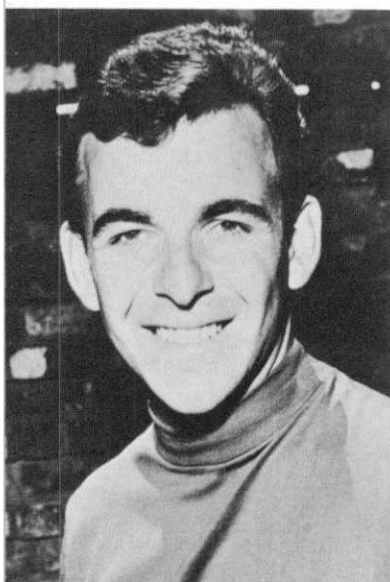

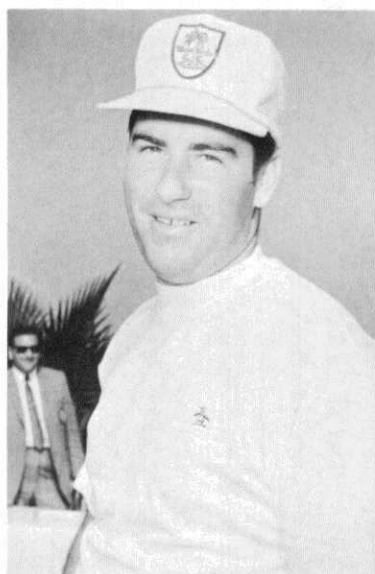

TOUR VICTORIES: 1970 Atlanta Classic



For Tommy Aaron, May 24, 1970, will always be remembered as V-Day. On that date Tommy ended nearly 10 years of winless frustration by scoring his first "official" Tour victory in the Atlanta Classic. (The 1969 Canadian Open, won by Tommy, was not counted in the "official" category because of scheduling complications arising from a rift within the PGA.)

Aaron's V-Day at Atlanta was heavy with drama and poetic justice. To start, whenever Aaron plays in Georgia the galleries treat him as "the favorite son." Tommy's home in Gainesville is 50 some miles away.

Tommy began the final round two strokes back of leader Tom Weiskopf, and got off to a fast start. Soon the gallery, surrounding each green cheered Aaron like it was home-coming day for the quiet-mannered Georgian.

But on the 14th hole Aaron called a two-stroke penalty on himself for moving his ball illegally. He recalls: "It was quite a shock when I realized I had moved the ball in an area where it wasn't allowed. I knew I had just donated two strokes to the field."

It nearly wiped out Aaron's three-stroke lead and it appeared that this could be another occasion when the tag of "bridesmaid" would be tied to Tommy again. Until he won the 1969 Canadian Open for his first professional victory, he was known widely for having finished second, or tied for runner-up, in nine Tour events.

But on this day Tommy did not succumb to the old jinx and he finished with a three-under 69 for 275.

"That's the lowest four rounds I've ever shot as a pro," Aaron said. Moreover, the 13-under-par total was two strokes below the tournament record set the previous year by winner Bert Yancey. Yet, at that moment,

Aaron would not accept congratulations until the entire field was in. Finally, Aaron's 275 was untouched.

One of the first to congratulate Tommy was his wife, Jimmye, and her recollections of that instant was one of the year's most poignant moments in golf. She recalls:

"When I first rushed over to Tommy, I kissed him and said, 'Tommy, I can't believe it!' He looked at me, kind of sad like, and said, 'I can't either ...'"

Later Aaron admitted it was "a great thrill to win, especially at home, although it's probably the hardest place to win."

Unfortunately, Tommy's father, Charles, was in his pro shop at Tally Mountain Golf Club in Tallapoosa, Ga., and missed the big day. Tommy's mother, Helen, was there and summed up the feelings of the family when she said:

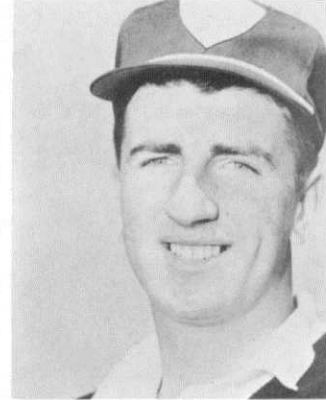
"I always knew that some day Tommy's luck would change. I knew some day he'd win a big one. Nobody ever enjoys being second best. Tommy never wanted to be anything but a winner, and he always was to us."

Aaron rounded out his most lucrative year on the Tour by finishing among the top ten in ten tournaments.

The soft-spoken Aaron has always been known as the possessor of a sound, rhythmic swing and a good putting stroke. In recent years he has developed a scoring consistency that has helped him to finish high among the money-winners in spite of his lack of victories.

Aaron has two hobbies which he enjoys in the Fall: bird hunting and watching football.

For George Archer, the 1970 season was one of disappointment. Illness and injuries continued to plague him. And, to compound his problems, one bad round ruined his hopes for victory all too often.

The lanky Californian's best finish was in the Robinson Open, where he tied with George Knudson after 72 holes and then became locked in a tense playoff. On the fourth green it ended for Archer in an unexpected manner. One of the Tour's master putters, Archer missed a tricky two-footer.

"This is a game of concentration," Archer said later of his errant putt. "Instead of concentrating on the putt, I was hoping for the end to come mighty soon. That's not the right attitude."

In a sense, Archer was pleased to know that his game had improved because Robinson was his best tournament finish since late 1969 (when he tied with Billy Casper and Jack Nicklaus for the Kaiser International Open's first prize. Nicklaus won it on the second play-off hole.)

At the 1970 Masters, where Archer was defending champion, he tied for 32nd. He knew he was the victim of a common mistake.

"I kept lifting my head," he admitted, "especially on wedge shots. I must have cut up five balls at Augusta".

At New Orleans, Archer borrowed a putter from Bob Stanton, opened with a 66 and added a 67 in the second round to take lead. Although he scored 72 in the third

round, Archer was still two strokes ahead of the others in the field. But George slipped to a 76 in the final round and finished fifth.

"Every now and then it's good to make a change of putters," Archer explained, "because it gets you thinking again." Many players on the Tour follow the same theory.

Until the Robinson, which was scheduled late in the year, Archer was unable to place higher than fifth in any tournament. That was his position in the Crosby, Greater New Orleans Open, Danny Thomas-Memphis Open and the American Golf Classic, which he led after 36 holes.

George teamed again with Bobby Nichols in the National Four-Ball Championship and the pair finished second. Archer and Nichols won the Tournament in 1968 when it was called the PGA Team Championship.

Archer has often been called the "Gilroy Cowboy," but he doesn't claim to be a cow puncher ... He says:

"Gene Selvidge, of San Francisco, gave me a job at his Hereford breeding ranch in Gilroy. He let me and my family live there, too.

"I whitewashed fences, painted barns and cleaned out troughs. I never did anything sophisticated enough to be a cowboy. But, I'll admit it, that Gilroy cowboy stuff sounds good."

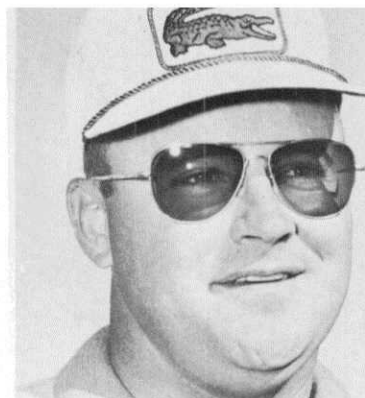

The Tour's Mysterious Mister X made a major change in his life during 1970. It wasn't in a golf tournament. On June 8, 1970, Miller Barber married Karen Harrison in Sherman, Texas. Miller had been one of the Tour's most eligible bachelors.

Barber has been called "Mister X" by his fellow professionals for years, he knows why: "I always kept to myself and was rarely seen by the others away from the course. Then, too, I wear the large Air Force style glasses.

"I never hung around with most of the other fellows, because they have their wives and families along with them. So they didn't see much of me."

Though Miller is no longer a bachelor, it's not likely that his nickname will be forgotten.

On the Tour, Miller continued his pattern of regular appearances - he entered 33 tournaments (it was 32 in 1969). For the fourth consecutive year, Miller won a tournament.

Shooting a final round 70 in the Greater New Orleans Open, Barber tied Bob Charles and Howie Johnson at 10-under 278. Because the final round had twice been delayed by rain, dusk forced the playoff to be put off until the following day.

Barber sank a 12-foot birdie putt on the second green to win - and said it was easy. Then he explained why: "I had exactly the same putt in the final round. As soon as I saw it, I realized the putt would break

from right to left and knowing that helped me."

As he walked up to the ball Miller said to his caddie, "Jack, we ought to know this one." No sooner had Miller rapped the ball and it headed for the cup, Jack the caddie leaped in the air and yelled, "Let's go home!"

Several weeks before in the Greater Greensboro Open, Barber finished second to Gary Player. Although he had chances on the late holes, Miller couldn't drop a putt to gain a tie with Player. When it was over, a discouraged Barber said: "I know one thing, I'm getting damn tired of finishing second."

When Barber got his victory chance in the New Orleans playoff, he appeared, as always, calm. But he said: "Ben Hogan once said that if you're not nervous at a time like this, you're not human. Well, I'm human, and I'm nervous.

Like others on the Tour, Barber's chief concern is putting. When he's intense about practicing, he often carries the putter with him to lunch.

"I hit the ball pretty much the way I wanted to hit it last year," Barber said, "but putting is something that comes and goes. It can go from one green to the next."

In addition to his three high finishes, Barber was sixth in the U. S. Open Championship and teamed with Don January to finish fifth in the National Four-Ball.

Jerry Barrier has learned quickly that golf is a humbling game, as the Scots have said for decades, and that life on the Tour tests all of a man's patience.

"When I came out on the Tour," said Barrier of his professional career that started late in 1968, "I felt like I was farther behind than most other young players because I hadn't had the money to play a lot of amateur golf.

"I felt that players like Deane Beman and Bob Murphy had a great advantage over many of us because when they turned professional they already had a winning attitude.

"If you don't have an active amateur background and come onto the Tour cold, it's easy to develop a losing attitude, or, at best, a negative attitude."

Barrier admits he speaks from experience:

"I was lost on the Tour for about seven months. At first I couldn't figure out how to qualify. Then, after I learned to qualify, I couldn't make the cut.

"This, said Barrier, sounding like a sage of the sport, "is the kind of game where you have to wait for it to happen."

It finally happened to Barrier, and, at first, Jerry didn't recognize his good fortune. He won Kiwanis Peninsula Open, a satellite at Newport News, Va., but:

"It didn't dawn on me that I could win until I was ready to tee off in the last round. I had led after the first round and was tied for the lead after the second round, but I wasn't thinking of winning.

"It wasn't until I eagled the seventh hole in that last round," he recalls, "that I realized I could win. It gave me a two-stroke lead at the time."

The soft-spoken, husky Barrier remembers Newport News as "one of those tournaments where everything fell together. I drove well, hit a lot of good iron shots and putted well."

Barrier rates driving as a weak phase of his game. Of the importance of driving, he says: "When you drive well on the Tour you can play more of an offensive game because you're in position to go for the pin. When you don't drive well you end up shooting for the fat of the green and that puts you on the defensive."

A graduate of the University of Houston (Class of '68), Barrier played on the golf team. He received a degree in mathematics, and jokes about it and a fellow professional: "I'm not in the genius class with Labron Harris."

Barrier attended the qualifying school conducted by the American Professional Golfers in late 1968 and is the first tournament winner from that group.

His closest friend and roommate on the road is Tour veteran Butch Baird. Of Butch, Barrier says:

"He helped me as an amateur and has gotten me over many rough spots on the Tour. He has helped me more than anyone and I owe any bit of success that I've had to Butch. He is the only man I will listen to 100 percent about my game."

Frank Beard has said of golf on the Tour:

"Playing from tee to green is half the game, and putting is the other half. You can't win with either one alone. You've got to have both."

But Frank was the first to say that his putter played major roles in both his 1970 Tour victories, the Tournament of Champions and the American Golf Classic.

The springboard to victory at the Tournament of Champions was Beard's second round -- a 64 with nine birds. In scoring the 64, Beard used 12 putts on each nine at the LaCosta Country Club. For the round he was 12 under par on the greens! In a typical understatement, Frank said later:

"I wasn't thinking about anything after the first six birdies. Under those circumstances you just hit the ball, find it and hit it again. It charges you up. Everything seems automatic."

Beard ended the tournament 15-under par with a 273 and he was seven strokes ahead of his nearest competitor, Billy Casper. Until Tony Jacklin won the U. S. Open Championship, also by seven strokes, it was the largest winning margin of the year.

Frank's other fantastic putting performance came at Firestone Country Club in the AGC, and this time his reaction was:

"I know I'm a good putter, but even I find this display hard to believe."

No wonder! Beard used only 10 putts on the back nine for a third round 67.

That day Beard one-putted eight greens, including five birdie putts, ranging

from three to 18 feet, and three part putts, from six inches to 10 feet. He two-putted the 13th for a double bogey 6.

Beard's success on the greens continued into the final round when, on the first hole, he bunkered his approach. After Beard blasted out he was still 20 feet from the cup. He ran that putt home for a par 4.

"If anything won the tournament for me," Beard said later, "it would have to be that putt. When the ball disappeared in the hole, so did a big lump in my throat."

For some years, Frank has had a reputation of not being colorful and this has been given as a reason for his inability to generate attention among galleries. Now that situation is changing, largely because the printed word has proven more influential than Beard's golf clubs.

Last year Frank's diary was published under the title of "Pro: Frank Beard on the Golf Tour." The reading public learned several things about Beard: 1) Frank's opinions and views of the Tour are far from colorless; 2) He is penetrating and candid about himself.

Beard answered some of his critics, who have said he appears to play as though he were afraid to win.

"Surely as a business man," Beard said, "I want to win. I know that first place pays more than second place."

Beard also pointed out that he considers himself a gambler on the course, and added, "Like any good gambler, I play the odds."

Deane Beman has learned a lesson on the Tour which can be useful to all golfers.

"The key to success in golf is not hitting bad shots," said Beman, a successful professional since mid-1967. Deane proved his theory to be correct while winning the 1970 Greater Milwaukee Open.

"The golfer who wins in this kind of competition," said the former two-time U. S. Amateur Champion, "is the golfer who makes the fewest bad shots. That's what I did and that's how I won."

Beman also admitted that the right frame of mind is helpful to winning on the Tour. He said:

"Getting into a good groove comes slowly sometimes, but I was lucky in Milwaukee because right from the start I felt I had things going for me."

Beman opened with a two-under 69 and continued his sub-par play to finish 12 under for 72 holes.

"I had a lot of confidence throughout the tournament," Beman said. "That confidence kept developing as I kept hitting the ball well. My entire game clicked -- driving, iron play and putting. That's the story of my success in Milwaukee."

That's the secret of success in every tournament, Beman acknowledged.

Beman, who gave up an insurance career to try his luck on the Tour, developed his own brand of positive thinking, or confidence, during an illustrious amateur career. It was highlighted by winning the 1960 and 1963 National Amateur titles.

He also won the 1959 British Amateur Championship. Additionally, Beman was a member of five Walker Cup teams; four World Amateur Team Championship squads and four Americas Cup teams.

Beman is not long off the tee, but as many on the Tour have pointed out, the shorter hitters must rely on perfecting good second shots. Beman is recognized as one of the Tour's most expert fairway wood players, an accurate irons player and one of the finest putters.

With this skill, Beman plays some of his best golf on long courses.

"Long courses don't handicap short hitters," he said. "If I were to be absorbed in the distance of tee shots alone, I might view myself as an inferior golfer. But I don't think like that!"

Beman, who has scored a victory in each of his last two years on the Tour, followed up his 1970 victory with a tie for seventh the next week in Philadelphia. In all, Deane had five finishes in the top ten for the year.

He won money in 21 of the 32 tournaments he entered and compiled 863.8 Exemption Points and ranked 35th in that statistical department.

Because the Seattle, Wash., Golf Club was closed for renovations during part of 1968, Don Bies is a regular player on the Tour.

The long-hitting associate professional at the Seattle club recalled: "I couldn't play at home since the club was remodeling the tees and greens, so I figured it was a good time to hit the Tour."

Bies (pronounced Bees) played in 15 tournaments that year. His brief swing on the Tour was highlighted by a fifth place in the U. S. Open and a fourth in the American Golf Classic. At the end of the year, Bies had won \$30,346 and was 58th on the money-winning list.

"That meant I would have exemptions in all the 1969 PGA events," Bies recalled. "Late in the year, my wife and I had a long talk about my career. The question we had to settle was whether I should go out on the Tour as a regular, or stay in Seattle and go out for certain tournaments?"

"My wife doesn't like me away from home any more than any wife likes her husband away. I'm not wild about being away from home myself.

"After we discussed it thoroughly, there seemed to be no question. She agreed that I should play because I felt that I couldn't live with myself if I didn't at least try it."

Bies was successful again in 1969. He played in 29 events and won \$33,340. That placed him 58th on the year's money-winning list and assured him of exemptions for the 1970 season.

In 1970 Bies continued to be a regular on the Tour. He played in 33 tournaments and won money in 25. He finished in the top ten four times and tied for eighth spot in three events: the Tucson

Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Doral-Eastern Open.

Counting his tie for seventh in Bob Hope's Desert Classic, Bies experienced a fine Spring in 1970.

He finished the year with winnings of \$31,100 -- almost exactly the same sum he has earned since becoming a regular. But, in 1970, money-winnings did not have anything to do with exemption status for 1971.

Under the 1970 Exemption Point Standings, which was based on tournament appearances and finishes, Bies earned 834 and finished 40th on the list. Again he had earned the preferred playing privileges for 1971.

Bies has had several moments of glory on the Tour. In 1968 he set a course record in the American Golf Classic with a six-under 64 at Firestone Country Club. With deliberate understatement, he now recalls it as: "It was a routine round ... six birdies and 12 pars."

In the 1969 PGA Championship at the NCR Country Club, Bies opened the second round with a double bogey six on the first hole and then shot nine birds and eight pars. His 64 set a course record.

Does Bies go hunting for course records?

"No," he said, "I don't go out seeking records and I doubt if anyone else does. I don't even think much about birdies. If anything, I try not to make mistakes. I don't like bogeys. I like to play well and I hope that birdies will come..."

Bies turned professional in 1957. Starting in 1961, he won small purses in brief appearances in Tour events in the Northwest.

Experience on the Tour has added maturity to Homero Blancas.

"It takes five or six years to realize there are better players on the Tour than you, but on a given week you can win. It takes time and work."

Homero started 1970 better than any of his five previous years on the Tour. He recalled:

"I played well but always seemed to have one bad round. If my putter was working well, I wasn't sharp off the tee. Then when I was driving well, I didn't putt very good. I needed to put it all together at the same time."

Blancas put it all together in sub-par fashion at the demanding Colonial National Invitational. He scored a seven-under 273 to edge out Lee Trevino and Gene Littler. Happily, for Homero, a tip from Trevino helped immeasurably.

"I told Homero he should move through the ball faster from the waist down," said Trevino. Blancas did and reported that the tip helped him hit a slight fade instead of a hook.

Blancas pocketed the \$25,000 first prize while Trevino and Littler each collected \$11,575. Said Trevino: "I'm proud of Homero, but my little lesson cost me about \$12,000!"

It was Blancas' first victory since the 1966 Seattle-Everett Open, and he went on to record his most successful year on the Tour. He finished in the top ten of 12 events,

and was co-leader with Tom Weiskopf in this department for 1970.

"I think desire is the motivating force behind becoming a great golfer. I feel that I'm prepared for the future. I enjoy golf."

"Years ago I used to study other people's swings and styles, but now I know that I can't play like anybody else. I've made my own style, and now I'm just me."

Years of tournament experience while an active amateur and as a professional have helped the smiling Blancas to attain a good attitude for golf:

"Pressure doesn't bother me. I feel I play better under pressure."

"The only fear I've known on the Tour has been in trying to make the cut and in qualifying for the next week. There are so many good golfers now that qualifying is almost as hard as playing the tournament."

"Winning gets you out of that rat race for a year, and I hope I can keep playing well enough to avoid having to qualify."

Blancas created a stir in the golf world in 1961 when he shot a 55 on a par 70 course while playing in the Premier Invitational at Longview, Texas. While attending the University of Houston, he won the Southern Intercollegiate and also captured the All-American tournament title twice.

Big, blond Chris Blocker finally made it on the Tour. After five years of struggling to win more than \$10,000 annually, Chris cleared that plateau with plenty to spare in 1970 - and won a tournament, too.

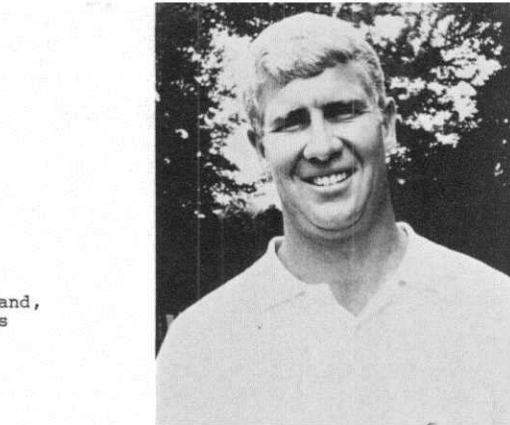
Blocker, a strong player from Texas, won the 1970 Magnolia Classic at Hattiesburg, Miss. The tournament was held as a satellite at the time of the Masters.

Blocker won dramatically, coming out of a bunker near the 72nd green and getting up and down in two strokes. The talkative Texan said almost immediately:

"I'm sure my sponsor will be happy that I've finally won." Then he added, with a smile: "I'm the sponsor."

Later he added: "It's good to break the ice. This will help me along the way."

Blocker's largest check - \$5,000 - was a big help, but Chris also helped himself as the year went along. He played in 35 tournaments and won money in 22. He seemed to score better as the year continued. As he scored better his income increased.



His second-place finish in the Green Island was worth \$6,840. Then he climaxed the year in 1970's final event by taking second in the Bahama Islands Open -- losing a playoff for the title to Doug Sanders on the second extra hole.

Chris picked up a check for \$14,800 at the Bahamas to boost his year's total winnings to \$39,518. The year before Blocker won \$6,033.

Blocker had lost a "sudden-death" playoff before. It was the 1968 Rebel Yell Open, which was a Masters satellite that year. Larry Mowry won.

Chris had one other finish in the top ten in 1970, a tie for seventh in the San Antonio Open.

Blocker attended Texas Tech but enlisted in the Army for two years before graduating. He turned professional in 1964 and joined the Tour the next year.

Interest in all sports, Blocker enjoys playing handball and billiards when not on a golf course.

Julius Boros doesn't make a big thing about it, but aches and pains are getting to him. But not enough to alter his calm, unflappable manner.

Much of last year Boros suffered pain and swelling in the last two fingers of his right hand. However, he talked about the condition only if someone mentioned it first.

"I don't know what causes it, an old injury probably, but the soreness comes and goes," Boros said. "It doesn't bother me."

He added with a smile: "Now if you want to talk about aches and pains, I've got them all. They're coming on with old age."

While the years have done nothing to Julius' long and graceful swing, he knows that age takes its toll on the course.

"My legs don't carry me as well as they used to," he admitted. "And my eyes are something else. I have trouble with the distances from 50 to 60 yards. I'm all right on long distances, but my depth perception close-in is weakening."

As a concession to his years, Boros is more selective in entering tournaments. His reasoning is practical: "It's getting tougher for me to walk some of these courses."

Late in 1970 he was named head professional at Country Club Aventura, North Miami, Florida.

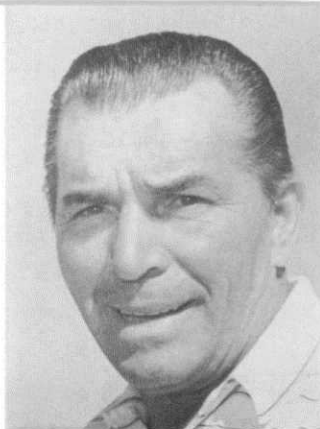
In recent years Boros has allowed an uncharacteristic motion to creep into his swing. At address he does not keep the clubhead steady.

"It's a nervous twitch," he explained. "I try to keep the clubhead still, but I can't. I think I would be better off if I could."

The full-shouldered Boros has compiled an outstanding record since turning pro and joining the Tour in 1950. He won the 1952 and 1963 U. S. Open Championships and the 1968 PGA Championship. He was a member of four Ryder Cup teams and was named Player of the Year in 1952 and 1963. In 1952 and 1955 he was the Tour's leading money-winner.

Boros enjoys being home with his family and is also one of the most avid anglers on the Tour. With his new club affiliation, Julius will be able to devote more time to both, but Julius remains on the Tour for an obvious reason:

"I've got seven kids to get through college, so I've got to stay on the Tour. Where else could I make this kind of money?"

Pete Brown has been on the Tour since 1963, and, no matter how he's played or how much money he's won or hasn't won - he figures every year has been a good one.

"I'm just lucky to be able to play," said the soft-spoken Brown. "I'll never complain. After what I went through in 1956, every year since then has been great."

Winner of the Andy Williams-San Diego Open early in 1970, Brown went on to enjoy his most lucrative year on the Tour. But success hasn't changed Brown. He's eternally grateful that he's alive and able to golf.

Months before he was to compete in the 1956 Negro National golf championship in Detroit, Brown was stricken with a painful but non-paralytic form of polio. He lost control of all his senses and was bedfast for a year, unable to move or speak.

Gradually, muscular control was regained but Brown had to learn to walk again, to speak again and to use his hands again. It was a long and painful recovery.

"Some friends had been visiting me for months," Pete recalls, "and they had brought me a golf club. I had been trying to grip it. Finally, when I was able to walk well enough, I was allowed to go outside to see if I could swing the club. I had no coordination and I couldn't even come close to hitting the ball."

Pete didn't give up and convalesced at home in Jackson, Miss. He eventually won his fight against polio and regained enough strength to play golf again. Figuring his misfortune, Brown's success has been remarkable. But the effects of his illness still linger.

"Because my back isn't as strong as it was before I became sick, I've had to flatten my swing. It's not the kind of swing I like, but I have to put up with it."

The chief trouble with his swing, Pete elaborates, is that his downswing flattens out and he often hits the upper portion

of the ball instead of getting the full club-face on the ball.

In an effort to help his back, Pete's physicians have recommended stretching exercises three times a day. Brown also lost weight in the latter part of 1970, cutting down from 195 to 180.

Brown first caddied when he was 13 in Jackson, Miss., at a municipal golf course. He found a five iron in a pond on the course and that started him on his career. Of the segregated course, he recalls: "We weren't allowed to play, but we managed to sneak on early in the morning or late in the afternoon. We had enough time to play one or two holes and run."

Golf was that kind of a game for Brown until 1954 when he entered the Lone Star Open in Houston, Texas, as a self-declared professional. Pete remembers the day well: "It was the first time I started a round on the first tee and finished on the 18th green. I had never played 18 holes before. It was the first time I wore golf shoes and a golf glove." Brown finished ninth in his tournament debut.

Between 1959, the year of his comeback, and 1962, Brown won 10 tournaments on the United Golf Association tour, including the 1961 and 1962 Negro National Open. Pete received his playing privileges on the PGA Tour in 1963.

At the 1964 Waco Turner Open at Burneyville, Okla., Brown became the first black golfer ever to win an official event on the Tour. Charlie Sifford won the 1957 Long Beach, Calif., Open, but it was an unofficial event.

Since early in 1969, former football star Jim Brown has sponsored Pete Brown on the Tour.

"We don't have a contract," said Pete, who is not related to Jim. "Jim and I are good friends and we have a gentlemen's agreement."

Quietly and business-like, Billy Casper continues to strengthen his role as "Mr. Consistency" on the Tour. He does it by winning.

For the eighth consecutive year, Casper was a multiple winner on the Tour as he triumphed in 1970 at Los Angeles, the Masters, Philadelphia and in the Avco Classic.

No one had won that many tournaments in one year since 1968, when Casper won six events. Starting with 1963, when he won two tournaments, Casper has compiled this record of victories: 1964, four; 1965, four; 1966, four; 1967, two; 1968, six; 1969, two plus the Alcan Golfer of the year; 1970, four - for a total of 29 victories in eight seasons.

Interestingly, two of Casper's victories in 1970 followed disappointing showings at the same events in 1969. The first was the Masters where Billy appeared to be the 1969 winner but took a final 74 for second place.

In 1970 he won the Augusta, Ga., classic, defeating Gene Littler in an 18-hole playoff.

At the 1969 Avco, Casper opened with an 81. It was the highest score he had ever made on the Tour and while he shot a second round 70 it was short of getting him by the 36-hole cut. He vowed to return, saying: "This course owes me a bundle." He won in 1970 by three strokes.

Casper was named the 1970 PGA Player-of-the-Year. It was the second time he had won this honor. Other career highlights include: two U. S. Open Championships; winner of the Vardon Trophy five times; member of five Ryder Cup teams; and twice the year's leading money-winner. He is a former member of the TPD Policy Board.



Casper plays a control type of game, figuring the percentages on all shots. While he enjoys the game, he views tournament golf in this way:

"Golf is a business from the time I walk on the first tee until I'm off the 18th green. I rarely play golf for fun. For diversion I enjoy fishing and being with my family. I often tell people at clinics that if golf gives them headaches or ulcers, they should turn pro."

An admitted perfectionist, Casper added: "When I'm playing I'm thinking about what I'm doing, what can possibly happen and how to guard against the wrong thing happening. That's why I can't communicate with a crowd."

Casper has won his battle against a variety of allergies by careful dieting. He is still subject to certain insecticides used on golf courses, however.

Billy is noted for his religious serenity. He is a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (Mormon), and has said: "There are only four interests in my life: religion, family, golf and fishing ... in that order. Actually, the first two are sides of the same coin."

Billy will turn 40 in mid-1971, and the natural question is: What's in the Casper future?

"If I can conquer my allergies," he said, "I should be able to play competitive golf till I'm 50. The rest of my life I want to devote to my church."

"I hope to be financially able to retire from golf, and carry on something that is beneficial to mankind."

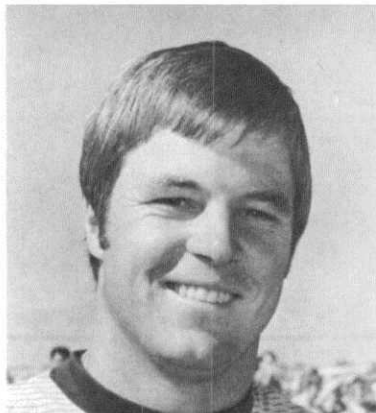

Ron Cerrudo made a vow in the late summer of 1970, and he fulfilled it early in 1971.

Winner of the 1970 San Antonio Open, Ron was forced off the Tour in mid-season by a back ailment. Physicians found a ruptured disc in his spinal column and it was removed during an operation in August.

While recuperating in the hospital, Ron told friends he would be back on the Tour when it resumed in January, 1971. He was, and is reported then that his back was sound.

Cerrudo has had a brief but extremely successful career on the Tour. A native Californian, Cerrudo was graduated from San Jose State in 1966 with a degree in business. He was an active amateur golfer and was a member of the 1967 Walker Cup.

Later that year Ron turned professional and was graduated from the Fall Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players. He climaxed his first full year on the Tour with a victory in the 1968 Cajun Classic.

In the 1970 San Antonio Open, Cerrudo was leading the tournament after 54 holes and was paired with Dick Lotz, an old friend, for the last round. Lotz was to be on's chief rival going down the stretch.

Ron won by five strokes over Lotz and the remainder of the field, and he said: "By winning, I told Dick, I gained some revenge on him because he beat me in the finals of the California State Amateur in 1962."

Cerrudo also said the pairing helped him: "He played so well that he kept me on my toes. After the eighth hole, Dick was only one stroke behind. Then he bogeyed and I moved away from him."

Ron recalled that he was "really nervous" at the start of the final round in Texas because he had not won since late 1968. He said: "I wanted to win so badly. The pressure is something. It's not so much the money you're thinking about, but rather just the idea of winning. Once you do it, you know you can play with anybody ... but I hadn't won for some time."

Ron was troubled by his back after the San Antonio win and was off the Tour three weeks. He later found it painfully necessary to drop off the circuit to rest. In all, Ron played in only 18 events before his operation, and won money in 11.

Cerrudo has the backing of a sponsor, and is happy with the arrangement: "I like the security of a sponsor, and, he's a great guy. I think it's been a good arrangement for both of us."

Although Cerrudo admits that he "loves the game," he tries not to take it home with him.

"I don't fiddle around with clubs in the motel room," he said, "or putt on the rug. My wife and I have our social life. On the Tour we go out with other young players who came out here about the same time I did. We stick with people in our age group and the older players do the same."

Being a lefthander, Bob Charles sets records simply by doing something first. Until the lanky, soft-spoken Charles came to the United States, there hadn't been a southpaw on the Tour with Bob's success and longevity.

After nine years of campaigning, Charles has proven many times that there has never been another lefthander like him in golf. Yet Bob rates his game as "mediocre."

Although Charles curtailed his competitive schedule somewhat, 1970 was a typical year for the New Zealander: He entered 23 tournaments; finished in the top three in three events; made the top ten seven times; and missed the 36-hole cut only twice.

Charles visited the pay window 21 times during the year. He missed going the route in his second tournament of 1970, the San Antonio Open, and his last, the Kaiser International.

There are reasons why Charles rates his game as "mediocre:"

1) He has a candid self-appraisal of his swing: "I just don't hit the ball as well as I'd like to because I come across it too often. I'm working hard so I can hit the ball straighter."

2) He hasn't won since the 1968 Canadian Open.

Nevertheless, Charles' performances provide a case that he should no longer be rated as merely "the best left-handed golfer in the world," as he has generally been called since winning the

1963 British Open ... It was the same year that he became the first left-hander to win an event on the Tour, the Houston Classic ... Charles must now be rated among the best players - period.

Charles, a right-hander all the way except for games requiring both hands, is slightly below average distance off the tee ... But what the slender southpaw lacks in length, he more than compensates for on the putting green.

He is accepted as one of the best putters on the Tour, and Charles says: "My putting is good. I never have had to take that part of my game apart as I did my driving and long irons some years ago. With putting I just aim the blade for the hole and let go."

The reserved Charles does not believe good putters are born ... They're made, he says, of determination, technique and application ... "Anyone can become a good putter if he works out a sound way to stroke the ball and practices enough to gain confidence in that method."

Charles' method is a pendulum stroke ... His wrists remain straight and unbroken during the stroke ... Clubhead movement originates in the shoulders.

Charles has been playing golf since he was five ... He never gave any thought to playing from the right side, as have many other left-handers, because both his parents were golfers and both were left-handed ... Bob's first clubs were an old set his father cut down for him.

As a schoolboy, Charles played cricket and some rugby ... He was employed by a Christchurch bank for seven years before he turned pro.

Jim Colbert learned in 1970 what a difference a year can make. In 1969 he won the Monsanto Open. In 1970 Jim did not win, but he had four finishes in the top ten places of the 35 events he entered. His best finish was second place in the Doral-Eastern Open.

He wasn't distressed by his year.

"I feel like I'm playing better," he said, "and I know I can win again. One of the things I have to find out is how far what I've got will take me."

The rigors of the Tour figure in Jim's thinking. He said:

"Your whole life revolves around the Tour. You have to find out what conditions you perform best under. You've got to learn how much traveling, practice, and sleep you need. There's no one to tell you what to do.

"Life on the Tour takes a certain amount of self-discipline. It's easy to just drift out here. On the other hand, you can't think golf 24 hours a day. I've been through that stage. You've got to leave it behind sometime and somewhere."

Although victory eluded Colbert in 1970, he won more money than he had in any other year, \$49,212. He picked up cash in 26 events during the year and also earned 803.0 points and placed 48th on the Exemption Point Standings list. That was good enough to keep him out of the Monday qualifying trials.

Colbert's victory in 1969 not only made the straight-talking Kansan \$20,000 richer, but it convinced him he had made the right choice of careers.

Introduced to golf as a boy of eight by his father, Jim enjoyed quick success. He captured the Kansas City junior championship when he was 11. He took the Kansas and Missouri amateur titles while still a teen-ager. But football almost won out over golf for Jim's full interest.



"I was good enough to make All-State," said the Kansas City native, who received a number of scholarship offers and accepted one to Kansas State. He weighed 160 pounds and played halfback both on offense and defense.

A freshmen game against Nebraska helped change Colbert's mind about football. Jim remembers the day well. It was raining and the field and ball were muddy and slippery.

"Our punter fumbled one and I tried to cover the ball," he recalls. "One of their big linemen tried to get there before me, but he slipped. As I dove for the ball he put his arm out to stop me, and it struck me under the face guard. When I got up I was still 20 feet from the ball and I could move every tooth in my head with my fingers."

The following Spring while Colbert was golfing, he remembered the savage jar. He considered the two sports and decided to give up football and concentrate on golf. He made K-State's golf team as a sophomore. In 1964 Colbert was runnerup in the NCAA championship. He was graduated in 1964 with a degree in political science.

Colbert went into the insurance business and continued to play golf. After he won the Kansas amateur title again in 1965, he decided to try the Tour. He was graduated later that year from the PGA's first ATP Qualifying School and joined the Tour in 1966.

Known as a keen putter, Colbert set 1967's putting record on the Tour in the Jacksonville Open: He used but eight putts on the front nine, and 21 for the round. He finished tied for third in the event.

Victory in the Monsanto Open helped give Colbert an answer to a nagging question: "Every time I'd go home, my girls would ask me when I was going to win a tournament. Now, at last, I've got an answer for them."

One of the lesser known sky-jackings of 1970 was sorely felt by Charles Coody. His clubs were stolen while he was traveling between tournaments on an airplane in early May.

"It seemed like I spent the rest of the year trying to find a driver, wedge and a putter that suited me," Coody recalled.

"I had my old driver for four years and had all kinds of confidence in it. I must have gone through 15 or 20 drivers until I got used to one, and during that time I had no way of telling where my drives were going to go. Consequently, I didn't play well all year.

"Your're not nearly at so much of a disadvantage with a new set of irons," he continued. "The driver, wedge and putter almost become a part of you, though."

As other Tour players have learned to their sorrow, the loss of a set of clubs is a confidence-shattering experience.

For Coody, the loss came after his most successful year on the Tour. With the experience Coody gained in 1969, he was looking forward to an even better season in 1970.

The graduate of Texas Christian University (Class of '60) learned several lessons on the '69 Tour. He tasted the sweetness of victory and the bitterness of a lost opportunity.

In the 1969 Masters, Coody held a one-stroke lead with only the last three holes to play. He recalled:

"I remember thinking as I walked to the 16th tee that if I could just par the last three holes, the whole thing would be mine. So what did I do? I changed from attacking the course to defensive playing."

He bogied in and finished tied for fifth.

"I knew then that no two situations are ever alike, but I vowed to myself that if I ever got in that position again that I'd try to birdie right into the clubhouse."

Two months later in the Kemper Open at Quail Hollow Country Club, Charlie set a course-record 65 in the final round and finished second as leader Dale Douglass was able to hold off Coody's charge.

The following week, in the Cleveland Open, Coody went into the final round with a two-stroke lead. He played attacking golf and won the event by two strokes over the field.

Coody goes through a clothes-tugging ritual almost before every swing. He gives the bill of his cap a pull, plucks at the shoulders of his shirt, then his pants legs. Charlie's idea is to loosen all his clothing so that nothing binds his swing.

Coody won the Texas state high school golf championship in 1954. He won some 30 amateur titles in Texas over the next seven years, including the Texas and West Texas amateur titles in 1959.

He served as an Air Force lieutenant for three years and took advantage of furlough time to play in the U. S. Open of 1960 and 1961. He reached the semi-finals of the U. S. Amateur in 1962 and that earned him an invitation to the 1963 Masters.

"Golf is the toughest of all sports," said Bruce Crampton recently. "Insecurity is the big thing. All of a sudden you can injure a finger or break something and miss several weeks of competition. You don't get paid for sitting on the bench in golf."

This kind of thinking tells a great deal about the sturdy Australian, especially when viewed against the background of his 1970 playing season.

Briefly, 1970 was Crampton's most successful since he started playing here regularly in 1957. Bruce won \$142,609 and was third among the money-winners. His victory in the \$250,000 Westchester Classic was his brightest plum.

His win at Westchester revealed much about Crampton. Starting the final round, Crampton was tied for the lead with Jack Nicklaus and Larry Hinson.

On the fourth tee, Crampton's driver broke. His placid reaction was typical. He told his caddie: "It's nothing to panic about. We'll keep playing. If it's my turn to win, I figure I'll win."

Bruce has a philosophy about victory. "When things are going for you, you can't seem to do anything wrong. When you're meant to win you can aim through a tree and not hit a thing. You can do no wrong. If you're not meant to win, you can aim through the same tree, hit it and bounce out of bounds."

Bruce finished out the round at Westchester using his 3-wood off the tee. It placed him at a disadvantage on the par-5 holes, but he made up for the deficiency in other ways.

With three holes remaining, Crampton and Nicklaus were tied. On the 16th, with a nation-wide television audience watching, Crampton chipped into the hole

from 18 feet off the green for a birdie 2. On the 17th Bruce putted from off the green and holed a 20-footer for a birdie.

"I knew what was at stake," Bruce said later of the \$50,000 first prize, "but I always try to tell myself to play for the score, not for the money."

"The effort and the pressure are the same if you play for \$5,000 or for \$50,000. The only difference is the figure on the check."

Crampton is grateful for the opportunity to play on the Tour. Now a professional football fan, Bruce likes to make analogies between football and golf: "Because of the caliber of the field every week on the Tour, the opportunities to win are not that frequent. The Tour is like the Super Bowl every week."

"I feel a great sense of achievement every time I win a check in the United States. Over here you're playing against the best in the world, and you can have one winner each week. That's pretty small odds."

Bruce learned a lesson he has never forgotten in his first tournament in the States. It was the Houston Open Invitational of 1957. He shot even par 288 and tied for 13th place and won \$693.

"The week before," Crampton recalls, "I had won the Australian Open and collected \$520. I thought to myself then that the States are for me."

A professional since 1953, Crampton won the Australian Open when he was 20. He was invited to the 1957 Masters and has been a regular visitor here since. Off the Tour, Crampton enjoys taking home movies of his family.

Back in Arkansas a dozen years or more ago, Richard Crawford played scholastic football. He recalled: "I played quarterback and everything else including end on the bench."

Crawford learned a lesson from football that he hasn't forgotten, and he has applied to Tour golf.

"I try to break a golf tournament down like a football game," he said. "There are four rounds, just like football's four quarters."

"You do as well as you can in each part, then forget it and go on to the next. When it's all over, add up all the parts."

But what happens in golf when it's late in the fourth round and you are running out of holes? What's the game plan?

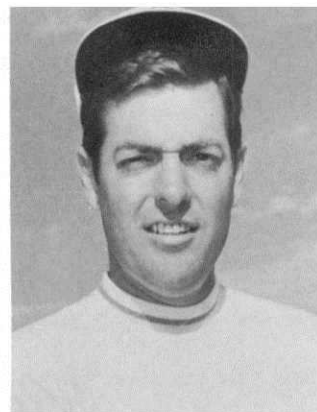
"You don't go crazy," said Richard. "You take one hole at a time and try to get the ball up close to the hole. At the end, if you have to take a chance, then take it."

Crawford also has three "rules" for successful play on the Tour:

"First, get your drive on the fairway. I don't care if you hook, slice, sky it or top it, get the ball on the fairway."

"Second, get the ball on the green with your next shot. Make any kind of shot you can or want to ... as long as it's legal, get the ball on."

"Third, once you're on the green keep the same attitude in mind. Get the ball into the hole as quickly as you can. Get it down in one, or at least close enough to the hole so that you don't knock yourself out of the game by three-putting."



In 1970 Crawford followed his own "rules" well enough to win a career high of \$46,565. He played in 38 tournaments and won money in 24. Among his five finishes in the top ten were second at Milwaukee, a third in the IVB-Philadelphia and tie for fifth in the Florida Citrus Invitational.

Crawford has another set of "rules" governing his way of life. He is an active witness for Jesus Christ. He explains how his belief helps his career:

"Everyone knows that we golfers are always making minor changes in our games, but in the middle of '68 I made a major change in my life."

"Something had been missing from my life, but I didn't know what it was. Fortunately, I discovered what it was. I lacked a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. I have now accepted Christ as my Lord and that has changed everything for me."

"It has opened my eyes so that now I have more patience and more understanding. And now I know there are things in this world that are more important than a golf ball."

"There is no greater feeling than the peace that Jesus Christ has given me. It's a peace of mind, a peace of heart, and a peace of body."

Crawford is a member of the Bible study group which meets weekly on the Tour.

Crawford is grateful to professional Jack Grout for the encouragement. Richard said: "Jack talked to me during the Doral Open and he really helped my confidence. He urged me to become more of an offensive player rather than a defensive player."

One of golf's most interesting books to be published in 1970 was entitled, "Play Like The Devil." It was written by Bruce Devlin, the former Australian master plumber turned golf professional, golf course architect and golf writer.

Devlin's playing record for 1970 is proof that he took the title of his book to heart. His year's play bordered on the fantastic:

- * He played in 19 Tour events and won money in every one.
- * His scoring average for the year was 70.9 strokes.
- * He finished in the top ten of nine tournaments.
- * He won the Bob Hope Desert Classic, the Cleveland Open (by four strokes), and the Alcan Golfer of the Year (by seven strokes).

It added up to Bruce's most lucrative year on the Tour -- \$112,738, good for 11th place among the Tour's money-winners.

In his first victory at Palm Springs, Calif., Devlin made only three bogeys in the 90-hole Bob Hope Classic.

In the rain-deferred Cleveland Open, the field played 36 holes on the final day and Devlin shot a four-under 66 in the morning and topped that with a 33-31-64 in the afternoon. His 130 ranks with the lowest scoring ever recorded on the Tour on one day.

Devlin, who has a quiet and articulate manner of speaking with only a trace of an Australian accent, recalls his 64

with a quip: "It was something like Houdini getting out of the casket ... it was one of the best putting rounds I've ever had!"

In the Alcan at Portmarnock, Ireland, Devlin conquered the winds and the rain so convincingly that he later admitted "that my seven-stroke margin was incredible."

Devlin's best year followed on the heels of his earlier best year, 1969. He played in 20 tournaments in 1969 and won money in 18. Moreover, he finished in the top ten eight times and won the Byron Nelson Classic.

"My golf has improved tremendously since I moved to this country," said Devlin, who was born in Armidale, New South Wales. "Before Gloria and I took up residence in Florida, it seemed that I was always on an airplane somewhere between the United States and Australia."

Another factor in his improved play, said Bruce, is his association with Bob Von Hagge as golf course architects. Bruce explained: "Now when I step onto a course, I look at every aspect of it. I read it thoroughly and this helps to prepare me mentally for the tournament."

Architecture also is a pleasant escape from the Tour, Bruce said.

"I'm not physically strong enough nor do I have the mental stamina to play week-after-week on the Tour," he explained. "If I stayed out on the Tour regularly, they'd have to put me in a straightjacket."

Bruce ended his finest year by teaming with countryman David Graham to win the World Cup for Australia.

Terry Dill, one of the game's long hitters, continues to show steady improvement on the Tour, but he's still hunting for his first victory.

In 1970, the tall Texan had four finishes in the top ten with a second in the Sahara Invitational being the best. The others were a share of fifth at both Los Angeles and San Diego and a tie for seventh at Milwaukee.

Dill was one of the Tour's "iron men," in 1970. He played in 38 tournaments and won money in 28. Regular appearances helped push his winnings to \$41,108, a career high.

He also earned 799.2 points and placed 50th on the Exemption Point Standings list. Therefore, he does not have to qualify for 1971 Tour events.

After a noteworthy collegiate golf career, which included leading the University of Texas team to the 1960 Southwest Conference Championship, the lanky Dill joined the Tour in 1962. He earned a degree in business administration at Texas.

Terry got off to a fast and impressive start on the Tour. In a few months he finished fourth in the Oklahoma City Open. Many followers of the Tour predicted a brilliant future for the Texan.

But Dill fell victim to a sophomore slump. Terry said that he had been listening to advice from too many other players and had lost his game.

Despondent, Dill left the Tour and returned to his college coach, Harvey Penick, for advice. Dill worked out for three weeks with Penick and found his game. Penick also advised Terry to return to the style of play that he had found successful as an amateur -- a more conservative form of offense.

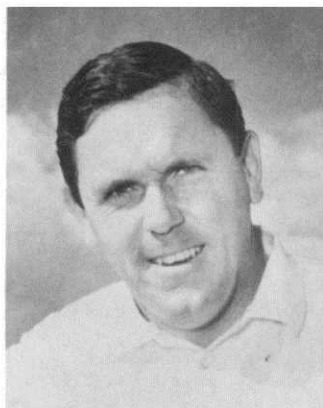
Dill's income improved each year on the Tour, but he still didn't hit the victory stride he sought. Not even after he tried a superstitious tactic!

After a low scoring round, Dill figured he might jinx himself by going into the press area and talking about it. Terry said he was superstitious and wouldn't go in a press tent until he had won.

During his high school years, Dill's family lived in a town called Muleshoe. He was graduated from high school in that Texas Panhandle town. Because he had many fond memories of the community, Dill registered out of Muleshoe for a while.

Much of the attention which Dill reaped in his early years on the Tour grew out of the town's unusual name. Terry now registers out of Austin, where he lives with his young family.

Dill's off-Tour hobbies include hunting, fishing, table tennis and gardening.

Dale Douglass has learned how to be a successful player on the Tour, and he doesn't mind sharing his secret:

"You've got to score a lot of threes and fours."

Of course, the Colorado stringbean smiles when he says that, but he adds seriously: "This is an over-simplification, but the truth is that you've got to make a good score on each hole. You must score as low as you can on each hole you play."

The Fort Morgan, Colo., resident joined the Tour in 1963 and struggled for five years. In 1968 he won \$57,744 although he did not score a victory. He was a runner-up in that year's Sahara Invitational and third in the Hawaiian Open.

Victory eluded the quietly articulate Douglass until 1969 and then he went for a double-dip. Dale won the Azalea Open, a satellite held the same week as the Tournament of Champions.

"The Azalea did more for my mind than anything else," said Dale, "because it boosted my confidence tremendously. It gave me the feeling, or the hope, that I could win again."

Two months later he bounced into the headlines again by winning the Kemper Open, and pocketing his largest check, \$30,000.

Douglass finished the year 12th on the money-winning list with \$91,553, and earned a spot on the Ryder Cup team.

Douglass got off to a fast start in 1970 by winning the Phoenix Open, second tournament on the year's schedule. Later he was second in both the Greater Jacksonville Open and the Western Open.

Douglass, a history major at the University of Colorado (Class of '59), has developed a philosophy about the game and the Tour. Of his play, he says:

"I feel that if you keep hitting the ball near the hole and keep putting at it, that some of them will fall.

"I try to play the same way every day. Golf is like automobile racing in that you can't make a game plan. You just go out on the course hoping and trying for the best on each hole."

As for a nomad's life on the Tour, Douglass says:

"I believe there are two factors that are necessary to help a player become a success on the Tour. The first is that he must love the game. The second is that he must have the ability to adapt to life on the Tour.

"The constant moving about, with different beds to sleep in, different restaurants to eat in can be trying. Then you must be able to practice and you must be able to concentrate when the tournament starts.

"thinking is an important part of the game. You'd be surprised at the slight difference between the caliber of players on the Tour. Often the difference between success and failure is in a player's thinking."

Douglass has a word of advice for the Tour's hopefuls, and it can apply to club golfers as well:

"You've got to strive for perfection, but you must be prepared to accept much less. You must learn to accept a poor shot. If you learn not to give up, you'll be surprised how many pars and birds you can make after a bad shot."

Dale and his wife, Joyce, drive across the country to most tournaments. In the off-season, Dale enjoys snow-mobiling in Colorado.

Smiling Rod Funseth liked the Exemption Point Standing System used by the Tournament Players Division in 1970. His reason was simple:

"It helped me to look better. I've always scored pretty well over the years, but I haven't won many big checks. You know, the amounts that get you into the headlines.

"But I think I've always been in the top 40 leaders on scoring average, and I have stood pretty well in the performance points that Golf Digest makes up each year."

In 1970, the Tour used an Exemption Point Standings based on tournament finishes. The system also rewarded those who played often. Rod played in 31 events during the year.

He earned 782.0 points and placed 52nd in the Standings -- good enough to avoid qualifying in 1971. He was one of the few players whose points and money-winning standings were almost the same. He cashed checks worth \$44,972 which placed him 53rd on the dollar derby list.

Funseth, a quiet manner, slow-speaking native of the State of Washington, looks back on 1970 as a "typical year."

"It was typical," he said, "because I figure I played as well as I have in other years. I didn't make any changes in my game, I just tried to get the ball in the hole as I always have."

The year was not typical in that Rod was a strong contender in two events. His opening 67 in the San Antonio Open led the tournament, and he was in second place after the second and third rounds, respectively. Ron Cerrudo charged in the final round to win as Funseth slipped and tied for third.

Later in 1970, Funseth shot one of his finest rounds -- a 66 in the last round -- to tie for second place in the

Avco Classic. He knocked in a 20-foot birdie putt on the final green to clinch second with Tom Weiskopf. It was Rod's highest finish since 1965.

Funseth won \$14,800 at Avco which was satisfying. But Rod was just pleased with his final round showing because throughout his career he has suffered from not being able to score lower in a tournament's last round.

And 1970 was not typical as far as Funseth's winnings were concerned -- his income of \$44,972 far exceeded his previous year, 1965, when he won \$30,647.

That year Funseth got a pep talk on the eve of the final round of the Phoenix Open, and he shot a 67 to win by three shots. It was his first victory.

Funseth, one of the Tour's long-hitters, spent seven years in club work before joining the Tour full time in 1962. He was slowed down by injuries in both 1963 and 1964, but he won a regional tournament, the Northwest Open, in 1964. He also placed second in the St. Paul Open that year.

In 1967, Funseth tied for second again. This time it was in the 500 Festival Open. The other best finishes of his career were ties for third in the 1965 and 1966 Canadian Open and the 1967 Phoenix Open.

Funseth recalled that in 1967 when he made strong bids to win at Indianapolis, Phoenix and Tucson, he lost his chances with high scoring rounds on the last day.

He figured that his inability to card a low round on the final day cost him more than \$15,000 that year.

As an amateur, Rod enjoyed a rare thrill when he finished third in the 1956 Caliente Open -- it was his first tournament.

Bill Garrett had been on the Tour since 1965, but after the third round of the 1970 Coral Springs Open he found himself where he had never been before: He was leading the tournament. He also had company, Lee Trevino, for both had 203s.

Garrett had a natural reaction: "I was so nervous that I woke up around midnight and couldn't go back to sleep. I wanted to go out and tee up right then."

Finally, when his tee time arrived, Garrett topped his drive only 75 yards off the first tee. He recalled: "I was so nervous that I could hardly walk down the fairway." Bill struggled to pars on the first two holes, then scored three consecutive birds and was never headed.

"I was paired with Boros," he said, "and I think that helped settle me. Just being with him helps another golfer play better. You just watch him go along playing each hole in that easy way he has and soon you catch some of his feeling."

"Actually, I play a lot like him. I mean that I walk kind of slow and hit kind of fast."

Victory in the next-to-last tournament of 1970 was the highpoint of Garrett's career. In 1969, Bill's previous best year, he won \$12,563. The Coral Spring Open's first prize of \$25,000 helped boost Garrett's winnings for the year to \$34,005.

It was the second time that he had finished in the top ten during 1970. In June he tied for sixth in the Kiwanis Peninsula Open. In all, he played in 37 tourna-

ments during the year and won money in 18.

The Tour has been a struggle for the giant Texan and he took the month of August, 1970, off to talk to his sponsors because his contract had expired.

"I had thought about quitting the Tour for the security of a club job," he admitted, "but I really never believed I'd have to quit. I had a feeling that some day I'd win."

Back home in Texas, Garrett convinced his 20 sponsors that he could do it. He returned to the Tour in the Fall and proved his point at Coral Springs.

Garrett was introduced to golf by his father when Bill was ten. Although he played high school basketball, Bill was more serious about golf and eventually accepted a scholarship to North Texas State.

Bill was graduated from North Texas State in 1962 with a degree in physical education. He turned professional in 1964.

"Terry Dill was a big help to me in the later weeks of 1970," said Garrett. "He's almost as tall as I am and he understands my swing."

"The secret for a tall person is to swing slowly and maintain your balance. I have to keep fighting for balance."

After scoring one victory, Garrett is now hunting for a second.

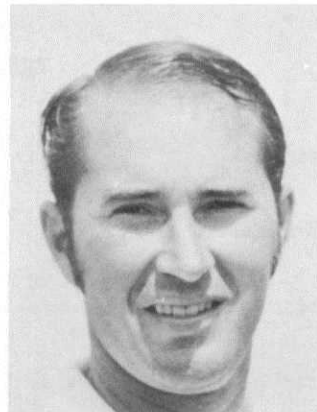

For C. L. Gilbert, Jr., of Hollywood, Fla., 1970 was a productive year.

Known as Gibby because his "initials stand for nothing," Gilbert leaped out of the ranks of unheralded players early in the year. Within a few weeks of each other he became a tournament winner, the father of his third son, and his winnings swelled to more than \$57,000.

Gibby's life had suddenly taken a U-turn from the year before when he had little more than four worldly possessions -- a wife, two sons and a bag of golf clubs. Speaking of the Tour then, he said:

"It's a tough life out there. But if you can just pull it off ... if you can ever make it out there, why it's the greatest life!"

Gilbert made it in Houston in 1970. He finished the Houston/Champions International with a two-under 282 and found himself tied with Bruce Crampton for first prize. On the third hole of the "sudden-death" playoff, Gilbert won the tournament and its first prize of \$23,000.

Gibby's crash into the headlines came more slowly and more painstakingly than he had dreamed. He started playing golf when he was 13 and soon began dreaming about playing on the Tour.

He attended the University of Chattanooga in his home town. He married and dropped out of school and then the couple moved to Florida where Gibby went to work as an assistant professional.

In 1967 Gilbert was among those who attended the PGA Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players. That group has since been called the "Blue Ribbon Class" because it included Orville Moody, Tony Jacklin, Deane Beman, Bob Murphy, Ron Cerrudo, Bunky Henry, Lee Elder and others.

Bobby Cole, of South Africa, was the low qualifier in the class, and "unknown Gibby Gilbert" was second, a stroke behind.

Gilbert did little to change his unknown status on the Tour in 1968. In 1969 he played in 17 events and about all he did was to convince himself that maybe he should not be a Tour player.

But, starting in the Fall of 1969, Gilbert played what he called "fantastic golf" in several Florida tournaments and won \$10,000.

"For the first time, I quit my job as club pro," he recalled "and decided to go on the Tour full time. Before I always got a leave of absence from the club where I worked. I started 1970 more determined than ever before."

He returned to the Tour for the 1970 Doral Open and finished seventh. He said: "The better I played the more confidence I got."

Like most other first-time winners on the Tour, Gilbert said after Houston:

"The greatest thing is that I don't have to qualify for a year." Unless you're on the Tour, you have no way of knowing what this means to a player who must qualify. A win changes your mental outlook completely.

"Knowing that you can win helps a player in many ways. It boosts his confidence and often that is all you need to get hitting the ball better."

What was the most unusual aspect of his victory?

"That's easy to pin-point," said Gibby, "it was getting used to all the publicity. That takes a while, I have to admit."

It's not planned that way, but Bob Goalby has turned the Fall season into a personal golden harvest.

In 1969 Bob won the Robinson Open in late September, and it was his first victory since the 1968 Masters. It came just in time to give him exemption from qualifying in 1970.

In 1970's third-from-last tournament, the Heritage Classic, Goalby came through with victory again. Although the triumph assured Goalby of another year on the Tour without qualifying, he probably would have gained the same status by finishing in the top 60 leaders in the Exemption Point standings.

Goalby earned points in 24 tournaments in which he played the full four rounds in 1970 and finished in the top ten five times. Victory, worth 120 points, helped him earn 921.67 points for the year and he finished in 28th place on the point list.

Bob's late season play also boosted his money-winnings to the second highest of his career. In his last three events, Goalby finished tied for second in the Sahara Invitation and won \$8,190; first at Heritage, worth \$20,000; and, at the Coral Springs Open he finished tied for 11th and won \$2,531.

Until the 1970 season, Goalby made virtually no changes in his swing. He always has been a strong player who hits low-flying shots with every club. For 1970, Bob added an inch to the shafts of his woods and irons.

"The reason I made the change," he explained, "was that I found myself squatting too much while addressing the ball. I think many golfers make this same mistake."

"With the extra length, I'm standing more upright and having an easier time getting the club back and swinging it through."

Bob discovered that he was squatting too much by watching movies of himself.

"I have my own shop," he said, "so it was no trick to lengthen the clubs myself. I like fooling around with golf clubs and old cars. I have a couple of beat-up Fords I work over every now and then."

Goalby soon discovered that the lengthened clubs helped his driving, and added, "When I drive well, I score well."

"You might call this change a mental thing. We all need a lift now and then and certainly the change proved to be a mental lift for me."

Speaking of changes, Goalby has seen many take place on the Tour since he first joined the circuit. He said:

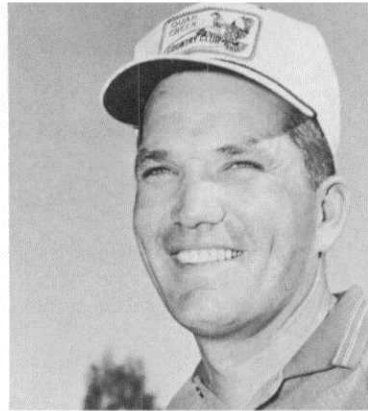
"The quality of play has increased so much since I came out that it's almost unbelievable. You can't afford to let up at any time now. It's tough qualifying over 18 holes, and then it's just as tough trying to make the 36-hole cut."

Goalby was a four-sport athlete at Belleville High School and won 11 letters. Although three major league baseball teams were interested in him, Bob went to the University of Illinois. He played one season of football there as a reserve quarterback and a defensive regular, and then left school.

He became a car salesman and won a half-dozen amateur tournaments in 1955-56 before turning professional at the age of 26 in 1957.

Goalby was a member of the old PGA Tournament Committee from 1962 through 1964. He played on the 1963 Ryder Cup Team.

His off-Tour interests include quail hunting, fishing and antique cars. He owns two Model A Fords.

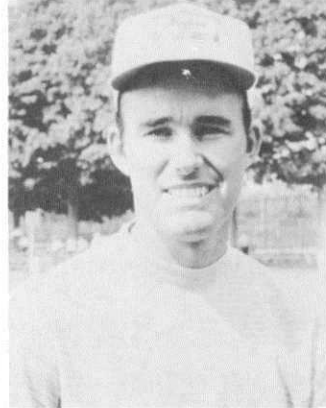

In 1967 Lou Graham earned a reputation for possessing a keen putting stroke.

Early in the year he went 170 consecutive holes, including the weather-plagued Bing Crosby National, without three-putting.

In mid-Summer the players encountered some of the most difficult greens on the Tour at Hazeltine National Golf Club, site of the Minnesota Classic was held. Lou solved them and posted his first victory.

After winning \$44,556 that year, Graham ran into bad luck in the form of Tendonitis in his left hand. An operation sidelined him for seven months.

Lou has been fighting his way back ever since.

Golf played a large role in Lou's life since he was 10, and his skill led to a scholarship to attend Memphis State University. He was there three years although he has since admitted, with a smile, "I didn't like school from the day I went into first grade."

Lou left Memphis State for a tour of duty in the Army. Graham has since admitted that he did not sign up because of his patriotic feelings, but rather because he wanted to get "my time over with." He also said: "I wanted out from the day I got in."

For a time Graham was stationed at Fort Myer in Arlington, Va., and was a member of the President's Honor Guard. He served with the select guard at John F. Kennedy's inauguration and other State functions.

"You don't know how many ceremonies there are in Washington, D. C. Some days we'd change uniforms five or six times. It wasn't any dream of a job."

Lou was discharged after he served 30 months and he worked at a golf club in Baltimore for more than two years before joining the Tour in 1964.

Graham made steady progress on the Tour until his physical setback. Off his 1970 record, Lou appears well into a "comeback." He played in 32 tournaments in 1970 and won money in 28. He finished in the top 10 four times.

Bert Greene won two tournaments in 1970 -- the Los Lagartos International on the Caribbean Tour and the Brazilian Open -- yet the year was disappointing.

The reason is not that the victories received little notice at home, but rather that Bert suffered through physical problems and his money-winnings dropped to almost half his 1969 winnings.

In 1968 Greene suffered a slipped disc and he has been afflicted with recurring back problems ever since. Looking for a cure in 1970, Bert Visited pro football trainers, chiropractors and physicians along the trail regularly.

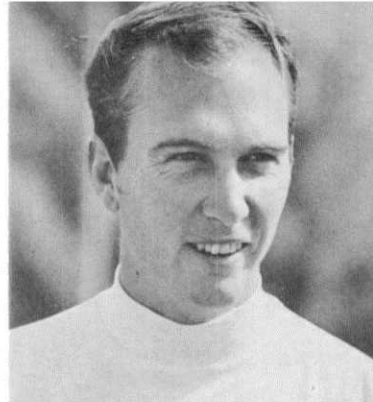
"I swing at the ball too hard," Greene said, in explaining the source of his woes. He had many painful attacks during the year, yet admitted at other times when he felt sound he worried and his back became a "psychological thing."

In the National Four-Ball Championship, Greene teamed with Billy Casper. He pulled a shoulder muscle while playing in the tournament and had trouble hitting the ball. Casper urged him to drop out, which would have eliminated the team from play, but Greene continued.

Greene has always been a tenacious golfer - ever since he played his first round at the age of five. In those days, when it was necessary for Bert's mother to hire a baby sitter for the boy, she would go to the country club in Gray, Ga., where Bert's father was the professional and hire a caddie.

Young Bert and his "sitter" would play nine holes of golf and wait for Mrs. Greene's return. Bert played his first tournament in Dublin, Ga., at the age of eight.

"I never forced him into golf," said Herb Greene, Bert's father. "I gave him the fundamentals and he developed most of his skills with steady practice and tournament play.



Bert attended the University of Tennessee and won that State's amateur championship. He turned professional in 1966 and was graduated from that Fall's Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players. He advanced to the Tour with a reputation of being a big hitter.

In the Spring of 1967, Bert underwent a kidney operation and went on a special diet. His health and strength returned gradually and in 1968 he hit his stride. The following year, 1969, was his most successful, although he did not win. His best finish was second place in the Westchester Classic.

In February, 1970, Bert dropped off the Tour to visit Bogota and won the Los Lagartos event from a field that included his friend Casper. He won the off-Tour Brazilian Open in May.

Bert missed very few tournaments in 1970 as he played in 35 events and won money in 26. He finished in the top ten five times and earned \$37.5 Exemption Points and placed 39th in the standings.

One of Bert's "vacation weeks" from the Tour was taker so he could attend a PGA Business School.

Greene's big chance for victory in 1970 was in the Houston/Champions International. He was leading the tournament with three holes remaining, but then lost three strokes and the tournament.

He three-putted the 16th green, and took a double bogey six on the 17th after hitting his approach into a ditch. He finished third.

Jimmy Demaret, one of the Champions' owners, offered Bert some consolation. Said Jimmy:

"You're young, Bert. Don't let this get you down. You're going to win a lot of tournaments."

Jerry Heard set a goal for himself in 1970, the second year on the Tour: "I wanted to win \$20,000."

Instead, he doubled that figure - and then some. He said: "I'm very happy to say that I won almost \$45,000 for the year and reached the top 60 in points, too."

Heard did not discover any secret technique to improve his swing, nor did he change putting styles. Rather, he got married on May 19, 1970.

"I really believe that marrying Nancy made the year for me," he said. "Marriage has changed my mental outlook ... it has made me a more stable person, and I progressed quicker after our marriage."

"Of course," he added, "I realize I was gaining experience on the Tour all the time, and there's no substitute for this, but marriage improved my outlook on life."

In his first five tournaments of 1970, Heard won money only once when he took home \$133 from the Phoenix Open. Unfortunately, his slow start continued. In his first 12 events, Jerry did not qualify or was cut after 36 holes in six tournaments.

After his May marriage, Jerry's fortunes on the Tour changed. He won \$3,037 with an 11th place finish in Cleveland, and a tie for seventh in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic netted \$4,256.

In the lucrative Westchester Classic, Heard tied for fourth and won \$11,000. That single purse was more than Jerry had won in all of 1969, his freshman year on the Tour.

From the Western Open through the Greater Hartford Open, Jerry was cut from only three tournaments.

His best finish in the Fall portion of the schedule was another tie for fourth, in the Kaiser International. This was worth \$6,200.

In all, Heard played in 39 events and collected cash in 28. He finished in the top ten five times. For the year he earned 869.2 Exemption Points, good enough to place him 34th on the list and to grant him exemptions in all of 1971's Tour events.

Heard plans to play as often as he can through the first half of 1971, and if he is progressing well toward his new goal, he may take a month off to go fishing.

"I'd like to win \$75,000 in 1971 and make the top 25," he said. "I'm going to work hard toward that, especially in the first half of the year."

Heard has been playing golf since he was 11. He recalled:

"I used to play baseball every Summer, but one evening I went over to a golf course with some friends to try to play. I enjoyed it so much I went back the next day. That was the end of baseball and the beginning of golf."

Heard was active in California amateur events and played on the golf team at Fresno State. He turned professional in the Fall of 1968 so he could attend the Qualifying School for ATPs. He was graduated with that group.

One of 1970's most incredible tournament finishes occurred in the Tallahassee Open as Harold Henning roared in with a bird, eagle, bird on the last three holes. He won by a stroke over Rives McBee.

Because the Tallahassee was held as a satellite to the Tournament of Champions, Henning's \$10,000 victory was overshadowed by the main show. But it was the highlight of an otherwise off year for the South African. By anyone's standards it was an unusual tournament for Harold.

In each of his three tournaments before going to Tallahassee, Henning did not survive the 36-hole cut. Harold was not pleased with his game as the tournament opened, but he scored a 67 in the first round and was tied for the lead.

The next day he took a 76 and went immediately to the practice green in search of a putting stroke. He made a complete change and switched to cross-handed putting.

In the third round, Henning equalled the course record with a 64 and took a one-stroke lead in the tournament. In that round he scored eight birds, including six on the back nine.

"I only wish I had discovered this stroke 10 years ago," he said.

On the final day Henning quickly ran into a string of bogies and went out in 18 and McBee was four-strokes in the lead.

Henning regained his touch and charged after McBee. Harold's final birdie-eagle-birdie combination proved to be a winner.

Henning played in only 15 events on the Tour in 1970 and won money in eight. His other finish in the top ten was a tie for ninth in the Byron Nelson Classic, the week following Tallahassee.

Henning turned professional in his homeland in 1953. He has gained a wide reputation as an international golfer and has won national titles in Denmark, Switzerland, Germany and Malaya. Until 1966 his play in this country had been sporadic.

He lost his playing privileges three times here for failing to participate in the required number of annual tournaments. But he regained it each time.

"I know that in a good year in the States I can make more than I can in five years overseas," he said. It is unlikely this will happen again.

Until 1970, Henning's lone Tour victory was in the 1966 Texas Open. The year before he had teamed with Gary Player to win the Canada (now World) Cup for South Africa.

Henning's brother, Allan, also plays on the Tour. They are rated as one of the strongest brother-brother teams active in golf.

Put Dave Hill down in Memphis, Tennessee, and the tournament's cash register there starts singing his song. For the third consecutive year, Hill walked off the Colonial Country Club's 18th green in 1970 as the tournament winner.

In eight appearances in Memphis Hill has won \$83,796 -- including \$20,000 for his victory in the 1967 Memphis Open, \$30,000 for an encore in 1968, and \$30,000 for winning the 1970 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

"I gotta like this town," said Hill. "After all, I win most of my money here."

Dave won enough other money along golf's trail to make 1970 his second most lucrative year on the Tour.

The Memphis tournament is held in May and his fine showings there may be a reflection of Hill's perplexing physical condition. In recent years he has suffered through a loss of weight as the Tour goes into the second half of the year.

"I've always been a high-strung person," said Hill of his emotional and physical conditions, "and when I'm on the Tour I don't eat regularly. If I eat breakfast, I get indigestion. So I eat about once a day, at night. Maybe I'll have a hot dog on the course, but usually I don't eat until about eight at night." Then, according to friends, Dave often fails to finish his dinner.

Consequently, Dave has found that as the season progresses his weight will drop from 155 or slightly higher to 130 or less. Several times during 1970, Hill reported "blacking out" while on the course.

By his own judgment, Dave is a complex and nervous individual of many moods. He admitted: "I guess the only people who

could really write about me would be my wife -- and a football coach I had when I was a kid.

Although Dave is temperamental, he is serious about his golf goals.

"I am obsessed with the idea of being very correct technically. I can't settle for mediocrity, and that makes me my own worst enemy. I'm not talking about winning, I don't care if I win one tournament or a thousand.

"I want to get to the point where I master the golf ball the way Ben Hogan masters it. Out here on the Tour the golf ball is usually the master. Just let me play well ... the way I'm capable of playing."

In 1969 Hill won the Vardon Trophy for having the year's lowest scoring average on the Tour. He played 90 rounds at an average of 70.344 strokes. In the same year he won three tournaments, was the second leading money-winner and was a member of the Ryder Cup team.

Hill takes a determined, long-range view of his goals: "I want to play golf as good as I can play for as long as I can play. That's it. That's what I want my life to be like.

"If I can play like Sam Snead does at his age, I'll be happy. Just so long as I play good."

Though Hill has spent long hours at practice, he does not consider the game the same thing as work. He said: "When golf becomes work, Dave Hill will quit. I hate work, but golf is not work for me."

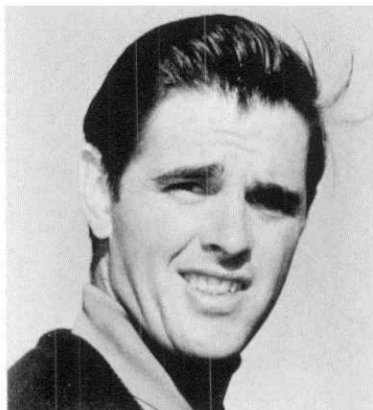

Mike Hill always wanted to play baseball as a boy, but he never fulfilled his Major League hopes and eventually joined his brother, Dave, on the golf Tour -- and now in the winner's circle.

Mike's victory breakthrough came in the 1970 Doral-Eastern Open when he beat runnerup Jim Colbert by four shots. Victory was worth three things for Mike: 1) \$30,000; 2) an identity; 3) confidence.

"People along the Tour have always mistaken me for Dave," said Mike, who is slightly shorter and heavier than Dave, "now some have gotten to recognize me. A few still call me Dave, but they know I won the Doral-Eastern.

"I guess winning gave me more confidence than anything else," said Mike. "This game is about 65 percent between your ears. If you think you can win, you can."

Mike's approach to each tournament is to play the first two rounds to survive the 36-hole cut. "After that," he added, "I let it fly and try to make something happen." Mike is not as bold a player as Dave, according to Mike himself.

Nineteen months younger than Dave, Mike Hill came into golf the hard way. He explained:

"We lived on a 130-acre dairy farm and a golf course was built right up to our property line. All of us kids became caddies and all became pretty good golfers."

The oldest Hill boy, George, "retired" from golf after winning the Jackson City Amateur title when he was 16. He concentrated on football and is now an attorney.

"Dave became the best golfer in the family," said Mike, "and he deserved it because he worked so hard on his game."

Mike dreamed of baseball's big leagues -- as either a shortstop or third baseman -- but after high school he served a four-year hitch in the Air Force where he played golf whenever he could, rather than baseball. He attended Arizona State for two years and then returned to Jackson.

"I spent five years driving a beer truck," he recalled "and finally decided golf was easier than work." Dave did not try to talk Mike into joining the Tour.

Dave said: "I wouldn't advise anyone to come out on the Tour, especially if he's a fellow who likes to come home every night after work."

Mike almost changed his mind about a career in golf because he failed to win Approved Tournament Player status in the PGA Qualifying Schools of 1966 and 1967. He made it in the Class of 1968 and joined the Tour for the 1968 season.

"I've had it a lot easier than Dave," Mike admitted. "Dave had to make it on his own. I've had a sponsor. And now there are so many tournaments with big purses that it's easier for the younger player to relax. We know we have a chance to make a living if we keep at it."

Mike is not as technically-minded about the game as is Dave. Mike feels he has a natural golf swing and he just tries to maintain his own groove. But he added: "Sometimes I kind of leach off Dave's knowledge of the game and the courses."

The year 1970 sounded like a broken record to Larry Hinson. It seemed that someone was always saying: "Congratulations, you played well at Kemper," and Hinson would answer: "But I didn't win."

Again Hinson would hear kind words about his Westchester finish, and he would say: "But I didn't win."

Later it would be: "Great year, Larry ... with two seconds and three thirds." Larry would reply: "But I didn't win."

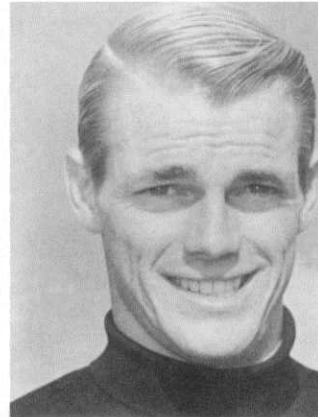
Though Hinson cleared the \$100,000 plateau late in the Summer, and ultimately more than doubled his 1969 winnings, he recited his 1970 litany: "But I didn't win."

Hinson finished in the top five in nine tournaments to tie with Lee Trevino in this category. Moreover, Larry's I-didn't-win refrain hit a sharp note at the end of the year when it was found that he had established a minor Tour record: He won more money in one year than any other player had ever collected -- without scoring a victory!

Hinson and Tom Weiskopf topped the \$101,987 which Frank Beard took home in 1968 without the benefit of a victory.

Looking back on the year, Hinson said: "I just wanted to win so badly ... so unbelievably badly. The money is great, of course, and it means a great deal to a young family ... but I didn't win."

Although it wasn't widely publicized, there was a victory on Hinson's individual record. It was earned when Larry went down to Bogota, Colombia, during the Fall idle period on the Tour.



But Tour victories and "the big ones" are always uppermost in Hinson's thoughts. He said: "I want to win the big four -- our Open and the British Open, the PGA and the Masters -- and then I'll retire. I know what that sounds like, but I really think I can do it."

Hinson has some feelings on how golf galleries feel about some of the winners on the Tour: "People talk about how long the odds were for some of the players to win. The fact is the players don't think that way at all. If you don't come out on the Tour feeling you're going to make it ... with no ifs, ands and buts ... well, dad gum, you might as well stay home. We come out to win."

Some of Hinson's friends thought he should not join the Tour in 1968 because a polio attack had withered his left arm. He recalls making a decision that "polio wasn't going to stop me from being an average boy," and it hasn't.

Hinson thinks of his handicap as an advantage on the golf course. He said "Once when I broke my arm it was reset wrong and now I can't turn it over and consequently there's no way I can duck-hook the ball."

Hinson feels that his determination not to become a victim of his handicap has helped him to reach the heights in golf that he has attained. He added: "Getting over polio was just something that happened. I didn't do anything heroic. I don't know why people want to make such a fuss over it."

It is a matter of record that Bryant (Babe) Hiskey's eight years on the Tour have been somewhat short of successful. However, only a few close friends and relatives new how trying and how hard those years were for Babe.

Few persons were aware, for instance, that back in 1964 Babe's card as an Approved Tournament Player was withdrawn. But he appealed and was given another chance.

Only his relatives knew that when a five-year contract between Bab and his sponsors ended, he continued to play the Tour on his own and went broke.

Only his immediate family knew that Babe's father came to the rescue then, supplying financial backing and a new automobile when Babe's old car succumbed to exhaustion.

All of this cliff-hanging information came to light after Hiskey won the 1970 Sahara Invitational. It, like Babe's career, was a cliff-hanger, and he won by a stroke.

The victory, Babe's second on the Tour, will eliminate for most of 1971 the need to qualify for each tournament. The weekly 18-hole qualifying rounds were one of Babe's dilemmas since the start of 1967 through virtually all of 1970.

Another phase of Hiskey's life which came to light in Las Vegas was his spiritual devotion. He is one of a number

of players on the Tour who meet regularly for Bible study sessions.

Hiskey prefers the word "Christianity" to "religion" and denies being a fanatic interested in the conversion of others. He will readily admit that his beliefs have a positive effect on his game.

In Las Vegas Babe spent his evening hours listening to Bible verses on tape. an exercise he insists helps his concentration on the golf course.

Asked if he prayed during the Sahara's final round, Babe replied: "You'd think I was a nut if I told you how much I was praying. If you'd seen some of my other finishes, you'd know this was a miracle."

Of his years on the Tour, Babe said: "It's been a struggle. I mean all of life, not just golf. Winning at Sahara was a victory for me and my dad. I probably wouldn't have stayed out on the Tour if it weren't for him."

Looking back on his "struggle," Hiskey added: "There were many times when I felt like I never belonged out here. I guess I've been leaving the Tour for five years ..."

Hiskey attended the University of Houston and was graduated in 1961. He is the younger brother of former touring professional Jim Hiskey.

Doug Sanders won the Bahama Islands Open in 1970, but he wasn't any happier than Herb Hooper, who finished in a tie for 16th in the same event.

Hooper's purse of \$1,690 wasn't all that made him happy. Rather, it was the fact that he earned 52 Exemption Points and that would be just enough to make him the 60th and final man on the list of players who would be exempt from qualifying for 1971 Tour events.

Hooper put on an 11th-hour drive to make the magic list. In his last three tournaments, he earned more than 146 points -- 30.5 in the Heritage Classic; 63.5 in the Coral Springs Open and 52 in the finale in the Bahama Islands.

Making the top 60, made 1970 a great year for the Hooper. But early in the year Herb did little that would indicate he was headed for the top 60. In his first four events, he was either cut after 36 holes or did not qualify. Consequently, he didn't earn a point or any money.

Then he joined the Caribbean Tour, where points are not available but where the experience and money count is valuable. The change of scenery helped as Herb won the first event, the Panama Open. With his pro-am earnings, Herb took \$3,641 with him. In the final event of the three-stop Caribbean swing, Hooper finished third in the Los Lagartos International and won \$1,500.

Before the year was over Hooper played in 37 events and won money in 26. He tied for fourth in the Green Island Open, and shared sixth in the Coral Springs Open.

And he also learned that an old habit of his had payoff possibilities. Hooper's habit is that he likes to rise early in the morning.

"The greens are usually heavy enough to hold the ball then," he explained, "and I like to work on my short game in peace and quiet."

Aside from that, it became a practical, money-making thing with Herb in 1970. Because he was available, Herb was called on to fill in for other professionals who apparently overslept their tee times in pro-am events. Four times during 1970 Herb was a last-minute sub.

"It was particularly rewarding for me at the Dow Jones," said the early-riser. It was 7:45 A.M. when the starter began searching for a substitute player and though Hooper was not even an alternate, he was available.

Herb took advantage of his opportunity by scoring seven birds, 10 pars and one bogey for a 66. That score was later tied by Dick Lotz, and each collected \$900. Hooper's team had a best-ball of 55 and that gave Herb an additional \$800.

The moral to Hooper's tale is that the early bird gets the green stuff.

Hooper turned professional in 1961 and was associated with Virginia clubs until he joined the Tour in 1968.

Hale Irwin starred as a football safety man at the University of Colorado and was named to the All-Big Eight team in 1965 and '66. In a short time on the Tour, the soft-spoken Irwin found there is a great difference between the kind of pressure experienced in football and in golf.

"In football you can get rid of your emotions," said Irwin, who was graduated from Colorado in 1967 after majoring in marketing. "You can tackle somebody hard, for instance.

"But in golf the pressure keeps building. You have to control your emotions, and that's sometimes hard.

"You're the only one out there on the fairways," he added, "and you can't rely on anyone else to help you."

Going into the final round of the Los Angeles Open, the first tournament in 1970, Irwin held a one-stroke lead on the field. He suddenly found all kinds of pressure bearing down on him. However, with four holes remaining, Irwin was two strokes ahead of his nearest competitor, Billy Casper. Irwin's lead was cut in half when he bogeyed the 15th hole.

Casper was playing ahead and finished with a 276. Billy then predicted that Irwin would win the tournament.

"There were 13 first-time winners last year," Casper said of 1969 in support of his prediction, "and for every one of those there are six others just waiting for their chance."

But Hale wasn't to be one of the "six others." He bogeyed the 18th hole to tie with Casper and set up a "sudden-death" playoff. Casper won it with a bird on the first hole.

Irwin, a graduate of the 1968 Spring Qualifying School for ATPs, took the loss philosophically. He said:

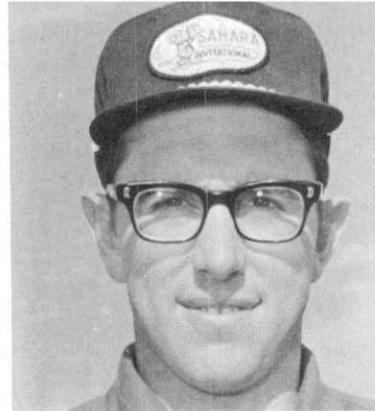
"I have to feel I lost the tournament, rather than that somebody won it. I was two strokes ahead with four holes to go, so I should have won.

"I was feeling good going to the 15th," he continued. "I wasn't nervous. I was kind of waiting for it to happen. Then, all of a sudden, everything I had worked for for two years slipped through my fingers.

"Winning it would mean you don't have to qualify for a year. That's the toughest thing in golf, that Monday qualifying."

Irwin stopped and added slowly, "Well, I guess it's the toughest except for winning a tournament. I was disappointed, but not discouraged. Just making a playoff against Billy Casper is a new high for me."

Irwin went on to his best year and finished among the top 60 in the Exemption Point Standings and will not have to qualify for 1971 Tour events.

Some time after winning the 1970 United States Open Championship, Tony Jacklin said: "Being human, you're never satisfied. I just hope this is the start of more wins. I hope to win the four major championships."

"My ambition," Jacklin continued, "is to be the greatest player in the world. This is a step toward it."

"If I could ever leave an impression on golf like Arnold Palmer, or Ben Hogan, or Jack Nicklaus, or Gary Player, why then I would feel that I am very fortunate."

Jacklin is well on his way toward fulfilling his ambitions. He won the British Open in 1969 and eleven months later won the U. S. Open.

After his British Open triumph, Jacklin received the Order of the British Empire from Queen Elizabeth. Tony's victory in the U. S. Open helped cement the affection the British public has for him. He is virtually a prized public institution.

Winning the British Open was the turning point in the handsome, young Englishman's career. He explained: "It made me financially secure for the rest of my life."

Many golf fans believe that hungry players are the best players, but Jacklin doesn't agree. He said: "I've found it is easier for me to play without worrying about money. It's a lot different than when you bend over to putt and have to think about that week's groceries."

Jacklin is aware that winning the U. S. Open can be lucrative, too. He said: "I've been told it can mean one million dollars to me ... and that's nice to think about."

"But I had more of an obsession to win the Open for itself than just for

the money. After all, you can only eat three meals a day, and you can only live in one house at a time."

Jacklin had an exceptional year on the Tour in 1970. More correctly, it was an exceptional half-year because after winning the Open he won very little money.

Before his June date with golfing date with golfing immortality, Jacklin was second in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open, tied for second in the Tournament of Champions and was third in the Greater Jacksonville Open.

For the year, he finished in the top ten six times and won money in 14 of the 21 events he entered.

Son of a lorry driver in Scunthorpe, Lincolnshire, Tony began caddying for his father at the age of nine. He started playing himself before that year was out.

The lad competed in boys' tournaments and won a county championship before he dropped out of school to turn professional at the age of 17. He worked two years in a golf shop, and improved his game.

Tony represented England, with Peter Alliss, in the 1966 Canada Cup (now World Cup) tournament in Japan and from there went on a world tour that was also his honeymoon. His journey brought him to the United States in the Spring of 1967 because he had been invited to play in the Masters.

He was named to the British Ryder Cup team that Fall and also decided to give the U. S. Tour a fling. He was graduated from the 1967 Fall Qualifying School and joined the Tour early in 1968.

To youngsters with golfing ambitions in Britain and other overseas nations, he advises: "Go to the States to learn what the game is all about."

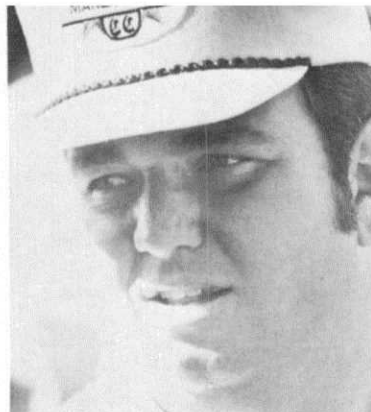

Jim Jamieson is living testimony to marital bliss.

As a sophomore on the Tour, Jamieson struggled early in 1970 to win money. In his first nine tournaments Jim missed the 36-hole cut six times. To top off that sad experience, he failed to qualify in his next three starts.

Jim dropped off the Tour and On April 11 was married to blonde Donna Pfister, an airline stewardess he met during the 1969 Danny Thomas-Diplomat Invitational in Florida. They had become engaged in January of 1970 and planned their wedding ceremony during the Masters.

As Jim said, candidly: "It was the one sure week I knew I wouldn't be playing. But some day ..."

Jamieson returned to the Tour for the Tallahassee Open, and, as though blessed by Dame Fortune, his career blossomed richly.

He won money in 16 straight tournaments -- finishing third in the Green Island Open and sharing third in the Western Open. He was 13th in both the Westchester Classic and the Greater Hartford Open.

The onetime Army 4th Class Specialist missed the 36-hole cut in the Kaiser International, but he bounced back to hit the cashier's window at the last four tournaments of the year. He placed 10th in 1970's windup event, the Bahama Islands Open.

"Two things contributed to my improvement," said Jamieson. "First, I was profiting from my experience on the Tour. Secondly, after we were married I felt I had someone to work for. I was able to set my

goals higher. My life didn't appear uncertain any more."

With Jamieson's success on the records, the ranks of bachelors on the Tour may soon start to thin.

Jim's performance also qualified him for the Alcan Golfer of the Year tournament in Ireland.

Born in Michigan, Jim was raised in Iowa and Illinois. He started in golf as a player -- when he was eight. He lived only two blocks from a nine-hole course in Moline and that was his proving ground. By the time he was 12, Jim was dreaming of playing on the Tour.

He attended Oklahoma State where he gained All-America rating. His amateur record included the 1964 Chicago District title and the 1967 Illinois Amateur, which he won while serving in the Army.

After his service discharge, Jim tried for the Tour at the 1968 Spring Qualifying School but failed. He came back and made the grade in that year's Fall School.

Success was elusive during 1969 and the year ended with Jim on the receiving end of a letter from the TPD office saying that his playing status was being studied. If his record did not improve he was in danger of having his playing privileges revoked.

In one year -- thanks to experience and marriage -- Jim jumped into the top 60 leaders in the Exemption Point Standings and he does not have to qualify during 1971.

Lean Don January is playing less on the Tour as the years go by, but he may be enjoying it more because he climbed back on the victory bandwagon in 1970.

The raw-boned Texan won the Greater Jacksonville Open, defeating Dale Douglass in an 18-hole playoff. Each had a 279 after the regulation 72 holes, and came back the following day for an 18-hole encore. Don scored 15 consecutive pars and then three birds for a 69 to Douglass' 72.

Jokingly, someone asked Don if he waited to get his birds until he reached the television holes, and he replied: "No, I'm not really that big a ham."

"I had my game going full choke all the way," added January, "but I couldn't get the putts to fall in until the 16th."

Naturally, the victory was the highlight of January's year. He played in 21 tournaments and won money in 15 and finished in the top ten three times. In 1969, he played in 24 events.

His total winnings of \$49,116 marked the first time since 1965 that he slipped below the \$55,000 bracket. But his 1970 income was enough to boost him into 12th position on the Tour's modern era money-winnings. He ended the year with a career total of \$490,179 in winnings.

"I can't play any more than four or five weeks in a row before I get completely fatigued," said January, who has been a Tour regular since 1956.

Don devotes more time to his family and to his expanding personal interests in Dallas. He has built a thriving insurance business and is associated with a group that includes Billy Martindale, a former Tour player, in the operation of a country club in Dallas.

Always interested in the conduct of the Tour, Don is now a member of the TPD Tournament Policy Board.

For reasons he cannot explain, January has long played well at the start of each year. Victory at Jacksonville in mid-March fits into that pattern.

Don's biggest financial killing came in February, 1961, in the Palm Springs Golf Classic. He made a hole-in-one at Indian Wells and received \$50,000.

Ironically, the richest tournament victories scored by the 1965 Ryder Cup player were in mid-season: the 1966 Philadelphia Classic (\$21,000) and 1967 PGA Championship (\$25,000).

Many golf fans recognize January instantly because his shirt collar is always turned up. Don does that for practical reasons, rather than as an identifying gimmick.

January said: "The sun really burns the back of my neck and the turned up collar gives me protection. If you've ever tried to sleep on a sunburned neck, you'd know what I mean."

Don compiled a fine record as a junior golfer in Dallas and then attended North Texas State College. He played on the school's NCAA championship teams of 1950-51-52 ... He entered the Air Force following graduation and turned professional in 1955 while still in the service.

January won the 1960 Tucson Open and played well for the remainder of the year ... He was named by Golf Digest as 1960's "most improved player."

Howie Johnson has found the formula for winning \$50,000 or more a year on the Tour. Make the 36-hole cut in each tournament and go on to collect a check.

In 1969 Johnson played in 33 tournaments and he missed the cut only three times. In 1970 his record bordered on the fantastic as he played in 31 tournaments and missed the cut only once. That occurred in the Greater Hartford Open, Howie's 26th event of the year.

Through those 25 tournaments, Johnson had finished in the top 10 five times and had kept his scoring average below 71 most of the time. The pace began to wear on Johnson, whose medical history includes two critical sieges of rheumatic fever, and his scoring average slipped higher as the season wore on. But he never missed the 36-hole cut again.

Johnson's two-year record is a remarkable display of consistent golf. It is even more impressive at Howie's age - he turned 45 on Sept. 8, 1970.

The Tour's late bloomer has said he turned professional on a dare.

"It happened in Houston after a pretty good round," he said. "I was a bachelor and had a pocketful of money, so I took the guy's dare."

At the time, Howie was an insurance salesman and was the recent winner of both the Minnesota and Texas public links championships. And, he was 30.

The one-time University of Minnesota golf team captain hasn't been sorry he made the switch in 1956.

Johnson came close to victory in 1970 -- in the Greater New Orleans Open -- and, thanks to his consistent scoring, he experienced his best year on the Tour.

Johnson's last triumph was off the Tour, the 1960 Mexican Open Championship. He knows the value of victory: "If you win a tournament a year, everybody's happy. Your sponsor is satisfied and you keep your name in the limelight. The possibilities on the Tour are almost endless ..."

But Howie doesn't agree with the school of thought which favors the power game. Johnson, who is long off the tee, said: "There are so many of the big, strong kids on the Tour who try to knock the ball a mile. But the finesse golfers are the ones who will endure."

Without classifying himself any further, Johnson rates himself as "having all kinds of shots."

The Minnesota native's fondest Tour memories go back to 1958 when he tied Arnold Palmer for first place in the Azalea Open and defeated him in an 18-hole playoff. Johnson played off and on the Tour through the early '60s while also being associated with clubs in Illinois and California.

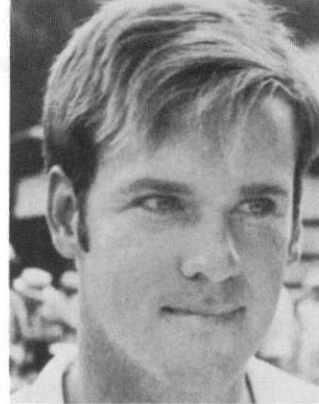

Grier Jones was graduated as the No. 1 qualifier in the 1968 Fall Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players, and he had a goal for 1969:

"I hope to make the top 60. Those Mondays are no fun."

Jones was referring to the necessity of qualifying each Monday for the week's tournament. It is an 18-hole test that most players agree is the Tour's toughest one round of play.

After Jones made the year's top 60 -- and also earned the 1969 title of "Rookie of the Year" -- he made the same vow for the 1970 season. Again he made it and will be exempt from qualifying in 1971.

Fellow professionals on the Tour credit Jones with a grooved swing and the ability to "hit every shot as it should be hit."

Jones modestly points out that he has a tendency to hook the ball. He explained: "I've always had a strong right-hand grip. I've changed it slightly and have moved my hand more over the top."

The blond, personable Jones is still looking for his first Tour victory. He turned professional after an impressive amateur career.

He won the 1968 NCAA Golf Championship while at Oklahoma State. His other titles from that period include: 1967 and '68

Big Eight Championship. The Oklahoma Intercollegiate, Oklahoma Invitational and Broadmoor Invitational -- all in 1968.

He also was named to the 1968 NCAA All-America team.

Jones has learned some valuable lessons on the Tour, including:

"The hardest thing to get use to on the Tour is playing a different course each week. Many of them have different grass and different greens."

Large galleries were something new for the Kansan when he joined the Tour. He said:

"I've learned not to let the galleries bother me, but when you get to playing badly you lose your concentration. That's when you start hearing the people talk."

As for bad moments on the course, Jones said: "I've learned not to get excited by a bogey. You just have to stick with it. You have to do the best you can."

Jones, the father of twin boys, has some advice for youngsters who might be interested in a career on the Tour:

"If you don't have the desire and you don't care about work, then you don't want to go on the Tour. There are too many good players out there who want to get ahead and who work at it."

In an effort to improve his Exemption Point position, George Knudson went all the way in the 1970 Robinson Open ... and won. But it was one of the toughest victories ever scored by the Canadian.

Because the Robinson's second round had been rained out, the field was scheduled to play two rounds on Sunday, the final day. George Archer's 202 held the 54-hole lead, three ahead of Knudson. But Knudson closed with a 63 to tie Archer at 268, 16-under par.

The "sudden-death" playoff was not so sudden. Knudson finally won on the fourth extra hole. Archer and Knudson had been paired throughout the final day and it turned out to be a sensational 11-hour, 40-hole marathon.

"I've won 10 tournaments in nine years on the Tour," Knudson said later, "and in all but one I've had to come from off the pace to win. So, in a sense, Robinson was nothing new.

"But I honestly didn't expect to win like I did. Not with such a fine player as George Archer missing a short putt on the fourth overtime hole."

Winning playoffs was nothing new for Knudson either. He's taken three in his career without a loss.

Victory was a confidence-builder for Knudson. He said:

"I found out what I've been doing wrong ever since the Bob Hope tournament," he said of the February Desert Classic. In that event, George also scored a hole-in-one.

George played in 24 tournaments during the year and won money in 18. He finished in the top ten five times. It appeared that he might not make the top 60 Exemption Point leaders but his Robinson victory earned a year's grace from qualifying.

In recent years, Knudson has been following a program of physical conditioning.

"My plan is to strengthen myself," he said, "and I believe it has paid off for me in better play. I lift weights and do calisthenics. It's a daily program and when I'm off the Tour I exercise for two hours a day.

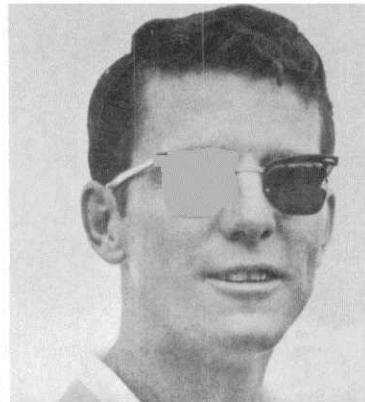
"One of the results is that I've added weight, and that was one of my intentions. When I started I weighed 140 pounds. By the end of the '69 season I was a solid 160.

"That's a big increase for a man my size and I may reach 170 before I level off."

Knudson joined the professional ranks in 1958, and played two years sporadically on the Tour before becoming a regular in 1960.

He won the Canadian PGA Championship in 1964. Knudson ranks his individual victory in the 1966 Canada (now World) Cup as his most prestigious triumph, although he won but \$1,000.

Knudson's biggest money-winning year on the Tour occurred in 1968 when he won successive events. They were the Phoenix and the Tucson Opens.

Gene Littler's most distinguishing characteristics are modesty and honesty. It tells a lot about the man's personality when he speaks of his considerable talents on the golf course in this manner:

"I just don't crave attention. It's the way I am. My idea is to get the job done on the course."

Littler has gotten "the job done" in a brilliant fashion many times. His victories include the 1953 U. S. Amateur Championship and the 1961 U. S. Open Championship. He has been a member of five Ryder Cup teams. On the Tour, Gene has won 21 events.

Littler's most notable effort last year was in the Masters. After 72 holes, Gene was tied with Billy Casper, an old friend and golfing rival from San Diego. Littler lost in the 18-hole play-off. Gene later tied for second in the Phoenix Open and the Colonial National Invitational.

"I have a lot of confidence when I'm playing well," Littler said, "but when I get going bad, I don't have any."

While 1970 was not a "Confidence Year" for Gene personally, there are dozens of players on the Tour who would like to borrow his swing.

Littler's smooth, stylish swing always appears to be in the groove, consequently he's known as "Gene the Machine." Littler smiles when golf fans mention this, and then he's likely to say:

"I'm still working on my action, even though people say I seem to make it look easy. It's a fight from year to year, and there's a very fine line between being good and bad. You must make continual adjustment.

"I guess the best thing you can say about my golf is that when I hit it badly, the ball stays on the course."

Then Littler will add a pro's insight into the game:

"Golf is not a game of great shots. It's a game of most accurate misses. The people who win make the smallest number of mistakes. That's why Billy Casper is such a great player. Even when he hits a poor shot, it goes relatively straight."

Littler's family -- his wife, Shirley; son, Curt, and daughter, Suzanne -- mean more to him than fame.

"My family travels with me in the Summer," he said, "and if they couldn't go along, I'd quit."

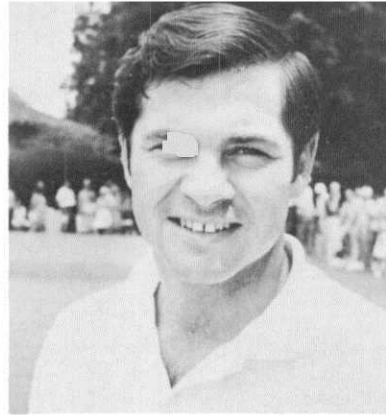

Scoring victories in the Monsanto and Kemper Opens; winning \$125,023 and placing sixth on the 1970 money-winning list; earning 1,170.0 Exemption Points and finishing 11th on that list add up to an outstanding year. How hard is it to attain all this?

Dick Lotz' answer was surprising:

"The hardest thing about life on the Tour is not playing golf, it's traveling. It's living out of a suitcase. It's having meals in different places every day and week after week.

"It's having two little children along, going through the same life. And who knows when the children might come down with colds and effect the whole family? But I prefer to take that chance because I feel a family should be together, and it's better for me than being out here alone."

Lotz smiled and concluded: "But playing on the Tour still beats working."

A natural left-hander who golfs right-handed, Lotz started the 1970 season with the goal of winning a tournament. He won the Monsanto Open in mid-March. He recalled:

"I wasn't surprised then because I felt I could win. But, honestly, I didn't think I'd win so early in the season." He moved again early in June at the Kemper.

"The confidence I've gained through these victories has helped me considerably," said. "It's knowing that if you get into a lead, you can handle it."

Lotz has not made any major changes in his game over the years, despite the fact that in his first four years on the Tour, Dick never won more than \$5,000 in any one season. He has admitted that a number of recent alterations have helped his scoring.

Dick credits part of his success to a better stance. He said: "I'm set up over the ball better than I used to be, and this helps me to get through it better."

Dale Douglass helped improve his short game, Lotz said. As might be expected, Dick's putting has improved: "I've learned to maintain a level speed with the clubhead, taking it back and through the ball evenly."

Dick concluded: "When you're winning, you're whole game seems to improve at the same time."

Lotz looks to the future confidently: "There's no reason I shouldn't win more tournaments, but I'm not making any predictions. I have a tendency to feel that I must try to keep up the pace, but I realize there are so many good players out here that I can't win them all."

"In fact, if you win three or four tournaments you're having an exceptional year. These days if you manage to win a couple of tournaments a year and can do it for maybe 10 years, you'll be classified as one of the greats ... and you would be."

Lotz is a member of the TPD Tournament Policy Board. Dick is the younger brother of John Lotz, also a Tour player.

One of the biggest men on the Tour, Bob Lunn now feels that he has grown up. It's not physical growth that Lunn has in mind.

"It's in maturity," said Lunn. "I've been out on the Tour four years and I've grown up a lot in my thinking. I have learned, for instance, to play one shot at a time and this has helped me tremendously.

"I've seen it written and have heard other players talk about it, but the idea of playing one shot at a time really didn't sink in until sometime last year."

Lunn, who made 1970 his third consecutive year in which he has scored at least one tournament victory, also picked up some additional knowledge:

"You find yourself learning something new about the game all the time. I guess that if this process ever stops, then you'd better start looking for something else to do."

A strong and accurate driver, Lunn tries to achieve consistency in his all-around game. He now realizes the cause of his variety in scoring from week to week:

"The difference in scoring well, at least for me, comes when I'm putting well."

Lunn, who has a goal of winning "all the big tournaments some day," also would like to be honored as "the outstanding putter of some year."

Bob is a devoted family man and had planned to take several weeks vacation from the Tour when his wife was expecting the couple's second child last Spring. Before 1970 he had never played well in Florida and decided to skip a portion of the Tour in the Sunshine State.

He passed the Doral-Eastern and was thinking of skipping the Florida Citrus Invitational, but his wife, Angie, said: "Why don't you play in the Citrus and win it for the baby?"

The couple's small joke became known when Bob did exactly that. Lunn edged Arnold Palmer by a stroke to take the \$30,000 first prize purse.

Palmer had always been Lunn's hero and they were paired for the final round of the Orlando, Florida event. Bob started the final round a stroke behind Arnold.

Lunn finished with a 70 to Palmer 72, and the usually placid Lunn was excited "I was pleased that I was able to hold my game together under the circumstances."

Then he added: "This is my greatest moment in golf."

The burly Californian has had other memorable moments in golf, including Victory in the 1963 U. S. Public Links Championship, when he was 18; consecutive victories in the Memphis Open and Atlanta Classic in 1968; and victory in the 1969 Hartford Open after a stirring playoff with Dave Hill.

Since joining the Tour in 1954, Billy Maxwell has never experienced a year like 1970.

It was somewhat strange because Billy finished 55th on the money-winning list (next-to-the highest listing of his career), yet he won more money than in any other year -- \$42,642.

It was Billy's 16th consecutive year of five-figure winnings on the Tour. His previous most lucrative year was 1962 when he won the Dallas Open and finished 12th on the money-winning list with \$31,834.

In 1970 the diminutive Texan entered 33 tournaments and won money in 25. His best finish was a tie for third in the Heritage Golf Classic.

Maxwell had four other finishes in the top ten and all were ties for position, including fifth in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, eighth in the Greater Hartford Classic and 10th in both the Greater Jacksonville Open and the PGA Championship.

Billy follows "The Maxwell Method" -- play often and well enough to take home a check every week. Except for his first year, 1954, Maxwell has had such success that after 1970 he was 30th on the all-time money-winning list with \$375,591.

A by-product of "The Maxwell Method" had its payoff in 1970 as Billy finished 29th on the Exemption Point Standings list. By playing regularly and well, Maxwell earned 920.27 points and is free from qualifying for 1971 Tour events.



After his service obligation, Billy turned professional early in 1954.

If they crowned an "up-and-down" champion on the Tour, Billy would be at the head of the line for the title. He is one of the best when it comes to saving pars with a keen game around the green. He also is a fine putter and some years back played 288 holes without three-putting.

Maxwell concedes that he has to compensate for his lack of ability to hit the ball long. He does so by keeping the ball in play and with his "touch" in the scoring zone.

While 1952 was Billy's best financial year until 1970, the 1961 campaign saw him win three of his eight Tour titles. The two efforts combined to earn him a position on the 1953 Ryder Cup team.

A golf future seemed inevitable for Billy when he was a boy. His family's home was just off the fourth green at Abilene Country Club. As an amateur, he won so many events that some writers called him "the Ben Hogan of Texas amateur golf."

Maxwell attended North Texas State University and while there he continued to enlarge on his impressive amateur career. He won the 1951 U. S. Amateur Championship. He helped his team win the NCAA golf title in 1950 and 1951. He won the Southern Intercollegiate crown twice. But Billy left college and went into the Army for two years. He won the 1953 Mexican Amateur.

John Miller started the third round of the 1970 Phoenix Open by scoring birds on the first three holes. He parred the fourth and birdied the fifth.

"I suddenly realized I was four-under," Miller recalled, "and I got shook up quite a bit. So I had to start talking to myself ... like, 'Let's just try to play par golf.'"

The lanky blond's pep talk had these results: He birdied two of the next four holes, then scored six consecutive pars and finished birdie-birdie-eagle. His card was 30-31-61 on the par 36-35-71 Phoenix Country Club course.

Miller's 61 held up as the lowest round scored on the 1970 Tour.

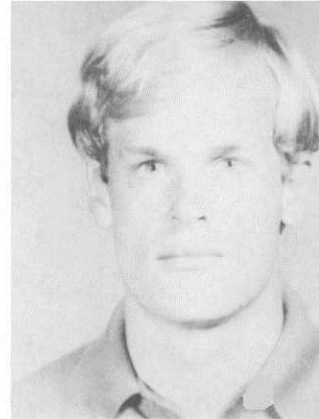
"Unbelievable! Lucky!" said Miller of that round. "You've got to be lucky to do something like that."

Jim Jamieson, Miller's playing partner saw it another way: "He could have had a 57 or 58! He lipped out at least four putts and left one about a half-inch short."

Part of Miller's secret was a new putter which he picked up the evening before his record round. He said:

"It has a square face and is easy to line up. I made 30 straight on the motel room rug, so I figured I might as well try it in the tournament."

The 61 attracted lots of attention to Miller, who had attracted a lot of attention while he was an amateur. The native of San Francisco started to play golf when he was five years old.



In 1964 he won the United States Golf Association's junior championship. He attended Brigham Young University and played on the college golf team, gaining All-America rating in 1967.

That was a year after he had placed eighth in the U. S. Open Championship at Olympic Country Club in San Francisco. He won the California State Amateur title in 1968.

John attended the 1969 Spring Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players and was graduated to the Tour. He qualified and survived the 36-hole cut in seven consecutive tournaments that year.

Miller has become a protege of Billy Casper. Like Casper, Miller is a Mormon. John has said that the most valuable lesson he has learned from Billy is to play the percentages.

"I need a lot of experience, of course," said Miller, "but Billy has taught me how to play the percentages and I know that has helped by advancement."

John does not drink or smoke. He said: "Abstinence helps me keep in good condition." It is also in keeping with his religion.

If Miller has a problem on the Tour it is a case of mistaken identity. Many fans think he is Larry Hinson. Both players are tall, lanky and blond. Miller has a solution for the problem:

"I've got to win so that people will walk up to Hinson and say 'Aren't you John Miller?'"

Bobby Mitchell continues to prove his own theory about getting started on the Tour. The Mitchell Theory goes like this: "It takes a player two years on the Tour before he really gets the experience necessary to know if he can make it."

Mitchell's first two years were 1966 and 1967. Since then he has never been below five figures in money-winnings. Each year since then he has increased his winnings.

In 1970 the drawling Virginian won \$36,342 by cashing checks in 27 tournaments of the 38 he entered. Moreover, he earned 822.7 points on the Exemption Point Standing list and placed 43rd in the field. That assured him of exemption from qualifying for 1971 Tour events.

Mitchell finished in the top ten in three events -- second in the Azaleas and shared fourth place in both the Heritage Classic and the Bahama Islands Open.

In the 1969 U. S. Open Mitchell shot a 66 in the third round, the day's best. But he took 11 more strokes in the final round and finished in a tie for 26th. In the 1970 Open, Bobby played more consistently and tied for 12th.

"I gained a lot of good experience in 1970," said Bobby. "For instance, I got into the Masters and now I know I can play there. That helps my confidence. Of course, the thing for me to do is to get back there every year.

"But the really big thing with me," he admitted, "is that I still want to win my first tournament. It doesn't matter



to me which one it is. I want to win! I feel like I'm a good enough player to win.

"I've learned a lot since I first came out," he said.

Mitchell does not have the tournament background of many others on the Tour. He did not play in any amateur tournaments ... He said:

"I didn't have an amateur record because I was never an amateur. I enjoyed the game as a kid and so I decided to become a professional. I was 15 when I turned pro."

Mitchell worked in the shop and later on the teaching tee at Danville, Va., Golf Club. And he worked on his game. In 1965 he won two tournaments with the same title, the Virginia Open.

"One was sponsored by the State amateur association and the other by the PGA," he explains. "They've gotten together now so that there's only the State Open."

Of his first year on the Tour, Mitchell recalls: "I was scared. I had played well locally, but I wasn't sure if I belonged out on the Tour because I didn't have any real tournament experience. I had a slow, rough start."

Orville Moody is something of a paradox ... He has never taken a golf lesson and he practices only briefly ... Yet he gained the star status in 1969 that many strive in vain to reach.

Moody's magnificent year included winning the U. S. Open, capturing the World Series of Golf, teaming with Lee Trevino to win the World Cup for the United States, and being named the PGA Player-of-the-Year.

When the modest Moody was saluted as 1969's Player-of-the-Year, he said: "I never dreamed I could receive this." ... Those words might serve as a summary of Orville's dream-like year.

That record make it a tough act to follow in 1970, and, while Moody did not win, he placed in the top ten six times in 1970. Orville entered 32 events and won money in 25, netting \$50,086 for the year. He also earned 760.9 Exemption Points which placed him 57th on the list of non-qualifiers for 1971.

In addition to fourth place in the Phoenix Open, Moody finished sixth in the Tournament of Champions, tied for sixth in the Dow Jones, shared seventh at San Antonio and was tied for ninth in the National Airlines Open.

Moody and Bruce Crampton teamed to tie for second place in the National Four-Ball event.

Son of a golf course superintendent, Moody remembers golfing as early "as I was big enough to hold a club." ... He won the Oklahoma State scholastic golf championship.

Sturdily built, Moody was offered an athletic scholarship to the University of Oklahoma by football coach Bud Wilkinson ... But he left college shortly after enrolling in 1953 and enlisted in the Army.

After a stint as a rifle instructor, Moody's golfing talents were recognized ... He was placed in charge of maintenance, instruction and supervision of Army courses ... He served in Japan, Korea, Germany and the United States ... He won three Korean Opens and was 1965's All-Service Champion.

In 1967, while stationed at Fort Hood, Killeen, Texas, Moody decided to give up his 14-year career in the Army to try the Tour.

Orville gave himself two years to make it on the Tour. If he failed by the end of 1969, he figured, he'd return to the Army. To get on the Tour he had to be graduated from the Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players.

Although the Fall Class of 1967 was full of world experienced young players, Orville earned his ATP card and joined the circuit.

"The first nine months on the Tour were the most miserable ones of my life," Moody said not long ago. "Almost everything I knew about the game left me. Especially my confidence, and that hurt."

Several times he was on the verge of quitting, but at the urging of his wife, he stayed with it. Gradually his confidence and his game returned. A cross-handed putter, Moody made it big in less than the two years he allowed himself.

The U. S. Open was Moody's first tournament victory.

An unassuming man, Moody is quiet spoken and deeply religious. He also rates himself as "a super-patriot." He tours Army bases regularly to give morale-lifting golf clinics. On the course he usually wears red, white and blue colors. He said: "I just happen to like those colors."

Bob Murphy enjoyed this third full year on the Tour, and no wonder: He won the Greater Hartford Open, was second at Tucson and Coral Springs and tied with Arnold Palmer for second in the PGA Championship.

He also won more money - \$120,639 - than ever before in his career, moved his family into a new home in Del Ray Beach, Fla., and won a race thoroughbred race horse.

The horse was picked up when Bob won the first Kentucky Thoroughbred Professional Celebrity Tournament, an 18-hole event in Louisville. Bob eventually decided to sell the horse.

Although the Brooklyn-born Murphy has proven himself a tough competitor and a four winner, he regularly is questioned about his weight.

If the questioners are serious, Murphy will respond in the same tone: "If people don't think I'm an athlete, let's arrange a decathlon and I'll take 'em on. I've played all sports. I just happen to be fat and just because a guy is fat doesn't make him lazy or slovenly."

If the questions are in a light tone, Murphy has often said: "Chi Chi Rodriguez once told me to try to get down to 175. He told him that the last time I weighed 175 was when I was in the third grade - and I'd been sick for three weeks."

Murphy suffered a slump during the second half of 1969 because his clubs were stolen in Philadelphia. He finally found a set in which he had confidence and his game picked up again, but many months were lost.

Of the game itself, and his pattern of fading the ball, Murphy has said, philosophically:

"It doesn't really matter how you do it on the Tour. You have to get the ball on the green and then get it in the hole. And it doesn't matter how you look while you're doing it."

Murphy has disproved the theory that successful golfers must start playing at an early age. Murphy didn't golf until his freshman year at the University of Florida.

Murphy attended Florida on a baseball scholarship, but he injured his shoulder in a pickup game of football during his freshman year. Bob did not go out for the baseball team.

The curly-haired Murphy took golf as a physical education course in his first year at Florida, and it was like love at first sight. "I used to skip classes to practice. Many days I'd work out six or seven hours at a stretch. I almost flunked out of school because my grades dropped off."

Murphy applied himself to golf and his studies. Before he was graduated in 1967 with a degree in physical education, he won: the 1965 U. S. Amateur Championship; 1965 and '66 Florida amateur titles; 1966 NCAS Championship; 1967 Florida Open; and, he was a member of the United States' World Amateur Team Championships squad in 1966 and the Walker Cup Team in 1967.

Murphy turned professional late in 1967 and was graduated from that Fall's ATP Qualifying School.

When Bobby Nichols accepted the position of head golf professional at Firestone Country Club in Akron, Ohio, it looked as if he would be phasing out of tournament play.

Bobby didn't phase himself out, and nobody told Bobby that club professionals are not supposed to win on the Tour. And he won professional golf's richest tournament -- the \$300,000 Dow Jones Open.

Bobby and four regular Labron Harris, Jr., started the final day at the Dow Jones as co-leaders at 207. Nichols came through with victory, thanks to a dramatic 14-foot putt on the final hole, for a 69 and 276.

Although Nichols and George Archer won the 1968 PGA Team Champion, Bobby had not won a tournament since the Minnesota Golf Classic in 1966, when he was a Tour star.

In 1969, his first year in the pro shop at Firestone, Nichols finished second to Ray Floyd in the American Golf Classic. But, of course, host professionals are never figured upon to win.

In 1970, Bobby came through to win the year's largest prize.

Obviously, a \$60,000 victory purse will make any golfer's year, yet the money wasn't the only thing on Bobby's mind.

"The personal satisfaction of winning a golf tournament was my ultimate goal," said Nichols. "You go so long and you don't think you'll ever win. You might think I'm crazy for saying that, when I'm getting a \$60,000 check, but I mean it."

"Guys like Jack Nicklaus and Billy Casper can go out and win a tournament every four or five weeks it seems. I'm not in that class, so it's a tremendous mental lift to finish first - no matter what the purse is."

Nichols played in 25 events in 1970 and collected cash in 20 for a total of \$103,429. It was the first year that Nichols had ever cracked the \$100,000 winning plateau.

He also earned 775.8 points in 1970 and placed 54th on the Exemption Point Standings.

Until his memorable Dow Jones victory, Nichols' most important victory was the 1964 PGA Championship. He took that title with a 271 which stands as the stroke play record for the event.

In 1967 Bobby came within a shot of winning the Masters. It took a 67 by his friend, Gay Brewer, to beat out Bobby. Nichols was named to the 1967 Ryder Cup team.

While attending St. Xavier High School in Louisville, Bobby was a football and basketball star. He was critically injured September 4, 1952, when a car in which he was a passenger failed to make a curve.

Nichols suffered a broken pelvis, back injuries, brain concussion and internal injuries. He was paralyzed from the waist down and was unconscious for 13 days. He was hospitalized for 96 days.

Nichols recovered slowly and later attended Texas A. & Am. He won the 1956 Southwest Conference golf title, and was graduated in 1958 with a degree in business.

In 1962 the Golf Writers Association of America voted Nichols the Ben Hoge Award in recognition of his recovery from his accident and his determination to play winning golf.

Jack Nicklaus admittedly points toward winning one of the world's major golf championships -- the United States Open, the PGA, British Open and the Masters -- each year. In 1970 Jack won the British Open.

Victory at St. Andrews, after a tense 18-hole playoff with Doug Sanders, was another giant step toward Nicklaus' lifetime goal. He would like to win more major championships than any other golfer. Bobby Jones won 13 major titles, and Jack admits he grew up with Jones' record ringing in his ears.

"The accomplishment that would separate me from other golfers," said Jack, "is to win more major championships. That would be a quality achievement."

Before turning professional for the 1962 season, Nicklaus had twice won the National Amateur championship (1959 and 1961). Since then he has added these championship titles: United States Open, 1962 and '67; PGA, 1963; British Open, 1966 and '70. In addition he has won three Masters, 1963, '65 and '66. This tournament was not in existence when Jones retired in 1930.

Nicklaus' triumph in Scotland qualified him for the World Series of Golf. After winning his fourth Series title in six tries, he talked more about his goals:

"I always aim for the four major championships. Winning one is a condition for getting into the World Series. Then, if you can beat the other three guys who

have won major championships, well, I feel like you've proven something. It gives me a great deal of personal satisfaction.

"It's not the same as beating a world field in, say the United States or British Opens, but when you beat the best it gives you a good feeling."

Nicklaus has experienced that "good feeling" many times and 1970 was a typically good year for Jack. He won the Byron Nelson Classic and teamed with Arnold Palmer to capture the TPD's Four-Ball Championship. Moreover, in five other events he finished in the top three places. In all, he had 11 finishes in the top 10.

Looking back on 1970, Jack said: "It was one of my best years because I hit fewer bad shots." That's indicative of how Nicklaus views each round. Another insight into Jack's game is reflected in this statement:

"The mistake too many golfers make on the Tour is that when they see a low score by somebody else, they start trying to hit shots they just can't bring off. And soon they're out of the tournament."

Nicklaus' scoring average has been consistently low: 1965 - 70.1; 1966 - 70.5; 1967 - 70.2; 1968 - 69.9; 1969 - 71.0.

In Arnold Palmer's own words, "the year 1970 was a kind of frustrating one. I lost a number of tournaments by a shot or two ... the PGA, the Byron Nelson, the Citrus Invitation, and even the tournament in Paris (the Lancome Tournament of Champions in October).

"I feel as though I played reasonably well most of the year," Palmer continued. "It would have made a big difference if I could have made a few putts at the right time."

As always, Palmer was honest with himself. He played well enough to finish among the top five in seven tournaments and he was in the top 10 nine times.

But to Palmer the lamentable part of 1970 was that he did not win a tournament as an individual -- for the first time in his 16-year professional career. He teamed with Jack Nicklaus to win the TPD's Four-Ball Championship, but that wasn't enough to satisfy his personal pride.

Although Arnie's money-winnings were the second highest in his career, he was unable to add a line to his winning record which is highlighted by: U.S. Open 1960; British Open, 1961, '62; Masters, 1958, '60, '62, '64; Vardon Trophy, 1961, '62, '64, '67; membership on the Ryder Cup teams of 1961, '65, '67 and captaincy in '63; leading money-winner in 1958, '60, '62 and '63.

After finishing second to Dave Stockton in the 1970 PGA Championship, Palmer talked about his play in the Tulsa tournament and his words then could serve as his requiem for the year:

"To win a championship you have to help yourself and I didn't do a lot to help myself here. Things like putting with confidence. I kept leaving them short ... I can't get the ball to the hole. Dave was putting with a lot of confidence, and that's something they haven't taken out of the game ... and it's something that I once was glad was a part of the game."

To Palmer, the difference between winning three Tour events and finishing second in the three came down to putting. Yet he declared that he has not been psyched out of his game on the greens in the same way that Ben Hogan suffered with his putting. Arnie has admitted, however, that putting has been "a fleeting thing" with him for perhaps five years.

"I can make changes in my stance," he said, "and I can use different putters. But I know it's the frame of mind that counts. That's really the thing that's hard to change."

In an effort to discover the source of his putting woes, someone asked Arnie if his trouble could be blamed on encroaching age.

"It would be an easy thing to say that," Arnie answered with a smile, "and maybe it might be logical. But I like to think my putting touch will come back when I'm 41."

Palmer turned 41 on September 10, 1970.

One shot alone rarely wins a tournament, but Gary Player is able to cite a sandshot as "having a hand in each of the four major championships I've won."

In 1970, the tiny South African added the Greater Greensboro Open to the list of tournament victories in which a sand shot figured prominently.

Player holed out a 40-foot shot from a bunker for an eagle three on the sixth hole of the final round. It sent him surging to victory.

"I take pride in my ability to consistently get down in two after I find myself in the sand," said Player. "It's an acquired skill, not a natural one. I practice by going into a bunker and not leaving until I've holed five shots."

Player's dedicated practicing does not stop at golf courses on the Tour. And, he did not rest on his Greensboro laurels for long. Last Fall, while Player was at home, he practiced sand shots in an unusual locale.

"We had a new house built at Honey-View, which is just outside Johannesburg," he said, "and naturally there was a lot of building sand available. I spent a lot of time there and I took advantage of the sand and hit plenty of shots from it."

Player practices regularly, all year round. His motto is: "The harder you practice, the luckier you get."

Practice pays off big for Player when he visits this country to join the Tour. In 1970 Player entered 17 tournaments and won money in 15. Finishing in the top ten eight times, Gary won \$101,212. It was his second consecutive year in the \$100,000 bracket.

One of four men to sweep all the world's major golf titles, Player has patterned his swing and his game after Ben Hogan, another of the championship titleholders.



"Ben Hogan was my hero when I was a kid," Player said. "Though I never saw him in person, I tried to swing like the pictures I saw of him."

Later, when Gary was on the Tour, he learned there was more to the game than just a stylish swing and he tried to think like Hogan, too.

"He must have greater knowledge of the game than anyone who ever played," Gary said, "and I still think he has one of the greatest swings."

Player often waxes philosophical about the game and his thoughts some times sound like epigrams:

"When you're playing golf for fun," Gary said, "it's fun. But when you're playing for money, golf is a game of sorrows. You always think you can do better."

"At the end of a tournament there's only one man who is happy. Everyone else is unhappy."

In the PGA Championship at Tulsa, Player recalled that he scored a 70 in the third round "and played lousy." In the final round he carded a 74 and called it "the best round I've played in my last five tournaments."

Then he added: "I've always said golf is the most difficult sport to play, and now I'm absolutely convinced of that."

Yet the physical fitness buff has compiled an outstanding record that includes victories in the 1961 Masters, 1962 PGA Championship, 1965 United States Open and the 1959 and 1968 British Opens. And, in 1970, he won the Australian Open for the sixth time.

When Phil Rodgers joined the Tour in July, 1961, he made one of the fastest starts in the history of the circuit.

Through the end of 1962 Phil won three tournaments, placed among the top five in six others -- including a tie for second in the U. S. Open -- and he won nearly \$50,000.

It would be almost impossible for anyone to top that opening act, and, expectedly, Phil cooled off. The candid Rodgers now describes his career as "a series of ups and downs."

The 1970 season would fit somewhere in the middle of that one-line description. Up, by a small margin, was Rodgers' winnings over 1969. He won \$38,182 in 1970 to \$32,203 in the previous year.

Among his four finishes in the top ten were three sixth-place positions and a tie for seventh in the Kaiser International. He played in 35 tournaments and won money in 23. In the Exemption Point System standings, Phil earned 779 points to place 53rd on the list to gain the exempt status from qualifying in 1971 Tour events.

To the disappointment of many golf fans, Rodgers has not fulfilled the promise that he showed in his early years. In recent years, Phil has been able to trace his problems to a handshake he received in 1967. It came during the Westchester Classic week, and Phil will never forget one golf fan. He said:

"Now I think of him being like a killer. He put one of those crunchers on me. Ouch!"

Rodgers suffered a bruised tendon, 10 weeks of inactivity and who knows how much money?

It was no comfort for Phil to recall that the year before he had a spell of tendonitis in his left hand and had to leave the Tour for a rest. Though Rodgers' right hand eventually healed, he remembers the incident as the start of his skid.

Rodgers took other steps to brake the decline. He recalled:

"I made a pact with myself not to drink on the Tour. I had taken a look at the winners and got the message. Gene Littler doesn't drink. Neither does Billy Casper, or Jack Nicklaus or Gary Player. And they're the guys winning the money."

Phil also went on a diet and lost 12 pounds. In earlier years Rodgers had been troubled with gout and cured it with a careful diet. He also lost weight then.

Rodgers played in his first golf tournament when he was a boy of 10. He won the International Jaycee Junior Championship in 1955. He was a quarter-finalist in the 1957 U. S. Amateur.

He attended the University of Houston for two years and played one season of varsity golf. That year he won the NCAA individual Championship and led Houston to the team title.

He left college and spent two years in the Marines. Phil is a bachelor.

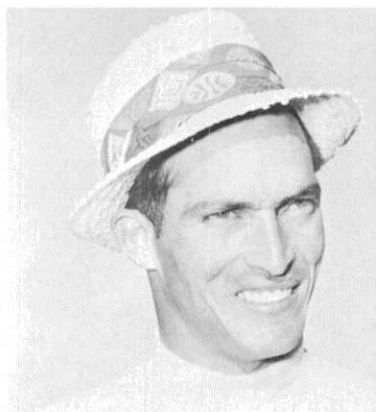

Juan (Chi Chi) Rodriguez is looking ahead to perhaps 15 years on continued top-flight tournament play, but he hopes he doesn't experience any more years like 1970. It was a year of paradoxes.

"I missed the cut in nine tournaments by one stroke," he recalled, "and I had to withdraw from two other tournaments. In everyone I was suffering with my arms.

"My arms were painful more days than they were sound," he went on, "and it's a wonder I was able to play as well as I did. I made over \$50,000, and so I have to say it was a good year that way."

It was the third consecutive year that Chi Chi won more than \$50,000, and it was the fourth consecutive year that the smiling Puerto Rican suffered from "tennis elbows."

Often during the 1970 season, Rodriguez's arms swelled up and were more painful than usual. Physicians recommended an operation on both elbows but Chi Chi was not anxious for surgery because he felt his playing career might be in jeopardy.

Finally, Rodriguez agreed to a date with a New York surgeon and on Nov. 3, 1970, calcium chips were removed from his left elbow. At the same time, the doctors made another correction. Chi Chi said: "They made a zig-zag cut just above my wrist and then straightened out a tendon that ran clear back up my arm to the elbow."

Almost immediately, Chi Chi said, the pain was gone. Moreover, he said the pain also was gone from his right arm.

"The doctors think I might have put extra stress on my right arm while favoring the left," he said. "I guess there's something to that, but we'll have to see."

Early in December Chi Chi visited his New York doctor and a growth was removed from the palm side of his left thumb.

Rodriguez's physical woes did not change his cheerful outlook on life. In recent years he has curbed his impulsive antics on the course, but he still enjoys talking to the galleries.

After a good shot he'll turn toward the fans and with a poker face say, "If I keep playing this way, I'm going to turn pro."

Or, if he misses any makeable putt, he's likely to say: "I'm playing like Tarzan, but scoring like Jane."

He jokes about his size: "You should have seen how little I was as a kid. I was so small that I got my start in golf as a ball marker."

Or: "When I joined the Army, they didn't know what to do with me. They finally used me to clean out the barrels of the howitzers."

In the Fall of 1970, Chi Chi turned 35 and he said to friends: "I'm 35 all right, but you can give me a newspaper 29 if you want."

Chi Chi battled his way out of poverty in Puerto Rico by way of the caddie ranks and then the U. S. Army. He is serious about the game, and about his goals in life:

"I want to be the best golfer in the world. I figure it's time to do something with my life. Playing golf is the most wonderful way in the world to make a living. I'm grateful to the game for all it has given me, and I want to put something back into it."

There is hardly a day when Hugh Royer doesn't telephone his wife, Carol, when he is on the Tour. But, on June 14, 1970, Carol called Hugh because she was sure he could not find time.

That was the day Hugh Royer won the Western Open. After more than three years of struggling on the Tour, Hugh won his first event, the prestigious Western Open. With a one-stroke victory over Dale Douglass, he became a tournament winner and a player exempt from pre-tournament qualifying.

For a non-exempt player, there can be no greater satisfaction than to escape that Monday ordeal. Hugh said:

"When I first came on the Tour in 1966, my goal was to make the top 60 money-winners. I've tried hard, but this is the first year I'm going to make it."

What importance is there to exempt status?

"For me," answered Royer, "it makes it a lot easier to play. I'm not near as scared to play now as I used to be. I'm not afraid to hit for the flags."

Until Royer emerged with his Western Open title at Beverly Country Club in south Chicago, there was no reason to believe that he was to become a winner. He first tried the Tour sparingly and unsuccessfully in 1959.

In 1966 he returned as a regular and from that time until mid-1970 he could



claim a third -- in the 1967 Sahara Invitational -- as his best finish. Even then, he was six strokes off Jack Nicklaus' winning pace.

Nevertheless, Royer was equal to the task when victory finally beckoned. Perhaps his athletic background was helpful.

Born in Eastman, Ga., a small town in south-central Georgia, Royer was interested in all sports as a boy and particularly basketball. He was given a basketball scholarship to the University of Georgia, but he soon discovered that at 175 pounds, he was "too small for basketball." Golf became his primary interest. Hugh lettered in basketball in his junior year and lettered in golf three years.

As a youth, he had won the club championship at Columbus Country Club and while at Georgia he won the Southern Amateur and the Georgia State Amateur. He recalls that he started to play golf when he was about 13. He added: "But at that time I still liked basketball best."

After graduating from Georgia in 1958 with a physical education degree, Royer turned professional. After his brief fling on the 1959 Tour, Hugh returned to Georgia and served as professional at Callaway Gardens for more than five years. He now represents Green Island Country Club, at Columbus, venue of the Green Island Open.

Royer finished in the top ten twice in 1970, including his Western Open victory. He tied for fourth in the Azalea Open. He played in 36 tournaments during the year and won money in 30. Hugh placed 37th in the Exemption Point Standing with 856.3 points.

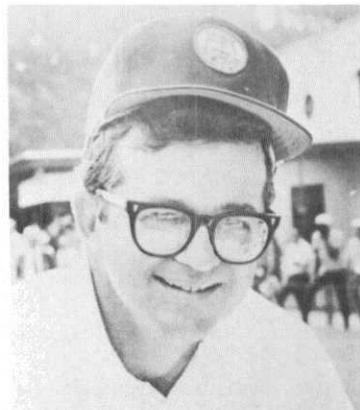

The 1970 Green Island Open was played at the Green Island Country Club in Columbus, Ga., but it ended like the setting were a Hollywood film stage.

Chris Blocker, a big, blond belter, appeared headed for his first Tour victory. He had a four-shot lead with only seven holes to play. But Blocker fell into errors and he began losing strokes.

Making a run for first place, meanwhile, was veteran Mason Rudolph. He hadn't won for years and was nearly a forgotten man. Rudolph's game got stronger as Blocker's faded, and Mason knocked in short birdie putts on the last two holes to win.

Rudolph, who had opened the tournament with a 74, closed with a six-under 64. Dramatic and exciting stuff, indeed, but to give it the Hollywood touch, the day, Sept. 27, turned out to be Mason and Carol Rudolph's 12th wedding anniversary -- and the purse was \$12,000!

Carol was nearby when Mason received the check and the winner handed it to her promptly, saying: "Honey, here's some spending money ... \$1,000 for each year."

Rudolph's anniversary victory was an endearing gift for his wife, but it also gave him exemption from qualifying in 1971 tournaments.

"For two years," said Rudolph, "I've suffered from poor putting. Now I think I have a stroke that will hold up under water ... hot water."

"I've listened to a lot of people about my putting, but I paid attention to only three ... Jack Burke, George Low and Phil Rodgers. Phil gave me a tip that enables me to get the putter head through the ball."

For the year, Mason played in 32 tournaments and won money in 25. In addition to his Green Island victory, he finished in the top ten four other times. He shared sixth place in two other Fall events, the Robinson Open and the Azalea Open. He placed ninth in the Heritage Classic.

His winnings of \$46,215 made 1970 the best year for Mason since 1964 when he collected \$52,568.

Mason's anniversary victory was not his first -- that came in 1959 when Rudolph captured the Golden Gate Open. It was only his 14th start as a professional and it was his first tournament victory. He was named Golf Digest's "Rookie of the Year" after the 1959 season.

In the 1963 to 1965 seasons, he had a streak of 52 straight tournaments in which he won money.

Rudolph is a former Tennessee Amateur and United States Junior Champion. He was a member of the 1957 Walker Cup team, and the 1958 Americas Cup team.

Long active in Tour Affairs, Mason was a member of the old Tournament Committee from 1965 through 1967.

For Doug Sanders, 1970 was a Comeback Year. Nobody, except Doug, knows how tough and how hard it was for him to regain the status of a tournament winner.

The year started tough when Sanders was beamed by a golf ball hit by Vice-President Spiro Agnew. The injury was not serious and Doug is among those who recognize that the blow became a stroke of good fortune.

Doug said: "It got me a lot of publicity, and it was that kind that doesn't hurt a bit. Then I became close friends with the Vice-President. I admire him as an individual, even if he does use those dictionary words all the time."

In mid-year, Sanders was on the verge of winning his first major championship -- the British Open at St. Andrews. He missed a 30-inch putt on the 72nd green and that stroke threw him into an 18-hole playoff which Doug eventually lost to Jack Nicklaus.

"It was the most expensive putt ever missed by anyone," said Sanders. "I figure that putt cost me over a million dollars."

Never one to use conservative estimates, Doug explained that the championship would have been extremely profitable to the "10 or 12" businesses with which he is connected off the Tour.

But what turned an eventful season into a Comeback Year was the Bahama Islands Open, last event on 1970's schedule. Doug scored his first triumph since the 1967 Doral Open at King's Inn Country Club, and he was happy as a rookie knowing that he had earned a year's exemption from qualifying.

Doug's victory came despite a painfully sore left wrist, an occupational hazard for the Tour's walking rainbow.

"I've seen X-rays of my wrist," Sanders explained, "and the doctors showed me how the bones of my wrist would crack together every time I hit a golf shot. I beat down on the ball so hard, it's bound to have some effect."

Never one to worry about anything for long, Doug added: "I don't like to complain about aches and pains, but I wouldn't know what to do if I woke up one morning feeling well."

Although Sanders is widely known for his short backswing, he plays a strong game. His fellow professionals recognize Doug is one of the best finesse players on the Tour.

"I've got the finest hands in golf," said Sanders, "and that's no kidding. I've got the touch of a surgeon with a club. I've got that certain feel that very few golfers have."

"If some of the others on the Tour had my touch, and ever learned to hit a bunker shot and a wedge, they would have won three times as much money."

"Gary Players has the touch. He can finesse the ball. So can Chi Chi Rodriguez, but there aren't many of us with the touch and the tempo to maneuver the ball."

While Doug's hair is strongly flecked with gray, he has not thought about retiring from the Tour.

"I love the life out here," he said. "I love the travel ... the fun ... and even the misery, which I've seen plenty of. I couldn't give it all up."

Move over Lee Trevino and Homero Llanas. Make room for Cesar Sanudo, another Mexican who wins, too.

Until Sanudo won the Azalea Open during the Fall portion of the 1970 schedule, few in golf fans knew Cesar. When his last name was mentioned, many would say: "You mean Ron Cerrudo, don't you."

Cesar Sanudo is a low-key, casual, quiet Mexican. He cracks drives without wisecracks. If Cesar thinks the world is his nachilada, he never mentions it aloud.

"I like to have a good time," said Cesar, of himself, "but I'm just not like Lee Trevino on the golf course. Maybe I ought to have his writer."

Sanudo has a reputation among his fellow professionals as being a steady and reliable player. But Cesar's cool was shattered by the happenings over the closing holes in the Azalea.

Bobby Mitchell held the 54-hole lead and Sanudo was four strokes behind as the final round started. Cesar narrowed the gap and tied Bobby. When Mitchell eagled the 15th hole he moved ahead by two strokes.

But Mitchell three-putted each of the three closing holes and Sanudo's steady play won the tournament by a stroke. Sanudo had put together rounds of 66-68-68-67-269, 3 under par on the Cape Fear Country Club course.

"At first I couldn't believe I won," Sanudo recalled, "and when it finally sunk in, I let out the longest yell you've ever heard!"

The victory yell was a long time coming. Cesar was born in Navajoa, Mexico, several hundred miles south of Arizona. When

he was 12 the family moved to Tijuana and there Cesar discovered golf. The following year the family moved to El Cajon, Calif.

He attended junior college for two years and went to Lamar Tech for a year. Naturally, he played golf at both schools. In 1965 Sanudo finished second in the U. S. Amateur, which was won by Bob Murphy. Cesar won the Mexican Amateur title in 1966.

In the Fall of 1966, Sanudo turned professional to seek Approved Tournament Players status in that year's Qualifying School, but he failed to graduate. Then, as a U. S. citizen, he entered the Army. After 14 months in the service, Corporal Sanudo injured a knee during field maneuvers, and he was offered the choice of an honorable discharge or corrective surgery.

"It didn't hurt all that much," Sanudo recalled, "so there was no doubt about which choice I would take. You know you can't play much golf in the Army ..."

He tried the Spring 1968 Qualifying School, but didn't make it. In the Fall of 1968, Cesar was among the graduating class of the APG School. His first year on the Tour was 1969 and he remembers it in this way: "I didn't have a good year at all."

Until the Azalea Open, Cesar felt about the same way toward his second year on the Tour.

Long after he had won, Sanudo was still so overcome by the implications of his victory that he kept repeating: "I don't have to qualify for a year! I can't believe it, I've got a year's exemption!"

"This must be the same feeling a man would have falling off the Empire State Building ... and landing in a ton of foam."

If John Schroeder had an identity crises, it would be understandable.

When he was graduated from the Spring 1969 Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players, he was known as the son of Ted Schroeder, the 1949 Wimbledon tennis champion and a member of ten Davis Cup teams.

John played well enough in the remainder of 1969 to win \$10,584, but that wasn't good enough to shake himself from the line that always followed his name, "the son of ..."

A Michigan graduate (Class of 1968, business administration major), John concentrated on his game in the early part of 1970. In his first 16 events he was cut or did not qualify for six, and the highest finish he recorded was a tie for 16th at Greensboro.

His 17th event was the Byron Nelson Classic, where, the final two rounds were played on Sunday. For those two rounds, Schroeder was paired with Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus.

"I'd never played with either of them," John said later. And his wife, Kathy, revealed their feelings: "We didn't even talk about the pairing the night before. I was afraid to mention it."

But Schroeder showed no nervousness and shot 69-67-137, actually bettering the scores of the heralded Palmer and Nicklaus, who were in a head-to-head duel for first place. Nicklaus defeated Palmer in "sudden-death" and Schroeder tied for third.

Now John had won identity for himself, right?

"Now," Schroeder said, "golf fans refer to me as the guy who played with Palmer and Nicklaus that day in Dallas."



Schroeder recalls his feelings at the start of "that day in Dallas."

"I thought, 'Here I am, John Schroeder, a nobody in reality with these two giants of the game.'"

John gained the admiration of the fans with his game, and also the plaudits of Palmer and Nicklaus. Palmer said: "John kept his cool when he might have lost it. He should be a very fine player." Nicklaus added: "John kept gradually coming at us. He's tough."

Schroeder admitted that the experience contributed greatly to his confidence and he went on to win \$32,059 for the year. He finished in the top ten in two other events -- a tie for ninth in the Avco Classic and a tie for sixth in the Westchester Classic.

Equally as important as the money to Schroeder, was the fact that he earned 750.8 Exemption Points. That placed him 59th on the list of 60 players who will not have to qualify for Tour events in 1971.

"It's really great to make the top 60," said John. "It's like being a first-stringer. Now I feel that somebody's got to beat me out. Before I had to beat them."

"Now I can plan my year in a more orderly fashion. I can take two weeks off if I think it will help. I believe this kind of program will improve the consistency of my game."

"I played in 30 tournaments in 1970 and that's a lot," he added. "I'd like to play something like 30 to 35 in 1971."

Maybe by the end of 1971 fans will recognize the real John Schroeder.

Dan Sikes had some memorable moments on the Tour in 1970, but, for his liking, the moments were spaced too far apart.

For instance, in the Byron Nelson Classic Dan scored a 67 in the second round to share second place with Arnold Palmer at 37, but tied for sixth as others rushed by in the final round.

In the Avco Classic, Dan opened with a six-under 66 at Pleasant Valley Country Club to lead the event. It was, Dan said, "the best putting round" of his life. At a 74 the next day damaged Sike's hopes and he eventually tied for ninth.

Dan's best finish of the year was in the Atlanta Classic, where he took second, one stroke behind Tommy Aaron's winning 275. Sikes' four rounds there included a 65.

Sikes closed well in the lucrative Dow Jones to finish third (worth \$21,300). He just made the cut, but over the final 36 holes his 67-68 were the lowest scores. A bogey on the 15th hole in the last drop dropped him out of contention for first place.

Dan tried the Tour much later in life than most of the professionals. He attended college, law school and served a stint in the Army before he turned professional in 1960, when he was almost 30 years of age. Sikes retains his membership in the Florida Golf Association, but as the years roll by and the Florida Law School graduate continues to golf in the upper income bracket, the likelihood of Sikes using his legal training becomes more remote.

He says of the Tour vs. the Law as a career: "I just can't earn this much money practicing law. But you never know when I might have to go back to it, so I keep up my membership and my interest."

While an undergraduate at the University of Florida, Sikes played No. 1 position on the golf team. During a tour in the service, he won the 1955 All-Army golf championship. In 1958 Sikes won the National Public Links Championship. He turned pro in 1960.

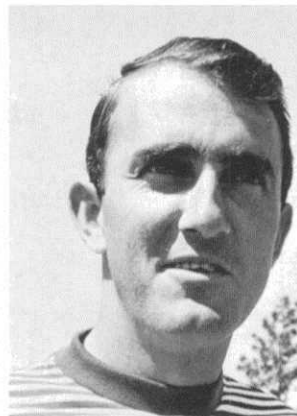
One of the most accurate drivers on the Tour, Sikes is above average in length. His swing is marked by a slow take-away and a pronounced pause at the top.

Sikes says his swing was influenced by his study of Cary Middlecoff's style. In recent years, Dan credits Gardner Dickinson with helping his all-around game.

Like many others on the Tour, Sikes finds his best finishes result from his best putting rounds. When he's putting well, Dan is likely to drawl: "The esteem that I hold for my putter ranks just slightly below the esteem I hold for my wife."

Sikes has long been interested in national PGA affairs. He is a former Chairman of the old PGA Tournament Committee and served on that board from 1965 to 1967. He was a Player-Director on the 1969 TPD Policy Board.

R. H. "Dick" Sikes is widely known in golf as the winner of the 1961 and 1962 U. S. Public Links Championships ... the Putter of the Year for 1962 ... and the Tour "Rookie of the Year" for 1964.

Putting has always been Sikes' forte ... But the soft-speaking Sikes suffered through a slump in 1969 and 1970. Ironically, the culprit was his putting.

"I couldn't keep my putter on track," he says. "It got so I just didn't know where the ball was going."

Sikes won less money in 1970 than he had since 1965. His best finishes came in consecutive tournaments: Ninth in the National Airlines Open; third in the Greensboro Open. They were his only finishes in the top ten.

At Greensboro, Sikes took a damaging 73 in the third round, but he came back with a final 69 to gain third.

Dick picked up a lot of fans among dog lovers there when he explained why he missed the Wednesday Pro-Am. He told how he flew from the National Airlines Open to home and then drove his English bulldog, named Sir Winston, to a clinic in Stillwater, Okla.

Dick explained: "Sir Winston's weight went from 55 to 32 pounds and we had to find out what's wrong with him." Then he added: "I've got to earn some money here

to get him out of the hospital." Dick won \$12,800 in Greensboro.

Dick entered 31 tournaments during the year and won money in 24. Two of the tournaments in which he did not survive the 36-hole cut were the lucrative Westchester Classic and the PGA Championship.

When Sikes won the first of his Public Links titles he attracted more than the ordinary attention because he carried his own golf bag throughout the tournament.

During the next two years while Dick was a student at the University of Arkansas, located only 10 miles south of his home in Springdale, he also won his second Public Links Championship, and the 1963 NCAA Championship. He lost to Deane Beman in the finals of that year's U. S. Amateur Championship, 2 and 1.

Sikes was graduated from Arkansas with a degree in education in 1965. He has three golfing brothers.

Sikes began his professional career shortly after the 1964 Masters. His first money tournament was the Cleveland Open where he started fast and tied for ninth, winning \$2,700.

One of the Cleveland fans who liked the way Sikes played was Art Modell, owner of the football Cleveland Browns. Modell eventually became Sikes' sponsor.

His name is Robert Edwin Smith, although it is usually printed as just Bob Smith.

"A writer suggested to me some time ago," said Smith, "that I should use my middle initial to make me distinctive. There are a lot of Bob Smith's in the world. Usually, I registered as Bob E. Smith."

And, usually, Smith is the first to admit, his name doesn't appear in many other places than on the pairing list and the scoreboard.

But in 1970, Bob E. Smith's name popped up in headlines when he shared the second round lead with Lee Trevino and Roberto de Vincenzo in the Colonial National Invitation Tournament.

It gained Smith his first invitation into a tournament press tent and he enjoyed every minute of it. So did the writers.

Smith revealed that he had switched to putting cross-handed just before the tournament because he had read that Harold Henning was the best putter on the Tour and that he putted cross-handed.

In the Colonial's second round, Smith missed seven greens in regulation strokes but he took bogeys on only two. He saved pars and made birds by taking only 27 putting strokes that day.

At the Fort Worth tournament, Smith also admitted he had a good luck charm -- Jay McCall, 12.

"Kay followed me for 72 holes in 1969," Smith said, "and she came back in 1970 and did the same thing. She's a cute little thing and it was nice of her to encourage me. I'd pull on her pigtailed for luck."

A native and life-long resident of Sacramento, Calif., Smith enlisted in the Army for two years following his graduation from high school. Following his service stint, Smith attended Sacramento State University and was graduated in 1967. He majored in physical education.

Smith turned professional late that year and attended the Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players. The 1967 class was full of young, international stars, yet the unheralded Smith boy finished eighth in the qualifying class of 30.

His career on the Tour has been marked by steady play, and an income in five figures starting in 1968.

"Out here," he said of the Tour, "it's a different game because there are so many really outstanding players. I figure that driving and putting are the best parts of my game, but I know that you've got to get the ball close to the hole to get those chances for birds."

"I usually hit a lot of greens, but then I've had trouble making those putts," he admitted, and added the obvious: "If you can't putt out here, you can't win."

"I was so discouraged with my putting last Spring," he recalled, "that I switched to putting cross-handed,"

In 1970, Smith entered 37 events and won money in 26. His performance added up to \$30,662 in winnings and 772.2 points and that was good enough to gain 55th spot in the Exemption Point Standing list -- and a year's exemption from qualifying in 1971.

Ken Still is anything but still when he's happy. He was overjoyed by winning the 1970 Kaiser International Open and he didn't hesitate to show it.

Ken scored a birdie on the first "sudden-death" hole -- to defeat Lee Trevino and Bert Yancey in the playoff -- and things happened immediately. Ken jumped up and down, kissed his caddie and whistled shrilly. And, as if anyone appeared to doubt his happiness, Ken proved it by launching his cap into orbit.

To understand Ken's emotional outburst, you had to understand the kind of year he had experienced. It started badly in late January. In fact, Ken's year almost ended in late January.

In his motel room after the first round of the Andy Williams-San Diego Open, Ken slipped and fell in the shower. He cracked three ribs. Though painful enough, the accident could have been more serious.

He withdrew from the tournament, of course, and returned home to recuperate. Being sidelined by an injury is not Ken's idea of an enjoyable vacation. He returned to the Tour in early March for the Florida Citrus Invitational, one of the two tournaments he had won in 1969.

"I feel great," he said of his mended ribs. "If they bothered me I wouldn't be here. There's no sense of jeopardizing my career. I'm young enough so that I'm going to play a lot of golf yet."

But Ken didn't play as well as he wanted. He finished 10th in the Tournament of Champions for his highest finish to that date.

In June he placed fifth in the U. S. Open and his confidence soared. Throughout the Summer, however, Still was not playing as well as he wanted.

Going into the Kaiser International, which was played late in October, Ken had won only \$27,110.

But Still's game fell together at the Kaiser and he finished with a 278, ten under par. Since Trevino and Yancey had the same total, the three set out to decide the winner of the \$30,000 first prize.

Still won it with an excellent approach to the first green which left him only a three-foot putt for his bird.

"Part of my success," Still said, "is that I really never gave up on myself. You know how I like sports, and I think like most athletics think. I keep trying. I can't see giving up."

Victory brought Still exempt status from qualifying in 1971 Tour events. He finished the year with winnings of \$57,510, and played in 26 tournaments, winning money in 17. He had five finishes in the top ten.

Still's father, John, wanted his son to be a baseball player. Ken made his high school's baseball team as a third-baseman when he was a sophomore.

When he was 16, an uncle suggested that Ken might be able to earn some money during the Summer as a caddie. He went to nearby Firecrest Golf Club.

"One visit to Firecrest and the flight of the ball got to me," Still recalls. "I fell in love with golf. I never have played baseball again. I guess my dad was heartsick."

Still follows major league baseball avidly, as well as other sports. But his fellow professionals call him "the biggest sports nut on the Tour." ... Ken is a bachelor.

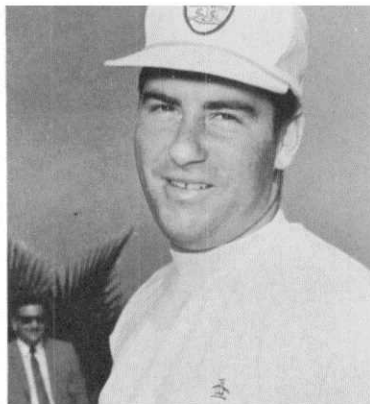

After the 1969 season, Dave Stockton reviewed his personal records -- he keeps detailed notes on how he played each round in each tournament -- and concluded:

"It was fine to win that much money (\$70,707), but I didn't win a tournament. Winning is more important than the money. The challenge is in winning, not in money."

Perhaps because Stockton's name had not been in the headlines as a tournament winner since the 1968 Milwaukee Open, Dave's reputation as a fine, all-around player was not as widely known as it might have been.

At any rate, after he shared the second round lead of the 1970 PGA Championship with Larry Hinson, a Tulsa newspaper headlined the story, "Unknowns Lead PGA."

"I was a little hurt by that," Dave admitted later, "but it gave me something to work for." After the third round, Stockton was the lone leader, and, in a typically tempered wisecrack he said to newsmen: "Make it partially unknown instead of unknown."

After winning the title, Stockton was "known," the press agreed, and Dave was happy with his victory.

"The PGA Championship is a title that puts a golfer's mind at ease," he said, and added: "Now I know I won't have to finish in the top 60 each year to have an exemption into tournaments. I've got an exemption now for 10 years. I think you'll see a lot of me in the next 10 years."

Now that Dave has won his first major title, he can eye the others with more confidence. He said: "I very definitely want to win as many of the big championships as possible. I don't think I'm any different from anybody else on the Tour in that regard."

Typical of his modesty, Dave makes little fuss of his younger years or his family heritage. He is a direct descendant of Richard Stockton, who signed the Declaration of Independence for New Jersey.

As a boy, Dave was well on his way to becoming an all-around athlete but, at 15, he cracked six vertebrae in his back while surfing. That ended his participation in sports for some months. He worked during the Summers while he was in high school in a lumber yard and the experience helped strengthen his back.

When he was 17, Dave started to play golf regularly. His father, Gail, had been a golf professional but went into the sporting goods business and regained his amateur status. He did not push his son into golf.

Dave became an active amateur golfer and eventually won 14 tournaments that his father had once won. And, like his dad, Dave attended Southern California. Dave captained the golf team and gained All-American ranking, just as his father had.

Over the years, Gail Stockton was Dave's only teacher and the younger Stockton is thankful. He has often said: "Everything my Dad has told me has been right."

Bob Stone has enough gray hair to qualify as the Tour's version of Father Time. But don't let appearances fool you.

"I've been gray since I was 19," said the quiet-mannered Stone. And, he's been playing good golf for more years than he has been gray.

A former caddie, Stone enlisted in the Air Force in 1949 after he was graduated from Rayborn High School near Kansas City. In the service, he played more golf. He was an engine mechanic in the Air Force and served in Korea.

After his discharge in 1954, Stone enrolled for a year at the University of Mississippi. But then he accepted the club professional's post at Rockwood Country Club in Independence, Mo. -- the hometown of former President Harry Truman.

"I used to score better in the early Sixties than I do now," said Stone. Among other tournaments he won in those days was the 1963 Oklahoma Open.

Although Stone played occasionally on the Tour over the years, it was not until 1968 that he thought "it would be fun to see if I was good enough to make it on the Tour before I got too old."

Stone, a steady type of golfer, has a drawing board type of game. He said: "I try to follow the same pattern in every round. I want to keep my drives in play and then I try to hit every green. I'll take pars and birdies anytime. I just don't want those bogeys."

His goal each year is relatively modest, too. He said: "I want to get into the top sixty so I won't have to qualify." Stone achieved his goal in 1969.

First, he won the Florida Citrus Open in March. It was the Florida Citrus fruit growers' first satellite tournament and offered a \$5,000 first prize. The young gray fox from Independence won it by four strokes.

Stone's victory comments revealed his true goal, again: "I'm going to keep playing on the Tour this year until I get in the top 60."

Stone finished out the year by playing in 36 events and winning money in 30. His \$36,087 tripled his 1969 winnings and he earned 847.7 points. That was good enough for 38th position in the Exemption Point Standings.

Stone has something else in common with many of the players on the Tour -- he loves to fish. He's a winner in this sport, too.

The Greater Greensboro Open conducts a sidebar tournament for players each year called the GGO Fishing Tournament.

It is held on a nearby lake and in 1970 Stone won it. In addition to a slew of fish, he won a fishing boat, motor and trailer; rod, reel and tackle box and a year's supply of lures.

For the final round of the 1970 Houston/Champions International, there was a pairing that had the galleries buzzing with anticipation because the players were direct opposites: Lee Trevino and Ben Hogan.

It was the first time that the Merry Mexican had been paired with the Hawk. Each scored a 70 for identical totals of 287.

Just as the pairing attracted a huge following on the course, there was a crowd of writers waiting for the players to finish. Everyone wanted to hear what Hogan would say about Trevino.

Hogan was his usual forthright self in answering a question about Trevino: "Trevino can play. He knows what he's doing out there. He maneuvers the ball well. He makes few mistakes. He's an excellent player."

That was early May and Hogan's words later proved to be prophetic as Trevino went on to record his most successful years on the Tour.

Trevino won the Tucson Open and the National Airlines Open and finished in the top ten in 12 tournaments.

More important, he scored a "statistical slam": He was the year's leading money-winner with \$157,037; he was the year's leader in the Exemption Point Standings with 1,533.1; he won the coveted Vardon Trophy, awarded for attaining the year's lowest scoring average on the Tour.

In Vardon Trophy events, Trevino played 109 rounds in 7,700 strokes for an average of 70.642 strokes. Over-all on the Tour, Lee played 118 rounds in 8,345 strokes for an average of 70.720.

Trevino is happy-go-lucky but there's a serious streak to the former

Marine who lived through hard times as a youngster. He knows the value of a dollar.

"I've set up a lifetime goal for myself in golf," explained Trevino. "I would like to make a million dollars on the Tour before I'm through. If the good Lord stays with me, I think I can do it."

"If I can keep my game, and if purses continue to go up as they have the last few years, I should get there."

"Maybe six or seven guys will be over a million by the time I reach it, but that's still real exclusive company."

At the end of 1970, Trevino had amassed \$413,414 in winnings. This is a tremendous achievement, since Lee's career started as recently as 1966 - and he won only \$600 that year!

Trevino is one of the most candid players on the Tour, a trait which has endeared him to galleries as well as writers. He wise-cracks his way around the course.

"I love to see people laugh," he said, "because it makes me feel good. Being on the Tour is real fun for me and I hope I can pass on some of the enjoyment to the people who come out and watch us."

He has a philosophy that enables him to shrug off the problems of constant travel:

"I don't complain about all the traveling we must do, or about the bad food, or of being interviewed, or the laundry being late. I love to travel, and no matter how bad the food may be, I've eaten worse. I love being interviewed, and I don't give a hoot about the laundry. I can remember when I had only one shirt!"

Tom Weiskopf compiled the best scoring average on the Tour in 1970 -- 70.643 strokes. Tom achieved this leading stroke average by playing 87 rounds in 6,146 strokes.

Because Tom did not become a member of the PGA of America until Sept. 30, 1970, his scoring record before that date was not included in the Vardon Trophy race computation. The Vardon Trophy competition is limited to PGA members.

Tom was among the leaders in two other Tour statistical categories in 1970: 1) He finished in the top five places in eight events, just one less than the co-leaders, Larry Hinson and Lee Trevino; 2) He finished in the top ten places in 12 events and was co-leader with Homero Blancas.

Unhappily, Tom has not won a tournament since 1968 and he knows the reason: "If I could putt a little, I could beat anyone playing the game today." Many of his fellow professionals agree.

After Tom tied for second in the Avco Classic, he said: "Golf on the Tour is a game of putting. I only made two putts of over 12 feet in 72 holes. When you don't putt, you don't score well. And when you don't score well, you don't win."

Winning isn't everything to Weiskopf. He explained: "Everybody wants to be a winner, but more than that, I want to hit good golf shots. When I get angry, it's not with anyone but myself. And that's usually because I didn't hit the shot the way I wanted."

Weiskopf feels he now controls his temper more than he did when he first joined the Tour. He recalled: "I used to try so

hard that it would just eat me up inside when I'd miss a shot.

"Now I feel that I've achieved a certain maturity, or some sort of settlement with myself. Now when I hit a bad shot I just forget it. I concentrate on hitting the next shot."

When the rangy Weiskopf first joined the Tour he felt he wanted to win every major tournament every year. He added: "I wanted to win everytime I teed it up. Now I just want to win a tournament and then I'll start aiming at another. I still try to win every time I tee it up, but now I realize that it can't be done and I accept it."

Weiskopf does not care where fans rate him in today's galaxy of golfers. He said: "If I'm not a super star, it doesn't matter to me. I'm not really sure that I want it. I don't want to be a Ben Hogan. I wouldn't be willing to work as hard as he did even if I knew I could achieve what he did."

"The main thing is to be happy, and my wife and I are very happy. Being a star like Jack Nicklaus or Arnold Palmer would create problems. I don't want that kind of adulation."

After attending Ohio State for two years and winning the 1963 Western Amateur championship, Weiskopf joined the Tour in 1964. He suffered through a siege of stomach disorders early in his career but has overcome that illness.

Tom is married to the former Jeannie Ruth, a onetime Miss Minnesota beauty queen. When off the Tour, Weiskopf enjoys hunting and fishing -- and watching other sports.

Larry Wood made headlines twice in 1970 -- once because of "Her" and again by winning the Sea Pines Open, the Heritage Golf Classic's satellite.

Wood would rather talk about his golf than "Her" ... because "Her" is the family dog.

"Winning at Sea Pines really helped my confidence," said the husky Wood, who registers out of a golf club in Boone, N. C. "It's hard to believe that you can win out here until you actually do.

"Even though the Sea Pines was not considered a major tournament on the schedule, it is still a win. Now I know that when I get into the same position again, I won't be afraid to win."

Wood came out of the pack in the final round of the Sea Pines with a late spurt. He scored five birds in a seven-hole span and left the field behind by two strokes.

"Now I have a goal for 1971," said Wood, who is one of the few golfers on the Tour who wears his hair crewcut. "I want to win another tournament, or, if I can't win, then I want to finish in the year's top 60. I want to avoid those Monday qualifying nightmares."

Although Wood joined the Tour in the early part of 1970, he is familiar with the qualifying routine. He has been a professional since 1962 and played the Tour with some frequency after 1965 while remaining a club professional. His best finish in those years was a tie for fifth in the 1968 Azalea Open.

Wood decided to give the Tour a fling last year on his own. He does not have a sponsor.



"I think it is better that way," he said. "If you make it on your own, all you earn is all yours. If you don't make it, well, things can be tight and it's easy to get into a financial bind."

When Wood joined the Tour he brought along his wife, Gloria, and "Her."

"Her" is a three-year-old mongrel dog that the Woods adopted sometime ago. She was dropped off at a Knoxville club where Larry was the professional and Mrs. Wood said they couldn't think of any name to call the dog but "Her."

"Her" and Larry hit the Atlanta papers -- headlines, picture and a story -- because "Her" has the ability to shag short shots.

"She's just great around a chip-ping green," said Larry, "because she saves me a lot of steps."

"Everybody on the Tour knows her," said Mrs. Wood, "and a lot of the Players get 'Her' to shag for them."

Wood is a self-taught golfer who just grew into the game as a boy. He remembers that he started to play when he was 14 and by the time he was 16 he won his club championship. He repeated his victory in the two years following. After his third straight victory, Larry's fellow club members permanently retired him from the competition to give someone else a chance!

He was graduated from the University of Southern Illinois in 1960 and was captain of the golf team that year and also was recipient of the school's most coveted award.

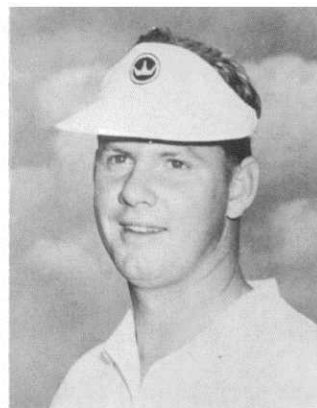

It may come as a surprise to many amateur golfers, but the biggest problems faced on the Tour are not of a mechanical nature, according to Bert Yancey.

"Trying to stay mentally ready for every tournament," said Bert, "is my toughest problem. I feel that you must be up for every hole and for every round. Trying to cope with the ups and downs of golf on the Tour is sometimes unreal.

"I've tried as hard as I can to play consistently well, but I can't do it. I really respect those who can do it well week after week.

"Physical strength is one thing that helps the top players," Bert said, "but it's not the whole picture. You have to have determination and drive. And you must be able to maintain your concentration.

"I believe that a player's mental attitude accounts for at least 90 percent of his success on the Tour. I think most of us are well matched mechanically. But it's our individual attitudes that make the difference on the course."

Yancey's mental attitude played a major role in his 1970 victory in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am. He went into the final round holding the lead, and heard that Jack Nicklaus had started fast - with a bird on the first and an eagle on the second.

"I asked my caddie to make sure I didn't know what Jack was shooting until I got to the 18th tee," Yancey recalled. There were no leader boards to Yancey to spot and so he played his own game.

He finished with a three-under 69 for a 278. Nicklaus shot a seven-under 65 and took second with a 279.

"If I had known what Jack was doing out there," Bert said, "it might have

been different for me. If I had known about that 65, I might have taken the big apple."

But Yancey didn't choke, and he scored his sixth Tour victory in his seventh year on the trail. He still remembers clearly that morning: "I felt this was going to be my day. Certain days you wake up and just feel great and know things will go right."

Bert points for winning certain tournaments -- the Masters and the United States Open Championship. Since his boyhood days in Tallahassee, Fla., the Masters has been something special to Bert. The Open is in the same category, Bert feels, because it is the national title.

Yancey is an avid bridge and chess player, games which he believes helps keep him alert for the Tour. And he is such a student of the swing that he is conducting an exhaustive research program in preparation for writing a book.

A dedicated perfectionist, Yancey has long been recognized as the possessor of a classic golf swing. It is modeled after the late Tony Lema's swing, Bert has noted, with important contributions by Bert's brother, Jim.

Golf fans watching Yancey's upright, rhythmic swing often forget that he is one of the Tour's most talented putters. In winning the 1966 Portland Open, Yancey used only 102 putts. During a period in 1968, Yancey played 305 tournament holes without three-putting.

The onetime West Pointer advises amateurs on putting:

"Develop a positive attitude on the greens. How? By regular putting practice so that you build complete faith in your stroke. Then apply what you've practiced to your game on the course."

Is there such a thing as an omen or a feeling of a coming victory on the Tour? Not if Mrs. Kermit Zarley is typical of a professional's wife.

Kermit left his family at a motel on the morning of the final round of the 1970 Canadian Open. Marilyn Zarley took the couple's two children to church and then went back to the motel to await her husband's return.

"I took a nap with the children and was sound asleep when a friend called to tell me Kermit was leading the tournament," said Mrs. Zarley. "I couldn't believe it! I didn't think he was in contention."

When the final round started, Kermit was four strokes off the lead, and, as the third round leaders faltered, Zarley shot a five-under 67. He won and his family was at the course to see him finish.

Zarley's previous Tour victory, the Kaiser International in 1968, was also made with a come-from-behind finish. Kermit said: "I gave it the Silky Sullivan finish both times."

Though he was an outstanding amateur golfer and has been a regular on the Tour seven years, Zarley is remembered more for his name than his game. Bob Hope made Kermit's name famous.

When Zarley was introduced to Hope during a telecast of the comedian's Palm Desert Classic some years ago, Bob quipped: "Kermit Zarley ... with a name like that it sounds like he's the pro from the moon."

Zarley has learned to live with Hope's wisecrack and has added to the stories about his name:

"I've always wanted to meet Billy Graham," said Zarley, who is a regular member of the Tour's Tuesday night Bible study group, "and about two years ago I finally met him. Three times during our conversation he called me 'Zermit.'"

Kermit learned the game of golf from his father, who also taught the tow-headed youth valuable lessons of life.

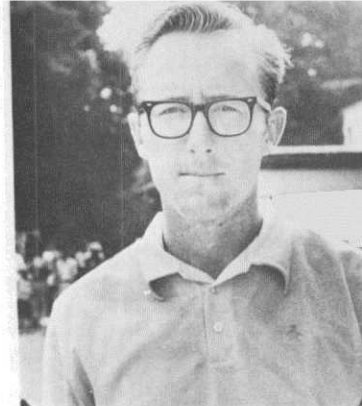
"My parents have always been in the restaurant business," he said. "In 1949 my dad opened a charcoal broil next to a public course in Seattle. I did a lot of caddying there and started to play there, too."

"At the same time, I worked in the restaurant. My dad said the best medicine for his children was to keep them working. I scrubbed the floors and washed dishes as a boy. When I was 16, he moved me into the kitchen and I made up salads and some other little things. The next year I took over some of the cooking."

"As I grew older he gave me more responsibility. He always believed in the philosophy that you don't get anything out of this world without working."

Kermit attended the University of Houston and won the NCAA golf championship in 1962. He turned professional in 1963.

Zarley entered 32 tournaments in 1970 and collected money in 22. He finished in the top ten twice -- first in Canada and tied for seventh in the San Antonio Open.

After 72 holes of play, Larry Ziegler was ahead of the field by two strokes with a 17-under 271. The tournament winner, right? Wrong! This was the 1970 Bob Hope Desert Classic, and that's a 90-hole event.

In the final round Bruce Devlin closed with 66 to win with 339. Ziegler took a 72 for 343 and second place.

"Any other week," said Devlin, "and Larry would have won. He led for four rounds and that's all we normally play."

Ziegler answered: "After leading for four days, I'll admit that it's easier to come from behind. That's not to take anything away from Bruce because he simply played the fifth round better than I did."

"I knew the tournament was 90 holes when it began," added Ziegler, "and it's only the results of 90 holes that count. I'm not ashamed. I didn't give it away."

"I played exceptionally well and if I had made some putts early in that final round, I think it would have ended different."

Ziegler is used to tough luck. After all, he was the winner of the 1969 Michigan Classic, when, for the first time in Tour history a sponsor was unable to pay the players. Eventually, the TPD payed the entire purse from its general funds, but for a while it seemed that Ziegler was the first "amateur" to win on the Tour in years.

The big, blond belter from St. Louis is used to the hard way of life. He

was one of seven brothers and six sisters and his father was not well-heeled. Most of the Ziegler boys quickly learned that the way to get spending money was to caddie. Larry took to the job and fell in love with the game.

After he was graduated from a St. Louis high school, Larry went into the Army reserves and served six months on active duty and 5 1/2 years on the ready. He was associated with golf clubs in the St. Louis area before he found a sponsor. He has been out on the Tour since 1966.

Although he did not win in 1970, Ziegler earned \$52,727. It was just under his best year, 1969, when he won \$59,804. Larry finished in the top ten in six events during 1970 and won money in 26 tournaments. He entered 39.

Ziegler's play also earned him 804 Exemption Points and 47th position on the list of 60 players who do not have to qualify for Tour events.

Larry is known as one of the Tour's longest hitters, ranking with Jack Nicklaus and Martin Roesink. He is also appreciated by other players for his sense of humor.

Off the Tour, Ziegler is interested in stock car auto racing and the St. Louis Blues hockey team. He has a Blues' emblem on his golf bag and often serves as the Blues' stick boy during the season. He has made many road trips with the team.

A total of 250 applications were accepted for the 1970 School. District Tryouts were held at nine sites to determine 60 qualifiers for the School proper. Tryouts were at 54 holes. Sixty attended the School and participated in the classroom sessions and the 72-hole tournament to determine 18 graduates to the Tour.

SUMMARY OF ALL PREVIOUS ATP QUALIFYING SCHOOLS

Fall 1965 -- Forty-nine were accepted to the PGA's first school and 17 were graduated to the Tour. John Schlee was leading qualifier with a score of 583 for 144 holes.

Fall 1966 -- Class included 99 men and 32 were graduated. Harry Toscano was low qualifier with 572 for 144 holes.

Fall 1967 -- A class of 111, including several international stars, attended School. Thirty were graduated and Bobby Cole, of South Africa, was No. 1 graduate. He scored 572 over eight rounds.

Spring 1968 -- Eighty-one were accepted and 15 were graduated. Bob Dickson led the graduates with 569 for 144 holes.

Fall 1968 -- Seventy-nine attended the School and 30 were graduated. Grier Jones was leading qualifier with 571 for 144 holes. The American Professional Golfers also held a School and graduated 21, headed by Martin Roesink with 585 for 144 holes.

Spring 1969 -- Enrollment was 91 and 15 were graduated to the Tour after a 72-hole tournament. Bob Eastwood was low qualifier with 291.

Fall 1969 -- For the first time, a system of District Tryouts at 54 holes was instituted. A total of 182 applications were accepted and 48 qualified for the School proper at the Tryouts. Twelve were graduated to the Tour with Doug Olson being low, at 286, in the School's 72-hole tournament.

EXEMPTION POINT SYSTEM FOR 1971

The Exemption Point System for 1971 is based on the money-winnings for each player in most 72-hole tournaments. The exceptions are the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, the Bob Hope Desert Classic, the National Team Championship and events on the Caribbean Tour.

The System was devised and approved by the TPD Tournament Policy Board. It will help to determine certain tournament playing privileges for the 1972 season.

Purses won in Pro-Amateur events and in tournaments of less than 72 holes are not included for computation in the Exemption Point System.

However, winnings from all co-sponsored and approved tournaments and their Pro-Ams are included in a player's money-winning total.

CHANGE IN EXEMPTIONS FOR PGA AND UNITED STATES OPEN CHAMPIONS

Winners of the PGA and the United States Open Championships are now eligible for ten years of exemption from qualifying in open invitational events co-sponsored by the PGA Tournament Players Division.

This decision by the TPD Tournament Policy Board will not affect the unlimited exemption of PGA and Open Champions prior to 1970.

Champions prior to 1970 will now receive exemptions in two categories, as follows:

1. Those who have entered at least 15 TPD tournaments in the last calendar year will be included in the basic field of 144 players in open invitationals.
2. For those who have not played in 15 events in the last calendar year, places will be added to the usual field of 144.

IN 1969 THE AWARD WAS MADE BY A VOTE OF THE PGA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. THE WINNER RECEIVES A PLAQUE AT THE PRESIDENT'S DINNER DURING THE PGA ANNUAL MEETING.

THE VARDON TROPHY

THE PGA VARDON TROPHY, NAMED IN HONOR OF THE INTERNATIONALLY FAMOUS BRITISH GOLFER, HARRY VARDON, WAS PLACED IN COMPETITION AMONG AMERICAN PROFESSIONALS IN 1937 AS A SUCCESSOR TO THE HARRY E. RADIX TROPHY, WHICH, PRIOR TO THAT TIME, HAD BEEN AWARDED ANNUALLY TO THE PROFESSIONAL HAVING THE FINEST TOURNAMENT RECORD IN COMPETITIVE PLAY IN THIS COUNTRY.

TODAY, THE VARDON TROPHY, A BRONZE COLORED PLAQUE MEASURING 39" X 27" IS AWARDED EACH YEAR TO THE MEMBER OF THE PGA OF AMERICA MAINTAINING THE FINEST PLAYING AVERAGE IN THOSE EVENTS CO-SPONSORED OR SO DESIGNATED BY THE PGA IN EACH SUCH PERIOD.

HOWEVER, SINCE THE CONCLUSION OF THE WAR, NOT ALL EVENTS ON THE PGA TOUR ARE CREDITED TOWARD THIS AWARD. IN THIS CONNECTION, IN 1947, CERTAIN INVITATIONAL EVENTS WERE EXCLUDED BY PGA TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS IN DETERMINING VARDON AWARD AND RYDER CUP TEAM STANDINGS, AND BEGINNING WITH 1948, THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE PGA ADOPTED A REGULATION WHICH PROVIDES THAT THE FOLLOWING SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED IN COMPUTING VARDON TROPHY SCORING AVERAGES, RYDER CUP TEAM POINTS AND PRIZE MONEY WINNINGS:

- (A) PROFESSIONAL-AMATEUR EVENTS;
- (B) INVITATIONAL EVENTS WITH FEWER THAN THIRTY (30) INVITED PLAYERS;
- (C) TOURNAMENTS WHICH ARE NOT MEDAL PLAY EVENTS;
- (D) ALL EVENTS WHICH ARE NOT PLAYED IN THE CONTINENTAL UNITED STATES, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THE CANADIAN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP; AND
- (E) SECTIONAL OR LOCAL EVENTS WHICH DO NOT CARRY THE MINIMUM PURSE REQUIREMENTS OF THE PGA.

THE TOURNAMENT REGULATIONS OF THE PGA FURTHER PROVIDE THAT, FROM JANUARY 1, 1948, THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 1961, A PLAYER MUST ALSO HAVE PLAYED AT LEAST SIXTY (60) ROUNDS IN ANY ONE YEAR TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE VARDON AWARD IN THAT YEAR AND THAT "PICKING UP" WITHOUT THE ROUND BEING FINISHED WILL AUTOMATICALLY MAKE THE PLAYER SO DOING INELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE THE TROPHY IN THE YEAR IN WHICH SUCH HAPPENING OCCURS.

AS OF JANUARY 1, 1962, THE MINIMUM NUMBER OF OFFICIAL TOURNAMENT ROUNDS REQUIRED FOR CONSIDERATION FOR THE VARDON TROPHY HAS INCREASED TO EIGHTY (80) IN ANY ONE YEAR.

THE VARDON TROPHY HAS NOT ALWAYS BEEN AWARDED ON A BASIS OF SEASONAL PLAYING AVERAGE. FROM 1937 THROUGH 1941, THE WINNER WAS DECIDED ON A POINT BASIS. UNDER THIS SYSTEM, THE LEADING PLAYERS IN EACH EVENT RECEIVED A PRE-DETERMINED NUMBER OF POINTS, AND AT THE END OF THE YEAR, THE PLAYER WITH THE GREATEST NUMBER OF POINTS WAS NAMED THE WINNER.

THE VARDON TROPHY WAS NOT AWARDED FROM 1942 THROUGH 1946, DUE TO THE LIMITATIONS ON COMPETITIVE GOLF CREATED BY THE EXIGENCIES OF WORLD WAR II.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

THE RYDER CUP MATCHES DEVELOPED FROM A MATCH PLAYED BETWEEN REPRESENTATIVES OF THE AMERICAN AND BRITISH PROFESSIONAL GOLFERS' ASSOCIATIONS IN ENGLAND IN 1926. THAT UNOFFICIAL MATCH, INCIDENTALLY, WAS WON BY THE BRITISH 13-1/2 TO 1-1/2.

FOLLOWING THIS HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL EXHIBITION, SAMUEL A. RYDER, A WEALTHY BRITISH SEED MERCHANT, OFFERED TO DONATE A SOLID GOLF TROPHY BEARING HIS NAME TO BE COMPETED FOR IN A SERIES OF MATCHES BETWEEN PROFESSIONALS OF THESE TWO NATIONS.

IN PLACING THE RYDER CUP IN COMPETITION, THE DONOR SET FORTH CERTAIN TERMS WHICH WERE TO BE OBSERVED BY THE PARTIES CONCERNED SO LONG AS THE MATCHES ARE CONDUCTED. INCLUDED AMONG THESE STIPULATIONS ARE THE FOLLOWING:

- (1) THE MATCHES WILL BE PLAYED EVERY OTHER YEAR ON A HOME-AND-HOME BASIS;
- (2) WHILE BOTH PARTIES MUST MUTUALLY AGREE ON THE SPECIFIC DATES FOR EACH MATCH, THE HOST TEAM MAY SELECT THE SITE AND WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR SUCH ARRANGEMENTS AND DETAILS AS ARE NORMALLY THE FUNCTION OF A SPONSORING GROUP;
- (3) THE MATCHES SHALL CONSIST OF TWO DAYS OF PLAY WITH THE FIRST BEING DEVOTED TO FOURSOMES AND THE SECOND TO SINGLES MATCHES;
- (4) EACH MEMBER OF THE COMPETING TEAMS MUST BE A MEMBER OF HIS COUNTRY'S PGA, AND FURTHERMORE, MUST BE A NATIVE BORN CITIZEN OF THAT COUNTRY.

THE MATCHES WERE FIRST OFFICIALLY PLAYED FOR THE RYDER CUP IN 1927 IN THE UNITED STATES. THEY HAVE BEEN HELD CONTINUOUSLY EVERY OTHER YEAR SINCE EXCEPT FOR THE PERIOD FROM 1937 THROUGH 1946 WHEN THE EXIGENCIES OF WORLD WAR II FORCED THEIR SUSPENSION.

FROM 1927 TO DATE, THE UNITED STATES HAS WON EVERY RYDER CUP MATCH PLAYED IN THIS COUNTRY. IT ALSO WON ON BRITISH SOIL IN 1937, 1949, 1953, 1961 AND 1965, TO RUN ITS LIST OF VICTORIES TO 14 IN 18 MATCHES. THE BRITISH WON AT HOME IN 1929, 1933 AND 1957. THE 1969 MATCH IN ENGLAND RESULTED IN THE FIRST TIE OF THE SERIES.

FROM THE START OF THE SERIES THROUGH THE 1959 RYDER CUP MATCHES, THE COMPETITION WAS COMPRISED OF FOUR FOURSOMES MATCHES ONE DAY AND EIGHT SINGLES MATCHES THE OTHER DAY, EACH AT 36 HOLES.

IN 1961, THE FORMAT WAS CHANGED TO PROVIDE FOR FOUR 18-HOLE FOURSOMES THE MORNING OF THE FIRST DAY AND FOUR MORE THAT AFTERNOON, THEN FOR EIGHT 18-HOLE SINGLES THE MORNING OF THE SECOND DAY AND EIGHT MORE THAT AFTERNOON. AS IN THE PAST, ONE POINT WAS AT STAKE IN EACH MATCH, SO THE TOTAL NUMBER OF POINTS WAS DOUBLED.

IN 1963, FOR THE FIRST TIME, A DAY OF FOUR-BALL MATCHES AUGMENTED THE PROGRAM TO ADD NEW INTEREST TO THE OVERALL COMPETITION. THIS BROUGHT THE TOTAL NUMBER OF POINTS TO 32.
