every golfer, except one, ranked 46th to 100th in points was in the field. Justin Thomas, Adam Scott and Shane Lowry all played in hopes of making the FedExCup playoffs, but none of the three did. Russell Henley opened the tournament 62-66 and led after the first two rounds, but Glover fired his own 8-under par 62 on Saturday to join Billy Horschel at 18-under par after three rounds with Henley one back in third. On Sunday, Glover's steady 2-under 68 was enough to win by two over Henley and Ben An. It was his fifth-career win, and the Clemson University alumnus became the 8th golfer representing an ACC school to hoist the Sam Snead Cup.

2024

Aaron Rai won the 85th annual Wyndham Championship after surviving a 72-hole marathon played in three days. Hurricane Debby marched up the southeast coast arriving in central North Carolina as a Tropical Storm and postponing first-round play until mid-morning Friday. The first round was completed Saturday, and the second, third and fourth rounds were completed Sunday except for one player. The final 36 holes were played Sunday. PGA TOUR rookie and Duke University alumnus Max Greyserman followed his second-round 60 with a 66 and led amateur Luke Clanton, a Florida State University junior, by two strokes. Greyserman led by as many as four on the final nine holes but faltered late. Rai, a five-time international winner from Wolverhampton, England, closed with a bogey-free 64 to claim his first PGA TOUR title, nearly in the dark, in his third Wyndham Championship appearance. He became the tournament's 21st first-time winner, its 21st international winner and its first winner from England. With the win, he moved from 53rd to 25th in FedExCup points and from 48th to 22nd in the Official World Golf Rankings.

2025

Cameron Young won the 86th Wyndham Championship finishing atop a field widely considered among the strongest in modern tournament history. Players entered striving to improve their position in the regular season's final top 10 or get into the top 10 for a shot at \$60 Million in bonus money, secure a spot in the top 50 after the second playoff event to qualify for the 2026 signature events or secure a spot in the top 70 to qualify for the FedExCup Playoffs. Young was looking for his first PGA TOUR win after seven runner-up finishes. The Wake Forest University alumnus was tied for third after the first round with a 7-under par 63 trailing first-round leader Joel Dahmen by two strokes. A second-round 62 gave Young a three stroke lead; his 63-62 start put him 15-under par tying the 36-hole tournament record. A third-round 5-under 65 gave him a 5-stroke lead; his 54-hole total of 190 was his career best and set the tournament record. Young cruised to a six-stroke victory with a final round 2-under 68. His 72-hole total of 258 was his career best and tied the tournament record. He became the 1,000th unique winner in PGA TOUR history, the fourth Wyndham Championship winner from Wake Forest and the tournament's 23rd first-time winner. He jumped from 40th to 16th in FedExCup points and from 44th to 21st in the Official World Golf Rankings. Amateur Jackson Koivun finished tied for fifth tying Luke Clanton's mark for highest finish by an amateur.

Personal:

Developed the pronounced pause at the top of his backswing to eliminate any re-routing or sideways movement of the club in transition. The pause became more and more pronounced through the years, and it is noticeably longer than it was during his college years at Wake Forest.

In March 2026, following his victory at THE PLAYERS Championship, Wake Forest University announced the Cameron Young Family Men's Golf Scholarship. Young said of the scholarship, "Wake Forest gave me an unbelievable foundation, not just in golf but in life. This scholarship is about giving others the same opportunity I had."

FEDEXCUP / FEDEXCUP PLAYOFFS

Established in 2007, the FedExCup is a season-long points competition offering \$100 million in bonus money and culminating with the FedExCup Playoffs in August. Players vie to become the FedExCup Champion, which distinguishes the one player who not only performs well during the FedExCup regular season but also excels through the pressure of the FedExCup Playoffs.

The top-70 players in the FedExCup standings following the Wyndham Championship are eligible for the FedExCup Playoffs with the three events featuring a progressive cut with fields of 70 (FedEx St. Jude Championship), 50 (BMW Championship) and 30 (TOUR Championship).

TOUR Championship:

At the TOUR Championship, the player with the lowest stroke total over 72 holes will win the FedExCup, be credited with an official victory at the TOUR Championship, earn a bonus of \$10 million and receive a five-year PGA TOUR exemption. Players compete for a \$40 million purse at the TOUR Championship that is considered Official Money, separate from the nearly \$100 million in FedExCup Bonus Money.

