The Tournament Policy Board

The Tournament Players Division of the Professional Golfers' Association of America conducts the tournament program, known as the PGA Tour. Policy for the Tour is established by a 10-member Tournament Policy Board, composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the TPD membership. A Player Director serves as Vice President and Executive Committeeman of the PGA.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board. This year, it is Lewis A. Lapham of New York, N.Y.

Three PGA Directors, the national officers of the PGA of America, President, Secretary and Treasurer. Henry Poe, President of the PGA, is Vice-Chairman of the Policy Board.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer. The Tournament Staff, under the Tournament Director, conducts tournament play.

A Message From **DEANE R. BEMAN** *The Commissioner*

The PGA Tour is a unique part of the American sports scene, unique because tournament golfers are unlike any other professional athlete in these important aspects: Each player on the Tour must pay his own expenses; no one is guaranteed a penny in advance of teeing off; and, each player is unsalaried and must make his livelihood based solely on his performance under the most intense competition. Obviously, the world of professional tournament golf is far different than any other sport.

Our partnership with sponsors of tournaments is another facet of the Tour which makes the sport unique. We have a new partner each week and in a different locale from the previous week's. Because of this partnership, our objectives must be consistent with those of our various sponsors. These are, generally, to develop interest in the game; to assist with the financial development of local charities; and, to have a role in community projects since, happily, most of our tournaments are local happenings. We are pleased to join in programs which bring people together.

Our chief goal in conducting the PGA Tour is three-fold: To present the highest level of competitive golf; to serve the game and to help increase interest in it by the play of our members; and, to provide an example of integrity and good sportsmanship.



Broadly speaking, the Director of Communications is responsible to the Commissioner for the direction and coordination of the overall communications program of the PGA Tour — including relations with the press, radio and television media, tournament sponsors, members of the TPD and the golf community across the nation.

Of special interest to our friends in the media, the Director of Communications will supervise all press releases, tournament statistics, player data, press badges — everything, in short, that involves the PGA Tour and representatives of the media.

Joe Schwendeman, the TPD's first Public Information Director, was named Director of Communications effective December 1, 1975. Formerly the golf writer for the Philadelphia, Pa., Evening and Sunday Bulletin, Schwendeman had been editor of the Golf Journal, official publication of the United States Golf Association, before rejoining the PGA Tour.

Tom Place remains as the Public Information Director and, as in the past, will be on the Tour at most of the tournament sites.



Al Geiberger . . .

. . . Winner of the Second Tournament Players Championship and the Joseph C. Dey, Jr., Trophy



It was Al Geiberger's tournament right from the start, although there surely were some moments during the final afternoon when the lanky Southern Californian was wondering if the Tournament Players Championship crown really was to be his.

At the close of each day's play, though, his was the name at the summit of the leader board. Most important, his was the name to be inscribed on the beautiful Joseph C. Dey, Jr., Trophy.

Competing on the difficult Colonial Country Club course in Fort Worth, Tex., Geiberger managed to avoid the treacherous Trinity River, the menacing rough, the troublesome Pecan trees and the late summer heat and humidity to win the title by three strokes over his close friend, Dave Stockton.

He won the first-place check for \$50,000, as he recorded such splendid scores of 66, 68, 67 and 69 for his 10-under par total of 270. Stockton, buoyed by a second-day 64, was at 273 and earned \$28,500. Hubert Green, who had a second-day 65, finished third at 275 and won \$17,750.

Jack Nicklaus, winner of the inaugural Tournament Players Championship at the Atlanta Country Club in 1974, had his problems. His 67-75-70-75—287 only was good for a tie for 18th.

Geiberger tied the competitive course record in the Pro-Amateur with a seven-under par 63. Then he started. His opening 31-35—66 included seven birdies and two bogies, but he birdied four of his final five holes. His lead was by one over Nicklaus, Bob Dickson and Hale Irwin.

The next day, he penciled in a 68, so now stood at six-under par 134 and his nearest challengers were two-strokes away—Dickson, Stockton and Green.

During the third afternoon, Geiberger birdied three of the back nine holes after playing the front side in even par for a 67 and a 54-hole score of nine-under par 201. This established a competitive low for Colonial. Jerry Heard stood at 202 in 1972 when he went on to win the Colonial National Invitation Tournament.

Stockton now was alone in second place, but three strokes away and Green was five back.

Finally, when everyone was looking for Geiberger to pad his margin, he suddenly started to falter. He birdied one and three, but suffered critical bogeys at five, seven and eight for a one-over 36 on the front. Stockton was charging. He birdied one, and then six, and when his 16 footer for a birdie dropped at the ninth, he moved into the lead by a stroke.

Dave couldn't maintain the pace. Geiberger evened it with a birdie at the 11th. A bogey at the 12th when he drove into the difficult rough dropped him one back again, but he quickly followed with a 12 footer at the par three 13th and an 18 footer at the 15th. Stockton's steam evaporated with a bogey at the 14th after he drove into the rough and another at the par three 16th when he three putted from a long distance.

1975 IN REVIEW

Tommy Aaron had to believe it was going to be his comeback year. He finished alone in third place in the Phoenix Open, posting 68-72-69-67—276, and then getting a tie for seventh in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open the next week with 71-66-70-72—279.

In two weeks, he earned \$16,550, more than half of what he totaled in all of 1974.

The next start was the Bob Hope Desert Classic, and his tie for 25th was anything but discouraging. Then the slide began. He missed the next two cuts, tied for 67th in the Florida Citrus Open, and then missed the following four cuts.

He never did find a way to collect another top 10 finish, and in his final 21 starts, he missed 12 cuts. Usually, it was a poor first round that caused the damage.

Tommy played in 33 tournaments and finished in the money 14 times. He missed 17 cuts, finished out of the money once and had to withdraw once. His stroke average was 72.7 and his low round was the 66 at Tucson National.

PRIOR YEARS

Although throughout the 1960s Tommy Aaron built a nagging reputation for runnerup finishes, few of his peers ever faulted his consistency of performance or his fluid swing. Then, late in 1973, the same year that he won the precious Masters title in his native Georgia, Tommy sank into a scoring slump which carried through most of the following year.


The result was that in 1974 he failed to make the top 60 exempt on list for the first time since he came on tour in 1961. He earned only \$31,572. He entered 32 events but missed the cut in 11 of them and finished in the top 10 only twice. However, in the last half of 1974, there were encouraging signs when he survived the cut in 11 of 13 events.

Aaron shattered his non-winning reputation in 1969 when he beat Sam Snead in an 18-hole playoff in the Canadian Open. The Canadian was not an official Tour event that year, but Aaron always will consider it a national championship, understandably enough.

In case there were any critics left after that victory, Aaron won again in 1970 at the Atlanta Classic, where gathered the finest of fields. At the finish of the Atlanta there were Dan Sikes, Arnold Palmer, Bert Yancey, Gary Player, Tom Weiskopf and Jack Nicklaus, all applying pressure within three strokes of him.

Before Aaron turned pro in 1960 he dominated amateur golf in Georgia, winning the Georgia and Southeastern Amateurs twice each and also the Georgia Open three times. He was a finalist in the U.S. Amateur in 1958 and a member of the 1959 Walker Cup team. A decade later, as a professional, he played on the first of two Ryder Cup teams.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a steady year for Brian (Buddy) Allin, although it was not as fruitful as he would have liked. After winning three times during the previous two years, he wasn't able to go the distance in 1975, although he was a solid contender on several occasions.

His best finish was a tie for third in the Pleasant Valley Classic at Sutton, Mass. His six-under par total of 278 only was two strokes in back of winner Roger Maltbie. Three times he finished fifth, with a solo effort in IVB-Philadelphia Classic, and ties for fifth in the Tournament of Champions and Doral-Eastern Open.

He also tied for 10th in the PGA Championship at Akron Firestone, and, after a first-round 68 in the Tournament Players Championship at the Colonial Country Club at Fort Worth, finished tied for 11th.

Generally, it was one round that caused his undoing, such as following his opening 68 in the TPC with a 73. Illness forced him to drop out of three events early in the summer, just when it appeared he was honing his game into peak condition.

Buddy played in 29 tournaments, earning money in 22, while missing the cut four times and withdrawing three times. He had five top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 71.8. He had two 67s for his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Buddy Allin's is one of the Tour's most interesting success stories, one certainly encouraging to the flock of young players who try to play professionally without a glittering amateur record behind them.

Buddy played on the same Brigham Young University golf team with Johnny Miller and Mike Reaser, then served 16 months in Vietnam as an army artillery officer, earning four decorations. He came to the Tour through the 1970 Qualifying School.


In the 1971 Greater Greensboro Open, Buddy won a playoff over Rod Funseth and Dave Eichelberger by sinking a 20-foot putt from the fringe on the first extra hole. His earnings dipping slightly in 1972, but the following year he captured the Florida Citrus Open at 23-under par, one of the finest scoring performances in Tour history. Then in 1974 he won twice more.

The first victory that year was a genuine surprise at the Doral-Eastern Open. "It was an unexpected pleasure," Allin said. "I was just trying to hang in there and make a good check. There were just too many good players up there ahead of me."

He birdied the 13th hole and two of the next three for a one-stroke victory over Jerry Heard, earning \$30,000. Two months later, Allin struck again. In the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas, Buddy set a course record at Preston Trail with a third-round 63 and won by four shots the following day with a 269 total, a Nelson tournament record.

Allin also was second in the Tournament of Champions in 1974, despite a third-round 75, and finished in the top 10 seven times in 26 events, while missing the cut only four times.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was, without question, the low point in George Archer's exceptional career, and most of it was due to physical ailments. He missed more than three months of the year at one point, after an operation on his wrist. He left the Tour after the Masters and didn't return until the Pleasant Valley Classic late in July.

One of the game's most consistent performers for many years, George only made money seven times in 21 starts last year, although his best showing was on one of the tougher courses, a tie for ninth in the Heritage Classic on Hilton Head Island, S.C.

His next best was a tie for 16th in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open as he collected \$9,777 for the year and finished in 127th place.

Toward the end of the year, George indicated that he was beginning to feel better and believed that it was just a matter of time before he started to play well again. Meanwhile, his lifetime earnings of \$810,020 place him 16th on the all-time list.

PRIOR YEARS

George Archer's career earnings passed \$800,000 in 1974, despite the fact that his winnings plummeted to less than \$80,000 for all of 1973 and 1974. If his legendary putting stroke had not troubled him in those two years, he easily might have joined the Tour's millionaire club.

Archer started playing golf at age 12, and by the time he stirred his huge frame to try the Tour 13 years later he had amassed an exceptional amateur record. In 1963 alone he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, the Northern California Open and the San Francisco City championship, lost to Deane Beman in the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International.


Two years later Archer won the Lucky International as a professional and acknowledged the achievement as "probably the biggest thrill of my life. There were a lot of home folks around, including one kid I used to shoot arrows with back in the sixth grade."

His thrills on Tour doubtless increased. Archer topped \$100,000 in winnings four times in a five-year period starting in 1968, and in each of those \$100,000-plus years he won at least two Tour events.

His greatest achievement came in the 1969 Masters, when he defeated Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf by a stroke.

In 1973, partly because of physical ailments, Archer's earnings were almost \$90,000 less than the year before, and in 1974 they dropped \$40,000 more as he finished in the top 20 only twice and experienced his worst of 11 years on Tour.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was an unusual year that Wally Armstrong put together, although the end result was a good one, as he made the top 60 on the money list to become exempt for the year.

When the PGA Tour headed into its 10th week, he only had about \$4,000 in winnings most of that coming in the Bob Hope Desert Classic as he tied for 14th, thanks to a final-day 65.

Then he tied for ninth in the Doral-Eastern Open after being tied with Gary McCord for the lead through the first two days. After starting 68-70, he slumped to a third-day 77, but finished with a strong 68.

The next week, he tied fifth at the Greater Jacksonville Open, buoyed by a third-round 66. A month later, back-to-back 66s at Pensacola gave him a solo second to Jerry McGee, just two strokes back.

As the year progressed, the bad streaks when he missed four straight cuts in May and early June, then made three in a row, and then felt the dreaded axe for six straight weeks through July and August. He snapped the string with a tie for 44th in the B.C. Open. He also tied for 15th in the Southern Open and tied for 10th in the World Open.

Wally played in 34 tournaments, earning money in 17 and missing the cut 16 times. His stroke average was 72.4 with the 65 in the Bob Hope his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

There were two very distinct segments to Wally Armstrong's rookie year of 1974. Through the first five months, he only made one major cut—in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open—and collected a grand total of \$262.66.


During the last half of the year, he earned nearly \$36,000, finished 74th on the money list and had two superb finishes. He tied for second with three others in the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas (third-round 65), and tied for third in the San Antonio-Texas Open (final-round 64). Those two finishes were worth \$16,588.75.

"Part of it was just getting adjusted to the Tour," Wally says, "and part of it was the teamwork that developed with my younger brother, Tom. He was my caddy from the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic (late February) until the Atlanta Classic in 1975."

Wally started to play the game at age 12 on a nine-hole course outside Indianapolis. His game started to develop in high school, and in 1963, he won the state's scholastic golf championship. Then he headed for the University of Florida on a scholarship, and he captained the 'Gator golf team in 1967.

Twice he tried to qualify for the PGA Tour after turning professional in 1970, but with no success. He did play well in the mini-tours, though, and it was that success that convinced him he could make it on the "big Tour." In the fall of 1973, he earned his card.

1975 IN REVIEW

One of golf's better streaks finally was broken in 1975. Miller Barber had won a tournament in each of the eight previous years. Only Jack Nicklaus had a longer one.

Twice, Miller finished third, and three times he was fourth, so the veteran from Texas certainly was in contention enough. However, some of his effectiveness was dulled by asthma problems.

He tied for third in the Pensacola Open and did the same in the Pleasant Valley Classic. However, a second-day 74 at Sutton, Mass., really stopped his bid. As it was, his 69-68 finish left him only two behind Roger Maltbie.

He was fourth by himself in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, and tied for fourth in the Atlanta Classic (had a second-day 64) and in the San Antonio-Texas Open, after a 66 start.

Miller had three other top 10 finishes. In the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas, he only was one stroke off the pace after three days, but an even-par 71 the final afternoon left him tied for eighth. He also tied for ninth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and the Heritage Classic.

Miller played in 33 tournaments and made money in 26. His stroke average was 71.5 and his low round was a 63 the first day of the Sahara Invitational.

PRIOR YEARS

Through 1974, Miller Barber had won a tournament in each of eight successive years, a remarkable achievement of continuous performance matched only by Jack Nicklaus in the same stretch.

Barber kept alive his string of victorious years by winning late on the schedules of the last two of those years. He won the 1974 Kings Island Open near the end of what he called "a hard, difficult year for me. I had a serious asthma attack and that almost killed me. It was a terrific scare."

In 1973, Barber lost playoffs to Nicklaus in the Greater New Orleans Open and to Bert Greene in the L&M Open before turning his frustration into the most noteworthy of his first 15 years on Tour. He won the half-million dollar World Open, stealing off with a record \$100,000 first prize to total \$184,014 for the year.

Barber first tried the tour in 1959 but not many years later settled into a club professional's job at the Apawamis Club in Rye, N.Y. A number of the club members convinced him to return to the tour, and he quickly rewarded their confidence with a record of outstanding performances that earned him selection to the 1969 and 1971 Ryder Cup teams.

His victory in the 1971 Phoenix Open will rival that in the first World Open in Barber's memory, at least in the category of scoring. His 65-64-67-65—261 was 23-under par and the lowest total on Tour since Mike Souchak's 257 in the 1955 Texas Open.

1975 IN REVIEW

An incredible story was unfolding at the Medinah Country Club in Oak Brook, Ill., at the U.S. Open in June. Frank Beard, after three rounds, was in the lead by three strokes.

Normally, that would not be so surprising, but prior to the week at Medinah, Frank had played in 20 tournaments. He had missed the cut in 15 of them and withdrew from another. He had one stretch of 13 events without finishing.

He then tied for 71st (out of the money) in the Kemper Open, tied for 15th at the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, and headed for Medinah, where he put together rounds of 74, 69 and 67 for his margin over Tom Watson.

The last day was a long one, though. He had a 78, yet, still tied for third, just one stroke out of the playoff.

He disclosed that a few sessions with Paul Runyon, the former PGA champion, had set him straight. "He basically changed me to a weaker grip," Frank said.

Frank also tied for ninth in the Ed McMahon Jaycees-Quad Cities Open for his only other top 10 finish.

Frank played in 36 tournaments and was in the money in 12. His stroke average was 73.5 with a second-day 65 at Westchester his low.

PRIOR YEARS

Since leading the Tour in money winnings with \$175,224 in 1969, Frank Beard's earnings suffered almost a steady decline for the next five years, except for a slight improvement in 1973 when he seemed to regain some of his old proficiency.

His most marked drop in earnings apparently resulted from a decision in early 1972 that his hook-oriented swing needed some left-to-right action. Whatever the cause, Beard's earnings were slashed almost exactly in half to \$56,188, for 40th place on the 1972 money list, and his stroke average leaped from 71.0 to 72.9.

Frank lowered that average to 71.6 in 1973 and improved to almost \$72,000 in earnings, but in 1974 he was mired in a serious slump until late in the season.

In the 1974 World Open, carrying a \$300,000 purse, Beard lost a four-way playoff to Johnny Miller's birdie on the second extra hole. His tie for second place was worth \$23,200 and he wound up the year with more than \$55,000, although he finished in the top 10 only twice, the other a tie for ninth in the Monsanto.

Beard won 11 Tour events in the first nine years after he joined the circuit in 1963, including two Tournament of Champions' titles and the Westchester Classic. He won more than \$100,000 for five straight years beginning in 1967, leading the money list in the middle year of that stretch, and entered 1975 with \$929,163 in career earnings.

1975 IN REVIEW

Don Bies said it so well, "Now I've done it. I've won and I'll have this for the rest of my life." He was beginning to wonder if he'd ever get to make that statement, but the quiet, gentlemanly Bies did win in true championship style, defeating tough Hubert Green on the second hole of their sudden-death playoff in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. He had been trying for nearly nine years to get the victory.

He fired four superb rounds of 65, 66, 67 and 69 for his 17-under par 267. He was one off the lead the first day, tied with Hubert after two rounds and in the lead by himself by one over Green after three.

It was a real scramble the final afternoon with several players chasing for the title. Hubert's birdie at the 18th put him 17-under par, and Don's birdie at 17 moved him in that position, too. J. C. Snead with Don in the last group, went to 17 with birdies at 15, 16 and 17. But, Don parred 18 for the playoff situation, while J. C. bogeyed. Then Don won it all with an eight footer for a birdie on the second extra hole.

Don also had a tie for sixth in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic and tie for ninth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Don played in 23 tournaments and earned money in 17. His stroke average was 71.9 with the opening 65 at Hartford his best round.

PRIOR YEARS

For more than a decade after he turned pro in 1957, Don Bies was involved in club work with only occasional ventures on the Tour. Then, in 1968, two things occurred which changed his career.

First, the Seattle Golf Club where he was employed closed for several months to undergo renovations and Don decided to spend the time competing in Tour events.

Second, he finished fifth in the U.S. Open in Rochester and earned more than \$30,000 in only 15 tournaments, cracking the top 60 list in winnings.


"My wife and I talked it over later in the year," Don said. "We felt that since I had the exemption for all of 1969, I should try it."

Bies played well enough to keep his exemption three times in the next five years and, although he did not win a tournament, his consistency kept him from having to qualify for all but one tournament in that time.

Bies' earnings climbed over \$70,000 in 1974, thanks in large part to a second-place finish behind Johnny Miller in the Westchester Classic. His closing 66 left him two strokes behind but his check amounted to \$28,500, easily the biggest of his career.

The two weeks immediately preceding Westchester also were productive as Bies tied for ninth in the PGA and for 11th at Hartford. His other high finish in 1974 was a tie for fourth at Memphis in May.

1975 IN REVIEW

For the first time in his 11-year career, Homero Blancas finished out of the top 60, but his exempt status remains intact because of his \$593,586 in career earnings places him among the top 50 of all time.

If there was a bright spot to the season, it would be in his better play the second half of the year. There was considerable improvement. In 20 starts through the U.S. Open, Homero was not around to play the final 36 holes. His best finish was a tie for 17th in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open.

After that, in 12 starts, he only missed it three times and earned two top 10 finishes. He had an excellent tournament in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, 67-69-68-66—270, or 14-under par. He only was three strokes out of the playoff.

His best finish was a tie for fifth in the Ed McMahon Jaycees-Quad Cities Open, due mainly to a 67 second day and 69 close.

Homero played in 33 tournaments and was in the money 16 times. His stroke average was 72.8 (it was 73.7 after the Open).

PRIOR YEARS

Homero Blancas won the Mexican Open in his first year on the Tour, 1965, and never failed to place in the top 60 money-winning list in his first 10 years on the circuit, topping \$100,000 in 1970 for his high point.

Perhaps his most prized victory was the Colonial National in 1970 when he beat Lee Trevino and Gene Littler by a stroke.

His earnings slid below \$60,000 in 1971 when he never threatened to win, although he counted eight finishes in the top 10. But he topped \$90,000 in each of the next two years after winning the 1972 Phoenix Open and the 1973 Monsanto.

At Phoenix in 1973, Homero recorded the year's low round, a 31-30—61. Also that year he tied for fourth place in the U.S. Open and for fifth in the Masters.

In 1973 he outlasted Frank Beard to win the Monsanto Open and won a place on the Ryder Cup team, but in 1974 he suffered the second sharp drop in official earnings in his career, to less than \$65,000.

Blancas tied for second twice in 1974, finishing three strokes behind Jerry Heard in Orlando when he closed with 66-70, and four back of Buddy Allin in the Byron Nelson after he started with a 65. He also tied for sixth in the Heritage Classic and for eighth at Jacksonville.

As an amateur, Blancas was picked to two All-American teams and won the Southern Intercollegiate tournament while at the University of Houston. Also he scored a 55 on the 5,002-yard Premier course in Longview, Texas, to equal the all-time record for low score.

1975 IN REVIEW

Julius Boros just laughed when someone asked him when he planned to retire. "Retire to what?" he answered. "I already play golf and fish for a living."

Even at age 55, Julius let everyone know he still can swing a pretty mean stick. The heat was oppressive at the Westchester Classic early in August, the type of sweltering heat that even was tough on the young players.

But, there was Julius, calmly firing rounds of 70, 66 and 70 to be five strokes off the lead after three days. On the closing afternoon he penciled in a smooth seven-under par 65 and found himself tied with Gene Littler at 17-under par 271.

It meant he'd have to go back on the course, but the playoff only lasted one hole. Julius hit his approach shot over the green, down in deep grass. He needed three to get home, so Littler had his third victory of the year.

