A young Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints a Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer. The Tournament Staff, under the Tournament Director, conducts tournament play. The Executive Staff in New York City performs administrative work.

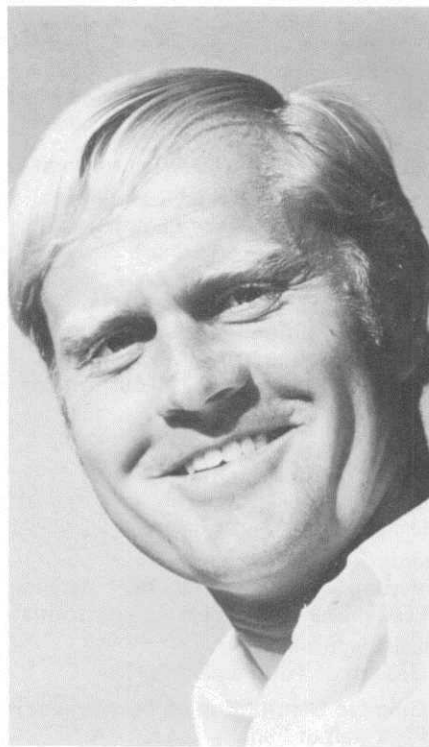

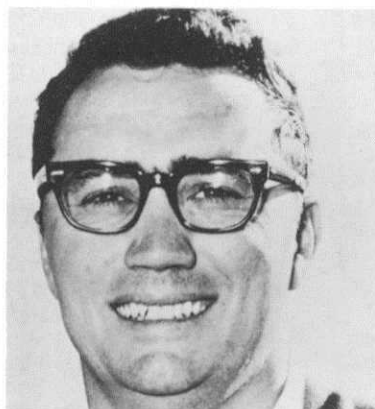

1971 RECAP: Tom Aaron's entire professional career has been one of near-victories, with only one official Tour title to his credit, and 1971 was typical. The smooth-swinging Georgian had no victories and no seconds, but he finished third three times and ended up 30th on the money list with over \$70,000.

In 34 tournaments, Aaron was in the money 29 times and failed to break into the low 25 just 11 times. He was in the top 10 six times, with his best showing being a third in the Kaiser International. He also tied for

third in the Western Open and the Bahamas National Open.

In compiling a stroke average of just over 71, Aaron played 72 rounds of par or better, and he was at his best in the closing round. Of the 29 tournaments which he completed 72 holes, Aaron was par or better the last round 17 times and was under 70 nine times. His best finishing rounds were 66 in the Bahamas and 67 in the Atlanta Classic.

Tom's best round of the year was a 65 in the Phoenix Open, and he had three 66's, proof of his consistent around-par scoring.

PRIOR YEARS: Nine times from his pro debut in 1960, Tommy Aaron was a mere runner-up almost to the point of obsession. Finally in 1969 he came through, beating Sam Snead in a play-off for the Canadian Open. It didn't count as an official win because of a schedule complication. The next year he made it official by winning the Atlanta Classic, only 50 miles from his home.

There is no reason to weep for Aaron,

however. During his 11 years on the circuit he has earned \$509,218.

Aaron, as an amateur, won almost everything they played in Georgia, but the Masters, during the 1950s. He was a member of the 1960 U.S. Walker Cup team.

His only "down" year as a Tourist was 1962 when Tommy spent six months in the Army and won a mere \$9,319.

1971 RECAP: There is an adage on the golf Tour that says "a player must lose before he can win," which means that few men are capable of handling pressure on first exposure. Brian Allin proved to be one of the few.

As a rookie with only 13 weeks of pro tournament experience under his belt, Allin won the 1971 Greater Greensboro Open in a three-sided playoff with Dave Eichelberger and Rod Funseth. A 20-foot putt from the fringe for birdie on the first extra hole

provided the victory, but Allin's courage was more a factor. He appeared out of contention after an opening round of 75, but he bounced back with a seven-under-par 64 and followed with 67-69 to force a tie. That 64 was Allin's best of the year, although he was in the 60s 15 other times.

The Greensboro victory was Allin's only finish in the top 10 during the year, but he did cash checks in 17 other events. A stomach ailment curtailed his play during the second half of the season.

PRIOR YEARS: Brian (Buddy) Allin, who played with Johnny Miller and Mike Reaser on the Brigham Young U., team is a former artillery officer who spent 16 months in Vietnam and was decorated four times. He was able to jump from the service to the Tour because a Santa Barbara businessman decided to back Allin after watching him play in the 1971 Los Angeles Open.

It was a good deal for both. With Allin pocketing \$55,786 in his rookie year, both he and his sponsor shared a substantial profit.

Allin, who graduated from the 1970 Qualifying School, is a modest youngster. In his second start on the tour, at Coral

Springs, Fla., he finished early with a 67 to lead "in the clubhouse." He was asked to go to the press tent for the customary interview. A stewardess there asked him what he wanted. "I just shot 67", he replied, "and was told to come here". The press girl disappeared and then came back and said "No one wants to talk to you". So Allin went about his business.

Allin says an inadvertent left ankle injury suffered in a casual game of tennis really helped his golf. Until then he had been a "fast-foot" swinger. With the sore ankle, he had to get his shoulders more into it, found it really lengthened his game and gave him more confidence.

1971 RECAP: George Archer finished fourth on the 1971 money list, a position which becomes more impressive when you consider that he trailed only Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino and Arnold Palmer.

Archer easily had his best season on the Tour in 1971, winning twice, finishing second three times, third once, and in the top 10 another three times.

George scored his victories in the Andy Williams San Diego Open and the Greater Hartford Open, and each time he did so with a great finish. At San Diego he romped to a

three-shot win on the strength of a last-round 65, seven under par. At Hartford he played the last three rounds each in 66 and then defeated J.C. Snead and Lou Graham with a birdie on the first playoff hole.

Archer's runnerup finishes came in the Monsanto Open, the Sahara Invitational and the Bahamas Open, and at Sahara it was the result of another strong finish — a six-under-par 66. However, he was the third-round leader at the Bahamas, but scored 72 and Bob Goalby overhauled him.

PRIOR YEARS: George Archer probably wields the Tour's best putting blade. At least most of the players rate their greens ability by saying, "I'm almost as good as Archer". At 6' 6", he is also the Tour's tallest player.

George Selva, who formerly ran the San Francisco Lucky International Open, persuaded Archer to hit the trail. He put George up at his ranch in Gilroy, Calif. George mended fences, sprayed against flies and did various other chores. The writers

called George the "Gilroy Cowboy" but he says he never even learned to milk a cow, much less ride a pony.

Archer's first tour victory was the Lucky International at Harding Park, in San Francisco, where he grew up. "They accused me of knowing every blade of grass", George recalls. "That wasn't true. There were a few I didn't."

Since then, he has won eight other Tour events, including the 1969 Masters.

1971 RECAP: Miller Barber put his name in the 1971 record book early in the year and it survived the entire season. Barber won the Phoenix Open with 65-64-67-65—261, 23-under-par and the lowest 72-hole return on Tour since Mike Souchak shot 257 in the 1955 Texas Open.

Barber was at his best during the Winter segment. At one stretch he played 15 consecutive rounds in par or better and, in

addition to winning at Phoenix, he tied for eighth in the Crosby Pro-Am, tied for third at San Diego, was runnerup to Tom Shaw in Hawaii, tied for fourth in the PGA Championship, and was third in the Doral-Eastern Open.

By mid-March Barber had won more than \$80,000 and was the leading money winner. He failed to keep that pace, but by year's end had 10 finishes in the top 10.

PRIOR YEARS: When Miller Barber took his first shot at the Tour it turned out to be a minor disaster. During the period 1959-'62, his winnings nearly reached \$11,000, and Barber knew there had to be an easier road to oblivion.

Saying farewell to the circuit, Miller signed on as an assistant to Jack Patroni at the Apawamis Club in Rye, N.Y. At 31, it appeared he was ready to settle down in a club job and let thoughts of the Tour fade away. Some Apawamis members were so impressed with Barber's shot-making, however, they offered to underwrite another

whirl on the circuit for him. This time, Barber didn't miss.

Tabbed "Mister X" by the lockerroom nicknamers, Barber has been a phenomenal late-bloomer on the Tour. He has won close to \$500,000 in his past five years and has become one of the most consistent performers while remaining one of the least publicized.

A graduate of Arkansas U., and a former lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force, Barber has won six events on the Tour.

He has been a member of the 1969 and 1971 U.S. Ryder Cup teams.

1971 RECAP: Frank Beard once again did what he does best — make money. Although Frank won only once — the Greater New Orleans Open — he recorded enough top 10 finishes to earn over \$100,000 for the fifth consecutive year.

In 31 starts, Beard failed three times to leave a tournament without a check in his pocket and he was in the top 10 eleven times. He tied for second in the Byron

Nelson Classic, tied for third in the Heritage Classic, tied for fourth in the Westchester Classic and was fifth in both the Southern Open and Disney World Open.

Beard's success, like all outstanding golfers, lies in his consistency. After opening with rounds of 80-77 in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, Frank had only three rounds over 75 the rest of the season. He had 37 rounds of 69 or better.

PRIOR YEARS: In 1963, Frank Beard was near death with encephalitis. Since then, he has won 11 tournaments; has led the money winning twice; and has remained comparatively anonymous.

Beard has an elegant, impeccable swing, a magic putter (nine putts in 10 holes in winning the 1970 American Classic) and a canny business-like view of his profession, which he joined in 1962.

Blunt and honest, Beard says, "Tee to

green is half the game, putting the other half". His golf philosophy is "play your own game regardless of what's going on. The key is trying to eliminate mistakes by not losing your equanimity when you do."

Beard is a half-brother of Ralph, onetime Kentucky All-America basketball player. Frank played at Florida U., and won the Kentucky Amateur twice. His Dad is a former golf professional who runs a hardware store in Louisville.

1971 RECAP: For Deane Beman, the 1971 season didn't really get started until Labor Day. That's when he finally got his game into gear and zoomed to 22nd place on the final money list with \$82,747, his best pro season.

In Deane's first 27 tournaments prior to Labor Day, he had made the low 15 only five times and was never better than a tie for 10th place. But in his last 10 appearances, he earned nearly \$50,000 and was never worse than 28th place.

Beman started his move with the Greater Hartford Open, where he tied for fourth on the strength of four successive sub-70 rounds. He then finished second in the Southern Open with 67-66-66 over the last three days, and won the Quad Cities Open, a satellite held opposite the Ryder Cup matches. After four consecutive finishes of 12th to 20th, Beman brought the season to a close with a tie for sixth in the Heritage Classic and was runnerup to Jack Nicklaus in the Disney World Open.

PRIOR YEARS: Deane Beman, one of the great amateur golfers of the past decade, has confounded many observers with his performance on the Tour. Initially, he surprised most of them by signing on with the professionals in 1967, after it appeared that he would remain in the ranks of the dedicated amateurs. Secondly, while a short hitter, he has developed into one of the most consistent money-winners on the circuit.

Beman's glittering pre-Tour record included the 1960 and 1963 U.S. Amateur championships, the 1959 British Amateur crown, plus membership on five U.S. Walker Cup teams, four U.S. World Amateur teams,

and four U.S. Americas Cup squads. Nevertheless, there was some skepticism over Deane's ability to pit his kind of game against the Tour's power players.

When Deane departed from his Washington, D.C. insurance business in 1967, he enrolled in the Qualifying School to earn his playing credentials and became a prominent part of the most famous of all rookie classes. The roster included Tony Jacklin, Orville Moody, Bob Murphy, Lee Elder, among others.

Since joining the Tour, Beman has won \$235,599 in five years, including three Tour victories.

1971 RECAP: Homero Blancas was not particularly pleased with 1971, not because he failed to win a tournament, but because he failed to record enough high finishes to meet his monetary goal of \$75,000.

Blancas considers himself too inconsistent to be a frequent winner on Tour, and his performance record indicates he is correct in his self appraisal. Of the eight tournaments in which he finished in the top 10, only once did he play all four rounds in par or better.

This factor limited his finishes in the top five to one — a tie for fourth in the Phoenix Open.

Nonetheless, Blancas maintained his position among the top money winners on Tour. He failed to complete 72 holes in only four of 32 tournaments entered, and in those four he made either pro-amateur money or some special check.

Blancas' best round of the year was a 63 in the Phoenix Open.

PRIOR YEARS: Homero Blancas has a long list of accomplishments in golf, but the one that attracts the most attention is a notation in the miscellaneous section of golf record books. It shows that in 1962, when he was 24, Homero fired a 55 on the Premier Golf Course in Longview, Texas, to equal the all-time low-scoring record. The only blemish on the incredible score is that Blancas' effort was over a 5,002-yard layout, while the original record, made in 1936, was achieved on a course more than 6,400 yards in length.

Blancas, son of a golf course maintenance man at Houston's River Oaks Country Club, was already well-known in Texas golf circles at the time. He had played on the famous U. of Houston teams, held the Southern Intercollegiate title, and had been named on two All-America lists. After 21 months in the U.S. Army, he joined the Tour in 1965, won \$26,162 and was given a Rookie-of-the-Year award.

Homero has three Tour victories to his credit. He cracked the \$100,000 level in 1970 with some \$994 to spare.

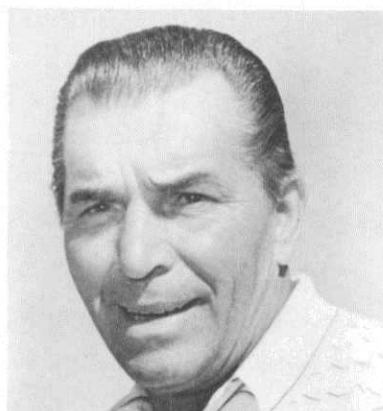

1971 RECAP: Julius Boros certainly deserves the "Old Man River" tag. Although he has passed his 50th birthday and has already won a PGA Senior title, Boros is still capable of competing on an equal basis with youngsters half his age on the Tour.

Boros couldn't come up with another Tour victory to add to his impressive record in 1971, but he was 37th on the money list.

Playing a limited schedule as he always does now, Boros competed in 24

tournaments on Tour and came away with 19 checks. Five of them were for top 10 finishes.

Julie's best showing came in the Florida Citrus Open where he chased Arnold Palmer right down to the wire before bowing by one shot. In that event Boros returned 67-68-67-69. He also tied for second in the National Team Championship, pairing with another oldtimer, Bill Collins, and he was tie for third in the Colonial National.

PRIOR YEARS: Julius Boros vows he picks easy courses these days because of aging legs. He lists arthritis, bursitis and myocarditis as persistent ailments.

He is 52 this year, but old age just doesn't seem to apply to Boros. Just imagine, since he turned 40 Julius has won \$644,596, more than three times as much as his total over

the first ten years on the trail. And of course he has also taken two national titles, the U.S. Open in 1963 and the 1968 PGA Championship.

Jay was Player-of-the-Year in 1952 and repeated in 1963. He has played on four U.S. Ryder Cup teams, and was top money winner in 1952 and in 1955.

1971 RECAP: Gay Brewer, Jr., unable to win a U.S. Tour event since taking the 1967 Masters, regained a spot among the exempt players in 1971 with enough high finishes to place him 44th on the money list.

It was a good comeback for Gay, but a check of his record indicates it would have been much better with some par rounds the last day.

In 36 tournaments, Brewer managed to cash a check in 30 and was in the top 10 seven times. But in the 30 events he finished, Gay shot over par 12 times. And, of those

12, he was still in the low 15 five times.

Brewer's most critical last-round troubles occurred in the American Golf Classic and Southern Open. In the former, he was tied for second entering the last round and shot 77 to tie for ninth. In the Southern, he was second, a stroke off the pace after 54 holes and returned a final 75 to share sixth.

Gay's best finish of the year came in the Robinson Open where he posted 68-69 on the final day's double round to share third place, one stroke behind winner Labron Harris, Jr., and playoff loser Bert Yancey.

PRIOR YEARS: Born in Ohio, reared in Kentucky and now a resident of Texas, Gay Brewer has been a traveling man most of his life. Now in his sixteenth year on the Tour and with almost \$500,000 in career earnings, Brewer has learned that travel can be profitable as well as broadening.

Gay was introduced to golf when he was 8, and by his mid-teens he was one of the bright prospects in the Louisville area. He won the 1949 U.S. Junior Championship,

spent two years at the University of Kentucky, and joined the Tour in 1956.

Brewer fashioned one of the most courageous comebacks in recent golf history when he rebounded to win the 1967 Masters. The year before, with victory only one shot away, his putt on the final lipped-out, throwing him into a tie. He lost in the playoff the next day.

He has won nine Tour events, plus the 1965 National Four-Ball title.

1971 RECAP: Billy Casper had one of his lesser seasons in 1971, but he brightened it with a victory late in the year in the Kaiser International. Coming off a seven-week layoff during which he had to recover first from the flu and then from a broken toe, Casper romped to victory in the Kaiser with 67-65-69-68—269, one of the strongest performances of the season.

That triumph kept intact Casper's record having won at least one tournament in every

year since 1956.

Prior to that the year had been a frustrating one for Billy. He started by losing a playoff to Bob Lunn in the Los Angeles Open, tied for second at Phoenix, was fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and second to Jack Nicklaus in the PGA Championship. However, in his next 11 starts, Casper was in the top 10 only once—tying for eighth in the Cleveland Open—and he missed the 36-hole cut in the U.S. Open.

PRIOR YEARS: William Earl Casper, Jr. hit his first golf ball at the age of four and a half on his grandfather's farm in New Mexico. He began caddying at 11, played in junior events while attending high school and won a scholarship to Notre Dame. The Midwest winter proved too harsh and he left before the first semester was over.

His enlistment in the U.S. Navy in June, 1951 was a pivotal point in the Casper

career. He spent the next 22 months at the San Diego Naval Training Center operating golf shops, over-seeing golf programs — and tuning up his own promising game. In 1954, he turned professional, and when he was discharged from the Navy in 1955, two local businessmen sponsored him on the Tour.

Billy won his first tournament in 1956, and since then he has compiled a long record of success.

1971 RECAP: Bob Charles had a very busy season in which he never really contended for victory, but when the year was completed, the New Zealand southpaw was again well up among money winners.

Charles' best finish of the year was a tie for second in the National Team Championship with Bruce Devlin as partner. Otherwise he had no finishes better than

seventh. However, he was in the money 22 times in 26 events, finishing in the top 10 seven times and 15 times among the top 25.

Bob's failure to win or contend can be traced to an inability to put four good rounds together. In his 26 starts, only once did he play four consecutive rounds of par or better — in the Hawaiian Open, where he tied for eighth.

PRIOR YEARS: Bob Charles is the most successful left-handed golfer to ever play the Tour. His victory in the 1963 Houston Classic was the first ever registered by a left-hander on the Tour. Later that same year, he defeated Phil Rodgers in a 36-hole playoff at Royal Lytham and St. Annes for the British Open title.

He has been a consistent money-winner on the Tour for ten years, defying the rule that "wrong-side" swingers are erratic.

The lanky New Zealander, who is

right-handed in all things except games requiring two hands, swung a golf club for the first time at age 5. He swung it left-handed. Since both his parents were southpaw golfers, he never thought about changing.

Charles also played rugby and cricket in his school years, and before turning professional in 1960 he worked for a bank in Christchurch, New Zealand.

He is regarded as one of the finest putters on the Tour, and won British Open in 1963.

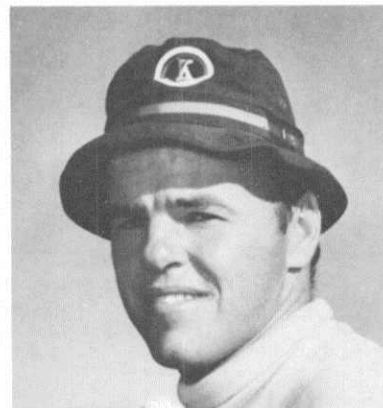

1971 RECAP: Midway through the 1971 season the outlook wasn't very rosy for Jim Colbert. In his first 21 tournaments he failed to cash an official check eight times and his only top 10 finish was a tie for 10th in the Byron Nelson Classic. His official earnings were just over \$9,000.

Then Colbert tied for third in the U.S. Open, just two shots back of playoff participants Lee Trevino and Jack Nicklaus, and he made a late season surge which netted him a spot again in the top 60.

Colbert continued to play spasmodically the last half of the season, missing the



36-hole cut or withdrawing in eight of the final 18 tournaments, but his finishes improved. Four times, in addition to the U.S. Open, he was in the top seven finishers, with a tie for third in the Robinson his best.

Jim had two good chances to win, but a third round of 73 hurt him at Robinson and a triple bogie on the 67th hole knocked him out of the lead in the Azalea Open, where he tied for fifth. His last strong finish came in the Disney World Open where he returned a last-round 66 to tie for seventh and move into the top 60 point leaders for the first time all year.

PRIOR YEARS: Although born in Elizabeth, N.J. 30 years ago, James Colbert, Jr., is every inch a Kansan, all five foot nine and 175 pounds of him. He has been on the Tour since 1966, after turning professional the year before.

His greatest moment, of course, was winning the 1969 Monsanto Open and the opportunities it opened up — like being eligible for tournaments without passing Monday's qualifying test. While the Monsanto has been Colbert's only prime finish, he has displayed the game and the temperament for remaining an exempt player.

Jim started out as a football star, an

all-state high school halfback offered a grid scholarship by Kansas State U. But his gridiron ambitions vanished in the annual game with the Nebraska frosh. In rain and mud, Colbert went for a fumble. A Cornhusker lineman really clobbered him, loosening not only his teeth but his desire. He then went out for the golf team, made it, and was runner-up for the 1964 NCAA championship.

A brief spell as an insurance agent after getting his B.Sc. and winning the Kansas amateur in 1965, moved Colbert to join pro ranks. It was an entirely different golf world, but Jim was able to adjust to it.

1971 RECAP: Professional golfers are notorious for hot streaks, and Charles Coody turned one of those streaks into the biggest victory of his career.

After a poor start in which he was in the top 10 only once in 10 events, Coody entered a six-tournament stretch in which he was never worse than 10th and in which he won the Masters Championship. That victory qualified him for the World Series of Golf,

which he subsequently won over Jack Nicklaus, Lee Trevino, and Bruce Crampton.

Coody was inconsistent throughout the season. In 31 starts he failed to qualify for the final 36 holes seven times, but he was also in the top 10 nine times. His best finish other than the Masters came in the Cleveland Open where a third round of 62 helped him to second place behind Bobby Mitchell's record 262 score.

PRIOR YEARS: William Charles Coody won more than 30 Texas amateur titles — including the state high school crown and the Texas Amateur — before he turned professional in 1963. He had also reached the semi-finals of the 1962 U.S. Amateur, gaining an invitation to the 1963 Masters.

Before joining the Tour, Coody received a degree in Business at Texas Christian U. and then put in three years as a lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force. He played in two U.S.

Opens (1960 and '61) while on leave.

The Masters has provided him with the high and low spots of his 7½ year on the Tour. In the 1969 Masters, Coody had a one-stroke lead with only the last three holes to play. Switching to more conservative play, Coody bogied the last three holes and finished tied for fifth place.

The high point, of course, was his victory in the 1971 Masters — the biggest of his three Tour triumphs.

1971 RECAP: Bruce Crampton enhanced his position as one of the top foreign players to compete on the U.S. Tour when he topped the \$100,000 mark for the fourth consecutive year.

Highlight of Crampton's 1971 season was victory in the Western Open, a triumph which qualified him for the World Series of Golf. Bruce also had six other finishes in the top 10, including a third in the Cleveland Open and fourth in the inaugural U.S.

PRIOR YEARS: Bruce Crampton has pursued the golf tour for 15 years with unflagging zeal and incredible durability. The first five were pretty rough on an alien loner who persisted through five years of never meeting expenses in 80 abortive starts.

Unsmiling and impassive, Crampton seldom touches off fireworks. Yet his game is regarded by contemporaries as one of the soundest on the tour — long off the tee, accurate with all irons, canny.

The 36-year-old Australian took up golf though his parents wanted him to play their game, tennis. Solidly built and strong, Crampton honed his game in adversity. Only someone with his single-minded intensity

Professional Match Play Championship. In the latter, he upset Arnold Palmer before bowing to DeWitt Weaver in the semifinals.

Bruce is one of the steadiest players on the Tour. In 30 events he failed to finish 72 holes only three times and was among the low 25 finishers 17 times.

In eight tournaments, Bruce returned four consecutive rounds of par or better. His best single round was 65, which he turned in at Phoenix, Milwaukee and Massachusetts.

could have survived those five years.

When his game started clicking in 1962, Bruce moved quickly into the top echelon of money-winners. His total take now approaches the \$700,000 mark. For the past four years he has topped the \$100,000 level each season.

Crampton is a fatalist who frequently has declared, "If you are meant to win, you will. Like playing a difficult shot through trees, I play it strong because I believe it is my destiny to do or don't."

He also has a competitive philosophy which has stood him in good stead. "I just try to score as low as I can, eliminating the money at stake from my mind," he declares.

1971 RECAP: Bruce Devlin cut down on his tournament play in 1971 to lend more time to course designing, and his performance on the Tour suffered as a result.

Although Bruce retained a position among the top money winners with more than \$50,000, he was nowhere near the player who has won six Tour titles in previous years and was among the \$100,000 winners in 1970.

In 20 tournaments in 1971, Devlin cashed checks 18 times but was among the top 10

only four times. And, while he had two seconds to his credit, he was never in position to win. As co-runnerup in the Tournament of Champions he finished eight strokes back of Jack Nicklaus, and in sharing second with partner Bob Charles in the National Team Championship, he was six strokes off the pace set by Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer.

Bruce had just 11 rounds under 70 for the entire season, and his low was 67 in the Cleveland Open.

PRIOR YEARS: Moving in high gear in his tenth year of tour competition. Bruce Devlin often complains that it is too rigorous a life for him. Master Plumbers are supposed to be big and sturdy, but Devlin who is (or was) an MP in his native Armidale, Australia, tires from protracted campaigning.

Meantime he is developing another life theme, as a partner of Bob Von Hagge in a Miami golf architectural firm. Bruce vows he prefers this phase of golf to slogging down fairways endlessly. If he can do as well building as he has playing, the expatriate, now a Florida resident, should have no

worries. In nine years, he has earned a total of \$421,769.19 as a player.

Devlin is a slashing hitter, inclined to draw his iron shots, and a super-putter. He is a former winner of the Bob Hope Classic and the Australian PGA championship. He was winner of the \$55,000 first prize in the last Alcan tournament, played in 1970.

Articulate in a quiet, low key, Bruce slumped to a mere official \$51,175 last year. But Von Hagge and Devlin are building courses all over the world, so Bruce will keep the wolf away even when his putts aren't dropping.

1971 RECAP: Gardner Dickinson was one of several veterans who rebounded from disappointing seasons in 1970 to regain a spot among the top money winners.

The 44-year-old Dickinson won once and came within a stroke of another victory en route to the 40th position on the money list with \$58,542 — his highest earnings in a season. Gardner scored his eighth Tour title when he won the Atlanta Classic with a sudden death playoff victory over Jack Nicklaus. Gardner birdied the 72nd hole to tie Nicklaus and then won on the first overtime hole when Jack took three putts.

Earlier in the year, Dickinson challenged J.C. Snead for the Doral-Eastern title but finally bowed by a stroke. Those were the only two tournaments of the year in which Gardner was able to putt consistently well. He played each with four consecutive sub-par rounds.

Gardner's only other finishes in the top 10 were a tie for seventh in the Western Open and a ninth place tie in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship. He seemed to tire badly late in the season, failing to finish in the low 30 in each of his last six starts after Labor Day.

PRIOR YEARS: Gardner Dickinson, Jr. was ready to quit the golf tour in the spring of 1969, when after fifteen years of constant play, his competitive game seemingly was coming to the end of the trail. He took one more try and won the Colonial Invitation.

They call Gardner the "Slim Man," but he says it now is a misnomer, since he is up to 144 pounds, (from 130 in 1952). For two decades he has been one of the most colorful characters on the trail. Not only an excellent

shotmaker, Dickinson is a teacher with Ph.D talent, a sound councilor of his associates, and a stentorian voice in player affairs. He was a TPD Player-Director in 1969.

Gardner was born in Dothan, Ala., son of an able golfing daddy. He went to Louisiana State and Alabama and from there right into golf. In 1954, he was assistant to Ben Hogan, his idol, and adopted many of Ben's mannerisms and as much of the Hogan technique as he could assimilate.

1971 RECAP: Dale Douglass didn't win a tournament during the 1971 season, a fact which has to result in frustration for the lean Coloradoan.

Three times Douglass finished second and each was a trying experience. In the Tucson Open he lost by one stroke to J.C. Snead when the latter birdied the 15th hole; in the Kemper Open he bogied the last two holes to drop into a four-way tie and then lost in the playoff to Tom Weiskopf; and in the American Golf Classic he broke par on three

consecutive days over the difficult Firestone course and found himself five strokes behind the winner, Jerry Heard.

Douglass maintained his reputation for being one of the busiest of the touring pros by playing in 37 tournaments. He was in the money in 28 and had six finishes in the top 10. He also served as a member of the Tournament Policy Board.

Douglass' best round of the season was 65, a score he returned at both Memphis and Kemper.

PRIOR YEARS: Dale Douglass is lean, lanky and surprisingly durable. He has been one of the tour's Iron Men for the past five years, and last year teed off in 37 of them, one less than in 1967.

Born in Wewoka, Okla., Douglass honed his golf as a player at Colorado U. (B.A., 1959) and turned pro in 1960. He hit the trail in 1963, with the backing of a group of Denver businessmen.

It took him six years to find a winning formula, which he finally achieved in the 1969 Azalea Open and again in the Kemper Open. The 1970 Phoenix Open was his other title success.

Quiet and unobtrusive with a wry sense of humor, Douglass says his only unusual difference from Mr. Average Guy is the two

"ss" ending his name. As an afterthought, he adds, "that and the 19 I took at Pebble Beach in 1967. I keep hoping they will forget it, but it pops up every time I have an interview. They never mention I finished with all pars from there".

He has an oft-repeated philosophy about his game: "I feel that if you keep hitting the ball near the hole and keep putting at it, some of them are bound to fall. Golf is like auto racing—you can't make a game plan, you just go out there hoping for the best".

Dale has a reputation with his contemporaries for low-scoring fourth rounds. He doesn't disagree. He thinks he has a gift for last-round rallies, and they have frequently brought him some large extra chunks of prize money.

1971 RECAP: Dave Eichelberger was one of the big surprises of the 1971 season. After struggling for survival through four years on the Tour, the former Walker Cup amateur from Waco, Tex., suddenly blossomed into one of the stars.

He scored his first victory when he won the Greater Milwaukee Open, and that, along with eight other finishes in the top 10, boosted Dave into the select group of \$100,000 winners. Prior to winning at Milwaukee, Eichelberger finished second in the Andy Williams San Diego Open and tied

for second in the Greater Greensboro Open. In the latter, he bogied the last hole and then lost to Brian Allin in a playoff.

Eichelberger had one stretch early in the season where he played 20 consecutive rounds (Crosby through Tucson) in par or better.

Dave also had an exceptional number of very low rounds. Eight times he returned 66 or better, the lowest of which was a 62 the final round of the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic. That tied the Tour's low round of the year.

PRIOR YEARS: Martin Davis Eichelberger, Jr., a tall, well-built Texan, loomed as a bright Tour prospect during his amateur days. He reached the semi-final round of the 1964 U. S. Amateur at Canterbury C.C., in Cleveland, before being stopped by Ed Tutwiler. In 1965, he was a member of the U. S. Walker Cup team and contributed two points to the 11-11 deadlock played by the U. S. and British squads at the Baltimore (Md.) C.C. He also represented the U. S. that year in the Americas Cup matches at Winnipeg, Canada.

Dave was a member of the Oklahoma State University golf team, and after he earned his degree in Business Administration in 1965, he signed on with the U. S. Marines. With his military commitment satisfied, Eichelberger was able to get back to his plan

to try for the professional Tour.

Eichelberger made it through the 1966 Qualifying School, earning his card with such other current Tour players as Bob Lunn, Jerry McGee, Bert Greene and Jim Wiechers. He earned only \$3,076 in 1967, his rookie year on the circuit, but climbed up the ladder rapidly the next time around.

Starting off with an impressive 13th place finish in the Los Angeles Open, Dave hit the top 30 in eight other events and wound up with \$15,473 for 1968. He tailed off to \$9,423 in 1969, but started moving upward again in 1970 with \$23,455 — a ninth place in the Robinson Classic being the highlight.

It was four years of grueling Monday qualifying for Dave, but observers believe it was an investment that helped him put it altogether in 1971.

1971 RECAP: Lee Elder regained a place among the top 60 after an off year in 1970, and he credited his success to early season preparation. Lee went West to work on his game in advance of the opening and that helped him get off to his fastest start ever. He had three finishes in the top 20 in the first month.

Elder's best showings of the year came in the New Orleans Open, where he finished tied third, and the Danny Thomas Memphis Open, where he shared second behind Lee

Trevino. He had two other finishes in the top 10, tying for ninth in the Andy Williams San Diego Open, and for eighth in the Philadelphia Classic.

Lee seldom played his way out of contention with a poor round. In 30 tournaments he had only seven rounds over 75. He also appeared strong at the finish. Of the 23 tournaments in which he completed 72 holes, Elder played the fourth round in par or better 14 times and three times closed with 66.

PRIOR YEARS: It took 37-year-old Lee Elder a long time to break into tour pro ranks. For a decade prior to earning his Tour credentials observers rated him as one of the top black golfers in the U.S. Playing out of Washington, D.C., Elder won 21 of 23 tournaments run by the United Golf Association. All the while he yearned to get on the big wheel but never could raise the finances to try it.

Eventually he and his wife, Rose, saved up enough for Lee to chart his course. He entered the Qualifying School and graduated with the Class of 1967.

Since then he has not scored a victory but has run up a total of \$145,427 in winnings.

Maintaining his Tour credentials is happiness to Elder, of course. But his fondest memory goes back to 1968, when he tied with Jack Nicklaus for first in the American Golf Classic and then took Jack five holes before yielding in the sudden-death play-off.

"I showed the greatest golfer in the world that I could hit a few licks, too" was his delighted comment.

His tour associates like Elder for his sound golf game and his gameness. In the fall of 1971, Gary Player invited Elder to play in South Africa, Gary's native land. Because of South Africa's apartheid policy, the incident attracted world wide attention. During the same trip, Elder won the Nigerian Open.

1971 RECAP: Ray Floyd trimmed down to a more desirable playing weight in 1971 but only on a few occasions did he show the form which brought him the 1969 PGA Championship.

Of the 31 tournaments he entered, he completed only 21 and was in the top 10 just five times. And in only four tournaments did he manage to avoid at least one round over par. One was the Bob Hope Desert Classic where he returned five

consecutive sub-par efforts only to lose to Arnold Palmer on the first hole of a playoff. Another was the Massachusetts Classic, where he was under par for four rounds and finished second to Dave Stockton.

Floyd's other top 10 finishes were a tie for fifth in the Atlanta Classic, eighth in the U.S. Open and a ninth place tie in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, where he upset Jack Nicklaus in the opening round.

PRIOR YEARS: Raymond Floyd, all six feet and 185 pounds of him, has had a kaleidoscopic career in his decade of golf tourism.

His brightest colors flashed forth in 1969, when Ray came out of nowhere to unexpected brilliance. During that year he won the Jacksonville Open, the American Golf Classic, and then attained the heights by winning the PGA Championship.

Floyd was born in Fort Bragg, N.C., son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Club in Fayetteville, N.C.

Ray turned pro in 1961 after winning the National Jaycees tournament in 1960. He hit the tour in 1963 and won the St. Petersburg Open and was chosen "Rookie of the Year". His second came in the 1965 St. Paul Open.

A bachelor who enjoys the good life, Floyd did nothing to distinguish himself — golfwise, that is — for the next several years. Periodically the insouciant Floyd reduces his social program for more time on the practice tee, and 1969 was one of those interims. The successful program carried over to 1970, when he played in 31 tournaments, didn't register a win but finished second in the Bob Hope and Massachusetts Classics, and was in the money 21 times for a total of \$70,607.

As a youngster Ray wavered between baseball and professional golf. The 1960 Jaycee victory decided the issue. He still is an ardent baseball fan and roots passionately for the Chicago Cubs. He even has his own locker, glove and gear in Wrigley Field and works out frequently with the Cubs.

1971 RECAP: Rod Funseth was not among the 1971 winners, but he had his best season ever at the pay window. Rod placed 34th on the money list with \$63,567, more money than he has ever won in a single season and his best position since he was 30th in 1965 with \$30,647.

Rod had two very good opportunities to win in 1971, but each time the elusive title got away. At the Greater Greensboro Open, he tied with Brian Allin and Dave Eichelberger, and Allin took the playoff

with birdie on the first hole. In the Greater Milwaukee Open, Rod was the third round leader but shot one over par in the last round and finished fifth.

Funseth was in the money in 26 of 35 tournaments and in the top 10 seven times. He was third twice, in the Massachusetts Classic, where he finished 68-69, and in the Azalea Open, where he closed with 68-67. He also tied for fourth in the Tallahassee Open, for fifth in the Kemper Open and for ninth in the Canadian Open.

PRIOR YEARS: Rod Funseth became a professional golfer in 1956 at the age of 23 and spent the next seven years working as an assistant at various clubs, including a season with Al Ciuci at Fresh Meadow C.C. on Long Island.

He first hit the Tour in 1962 and has been a regular ever since. Injuries in both 1963 and 1964 slowed his progress, although he did have a strong finish as runnerup in the '64 St. Paul Open. He finally cracked through in 1965 to win the Phoenix Open and record his first Tour success. A final round 67 enabled him to breeze in by three.

Rod has not had a Tour win since, although he has been close. In both 1965 and 1966 he tied for third in the Canadian Open, and in 1967 he tied for second in the 500 Festival and for third at Phoenix. A 66 in the final round gave him a share of second place in the 1970 Avco Classic.

Rod hits a long ball and his game is solid. He is a plodder who loves to play the game, and his career earnings of \$246,475 reflect his success. He is the type that fellow pros enjoy playing with — good length, sound swing, gentlemanly. He is always ready with swing antidotes for those in a slump.

1971 RECAP: Gibby Gilbert's performance on the Tour in 1971 can be summed up with two facts: He is at "home" in Florida, and he is a very streaky player.

Gibby, a resident of Southern Florida, had six top 10 finishes in 1971, and three of them came in succession during the winter Florida swing. He tied for sixth in the PGA Championship, finished fourth in the Doral-Eastern Open and shared sixth again in the Florida Citrus Open.

Gilbert's other top 10 finishes were a tie for fourth in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open, ninth in the Tournament of Champions and a share of second in the Westchester Classic.

Gibby is a player who may shoot for 65

or 81, both of which he did during the year. En route to his fine Los Angeles Open finish he had three eagles and posted four consecutive rounds under par. The very next week he opened with 81 in the Bing Crosby. And in the Byron Nelson Classic, he moved into contention with 69-67 over the middle rounds and then shot 80 the last day.

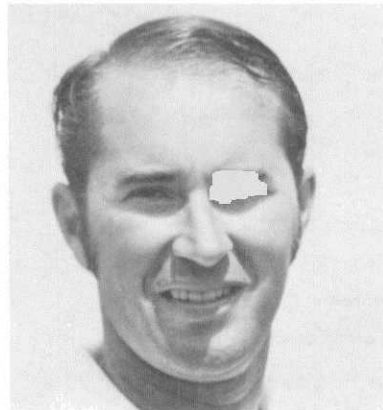
The highlight of his season, however, came in the Western Classic, where he established the season record with six consecutive birdies. He also had another string of four birdies in a row in the same tournament. His inconsistency also shows in the fact that he finished only 20 of the 34 tournaments he started and still ranked 35th on the money list.

PRIOR YEARS: C. L. Gilbert, Jr., didn't get a name when he was born — just initials. But he's been making a name for himself as Gibby for the past two years. The initials, he says, "stand for nothing."

Gibby started playing golf at 13, made the team at Central High and again at the University of Chattanooga, in his native Tennessee city. In 1962, he quit college, got married and became an assistant professional in Hollywood, Florida. He tried the Tour in 1964 without success, but took another shot at it after he earned his card at the 1967 Qualifying School.

This was the class that included Bob Murphy, Tony Jacklin, Orville Moody, Lee Elder and Deane Beman, among others. Gilbert, powerfully built and soft-spoken, finished second in the class, topped only by South Africa's Bobby Cole.

Gibby's Tour efforts in 1968 produced only \$1,752. In 1969, the improvement was only slightly better — \$2,814. In 1970, he decided to invest one more year on the circuit before calling it quits completely. Success finally came. He made the biggest jump on the money list, soaring to over \$65,000 and 27th place.

1971 RECAP: Bob Goalby evidently likes those mystery stories which don't let you know "who dun it" until the very last line. That's the way he plays the golf tour.

For the third consecutive year, Goalby went into the final stages of the season confronted with a virtual win-or-else situation if he were to remain an exempt player and, for the third consecutive year, he won a tournament.

In 1971 he waited until the very end, edging George Archer by one shot to win the

Bahamas National Open. It had to be one of the most astonishing feats of the year. In 36 previous events, Goalby had been in the money only 21 times and hadn't been in the top 10 since tying for eighth in the first tournament of the year at the Los Angeles. Then he returned 69-70-66-70—275 over a very difficult par-71 test to win the Bahamas title.

Until then Goalby never could get anything going. In his first 36 events he had only 12 rounds under 70.

PRIOR YEARS: Robert George Goalby was a four-sport athlete at Belleville (Ill.) High, in his hometown, winning 11 letters. He turned down major league baseball offers to enroll at the University of Illinois and play football. He played one year as reserve quarterback and member of the defensive unit before leaving school and becoming an automobile salesman.

After winning six amateur tournaments during 1955-56, Goalby turned professional in 1957. He won only \$20 in his first year, but climbed to 31st on the list in 1958.

Goalby's most important career victory came in the 1968 Masters with an impressive 277. Unfortunately, some of the glitter of the triumph was diminished when Roberto DeVicenzo signed for an incorrect score and was placed second behind Goalby. With the right score, DeVicenzo would have tied Goalby at the end of 72 holes.

Before the Masters win, Goalby had scored only one victory over a five-year period. Since then he has won a tournament in each of the last three seasons — usually late in the season.

1971 RECAP: Lou Graham was one of the busiest and most consistent of the professionals on the 1971 Tour. He competed in 35 tournaments, finished 29, was in the top 10 ten times and in the top 25 twenty three times.

In compiling a 71.1 scoring average, Graham had only 10 rounds over 75 and was under 70 in 36 rounds. His low of the year was 65, which he shot three times — twice in finishing rounds.

Graham's best finish of the year was a tie for second in the Greater Hartford Open,

where he returned four consecutive sub-70 rounds and then lost to George Archer in a playoff. Lou was also fifth in the Houston Champions, Philadelphia Classic and U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, and sixth in the Canadian Open and Greater Milwaukee Open.

An indication of Graham's consistently good pay is the fact that his tournament check was in at least four figures 23 times. In his last 24 tournaments he missed the 36-hole cut only once and was in the low 25 19 times.

PRIOR YEARS: Lou Graham, a consistent money-winner on the Tour, can recollect some vivid detours on the way to becoming a successful links nomad.

One memory recalls some dark hours in 1968, when tendonitis in his left hand threatened the end of his golf. Not only an operation but seven months of recuperation and long months of recovering the fairway touch befell Graham. His record over the past two years indicates that he has not only recovered the knack but improved it.

Born in Nashville, Lou matriculated at Memphis State on a golf scholarship at age 20. But he found student life boring and quit school in his third year to enlist in the

Army. He found that life even less glamorous.

He must have been a good soldier, though, since he was picked for the Presidential Honor Guard and left-righted in President Kennedy's inauguration parade.

Finishing the Army in 1962, Graham worked two years as an assistant in Baltimore before striking the Tour trail. After two so-so years, he hit the jackpot in 1967, winning the Minnesota Classic and gleaning \$42,556. for the season. In the course of the year he went 170 consecutive holes without three-putting, showing his skill in an important department.

Then came tendonitis.

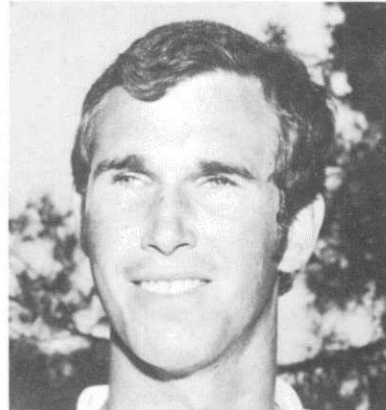

1971 RECAP: Hubert Green became the second rookie to win on the 1971 Tour when he defeated veteran Don January in a Houston Champions playoff to follow Greensboro winner, Brian Allin, to the victory circle.

It was a reward for persistence for the young Alabaman who needed two tries before earning his Approved Tournament Player card. A month prior to Houston, Green had led going into the final round of the Tallahassee Open and shot 75 to finish third. A week later, he again led after 54 holes and was overhauled by Frank Beard.

PRIOR YEARS: Hubert Myatt Green is not only a blithe spirit but a solid golfer. In his first full year on the tour, the 25-year-old son of a Birmingham, Ala., general practitioner earned his place among the exempt players with points to spare.

Hubert stands 6-1, weighs 170 (up ten pounds in a year) and learned much of his sweet swinging from Jon Gustin. Green played golf at Florida State, earning a B.S. degree in 1968, and hit the golden trail via the 1970 class of the Qualifying School.

Hubert still shakes his head in wonderment about qualifying at the School,

However, at Houston he came from off the pace, passed DeWitt Weaver with a final round of par 71, and then dropped a 15-foot birdie putt on the first extra hole to whip January. Green had made his presence known on Tour early in the season when he tied for fourth in the Hawaiian Open, rebounding from an opening 73 with three successive sub-70 scores.

He went into a tailspin following his victory, however, and had only one top 10 finish in his last 18 tournaments, missing the 36-hole cut eight times. He tied for fourth in the Greater Hartford Open.

especially going into the last round standing 19th among the candidates, only 18 of whom would qualify.

"The tour isn't as tough as the players' school", he insists.

After qualifying in October, 1970, Green joined the tour to win \$1,690 in the few remaining events on the schedule. Then came 1971 and he put together the best record of all the rookies.

Incidentally, Hubert was selected for the 1969 Walker Cup team but declined the invitation with regrets because he had made up his mind to join the professionals.

1971 RECAP: This was the year of the breakthrough for Labron Harris, Jr. After seven struggling years on the Tour, the 1962 U.S. Amateur champion scored his first Tour victory and for the first time made the official top 60 list.

Labron's triumph came in the Robinson Classic, where he defeated Bert Yancey in a three-hole playoff. Harris forced the tie by making birdie at the 71st hole, and then saved par from a bunker at the 72nd. Harris had twice previously come close to winning,

losing a playoff to Bob Murphy in the 1968 Philadelphia Classic, and in 1970 when he came within one stroke of Bobby Nichols in the Dow Jones Open.

Harris had only a tie for fifth in the Azalea and a tie for eighth in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, but he was in the low 25 a dozen times. In his last 10 tournaments of the year he was 21st or better eight times, his best stretch.

Labron's best single round was a 65 on the last day of the Memphis Classic.

PRIOR YEARS: When Labron Harris Jr. joined the professional golf ranks in 1964, every one expected the big fellow (6-4 and 200 pounds) to move quickly into strong tour contention. After all he was 1962 U. S. Amateur champion with a long, strong game taught him by his Dad and backer, the famed golf coach at Oklahoma State U., Young Harris, an OSU graduate, was ambitious, determined and tireless.

But Junior somehow couldn't find the combination. His first year ended up deep in travel deficit. Things weren't much better in 1965, and 1966 (the year he worked hardest to earn his Masters degree in mathematical calculations) was worse.

Labron never stopped trying and was always there for the Monday qualifier. In 1967, he came near breaking even with \$14,479, and did a bit better in 1968.

A real break came in 1970, when Harris earned his first big check without even winning. He finished a courageous second in the \$300,000 Dow Jones Open to pick up \$34,000 — more than he had won in four previous years put together.

Even so he did not gain the longed-for exemption in the 1970 campaign. Finally in 1971, Labron went to the winner's circle in the Robinson Open and a \$46,922.51 year and full exemption followed.

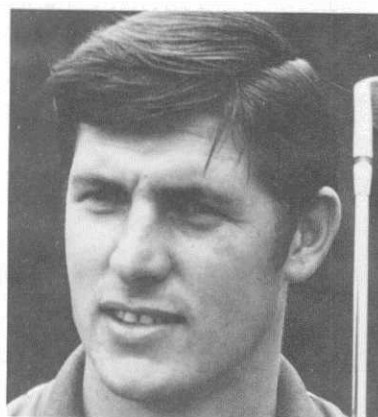

1971 RECAP: Many people have been predicting a very good future for Jerry Heard since he arrived on the Tour in 1969, and he may now be ready to take his place among the stars.

After several close calls, Heard broke into the winner's circle in impressive fashion when he romped to a three-stroke victory in the American Golf Classic. With 67-66-68 for openers over a very tough Firestone course, Heard was five strokes out in front and able to survive a finishing 74.

That victory, added to 10 other finishes in the top 10, boosted Heard over the \$100,000 mark for the first time and placed



him seventh on the money list. Jerry was second in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, third in the Western Open and fourth in the Bing Crosby National, the Citrus Open and the Cleveland Open.

Heard has always shown an ability to sneak up on leaders during the late going. At the Crosby, for instance, he finished with a five under-par-67; at Memphis he came from well back with closing 64; and in the Cleveland Open he had 66-67 for the last two rounds. In fact, in the 27 tournaments Jerry completed he was over par only seven times in the last round.

PRIOR YEARS: In 1968, Jerry Michael Heard was just another ex-college golfer from Visalia, Calif. He had played at Fresno State. Not a bad swinger, but no titles or anything.

He was well up on the list of graduates from the Fall 1968 Qualifying School. He made no waves in his rookie year with \$10,236 in earnings. He started 1970 on an even lower key. In the first five tournaments his total take was \$133 won at Phoenix.

In May of '70, however, Jerry took a big step. He married Nancy — and he could rename her Lady Luck. Without ado his golf fortunes changed dramatically. Within two months he picked up \$7,000 with high finishes in the Cleveland and Philadelphia Opens. Then a fourth in the Westchester

Classic gleaned \$11,000. Jerry ended up with \$44,919, a lovely honeymoon and respite from the Monday qualifying clarion.

Heard combines his good swing with the confidence that he can make a success of his Tour efforts. He proved the contention in 1971 by winning the American Classic and raising his total winnings to \$112,389.02.

Confident as he is, Heard actually underestimated his 1970 and 1971 potentials. At the end of 1970, he confided that his actual goal for that season had been \$20,000 in earnings. He more than doubled it. Then he said he would like to win \$75,000 in 1971, and went \$40,000 better.

No wonder Jerry Heard is glad he gave up baseball ambitions at age 11 to become a golfer.

1971 RECAP: Dave Hill played a limited schedule in 1971, competing in only 23 tournaments, and while he failed to win, he nonetheless maintained his position among top money winners.

With six finishes in the top 10, Hill earned \$61,410. He did not play at all after the Greater Hartford in September.

Dave was inconsistent throughout the year, but occasionally showed the skills which brought him three victories in 1969 and another in 1970. His best showing was

in the Philadelphia Classic, where he challenged all the way before finally bowing to Tom Weiskopf. He also tied for fourth in the Phoenix Open, where he never had a round worse than 67. He had sixth-place finishes in the PGA Championship, New Orleans Open and National Team Championship. In the latter, he paired with brother Mike.

Hill's best round was a 65, which he shot at both Phoenix and Hartford, but he had 44 rounds of par or better.

PRIOR YEARS: Ever since 1959, when Dave Hill came on the golf scene from Jackson, Mich., he has been a dashing and sometimes stormy figure both on and off the course.

For all the fireworks, no one underestimates Dave's golf talent. He can play. He proved that positively in 1969, when he ended up second on the money list with \$156,423 and grabbed the coveted Vardon Cup award with a 70.344 average for 90 rounds.

That year was high in his Tour career, during which he has won a total of \$524,340. He came right back in 1970 with a lucrative \$118,415. Last year, he limited

his play, quitting after the Hartford Open in September, but he still pocketed \$61,410.

The temperamental 34-year-old Michigander says the money isn't everything to him. He vows he will play golf only "as long as it is fun". His intensity and self-demand that he develop a perfect swing boils within him, so much so that each year the nervous strain causes him to lose weight as the season progresses. He once dropped from 165 to a little over 130 pounds.

He has won eight tournaments and finished close up in several others, including the 1970 U.S. Open at Hazeltine C.C., behind Tony Jacklin. His jackpot has been the Memphis, which he won three times.

1971 RECAP: After winning a tournament in his rookie 1969 season and piling up more than \$100,000 in 1970, Larry Hinson suffered through a dismal 1971. He never finished better than third, earned only \$48,604, and much of his slump can be blamed on an ailing shoulder.

Hinson was plagued by the ailment much of the year but it was most severe late in the season. After his best finish, a tie for third in the Robinson Classic, Larry was forced to withdraw from three consecutive events.

Larry was never able to regain the form which made him look like a coming superstar. In 31 tournaments he was in the

money 23 times. Fifteen times he made the low 25, but could reach the low 10 in only five events.

He had one stretch in which he appeared to be returning to good form, tying for eighth in the Kemper Open, for ninth in the U.S. Open, and for seventh, with Bunky Henry, in the National Team Championship. He had some strong individual rounds, like a 66 in the final of the Bing Crosby, a third round 64 in Phoenix, and closing 67s in both the American Golf Classic and the Robinson Classic. However, only four times all year did he have more than one sub-70 round in the same tournament.

PRIOR YEARS: When lanky, blond Larry Hinson decided to try for playing privileges on Tour in 1968, some of his friends in Douglas, Ga., tried to talk him out of it. They feared the sunny, smiling collegian with the deep South accent could not survive the rigors of the trail because of his withered left arm incurred as a boy polio victim.

But Hinson, brought up to disregard his handicap by his courageous mother, was determined to go forward. He finished fifth in the class of Spring, 1968 at the Qualifying School and hit the trail immediately.

He didn't make expenses for the balance of '68, but Hinson moved up into the blue chip area in 1969, not only winning the New Orleans Open but amassing \$54,267.

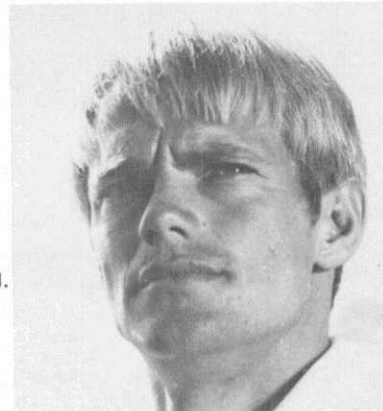
The next year he more than doubled it, going up to \$120,897. And he did it uniquely, setting a tour record for winning the most money without a victory.

Hinson has never let his withered arm interfere with his athletics. He played basketball, (breaking his arm three different times), and golf at East Tennessee State University, where he won the College Division, NCAA, championship.

Larry won the Ben Hogan Award in 1970 for his success despite his handicap.

Larry claims his arm helps his golf because after one bone break it was set improperly and now he cannot turn his arm over.

"So it's impossible for me to hit a duck hook", he exclaims.

1971 RECAP: Hale Irwin became one of 10 first-time winners on the 1971 Tour when he scored an impressive victory in the Heritage Classic and firmly established himself as a potential star of the future.

Hale returned rounds of 68-73-68-70 over the very difficult Harbour Town Links on Hilton Head Island, S.C., and survived finishing pressure applied by Jack Nicklaus, Frank Beard and Bob Lunn.

The victory was one of seven finishes in

the top 10 for the former NCAA champion. He twice tied for second—Memphis and Westchester—and was in a third deadlock in the Tucson Open.

Irwin was also one of the busiest players on the Tour, competing in 37 tournaments. He completed 72 holes in 28 of those. In compiling a 71.6 scoring average, Irwin posted 11 rounds of 67 or better, with 65 being his lowest.

PRIOR YEARS: Any time a one-time college footballer does well on the golf tour, someone promotes him to All-America rank. Hale Irwin is probably the best football player to make a mark on the circuit, and he has the added thrill of seeing himself cited as an All-America in some stories. Actually he was an All-Big Eight Conference safety for Colorado University, no small achievement.

Irwin was born in Joplin, Mo. He graduated from Colorado with a B.S. in Marketing in 1967, and almost immediately took dead aim on the Tour. He made it through the Qualifying School with the class of Spring, 1968, but his first-year earnings amounted to only \$9,093. He went up to \$18,571 in 1969 and took off in 1970 to garner \$46,870.

His initial start that year in the Los Angeles Open was almost a winning

break-through when he led at 54 holes and came to the 15th of the final round two strokes ahead. His challenger was Billy Casper, playing ahead. Bill birdied the final hole for 276 and Irwin needed only a par to win. But he hit a tree limb, took a bogey 5, and Casper won the play-off with a birdie on the first extra hole.

Hale sadly declared, "I lost the tournament, Billy didn't win it". His only consolation was that he became a footnote to history. The victory sent Billy over the \$1 million mark in career winnings.

Irwin says, "Golf is tougher than football. On the gridiron you can blow off your emotion by belting someone. In golf, pressure just keeps building up within you and there is no outlet of relief. You must learn to control your emotions, and that's not easy".

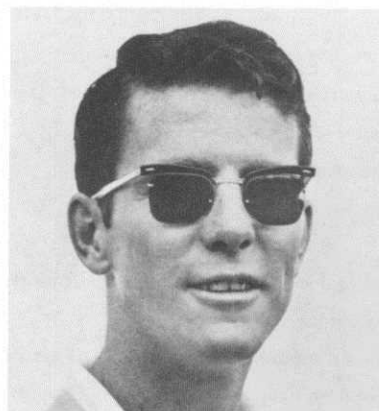

1971 RECAP: When George Knudson lost his exemption late in the 1971 season and was forced to qualify for the Azalea Open, he decided he didn't need that ordeal.

With a late surge which was unspectacular but effective, Knudson overtook Jim Jamieson and Dick Lotz to gain the last of the 60 exempt spots for the 1972 season. In his last four events, Knudson tied for 10th at Azalea, for sixth in the Heritage Classic, for 26th in the Disney World, and for 20th in the Bahamas Open.

Nonetheless, 1971 had to be a disappointing season for the Canadian star

who has won seven Tour titles. In 30 events he was in the money only 18 times and had just five top 10 finishes. His best showing was a tie for third in the Colonial National Invitational, a tournament he led after 67-69 and finished with 76-73. His most consistent event was Philadelphia, where he was fourth on 71-68-69-69.

Knudson is regarded as one of the finest shotmakers in the game, and his skills were evident in the second round of the Heritage Classic. He returned a 66 on the Harbour Town Links, regarded by many as the most demanding the tourists play.

PRIOR YEARS: George Knudson is a peripatetic Canadian golfer with a powerful swing and a penchant for collecting tournament coin.

Born in Winnipeg and now playing out of Toronto, Knudson turned professional in 1958, and took tentative stabs at the American Tour in 1959 and 1960. He won exactly \$340 for that effort, improved in 1961 (\$5,682), and finally started to roll in 1962 with \$14,664.

Since then he has gone back home each

year with bankrolls ranging from \$18,500 to \$71,360 in his peak year of 1968. That was when he won Phoenix and Tucson Opens back to back.

In 1964, he took the Canadian PGA championship, and in 1966 he was low individual player in the Canada (now World) Cup matches.

For the past two seasons George has skirted on thin qualifying ice to earn an exemption from qualifying. In 1970 only his victory in the Robinson let him make it.

1971 RECAP: Gene Littler followed his normal pattern in 1971. He won two tournaments and \$98,687 before Labor Day and then went home to California to tinker with his antique cars.

In 22 tournaments in 1971, the smooth-swinging Littler failed to cash a check only once — the result of a withdrawal at Tucson. He was in the top 10 six times, with victories in the Monsanto Open, where he finished with 67 to overtake Mason

Rudolph and Al Geiberger, and the Colonial National Invitational, where he made up five strokes on the last day with a 69.

Littler also tied for fourth in the Masters, was fifth in the Tournament of Champions, seventh in the Cleveland Open, and made the round of 16 in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship.

In compiling a 71.1 scoring average, Littler had only three rounds over 75. His best was a second round 63 in the Phoenix.

PRIOR YEARS: Probably no player in golf history has been able to simplify the intricacies of a complex game more than Gene Littler, the quiet man from San Diego.

Gentle, unobtrusive Gene lets his flashing clubs do his ballyhooing and down the years they have pointed him to 23 tournament victories including the 1961 U.S. Open Championship. Also notable in his glittering record is his sweep of the Tournament of Champions in 1955, '56 and '57.

He disclaims any special talents. "I'm still working on my game. It is a continual fight

because there's a fine line between being good or bad. You have to adjust continually", he advises.

Littler doesn't go the full route these days, going home as he did last year, usually following Labor Day.

His winningest year was 1969, when he amassed \$112,737 and won the Phoenix and Greensboro Opens. He has been a member of six Ryder Cup teams. In his career Littler has totalled \$814,848, fifth on the all-time list behind Palmer, Nicklaus, Casper and Boros.

1971 RECAP: Bob Lunn began the 1971 Tour about 40 pounds under his 1970 playing weight and jumped out of the starting gate with victory in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. He tied at 274 and then defeated Billy Casper in a four-hole playoff.

Lunn continued to lose weight, but his golf game suffered. It was not until he put some pounds back on that he regained his form. After a tie for fifth in the Kemper Open in June, Bob went 12 tournaments without a top 10 finish, and he decided he was not strong enough.

PRIOR YEARS: Husky Bob Lunn, son of a retired San Francisco policeman, joined the tour via the Qualifying School late in 1967 carrying the credentials of the 1963 U.S. Public Links champion.

He caused no immediate stir but the next year he not only won at Memphis and Atlanta back to back but amassed a total of \$102,711. He hasn't surpassed that pace since but has won a tournament every year. It was the Hartford Open in 1969, the Citrus Open in 1970, and the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open last year. Thus in four years Bob has piled up an impressive pay-off of \$355,274.48, 37th on the career earnings chart.

Lunn created a stir in 1970 when he

He showed up for the Heritage Classic about 20 pounds heavier and promptly took second behind Hale Irwin, shooting par or better each day on the Harbour Town Links. He finished the season 21st on the money list with \$83,892.

Lunn's lack of stamina began to show in the Kemper. After opening with 69-66 for the halfway lead, he posted 71-73, and in the next five tournaments he completed, he had finishing rounds over par three times. He was again a contender after 36 holes of the American Golf Classic, trailing only Jerry Heard, but he finished 75-73 for 15th place.

showed up at the Citrus Open though he had decided to pass up Florida competition because he never had played well there. His wife Angie, expecting their second child, suggested he play and win it as a present for the anticipated heir. He not only obliged but beat Arnold Palmer in a final round battle.

One of the longest hitters, Lunn exudes confidence in every phase of shotmaking, but says his putting varies at times. "I'd like to win all the big ones some day", he says, and adds, "And I'd like to be named some year's outstanding putter". Obviously he thinks the two go together.

Bob says of Tour life, "Most of us can't take time off and we get tired and pick up flaws."

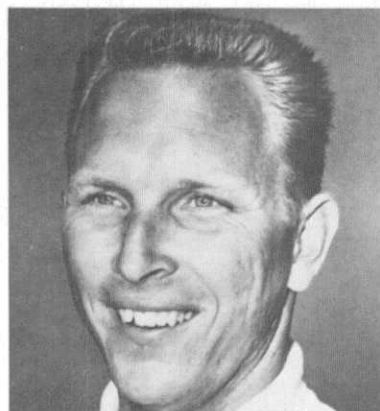

1971 RECAP: Fred Marti regained a position in the top 60 in 1971, and he is no doubt a big supporter of the satellite tournament program. Fred won the United Ontario Open, played opposite the Hawaiian Open, and that victory spurred him to his best season as a professional with \$58,740.

In 31 tournaments, Marti finished in the money 23 times with six top 10 finishes. In addition to his United win, Fred tied for ninth in the PGA Championship and was third in the Magnolia Classic, another

satellite. He tied for third in the Colonial National Invitational, was runnerup in the Kaiser Open, and tied for seventh in the Sahara Invitational.

Marti's success in 1971 appears to stem from strong finishing rounds. In the 23 tournaments he finished, Fred played the last round in par or better 17 times, including a 65 in the Magnolia. In both the Kaiser and Sahara, he appeared out of the running after two rounds but finished with 68-67 in the former and 67-69 at Sahara.

PRIOR YEARS: Fred Marti, Jr., a second generation PGA member, didn't take up golf seriously until he was 19. Some of the talents of his Dad and his Uncle Elroy, a one-time tour player, have brushed off on Junior.

Young Fred started thinking of a golf career in 1959, when he entered U. of Houston. He made the golf team, won the 1963 NCAA championship and was picked on the college All-America team. He turned pro in 1964 and joined the circuit.

He hurt his back the next year, temporarily stalling his plans. After his back healed, his Dad and Uncle Elroy made a careful study of young Fred's progress as a player and estimated his Tour potential. It

was a good report, and Marti hit the trail again.

Marti shot up onto the coveted exemption list in 1968, via 17 straight finishes in the money. He maintained the pace in 1969 when he ran up a 20 "in-the-money" string. A slump season in 1970 sent him back to Monday qualifying ordeals. His best finish was a third in the Tallahassee Open.

As a schoolboy, Marti was an outstanding catcher and hoped for a big league offer. But when baseball scouts dangled large bonuses in front of his pitchers instead, young Fred decided the family golf tradition might be a better course.

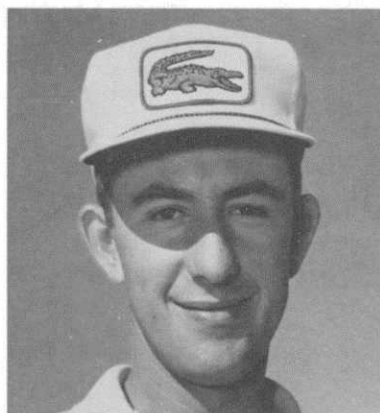

1971 RECAP: If the Tour had a hardluck award, the leading candidate for 1971 would be Jerry McGee. After four struggling years on the Tour, McGee appeared to have his game in shape this year and on the verge of victory. However, a wrist injury forced him to withdraw from the Canadian Open early in July and he never returned to competition.

Nonetheless, McGee became an exempt player for the first time in his career, the result of piling up earnings of \$54,359 during the first half of the season. In 26 events he was in the money 21 times and in

the top 10 five times.

Jerry made his first impressive showing in the National Airlines Open when he came from well back in the field with a closing six under par 66 to gain third place behind Gary Player and Lee Trevino. Next, he tied for second in the Byron Nelson Classic on the strength of an opening 66 and a finishing 65, and he added a tie for seventh in the Colonial National Invitational.

His final top 10 finish was the Cleveland Open, where he returned 67-69-67-68 to tie for fourth, one week before the injury sidelined him from the rest of the year.

PRIOR YEARS: Onetime Buckeye golfer Jerry McGee, who earned his ticket for the Tour at the 1966 Qualifying School, encountered lean pickings in his first three years on Tour. However the \$22,965.82 he picked up in 1970 brought a ray of sunshine.

That year he started in 39 events and finished 23 times in the money. Tour experience had smoothed the rough edges of his game to the point where play was becoming more consistent. But he must also have suspected he was no favorite of Lady Luck. At the outset of the '69 campaign when he was trying to light a scoring bonfire, he twice came up with 70s in the Kaiser Open only to have each score washed out by rain.

A fellow inclined to speak his mind.

McGee grabbed some amusing headlines last May when his opening score of 66 led the field in the weather-plagued Byron Nelson Open. He finished with an even finer 65 to tie Frank Beard for second behind Jack Nicklaus. Called in for customary interview with the press, McGee took the opportunity of informing the press that he didn't think much of the term "Rabbit," which the scribes use to describe the Monday qualifiers. Jerry referred particularly to one Dallas headline which blared, "Rabbit Leads Nelson Open."

"Can you name me one player out here who resembles in any manner, shape or form a rabbit", he asked indignantly. The writers good-naturedly asked him to come up with a better one-word description. Jerry passed.

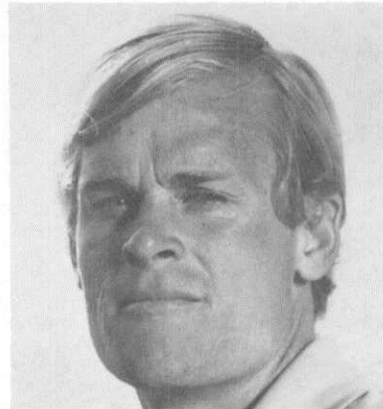

1971 RECAP: Johnny Miller reached the peak of a fine year when he carded a final-round 67 to romp to easy victory in the Southern Open.

It was the first victory for Miller, who has been a strong money-winner since joining the Tour in late 1969. However, the highlight of Johnny's season came much earlier in the year and not in victory. With closing rounds of 68-68, Miller tied Jack Nicklaus for second in the Masters. That supplied all the confidence he needed. "That's when I knew I could play with the big boys," he says.

In 33 tournaments in 1971, Miller finished in the money 27 times and had nine

finishes in the top 10. In addition to the Southern and the Masters, he tied for third in the Jacksonville Open, where he three-putted the last green to miss by a stroke of tying Gary Player and Hal Underwood. He shared fifth in both the U.S. Open and the Atlanta Classic, challenging to win the latter until he drove out of bounds on the 72nd hole.

Instances such as the three putts at Jacksonville and the errant tee shot at Atlanta have caused some of the doubt about the Californian, but the record indicates Miller is a strong player the last day. In the 27 tournaments he finished, he shot par or better the last day 23 times!

PRIOR YEARS: In 1966 a tall, blond, photogenic amateur from San Francisco named John Lawrence Miller, 19 years old, placed eighth in the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club. He was a challenger all the way.

Partisan natives predicted a bright career for the prodigy who, in 1964, had won the U.S. Junior championship. Before his flash in the Open he had earned All-American rating at Brigham Young U.

When Johnny went to the 1969 Qualifying School he won easy induction, and went on to make the cut in the first seven events. He picked up a quick \$8,364 before the end of the season.

Cashing \$52,391 of prizes in 1970 and

\$91,081 more in 1971, Miller has pocketed \$150,616.55 in just a bit over two years.

At the outset of the 1970 campaign he came up with a 61 in the third round of the Phoenix Open. Jim Jamieson, playing with him, says it could have been a 57 or 58 "if some lipped-out putts had dropped".

Miller has a counselor now, a fellow Mormon named Billy Casper.

"Mr. Casper taught me how to play percentages", says Miller.

While Miller has gained confidence he lacked at the start, he still goes back to John Geertsen, pro at San Francisco C.C., for advance. Miller started taking lessons from John at the age of 7, two years after he swung his first club.

1971 RECAP: Bobby Mitchell scored his first victory on the Tour in 1971 and he did so with overwhelming strength. With 66-64-67-65—262, Mitchell won the Cleveland Open by seven strokes and his total score was second only to Miller Barber's 261 in Phoenix for the 1971 Tour low.

After blowing a lead the last day of the Azalea Open in 1970, Mitchell was being carefully watched as he went into the final round as the leader in Cleveland. He

provided the answer early as he promptly birdied the first three holes.

Mitchell had a busy and productive year in 1971. In 35 tournaments he was in the money 29 times and had top 10 finishes in five events. He also equaled the low round of the year when he carded a third-round 62 enroute to third place in the Southern Open.

In addition, Bobby tied for fifth in the Azalea Open and closed the season with a share of eighth in the Bahamas Open, coming from well back with a closing 67.

PRIOR YEARS: Bobby Mitchell, of Danville, Va., who has been a professional for 14 years, never played as an amateur.

Mitchell quit the tenth grade in high school at the age of 15 because "I wasn't getting good grades and anyway I spent more time on the golf course than in the classroom".

Within the year he was an assistant to Al Smith, the pro at Danville C.C. A pro at 15! By 1965, at the age of 22, he felt ready to head out on the Tour.

He theorized it would take two years to get started. He was right. His take for the two trips around the horn netted only \$5,029. Bobby did not let that discourage him, although he admits "I was scared. I

wasn't sure I really belonged—just an ol' Virginia kid who had won a couple of State Opens."

It got better in 1968 when Mitchell jumped to \$20,699, and in 1969 Bobby moved up to \$34,155 and to \$36,342 in 1970. After the latter, he earned exemption from Monday qualifiers. As a PGA member he didn't have to attend a TPD school.

Bobby made the 1971 Masters, a heady thing for a Danville boy, by finishing among the low 16 in the 1970 U.S. Open Championship. Just being at Augusta made him realize he could play with the best. He came close to winning a berth on the 1971 Ryder Cup team. He finished just behind Gibby Gilbert in the point standing for selection.

1971 RECAP: Bob Murphy did not win a tournament in 1971, a fact which must be distressing to the 1968 Rookie of the Year, but he nonetheless maintained his position among the Tour's most productive money makers.

Bob's performance chart was the most consistent of his still young career. He failed to complete 72 holes in ten tournaments,

and during the rich summer segment of the Tour, missed the 36-hole cut in five of six consecutive events.

He posted eight finishes in the top 10 and was third on three occasions — the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, Houston Champions and American Golf Classic. He also tied for fourth in the Monsanto Open, where he returned four rounds of 70.

PRIOR YEARS: Bob Murphy, who insists he is fat, not rotund, has earned \$352,890 in four years, is best remembered for his sensational impact as a rookie in 1968. He not only won tournaments back to back, but took second in the rich Westchester Classic all in the space of three weeks. No freshman has come close to matching that since.

Born in Brooklyn, N. Y. but now a Floridian, Murphy, who stands 5-10 and weighs 215, is a golfing enigma. He did not take up golf until he was 19. A standout pitcher, he had earned a scholarship at Florida U., but a shoulder injury sidetracked him and he had to find another sport.

A fine, strong athlete belied by his build, Murphy took up golf, got friendly with the coach and wangled his way on the team. Three years later he won the U.S. Amateur

and the NCAA championships, and was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup and World Amateur Teams.

Finishing college, Bob passed through the Fall 1967 Qualifying School. Without ado he moved into the elite corps of the troupe with his spectacular mid-summer burst. After finishing second in the Westchester Classic, with all the big guns on hand, he won the Philadelphia and Thunderbird Opens on successive weekends. His earnings for the year were \$105,595. His third tournament win came in the 1970 Hartford.

"Timing is the name of the game", he vows. "I learned on the Tour how to make a bogey. When you get in trouble, keep cool, take the bogey, don't blow up — then you've a chance at a bird on the very next hole".

1971 RECAP: Bobby Nichols is frequently referred to as "the club pro from Akron, Ohio," but the former PGA Champion remains one of the finest players in professional golf.

Nichols' strength lies in his consistency. In 27 events, Bobby failed to survive the 36-hole cut only once and placed in the top 10 seven times. (Oddly enough, Bobby missed the cut in the American Golf Classic

— on his home course.) In compiling that record, Nichols returned 34 rounds under 70, and only once was he higher than 75. One more fact: In seven tournaments he never had a round over par.

Bobby's best finish came in the Western Open, where he was second to Bruce Crampton after sharing the third round lead.

His scoring average of 70.8 placed him fifth among the Tour regulars.

PRIOR YEARS: Tall, trim Bobby Nichols looks acts and plays like a golf champion. He also has the profitable habit of playing his best in the big events.

Golf was one of Bob's lesser sports when he was the football and basketball star at St. Xavier High in Louisville, Ky. College scouts were in hot pursuit until a car crash threatened to wipe out his athletic career. A broken pelvis, a brain concussion and spinal damage were among his injuries. He was hospitalized for more than three months. During his recuperation he turned more and more to golf.

Bob's game developed fully at Texas A. & M., where he won the 1956 Southwest Conference title. After graduating with a degree in business in 1958, he got the bug for the Tour.

Nichols started slowly in 1960, but by 1962 he had his first Tour victory — in fact, two of them — St. Petersburg and Houston. Since then, he has taken down some of the gaudiest prizes on the Tour. In 1964, he won the PGA Championship and the lucrative Carling World Open.

He missed winning the 1967 Masters by one shot, when his old pal, Gay Brewer, shot a 67, but in 1968, he won the PGA Team Championship with George Archer. His biggest haul on the Tour, however, came in the 1970 Dow Jones, where his prize was \$60,000.

Nichols received the Ben Hogan Award in 1962 for his courageous recovery from his severe injuries. He was named to the U.S. Ryder Cup team in 1967. Bob is the head professional at the Firestone C.C., in Ohio.

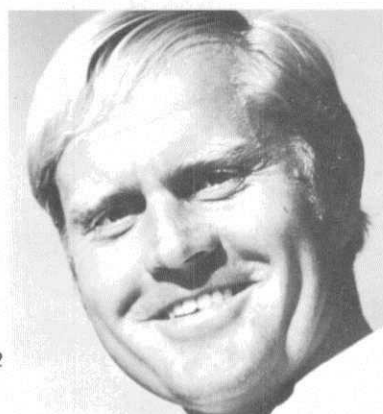

1971 RECAP: Jack Nicklaus did not win the Grand Slam in 1971 and, for that reason alone, the season was not personally satisfying. But it would still be hard to improve on the record he compiled.

In 18 tournaments, Nicklaus was in the money in every event. He was among the top 10 in 15 tournaments — among the top three

11 times. And, in 54 rounds, he broke par 37 times and equaled it five other times.

Jack ran his major championship total to 11 by winning the PGA Championship, then added the Tournament of Champions by a season — high edge of eight strokes, the Byron Nelson Classic and the National Team, the latter in partnership with Arnold Palmer.

PRIOR YEARS: Each new year Jack William Nicklaus sets a transcendent goal — to win the modern Grand Slam. Of course every Tour player would like to win the U.S. Open, the British Open, the PGA Championship and the Masters all in one year. But Jack, most golf observers concede, has a most realistic chance of pulling it off.

After ten years on the Tour, Nicklaus has won virtually every title and honor in golf.

Last year, after winning his second PGA title, he became the first to ever win all four of the "Slam" events at least twice. Before turning pro in 1962, Jack had won the U.S. Amateur in 1959 and '61.

Nicklaus was named PGA Player-of-the-Year for 1967, topped the money list in 1964, '65, '67, and '71 — when he set a new record with \$244,490—and has been on two U. S. Ryder Cup teams.

1971 RECAP: Arnold Palmer rebounded from the most disappointing season of his professional career.

After a dismal 1970 season in which he failed to win a U.S. Tour title for the first time since he became a professional in 1955, Palmer came back to capture four victories in 1971 and won more money than he ever has in a single season.

Arnold won the Bob Hope Desert Classic in sudden death playoff with Ray Floyd, took the Florida Citrus Open with four consecutive sub-70 rounds and then romped to a five-stroke victory in the Westchester.

Palmer's fourth victory came in the National Team Championship with Jack Nicklaus.

PRIOR YEARS: The son of a golf professional-greenkeeper, Arnold Palmer grew up on the golf course in his native Latrobe, Pa. Even by the time he was barely able to shoulder a bag it seemed that golf would be his life, too. A tour at Wake College U. and another in the U.S. Coast Guard preceded his decision to turn

professional in November, 1954.

Setting out with a young bride and a second-hand trailer in 1955, Palmer found the winner's circle early, capturing the Canadian Open.

Palmer has won virtually every major golf event and honor — with the exception of the PGA Championship.

1971 RECAP: Gary Player did his usual again in 1971, coming over for brief visits and taking a \$120,916 in U.S. currency back to his native South Africa.

Gary was the only player of the year to score individual victories in successive weeks, defeating young Hal Underwood in a playoff in Jacksonville and then outshooting Lee Trevino to win the next week in the National Airlines Open.

Player made money in each of his 14 starts in the U.S. and was in the top 10 eight

events. In addition to his victories, Gary tied for second in the Tournament of Champions and Kemper Open, losing in a playoff to Tom Weiskopf in the latter, and tied for third in the Atlanta Classic where he finished one stroke behind Gardner Dickinson and Jack Nicklaus.

As is his history, Player thrived on consistency. In 56 Tour rounds, he was three times under 68 and once over 75. He had 28 sub-par rounds and another 10 at par.

PRIOR YEARS: Player stands with Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan and Jack Nicklaus as the only golfers who have won golf's four major titles—the U.S. Open ('65), British Open ('59) PGA Championship ('62) and Masters ('61). Player won the British crown for a second time in 1968.

While he currently ranks sixth in career earnings, his total number of victories on the

Tour—13—is well down the list. Triumphs in foreign championships and other events, however, add substantially to the total. He has finished among the top ten on the money list seven times in the last 11 years, including 1961, when he was first with \$64,540. Player did not start playing golf until he was 15, his first teacher being Jock Verwey, now his father-in-law.

1971 RECAP: Two or three high finishing rounds prevented Phil Rodgers from reentering the winner's circle in 1971, but the rotund Californian still surpassed his previous best year in take-home-pay from the Tour.

Phil easily bettered his banner season of 1966 when he won two tournaments and \$68,360, and he did so through regular trips to the pay window. In 35 tournaments, Phil was in the money 30 times and in the top 10

six times.

Rodgers' finest showing came in the inaugural U.S. Professional Match Play Championship in which he bowed to DeWitt Weaver. Phil returned a 5-over-par 77 in the finale to Weaver's 71 and that was just one of three poor finishes which kept him from victory. In both the Colonial Invitational and the Western Open, a fourth round in par would have placed him first, but he returned 74 and 77, respectively.

PRIOR YEARS: Phil Rodgers came on the Tour trail at 23 and took off like a moon shot. In less than a year and a half of play he bagged two tournaments and had pocketed more than \$40,000 by the end of 1962.

When Phil won both the Los Angeles and the Tucson in his sophomore year, he brought new hope to young and ambitious golfers everywhere. Rodgers also added to his stature by finishing just behind Nicklaus and Palmer in the 1962 U.S. Open, fighting back after a calamitous 8 during the first round.

He continued his spree in 1963, when he won the Texas Open and was runner-up to

Bob Charles in the British Open. Then his first slump set in. He didn't reach the winner's circle again until 1966, when he took the Doral and the Buick and set his high mark of \$68,360.

Partly due to a hand injury brought on by an admirer's crushing handshake, Rodgers' play tailed off in 1967 and the slump continued into '68.

Phil started golf at age ten. He won the International Jaycee Junior Crown at 17, and went on to Houston U. He won the NCAA championship in 1967 and also reached the quarter finals of the U.S. Amateur.

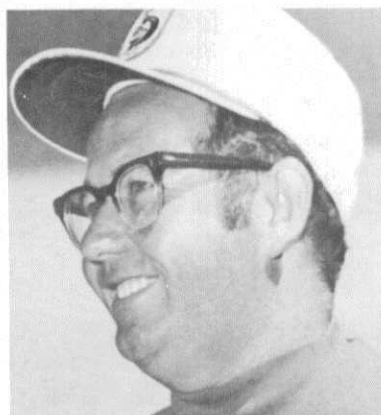

1971 RECAP: Although Rosburg failed to produce a victory on the 1971 Tour, he enjoyed the most successful season of his career from a financial standpoint. On the strength of several strong finishes, Rosburg earned \$56,044 during the 1971 season.

Rosburg was at his best on courses which are considered the most difficult. His best finish of the year came on the tight Merion course in Ardmore, Pa., where he tied for third in the U.S. Open. He also was fifth in

the Canadian Open, tied for ninth in the PGA Championship and shared seventh in the Colonial National.

Bob also contributed two of the finest individual efforts of the season. In the Colonial National, a second round of 66 was the best of the tournament, and just the week prior he set a course record of seven under par 64 in the Houston Champions.

Rosburg had the knack of playing 72 holes, missing the cut six times in 28 events.

PRIOR YEARS: Bob Rosburg, embarking on his 20th tour year, has had an unusually variegated golf career. The zenith, of course, was 1959, when he won the PGA Championship at Minneapolis, and finished second behind Billy Casper in the U.S. Open at Winged Foot in New York. This gave him seventh place on the money list (\$31,676) — his highest position ever.

Rosburg, a baseball star at Stanford U., where he received his degree in 1948, turned pro in 1953 and hit the trail the following

year.

As a rookie, Rosburg won the Brawley and Miami Opens, yet garnered merely \$8,662. since purses were still modest in those days. In 1956, he again hit a double with victories in the Motor City and the San Diego events. The last of his six Tour triumphs was in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am in 1961, when his earnings hit \$26,848.

Bob's most recent return as a full-time tourist came after he won the 1970 Club Professional Championship.

1971 RECAP: The year 1971 wasn't the most successful in Mason Rudolph's career, but it will certainly be one of the most memorable.

After suffering through dismal seasons in 1968 and 1969, Mason bounced back in 1970 to win the Green Island Open, and in 1971 his "comeback" was climaxed by selection to the U.S. Ryder Cup team.

Fourth-round problems plagued Rudolph much of the year and on at least two

occasions may have prevented him from winning. In the Monsanto Open he closed with a 73 to tie for sixth after sharing the 54-hole lead, and in the Florida Citrus Open, a finishing 75 dropped him to a tie for 21st after being only two strokes off the third-round lead. His only fourth rounds under 70 came in the Westchester Classic, where he returned a 65 to finish tied for sixth, and in the Disney World, when a 68 got him a share of 26th place.

PRIOR YEARS: Bespectacled Mason Rudolph, who describes himself as a "li'l ol' country boy from Clarksville, Tenn.," has been quietly piling up \$407,902 in 12 years on the Tour, and now stands among the top 30 all-time earners.

Rudolph joined the Tour in 1959 and had his first tournament victory in his twelfth start — the Golden Gate Open. For his auspicious start he was cited as "Rookie of the Year." Prior to turning pro, Rudolph attended both Tennessee and Memphis State and was a standout amateur. He won the Tennessee Amateur, the 1950 U.S. Junior, and was semi-finalist in the 1957 U.S.

Amateur. He was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup and Americas Cup teams in 1956.

After dropping to 83rd place (\$20,967) on the money list in 1969, Rudolph's future on the Tour seemed in question. But he bounced back in 1970 to win the Green Island in a dramatic finish. He shot a closing round 64 to snatch the victory from Chris Blocker, who had at one point in the final heat had enjoyed a four-shot lead. The win came on Rudolph's twelfth wedding anniversary, and most appropriately, the prize was \$12,000.

1971 RECAP: John Schlee got off to a fast start in 1971 and that propelled him to his first top 60 finish since his 1966, when he was named Rookie of the Year.

Schlee opened the season with a tie for 12th in the Los Angeles Open, followed with a tie for seventh in the San Diego Open and a share of eighth in Hawaii. He was never out of the top 60 money winners the rest of the year.

Although his best finish was a tie for fourth in the National Team Championship with Bob E. Smith, Schlee accomplished his

best earning season to date as result of 10 finishes in the low 15.

John frequently exhibited talents to become a winner on the Tour but was never able to avoid one bad round each week, and the middle two rounds were often the problem. He had seven opening rounds and nine finishing rounds in the 60s, but had only four such efforts in the middle rounds. Such inconsistency also resulted in his failure to survive the 36-hole cut in 11 of 36 events in which he started.

PRIOR YEARS: John Schlee, tall, ex-college star from Memphis State U., was valedictorian of the first Qualifying School late in 1965.

In his first year on the Tour he more than fulfilled the most-likely-to-succeed label by winning \$21,442 and earning Rookie-of-the-Year laurels.

John tailed off to \$15,224 in 1967, but he got off to a good start in 1968, piling up over \$12,000 in the first four months. When the Tour reached his old college days haunts

for the Memphis Open, however, his game faltered again. Thereafter, the checks were scarce. In 1969, the lean weeks continued and his earnings hit his all-time low of \$12,808. But in 1970 he came back to a \$27,679, and, finally, in 1971 he made the elite 60 list with his biggest season ever — \$47,815.

He's still looking for his first Tour win.

Schlee, a native of Colorado, graduated from Memphis State in 1964, and did a hitch with the paratroopers before turning pro.

1971 RECAP: To say that Tom Shaw is inconsistent is almost an understatement. He is an infrequent star in golf's galaxy, but when he shines, he shines brightly.

Shaw's fans — and they are many — never know what to expect. In 1971 he did things like 82-69 in the Houston Champions, or 68-78-68 the next week at Fort Worth. For the year he had a total of 18 rounds over 75 and on three occasions failed to break 80. His scoring average of 72.5 placed him 90th among active players on the Tour, but his earnings placed him in the top 20 with \$96,220. That despite the fact that he failed

to make money in 13 of 35 starts.

Tom has an enviable quality, and that is an ability to put it all together for an entire tournament. In all of 1971, he had a total of just 38 sub-par rounds, but 12 of them came in three tournaments. He led all the way with four consecutive under-par efforts in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, and was again below par all the way in winning the Hawaiian Open. And, in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, he was below par in four of five rounds en route to a tie for 10th. His only other top 10 finish came in the Bahamas National, where he shared 10th.

PRIOR YEARS: Tom Shaw is a blithe, blond spirit with a big smile, a golfer who readily admits he is a "streak player." It is an accurate analysis.

Tom, who lists Dec. 13, 1942 as his birth date, was a four-sport high school star before he went on to the U. of Oregon. After getting his degree at Oregon U. in 1962, Tom turned pro the following year. He created no waves on the tour for several years, then suddenly burst forth in 1969 to win \$83,332. Victories in the Doral and Avco Opens, helped him make the fantastic

jump from 100th to 16th on the list.

In 1966 Shaw's golf career seemed doomed when he was seriously injured in an auto crash on the way to the Bob Hope Classic. Doctors told him his back was broken, feared he never would play again. Tom recovered, stayed off the Tour and became an assistant pro at a Chicago club while his back got stronger.

He rejoined the circuit in late 1968 and made \$13,972. After his big '69 production, Shaw cooled down to a \$34,000 campaign in 1970 as a prelude to last season's big success.

1971 RECAP: Dan Sikes did not have one of his better years in 1971, and the biggest reason was an inability to put four good rounds together. In fact, only once during the season did Sikes have four consecutive rounds under par, and that came in the Phoenix Open where he started with 66 and finished with 64 to tie for second place.

Otherwise, Dan had just five finishes in the top 10 in 27 tournaments entered, and

he had only 18 additional rounds under 70. His second best finish came in the Houston Champions International where he carded a closing 66 to tie for fifth. He was also eighth in the Byron Nelson Classic and the Cleveland Open, the latter on the strength of a 64-67 start which had him in the lead.

Sikes' other top 10 finishes were ties for 10th in the National Airlines Open and the National Team with Mason Rudolph.

PRIOR YEARS: Dan Sikes, now 42 and on his twelfth Tour trek has won nothing since the 1968 Minnesota Classic — but money. About \$218,000.

The Tour's only fully-accredited lawyer (member of the Florida Bar Association), Sikes did not join the Tour until he was in his 30's. Prior to that he played No. 1 on the U. of Florida golf team, attended law school, and did a hitch in the U.S. Army. In the service, incidentally, he won the All-Army Championship, and before he turned pro he took down the 1957 U.S. Public Links Championship.

Dan joined the Tour in 1961 and made a

steady climb up the ladder after earning \$6,616.

A winner of six Tour events, Sikes is best remembered at the Westchester Classic for finishing second. On the second day of play in 1969, Sikes, ill and playing badly, picked up and headed for home. Before he could get going, a late afternoon storm washed out all scores. For the next two days, rain wiped the slate clean each time. When it finally cleared, Sikes shot a record 62 and chased winner Jack Nicklaus to the wire. He collected \$17,750 for second.

Dan has been a Player-Director on the TPD Policy Board.

1971 RECAP: Bob E. Smith retained spot among the top 60 official leaders in 1971 despite finishing in the top 10 only five times and the top five just once. He did it on the strength of 13 finishes in the top 25 and 27 finishes in the money.

Smith's best finish came in the National Team Championship, where he teamed with John Schlee for a share of fourth place. On his own he tied for ninth in both the Monsanto and the Tucson Opens, and shared

10th in the National Airlines and the Azalea Opens.

Bob's best chance to score his first victory came in the opening event of the year, the Los Angeles Open. With 66-69 he led by three strokes after two rounds but closed with 75-74 for a share of 28th place. That 66, and a closing 65 in the Greater Greensboro Open, where Smith's best rounds of the year.

PRIOR YEARS: Smith is a common name but Bob E. Smith from Sacramento, Calif., is no common or garden variety of golfer. Since he came on the circuit via the Fall 1967 Qualifying School, this well-built 30-year-old swinger has played his way to a very comfortable living.

Bob has a sound game which has kept him solvent all four of his years on the Tour, although he has not scored a victory. As a novice in 1968, he earned \$30,044, slumped to \$22,851 the next year, and went back up to \$30,662 in 1970.

Smith came to the Tour after two years in the Army. Prior to that he earned a B.S. at Sacramento State College and as an amateur won the California Amateur in

1967. This is no small achievement in a state loaded with fine young players.

Smith is one of the longer hitters off the tee, a good putter and a cool competitor. Seldom satisfied with his greens efforts, Smith is ready to experiment with almost anything that might improve him. In 1969, he even went to a cross-handed grip, after watching Harold Henning use it so well. It worked fine for 36 holes, especially the first two rounds of the Colonial Open which he led with 136. But he went back to the orthodox style when his last two rounds plummeted him far down the list.

Smith never has won a tournament, but he is regarded as a very consistent player.

1971 RECAP: After several unsuccessful seasons during which he was known as "Sam Snead's nephew," J.C. Snead made a name for himself by winning the Tucson Open and the Doral Open within the space of three weeks.

Snead scored his first victory in a close battle with Dale Douglass at Tucson, starting and finishing with rounds of 66 for a one-stroke edge. Then, two weeks later, he finished 66-69 to beat Gardner Dickinson by a stroke for the Doral title.

Those two victories boosted Snead to a

place on the U.S. Ryder Cup team, and he was unbeaten in four Cup matches.

J.C. had four additional top 10 finishes, the best being a tie for second in the Greater Hartford Open, where he and Lou Graham were beaten by George Archer in a sudden death playoff. He also tied for sixth in the Robinson Classic and for seventh, with Bobby Mitchell, in the National Team Championship.

Snead had 27 rounds under 70 during the season and eight times was 66 or better. His best was 65 at Phoenix and Hartford.

PRIOR YEARS: Until he was 22, J. C. (Jesse Carlyle) Snead looked at golf as the game which made his famous Uncle Sam wealthy. Baseball was J.C.'s bag.

An all-around athlete in Hot Springs, Va., J.C. got a bonus from the Washington Senators to play outfield after a .450 hitting average in high school. Four years later, a double-A performer with a .318 average, somebody in Washington dropped him to Class A.

J.C. retired without ado and decided to move over to golf, which he had taken up belatedly. Charlie Beverage, former Hot

Springs pro who had moved to White Plains, N.Y., gave him an assistant's job.

By 1968, J.C. had his game going well enough to prompt a group of his Century C.C. members to finance him on the Tour.

His hopes kept alive with \$10,640 earned in 1969, and \$11,547 in 1970. His best finish, a sixth in the 1970 Robinson Open, vaguely hinted of future possibilities, but not as startling as J.C. produced.

Nephew Snead resembles Sam facially, but is bigger (6-2 and 200) and better haired. His swing doesn't have the same ineffable grace, but it is sound, strong and natural.

1971 RECAP: Inconsistency plagued Still throughout the 1971 season, but he managed to put it all together enough times to gain a place among the top 60. Only five times in 35 tournaments did Ken post four rounds of par or better and he had a unimpressive 72.3 stroke average.

However, three top 10 finishes including third place in the inaugural U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, netted him

earnings of \$43,660. His other top 10 finishes were a tie for sixth in the Masters and a tie for eighth in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic. In the latter event, Still posted a finishing 63, one of the best rounds of the year.

In the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, Still lost in the semifinals to Phil Rodgers but rebounded to defeat Bruce Crampton in the match for third place.

PRIOR YEARS: Kenneth Allan Still was groomed to be a baseball player by his father, a bus company mechanic in Tacoma. Ken responded with enthusiasm, becoming the regular third baseman at Clover Park High when he was only a sophomore. But then it happened. He went out to the Firecrest Golf Club to investigate the possibilities of becoming a caddie and made a dramatic discovery.

"One visit to the club and the flight of the ball got me," Ken recalls. "I fell in love with golf. I never played baseball again."

Ken became a pro in 1953, when he was

18, but didn't try the Tour until 1960. It took him some five years to break into the top 100.

Still tramped the circuit for eight years before he notched his first victory, but then he found it was just as easy to take two. In 1969, he won the Florida Citrus and followed this with a victory in the Greater Milwaukee. It enabled him to hit \$72,514 on the money list — his most profitable year.

Ken's other Tour triumph came in the 1970 Kaiser, which he accomplished in sudden-death over Lee Trevino and Bert Yancey.

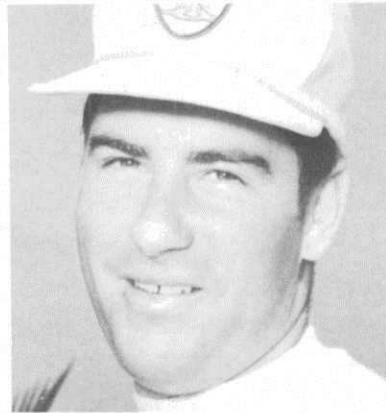

1971 RECAP: Stockton scored his sixth Tour triumph and remained one of the game's leading players in 1971. Although he did not compete after Labor Day, Dave compiled earnings of \$85,738, a large part of that coming as result of his victory in the Massachusetts Classic, where he came from behind in the last round with 66.

As usual, Stockton was a very consistent

performer. In 27 starts he was in the money 24 times and the top 10 six times. In addition to his victory, Dave tied for sixth in the Florida Citrus Open, tied for ninth in the Masters, tied for second in the Tournament of Champions, tied for fourth in the Greater Hartford Open, and advanced to the round of 16 in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship.

PRIOR YEARS: On his way to winning the 1970 PGA Championship at Southern Hills C.C., Tulsa, Dave Stockton chided a local sports writer. "After my round today, couldn't you make it 'partially unknown' the next time you write about me?" he asked, after his third-round 66 took the lead in the Championship.

Stockton isn't as well-publicized as some of the other stars on the Tour, but he takes a back seat to none in shot-making consistency. From a self-avowed scrambler when he joined the Tour back in 1964, the former captain of the U. of Southern California golf team (as was his father), has become a model of steadiness.

Dave's winnings over his first three years

on the circuit barely exceeded \$16,000. In his past five years he has chalked up more than \$400,000. The surge started in 1967, when he won the Colonial National and the Haig Scotch Foursome. He had another pair the next year — Cleveland and Milwaukee — before he took the PGA crown in 1970.

A descendant of a Declaration of Independence signer from New Jersey, Stockton didn't take up golf seriously until he was 17. His father is a former pro who regained his amateur status and went into the sporting goods business. Dave played amateur competition long enough to triumph in the same 14 events his father had won as a youth. And, also like his father, Dave was a college All-America.

1971 RECAP: One unbelievable stretch of 11 weeks during the early summer was all it took to make Lee Trevino the 1971 Player of the Year. In those 11 weeks, Trevino won the National Open titles of the U.S., Canada and Britain, plus the Tallahassee Open and Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, and missed winning three other times by a mere stroke.

Lee started his triumphant spree with victory in the Tallahassee Open. He withdrew after one round a week later at New Orleans, but followed with a tie for fifth in the Byron Nelson Classic, a tie for third at Houston, where he was one shot back of Hubert Green and Don January, and

a tie for 12th in the Colonial National Invitational. The next week at Memphis he won going away with 66-66-69-67—268, missed by one stroke of tying Gardner Dickinson and Jack Nicklaus at Atlanta, and lost a playoff to Tom Weiskopf in the Kemper Open. Then he defeated Jack Nicklaus to win the U.S. Open, downed Art Wall in the Canadian Open, and edged Taiwan's Lu Liang Huan for the British Open.

An appendectomy halted Lee late in the season but he came back to score another victory, rallying the final day with 66 to win the Sahara Invitational.

PRIOR YEARS: An incredible aspect of Lee Trevino's rags-to-riches saga is that it all started only five years ago, when he was polishing clubs and shining shoes as an assistant in Texas. In the spring of 1967, his wife sent his entry to the local qualifier for the U.S. Open. They could ill-afford the \$20 fee. Lee went all the way, finished fifth at Baltusrol, won \$6,000. Since then he has done everything but walk across the water.

Raised near Dallas by his grandfather, a grave-digger, Lee went as far as the eighth

grade before he had to work. He became a handyman at a pitch-and-putt course and also learned to play. But it was during a four-year hitch in the Marines that his game developed.

After the Marines, it was back to a \$30-a-week assistant's post in El Paso. Some play in local events. Marriage. And, finally, a fateful entry for the '67 Open.

If the golf world wondered about Trevino at Baltusrol, all the questions were answered when he won the 1968 U.S. Open.

1971 RECAP: Art Wall was Masters Champion, Player of the Year and leading money winner back in 1959, but 1971 was his most successful season from a monetary standpoint.

Although he failed to win, Art played some of the finest golf of his career in 1971, placing in the top 10 four times and two times the top three. He earned \$54,644, bettering by more than a \$1,000 his winning year of 1959.

Wall came within inches of winning twice during 1971, a bogie on the 72nd hole keeping him out of a playoff with Bob Lunn and Billy Casper in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, and losing to Lee Trevino in a playoff for the Canadian Open title.

Art also tied for ninth in the Andy Williams San Diego Open and the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, and he finished third in the Panama Open on the Caribbean circuit.

PRIOR YEARS: Arthur J. Wall, Jr. can vouch for the fantastic growth of purses on the Tour. In 1959, when Art won the Masters and three other Tour events to virtually dominate the circuit, he won \$53,167 and was the leading money winner. Some 22 years later, he was able to show a bigger profit for his efforts without even hitting the winner's circle.