FEDEXCUP Bonus Structure:

In 2025, the PGA TOUR announced enhancements to the TOUR Championship format, including the elimination of Starting Strokes. To account for the increased volatility of the final event, reward season-long performance and recognize the significance of the FedExCup, a pool of nearly \$100 million in FedExCup Bonus Money will be paid out following the BMW Championship – the last event of the season that awards FedExCup points. The \$40 million purse at the TOUR Championship is considered Official Money and is separate from FedExCup Bonus Money, with the FedExCup Champion receiving \$10 million. The FedExCup points leader following the BMW Championship will earn \$22 Million with second place earning \$12 Million.

The top-50 players in the FedExCup standings are fully exempt for the following season, including THE PLAYERS Championship and all eight Signature Events. Nos. 51-70 in the FedExCup standings are fully exempt, including THE PLAYERS Championship. Top 125 eligibility for the remainder of players is finalized during the FedExCup Fall.

Points Distribution – PGA TOUR Season:

- Official PGA TOUR events played during the PGA TOUR Season each award 500 FedExCup points to the winner.
- The Masters Tournament, THE PLAYERS Championship, U.S. Open, The Open Championship and the PGA Championship award 750 FedExCup points to the winner.
- Winners of Signature Events earn 700 FedExCup points.
- Additional events (played the same week as other tournaments) award 300 FedExCup points to the winner.
- 750 Points to the winners of the first two Playoff Events.

Points Distribution for the Wyndham Championship:

In all cases during the FedExCup Season, points are distributed based on the same percentages used for a standard event purse distribution. First place receives 500 points, second place 300 and third place 190, down through one point for 70th place and fractions of one point for ties at 71 and above.

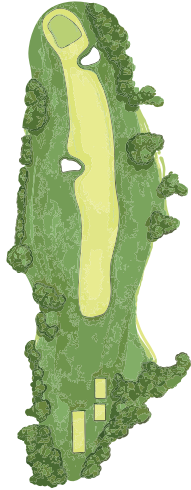

HOLE DESCRIPTIONS



HOLE 1 | PAR 4 | 418 YARDS

Donald Ross preferred to open the round with a hole of somewhat modest difficulty and length, and this is certainly the case at Sedgefield. A drive near the fairway bunker 290 yards from the tee will leave the best angle of approach with a middle iron. This classic raised Ross green leans from right to left.



HOLE 2 | PAR 4 | 442 YARDS

One of the best holes ever designed by Donald Ross. The tee shot will require a slight fade over the middle of three diagonal cross bunkers to set up the shortest and best line into a green that's well protected on the right by a creek. Approach shots should favor the left side of the green, which leans hard right toward the creek.



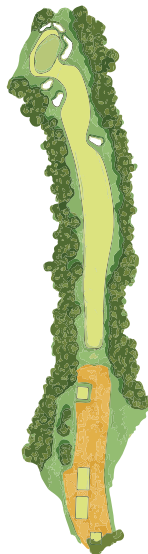
HOLE 3 | PAR 3 | 174 YARDS

This mid-length par three hole is generally played into the prevailing wind and contains three of the deepest bunkers on the course, short and right. The large, somewhat subtle green narrows the deeper one plays into it. Long and left is a very difficult up and down, with the green sloping away from the player.



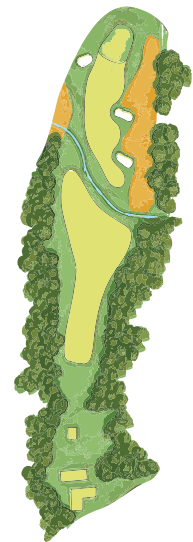
HOLE 4 | PAR 4 | 428 YARDS

A blind tee shot to a left-to-right sloping fairway awaits the player on this hole. The best line favors the left side, allowing for considerable roll to the right. The bunkerless green is one of the most undulating and demanding on the course, requiring a very precise approach to get it close for a birdie attempt.