Littler, who was 45 at the time, laughed, "I figured if I could keep Julius out there long enough, as hot as it was, I'd wear him down."

Interestingly enough, two weeks earlier at the Pleasant Valley Classic, Julius was congratulating his good friend, Art Wall, on his victory at age 51 in the Greater Milwaukee Open. "You're bringing all us old guys back out, Art," he said. "In fact, I think I passed Ky Laffoon on the way here."


Julius played in 18 tournaments, survived the cut in 14. His stroke average was 72.7 with the 66 and 65 at Westchester his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

One of the all-time favorites in the sports world, Julius Boros casually has been strolling the fairways and making friends for the Tour for more years than he cares to remember.

He gave up his role as an accountant in Connecticut to head down the road in 1950 and what a road it has been. His first victory was the United States Open in 1952 at the Northwood Club in Dallas. He won the Open again in 1963 at Brookline, beating Arnold Palmer and Jacky Cupit in a playoff.

He added the PGA crown to his list of 18 titles in 1968 at Pecan Valley in San Antonio, Tex., and outlasted Palmer in the extreme heat. Later that same year, he won the rich Westchester Classic, and that was his last on the Tour. He since has added the PGA Seniors crown, though.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a year Gay Brewer would like to forget, as it was his poorest in more than a decade. Yet, he almost won a tournament, the Canadian Open. He battled Tom Weiskopf and Jack Nicklaus down to the final holes at the Royal Montreal Golf Club, only to finish one stroke out of the playoff.

He had a five-under par 275 on rounds of 68-68-70-69 and credited his success to "my best putting in two or three years," thanks to a pre-tournament tip from Bob Rosburg. He felt he lost his chance at the par five 13th as he three putted from off the edge. "I really should have chipped it first," he said later.

His only other top 10 finish was in the Western Open as he tied for seventh. His middle rounds were 70 and 69 at the Butler National course in suburban Chicago, but he opened and closed with 75s.

For the most part, he said he played reasonably well all year, but it was his putting stroke that held him back.

Gay entered 26 tournaments, earning money in 11, while missing the cut the other 14 times. He only had two top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 72.9. His low round was a 68, and he had four of them.

PRIOR YEARS

During almost two decades as a golf professional, Gay Brewer mounted two of the most stirring comebacks by anyone ever to play the Tour, both incidents associated with the Masters Tournament in Augusta, Ga.

In 1966 he bogeyed the final hole at Augusta, fell into a tie for first with Jack Nicklaus and Tommy Jacobs and lost the playoff. But the following year he rallied on the closing nine holes to beat playing-companion Bobby Nichols by a stroke for the Masters title.

In 1972, on the eve of the Masters, Gay was hospitalized with a bleeding ulcer which almost took his life. Not only did he recover but he won the Canadian Open that same year and finished in the top 10 in four other tournaments.

Also in 1972, Brewer won the \$300,000 Taiheiyo Club Masters in Japan, defeating David Graham in a playoff, worth \$65,000. The check was only slightly larger than previous large playoffs on foreign soil. He won the 1967 and 1968 Alcan events in Great Britain, each good for \$55,000.

Brewer's official U.S. earnings reached a high of \$93,502 in 1973, although he failed to win a Tour event. He tied for second twice and was in the top 10 seven other times, and he played on his second Ryder Cup team.

He suffered one of his worst seasons in 1974, missing the top 60 list for only the third time in his long career. Brewer lost a playoff in the American Golf Classic, three putting the first extra hole, and tied for ninth at New Orleans and for 10th in the Disney World, constituting his best efforts that year.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was another excellent year for Billy Casper as he earned over \$100,000 for the eighth time in the last 10 years. As he said with emphasis, "It was a good year. I was pleased with my consistency."

Well he should be. He won again after drawing a blank in 1974, to give him 51 triumphs during his illustrious 21-year career on the Tour; and he forced Jack Nicklaus into a sudden-death playoff in the World Open at Pinehurst, N.C., before bowing on the first extra hole.

The victory came in the First NBC New Orleans Open at the Lakewood Country Club. He was tied after the first day with young Larry Nelson at 67, but from that point on, Billy was in command at the end of each day's play. He followed with 68, 66 and 70 for his 17-under par score of 271, edging England's Peter Oosterhuis by two strokes.

He missed the three tournaments prior to New Orleans, as his wife, Shirley, presented him with their 10th child, Sarah.

He did well in the major championships, too, tying for fifth in the PGA and gaining a solo sixth in the Masters. For the eighth straight time, he was named to the U.S. Ryder Cup team.

Billy played in 19 Tour events, earning money in 16 while missing the cut in three. He had eight top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 71.2. His low round was 66 and he had four of them.

PRIOR YEARS


In 1974, Billy Casper failed to reach \$100,000 in earnings for only the second time in nine years, but there were encouraging moments which must have led him to foresee a recovery such as he experienced in 1973.

After winning two tournaments and qualifying for his seventh straight Ryder Cup team in 1973, Billy failed to win a tournament in 1974 for only the second year since his initial victory way back in 1956. However, it was a productive year of sorts.

Casper played in 20 events in 1974 and missed the cut only three times, while finishing in the top 10 five times.

1975 IN REVIEW

Bob Charles never was able to get his game together on the U.S. Tour in 1975. As a result, the native New Zealander who now resides in Johannesburg, South Africa, had his poorest year since his first in 1962.

Maybe the sign of things to come came early in the year, when he missed the cut in his first three starts. His best finish was a solo fifth place in the Tallahassee Open and his next most productive weeks were in the Greater Jacksonville Open and the Pensacola Open, tying for 25th in each.

The lefthander only played once in the second half of the season, his final tournament being the Westchester Classic the first weekend in August.

Bob played in 15 events, earning money in eight and missed the cut in the other seven. He compiled a stroke average of 72.9, with his low round being a 66 the third day at Jacksonville.

PRIOR YEARS

Almost convinced that the U.S. Tour was no longer profitable for his style of play, Bob Charles experienced a rebirth in winning in this country when he captured the Greater Greensboro Open in 1974 and finished the year with more than \$65,000 in earnings. He also won the Swiss Open in early August, for a \$10,000 payoff.

Until the GGO, when Charles entered the final round with a one-shot lead and held it to win \$44,000, he hadn't won in the U.S. since 1968. His relative lack of distance, he felt, kept him at a disadvantage on American courses, but his deft putting touch and all-around short game landed him on the top 60 money list nine times since he first joined the U.S. Tour in 1962.


Without question the most successful left-hander ever to play professional golf, Charles won the first of his five U.S. victories in 1963 in his second year playing the Tour. He amassed more than a half-million dollars in purses in 13 years here.

The lanky New Zealander's most dramatic achievement also came in 1963 when he defeated Phil Rodgers in a 36-hole playoff at Royal Lytham and St. Annes for the British Open title.

Charles does everything right-handed except play games requiring two hands. He swung his first golf club at age five, left-handed, and, since his parents also were southpaw golfers, he never considered changing.

Charles played rugby and cricket during school years and worked in a bank in Christchurch, N.Z., before joining the U.S. Tour in 1962. Since 1954, six years before he turned pro, Charles has won more than 20 major tournaments around the world.

1975 IN REVIEW

It wasn't the typical Jim Colbert year, although the hard-working veteran from Kansas State did have his weeks when he played like the Colbert of the three previous years.

One of those weeks was at the Walt Disney World National Team Play championship, the final event of the year. He joined with his close friend, Dean Refram, and they won the title with a 36-under par score of 252. The victory was worth \$20,000 to each player, although it does not show on the year-end earnings.

It did extend Jim's winning streak to four years.

His best individual finish was a good one, a tie for second in the B. C. Open and that came just after he had taken time to work on his game. A birdie at the final hole in Endicott would have forced a playoff, but Jim was on the fringe with his approach and couldn't get his birdie to drop.

He was a persistent challenger in the Tournament of Champions, finally finishing alone in fourth. After a little help from Gary Player, Jim started the T. of C. with a 65 and a two-stroke lead. He followed with 73, 70 and 71 for a nine-under par effort.

His only other top 10 finish came in the Atlanta Classic with a 68-67 rally.

During the fall, Jim completed his two-year term of office as a player director on the PGA Tournament Policy Board.

Jim entered 32 tournaments and made money in 19. He had a stroke average of 72.3 with a 65 and two 66s his lowest.

PRIOR YEARS

A week after finishing fifth in the 1974 U.S. Open at Winged Foot, Jim Colbert entered the final round in the American Golf Classic trailing leader Forrest Fezler by three strokes. A closing par 70 at Firestone landed him in a four-way playoff, which he won on the second extra hole to grasp the \$34,000 first prize.

The victory, marking the third straight year that Colbert had won a tournament, comprised the biggest boost toward his best money-earning year, a total of \$96,734.


Jim also played well in the Masters, a third-round 69 lifting him to a stroke behind leader Dave Stockton, before a 73 finish left him tied for fourth.

An All-State high school football star, Colbert entered Kansas State on a football scholarship but turned to golf after losing some dental work in a freshman game. He had won the Kansas State Junior at age 11, and he sharpened his game for college golf to such an extent that he finished second in the 1964 NCAA championship.

Colbert joined the Tour in 1966 and cracked the top 60 list his second year, before falling back to 104th place in 1968. Victory in the 1969 Monsanto Open in Pensacola helped begin a string of six successive years in the top 60.

In 1972, Colbert won the Greater Milwaukee Open and closed with a 65 to finish second to Jack Nicklaus in the Westchester Classic, earning \$53,350 in those two events.

1975 IN REVIEW

Charles Coody enjoyed his second most profitable year on the Tour as he collected \$86,812. While victory eluded his grasp, he did have a pair of good third-place finishes.

His final-round 65 on the tough Harbour Town links on Hilton Head Island in the Heritage Classic gave him third by himself, and middle rounds of 68-67 left him with the same result in the Atlanta Classic.

A second-day 66 led the way to a solo fourth in the Florida Citrus Open, and a third-round 65 aided considerably in a tie for fifth in the Sahara Invitational. He also tied sixth in the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Charles had the touch for turning in a few excellent scores, such as the opening 65 at Pensacola and a closing 66 in the Canadian Open. He had 27 rounds in the sixties.

His year started slow, as he missed the cut in three of his first four starts. Then came a tie for ninth in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic and the fourth at Citrus. He was off and running from that point.

Charles, who now lives in the Orlando, Fla., area, played in 28 tournaments and cashed checks in 21. He compiled a stroke average of 71.2.

PRIOR YEARS

Since winning the Masters in 1971 and almost \$100,000 that year, Charles Coody went without victory for three years on the U.S. Tour, but consistency marked all three as he earned more than \$60,000 in each. The year 1974 was a good example.

In 30 events in 1974, Coody missed the cut only four times and he finished in the top 10 on five occasions, the highest a tie for second when he closed with a 66 in the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas.

Coody brought with him a most impressive amateur record when he joined the Tour in 1963. He had won 30 titles in his native Texas, many while attending TCU and including the State high school championship in 1954. He qualified for the U.S. Open in 1960 and 1961 while serving a three-year hitch in the Air Force, and as a semi-finalist in the 1962 U.S. Amateur he was invited to compete in the 1963 Masters.

The Masters provided Charles with some of his greatest moments in golf. In 1969 he led the Masters by a stroke with three holes to play but he decided to play defensively, and he bogeyed in and fell to fifth place. Two months later, however, he won the Cleveland Open.

In the 1971 Masters, Coody finished birdie-birdie-par-par for a 279 to capture the major title which had eluded him two years earlier. And that victory got him in the World Series of Golf in September, when he won again for an additional and unofficial \$50,000.

During his winless 1973 year in the U.S., Coody did win abroad twice within a month, in the Wills Open in England and in the John Player Classic at Turnberry, Scotland.

The quiet Texan has been active in Tour affairs, serving as a player member of the TPD Policy Board and as a PGA vice-president.

1975 IN REVIEW

Bruce Crampton continued to be one of the more consistent players in the game today and, as a result, he compiled another superb record in 1975.

He was the winner in the Houston Open by two strokes over Gil Morgan as he only suffered five bogeys in the 72 holes for a 15-under par total of 273. It was his second victory in Houston, and, a satisfying one. It was in 1957 that he made his U.S. Tour debut in the Houston Open, coming here from Australia.

Bruce made a solid run for the PGA crown at Akron Firestone, too, finally finishing two strokes in back of Jack Nicklaus. En route to his runner-up spot, he fashioned a brilliant seven-under par 63 in the second round for a PGA tournament record and the South course record.

He compiled his exceptional record despite the fact that he missed six weeks of the summer schedule due to a "stress fracture" of the ribs. He doesn't know how it happened, but had to withdraw from the Kemper Open in early June and didn't return until the Pleasant Valley Classic late in July.

This also was the eighth straight year that he has been a member of the Century Club in money won and also the third best of his splendid career.

Bruce played in 24 tournaments, earning money in 21, missing the cut in two and withdrawing a third time. He compiled a stroke average of 70.6 with his low round being the 63 at Firestone. He also had four 65s, two of them in the Sahara Invitational and a total of 34 rounds in the 60s. These impressive statistics gave Bruce the 1975 Vardon Trophy. He had 10 top 10 finishes.


PRIOR YEARS

Although he topped \$100,000 in official earnings for the seventh straight year, Bruce Crampton had to feel a letdown in 1974. For one thing, he didn't win a tournament. For another, 1973 was a tough act to follow.

Few mortals have experienced a year in competition as Bruce did in 1973, when he won four tournaments, was second in five others, earned over \$270,000 to trail only Jack Nicklaus in that department and became the fifth member of the Tour's million-dollar club in career purses.

Of course, 1974 wasn't without its high spots, too. Crampton played in 32 events and finished in the top 10 on 13 occasions while placing 12th on the money list. From February through the end of May he played in 14 straight tournaments without finishing worse than 32nd.

1975 IN REVIEW

Ben Crenshaw only finished one stroke out of the playoff for the U.S. Open at Medinah, and it is likely he always will remember his 71st hole of the championship.

On the par three that mostly is water between tee and green, Ben and his group had a short wait on the tee. Then, Ben joined many other players who had problems there. He hit his two iron on the toe. Splash! Double bogey, and with it went his hopes and dreams of the year.

Ben skipped the next three U.S. tournaments and came right back with another tie for third, in the Pleasant Valley Classic, aided considerably by a 69-68 start. He also finished third alone in the Florida Citrus Open, the keys being the middle rounds of 68-67.

He had three other top 10 finishes — solo sixth in the Southern Open, tie for eighth at the Greater Jacksonville Open and tie for 10th in the PGA.

Ben was a big winner in another area, though. He was married during that stretch between the Open and Pleasant Valley.

Ben entered 29 tournaments and made money in 20. He had a stroke average of 71.8 and had three 67s for his lowest.

PRIOR YEARS

Ben Crenshaw produced about the same results in his first full year on the Tour, 1974, as he did in only nine events in 1973 after turning professional. But it was unlikely that he could continue the torrid pace that he set at the end of 1973.


Ben earned over \$76,000 for those first nine starts as a pro in 1973, including winning the San Antonio-Texas Open in his first try after earning his Tour playing card and finishing three-shots back of Miller Barber in the 144-hole, \$500,000 World Open.

In 1974, Crenshaw started quickly with a second place at Tucson, chasing Johnny Miller for four rounds and finishing three strokes back, then starting with a 65 in San Diego and finishing sixth. He also tied for second at New Orleans and registered three other top-10 finishes and earned more than \$71,000 for the full year in 26 events.

When Crenshaw joined the Tour in the fall of 1973, he came with unparalleled amateur credentials. He was NCAA champion all three years he spent at the University of Texas, sharing the title with fellow Longhorn Tom Kite in 1972; he was a three-time All-American and a member of the 1972 U.S. line-up in the World Amateur Team Championship; he had a 69.9 stroke average for 42 competitive rounds in 1973 and he won the 1973 Western and Sunnehanna Amateur titles. Also, still as an amateur, he tied for third in the 1972 Heritage Classic and for sixth in the 1973 Houston Open, and was impressive in U.S. Open and Masters appearances.

In the 1973 TPD Qualifying School, Ben was 18-under par for 144 holes split between Perdido Bay in Pensacola and the Dunes Golf and Beach Club in Myrtle Beach and won by 12 strokes, closing with a spectacular 30 on the back nine at the Dunes!

1975 IN REVIEW

Rod Curl saved his best effort of 1975 until his final event, the Kaiser International Open at Napa, Calif., and it was just when he needed it.

He was 62d on the money list when the tournament began, but his 73-67-64-71—275 gave him second place by himself behind Johnny Miller, and he retained his exempt status for the third straight year. "This will make Christmas a little better," the three-fourths Wintu Indian said smiling, "Johnny got so far out in front I didn't think any of us would catch him, so I won my own little tournament, the one over the rest of the field."

He injured his left wrist in mid-summer of the year before and was off the Tour for most of the last three playing months. "The wrist really didn't get well until June," he said. "It held me back mentally and physically."

Still he had his good moments, such as a solo third in the Greater Milwaukee Open, and ties for ninth in the Florida Citrus Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic.

"I'm not as strong as I was before the wrist injury," he said, "and I can't overpower the courses the way I used to. But, I don't expect any problems from it in 1976, so I should be able to get a good fresh start."

Rod played in 31 tournaments, earning money in 20 while missing the cut in 11. He had four top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 72.0. His low round was the eight-under par 64 in the Kaiser which tied the North course record at Silverado.

PRIOR YEARS

Since Rod Curl joined the Tour in 1969 he improved steadily but unspectacularly until 1973. He then tripled his earnings from the year before and crashed the top 60 money list, and in 1974 more than doubled his winnings again, thanks largely to his first victory.

The Californian finished in the top 10 five times in 1973, winding up the year with a solo eighth and a \$4,425 check in the Walt Disney World Classic.

Curl missed the cut and withdrew in his first two 1974 events, then startled observers at San Diego by finishing one stroke back of winner Bobby Nichols, after poor drives on the 70th and 71st holes. His tie for second with Gene Littler, worth \$15,725, was the highest finish of his career to date.

Two months later he was ninth and fourth in back-to-back events, the Heritage Classic and New Orleans. Six weeks after that, in Houston, Curl trailed by one shot entering the last 18 holes. After missing a number of birdie chances, he wound up one stroke back of winner Dave Hill to land in a three-way tie for second once more.

The very next week in Fort Worth, the 5-foot-5 "Yoso" ("my Indian name; it means 'Johnny Come from Behind'") was two back entering the final round of the Colonial National, rallied, faltered, then jumped ahead of Jack Nicklaus with a curling 30-foot putt on No. 16 and won \$50,000 first prize in the Tour's first designated event.

Rod was 19 before he took up golf, after concentrating on baseball in high school. After graduation he worked in construction near his Northern California home town of Redding. His golf record was undistinguished until he played well in the 1968 U.S. Amateur in Columbus, Ohio, which moved him to turn pro that fall.

1975 IN REVIEW

The year started well enough for Bruce Devlin, as he tied for sixth in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, his first event. That was despite a final round of 76 in the high winds that swept over the rugged Pebble Beach links.

Only once again did the handsome Australian make it into the top 10, as he tied for fifth in the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, thanks to a third-round 66. His next best was a tie for 15th in the Masters after a 72-70 start, but a third-round 76 canceled out his hopes for a position among the contenders.

Money-wise, his \$26,627 was his lowest figure since 1967 when he was having leg problems. His career earnings of \$660,455, though, place him well up among the top 50 of all-time and thus assure him of exempt status for another year.

For many years, he lived in the Miami, Fla., area, but has moved to Houston, Tex., and is playing out of the Walden Golf and Country Club in Conroe.

Bruce played in 24 tournaments, earning money in 16, missing the cut in six and withdrawing once. He only had two top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 72.4. His low round was the 66 at Citrus.

PRIOR YEARS

Bruce Devlin experienced his worst year in 1974 since he suffered leg problems in 1967, missing the top 60 money list with less than \$40,000 in official purses. He missed three cuts in his first four tournaments but missed only two more in his next 16. He was a contender several times but wound up the year with only two top 10 finishes, a tie for third in the Doral-Eastern and for ninth in the World Open.

A highly respected international competitor, Bruce has won the Open and PGA titles in his native Australia, and also the French and New Zealand Opens and the 1970 Alcan, which was played in Ireland.

He has won nine times since joining the U.S. Tour following the 1962 Masters. He was winless in his first two years here but, after a session on the practice tee with Jack Nicklaus preceding the 1964 St. Petersburg Open, he won that event to demonstrate the abilities which would make him a consistent performer for the next decade.

Bruce enjoyed his best year on Tour in 1972, although heavily involved in course design with partner Bob Von Hagge. He won the Houston Open and the USI Classic and wound up eighth on the money list. He also was fifth in the Masters and had four other top 10 finishes, including a second to countryman David Graham after two holes of a playoff in the Cleveland Open.

His earnings dropped by more than half in 1973, when he failed to win.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a decent year for Dale Douglass, but not as profitable as he thought it might be, especially after the fine start. Dale had three straight top 10 finishes in February - and then wasn't able to reach that plateau again all year.

He tied for ninth in the Hawaiian Open with three rounds in the 60s. He tied for ninth in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open in his next start, then went to the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open and, after opening with 68-69 which gave him a three-stroke lead, he slipped to 74-73 and a final 284.

Maybe a little disappointed by that, he went to the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic and finished well down the line. The next two weeks he missed the cuts. Although he never again missed the 36-hole axe for two weeks in a row, he couldn't find the secret to challenge.

His next best finish was a tie for 11th in the First NBC New Orleans Open with 67-69 for the middle rounds. He tied for 17th in the PGA Championship aided by a strong three-under par 67 the last afternoon at Akron Firestone.

Dale played in 31 tournaments and cashed checks for 24. He had a stroke average of 72.3 with four 67s his low.

PRIOR YEARS

After failing to reach the top 60 list two years in succession, Dale Douglass must have felt in 1974 that he had found some of his old consistency. The slim Coloradoan won more than \$50,000 for 56th place in the rankings and, in the 32 events he played in, he finished in the top 10 four times, all in late summer.


A second-day 67 at the B.C. Open helped him tie for eighth place. The following week at the Canadian Open he tied for fourth after a second-round 65, and the very next week he tied for fourth again in the Pleasant Valley Classic. Two weeks after that, Dale opened with 67-66 at Westchester and wound up tied for seventh, collecting his third \$7,000-plus check in a four-week span.

Until 1972, Douglass gained exempt status five times over a six-year period, but 1972 and 1973 found him struggling to win barely \$42,000 and missing the top 60 list both times.

A native of Wewoka, Okla., Douglass honed his golf game at the University of Colorado in the late 1950s and turned pro in 1960. The backing of a group of Denver businessmen pushed him out on the Tour in 1963, but it was six more years before he found the victory formula. In 1969 he won both the Azalea and Kemper Opens, and in 1970 he also won the Phoenix Open early on the schedule.

Quiet and unobtrusive, with a wry sense of humor, Douglass says he differs from Mr. Average Guy only by the two "ss's" at the end of his last name. "That," he says, "and the 19 I took at Pebble Beach in 1967. I keep hoping they will forget it, but it pops up every time I have an interview. They never mention I finished with all pars from there."

1975 IN REVIEW

Forrest Fezler was off to a quick start in 1975, but through most of the second half of the schedule, his normal effectiveness was not there because of a painful wrist injury. Even when he tried to play, he couldn't do the things he normally can do.

Forrest had four top 10 finishes in his first nine starts, though and appeared to be closing in on his second Tour victory. His best finish was in the Doral-Eastern Open. A third-round 67 moved him into a tie for the lead with Jack Nicklaus, but a one-under par 71 the final afternoon wasn't good enough.

The week previous, he finished 69-67 to tie for fifth in the Florida Citrus Open. He was solo fifth in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and solo sixth in the Hawaiian Open.

He had a chance in Hawaii, starting 69-67-68 to lead by one, but a closing 74 frustrated his bid.

Forrest appeared in 31 tournaments and made money in 17. He missed 10 cuts, but also was forced to withdraw four times because of the injury. His stroke average was 72.4 (it was 71.5 after Doral) and three 67s were his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Until Forrest Fezler arrived at Columbus, Ga., in September, 1974, his third full year on the Tour was stacking up as a close copy of his second. He had finished one stroke behind Hale Irwin in the U.S. Open and had tied for second the following week in the American Golf Classic, dropping out of a four-way playoff with a bogey on the first extra hole. Close finishes were becoming a gnawing habit.

Now he had a record of five second-place finishes and three close thirds in his young Tour career. At Columbus, Forrest never led until the final round, when he closed with a five-under-par 65 and—finally—a one-shot victory. "Winning, not the money, was the big thing. I had to get over that image of finishing second," Fezler said.

Forrest came to the Tour late in 1971 through the fall Qualifying School, two years after winning the 1969 California Amateur, Northern California Amateur and the California Junior College championship.

After failing to cash a check during a seven-week stretch in the summer of 1972, Fezler finished his first full Tour year in strong fashion with more than \$26,000. Since then he has been among the game's top performers.

He challenged again and again in 1973, only to find one of the super stars had beaten him. He finished second to Lee Trevino at Inverrary, second to Tom Weiskopf in Canada and second to Gary Player in the Southern Open. He led the American Golf Classic by two shots after 54 holes but wound up fifth behind Bruce Crampton. He tied for third in the Philadelphia Classic, again behind Weiskopf. But he won \$106,390.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was an astonishing beginning for Pat Fitzsimons. After drawing blanks for his first four tournaments, he suddenly found the flagsticks. He closed brilliantly in the Bob Hope Desert Classic with 67-67-66 to tie for fifth. The next week in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open, his final round 68 gave him a tie ninth.

Next was the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open at the famed Riviera Country Club. He started 70-71. Then fired a course-record 64 and leaped into a six-stroke lead. He finally won by four over Tom Kite, but the remarkable success story was completed. Just a year before, he left the Tour, nearly broke.

There is more to the story. He represents the Pennncross grass-growing people on the Tour, and after San Diego, he flew to New Orleans for a convention. He arrived in Los Angeles late Wednesday. His first look at Riviera was Thursday morning during his first round.

Those three weeks netted him more than \$40,000, far more than he had won altogether during his first two years on Tour.

His success continued. He was tied for the lead after the first day in the U.S. Open at Medinah, and was tied for second, three strokes in back of Frank Beard, after three rounds. A final-day 77 dropped him to a tie for ninth.

At Westchester, a third-day 66 put him within two of the lead, but a closing 73 left him alone in fifth place. At the World Open, he led after two rounds and was only one back after three, but a final 75 left him alone in fourth.

Pat may not be the most stylish dresser on the Tour, but he says he isn't comfortable in the tighter-fitting double knits. That's why he wears the loose-fitting cottons.

Pat was in 27 tournaments and earned money in 18. He missed six cuts, and twice, early in the year, failed to qualify on Monday. He had a stroke average of 71.6 with the 64 at Riviera his low.

PRIOR YEARS

The Tour almost lost Pat Fitzsimons in the spring of 1974. It was an incredible 29-29-58 on his home Salem, Ore., course that brought about an abrupt change in his plans.

When Pat earned his player's card in the fall of 1972, he decided to go it alone financially, with assistance from his mother. His rookie year brought him \$16,596. Not bad, but he wasn't satisfied.

"For economic reasons," he explained, "I started out in 1974 by myself. Mary (his wife) and I felt it would be cheaper if she stayed at home for awhile."

The opening weeks brought little success. After the Andy-Williams-San Diego Open in mid-February, he headed for home, nearly broke. He was hopeful of finding a sponsor. In mid-March, he toured the 6,000-plus yard Salem Country Club course in 58, and in his group that day was an official of the Pennncross-Manhattan grass growers.

Impressed, he felt Pat would be a good representative for the grass company and could be used in the marketing program. Two months later, Pat was back on Tour.

Pat started to play golf at age six, although he has a picture taken when he was two, with a cut-down golf club in his hands. His parents encouraged him to play and he started in tournaments at age eight.

He went on to win the Oregon Open as a 17-year-old and the next summer won the Northwest Open. Pat turned professional in 1971 and missed in his first attempt at qualifying for the Tour. He easily made it the next year, finishing as the third low qualifier.

1975 IN REVIEW

It certainly was a memorable year for Ray Floyd. He re-established himself as a winner on the Tour. He caught Gary Player on the final day of the Kemper Open in Charlotte, N.C., and won by three strokes over Player and John Mahaffey.

It was Ray's first Tour victory since he captured the PGA National championship at Dayton's National Cash Register Club in 1969. His first-day 65 gave him a two-stroke lead and he held it through 36 holes with his 71 on the second day for 136. Player came on strong the third day to gain the top rung, as Ray only could manage a 73, but his final-round 69 left him riding high.

Earlier in the year, he pushed J. C. Snead to the fourth extra hole in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open before bowing. His excellent play helped to earn him a position on the United States Ryder Cup team.

When asked about his resurgence the last two years, he simply replied, "I've just begun to like to play golf. Some of this comes with maturity, but I've been applying myself and working hard. The game's enjoyable for me."

Ray played in 27 tournaments, earning money in 20, missing the cut in five and withdrawing in two. He had five top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 71.7 and he had two 65s.

PRIOR YEARS

Since joining the Tour in 1963, Ray Floyd has been out of the top 60 only twice, in 1972 and 1973. He recovered from those lapses with a smashing year in 1974 that lacked little except outright victory.

Floyd finished in the top 10 eight times in 1974, missed the cut only twice and earned \$119,385 in official purses to rank 18th.

"I've got some personal goals now after playing on the Tour for five years without a purpose," Floyd said, doubtlessly referring to his young family. "It's mostly a change of attitude. I don't let everything bother me."

As a youngster, Ray wavered between a career in baseball and professional golf. When he won the National Jaycees tournament in 1960 his mind was made up.

He was chosen Rookie-of-the-Year after winning the 1963 St. Petersburg Open. He won the St. Paul Open in 1965. But 1969 was the most memorable year, when he won the Jacksonville Open, the American Golf Classic and the coveted PGA Championship, earning a lifetime exemption from qualifying.

Floyd is a native of Ft. Bragg, N.C., and the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Club in Fayetteville, N.C. He remains a serious baseball fan, specifically that of the Chicago Cubs, whom he frequently visits and even practices with on occasion.

1975 IN REVIEW

Twice, Rod Funseth was in the lead position after three rounds, but found the momentum dulled slightly the final day.

His 70-67-69 at Torrey Pines in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open placed him 10-under par and the leader by one stroke over Raymond Floyd. But, Rod put a last-day 74 on his scorecard and finished fourth, just one stroke out of the three-way playoff.

In the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas, Rod was tied with Bruce Crampton and Bob Eastwood after three days at 10-under par 203, he was one of the victims of Tom Watson's closing 65, so his 69-68-66-70—273 left him tied for fourth.

Rod also had two other top 10 finishes. He tied for sixth in the World Open at Pinehurst and did the same in the San Antonio-Texas Open.

He did return to the top 60 money winners for the year, coming back from a hand injury that forced him well down the list in 1974. While the hand still may not have been 100 percent, it was far better than the previous year.

Rod played in 26 tournaments and made the cut in 20. He compiled a stroke average of 71.6 with two 66s his best efforts.

PRIOR YEARS

In 1974, Rod Funseth followed his finest year on Tour with possibly his least productive, partly because a hand injury made it difficult for him to swing the club with accustomed authority.

Rod tied for third place in the Crosby Pro-Am but that was to be his lone top 10 finish for all of 1974. He made money in 15 of 27 events but missed the cut nine times and cashed checks for barely \$27,000.


Until 1974, Funseth had placed in the top 60 eight years out of nine, earning a high of almost \$90,000 in 1973 when he started fast by winning the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open for his second career victory. By mid-season he had surpassed his previous high in official purses, \$63,567 set in 1971.

Rod turned pro in 1956 and came on Tour in 1961 after working at various clubs as an assistant. He won the Phoenix Open in 1965 to begin his stretch of consistent performances that was to last almost a decade.

Among his other top efforts on Tour are a second in the 1967 '500' Festival at Indianapolis, ties for third in the 1965 and 1966 Canadian Opens and a third alone in the 1968 Phoenix Open.

In 1971 he lost a three-way playoff with Dave Eichelberger and Buddy Allin at Greensboro and added two third-place finishes toward his best year in purses to that time. Rod had four finishes in the top 10 in 1972, the best being ties for third at Jacksonville and Tallahassee.

1975 IN REVIEW

This lanky Southern Californian seems to be getting better with age. He easily had the finest campaign of his 16-year career, winning two tournaments, finishing second in two others and earning nearly twice as much as he ever has before in a single season.

He picked two of the big ones for his triumphs, too - the Tournament Players Championship at Foothill's Colonial Country Club, and the Tournament of Champions at LaCosta, Calif. In the latter, he had to defeat Gary Player in sudden death to do it.

The second-place finishes came early in the year. He started with a 66 in the rain-plagued Hawaiian Open and then had to birdie the 72d hole to finish one in back of Gary Groh. After a 71-75 start in the Greater Greensboro Open, he came back super-strong with 66-66 to close within three of Tom Weiskopf.

He was a wire-to-wire leader in the Tournament Players Championship, although Dave Stockton had him by one at the turn of the final afternoon. Al threw a two-under par 33 at Dave on the trip home, and won it by three.

In the T of C, he only had three bogeys all week, but one came at the 72d and thus the tie with Player. On the first extra hole, his eight-iron approach was to nine feet and he rolled home the birdie putt from there.

All of his steady play earned him a position on the United States Ryder Cup team.

Al played in 26 tournaments and cashed checks from 21 of them. He missed the cut in the other five. He compiled a stroke average of 71.4, with a 64 at Hartford and four 66s being his best.


PRIOR YEARS

After suffering through eight years without victory and enduring a multitude of personal and physical problems, Al Geiberger had the feeling that he may never win on Tour again. But on a sunny Sunday in the fall of 1974 in the Nevada desert he broke through to win the Sahara Invitational by three strokes.

"Every time you get in contention someone will ask how long it has been since you have won, and all you do is cut some years off and mumble a lot," Geiberger said when the drought ended. "Winning became more and more important and it also seemed harder and harder to do. Second place means nothing to me at this stage of my career."

Akron's Firestone Country Club was good to Al in the mid-1960s, when he won the 1965 American Golf Classic and the 1966 PGA Championship there. Two more good years, however, were followed by four rather lean ones, during which an internal disorder sent him home to California for long periods of time.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was another profitable year for Gibby Gilbert, as he played steadily, if not exceptionally. He finished with six top 10 performances the best being back-to-back ties for fourth in the Western Open and the Greater Milwaukee Open.

He had a solo fifth in the Southern Open with four rounds in the sixties. The others were ties for ninth with back-to-back efforts in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and the Atlanta Classic, and finally in the Kaiser International Open. It was a second-day 65 at Atlanta that propelled him into the good finish.

Although he tied for 16th in the Sahara Invitational, it was satisfying to him the way he did it. An opening 73 left him 10 strokes back, and then he roared home with 67-69-66 for a nine-under par 275.

Gibby played in 34 tournaments and earned money in 25. He had a stroke average of 71.8 with a 65 and two 66s being his low.

PRIOR YEARS

Gibby Gilbert earned his players card at the 1967 Tour Qualifying School where he was second to low qualifier Bobby Cole and was graduated with such players as Deane Beman, Tony Jacklin, Orville Moody, Bob Murphy and Lee Elder. He struggled through meager earnings for two full years before he won the Houston Champions International and more than \$65,000 for the entire year of 1970.

In 1971, Gibby recorded six straight birdies en route to a tie for second in the Westchester Classic. His earnings held steady over the \$60,000 mark that year but they slipped badly in 1972, and by the following spring he was ready to give up the Tour in favor of golf sales. Suddenly, his performance improved.

Beginning with the American Golf Classic in June 1973, Gilbert made the cut in 13 straight events and returned to the top 60 list with more than \$60,000 in official purses once more.

A highlight of Gilbert's 1973 campaign was a course-record 62 at the famed Pinehurst No. 2 course on opening day of the 144-hole World Open. It shattered the previous record by three strokes, but Tom Watson matched it the following week.

The year 1974 was lucrative again as he barely missed \$70,000 and almost won his second Tour event, the Sea Pines Heritage Classic. Gilbert shot 71-71-68 in the first three rounds but wound up four shots back of Johnny Miller and in second place alone with \$23,250.

Gibby, who was born without a first name—C.L. Gilbert Jr.—began to make a name for himself in golf when he first took up the game at age 13 in his native Chattanooga. In 1962 he quit the University of Chattanooga, married and became an assistant pro in Hollywood, Fla.

1975 IN REVIEW

Although Bob Goalby has been one of the Tour's leading players for nearly two decades, he now will be spending more time at The Springs, a beautiful new club in Palm Desert, Calif., where he is the head professional.

His career earnings of \$629,457 places him well up the list for an exemption for 1976 in the "all-time top 50 money winners" category. His best finish during the past year was a tie for 19th in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

Several times, he was in decent position only to have one round spoil the bid for a final charge, such as at Atlanta Classic where he opened with a 69, and the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, where he opened with a 67.

Bob played in 22 tournaments, his lowest number in many years, earning money in 12 and missing the cut nine times. He also withdrew once. He compiled a stroke average of 73.4.

PRIOR YEARS

Bob Goalby earned 11 letters in athletics at Belleville, Ill., High School and turned down several major league baseball offers to enter the University of Illinois on a football scholarship. He stayed one year, because his heart was in golf and he wanted to join the Tour, which he did in 1957.

One year later Bob won at Greensboro and began a stretch of 15 years in which he was absent from the top 60 list only once. Among his 11 tour titles was the 1968 Masters, a tournament perhaps best known for Roberto deVicenzo's signing an incorrect scorecard but one in which Goalby shot four rounds in the 60s for an 11-under-par 277, at the time fourth lowest total in that major championship's history.


Goalby still owns one long-standing Tour record, eight straight birdies in the final round of the 1961 St. Petersburg Open, en route to his fourth Tour victory.

His last three victories—in the 1969 Robinson, 1970 Heritage and 1971 Bahamas Open—came near the end of the schedule each year and twice saved his exemption status.

He had four top 10 finishes in 1973, the best a tie for third at St. Louis, and barely made the top 60 money list.

Bob made money in 13 of 25 events during 1974, the best a tie for 14th in the Doral-Eastern Open when he closed with 69-69. He also tied for 17th at Akron and for 22nd in the Masters after poor starts.

1975 IN REVIEW

David Graham closed with a flurry of birdies in the B.C. Open at Endicott, N.Y., in late August and it nearly netted him his second Tour victory. Instead, he had to settle for a tie for second as Don Iverson swept to his first triumph.

"I played like my life depended on it," he said. "I was out of it and it looked as if I'd be a seventh place finisher, but I hit my six best shots of the tournament in getting three birdies at 14, 15 and 17." He had a 20 footer for another at the 18th, but didn't get the one that would have forced the playoff.

He had three 68s and a 71 that week for his nine-under par score of 275. He also used a closing 67 to tie for eighth in the First NBC New Orleans Open and he finished in the same position two weeks later in the Kemper Open. A pair of even-par 70s at Firestone led him to a tie for 10th in the PGA championship.

David is highly-respected as a golf club designer and he is consulted frequently by his colleagues. The last two years, he has played well in the latter half of the season, and said that he believes it is because "I don't work hard enough on my game early in the year."

David played in 30 tournaments and made money in 22. He missed the cut eight times, but five of them came in succession - after tying for 13th in the year's first event, the Phoenix Open. He compiled a stroke average of 72.0, and had two 65s and three 66s for his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

After turning pro in 1962 at age 16, David Graham began his tournament career in the late 1960s in his native Australia and on the Far East Circuit. In the 1969 Singapore Open he tied for first place after a tournament-record 62 but lost the playoff. He then entered the 1970 ATP Qualifying School with a "sure thing" tag from close observers.

He failed to get his players card, but the following week he and Bruce Devlin won the World Cup for Australia in the annual tournament in Buenos Aires, and David placed second individually.


In 1971 Graham won the Caracas Open and the Japanese Airlines Tournament, passed the U.S. Tour qualifying test on his second try and won over \$10,000 in official American purses. And in 1972 he fulfilled many of the glowing predictions of him.

Using a set of Australian-made irons that Arnold Palmer gave him (in exchange for an old Tommy Armour putter), Graham defeated Devlin on the second playoff hole of the 1972 Cleveland Open and finished the year with more than \$55,000. He also lost a four-way playoff in the Liggett & Myers Open and, abroad, was beaten by Gay Brewer in extra holes in the Taiheiyo Club Masters in Japan.

Graham started 1973 with a second-place tie at Los Angeles, but it was a long year as he missed the top 60. He was fighting to regain that same exemption status in late 1974 when his fortunes turned favorable for a two-month stretch.

In the last six tournaments of 1974, Graham won more than \$30,000 and easily regained the top 60, his best effort a tie for sixth at Sahara after scoring 67-67.

1975 IN REVIEW

Regardless of what he does through the rest of his golf career, there never will be a week to equal the one in June last year at the Medinah Country Club in suburban Chicago. It was wet and hot and muddy, but to Lou Graham, it forever will be beautiful.

It was the week he won the United States Open championship in an 18-hole playoff over John Mahaffey. "It really is hard for me to sit here and think I'm the U.S. Open champion," he said softly and with his Tennessee drawl. "It's the dream of a lifetime. Every kid, when he starts playing golf, dreams of winning the U.S. Open."

Lou was seven strokes back after his first-round 74. After the second day, he was 11-strokes back, with 146 to Tom Watson's Open record of 135. Then he made a big move. His 68 on Saturday gave him a one-over par 214, only four off Frank Beard's third-round score. Finally, his closing 73 gave him the three-over par 287 and a tie with Mahaffey.

The next day, Lou birdied early and went on to win the playoff, with even-par 71 to John's 73.

Three times Lou finished fourth. He was alone in that position at the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur and Greater Jacksonville, but tied for fourth in the Hawaiian Open. He also was named to the Ryder Cup team and played well, being a member of three winning team matches, and losing one singles.

Lou played in 26 tournaments and made money in 23. He only missed two cuts and finished out of the money in another. He compiled a stroke average of 71.7 and had three 65s for his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Lou Graham, the man from Nashville with the erect carriage but low profile otherwise, strides quietly down the fairways year after year, claiming a piece of the purse week after week and winding up comfortably in the top 60.

Since first crashing the exemption list in 1967, three years after joining the Tour, Lou has missed the top 60 only once, when tendonitis in the left hand—and resulting surgery—limited his play in 1969.


Lou took up golf at age 10 and earned a scholarship to Memphis State, where he stayed three years. "I didn't like school from the day I went into the first grade," he remarks on his early departure.

He enlisted in the Army and served in the President's Honor Guard, but that duty wasn't much better than school. "I wanted out from the day I got in," Graham says of that experience.

He turned pro after discharge in 1962 and worked at a club near Baltimore until finding backers to send him on the Tour in 1964. He developed into a consistently high finisher, winning the 1967 Minnesota Classic and the 1972 Liggett & Myers Open. Also memorable was a three-week stretch in early-spring 1973 when he finished one stroke out of first place at Jacksonville, New Orleans and Greensboro.

In 1974, Graham started very slowly, winning less than \$6,000 in his first 13 tournaments. Then he finished seventh in the Colonial National Invitation and tied for second in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, two shots behind Gary Player. Four other top 10 finishes followed, including a tie for third in the U.S. Open which went largely unnoticed, and he completed the year with only two missed cuts.

1975 IN REVIEW

After finishing second alone to Gene Littler in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, the third week of the year, Hubert Green waited until the end of summer to put together four weeks that helped to keep him up among the game's superstars.

After withdrawing from the PGA Championship due to the death of his father, Hubert then finished second in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, losing in sudden-death to Don Bies on the second extra hole; was third by himself the next week in the Tournament Players Championship on the tough Colonial course in Fort Worth, Tex.; tied for fifth in the B.C. Open at Endicott, N.Y., and then won the Southern Open at Columbus, Ga., overtaking John Schroeder on the final day. That stretch netted him nearly \$70,000.

Right in the middle of it all, on the Monday after Hartford, his wife, Judy, presented him with their first child, a son, Hubert Myatt III. Hubie was there for that great occasion, too.

The victory week was an impressive one, he had rounds of 68, 66, 66 and 64 for a 16-under par total of 264. He credited his hot streak to a change in putting styles. "My stance now is more like the one Jack Nicklaus uses," he said. "My feet are more wide open."

His other top 10 finish was a tie for eighth in the Masters, as he closed with a pair of 70s.

Hubert played in 28 tournaments and made money in 22. He had six top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 71.4, with one 64, two 65s and five 66s.

PRIOR YEARS

Despite one relatively disappointing year, 1972, Hubert Green has quickly established himself as one of the game's premier players since gaining his Tour players card in the fall of 1970.

In his rookie year he earned more than \$73,000 and won the Houston Champions International in a playoff with Don January, in addition to placing second, third and fourth twice in other events.

Although he barely made the top 60 in 1972, the year was rewarding in that he married the former Judi Rowlands, whom he met during the San Diego Open. "I was looking for my parents and found Hubert," Judi says. Then, after missing the cut in nine of 26 events, Green finished the year with 10 straight in-the-money performances.


He started slowly again in 1973, missing the cut in four of his first six tournaments, but steadied dramatically. Green won the Tallahassee Open and the B.C. Open and collected eight other top 10 finishes, including a tie for fourth in the Walt Disney World.

It added up to almost \$115,000 for the year, and if that seemed like a tough act to follow, Hubert topped it. In 1974 he won four tournaments and more than \$210,000, finishing behind only Johnny Miller and Jack Nicklaus on the money list.

In his sixth tournament of 1974, Green closed with a 65 in the Bob Hope Desert Classic to beat out Bert Yancey. Five weeks later he won again at Jacksonville. At the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, Hubert shot the last three rounds in 67-66-68 to win again. Then he joined hometown pal Mac McLendon to win the year's final event, the National Team Championship at Disney World.

Green won seven major amateur titles before turning pro, including two Southern, and declined a Walker Cup invitation to compete in the 1970 Tour Qualifying School.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a day Gary Groh will treasure for the rest of his life. There he was, battling Arnold Palmer and Al Geiberger through the tense final holes of the Hawaiian Open - and he won.

It was the first main Tour victory of his career and the way his swing held up under the intense pressure was most impressive. His opening 68 placed him two strokes in back of Geiberger, but Gary had an embarrassing moment that day. At the 12th, his 30 footer ran seven feet past the cup. His comebacker stopped on the lip. He walked up to it and took a casual pass at the ball to tap it in - and missed the ball completely.

He didn't lose his composure, though, and his second-straight 68 moved him into a tie with Palmer for second, just one in back of Geiberger. Forrest Fezler took the third-round lead, while Gary fell two off the pace with a 70 for 206.

On the final day of the rain-delayed tournament, Gary, Palmer and Geiberger were tied as they entered the final nine. When they came to the closing holes, Gary, playing the 18th, and Arnold, the 17th, were tied for the lead, with Al one back. But, Arnold bogeyed, when he missed the green, Gary birdied the 18th to win it. Al also birdied the 18th to clinch second, and Arnold settled for third.

The victory was worth \$44,000. His only other top 10 finish was a tie for sixth in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, thanks to a closing 66.

Gary entered 31 tournaments and was in the money 16 times. He compiled a stroke average of 72.7 with the 66 his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

There was a time when Gary Groh was referred to as the "King of the Second Tour." He won four of those events through the 1973 and 1974 campaigns. "I was happy to win them," he said. "The Second Tour was a great stepping stone for me."

Gary did not have a lot of amateur experience, so the competition and the tastes of victory were invaluable to him.

He missed in his first attempt at the qualifying school in the fall of 1968, but came back to get his card in the spring of 1969. "I didn't play well at all, though," he says. At the end of the year, his playing card was lifted.

It wasn't until the fall of 1971 that he tried again, and made it. "I also got married about that time, and I was more adjusted to the situation." Although his progress was not as rapid as he wanted, he said, "I did get a little better each year, so I really wasn't discouraged."

Gary started to play the game at age seven. It wasn't until he was in the Navy and stationed at Patuxent River, Md., for two years that his game developed. He was in special services and worked in the pro shop at the Naval Air Station course.

Upon his discharge, he went to the Bahamas and worked for Craig Wood. During the summer of 1968, he was an assistant under Bob Toski. He also worked for Toski briefly in the winter of 1970-71, and was an assistant professional at the Jackson, Mich., Country Club in the summer of 1971 before regaining his Tour card.

1975 IN REVIEW

Mark Hayes came on the Tour with little fanfare, but in just two years, he is showing why he was able to establish such a fine amateur record. He moved into the top 60 in 1975, mainly because of an exceptionally strong and consistent second half of the season.

Through his first 14 tournaments, he had missed five cuts and his best finish was a tie for 12th in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open. In his final 17, he only missed it three times and had four top 10 finishes.

His best effort was a solo third in the Ed McMahon Jaycees-Quad Cities Open. His 70-68-70-69-277, seven-under par, was two off the pace. The week previous, he tied for eighth in the Greater Milwaukee Open with 68-66 for his middle rounds. Back-to-back tenth-place finishes came in the B.C. Open and the Southern Open. He had a second-day 65 in the Southern.

Mark played in 33 tournaments and made money in 24. He missed eight cuts and finished out of the money in another. His stroke average was 71.8 with a 65 and two 66s his best.

PRIOR YEARS

As a youngster, Mark Hayes never doubted that one day he would be on the PGA Tour. He was completely dedicated to the game and either practiced or played every chance he had.

"One of the reasons I was so dedicated," he says, "is that I was small for my age. I couldn't do anything else. I practiced every day, before school and after school. I never thought of doing anything else for a living but play golf."

He started at age six under the eye of his father, who was a high school physical education teacher and golf coach. At age 13, the family moved to Stillwater, Okla., and he came under the wing of Labron Harris, Sr. at Oklahoma State, a good friend of Mark's dad.


He started tournament play at age 10. Competing against the 11 and 12-year olds, he "won by a whole bunch" nearly every time. One of the highlights of his young career came when he was 17, and he defeated Tom Kite of Austin in the final of the Texas-Oklahoma junior championship.

He caddied in five Oklahoma City Opens when that event was a regular Tour stop, and was a student at Oklahoma State for four years (lacks six hours for degree). He was on the 1970 and 1971 All-America teams and was runner-up to Gary Cowan in the 1971 U.S. Amateur. In 1972, he played on the World Amateur Cup team for the U.S.

Mark spent two years in the Army, mostly at Fort Jackson, S.C. He spent most of his time working at the base golf course with fellow tourist Joe Inman, Jr. After his discharge in 1973, he went through the Tour qualifying school.

Mark had good success as a rookie, winning \$40,620 for 65th place. His best finish was a tie for fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

1975 IN REVIEW

Although he was shut out of the victory column and his money total was the lowest in five years, it still was a rather profitable year for easy-going Jerry Heard.

In the first tournament, he fired a 65 on the final day to finish second in the Phoenix Open with a 10-under par score of 274. But, he lost by 14 strokes to Johnny Miller. Jerry grinned afterwards, "I feel like I won the tournament."

A month later, Jerry had a solo third-place finish in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, again, Miller being the winner. He had four other top 10 finishes, but one of the more surprising was his tie for fourth in the Western Open at the Butler National course in Oak Brook, Ill.

Jerry, along with Lee Trevino and Bobby Nichols, was hospitalized on the evening of the second round as the result of receiving the jolt of a sudden bolt of lightning. Because of rain and wetness, the second round was wiped out and play did not resume again until Sunday. Jerry was discharged from the hospital Saturday evening, and was the only one of the three to continue play.

Jerry played in 27 tournaments and earned money in 24. He missed two cuts and finished out of the money in another event. He compiled a stroke average of 71.7 with two 65s being his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

"There's only one goal I've ever set," Jerry Heard says. "I want to win \$100,000 a year. If you do that you usually have to win a tournament or two."

In his first six years on the Tour, Jerry reached the hundred-grand level three times and won \$535,633 and four tournaments.

Heard took up golf at age 11, and a year later he was shooting par, a result of daily practice at a municipal course in California operated by his father.

He dropped out of Fresno State College in 1968 to attend the Tour Qualifying School, made good, but he earned barely \$10,000 in his first year, 1969. In his first five tournaments of 1970 he earned only \$133 but he was married in May and recorded five top 10 finishes while cracking the top 60 list.


In 1971, Jerry won the American Golf Classic by three strokes and easily topped his \$100,000 goal. He won the Florida Citrus and the Colonial, and more than \$137,000, in 1972 when he produced 11 top 10 finishes.

Heard was winless in 1973 but a pair of seconds on strong courses, Colonial National and Harbour Town, helped him compile almost \$95,000. Then followed his finest year overall.

During the month of March, 1974, in Florida, Heard won \$59,000 in three tournaments. He started in the Florida Citrus by rejecting a new swing and going back to "my way," and shot a 15-under-par 273 for a three-stroke victory worth \$30,000.

The next week he opened with a 65 at Doral but a double bogey on the 72nd hole left him a shot back of winner Buddy Allin. Then he was third at Jacksonville, where a closing 68 left him three strokes back of Hubert Green.

1975 IN REVIEW

There are few people who enjoy playing golf more than Lionel Hebert. He is one of the game's better good-will ambassadors and has spent many hours and years working to improve the image of the Tour.

Even after two decades, Lionel continues to be competitive. His best finish last year was a tie for fifth in the Houston Open with 69-71-70-69—279, or nine-under par on the Woodlands course. He also tied for 10th in the Greater Milwaukee Open.

On several occasions, Lionel had a problem staying away from the high numbers in one round which cost him dearly, such as the 72-80 in the Canadian Open.

One of Lionel's favorite diversions is to blow his trumpet and at such sites as the Bob Hope Desert Classic, he can be found taking his place on the bandstand.

Lionel entered 28 tournaments and was in the money on seven occasions, most of those coming during the second half of the year. He compiled a stroke average of 73.7.

PRIOR YEARS

Lionel Hebert has been one of the PGA Tour's leading citizens for nearly 20 years, and there isn't any sign of him slowing down.

Undoubtedly, the highlight of his colorful career was his victory in the PGA National Championship in 1957, his first year out, when he defeated Dow Finsterwald, 2 and 1, at Miami Valley in Dayton. That was the final PGA to be decided at match play.

Three years later, older brother Jay (there is five years difference) won the PGA at Akron Firestone. Lionel has won four other tournaments, his last being the 1966 Florida Citrus Open.


Over the years, Lionel has been involved deeply with the affairs of the Tour. He was a member of the Tournament Committee in 1961 through 1963. In 1963, he was chairman of the committee.

In 1972, he was summoned again, and he returned as a player director on the Policy Board, and served through 1974. There have been times when a player has been needed to represent the Tour, and Lionel always has been available, willingly giving his time.

Although Lionel first appeared on the Tour in 1952, he didn't become a regular until 1957.

Jay since has retired from the Tour, but they still are among the more popular partners in the National Team Play championships.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was not what you would call a vintage year for Dave Hill, at least it wasn't until his next to last individual event of the year.

It was a year when he had problems putting everything together, "just looking for some sort of consistent action," he said. But, in the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas, while his swing may not have been classic, his burning desire to win certainly was.

Battling in his own admirable way, Dave was carried to the first extra hole of sudden death before he emerged victorious over Rik Massengale. He did it on rounds of 68, 66, 67 and 69 for 14-under par 270. Yet, he said, "My game is so bad it's embarrassing. I haven't hit but four good shots all week."

Over the years, it seems as if the more trouble Dave says he is having with his game, the more dangerous he becomes. Truly, he is one of the more gifted shotmakers on the Tour.

Dave played in 29 tournaments and earned money in 19. He missed seven cuts and withdrew three times. His stroke average was 71.5 with the 66 and 67 at Sahara his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Ever since he joined the Tour in 1959, Dave Hill has been one of its most colorful members, but also one with an exceptional record of performance. Examples would be the years 1972 and 1973, when he competed only 21 times in each yet earned more than \$90,000 both years.

Hill needed only one year of seasoning on Tour before he made the top 60 list to stay. He earned less than \$50,000 a year in official purses until 1969 when he won three tournaments and \$156,423 (second only to Frank Beard) and won the Vardon Trophy with a 70.344 stroke average for 90 rounds...Dave finished 10th on the money list in 1970, then began limiting his tournament appearances. He cut his appearances further in 1972 but played more efficiently, winning the Monsanto Open and posting seven other top 10 finishes, none worse than sixth place.

In 1973 he won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic for the fourth time and finished in the top 10 eight other times while missing the cut only once. He also qualified for his second Ryder Cup team.

Hill did not rejoin the Tour after the 1973 Ryder Cup matches, electing for surgery to remove a cartilage in a knee which had bothered him for some time. The move probably helped him perform well enough in 1974 to show his second most profitable year.

The competitive year didn't get untracked until May, when Hill arrived at the Houston Open and said, "I don't expect to win; I'm not playing well enough." But he did win, closing with a 65 which captured his 11th Tour title.

1975 IN REVIEW

Twice Joe Inman Jr. finished tournaments with 67s and in both cases, he wound up in third place for his best efforts of a good year. The talkative Carolinian fired 68-70-71-67—276 for 12-under par in the Houston Open, and went 67-70-67-67—271 for 13-under par in the Sahara Invitational, to finish only one stroke out of the playoff.

Houston has become one of Joe's favorite events. In his rookie year, he tied for fifth.

He had two other top 10 finishes, a tie for eighth in the Greater Jacksonville Open and a tie for ninth in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

There also were a few days he'd like to forget. His opening 66 in the Atlanta Classic put him in a tie for the lead, but a 76 the next day ended all his hopes. Going the other way, in the World Open at Pinehurst, he started with an embarrassing 79, but roared back with a 67.

There were eight times in 1975 when Joe's first round was in the sixties, but found his second round slipping into the seventies.

Joe played in 32 tournaments and had four top 10 finishes, as he also made money in 22. He compiled a stroke average of 71.8 and had three 66s.

PRIOR YEARS

Joe Inman entered the last official tournament of 1974, the San Antonio-Texas Open, battling a half-dozen other players for a placing in the top 60 for the year. "It's like pressure I've never seen before," Inman said that week. "I'm sure leading the Masters or the Open couldn't be worse."

Joe responded to the challenge with a 69-66-70-70 to tie for 13th and wind up 55th in exemption points, although 61st on the money list. Joe also had four top 10 finishes in his first full year on Tour.


Inman is one of a long line of Wake Forest products to come out on the Tour. Before graduating in 1970 he won the 1968 Carolinas Open, and the 1970 North Carolina Amateur and the 1969 North-South Amateur and was chosen to the 1969 Walker Cup team. The amateur circuit seasoned his attitude as well as his golf game.

"Most people are victims of escalating goals," he says. "My own goals are family oriented—my wife and children, and a house. However, I'm very, very happy about being able to make my living by doing what I love, and that's playing golf."

When Joe joined the tour in 1973, one of the things he couldn't understand was the advisability of taking a week's rest occasionally.

"I couldn't figure out why the players didn't compete every week," he said. "Now, after a year of the Tour, and the pressure, and the problems involved with the traveling all over the country, I know."

1975 IN REVIEW

There is no questioning the superstar status of Hale Irwin. He is one, in the truest sense of the word. Just the fact that he finished in the top 10 in 14 of his 22 tournaments last year attests to his extraordinary skills.

Despite his brilliant shotmaking, he still does not receive the complete attention he should, mainly because of his quiet, business-like approach to the tasks at hand.

"I'm a professional golfer first and foremost," he has said. "I'm out there to play the best that I can, and to win." As a result, the Tour knows no fiercer competitor.

There were two victories added to the Irwin collection in 1975, in the Atlanta Classic by four strokes over Tom Watson (66-69-68-68—271, 17-under par); and the Western Open by one over Bobby Cole.

He was second in the Florida Citrus Open to Lee Trevino and tied for third in the United States Open, just one stroke out of the playoff. He also had two fourths and three fifths. His final-round 64 at Augusta National gave him a tie for fourth in the Masters. He also was instrumental in the U.S. Ryder Cup victory over Great Britain.

Hale continued his success overseas, winning the World Picadilly Match Play crown for the second straight year in England, and finishing ninth in the British Open.

Hale played in 22 United States Tour events and only missed the cut once. He had 14 top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 70.9, which tied him with Watson and Gene Littler for the fourth best of the year. He had a 64 and three 65s among his 25 rounds in the 60s.


PRIOR YEARS

Six years after graduation from the University of Colorado in 1968, with a degree in marketing, an NCAA golf title and two selections to the All-Big Eight football team as a defensive back, Hale Irwin had established himself as one of the finest golfers in the world. His performance in the 1974 U.S. Open sealed it.

Irwin is invariably a contender, especially on difficult courses, as evidenced by his victories. Twice he won the Heritage Classic on the Harbour Town Golf Links on Hilton Head Island, S.C.

Hale just missed the \$100,000 level in earnings in 1971, then topped that figure easily the next two years, finishing in the top 10 in 23 tournaments over the two years. In 1974, a strong fourth-place finish in the Masters convinced him that he could win a major title. Three weeks before the U.S. Open he told his wife that he had dreamed he won it.

1975 IN REVIEW

Those final few minutes of the B.C. Open seemed to last a lifetime for Don Iverson. He was in the scoring tent with his 10-under par 66-69-71-68—274, watching and waiting for Jim Colbert and David Graham to play the final hole. They were one-stroke back, so a birdie would send it into a playoff.

They only parred, so the stocky, friendly fellow from Wisconsin had his first victory. He had to overtake Butch Baird to do it though. Butch led by two after the second and third rounds.

"Midway through the last round," Don recalled, "I noticed three or four fellows were tied with me at eight under. I really didn't want to look at the scoreboard because I never had won. So, I just told myself not to worry about what someone else was doing."

His only other top 10 finish was in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open, as he tied for fourth. Even with the victory, it was not the smooth, steady year he'd like to have. During the last half of the year, he missed four straight cuts, made four straight (including his victory), and then missed the last three.

Don played in 34 events and made money in 17. His stroke average of 72.6 with three 66s being his low. This is his first trip into the top 60.

PRIOR YEARS

Although the record shows Don Iverson joined the Tour in 1968, his stay was one of the briefest in history. "I played one tournament, the Lucky International in San Francisco, and then was drafted into the Army."

Two years later, he rejoined the Tour to stay. "The first year, about all I did was get my eyes opened and find out what it was all about."


The next two years were more promising. In 1972, he finished third to Deane Beman in the Quad Cities Open and played well in the Kaiser International. The following year, he gained national attention with an exceptional effort in the PGA National Championship at the Canterbury Golf Club. He was tied for the lead through the first and second rounds and still was challenging in the third when he hit a ball out of bounds at the 15th. He finished fifth, six strokes in back of winner Jack Nicklaus.

A letdown came in 1974 as he slipped to \$22,288, but he says, "it mostly was mental."

Don started in the game at age 10 and was encouraged by his father. He won the Wisconsin State Junior titles at ages 14 and 16. At age 17, he won the International Jaycees crown in Midland, Texas.

He went to Wisconsin State University (now University of Wisconsin at LaCrosse) and was graduated in 1968. He won the NAIA (small college) championship and the Wisconsin State Amateur in 1966.

1975 IN REVIEW

Tony Jacklin's return to the United States Tour was not the smashing success he had hoped it would be. Nevertheless, he is glad to be back. "I know now that I will have to continue to play in the States, always, if I want to continue as a world golfer."

After five years on the PGA circuit, the handsome Englishman gave up his playing privileges in the U.S. to lend his full support to the European Tour and to be closer to his family.

He continued to enjoy reasonable success, but for tax-shelter purposes, he moved to the Channel Isle of Jersey and then decided to return to the U.S. Tour. His first appearance was in the Greater Greensboro Open and he finished 12th, winning \$4,218. That was his best effort. The next week, he missed the cut in the Masters.

Meanwhile, Tony applied to have his playing privileges reinstated, and they were granted in early May. He officially started back in the First NBC New Orleans Open, tying for 32d.

He made 12 more starts and his best finish was a tie for 18th in his last event, the Sahara Invitational, closing with a 67.

Tony played in 15 tournaments on the U.S. Tour and made money in nine. He compiled a stroke average of 72.5 with his low round being the final one, the 67.

PRIOR YEARS

Certainly one of the great players ever to come out of Great Britain, Tony Jacklin left his mark on the U.S. Tour before he left it late in the 1972 campaign. He earned his player's card in the 1967 school, and the following year, he won the Greater Jacksonville Open. His 273 equaled the tournament record set by Doug Sanders in 1966.

His triumph in the 1969 British Open made him the first home-grown champion since Max Faulkner in 1951. Just 11 months later, he conquered the high winds at Hazeltine in Chaska, Minn., to win the U.S. Open and thus was the first since Ted Ray in 1920 to take this coveted crown back to Great Britain.

He also was the first Briton to ever hold the two Opens jointly.

Tony's first glimpse of golf was as a caddy for his father, a truck driver in Scunthorpe, Lincolnshire. Soon, he started to play himself. His first victory was in the British Assistant's in 1965. It wasn't long until he was testing his skills around the world, and he was a winner in the Dunlop Masters at home and the New Zealand PGA, both in 1967.

Five times he has distinguished himself as a member of the British Ryder Cup team.

1975 IN REVIEW

Don January came back in 1975 as few ever have come back before. Off the Tour for 2½ years, the slim Texan returned and played well all year. He climaxed the season brilliantly, winning the San Antonio-Texas Open in a sudden-death playoff over Larry Hinson.

Don had rounds of 71, 67, 71 and 66 for his 13-under par 275. Hinson rolled in a 25-footer at the 18th to tie him, and then Larry three-putted the first extra hole as they both bogeyed. Don wrapped up the 11th title of his career with a four-footer for a birdie on the second extra hole.

Earlier, Don had six top 10 finishes, his best being ties for fifth in the First NBC New Orleans Open (last-day 66) and the Sahara Invitational (second and last day 66s). A second-day 64 in the Kaiser International led to a tie for ninth.

He said of his return, "Physically, it wasn't too bad. Mentally, it was tougher than I anticipated." After his victory, he said, "I am here to stay. I shall not leave on my own. It will take my game to force me off."

Don entered 26 tournaments and had seven top 10 finishes. He only missed two cuts. His stroke average was 71.5 and his low round was the 64 at Kaiser.

PRIOR YEARS


Always one of the more colorful and steadier golfers on the Tour, Don first came out in 1956 and promptly won two tournaments—the Dallas Open and the Apple Valley Clambake.

He saved his very best until 1967 at the Columbine Club in Denver, when he won the PGA National Championship in an 18-hole playoff over Don Massengale (69 to 71). It appeared as if he was going to win the 1961 PGA, but Jerry Barber rolled in monstrous putts on the final four greens to tie—and then won the next day, 67 to 68. That was at Olympic Fields.

Don was a member of the 1965 Ryder Cup team and over the years played an important role in the shaping of the Tour. He was a Player Director in 1970 through 1972, and served as the secretary in 1971.

A graduate of North Texas State, Don was a regular until part way through the 1972 season. He left to devote his full time to his golf course construction business and did not return until 1975.

1975 IN REVIEW

The week before the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, Tom Jenkins failed to qualify for the U.S. Open. "I missed it by one," he said, "and that hurt. I became mad at myself, and I guess that is what motivated me."

He became so motivated that he toured the soggy Whitemarsh course in nine-under par 69-65-69-72—275 and a one-stroke victory over Johnny Miller.

It also was the first victory for the third-year pro from Houston. It also elevated him into the top 60 for the first time.

Part of his success at Whitemarsh was due to a new putter, which he said "gave me the confidence I needed, and that's what putting is all about. The 15 footer downhill at the 17th (the 71st of the tournament) won it for me."

Tom had one other top 10 finish, a tie for ninth in the Doral-Eastern Open. The year did end on a disappointing note, as he missed the cut in seven of his last nine tournaments.

Tom played in 33 tournaments and cashed checks in 15. He missed 15 cuts and, earlier in the year, twice failed to qualify on Monday. His stroke average was 72.6 with the 65 at Philadelphia his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

Tom Jenkins points to Dave Williams, the golf coach at the University of Houston, as the man most influential on his career.

"My parents gave me the opportunity to play," he said, "and I did play in a lot of junior tournaments. Dave seemed to be there all the time, partially because he ran quite a few of them."

"But, I looked up to the man. I wanted to play golf, and play at Houston. I always thought it would be great to be on a championship team under him. That was my dream through junior high and high school."


Tom was on a five-year program at Houston, and he was a regular on the golf team the last two. "It was then that I knew what I wanted to do, and knew what I had to do to achieve that goal."

He turned professional just after graduation in 1971, but missed in his first attempt for a Tour card in the fall. After playing the mini-tours for a year, he tried again in the fall of 1972 and made it.

"While at school, I learned a lot about the mental side of the game and how to prepare myself," he said. The first year was a good one, winning \$38,241 for 80th place. He slipped a little in 1974, but it still was pretty good at \$30,826 for 86th place.

"I've never had any real formal instruction," he says of his game, "but I have had some help from Bob Toski and Jack Grout."

1975 IN REVIEW

Everyone knows it only is a matter of time before Tom Kite wins his first tournament on the Tour. Meanwhile, he is enjoying a most comfortable living, thank you.

Tom has improved in each of his three full years and has displayed an ability to put some rather impressive numbers on the scoreboard.

Nine times in 1975 he finished among the Top 10, with his second place to Pat Fitzsimons in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open his best on Tour. Fitzsimons put the title out of reach with his third-round 64, but Tom hung in there and used a final day 68 for his runner-up position, finishing one ahead of Jack Nicklaus.

A month earlier, Tom came from well off the pace in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur to finish 69-70 and all alone in third place behind winning Gene Littler and runner-up Hubert Green.

It is interesting to note that all nine of Tom's leading finishes came in the first five months of the year. Four of them were for fifth place—Andy Williams-San Diego, Heritage Classic, when a last-round 75 ended his hopes, the Houston Open and the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

Tom played in 27 tournaments and made the cut in 22. He compiled a stroke average of 71.4 and two 67s were his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Although he may have been impatient with his inability to win a Tour tournament, Tom Kite demonstrated in 1974 his consistency of performance. He missed the cut only once and finished in the top 10 on eight occasions, and his earnings leaped by 50 percent to over \$80,000. And it was only his second full year on the Tour.

Tom started golf at age 6, spurred on by his father's enthusiasm. "He helped me very much. He made everything possible for me," Kite says.


He captured his first victory at age 11, an age-group junior event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously at age 14 and enter major amateur events. In 1970 he was medalist in Western Amateur, runner-up to Lanny Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur and second in the Southern Amateur, and was chosen to help represent the U.S. in the World Amateur Team championship.

Kite also was chosen to play on the Walker Cup team in 1971. A year later he shared the NCAA championship with his Texas schoolmate, Ben Crenshaw, and finished 19th in the U.S. Open. That fall he qualified for his Tour players' card shortly before his 23rd birthday.

Tom was named Rookie-of-the-Year for his 1973 performance on Tour. In 35 starts he missed the cut only three times. He went through a string of 23 tournaments without missing it, and he went the distance in 29 of his last 30 tournaments.

Although he did win the Second Tour's Hope of Tomorrow event, he did not have as many high finishes in regular Tour events in 1973 that he would have liked. Among his better showings were a tie for fifth in the Ohio Kings Island and a tie for seventh at Hartford, where he finished 63-65.

1975 IN REVIEW

George Knudson returned to the firing line in earnest again in 1975 after a couple of years of on-again, off-again play due to physical ailments. He did respond with his best season since 1972, when he chalked up his last victory in the Kaiser International Open.

Twice, George moved into the top 10, gaining a tie for seventh in the Pleasant Valley Classic with a 69-69 start; and tying for eighth in the Byron Nelson Classic with four consistent rounds of 68-69-68-70.

He helped to make the Canadian Open at the Royal Montreal Club more interesting for his home folks with a tie for 11th. He started there with a 68 and closed with the same score, but it was the second-day 74 in the high winds that hindered his bid.

He credited a "little more aggressive play" as one of the reasons for his improvement. He also had a tie for 11th in the First NBC New Orleans Open.

George played in 32 tournaments and made money in 19, missing the cut 13 times. He compiled a stroke average of 72.6 with six 68s being his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

During his many years on the Tour, George Knudson has been regarded as one of the classic swingers of the golf club. "When I was younger," he has said, "I spent every day on the course. Now, it's work, not play."


The slim Canadian turned professional in 1958 and he made a few efforts at being a tourist in 1959 and 1960, without much success. He came to stay in 1961, especially after he won the Coral Gables Open that year.

George has won eight times on the U.S. Tour and added four more on the Caribbean. His most memorable stretch was early in 1968. He won the Phoenix and Tucson Opens back-to-back. He nearly did it again in 1972, as he won the Kaiser International at Napa, Calif., and the following week led the Sahara Invitational at Las Vegas by three strokes with one round to play. He finished with a 76 and tied for seventh, as Lanny Wadkins won his first.

The Kaiser-Sahara effort did boost his winnings to \$74,366 for his most rewarding year, financially.

The one title that has eluded him and the one he'd most like to win is the Canadian Open. He did win the Canadian PGA in 1964. Two years later, representing his homeland in the Canada Cup matches (now World Cup), he was the low individual.

1975 IN REVIEW

Incredible! There are few words that describe Gene Littler any better. There he was, in the sweltering heat at the Westchester Country Club, at age 45 and three years after an operation for cancer, winning his third tournament of the year—and the 28th of his brilliant career.

A few weeks later, when he was asked if he was surprised at the quality of his play Gene's eyes brightened, "Surprised? Why, I'm surprised to be playing at all."

Gene's first victory came in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur by four strokes over Hubert Green. In late May, he won again, easily winning the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic by five strokes.

Finally, there he was at Westchester, coming on strong on the back nine, using a hole-in-one at the 12th as the springboard. He caught Julius Boros and then won with a par on the first extra hole.

Gene played in 22 tournaments and made the cut in them all. He had eight top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 70.9, which tied him with Hale Irwin and Tom Watson for the fourth best on Tour. A 65 at the Kaiser International was his low among 23 rounds in the 60s.

PRIOR YEARS

Ever since Gene Littler joined the Tour after his victory in the 1953 U.S. Amateur, he has been one of the most respected of professional golfers. The steady performance that produced 25 Tour titles over a 20-year period earned him the nickname "Gene the Machine," but in the spring of 1972 it appeared as if the Machine was finished.

Gene underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands that spring. However, to the astonishment and joy of the golf world, he rejoined the Tour that October. The following July, some 16 months after his surgery, he captured the St. Louis Children's Hospital Classic.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was another successful year for John Mahaffey, but the friendly Texan will tell you it should have been better.

He refers to the four second-place finishes. The fact that he wasn't able to find the secret that would let him take that one more step did bother him. "I want to win" he kept insisting, and for good reason. He possesses all the skills to do so.

He also had six other top 10 finishes in 27 starts, so you see how well he truly did play and how a shot or two at the right time could have let him go the distance.

The most notable runner-up finish was in the United States Open at Medinah. He tied with Lou Graham at three-over par 287, and then lost the 18-hole playoff, 71 to 73.

He also was solo second in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open. He finished 16-under par and lost by nine strokes. In the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, he was tied for the first-day lead, owned a two-stroke margin after two days, was tied again with Gene Littler after three, and then lost it to Littler's six-under par 66 the final day. Two weeks later, he tied Gary Player for second in the Kemper Open.

John played in 28 tournaments and cashed checks from 21. He compiled a stroke average of 71.0 with a 65 and four 67s his best.

PRIOR YEARS

Apparently Ben Hogan was among those who recognized John Mahaffey's potential for a career in professional golf. They played a round together in 1971 at the Houston Champions Club, where John was working for Jackie Burke and Jimmy Demaret.

"The next day he asked me to join him again," John recalls. "After that, Mr. Hogan asked if I'd like a special invitation to play in the Colonial National in Fort Worth the next week." He tied for 12th.

Of course, by then, Mahaffey was not exactly an unknown amateur. He had received the Sports Illustrated Award of Merit in 1969 and had been selected All-American for his play for the University of Houston in 1969 and 1970 and he had tied for low amateur in the 1970 U.S. Open.

John earned his Tour players card in the fall of 1971, and in his first full year he placed second at Memphis and earned almost \$60,000 in official purses.

The next year, John won his first event, the Sahara Invitational, finished in the top 10 in 11 other tournaments and almost doubled his winnings with more than \$110,000. In 1974, his earnings crept over \$120,000 despite failing to win a tournament.

By the end of April, 1974, Mahaffey had placed second, tied for second, third and tied for fourth and had collected more than \$85,000. But, victory was to elude him for the year.

He wound up the year with seven top 10 finishes in 24 tournaments, including a tie for ninth in the PGA Championship, while missing the cut only once.



1975 IN REVIEW

After Roger Maltbie fired his 74-65-72-64—275 to win the Ed McMahon Jaycees-Quad Cities Open by two strokes, everyone said, "Well done. Jolly good." And, all that sort of glad tidings. He deserved it, coming from seven-shots back the last afternoon.

They knew Roger had the skills to be a fine player, and everyone was happy for the young first-year player from San Jose. The next week, the Tour was at Pleasant Valley in Sutton, Mass., and Roger still was savouring the thrill of victory.

When he started out over the hilly course in 72-71, he was eight-strokes back of the leader. Then came a four-under par 67 and he only was three strokes back.

His final-round 66 gave him an eight-under par 266 and his second-straight victory, this time by a single stroke over B. R. (Mac) McLendon. He did it with a final surge that produced four birdies through the last seven holes.

He thus became the first rookie to win back-to-back tournaments since Bob Murphy accomplished it in 1968.

"I'm a pretty good competitor," the friendly young man said. "I'm probably a better competitor than I am talented. I work at improving my game, and as long as I play as well as I think I can, well, that's all that enters my mind."

He finished the year with five top 10 finishes, but his path was a little downhill after the triumphs. He finished the year by missing the cut in five of his last six starts.

Roger played in 29 tournaments and made money in 17. He missed 10 cuts, withdrew once and finished out of the money another time. His stroke average was 72.1 and the 64 and 65 at Quad Cities were his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

It was a day when James Lick High School of San Jose, Calif., couldn't lose. Two of its sons, Forrest Fezler and Roger Maltbie, were meeting in the final for the state high school golf championship. In a mild surprise, Roger, the sophomore, won in sudden death over his teammate, Forrest, the senior.

"I knew after that match that I had what it takes to be a touring pro," Roger says. "Forrest was two years older than me, and clearly the better player in those days. He did a lot for me to help me progress as a player and a competitor."


Roger went on to win the Northern California Amateur title in 1972. Shortly afterwards, he turned professional. He won the 1973 Northern California Open and then tested his talents in the PGA Tour's qualifying school that fall. He didn't make it, so, he headed for the mini-tours.

He won the California State Open in 1974, but, even more important, he earned his player's card in the final test at the Canyon Club in Palm Springs, so he was ready to head for the big tour, at last.

Roger knew at an early age that golf was his game. He used to "sneak" onto the San Jose Country Club course as early as age seven. His interest prompted his father to become a club member, and, from that moment on, the course was his "home."

He credits head pro Eddie Duino, whom he still calls "coach," for his rapid progress. By the age of 13, he was considered one of the better junior players in Northern California.

1975 IN REVIEW

Rik Massengale was coming off the type of year that makes a player wonder if he is in the right business. But, in 1975, Rik confirmed the belief that he truly does belong on the PGA Tour.

He won the Tallahassee Open for his first victory and then nearly won the Sahara Invitational, losing only in a sudden-death playoff to Dave Hill. He also had four other good top 10 finishes.

Rik came back with a new confidence in his swing, and most of all, a new determination. He tied for sixth in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, then tied for ninth in the Jackie Gleason-Invitational Classic and tied for fifth in the Florida Citrus Open.

He took charge at Tallahassee early. He was tied with five others after day one at 67, but then had the lead to himself the rest of the way with 67-78-72—274, 14-under par.

In Las Vegas, Rik was seven-strokes back of Miller Barber after his opening 70, but a second-day 64 threw him into a six-way tie for the lead. He still was tied after three — and again after four, with Hill. On the first extra hole, a par five with a pond near the green, Rik tried to reach the putting surface in two. The ball carried across the water, hit the bank and rolled back in. Bogey. Hill won with a par.

Rik played in 30 tournaments and made the cut in 21. His stroke average was 71.6 with a 64 and two 65s his best.

PRIOR YEARS

Rik Massengale considers himself fortunate. He has a big brother for a hero.

Rik is 10 years younger than Don, and "when I was about five years old, I started to play golf just to be around him. He basically helped me to develop the swing. And, he still helps me.

"When Don went off to Texas Christian University, I'd wait for him to get home on the weekends, so we could play golf together," Rik continued. "By the time I was in high school, Don was on the Tour. That's when I had aspirations of being on the Tour, someday. Nothing else aroused me."

Rik tasted success as a junior player, and two of his more impressive achievements came in 1964 and 1965 when he won the Texas State high school championships.

He went on to the University of Texas, and, in 1968, won the Southwest Conference and Western Amateur championships.

He missed qualifying for the Tour on his first attempt in 1969, but made it in the fall of 1970. His success was not instantaneous. "I was experimenting with my swing for about three years," he said. He did manage a few strong finishes, such as a second in the 1973 Pleasant Valley Classic at Sutton, Mass. He won \$42,295 that year and barely missed making the Top 60 for exemptions.

The next year, 1974, was one he'd like to forget. "My swing problems came back," he says. However, Rik knew he had the talent to win. He proved it in 1975.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a good steady year for Gary McCord as he moved into the top 60 for the first time and he can point to several different tournaments as the ones that helped to put him in among the elite.

The biggest of all was the Greater Milwaukee Open. He had two strong rounds at the finish, 65-67, and nearly caught Art Wall at the final hole. He only was one stroke back of the former Masters champion, but the \$14,820 check was the largest of his Tour career.

The next week, a second-day 66 aided considerably in his solo fourth-place finish at the Quad Cities Open. He earned another healthy check in the B.C. Open, posting a last-day 66 and getting a tie for 10th. A month later, in the Sahara Invitational, he was cruising along, well back, for three days, and then penciled in a beautiful closing 65 to tie for ninth.

In the year's final event for earning money toward exemption, he tied for 14th at six-under par, and that was just enough to insure his position.

Gary played in 34 tournaments, and cashed checks in 19. He compiled a stroke average of 72.1 with two 65s his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Gary McCord's debut as a rookie on the PGA Tour in 1974 was a smashing success. Playing at Cypress Point the first day of the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, the big fellow jumped into the first-round lead with a seven-under par 65.

He put together six straight birdies in that round, equalling the best on the Tour for the year. Unfortunately, he wasn't able to maintain that pace in the rain-shortened Crosby.

Although his best finish of the year was a tie for sixth in the Quad Cities Open, he regards the tie for seventh in the Colonial National Invitation at Fort Worth the highlight of the year. A 66 the third day was the key. "I was paired with Gary Player the last round and I was scared to death," he now admits.


He finished the year 78th on the money list \$33,640, with other good finishes being tie 10th Western Open, tie 11th Hawaiian Open and IVB-Philadelphia Classic and tie 13th Greater Milwaukee Open.

Gary started to play the game at age 15. He was a pretty fair baseball pitcher as a teenager in Garden Grove, Calif., but his family moved to Riverside. "I was 15 then, and I didn't know anyone. So, I started going out to the golf course, and I played every day all summer."

He developed into a fine player at the University of California-Riverside earning All-America honors twice and winning the College Division NCAA crown. "It was a futuristic dream, but I started to think this would be a great way to make a living."

After missing in the PGA Tour qualifying school twice, he finally made it in the fall of 1973. Meanwhile, during an 18-month period in 1972 and 1973, he earned approximately \$84,000 on the mini-tours, most of it near his home in Southern California.

1975 IN REVIEW

It is hard to imagine a tournament winner being any happier than Jerry McGee, when he went the distance in the Pensacola Open.

As one fellow told him later, "Well, Jerry, at least they won't be able to say sudden success spoiled you." It was his first triumph in more than eight years of trying.

The week started without much fanfare. His opening 69 put him five behind Andy North, but the next day, he turned in a five-under par 66 and leaped into second place, only two behind Don Iverson. Another superb 66 nudged Jerry into the third-day lead, one ahead of Wally Armstrong.

As they moved through the final 18, though, Jerry was faltering on the front nine, and suddenly found himself tied with Armstrong and Bruce Crampton for the lead. But, Jerry found the secret again with three back nine birdies.

Jerry gave considerable credit to Crampton for his improved play, not only help mechanically but also in course management, while he cited his wife, Jill, as being a tremendous help mentally.

It was Jerry's best year in all ways. He was third by himself in the Greater Greensboro Open and had four other top 10 finishes.

Jerry played in 31 tournaments and made the cut in 26. His stroke average was 71.2 with three 66s being his lowest.

PRIOR YEARS

Four years after he joined the Tour, Jerry McGee was certain of finally gaining exempt status by the middle of the 1971 season. But, he was wondering if he'd ever play tournament golf again.

He had jumped out quickly that year to amass over \$54,000 through the Canadian Open, early in July. Then he pulled ligaments in his thumb and was forced to sit out the rest of the year. "The longer I was home," he said, "the more I wondered if I'd ever play again."

He did play again, but maybe wished he hadn't. He missed the cut in his first three tournaments in 1972. However, a closing 68 in the Hawaiian Open left him tied for 35th and with the feeling that perhaps his game had returned.

At the end of 1972 Jerry again had made the top 60 list, his most impressive showing a tie for fifth in the Masters, which he then described as "the biggest thrill I've ever had in golf." He also won four automobiles in closest-to-the-pin contests in 1972.

McGee's earnings slipped to 67th place in 1973, when the best finish he mustered was a third in the Southern Open, but he recovered the following year to record the highest total winnings of his eight on Tour. In 35 events, he finished in the money 25 times, and five times in the top 10.

1975 IN REVIEW

It is amazing what a difference a year made for Benson Rayfield McLendon. Mac was on the verge of leaving the Tour at the end of last year but, suddenly, he teamed with his close friend, Hubert Green, and they won the Walt Disney World National Team Play championship. So it was, in January of 1975, that Mac headed for the Tour again with renewed confidence and an exemption for the year. He played as he never has played before. His \$76,971 more than doubled the amount he ever had won in a season.

Twice, he nearly went the distance, finishing tied for second in the Greater Jacksonville Open and second alone in the Pleasant Valley Classic. Early in the year, when Mac was playing so well and Hubert was having a few problems getting his fine game untracked, Hubert remarked, "I sure hope Mac will invite me to be his partner on the Team Play."

A last-day 66 in the Bob Hope gave him a tie for seventh and he was solo seventh in the Heritage Classic. An opening 65 was the key to his tie for 10th in the Southern Open.

Mac played in 31 tournaments and made money in 22. He compiled a stroke average of 7.6 with the 65 and 66 being his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

Mac McLendon won the first tournament he entered on the Tour, the 1968 Magnolia Classic, a Second Tour event, and gained a spot in the top 60 that year with more than \$40,000 in official earnings.

In the next six years he never quite matched that figure, but he regained exemption status at the end of 1974 by winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship with Hubert Green as partner.

It was a huge relief, not only because tournament winners are exempt from Monday qualifying for the next 12 months, but also because the \$25,000 check sorely was needed at the bank. There also was great appreciation for his partner of the last four days.


"I definitely think Hubert is one of the Tour's superstars," Mac said. "I've learned an awful lot about the mental aspects of golf just from playing with Hubert these past few days."

However, Green wasn't playing alone. Mac birdied seven of the eight par-3 holes the first two days, four more holes on the front nine the final day and No. 14 coming in.

Benson R. McLendon Jr., who prefers the nickname Mac, has been troubled by asthma which acts up particularly in the California swing. But that ailment was one factor which led him to try the Tour in the first place.

After graduating from LSU, where he won three straight Southeastern Conference titles beginning in 1965, McLendon accumulated nine hours of graduate work toward a masters degree in business administration. He was drafted for military service but was refused for duty because of asthma. Unhappy with school and unsure of his future, he turned to professional golf.

1975 IN REVIEW

Steve Melnyk was not quite as consistent as he was in 1974, but it still was a productive year.

Steve had four top 10 finishes, but his best effort probably was in the First NBC New Orleans Open. He tied for fifth with 69-69-68-72—278, which is 10-under par..., but his name was on the leader board most of the way. He was a strong contender until the final holes.

He finished tied for eighth in the Kemper Open, and only was three off the pace after 36 holes with 71-68, but a 74 the next day dampened his hopes. He lowered his score a shot a day at the Doral-Eastern Open to tie for seventh with 72-71-70-69—282.

He tied for ninth in the Greater Greensboro, and then wished he could play the first round over. In the high winds, he started with a 77, then fired 70-70-68.

Unfortunately, he did not finish strong, missing four straight cuts until he tied for 13th in the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Steve played in 35 tournaments and made money in 17. He compiled a stroke average of 72.1, with two 66s and three 67s as his best.

PRIOR YEARS

Steve Melnyk joined the Tour in 1971 after a brilliant amateur career which produced expectations of quick fulfillment as a professional. But his progress has been slow instead of spectacular.

A 1969 graduate of the University of Florida, Steve won the U.S. Amateur championship that year at Oakmont; the British Amateur two years later and played on the U.S. Walker Cup team both in 1969 and 1971. Still as an amateur, he finished fifth in the Greater Jacksonville Open, then graduated from the 1971 Tour Qualifying School.


In 1972, Melnyk's top efforts were a third place at Tallahassee and victory in a Second Tour event, the Canongate Open. In 1973 he tied for second at Phoenix and his year's earnings improved almost 50 percent to \$46,143.

In 1974, Steve finally crashed the top 60 with four finishes in the top 10, making money in 25 of 34 tournaments he entered. He failed to qualify only once, he withdrew on one other occasion and he missed only five cuts.

Two weeks in May were the most lucrative segment of Melnyk's 1974 campaign. He arrived at the Houston Open with a tie for 30th at New Orleans his best effort of the year. A second-round 65 put him in contention and, after a rain delay occasioned a 36-hole final day, he shot 70-70 to tie for second place.

The following week, in the Colonial National at Fort Worth, Steve tied for seventh, worth more than \$7,000, to total almost \$19,000 for the two-week's work.

1975 IN REVIEW

Johnny Miller opened his year with a smashing victory in the Phoenix Open and he closed it in the same style in the Kaiser International Open at Napa, Calif.

This young man was unbeatable through the first two weeks of the year. He won the Phoenix Open with a 24-under par score of 260 and a margin of 14 strokes. The next week, he won the Dean Martin-Tucson Open with a 25-under par score of 263 and a margin of nine strokes. In each tournament, he had a 61. All eight of his rounds were in the 60s, and he led from wire-to-wire.

A tie for sixth in the Bing Crosby interrupted his streak, but he came back in his next start to win the Bob Hope Desert Classic by three strokes with a 21-under par effort. It wasn't until his final individual start of the year that he won again, in the Kaiser before his home folks at the Silverado Country Club.

In between, he was successful, too. He had two incredible days at the Augusta National as he fired 65-66 to tie Tom Weiskopf for second place in the Masters, just one stroke behind Jack Nicklaus. He also was second in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, just one in back of Tom Jenkins.

Johnny journeyed to Carnoustie, Scotland for the British Open in mid-July, and tied for third, just one stroke out of the playoff for the championship. His next encounter with the British was in his first Ryder Cup appearance.

Johnny played in 22 tournaments and made the cut in 20. He compiled the second-best stroke average, 70.2, as he had 35 rounds in the 60s, with the two 61s, two 64s and two 65s


PRIOR YEARS

At the end of the 1974 Tour schedule, Johnny Miller looked back on his astonishing performance and said: "I'm going to have to sit down and do a lot of thinking about next year. This has been sort of ridiculous, and I've got to keep everything in perspective."

All Johnny did was surpass Jack Nicklaus' single-season money record by more than \$30,000, with official total purses of \$353,021; win eight tournaments in 21 appearances and place in the top six in four other events.

His first 23 rounds of the year were at par or better as he won the Bing Crosby, Phoenix and Tucson and tied for fourth in the Bob Hope before placing fifth at Los Angeles. He also won the Heritage and the Tournament of Champions before the end of April, played seldom the next 15 weeks, then added victories in the Westchester, World Open and Kaiser International.

1975 IN REVIEW

Dr. Gil Morgan knew the odds were "astronomical" when he headed for the San Antonio-Texas Open, the final event in which money would be awarded toward the exemption list. He was 66th, nearly \$7,000 out of the 60th position.

He proceeded to play one of the finest tournaments of his life. He was in the lead after two days and finally finished third, earning \$8,875 and clinching the final spot to earn his exemption for this year. He posted 66-68-75-68—277, 11-under par and two-strokes out of the playoff.

It was a strange year for Gil. Through his first eight tournaments, he only finished two, missing the cut in four others and failed to qualify in two more. Part of the problem was an aching back.

Then he went 11 straight events without missing the 36-hole axe, and he made a good run at the Houston Open crown, finally finishing second by himself to Bruce Crampton. He fired 70-68-67-70—275, which was 13-under par. He was two strokes off the pace.

In his final 14 tournaments, he only went the distance five times, but one was the super charge in San Antonio. He did miss one month of play in July, as he studied for his Florida Board of Optometry examination - and passed.

Gil played in 34 tournaments, earning money in 18. He missed nine cuts, failed to qualify for six events and finished out of the money in another. He compiled a stroke average of 72.0, with two 66s being his low.

PRIOR YEARS

Gil Morgan had good reason to be optimistic about his future in the game. Just before he turned professional in the fall of 1972, he had an excellent summer on the amateur circuit.

The former Oklahoma collegiate champion lost the Western Amateur in sudden-death to the late Gary Sanders and was second to Ben Crenshaw in the Porter Cup. He tied for third in the Southern Amateur.

The fact that he didn't qualify for the PGA Tour on his first attempt didn't deter his ambitions. He headed for the mini-tours, and played well. In the fall of 1973, he tried again, and made it.

His first true test came in the Walt Disney World Classic, the last year this event was an individual test. He was tied for second through the middle two rounds, and, despite a poor final afternoon, he still was encouraged.

During his rookie year of 1974, he had stretches when he played well, but he saved the best for the end of the year. He won approximately \$11,000 in his last four tournaments.

Gil started in the game at "about the age of 15," but he also was playing most other sports. It wasn't until his junior year at East Central State College in Oklahoma that he thought of making it a career—along with his Optometry.

1975 IN REVIEW

After he gave it a good run and finally finished second by three strokes to Johnny Miller in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, Bob Murphy announced that "Murph's ready. If he doesn't get them next week, he'll get them soon."

He only tied for 18th the next week in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open, but two weeks later, in his next start, Bob did get them as he won the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic—and \$50,000—by one stroke over Eddie Pearce and by two over Jack Nicklaus.

It appeared as if Nicklaus was in command until he hit it out-of-bounds on the par three 12th, but Bob clinched it when he stroked a magnificent eight-iron approach on the 17th that stopped one inch from the cup.

He made up considerable ground through the final round of the U.S. Open with his two-under par 69 and tied for third, just one stroke out of the playoff. In the Tournament Players Championship at Fort Worth's Colonial Country Club, his closing 68 gave him a tie for fourth.

His steady play late in 1974 and through the first half of 1975 earned him a position on the Ryder Cup team.

Bob played in 23 tournaments, missing the cut only in two and withdrawing from another. He compiled a stroke average of 71.5 with three 66s being his low rounds. He had eight top 10 finishes.

PRIOR YEARS

The Bob Murphy story in golf defies credibility. He was an exceptional baseball prospect when he entered the University of Florida in the early 1960s. An injury kept him off the diamond in his freshman year, so he turned his efforts to golf. In 1965 he won the U.S. Amateur and the following spring the NCAA championship.

After turning pro and graduating from the 1967 Tour Qualifying School, Murphy never looked back. He won over \$100,000 in his rookie year—easily the most ever by a rookie to that time—and two tournaments in succession. Since then, he never has had to qualify for a Tour event.

Most of his rookie-year cash was earned in a three-week stretch when he was second in the 1968 Westchester Classic, then won the Philadelphia and Thunderbird events, in that order.

In the following six years, Murphy was victorious on Tour only once more, at Hartford in 1970, but he challenged frequently. He lost the 1972 Hawaiian Open to Grier Jones in a playoff. The 1973 Westchester Classic escaped him when Bobby Nichols eagled the final hole and won the playoff one extra hole later with a 25-foot putt.

Murphy did win abroad in 1972, in the Wills Masters in Australia.

In 1974, a thumb injury kept him out of action for four months and limited his play to 19 tournaments, but he finished in the money in all but four of these and easily kept his exempt status.

1975 IN REVIEW

Bobby Nichols had one big chance to win in 1975 as he battled his way into the three-way playoff in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open with J. C. Snead and Ray Floyd. He made it by rolling in a 14-foot par putt on the 72d hole, after a weak chip from in back of the green.

On the first extra hole, though, Bobby fell by the wayside when his four footer for a par rimmed the cup. Snead finally won it on the fourth extra hole, but Bobby was credited with a tie for second with Floyd.

He was the first-round leader in the Masters with a 67, but a 74 the next day dropped him well off the pace. He wasn't finished, though, and a closing 69 moved him back into a tie for fourth.

His only other top 10 finish was in the Kemper Open at Charlotte, N.C. Going into the final afternoon, he was one stroke in back of Gary Player, tied with Floyd. But, he struggled home with a 75 and finished tied for eighth.

He had one of the biggest scares of his career in the Western Open when he felt the effects of a bolt of lightning late on Friday afternoon and was hospitalized with Lee Trevino and Jerry Heard. He skipped the next three tournaments.

Bobby played in 23 tournaments and made money in 15. He missed the cut seven times and withdrew once. He compiled a stroke average of 72.3, with a 65 being his low round. He had three top 10 finishes.

PRIOR YEARS

At age 38 and dividing his 15th year on Tour between playing and his head pro job at Firestone Country Club in Akron, Bobby Nichols enjoyed his most lucrative campaign in all by winning two tournaments, finishing in the top 10 three other times and earning more than \$120,000.

It was the third time Bobby won two events in a single year, but if there is one mark to his career it seems to be his ability to win big tournaments. Among his 12 Tour victories were the 1964 PGA Championship, the \$300,000 Dow Jones in 1970 and the 1973 Westchester Classic. In the last of those three he eagled the 72nd hole to tie and birdied the first playoff hole to beat out Bob Murphy.

One of the Tour's more popular players, Bobby was a standout football and basketball player in high school in Kentucky. A serious car crash forced him to turn to golf and, while attending Texas A&M, he won the 1956 Southwest Conference title.

There is little, if anything, left to be said about Jack Nicklaus. He has done it all—and several times over—on the PGA Tour.

Updating his statistics, he won five times on the Tour in 1975, giving him a total of 58 since starting in January of 1962.


He won two of the "majors" in 1975—the Masters by one stroke over Johnny Miller and Tom Weiskopf; and the PGA National championship by two over Bruce Crampton.

He extended his "NO-CUT" streak to 91 Tour events. The last time he wasn't around for the final 36 holes was in October of 1970 at the Kaiser International Open in Napa, Calif.

He has won 16 "majors"—5 Masters, 4 PGAs, 3 U.S. Opens, 2 British Opens and 2 U.S. Amateurs. And, he now has career earnings of \$2,541,772.99.

Jack played in 16 Tour events and had 14 top 10 finishes. He compiled the lowest stroke average on the Tour—69.9. His low round was a 63 in the Heritage Classic.

1975 IN REVIEW

Maybe Andy North did not have as good a year as he did the season before, but the lanky ex-University of Florida star went into the golf record book with a 27 on one nine.

He was the first-round leader in the B.C. Open at Endicott, N.Y., with a seven-under par 63, but he had a seven-under 27 on the back nine (par was 34). Only Mike Souchak, in the 1955 Texas Open, ever had been that low in tournament play.

Andy had four top 10 finishes—and the B.C. Open wasn't one of them. He tied for 20th there. A solo fourth in the PGA Championship was his best, thanks to a strong five-under par 65 the last day.

He also tied for fifth in the Greater Jacksonville Open, tied for seventh in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open after an opening 66, and tied for 10th in Pensacola after assuming the first-day lead on a 64.

He had a good U.S. Open, tying for 12th with 72s each of the last three rounds.

Andy played in 33 tournaments and earned money in 23. He compiled a stroke average of 72.1, with the 63 at the B.C. Open his best.

PRIOR YEARS

It took a serious knee problem to get Andy North off the basketball courts and football fields of his native Wisconsin and onto the golf course. It was discovered when he was in the seventh grade that a bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. He was on crutches for 18 months.

He was told that one game he could play was golf—if he rode in a cart. Since his father was a low-handicap player, the idea for the boy was welcomed. With the help of his dad and Lee Milligan, then head pro at Nakona CC in Madison, Wis., Andy began his career in golf.

Andy did return to basketball to make all-state his senior year in high school, but he also won the Wisconsin high school golf championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and was second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969.

North attended the University of Florida, where he was chosen All-America in golf for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur and the Houston All-American tournament. Also, corrective surgery on his bad knee apparently solved that problem permanently.

North turned pro in 1972, joined the Tour the following year and just missed the top 60 list while winning the Little Crosby Second Tour event and placing third in the Monsanto and Kings Island regular tournaments. In 1974 he improved 18 places on the money list and easily gained exemption for 1975.

North played in 34 events in 1974 and missed the cut only five times, while placing in the top 10 in three events. His best was a tie for second at Houston, where he finished with 68-67-69 for 277 and one shot behind Dave Hill.

1975 IN REVIEW

Peter Oosterhuis will be the first to tell you that his play for his rookie year on the U.S. Tour was not up to his expectations, but the big Englishman showed considerable talent.

Peter's best effort was a solo second to Billy Casper in the First NBC New Orleans Open. Through the 11th hole in the third round, Peter actually had a two-stroke lead, but Casper started a birdie barrage that led him to the victory.

Peter had rounds of 68, 68, 69 and 68 for his 15-under par 273, a most creditable performance. Three weeks later, he tied for fifth in the Kemper Open and, still another two weeks later, he tied for seventh in the U.S. Open. At one point late in the latter championship, Peter was one of those who was in position to win.

One of the busiest of the regulars, he played in the first 19 tournaments, skipped the next because of a playing commitment in Britain, and then came back for five more. So, he actually played in tournaments for 25 straight weeks.

Once again, he distinguished himself in the Ryder Cup matches and was Great Britain's finest player in the loss to the U.S.

Peter played in 31 U.S. Tour events and cashed checks in 24. He compiled a stroke average of 71.9 with a 64 at the Atlanta Classic his best.

PRIOR YEARS

Before Peter Oosterhuis decided to test his talents on the United States PGA Tour, he compiled an enviable record around the world. For four straight years, 1971 through 1974, he led the British Order of Merit. That means, he was Europe's finest player.

The big, friendly Englishman has won such national titles as the French and Italian Opens, has been a consistent challenger in the British Open and has been spectacular in his Ryder Cup appearances.

Even before he obtained his player's card in the fall of 1974, he proved he could play here. He lost the Monsanto Open at Pensacola in 1974 in sudden-death to Lee Elder, after Lee birdied three of the final four holes to tie him.

He was the third-round leader in the 1973 Masters at the Augusta National, and finally finished tied for third with Jack Nicklaus and Jim Jamieson behind the winning Tommy Aaron.

Peter was born in London, and although he plays out of Mission Hills in Palm Springs, he now resides in Santa Barbara, Calif.

1975 IN REVIEW

There were several memorable weeks for Arnold Palmer, such as guiding the United States Ryder Cup team to an easy victory as its captain; two victories overseas, a near victory during the exciting chase for the Hawaiian Open crown.

The two triumphs across the pond came in the Spanish Open and the British PGA. He has 61 U.S. Tour victories since starting in 1955, and he now has a total of 79 around the world.

In the Hawaiian Open, he stood on the 17th tee on the final afternoon at the Waialea Country Club, tied for the lead with Gary Groh, who by that time, was in the 18th fairway. But, he pulled his tee shot on the par three 17th into the high, wet grass. He pitched it short, to four feet, and then missed the par-saving putt. Groh went on to birdie the home hole and clinch the victory. Al Geiberger birdied the 18th to deprive Arnold a share of second place, so he had to settle for third.

His next best finish came in late July, when he finished 69-67 for fourth place in the Canadian Open at Royal Montreal. His other top 10 finishes were tie for seventh in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, tie for ninth in the U.S. Open and a tie for 10th in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open.

Arnold played in 20 tournaments and made money in 15. He compiled a stroke average of 71.8 with two 66s being his low rounds.

1975 IN REVIEW

Eddie Pearce has those moments when he plays with all the authority and skills his colleagues know he has, but he still is looking for the secret of putting it all together for four straight days.

The one week he did, in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, he thought he might have a winner, only to finish second to Bob Murphy, one-stroke away. Eddie opened the week in sensational style, firing 67-64—131, 13-under par. His last two rounds were 72-71 for his 14-under par score of 274.

In the final moments, though, he birdied the 17th to move within a shot of Murphy, who was playing behind him. Eddie lofted a beautiful sand wedge onto the green at the 18th, to within six inches for another birdie.

Murphy, though, stroked his eight iron at the 17th at just about the same time, and the shot stopped an inch short of the cup. It was the birdie and the edge he needed.

Eddie played in 27 tournaments and made money in 16. He missed the cut nine times and withdrew once. He compiled a stroke average of 72.5, with his low being the 64 at the Gleason.

PRIOR YEARS

Few young players—if any—ever have come out of Florida with the competitive credentials matching those of Eddie Pearce. He started to play golf at age 4 under the eye of his father in Tampa, and at 12 broke 70 for the first time with a 69.

When he was 16 he won the USGA Junior championship at Brookline, Mass.; also competed in the U.S. Open and U.S. Amateur and was runner-up to Ben Crenshaw in the International Jaycees tournament in Tulsa, Okla.


Eddie enrolled at Wake Forest under an Arnold Palmer scholarship and, as a freshman, won the North-South Amateur and finished third in the NCAA championship. The following year he was second in both the North-South and the U.S. Amateur. And he was one of the youngest ever to win the Florida Open, at age 18.

Pearce turned pro in the fall of 1972 and, surprisingly, failed to earn his Tour players card. In the fall of 1973 he graduated from the Tour Qualifying School on his second try.

In his fourth tournament of 1974, Eddie was second to Jack Nicklaus in the Hawaiian Open and won \$25,080, after closing with a 66. About six weeks later he seemed a serious contender for Rookie-of-the-Year when a backyard motorcycle accident sidelined him for another six weeks with a broken collarbone.

In his first start after the accident he tied for second at Tallahassee, but he never again got that close to victory the remainder of the year. He tied for ninth in the Tournament Players Championship and for 10th at San Antonio for his only other high finishes, but he made the top 60 list comfortably in 47th place.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was a disappointing year for Gary Player on the U.S. Tour, but for many others, the results that he achieved would have been quite satisfactory.

Although his streak of winning a U.S. tournament for six straight years was broken, he did come close twice. In the Tournament of Champions at LaCosta, Calif., he finished with 68-67 to tie Al Geiberger, and then lost it on the first hole of sudden-death playoff.

In the Kemper Open at Charlotte, N.C., Gary led Bobby Nichols and Ray Floyd by one starting the final round. He dueled Floyd through most of the afternoon, but when Gary's birdie attempt at the 16th failed to drop and he bogeyed the final hole after a poor drive, his hopes were gone.

Gary played in 15 U.S. Tour events and only missed one cut. He compiled a stroke average of 71.4 and the 66 was his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

One of four men to have won all four of the world's major championships in golf, Gary Player in one respect had his finest year in 1974, when he won two of these titles in a single year for the first time.

A serious operation in January of 1973, curtailed his schedule for at least four months. But, Player came back and won more than \$100,000 on the U.S. Tour in 1974, while capturing the Masters for the second time and the British Open for the third. He also came from five-strokes back with 17 holes to play to win at Memphis, and recorded five top 10 finishes in 15 U.S. tournaments, missing the cut twice.

1975 IN REVIEW

There were tears in Dean Refram's eyes as he sat there alongside Jim Colbert and they talked of what winning the Walt Disney World National Team Play championship meant.

"Obviously, I'm happy for myself," Colbert said, "but you can't believe how happy I am for Dean. After everything he has been through, this seems to be fitting, that he'd win."

Dean has been off the Tour for the better part of four years, due mainly to a putting stroke that was not your basic velvet. Prior to the Disney, he entered four Florida events and his only finish was a tie for 57th in the Florida Citrus Open, worth \$395.

But, with his victory, he now is exempt for all of 1976 and had indicated that he plans to play more, possibly fulltime.

Colbert, a close friend of Dean's for many years, said he knew his pal was going to be just fine after the second hole of the first day. "I was out of it. I had my ball in my pocket. He had a three-to-four footer he had to make to save par. I thought to myself, it's now or maybe never. He made it, dead center, and he didn't miss another inside eight feet all week."

The Colbert-Refram team made 36 birdies and 36 pars (notice, that's also NO bogeys) through the four rounds, and it truly was a team effort. Both played exceptionally well.

While he didn't play much, for six weeks prior to the Disney, he spent considerable time on the practice tee at the Saddlebrook Country Club in Wesley Chapel, Fla., the development owned by the family. So, he was ready.

PRIOR YEARS

Among his colleagues, Dean Refram always was considered one of the better strikers of the golf ball. His problem was putting. It was that part of the game that held him back, and eventually forced him to leave the Tour in 1972.


Dean tried various ways to get the ball into the cup sooner. He was one of the early "straddlers," but that method was outlawed, and with the ruling, went his last hope, so it seemed.

Dean compiled a fine amateur record in the Chicago area (he won the 1958 Chicago District Amateur). He was graduated from Florida Southern in 1960, he turned professional. His first year on the Tour was 1961.

His biggest money year was 1971—\$17,659—when he won the Little American Golf Classic, a second-Tour event opposite the main show at Firestone Country Club. His highest position on the money list, though, was 79th in 1967 when he won \$13,431.

In mid-summer of 1974, an accident threatened to wipe out his playing days forever. He was severely burned by steam when a boiler exploded, and, painfully, had to undergo extensive skin grafts.

1975 IN REVIEW

Juan (Chi Chi) Rodriguez offered no excuses for his poorest year on the Tour since 1962 except to say, "For some reasons, the cuts just got awfully small."

Although he was hit by the flu three times and that deprived him of some of his effectiveness, he said, "But, I can't use that as an excuse. I just didn't play well."

Chi Chi, still one of the big favorites with the galleries all over the country, only collected \$13,955 to finish 115th on the money list. He never was able to mount a charge and his best finishes were a tie for 12th in the Greater Greensboro Open and a tie for 17th in the World Open. His biggest check of the year was at Greensboro, \$4,218.

An indication of how well this man has played over the years is reflected in his career earnings of \$650,970, placing him well into the list of the top 50 of all time. That is his exemption category for 1976.

Chi Chi played in 27 tournaments and was in the money 14 times. He compiled a stroke average of 72.7 with 11 rounds in the sixties.

PRIOR YEARS

Juan (Chi Chi) Rodriguez gravitated to golf as a boy in Puerto Rico after learning to hit tin cans with limbs from a guava tree. At 19 he felt the pressures of family responsibility and joined the Army "to make money, more than I could have by caddying at home."

He came to the Tour in 1960 and didn't finish higher than sixth in any tournament until he won the 1963 Denver Open. He easily remained on the top 60 list until 1971, when surgery on his arms late in 1970 curtailed his schedule.

Always amusing and in high good humor, Chi Chi decided to take the game more seriously, and in 1972 he won the Byron Nelson Classic and finished in the top 10 in eight other events. In 1973 he added victory at Greensboro and was a contender the following week in the Masters until a final 76 dropped him to a 10th-place tie.

Chi Chi failed to win in 1974 but he placed in the top 10 on six occasions, the best a tie for fourth in the Canadian Open after starting with 68-63. He closed to within a shot of leader Al Geiberger at Las Vegas but triple-bogied the 72nd hole.

One of the most respected and popular of the touring pros, Rodriguez always has felt an obligation to help people less fortunate than himself, and this feeling has been a motivation behind his career.

1975 IN REVIEW

One of the most difficult courses on the entire PGA Tour is the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth, Tex., and that is where Mason Rudolph had his most success last year.

It was the Tournament Players Championship and the veteran from Tennessee rallied with a tie for fourth. He finished with a one-over par score of 281, with rounds of 69, 70, 72 and 70, to earn \$10,333. In a way, that was the end of the season for him, as he played three more times, but missed the cut in each.

He had one other top 10 individual finish, tying for ninth in the Greater Greensboro Open with a two-under par 70-70 finish. In the Walt Disney World National Team Play, he joined with Dan Sikes to tie for fifth.

They helped him to increase his career earnings to \$535,943, and is well among the top 50 in this category, thus giving him another year's exemption.

Mason played in 21 tournaments and made money in ten. He had a stroke average of 72.9 with three 68s being his lowest.

PRIOR YEARS

One of the more popular and easy-going professionals on the Tour, Mason Rudolph was successful right from the start. He turned pro in 1958 and joined the Tour the next year. He won the Golden Gate Open in San Francisco, and was named the "Rookie-of-the-Year."

He has added four other individual victories to his list - the 1963 Fig Garden Village, the 1964 New Orleans Open, the 1966 Thunderbird Classic and the 1970 Green Island Open. He fired a closing 64 to win the latter, bumping Chris Blocker from the lead.

More recently, he had his biggest year financially in 1973 when he finished second by one stroke to Jack Nicklaus in the Walt Disney World Open (the last year it was individual play) and tying for third in the PGA National championship at Cleveland's Canterbury Club.

Mason showed his skills at an early age, when he won the 1950 U.S. Junior title. He was a fine amateur, and in 1957, played for Uncle Sam on the Walker Cup team. In 1971, he faced Great Britain again wearing the Red, White and Blue, only this time as a member of the Ryder Cup team.

He has been involved in helping to shape the Tour, too, serving on the Tournament Committee in 1965 and 1966.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was surprising to see John Schlee on the first tee at the Bob Hope Desert Classic early in February. About a month before, he underwent surgery on a disc. While his recovery period was remarkably short, he admits he may have started back too soon.

He did have two good tournaments in those early weeks, though, tying for eighth in the Florida Citrus Open with a 69-69 finish; and a solo eighth in the Heritage Classic. Incidentally, he tied for 25th in the Bob Hope. Meanwhile, he also missed the cut four times and withdrew from another before he finally settled back in the groove.

As the summer progressed, he tied for ninth in the Atlanta Classic and tied for 10th in the PGA Championship. He clinched his position in the top 60 for the fifth straight year in the World Open at Pinehurst, N.C. He tied for sixth and earned his biggest check of the year, \$6,225.

He was a contender in the Tournament Players Championship at Fort Worth, Tex., after two rounds, posting 69-68—137 on the tough Colonial Country Club course. It put him three off the pace, but a 75 the next day ended his hopes.

John played in 26 tournaments and earned money in 15. He missed the cut eight times and had to withdraw from three other events. He compiled a stroke average of 71.8 and his low round was a 65 the third day of the Bob Hope.

PRIOR YEARS

After leading the first Tour Qualifying School in 1965 and earning rookie-of-the-year honors in 1966, John Schlee struggled through four lean years while learning his craft. But in 1971 he regained a spot in the top 60 and has held it since, soaring over \$100,000 in 1973 for what he called "financial security, at last."

That year was marked by his first Tour victory, in the Hawaiian Open; a second place in the U.S. Open when Johnny Miller beat him out with his historic closing 63, and by losing a playoff to Ed Sneed in the Kaiser International.

In 1974 a back injury forced Schlee to withdraw from four tournaments during the last three months of the schedule, contributing to almost a 50 percent drop in earnings to \$64,238. During that period, however, he did lead the PGA Championship after 36 holes, before finishing with 75-75 for a tie for 17th place.

His best of four top 10 finishes in 1974 was a tie for second in the Canadian Open, worth \$18,500, thanks to a 16-foot birdie putt on the final hole which he said he will always remember.

Schlee attended Memphis State University and was an Army paratrooper for two years. Among his hobbies are astrology and photography. "When your signs are right, you can do anything," says the Tour's resident astrologist.

1975 IN REVIEW

The year started slowly and ended the same way for Dan Sikes, but he did have several weeks when he flashed his former form. He had two top 10 finishes, getting a tie for seventh in the Pensacola Open as he started with a 72, and then had 69, 66 and 69.

At the Westchester Classic, where he always seems to play well, he tied for ninth with a 69-66 finish. He earned \$6,000 for his biggest check of the year.

Dan skipped all the west coast tournaments at the start of the year with the exception of the Phoenix Open, where he missed the cut. At the start of the Florida swing, he withdrew from the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, finished 54th in the Florida Citrus Open and missed the cut in the Doral-Eastern Open.

Through his next 16 tournaments, he was a steady performer, only missing the cut three times. In the Walt Disney World National Team play, he teamed with Mason Rudolph to tie for fifth.

Dan played in 24 tournaments and finished in the money 17 times. He compiled a stroke average of 72.0 with two 66s his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

A member of the Florida Bar Association, Dan Sikes joined the Tour in 1961 because, he said, "I can't make this much money this fast in law." In the next 14 years, in official purses alone, Dan earned more than three-quarters of a million dollars.

His most lucrative years were 1967 and 1968 when he won the last four of his six titles and more than \$100,000 each year. In 1967 he won in his home town of Jacksonville and in Philadelphia and was second to Jack Nicklaus in the rain-delayed Westchester Classic, the first \$250,000 tournament in the Tour's history.


Dan thought he had missed the cut at Westchester but the second round was washed out three times, and finally he shot a 62 that counted. It was the first Westchester, and the tournament has been good to him ever since. He tied for second in 1968—while also winning the Minnesota Classic and the Florida Citrus—he was third in 1969 and he tied for third in 1973.

Also in 1973, Sikes finished second twice to record his third best year in earnings, more than \$90,000. Dan held a three-stroke lead in the Byron Nelson until Lanny Wadkins birdied five of the last seven holes to catch him. Then Lanny won the playoff when Dan bogied the first extra hole.

Dan knew at the outset of 1974 that it would be a demanding year. He missed the cut in his first five tournaments. He finished in the money in 17 of his next 19 events but missed the top 60 for the second time in three years. A tie for second at Tallahassee was the highest of his four top 10 finishes.

Sikes won the All-Army championship while in military service and later, in 1957, won the U.S. Public Links title.

1975 IN REVIEW

Feeling better physically, Jim Simons had the makings of the type of season followers of the game know he can have.

Neither his shoulder nor his wrist bothered him quite as much, and Jim fashioned four top 10 finishes. His finest effort was a tie for third in the Pleasant Valley Classic at Sutton, Mass. It was a superb final-round 65, six-under par, that lifted him there. His six-under par 278 was two in back of the winner, Roger Maltbie.

Solid, consistent rounds were responsible for his five-under par 279 and solo fourth in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, and the seven-under par 281 for a tie for fifth in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He also tied for seventh in the Western Open.

On two other occasions, Jim used torrid finishes to pick up handsome checks - a final-round 63 gave him a tie for 11th in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and a closing 65 netted a tie for 16th in the Sahara Invitational.

Jim played in 31 tournaments and earned money in 23. He had a stroke average of 71.9 with the 63 being his best.

PRIOR YEARS

Jim Simons will be the first to tell you that his first two years on the PGA Tour were not up to expectations. He probably won't mention, however, that he also has been hampered with physical ailments.

He has had tendonitis in his left wrist, but, more painful has been his left shoulder, which has been diagnosed as a "looseness in the joint - a minor dislocation." It's the result of a "horsing-around" incident with his fraternity brothers while at Wake Forest.


The first year, he was in considerable pain, mainly because it had not been diagnosed properly. "I was doing stretching exercises because it seemed tight. But, that was just the opposite of what I needed." Fortunately, during this past year, it has not been as bothersome.

Jim's father started him in the game at the Butler (Pa) Country Club at age nine. He lived on a farm and, "I'd ride over to the club on my bike early in the morning and either play or hit balls most of the day, and ride back in the evening."

He started in competition at age 13, and his progress was rapid. He enrolled at the University of Houston, but, after a year, transferred to Wake Forest. He was on the 1971 Walker Cup team and lost in the finals of the 1971 British Amateur to Steve Melnyk. In the 1971 U.S. Open at Merion, he gained national attention as he led the tournament after the third round, finally finishing in a tie for fifth.

His best Tour finishes have been at Tallahassee, as he had a solo second in 1973 and a tie for fifth in 1974. They came after he earned his player's card in the fall of 1972.

1975 IN REVIEW

It is easy for Bob E. Smith to point to the week that permitted him to return to the top 60. It was the Byron Nelson Classic at Dallas, and Bob turned in one of his better Tour performances.

He finished second to Tom Watson, just two strokes away, with 67-68-69-67—271, 13-under par. He was around the lead all week, but, in the end, it was his superb six-iron into the 72d green that brought him his biggest smile. He hit it four inches from the cup.

"It was so close I could have blown it in," he said beaming. "I'm elated." His check was the biggest of his eight-year career on the Tour—\$19,550. The birdie at the home hole gave him second place by one stroke over Jack Ewing.

Bob tied for 14th the next week in the First NBC New Orleans Open, and then had problems keeping it all together the rest of the year, although he played well enough to make most of the cuts.

Next to Dallas, his best finish was a tie for 12th in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. The next week, he tied for 13th in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic.

Bob played in 30 tournaments and made the cut in 23. He compiled a stroke average of 72.0 with a 66 at New Orleans his best.

PRIOR YEARS

When Bob E. Smith arrived on the Tour in 1968, he brought with him an impressive set of credentials. He had won the 1965 and 1967 Western Amateurs, the 1967 California State Amateur and the 1967 NCAA Small College crown for Sacramento State.


Immediately, he jumped into the Top 60, as he earned \$30,044 the first year to finish 59th on the list. The future appeared bright.

Experimenting with his swing, his effectiveness diminished slightly, and he fell out of the coveted exempt category the next two years. He did return in 1971 and 1972, but dropped out again the following two years.

Bob has shown the signs of being the outstanding player many thought he would be, but has lacked the consistency necessary to achieve that goal. He has said it is a "frustrating feeling," to see players he used to beat regularly as an amateur now ahead of him on the money list.

Prior to 1975, his best money year was 1971 when he won \$44,595. He had 13 top 25 finishes that year.

1975 IN REVIEW

J. C. Snead kept talking about not being able to make any putts—and just kept on winning a bundle of cash and continuing as one of the leading players in the game.

He ended his victory drought early in the year, outlasting Ray Floyd and Bobby Nichols in their sudden-death shootout at the Andy-Williams-San Diego Open. His last previous victory had been in the 1972 IVB-Philadelphia Classic.

The weather at Torrey Pines was a little windy and cool, and J. C. believes that was to his advantage. "I've always felt my chances were better in bad weather," he said. "I can strike the ball halfway decent and hit it low into the wind."

He came from five-shots back with a closing 68 to catch them. Nichols went out on the first extra hole, and J. C. won it with a birdie at the fourth extra hole.

He was in position to win again in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, but he bogeyed the 72d hole and finished one stroke out of the playoff between Don Bies and Hubert Green.

Three times he finished sixth—by himself in the Phoenix Open and the Canadian Open (with a last-day 66) and tied for sixth in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. Three 68s led him to a tie for seventh in the Southern Open.

For the third straight time, his steady, strong play earned him a position on the U.S. Ryder Cup team. J. C. played in 29 tournaments and earned money in 23. He had seven top 10 finishes as he compiled a stroke average of 71.8. He had two 66s for his low rounds and five 67s.

PRIOR YEARS

J. C. Snead improved his official earnings by almost 60 percent in 1974, again passing the \$100,000 level without winning a tournament. In fact, his 1974 total of \$164,486 was the highest for a non-winner in tour history.

He finished in the top 10 in 11 of 30 events, including four seconds and two thirds. He was runner-up to Jack Nicklaus in the first Tournament Players Championship, by two strokes. The following week he needed to sink a 13-foot putt on the 72nd hole to tie Forrest Fezler in the Southern Open, but the ball slid off to the right.

Although a nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, Jesse dreamed of a major league baseball career during his boyhood in Hot Springs, Va. After a spell in the Washington Senators farm system, he decided to try golf and turned pro in 1964. It was four years before he earned his playing privileges on the Tour.

J. C. worked as an assistant to head pro Charlie Beverage at Century CC in Westchester County, N.Y., while twice failing to pass the Tour Qualifying School.

After earning his players' card, Jesse endured three very lean years until early in 1971, when he won two tournaments in a three-week period, at Tucson and Doral.



1975 IN REVIEW

Ed Sneed used two tournaments as the keys to maintaining his status among the exempt players. The handsome former Ohio Stater finished alone in third place in the Western Open to pocket \$14,200 and alone in fifth place in the World Open to earn another \$8,200.

He played well for most of the year, but as so often happens, "nothing really happened." In the World Open, he only was two strokes off the pace after the second and third rounds, starting 68-70-70. The wind came up the final afternoon, and so did most of the scores. Ed finished with a 75 and three strokes out of the Jack Nicklaus-Billy Casper playoff.

One of the keener students of the game, Ed also is one of the Tour's better conversationalists and comics. His imitations of various players are exceptional. Incidentally, he was the best man at Tom Weiskopf's wedding, and Tom was in the same role when Ed married Nancy Kay Popa.

Ed played in 30 tournaments and earned money in 25. He compiled a stroke average of 72.3 with a 67 being his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

Ed Sneed endured four years on the Tour with little to keep him going except the encouragement of his close friend, Tom Weiskopf, who kept insisting that there was no reason he couldn't crack the top 60. Late in the 1973 season, Ed popped up a winner.

Sneed won the New South Wales Open in Australia, caught a plane for San Francisco and—gaining a day via the International dateline—made it to Napa, Calif., in time for the Monday qualifying round preceding the Kaiser International. The following Sunday he beat John Schlee in a playoff for the first prize.

The following July, Sneed won the Greater Milwaukee Open. "It's good to know you can win again," he said. "I've seen it happen before. A guy gets it together one week and they you never hear of him again." He led all four rounds at Milwaukee, scoring 66-67-71-72.

The following two weeks, Sneed tied for sixth in the Quad Cities and placed 14th in the B.C. Open. Earlier in 1974 he battled two severe cases of flu and had all his wisdom teeth pulled, and missed seven cuts.

Ed started to play golf at about age 13 in his native Roanoke, Va., and attended Ohio State University, where he played No. 1 on the golf team as a senior.

After earning his playing privileges in 1969, Ed divided his time between the Tour and Walker Inman's pro shop at Scioto CC in Columbus, Ohio. In 1971 he decided to make the Tour his full-time job, and the following year he won a Second Tour event, the Maumelle Open in Little Rock, Ark.

1975 IN REVIEW

Ken Still always refers to the Greater Greensboro Open as one of his all-time favorite tournaments. Well he should. It's been a good track for him at the Sedgefield Country Club and the people there love him—almost as much as he loves the Dodgers.

His best finish of 1975 came in Greensboro, a tie for sixth, and there was a time when it appeared as if he had a chance to catch the fast-running Tom Weiskopf. Ken's first three rounds of 74-68-69 put him in second place behind Tom, but his closing one-over par 72 proved costly. The check for \$7,650 was his best of the year.

Ken later used a 68-67 start to finish alone in seventh place in the Greater Milwaukee Open; and he tied for seventh in the Canadian Open, aided by a second-day 67 and final-round 69.

The most costly part of the year for Ken was a five-week stretch starting with the Houston Open. He missed five straight cuts.

Ken played in 27 tournaments and earned money in 20. His stroke average was 72.2 with two 66s his low rounds.

PRIOR YEARS

After turning pro in 1953, at age 18, Ken Still waited seven years before joining the Tour, and it was another nine years before he won a tournament.


Ken won twice in 1969, in Orlando and Milwaukee, for his best year on Tour before or since. He won again in 1970 when he defeated Lee Trevino and Bert Yancey in a playoff for the Kaiser International title.

A high spot since then was the 1973 Greater Greensboro Open, when Ken made up five shots in the final round with a seven-under par 64 to lose to winner Chi Chi Rodriguez by a stroke. He was delighted with the effort, saying, "It's the most under par I've ever been in one round of a tournament."

In 1974 he slipped out of the top 60 for the first time in nine years. A neck injury which required traction left him able to enter one tournament from mid-May to mid-July. A tie for ninth at Westchester was his lone top 10 finish but he collected money in 17 of 26 tournaments.

One of the Tour's most avid sports fans, Ken played baseball in high school in Tacoma, Wash., and turned to golf after investigating a caddie job at the Firecrest Golf Club.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was an unusual year for Dave Stockton. This is a man used to stepping into the winner's circle, but the closest he could come to it was a solo second finish in the Tournament Players Championship. He finished three strokes behind his close friend, Al Geiberger.

That, alone, doesn't tell the whole story as it unfolded at the Colonial Country Club. Geiberger was a wire-to-wire leader, but twice during the final round, Stockton actually had nudged ahead.

Dave had the lead with nine holes to play as he toured Colonial's front side in a sparkling three-under par 32, while Al was working on a 36. The back nine wasn't quite as kind to Dave, and he settled for a 69 on the day and a check for \$28,500.

The duel had added interest in that Dave and Al are former University of Southern California golf standouts and they were partners in two victorious efforts on the old CBS Television Classic. "Al and I have finished close together in tournaments," Dave said, "but this was the first time it came down to head-to-head battle for the championship."

That was his best effort of the year. Three 68s led him to a solo sixth in the Greater Milwaukee Open and he had ties for ninth in the Tournament of Champions and the Quad Cities Open.

Dave played in 29 tournaments and earned money in 24. He had a 71.6 stroke average with the 64 at Colonial his lowest round.

PRIOR YEARS

Dave Stockton was playing the Tour for three years, barely getting along, when he discovered the secret of winning. Since then he has proved to be one of the game's finest players, and his huge success in 1974 didn't surprise serious observers.

Dave's career reached three highs in 1974—three victories in a single season, more than \$150,000 in official purses and a near miss in the Masters, when he tied Tom Weiskopf for second place behind Gary Player.

Stockton won at Los Angeles by beating back a challenge from Sam Snead and John Mahaffey with a 72d-hole birdie, after a 235-yard three-wood shot 12 feet from the flagstick. His total of 276 was one stroke off Ben Hogan's record at Riviera.

His second victory came at Quad Cities, where he trailed by six shots until a closing 64 left him in front by one. He posted the year's lowest 36-hole total of 130 at Hartford and finished 69-69 to win by four shots. It prompted a phone call that evening from an earlier pro-am partner, Gerald Ford, who had occupied the White House barely a week.

Stockton captured seven tournaments in his previous 10 years on Tour, and no doubt the most precious was the 1970 PGA Championship, in which he fought off Arnold Palmer and extreme heat to win at Tulsa's Southern Hills.

1975 IN REVIEW

It started out as if it would be another sensational year for Leonard Thompson, three top 10 finishes in his first five starts. Then, he only was able to move into that select group one more time the rest of the year—through 27 tournaments.

To say the least, it was a frustrating year for the big, friendly Carolinian.

After his tie for 29th in the inaugural at Phoenix, he moved into a tie for seventh in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open and followed with a tie for sixth in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur. A bad first day in Hawaii made him miss the cut there, but he came right back with a tie for ninth in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open.

It was one of those years in which he'd find himself in position one day and out of it the next. Examples: He was two off the lead after the first day in the Atlanta Classic, and then posted a 75. He opened with a 69 at Pleasant Valley and followed with a 74. The next week, he had a 68 the first day in the Canadian Open, and then tacked on a 75.

A first-round 66 in the Southern Open left him only one off the pace, but his second-day 72 put him seven back. Just in reverse, he tied for 13th in the Byron Nelson Classic after starting with 74, and then fired 68-65-69.

Leonard played in 33 tournaments and made money in 24, missing the cut seven times and withdrawing twice. He had four top 10 finishes, compiling a stroke average of 71.9. The 65 at the Byron Nelson was his low.

PRIOR YEARS

Leonard Thompson found success fairly quickly after joining the Tour.

He failed in his first attempt to gain a player's card but, after serving a year as an assistant pro at the Possum Trot course in North Myrtle Beach, S.C., he qualified in the fall of 1971 and almost cracked the top 60 in his rookie year. He was 61st in exemption points.

In 1973 he set a goal of \$75,000 in earnings and easily passed that figure, collecting more than \$42,000 of his \$91,158 in his home state, by placing third in the World Open and tying for third in the Kemper in Charlotte. He had five other top 10 finishes and 34 rounds in the 60s.

Leonard pushed his goal upward to \$100,000 in 1974 and again passed it, thanks mostly to the \$52,000 first prize in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, in which he beat Hale Irwin by a stroke.

"I really didn't think about the money. And I wasn't nervous. Tense, yes," Thompson explained after his first Tour victory. "Winning gave me a lot of self-satisfaction, something you can't put into words."

Leonard donated \$10,000 of his purse to the tournament beneficiary, the Boy Scouts of America. In the succeeding four weeks, he placed sixth at Orlando, 12th at Doral, fourth at Jacksonville and fifth in the Heritage Classic and eventually counted seven top 10 finishes for 1974.

1975 IN REVIEW

Although Lee Trevino did not have the type of year that pleased him, he still was one of the Tour's biggest crowd pleasers.

Lee only won once, in the Florida Citrus Open by one stroke over Hale Irwin. Twice he finished third, by himself in the Tournament of Champions and tied for that position in the Kaiser International Open.

This was the eighth straight year that Lee had won a tournament but his streak of \$200,000-plus years was snapped at four. He won \$134,206, his lowest since 1969.

His best finish among the major championships was a tie for 10th in the Masters.

Late in the second day of the Western Open, he, along with Bobby Nichols and Jerry Heard, suffered the effects of a jolt of lightning, and was hospitalized for nearly two days.

Lee played in 27 tournaments and earned money in 23. He compiled a stroke average of 71.1 with three 65s and five 66s.

PRIOR YEARS

No one noticed when Lee Trevino played in the 1966 U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco, his only attempt on Tour that year. Twelve months later he finished fifth in the Open at Baltusrol, near Newark, N.J., won \$6,000 and was on the Tour to stay.

Another 12 months later found Lee with his first victory, in the 1968 U.S. Open at Oak Hill in Rochester, and one of the game's incredible sagas was unfolding. He won another U.S. Open in 1971 by beating Jack Nicklaus in the playoff at Merion. He won the British Open in 1971 and 1972.

Lee represented the U.S. in four straight World Cup events starting in 1968 and in four straight Ryder Cups starting in 1969. He won the Vardon Trophy for low-stroke average three straight years starting in 1970 and more than \$200,000 four straight starting in 1971.

After winning the U.S., Canadian and British Opens in a span of five weeks in 1971, Trevino was named PGA Player-of-the-Year. He accumulated more than \$1 million in official U.S. purses by the end of his sixth full year on Tour, marking the fastest anyone ever won a "first" million in tournaments.

In 1974, Lee won his first PGA Championship and his first World Series of Golf, as well as the Greater New Orleans Open by eight strokes, biggest margin of the year, and with the lowest total, 21-under-par 267.

1975 IN REVIEW

"It's a great, great feeling, I worked hard to get what I got. Winning is almost like a new experience." The speaker was Art Wall, one of the finest gentlemen ever to play the game. The scene was in the news room at the Tuckaway Country Club, site of the Greater Milwaukee Open. Art had just returned scores of 67, 67, 67 and 70 for a 17-under par 271 and a one-stroke victory over Gary McCord, a free-and-easy Californian nearly half his age.

Art has had a distinguished career, but this was his first victory since the 1966 Insurance City Open in Hartford. "It's not my character to say this is going to change everything," he said softly. "But it certainly is a big boost to me to play under pressure again."

Earlier in the year, Art was wondering if he should remain on the Tour. His once superb game lacked the crispness of years gone by.

Until he arrived in Milwaukee, he had played 35 rounds and was unable to break 70. A tie for 15th in the Masters, though was encouraging. Then he started his birdie-binge with his three straight 67s.

Through the rest of the year, Art played 34 more rounds, and 13 of them were in the 60s. He tied for ninth in the Westchester Classic with a 68-69-69 finish. He had a final round 63 in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and he closed with a 66 in the Sahara Invitational.

Art played in 23 events in 1975 and made the cut in 13 (including seven of his last nine). He compiled a stroke average of 72.3, with the 63 at Hartford his low.


PRIOR YEARS

It just seems as if Arthur J. Wall, Jr., has been on the PGA Tour forever—and the Tour most certainly is fortunate for that. What a fine career he has had.

He has collected 14 triumphs, the first one in the 1953 Fort Wayne (Ind.) Open, but his big year was 1959. He won four times—the Masters, the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, the Azalea Open and the Buick Open.

As you might imagine, he was named the PGA Player of the Year, and his earnings of \$53,167 placed him No. 1 on the list. His biggest year for collecting checks, though, was in 1971 and he pocketed \$54,644.

1975 IN REVIEW

This was the year Tom Watson truly came of age as one of the stars of the PGA Tour. He won the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas, was second in the Atlanta Classic to Hale Irwin and third in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open. With a splendid display of consistency, he fashioned 12 top 10 finishes in his 25 Tour starts.

He broke through in the "majors" by winning the British Open at Carnoustie, Scotland. He was three off the lead of Bobby Cole and two in back of Australian Jack Newton after three days, but he caught Newton on the final afternoon to force an 18-hole playoff. In the rain, Tom managed a one-under par 71 to Newton's 72 and the coveted trophy was his.

That put him in his first World Series of Golf at Akron Firestone C.C., and he came through again, finishing two ahead of Jacklaus in the 36-hole event. The \$50,000, though, isn't included in his official earnings.

Nicklaus said of Tom, "He knows exactly where he's going. Straight ahead. Nothing distracts him. He has great abilities, super confidence and just enough cockiness. He's not a comer. He has arrived."

The victory at the Byron Nelson was the second of his Tour career and he used a brilliant 63 in the second round and a superb final-round 65 to nail it down. Another 65 at Atlanta, in the third round, was the key to his runner-up position. At Tucson, he fired three straight 67s after a 72 start.

Tom played in 26 events and earned money in 23, with 12 top 10 finishes. He compiled a stroke average of 70.9, tying Gene Littler and Hale Irwin for the fourth best of the year. His 63 was low and he also had two 65s among his 32 rounds in the 60s.

PRIOR YEARS

Tom Watson was six years old when his father, a one-time scratch player, introduced him to golf. Tom developed into a four-time Missouri Amateur champion and played for three years at Stanford University. Shortly before graduating with a degree in psychology, he decided to try the Tour.

He admits to only one good tournament in his rookie year of 1972 but he was satisfied with his beginnings. He closed with 69-66 at Quad Cities to lose by a stroke to Deane Beman. And twice in 1973 he had victory actually in his grasp but let it slip away.

Tom started the 1974 campaign by finishing fourth, ninth and fourth at San Diego, Hawaii and Los Angeles, in that order, and was on his way to well over \$100,000 won.

Memorable was his losing effort in the U.S. Open at Winged Foot. He scored 73-71-69 to lead by a shot, then stumbled to a 79 and tied for fifth. "I blew it," he admitted, but he refused to wallow in remorse.

In the first Western Open to be played at the tough Butler National course in Oak Brook, Ill., Tom staged the best victory rally of anyone in 1974, making up six shots with a closing 69.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was another tremendous year for Tom Weiskopf and it came so close to being one of the great years.

As it was, he won twice, in the Greater Greensboro Open when he fired a seven-under par 64 in the first round despite near gale winds; and in the Canadian Open, when he caught his rival and close friend, Jack Nicklaus, on the final hole and then won the sudden-death playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

Twice he finished second. Who ever could forget the Masters, when he and Johnny Miller chased Nicklaus to the final flagstick?

He dueled Nicklaus again in the Heritage Classic after his second-round 65. They were tied after three rounds, but Jack went on to win.

Four times, Tom was third, tying Nicklaus for that spot in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, and then by himself in the Westchester Classic, the PGA Championship and the World Open.

Tom was masterful in the Ryder Cup victory over Great Britain, winning in all four of his matches and was acclaimed the outstanding player of the three-day affair.

Tom played in 23 tournaments and made money in 18. He missed four cuts—and three of them came in the first six weeks of the year. He compiled a stroke average of 71.1 with a 63 at Westchester his low round among the 25 he had in the 60s. He tied with John Mahaffey with the streak of 13 rounds at par or less.

PRIOR YEARS

Few players in the history of golf have come close to the combined achievements that Tom Weiskopf recorded in 1973, his 10th year on the Tour. In one eight-week span he won five tournaments, including the British and Canadian Opens, and he later won the World Series of Golf and the South African PGA championship. He easily topped \$200,000 in official U.S. earnings to rank third, and during his hottest streak scored in the 60s in exactly half of 40 rounds.

Although victory escaped Tom in 1974, the year had its memorable moments, such as passing the \$1 million mark in career earnings. He played in 21 events and would up in the top 10 in nine of them.

A former Western Amateur champion and two-time Ohio Public Links winner, Weiskopf spent four years on Tour before finding the winning combination. He won twice in 1968, twice more in 1971 and once in 1972.

1975 IN REVIEW

Bob Wynn reached his first goal in 1975—to make the top 60. If he was permitted to play one shot over again, though, it probably would come at the 71st hole of the IVB-Philadelphia Classic at the Whitmarsh Valley Country Club.

He was leading the rain-plagued tournament late in the final afternoon by two strokes with an 11-under par score. He wanted to hit his tee shot left, but it drifted a little too far left, into a bunker.

When he finally pulled his ball out of the cup, he had to put an eight onto his scorecard, a quadruple bogey. The end result was a solo third-place finish. He started 73-70, but during the 36-hole final on Monday (forced by two rain postponements), he fired a superb 65 in the morning, and was working on another until the next to last hole.

Bob won the Magnolia Classic, the second-tour event opposite the Masters, aided by a third-round 64. A third-round 66 led him to a fourth place in the First NBC New Orleans Open. He tied for seventh in the Canadian Open and an opening 64 paved the way for a tie for ninth in the Sahara Invitational.

Bob played in 31 tournaments and made money in 22. He had five top 10 finishes (including Magnolia), and compiled a stroke average of 71.5.

PRIOR YEARS

One of the game's better trivia questions: "What record does Bob Wynn share with Byron Nelson and Denny Shute?" The answer: Winner of the Ohio Open three straight years, 1970, 1971 and 1972, in Bob's case.

He owns another distinction. It is unlikely anyone on the Tour ever started in the game as he did. "I was 15 years old and they were having the qualifier for the Ohio Jaycees tournament. They needed two more entrants to get one more qualifying spot. They called my Mom, and said all I had to do was go out and tee it up. That's what I did. The first ball I ever hit was in the first tee, and that's all I did that day, hit it once."

He only played three times that year, but he started to realize that golf was his game. As a 16-year-old the next summer, he played a lot of golf and had an 18 handicap. The next year, in 1957, "I'd play 36 holes a day and hit close to 500 balls at the Xenia Golf Club. I got my handicap down to one." He also finished third in the Ohio Jaycees—to Jack Nicklaus—that year.

He turned professional at age 19 in 1959 and worked in all phases of the club operation. In the mid-sixties, he spent two years in the Army, and in 1965 he won the Eighth Army Support Command title in Seoul, Korea, and then lost in an 18-hole playoff to Sergeant Orville Moody for the All-Eighth Army crown, also in Seoul.

Upon his discharge, he returned to southern Ohio and in 1968 and 1969, was the head professional at the Xenia Club. He played in a few Tour events in 1970 and came out to stay in 1971.

1975 IN REVIEW

Although illness prevented Bert Yancey from being as effective as he had been in previous years, he still managed two strong second-place finishes.

After missing the first two months of the Tour, he made a bid for victory in his third start, the Doral-Eastern Open in Miami. He tied with Forrest Fezler for second place behind Jack Nicklaus, due to his superb 69-67 finish.

Then, in his hometown of Tallahassee, Fla., he finished 68-69 to tie Spike Kelley for the runner-up spot behind first-time winner Rik Massengale. His next best finish was in the Western Open at the Butler National course in Oak Brook, Ill., where he tied for 12th.

This past year, Bert also was elected by his colleagues to be one of the four player directors on the Tournament Policy Board.

Bert played in 18 tournaments (leaving again due to illness early in August) and made money in 11. He compiled a stroke average of 72.5 with 67 being his low round.

PRIOR YEARS

Fascinated by golf history and blessed with the ability to analyze the golf swing, Bert Yancey often can be found conducting clinics after the Wednesday pro-am events.

Bert joined the Tour in 1964 and only two years later won three tournaments in a single season. Four more victories were spaced out over the following six years, but he possibly is best known for his unsuccessful challenges in the Masters and the U.S. Open. He led the 1968 Open by five strokes after 45 holes but was passed by then-little known Lee Trevino and defending champion Jack Nicklaus.


In the last event of 1972, the Walt Disney World, Yancey shot a record-tying 64 with seven straight birdies, longest string on the Tour that year, but his second victory of the year escaped him. He had won earlier that season in the American Golf Classic.

Victory escaped him completely in 1973, largely because of a new bad habit of shooting one high round. There was more of the same in 1974, when bad luck in the final rounds kept him from victory in three tournaments.

In the 1974 Bob Hope Desert Classic, Bert shot a 30-31—61 at Indian Wells, but a closing 70 dropped him behind winner Hubert Green.

He challenged in the U.S. Open with a second-round 69, before finishing with 73-72 to tie for third. The following week, Yancey led the American Golf Classic with eight holes remaining, but a double-bogey six on the home hole cost him a spot in the four-way playoff.

1975 IN REVIEW

It was not a year Kermit Zarley would like to remember. He never managed to get his game in a challenging position, and his best finishes turned out to be a tie for 10th in the World Open, and ties for 12th in the Florida Citrus Open and the Atlanta Classic.

It was the second straight year that he has failed to make the top 60 for exemption, but is using his position on the top 50 all-time career earnings to avoid the qualifiers. He has pocketed \$463,927 since he started in 1964.

There were times when Kermit appeared ready to break out of it, such as the Southern Open, when he fired 68-68-69 but faltered with a closing 73 to tie for 15th. The Sahara Invitational proved a disappointment, as he opened with a 68, and posted a 75 and missed the cut. That's the type of year it was.

Kermit played in 29 tournaments and made money in 18, missing the cut 11 times. His low round was a 64 the second day at Pensacola, as he compiled a stroke average of 72.4.

PRIOR YEARS

Kermit Zarley began his golf career in his native Seattle, Wash., where his father owned a restaurant near a public course. By the time he enrolled at the University of Houston he had won the Washington State and Northwestern Amateur championships. He added the NCAA title in his senior year at Houston.

In his first 12 years on the Tour, the "pro from the moon"—as Bob Hope dubbed him once—has been a steady earner if not spectacular winner, although he captured single titles in 1968, 1970 and 1972, the last the National Team Championship in the company of close friend Babe Hiskey. Kermit and Babe have been active for years in the Tour's Bible study classes.

Also notable in 1972 was Zarley's trailing Jack Nicklaus by only a stroke entering the final round of the U.S. Open, before the Pebble Beach winds blew him to a 79 score and sixth place.

Kermit enjoyed his second-best earnings total in 1973, thanks largely to several low final rounds. He closed with 67 at Quad Cities to tie for second, had a 67-64 finish at Orlando to tie for third and finished with 65 at St. Louis, tying for 11th.

But he was lacking those scorching final rounds in 1974 and slipped out of the top 60 for the first time in five years.

His largest check of 1974 was \$8,000, for seventh place in the Kemper Open. But his highest finishes were sixth place at Dallas and a tie for sixth at Tuckson, the latter the result of rounds of 68-71-68-71. Kermit played in 28 events and missed the cut in six.

1975 IN REVIEW

The traffic was heavy in the stretch run for the Greater Jacksonville Open crown, one of the closest chases of the year. There were nine players who either led or shared in it at some point during the final 18 holes.

Later, it caused Larry Ziegler to remark, "I thought that somebody would come out of the pack to win it, but I never thought it would be me."

Larry Ziegler it was, coming from three strokes off the pace at the start of the final humid afternoon to win by two, thanks to a brilliant seven-under par 65. He picked the perfect time for his low round of the year. He had other rounds of 73, 69 and 69 for his 12-under par 276.

Once again, Larry cited veteran Doug Ford for his success. "Any success I've had, Doug deserves a tremendous amount of credit for it." He has worked with Larry for the last three years or so.

Larry's only other top 10 finish was a tie for eighth in the Florida Citrus Open and his next best was a tie for 13th in the Masters, aided by a solid final-round 69.

Larry played in 32 tournaments and cashed checks in 18. Four times, illness or injury forced him to withdraw. His stroke average was 72.1.

PRIOR YEARS

Larry Ziegler's up-and-down career on Tour turned upward in 1973 and continued to climb the following year for successive placings among the top 60 money winners.

One of the longest hitters in golf, Ziegler rallied strongly late in 1973 to finish no lower than 14th in seven tournaments, placing in the top 10 three times.

In 1974, Larry surpassed his best previous earnings year, 1969, by almost \$20,000 by finishing in the money in 30 tournaments and in the top 10 in four of them. He challenged for two titles, the Canadian Open and Westchester Classic.

In Canada, Larry set a course record with a second-round 63 to lead with a 132 total, but slipped to a 73 before closing with 69 and a tie for second place, worth \$18,500.

He tied for the first-round lead at Westchester with a 67 and trailed by one stroke at the halfway mark, but a third-round 72, including two penalty shots, led to a tie for fifth.

Ziegler's first three years on Tour yielded barely \$8,000, but in 1969 he found victory in the Michigan Classic. For the first time in Tour history, a sponsor was unable to pay the purse, but the TPD eventually provided all the cash from its general funds.

One of 13 children in a St. Louis family of modest means, Larry and his six brothers found that long hours of caddying could provide needed money, and Larry fell in love with golf.

After he was graduated from high school, Larry spent six years in the Army Reserve and was associated with St. Louis area clubs until he found a sponsor to finance his venture into Tour competition.

World Series of Golf Field to be Worldwide

The new World Series of Golf will be a 72-hole championship, contested over the South Course at Firestone Country Club in Akron, Ohio, September 2-5. It will have total prize money of \$300,000.

The following players now will qualify for invitation to participate.

The winners in 1976 of:

- The Tournament Players Championship
- The Masters Tournament
- The United States Open
- The PGA Championship
- The Canadian Open
- The Western Open
- The British Open
- The United States Amateur
- The British Amateur

The winner of the 1975 World Series of Golf (Tom Watson).

The winner of the 1975 World Cup individual championship.

The winner of the Winter Tour segment of the PGA Tour (which started with the 1975 Southern Open and continues through the Florida Citrus Open, March 4-7).

The winner of the Spring Tour segment (which starts with the Doral-Eastern Open and continues through the Kemper Open, June 10-13).

The winner of the Summer Tour segment (which starts with the United States Open and continues through the American Golf Classic, August 26-29).

The winners of two or more events on the Tour during the preceding 12-month period.

The five (5) leaders on the Tour's money list starting with the NBC Tucson Open and continuing through the American Golf Classic.

The five (5) leaders in Vardon Stroke Average starting with the NBC Tucson Open and continuing through the American Golf Classic.

The leaders in the Order of Merit from the Asian, Australian, British, Japanese and South African Tours.

The original World Series of Golf was designed to bring together the winners of the year's four major championships—United States and British Opens, the Masters and the PGA Championship. They played 36 holes, with \$50,000 to the winner. This competition began in 1962 and continued through last year.

The New Tours — Winter, Spring, Summer

The PGA Tour schedule has been divided into three distinct segments to give the year new highlights and add continuity to the individual tournaments as they now are linked together with a meaningful purpose.

The three segments are known as the:

- **WINTER TOUR**, which started with the 1975 Southern Open and concludes with the Florida Citrus Open, March 4-7.
- **SPRING TOUR**, which starts with the Doral-Eastern Open and concludes with the Kemper Open, June 10-13.
- **SUMMER TOUR**, which starts with the United States Open and concludes with the American Golf Classic, August 26-29.

Points are awarded to eligible players through the first 10 places in each PGA Tour event. The player with the most points at the end of each segment is invited to the new World Series of Golf.

Points are awarded on the following basis: First place, 100 points; second, 57; third, 36; fourth, 22; fifth, 19; sixth, 17; seventh, 15; eighth, 13; ninth, 11; and tenth, 10.

QUALIFYING SCHOOL FOR APPROVED TOURNAMENT PLAYERS

The Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players was initiated in 1965 as the procedure for accrediting new players for the Tour. Since that time, 318 men have received Approved Tournament Players membership cards through these schools.

In 1975, two Qualifying Schools were held, the first in June at the Bay Tree Plantation club in North Myrtle Beach, S.C. There were 233 applicants and 13 received their cards following 108 holes of competition and three days of classroom work. There were 380 applicants in the second school at Walt Disney World in Lake Buena Vista, Fla., and 25 received their playing privileges.

Classroom instruction covers such subjects as the Rules of Golf, Personal Development, the History of Golf and the PGA Tour, Contracts and Finances, Public and Press Relations and an orientation about life on the Tour. A written examination follows.

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS QUALIFYING SCHOOLS

- FALL 1965**—Forty-nine were accepted to the PGA's first school and 17 were graduated to the Tour. John Schlee was leading qualifier with a score of 583 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1966**—Class included 99 men and 32 were graduated. Harry Toscano was low qualifier with 572 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1967**—A class of 111, including several international stars, attended school. Thirty were graduated and Bobby Cole, of South Africa, was No. 1 graduate. He scored 572 over eight rounds.
- SPRING 1968**—Eighty-one were accepted and 15 were graduated. Bob Dickson led the graduates with 569 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1968**—Seventy-nine attended the school and 30 were graduated. Grier Jones was leading qualifier with 571 for 144 holes. The American Professional Golfers also held a school and graduated 21, headed by Martin Roesink with 585 for 144 holes.
- SPRING 1969**—Enrollment was 91 and 15 were graduated to the Tour after a 72-hole tournament. Bob Eastwood was low qualifier with 291.
- FALL 1969**—For the first time, a system of district tryouts at 54 holes was instituted. A total of 182 applications were accepted and 48 qualified for the School proper at the tryouts. Twelve were graduated to the Tour with Doug Olson being low, at 286, in the school's 72-hole tournament.
- 1970**—Nine district tryouts, at 54 holes, reduced the field of 250 applicants to 60. A 72-hole tournament at Tucson, Arizona produced 18 approved players. Robert Barbarossa was low qualifier with 279.
- 1971**—A system of three regional tryouts at 72-holes was used. A total of 357 applications were accepted and 75 qualified for the school proper at the tryouts. Twenty-three were graduated to the Tour with Bob Zender being low qualifier with 425 for 108 holes. The school was held at PGA National Golf Club, Palm Beach Gardens, Florida.
- 1972**—A record 468 applications were accepted. Eighty-one survived the three regional tryouts with 25 receiving playing privileges. Larry Stubblefield and John Adams were low qualifiers with 434 for 108 holes.
- 1973**—373 applications were accepted by the Division. 78 players survived the regional tryouts, and 23 players received playing privileges on Tour for one year. Ben Crenshaw was the low qualifier for 144 holes. His 558 was 18 under par, 12 strokes ahead of field.
- 1974**—There were 447 applicants. Three Regional Tryouts reduced the field to 78 candidates and 19 received credentials after completing course at the Silverado Country Club, Napa, Calif., and the Canyon Country Club, Palm Springs, Calif. Fuzzy Zoeller was low qualifier with 572 for his final 144 holes.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of two nations.

In placing the Ryder Cup in competition, the donor set forth certain terms which were to be observed by the parties concerned so long as the matches are conducted. Included among these stipulations are the following:

- (1) The matches will be played every other year on a home-and-home basis;
- (2) While both parties must mutually agree on the specific dates for each match, the host team may select the site and will be responsible for such arrangements and details as are normally the function of a sponsoring group;
- (3) The Matches shall consist of two days of play with the first being devoted to foursomes and the second to single matches;
- (4) Each member of the competing teams must be a member of his country's PGA, and furthermore, must be a native born citizen of that country.

The matches were first officially played for the Ryder Cup in 1927 in the United States. They have been held continuously every other year since except for the period from 1937 when the exigencies of World War II forced their suspension.

From 1927 to date, the United States has won every Ryder Cup match played in this country. It also won on British soil in 1937, 1949, 1953, 1965, 1973 and 1975, to run its list of victories to 17 in the 21 matches. The British won at home in 1929, 1933 and 1957. The 1969 match in England resulted in the first tie of the series.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursomes matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The PGA Vardon Trophy, named in honor of the internationally famous British Golfer, Harry Vardon, was placed in competition among American professionals in 1937 as a successor to the Harry E. Radix Trophy, which, prior to that time, had been awarded annually to the professional having the finest tournament record in play in this country.

Today, the Vardon Trophy, a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" x 27" is awarded each year to the member of the PGA of America maintaining the finest playing average in those events cosponsored or so designated by the PGA in each such period. A minimum of 80 rounds in tournaments considered official by PGA is required to win.

Each year the PGA of America honors America's leading professional player by presenting him the PGA Player-of-the-Year Award.

This award is made on the basis of playing record for the year, including such things as money winnings, Vardon Trophy scoring average, Ryder Cup points and an overall evaluation of playing achievements.

In the past, selection of the PGA Player-of-the-Year has been made each year by a vote of the PGA membership and the individuals on the PGA national press list. Beginning in 1969 the Award was made by a vote of the PGA Executive Committee. The winner receives a plaque at the President's Dinner during the PGA Annual Meeting.