Art is one of 11 veterans in the 40-and-over category who stand among the top 60 exempt players. This is a testimonial to the durability of tournament players, and

particularly to Wall, who would never be mistaken for a weight-lifter.

Wall, a graduate of Duke in 1949, turned pro and joined the Tour that same year. He didn't break into the win column until 1953, when he won the Fort Wayne Open. He has won a total of 13 Tour events, plus another eight victories on the Caribbean Tour. In his blockbuster year of 1959, his triumphs included the Bing Crosby, the Buick and the Azalea, as well as the Masters. He was also named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

1971 RECAP: DeWitt Weaver scored his first Tour victory during 1971, and he picked a good one. Against one of the best fields ever assembled, Weaver battled his way through tense elimination rounds to triumph in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship.

En route to that victory, DeWitt defeated George Archer, Doug Sanders, Julius Boros, Lou Graham, Bruce Crampton and Phil Rodgers. Only once was he over par for the

tough C.C. of North Carolina course.

Weaver, once an erratic long hitter, was a much more consistent player throughout the 1971 season, finishing in the top 10 five times prior to his victory. He was third in the Hawaiian Open, leading through the first 69 holes, and tied for sixth in the Tucson Open, and seventh in the Houston Champions, where he was the 54 hole leader. He was ninth in the Canadian Open.

PRIOR YEARS: Who's the longest hitter on the Tour? When Tour players consider the question many names are tossed into the hopper and DeWitt Weaver is always one of them. In fact, some say he rates the most votes of all.

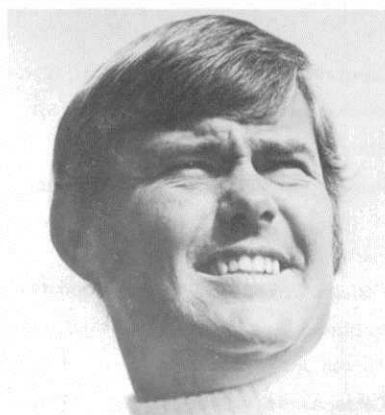
For all his power, however, Weaver remained a lesser known tourist in his early years on the circuit. Observers claim it was because he was so busy looking for his cannonades in the rough — the inevitable fate of all-out hitters.

But 1971 may have produced a wiser, less distance-minded Weaver, the reigning U.S. Professional Match Play champion. His upsurge produced \$38,000 more than the

total of all his previous years.

Weaver, a Kentuckian, didn't start out a golfer. An all-star schoolboy quarterback in Lubbock, Tex., Weaver arrived at Southern Methodist on a scholarship while Don Meredith was guiding the Mustangs to annual glory. Two years on the bench led Weaver to turn to golf. He became a pro in 1963, and made his Tour debut the next year.

Weaver says, "I found out I couldn't play a lick." So he took the head pro job at Cairo C.C., Cairo, Ga., and started working on his game. By 1967, he thought he was ready and tried the Qualifying School. DeWitt and Rives McBee finished in the last two of the 32 places open.

1971 RECAP: The year 1971 was an extremely satisfying one for Weiskopf. After winning two events in 1968, Tom was heralded as a future great. But he failed to win in either 1969 or 1970, and his confidence was waning.

He bounced back in 1971 to win the Kemper Open in a playoff with Lee Trevino, Gary Player and Dale Douglass, and then added the Philadelphia Classic title in a tense finish against Jack Nicklaus and Dave Hill. A week prior to Philadelphia, Tom had threatened to quit the game after a finishing

78 destroyed chances of winning the Massachusetts Classic.

Tom had five other finishes in the top 10 during the year. He tied for fourth in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, tied for fourth in the Florida Citrus Open, shared sixth in the Masters, tied for fifth in the U.S. Professional Match Play Championship, and tied for eighth in the Hartford Open.

In compiling one of the best stroke averages of the year (71.3), Weiskopf returned eight rounds of 66 or better, with 65 at Hartford and Phoenix the lowest.

PRIOR YEARS: Tall, handsome Tom Weiskopf was ticketed for instant golf success when he turned professional in 1964 and hit the Tour the next year. An Ohio State student for only two years, one of them as a sophomore when Jack Nicklaus was a senior, and a tremendous hitter, many observers said he was a good bet to follow in the Golden Bear's foot steps.

It didn't take Tom long to get moving. By 1966 he climbed to 27th in the money list with \$37,166, and in 1968 the big break-through came. He not only won two tournaments, the Andy Williams—San Diego

and the Buick but finished third money winner with \$152,946. All this despite being called up by the Army before the campaign ended.

Tom got out of the service in March of 1969 and went on to earn \$81,594 without a victory. He also missed the winner's circle in 1970 but won \$95,287.

Some say Tom would do better with more practice, but he detests the idea. He prefers to lead as normal a life as possible and not let golf totally occupy his time and his family's time.

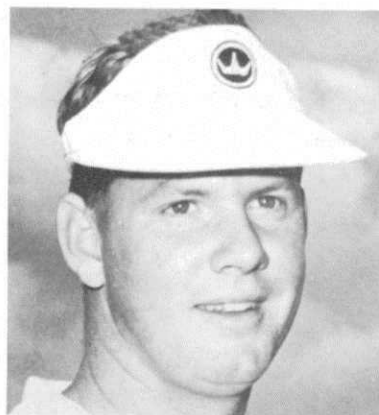

1971 RECAP: Bert Yancey didn't score a victory in 1971, but a pair of seconds and two thirds kept him well up among the leading money winners.

Yancey appeared to have the Robinson Classic all but won until Labron Harris, Jr., birdied the 71st hole to force a playoff. Harris won it with a birdie at the third hole. That was Bert's best chance to win, although he was runnerup also in the Colonial National Invitational, and third in both the

Bob Hope Desert Classic and Bahamas Open.

In 33 tournaments during 1971, Yancey was in the money 28 times and among top 10 six times. In addition to the aforementioned, Bert tied for fifth in the Byron Nelson Classic and for ninth in the U.S. Open.

Bert's biggest disappointment of the year came in the Masters where he scored 81 the second day to miss the 36-hole cut in the tournament he most desires to win.

PRIOR YEARS: Albert Winsborough Yancey, who has averaged \$84,060 per year for the last three seasons, has proved himself a master craftsman in a difficult art. The one time West Pointer is a perfectionist with a classic swing, modeled after that of the late Tony Lema, and a record for consistency.

Yancey turned pro in 1961 and found out quickly he couldn't make a go of it. He took an assistant's job in Philadelphia and worked on his game. By 1964 he figured he was ready to try the circuit again.

He certainly was. For the first three years

he averaged \$25,000, upped it to \$66,000 per in 1967 and 1968, and then hit the \$84,000 plane.

Yancey believes a competitor's mental attitude accounts for 90 percent of success. He says he let his attitude stray in the 1968 U.S. Open at Rochester. With a five-stroke lead and 27 holes to go, he saw Lee Trevino go past him at the finish.

Yancey's most winning year was 1966, when he won at Azalea, Memphis and Portland. He took the Dallas in 1967, Atlanta in '69, and the Bing Crosby in 1970.

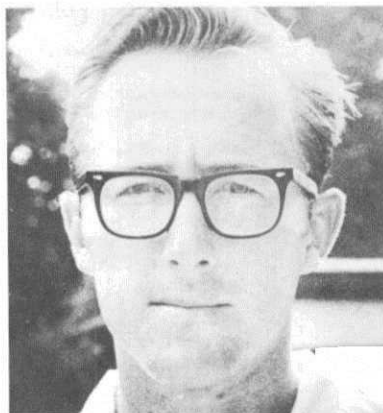

1971 RECAP: Kermit Zarley was rarely in position to score a victory during 1971, but he went to the pay windows often enough to retain his place among the top 60.

In 32 tournaments Zarley was in the money 24 times, with four finishes in the top 10. His best showing came in the Florida Citrus Open, where he finished third. He tied for seventh in the Phoenix Open, shared eighth in the Kemper Open.

Zarley's best chance to win was the Citrus where he opened with 64-68 for the halfway lead. However, a third round 72 dropped him from contention. Kermit also had a 64 during the Phoenix Open, and a 65 in the Doral Open.

Kermit slumped badly during the second half of the season, with the Sahara producing his only top 10 finish in his last 14 tournaments.

PRIOR YEARS: Kermit Zarley, son of a restaurateur, tuned up his golf game whenever he wasn't flipping steaks and chops over a charcoal pit. Kermit learned his golf from his father, but he got into the game more seriously after the Zarleys opened a restaurant next to a Seattle public course.

Zarley won the Washington State and Northwestern amateur titles and then went on to the U. of Houston. He won the NCAA championship in 1962 and helped Houston expand its reputation as a collegiate powerhouse. He graduated with a B. Ba. in 1963, and went into the pro ranks the next year.

It took Kermit two years to adjust to the

pressures of the circuit, but by 1965 he started to move. His earnings leaped to \$42,546 the next year, tailed off slightly to \$37,712 in 1967, and then soared again when he won the 1968 Kaiser International with a rallying finish. His earnings reached \$64,993, high rank of his career.

Zarley's second Tour triumph came in 1970, when his closing 67 beat out Gibby Gilbert in the Canadian Open.

Over the years, Kermit has taken some good-natured ribbing about his name, including Bob Hope's line: "With a name like that it sounds like he's the pro from the moon." Zarley has also revealed that during a conversation with Billy Graham the latter called him "Zermit" three times.

1972 MATCH PLAY FORMAT

As a result of a change in format, the 1972 U. S. Professional Match Play Championship will be part of golf's first double-header — two concurrent major tournaments played on the same course.

The \$100,000 Liggett & Myers Open, at 72 holes stroke play, will be played August 24-27 and will provide half the field for the Match Play event. At the end of 36 holes, the eight lowest scorers in the Liggett & Myers competition will drop out of the field and join the select lineup for the Match Play Championship. The rest of the Liggett & Myers field will play the remaining 36 holes.

The Match Play lineup of 16 will include,

in addition to the eight qualifiers from the Liggett & Myers event, the 1971 Match Play Champion, the 1972 winners of the PGA Championship, U.S. Open, British Open, and the Masters, and the first three available players from the final 1971 Exemption Point Standing, who are not otherwise eligible.

Orthodox match play will be the basis for the Match Play Championship.

The Match Play competition will be played August 26-27. Both events will be held at the Country Club of North Carolina, Pinehurst, N.C. The Match Play purse will be \$150,000, providing a grand total of \$250,000 in prizes for the double-header.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Associations in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of these two nations.

In placing the Ryder Cup in competition, the donor set forth certain terms which were to be observed by the parties concerned so long as the matches are conducted. Included among these stipulations are the following:

- (1) The matches will be played every other year on a home-and-home basis;
- (2) While both parties must mutually agree on the specific dates for each match, the host team may select the site and will be responsible for such arrangements and details as are normally the function of a sponsoring group;
- (3) The matches shall consist of two days of play with the first being devoted to foursomes and the second to singles matches;
- (4) Each member of the competing teams must be a member of his

country's PGA, and furthermore, must be a native born citizen of that country.

The matches were first officially played for the Ryder Cup in 1927 in the United States. They have been held continuously every other year since except for the period from 1937 through 1946 when the exigencies of World War II forced their suspension.

From 1927 to date, the United States has won every Ryder Cup match played in this country. It also won on British soil in 1937, 1949, 1953, 1961 and 1965, to run its list of victories to 15 in 19 matches. The British won at home in 1929, 1933 and 1957. The 1969 match in England resulted in the first tie of the series.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursomes matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The PGA Vardon Trophy, named in honor of the internationally famous British golfer, Harry Vardon, was placed in competition among American professionals in 1937 as a successor to the Harry E. Radix Trophy, which, prior to that time, had been awarded annually to the professional having the finest tournament record in play in this country.

Today, the Vardon Trophy, a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" x 27" is awarded each year to the member of the PGA of America maintaining the finest playing average in those events co-sponsored or so designated by the PGA in each such period. A minimum of 80 rounds in tournaments considered official by PGA is required to win.

QUALIFYING SCHOOL FOR APPROVED TOURNAMENT PLAYERS

The Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players was initiated in 1965 as the procedure for accrediting new players for the Tour. Since that time 213 players have received credentials and approximately 57 per cent are still active on the Tour.

Under the current structure, applicants for the School are required to play in 72-hole Regional Tryouts at stroke play. The calibre

of the field determines how many of the lowest scorers qualify for the School. At the Qualifying School, the survivors play a 108-hole tournament, attend classroom lectures and undergo a written examination. Again, quality of play determines the number of players who receive playing credentials for the Tour.

Graduates of the School are on probation for one year.

1971 QUALIFYING SCHOOL

A record number of 357 applicants sought admittance to the 1971 Qualifying School. Three Regional Tryouts reduced the group to 75, and 23 players received credentials after completing the course at the PGA National

Golf Club, Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

Bob Zender, of Skokie, Ill., led the field with 425 for 106 holes. The scores of the other qualifiers follow:

- Fall 1967 —** A class of 111, including several international stars, attended School. Thirty were graduated and Bobby Cole, of South Africa, was No. 1 graduate. He scored 572 over eight rounds.
- Spring 1968 —** Eighty-one were accepted and 15 were graduated. Bob Dickson led the graduates with 569 for 144 holes.
- Fall 1968 —** Seventy-nine attended the School and 30 were graduated. Grier Jones was leading qualifier with 571 for 144 holes. The American Professional Golfers also held a School and graduated 21, headed by Martin Roesink with 585 for 144 holes.
- Spring 1969 —** Enrollment was 91 and 15 were graduated to the Tour after a 72-hole tournament. Bob Eastwood was low qualifier with 291.
- Fall 1969 —** For the first time, a system of District Tryouts at 54 holes was instituted. A total of 182 applications were accepted and 48 qualified for the School proper at the Tryouts. Twelve were graduated to the Tour with Doug Olson being low, at 286, in the School's 72-hole tournament.
- 1970 —** Nine District Tryouts, at 54 holes, reduced the field of 250 applicants to 60. A 72-hole tournament at Tucson, Arizona produced 18 approved players. Robert Barbarossa was low qualifier with 279.

PGA PLAYER-OF-THE-YEAR AWARD

Each year the PGA of America honors America's leading professional player by presenting him the PGA Player-of-the-year Award.

This Award is made on the basis of playing record for the year, including such things as money winnings, Vardon Trophy scoring average, Ryder Cup points and an overall evaluation of playing achievements.

In the past, selection of the PGA Player-of-the-Year has been made each year by a vote of the PGA membership and the individuals on the PGA national press list. Beginning in 1969 the Award was made by a vote of the PGA Executive Committee. The winner receives a plaque at the President's Dinner during the PGA Annual Meeting.