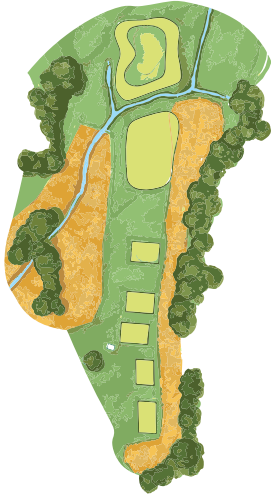
HOLE 5 | PAR 5 | 529 YARDS

The first par five of the course is easily reachable in two shots. However, a deep hollow running diagonally across the putting surface will make getting up and down for birdie a challenge. The key to this hole is finding a level lie in the well-undulating fairway. Any shot hit short of this green will roll well back down the fairway.



HOLE 6 | PAR 4 | 423 YARDS

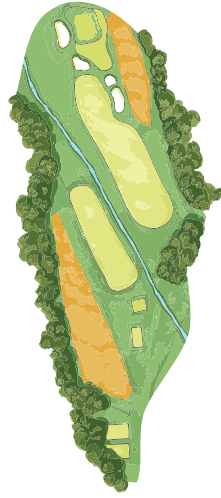
A dramatically downhill tee shot to a fairway crossed by a creek at 280 yards calls for a fairway metal or long iron. Those players who position the ball left of center nearest the creek will be rewarded with the best angle into this front-sloping green. The most difficult hole location is back right, behind a large rolling mound.



HOLE 7 | PAR 3 | 223 YARDS

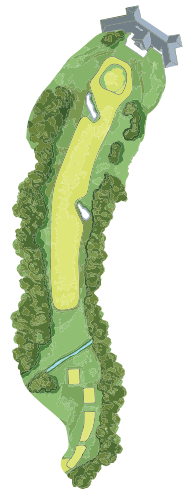
On this long par three, the green is guarded on three sides by a deep creek and features a soft punch bowl green with very difficult hole locations in the corners. Par is a great score on this demanding hole.

This is the hole that Arnold Palmer triple bogeyed during the final round of the 1972 GGO, costing him the tournament and breaking the hearts of everyone in "Arnie's Army."



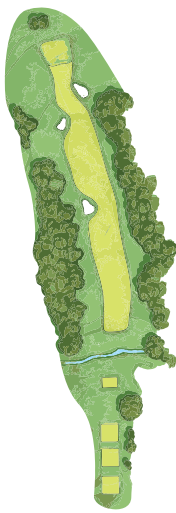
HOLE 8 | PAR 4 | 374 YARDS

A definite birdie opportunity for the player who plays right of the creek near the two fairway bunkers. The big hitters can go for this green, but long is no place to be. Sam Snead played short and left of the creek en route to his eighth win in 1965.



HOLE 9 | PAR 4 | 416 YARDS

A left-to-right tee shot near the deep fairway bunker 275 yards from the tee is preferred on this hole. A properly struck tee shot will find the bottom of the saddled fairway and allow an aggressive approach into this scalloped-edge green set below the backdrop of the Sedgefield clubhouse. Hitting long of this severely sloping and undulating green will all but eliminate an up and down for par.



HOLE 10 | PAR 4 | 440 YARDS

The first of several long par fours on the back side requires a well-struck tee shot positioned near the fairway bunker on the left. The most severe green on the course awaits the approach shot. Distance control into this green is of the utmost importance, as going long leaves little chance for recovery.



HOLE 11 | PAR 4 | 486 YARDS

The proper line for this tee shot is the bunker seen in the distance short and right of the green. The severely canted fairway will kick a right-to-left tee shot into the left-hand rough. The approach shot into this green is deceptive and can be bounced in by landing a long to middle iron just over the approach bunker 25 yards short and right of the green.



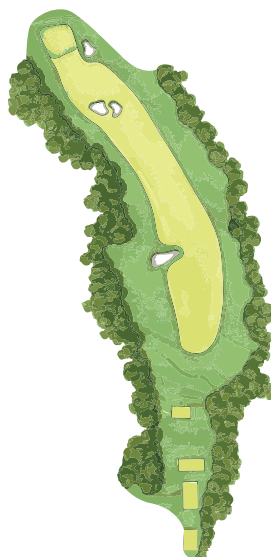
HOLE 12 | PAR 3 | 235 YARDS

The longest par three on the course will require a very precise approach into a dramatic two-tier green cut into the face of a hill. Anything short will roll well back from the green and require a difficult up and down. Dead center of this green is the preferred line and will give the player the best chance of escaping with a par or occasional birdie.



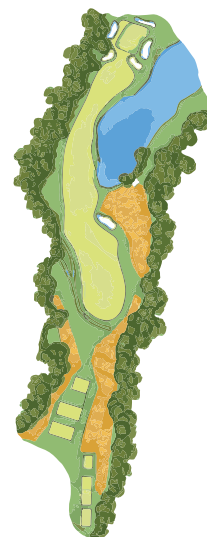
HOLE 13 | PAR 4 | 405 YARDS

The 13th hole is one of the most strategic holes on the course. The left side of the landing area funnels into the left rough, leaving a blind approach over two cross bunkers. The smart play is along the right side, providing an open view and short iron into this highly undulating green.



HOLE 14 | PAR 4 | 505 YARDS

This very difficult and demanding long par four requires a right-to-left tee shot over the fairway bunker at 275 yards. Two center-line bunkers create a deceptive approach into this "skyline" green. The green is the largest on the course and probably one of the most difficult to putt due to its severe slope from back right to front left.



HOLE 15 | PAR 5 | 545 YARDS

The ideal tee shot to this reachable par five is directly at the fairway bunker. The downhill tee shot must avoid the sheep fescue grass to the right and just over the bunker. Deep bunkers surround this undulating green. The far back right corner pin is the most difficult location, especially if going for the green in two.



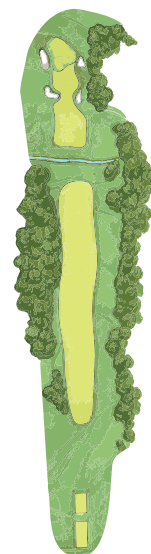
HOLE 16 | PAR 3 | 175 YARDS

This short par three will provide the player an opportunity to be aggressive. However, the horseshoe-shaped green will wreak havoc on misplayed tee shots and chips from around the green. Two four-foot-deep pot bunkers guarding the green require a demanding short iron approach.



HOLE 17 | PAR 4 | 406 YARDS

One of the most beautiful holes in North Carolina. This deep, saddled fairway meanders up an old creek bed filled in by Ross. A short iron approach into the smallest green on the course is compounded by the difficulty of finding a level lie in the fairway. A natural amphitheatre surrounds the green, making it a great place to view an exciting finish.



HOLE 18 | PAR 4 | 507 YARDS

This members' par five converted to a long par four will be the most difficult on the course. A tee shot to the crest of the downhill-sloping fairway leaves an uphill long iron or fairway metal into this severely undulating hilltop green. The most difficult hole location is atop a large roll in the back right corner of the green. Birdies from this location will be difficult.

SEDFIELD COUNTRY CLUB COURSE STATISTICS

The Wyndham Championship returned to Sedgfield Country Club, one of the courses on which it was founded in 1938, in 2008, and with that move, it was then the only regular-season tournament played on a Donald Ross-designed course. When the PGA TOUR played at Sedgfield in 1976 and earlier, the layout played as a par-71 at 6,641 yards. The PGA TOUR course record at Sedgfield was 63, recorded by Gary Player in 1970, Doug Sanders in 1968 and John Schlee in 1967.

PGA TOUR golfers playing the Wyndham Championship this year will enjoy a course that was restored to Donald Ross' original design and updated to accommodate the modern player in 2007. Carl Pettersson set the course record in 2008 when he fired a 9-under-par 61 in the second round. In 2016, Si Woo Kim lowered the mark to 60 in his second round, but in 2018, two-time champion Brandt Snedeker shot a 10-under-par 59 in the first round and claimed the course record. It was the ninth sub-60 round in PGA TOUR history, and Snedeker became the 10th multiple winner in tournament history. The Donald Ross masterpiece at Sedgfield will play as a par-70 course at 7,131 yards for this year's event.

Prior to the 2012 tournament, Sedgfield Country Club converted its greens to Champion Bermudagrass in an effort to make the greens hard and fast during the hot, humid North Carolina summers, allowing the course to be played the way Donald Ross intended. In addition, bunkers were added around the fifth and 15th greens. The green at the par-4 second hole was extended, creating an additional back pin placement. Course statistics for 2025 are below:
