*Three PGA Directors*, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA Tour. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner and the Tournament Director, conducts tournament play.

## *A Brief History of the PGA Tour*

The precise start of the PGA Tour defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 75th anniversary and continues to thrive on the PGA Tour with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the PGA Tour started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-back "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass., and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's PGA Tour is traced to the early Twenties when, in the Winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the Spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the Summer. The Summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic poignancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money-winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this Media Guide, our records such as leading money-winner; growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth.)

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of PGA Tour events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the PGA Tour to all cosponsors have gone back into purses accounting for the doubling of purses in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration the value of tournament purses have escalated and are likely to reach \$14 million by 1981. The PGA Tour operation has become more business-like and professional. An agronomist has been added to the staff to provide turf management advice and assistance to all events. The Tournament Players Championship, the players' own, has become one of the most significant events on the Tour and the new World Series of Golf has provided a climax to the season.

With the full cooperation of the players in 1978, the Tour's program to improve pace of play produced immediate results. Rounds of five hours disappeared and the average time was reduced to just over four hours. It is an example that Commissioner Beman hopes all golfers will follow.



# DESIGNATED PLAYERS FOR 1979

## *Key to Eligibility*

1. TPC Champions of last five calendar years.

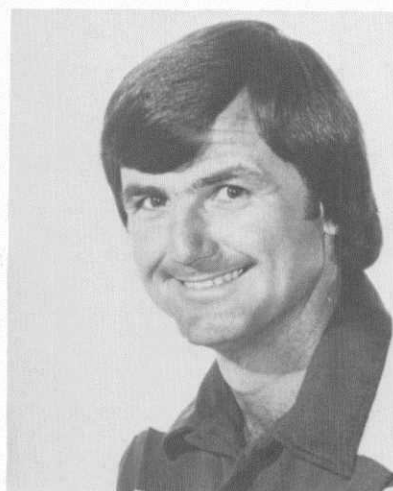

Though a trip to the winner's circle continued to elude Wally Armstrong in 1978, his fifth full year on the PGA Tour was certainly his best. His schedule was still busy, but he won more money than ever while playing in fewer events than he ever had.

Wally experienced a particularly good stretch in April, tying for fifth in two consecutive events, the Greater Greensboro Open and the Masters. He also tied for fifth in the Kemper Open two months later.

He has been a model of consistency. In 1976 and 1977 he played in 35 tournaments and missed the cut only seven times each year. During that span he finished in the top ten a total of ten times. In 1975 Wally missed the cut in half of his 34 events, though he finished in the top ten five times.

Wally's life is marked by diligence. He not only works hard on the PGA Tour, but he is active in the Tour's Bible study group.

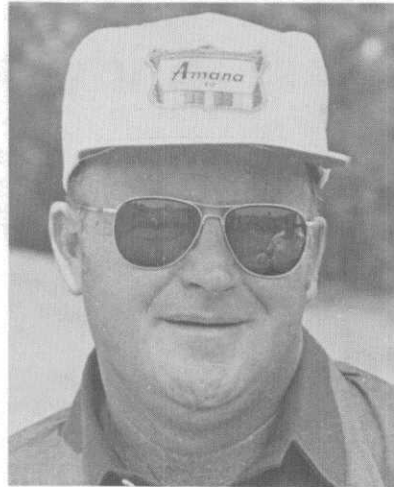
He started golf at age 12 on a nine-hole course outside his home in Indianapolis. His game progressed markedly in high school and he won the State scholastic title in 1963. He accepted a scholarship to the University of Florida, where he captained the Gators in 1967 and earned All-America honors.

He turned pro in 1970 but missed in the Tour Qualifying School twice before earning his Approved Tournament Player's card late in 1973. Success on the mini-tours had convinced him, meanwhile, that he would make it someday.

His rookie year of 1974 was divided into two segments of accomplishments. In the first five months, Wally made the cut in only one major event and earned \$262.66 at Los Angeles. The remainder of the year he collected more than \$30,000 and finished strongly with a tie for second at Las Vegas and for third at San Antonio.

"Part of it was just getting adjusted to the Tour," Armstrong said, "and part of it was the teamwork that developed with my younger brother, Tom. He was my caddie from the Gleason, late in February of 1974, until the Atlanta Classic in 1975."

Miller Barber, who will turn 48 on March 31, had yet another fine year in 1978, his 16th straight among the Top 60 money winners. Miller opened his 1978 campaign as hot as he'd left off in 1977, when he won the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic and finished second in the San Antonio Texas Open in consecutive weeks toward the end of that year.

After tying for 20th at Tucson, the first stop in 1978, Miller came from four strokes off the pace in the final round to win the Phoenix Open the following week. Opening with 68-69-70, Barber fired a finishing 65 to top Lee Trevino and Jerry Pate by one shot as he garnered his 11th PGA Tour victory.

Miller led nearly all the way as he won the 1977-78 Winter Tour Seasonal Championship with 291.25 points (Hale Irwin was runnerup with 263.16).

Barber's game slumped somewhat following his Phoenix triumph, but he rebounded in the Summer with three straight top ten finishes. He was third at Milwaukee, tied for sixth at Philadelphia and tied for fourth in the American Optical Classic.

From 1967 through 1974, Barber won one tournament a year, and only Jack Nicklaus matched that consistency of performance over those same eight seasons. In the late Winter of 1975-76 he picked up a check for \$911 by tying for 43rd in the Tournament Players Championship. This off-form effort would have gone unnoticed except for the fact that it made him the 10th player to pass \$1 million in PGA Tour purses.

Barber remains one of the busiest players on the Tour. In 1976 he played in 34 events and made money in 26, the same number he cashed checks from in 1975 while playing in 33. He hasn't missed the Top 60 money list since 1962, his fourth year on Tour.

Barber first ventured out on the Tour in 1959, but he did not make it a full-time occupation until members of the Apawamis Club in Rye, N.Y., where he was serving as pro, urged him to give it his best effort. Starting in 1963 he never was close to falling out of the Top 60.

In 1973 he lost playoffs to Jack Nicklaus at New Orleans and to Bert Greene in the L&M Open, but the year was to wind up as his most lucrative. In the first World Open at Pinehurst, N.C. which carried the first half-million-dollar total purse, Barber won the record \$100,000 first prize at the end of 144 holes.

Andy Bean, entering his third year on the PGA Tour, had already won a tournament, the 1977 Doral-Eastern Open, and had finished 12th on the money list that season with more than \$127,000. But no one could have anticipated the kind of year he had in 1978, a year in which he won three tournaments and was the third leading money winner.

Though Andy's first victory of the year did not come until the Kemper Open in June, before the win he had already garnered nearly half of his 13 top ten finishes, including a tie for second in the Andy Williams San Diego Open and a solo second in the Houston Open. In the latter event, Bean held a three-shot lead after three rounds; his total of 18-under 198 was the lowest 54-hole score on the Tour up to that point (Ben Crenshaw had a 12-under 198 at the San Antonio-Texas Open late in the year). But after opening 67-65-66, Andy slipped to a 73 on Sunday, while Gary Player recorded a 69 for a one-stroke victory, his third consecutive triumph.

At the Kemper, Bean was one shot off the lead after rounds of 72, 67 and 68. He finished with a six-under 66, however, to win by five strokes over Andy North and Mark Hayes.

The very next week, at the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, Andy struck again. After three rounds (70-68-69) he shared the lead with Rod Curl, and shot a closing 70 to finish at 11-under 277. But Lee Trevino caught him with a 65 that forced a playoff. On the first extra hole, Andy rolled in a 35-foot birdie putt for his second win in as many weeks.

Bean's third triumph came three weeks later, also in a playoff. A fantastic fourth round, when he shot another six-under 66 on the difficult Butler National Golf Course, brought him from six strokes off the pace to tie Bill Rogers at 282. Bean again won the playoff on the first extra hole, making par to Bill's bogey.

In his first Tour victory at Doral, Andy led all four days on the Blue Monster course, shooting 67-67-71-72—277. The win became a birthday present; he turned 24 on the final day, March 13.

During his rookie year of 1976, Bean's play was disappointing, especially to himself. "It was mainly temperament," he says. "I knew I had the game to play out here, but when I'd make a mistake I'd get hot at myself, and that would make everything worse. I wasn't able to manage my game."

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, Ga., where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, Fla., where his father bought a course.

"I've been lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

In 1978, George Burns fell slightly off the pace he'd set in his first two seasons on the PGA Tour, and though he failed to win a tournament, he continued to strengthen his reputation as a consistent cut-maker and money-winner. In 1977, his best year financially, George was in the money in 25 of 30 events; last year he made the cut in 30 of 33 starts.

Burns came on Tour from the Fall 1975 Qualifying School, in which he was runnerup to Jerry Pate. In his first full year, 1976, he was third three times—in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, the Houston Open and the World Open—and earned more than \$85,000. Only Pate and Bob Gilder surpassed that showing among rookies that year.

At Houston in 1976, he was in front late in the afternoon of the final day, but his putter betrayed him down the stretch. At Pinehurst, in the World Open, he was tied for the lead after the first round, led alone after the second and third, but closed with 73 and wound up a stroke out of the playoff between Ray Floyd and Jerry McGee.

In 1977, George came close to winning twice in North Carolina, but he ended up tied for second in the Greensboro and Kemper Opens.

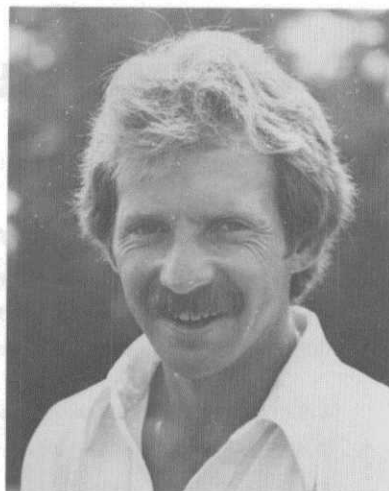
Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

However, it was a full year after his graduation before he blossomed as a force in amateur golf. While working for two years in the New York City area in sales and promotion, he had a chance to play often, and in 1973 he won the Canadian Amateur. The following year Burns won the Porter Cup, North-South Amateur and the New York State Amateur.

Burns was selected to play on the Walker Cup team in 1975 and also on the U.S. side in the World Amateur team championship. "Playing for my country on those teams always will be among the biggest enjoyments I've had in sports," he says today.

Rex Caldwell believes that failing to qualify for the 1978 Hawaiian Open may have been the best thing that has happened to him during his PGA Tour career.

"I three-putted my way out of it," he said, "and that was when I decided I had to do something. I had never been a good putter, so I went home that week and did nothing but putt. I putted for hours."

The next week, Rex went to the Bob Hope Desert Classic with a new attitude and a new putting stroke. He finished fourth, with a 69-66 finish, and earned his first check of the year, \$10,575.

He has continued to work on his putting, and now says, "It's my biggest asset now. When I started to putt better, my whole mental outlook improved."

The putt he never will forget, though, was his final one of the 1975 Tour in the San Antonio-Texas Open. "I had to make \$496 in that last tournament to meet the guidelines and keep my card. On the last hole, I had a four-footer and I knew I had to make it or adios."

He made it, earned \$590, and was able to remain on the Tour. "If I had missed that one putt," he says grinning, "I don't know what I would be doing today."

The happy-go-lucky fellow didn't start to play the game until he was 14, but it only took a few trips to the country club with his father to convince him that this was his sport.

He made his Lompoc, Calif., High School varsity golf team as a sophomore. He went to junior college for two years and then on to San Fernando Valley State College on a golf scholarship. That's when he started to work on his game seriously.

He had dreams of being on the Tour, but knew his game wasn't good enough. He worked one summer at the Arnold Palmer Golf Academy in Stratton, Vt., and played the mini-tours for two years. It wasn't until after his second year that he decided to give the Tour a try. He entered the 1974 Fall School and made it. In fact, he was leading going into the final round at the Canyon Club in Palm Springs, and finished tied for seventh.

Rex knows he had "a couple of opportunities to win" in 1978, but was not able to take advantage of them. His best chance came in the Buick-Goodwrench Open where he tied for third, but only one stroke out of the playoff. His seven top 10 finishes serve as an indication of his improved play.

Billy Casper won less money in 1978 than he had in any year since 1955—his first on the PGA Tour. His best finish was a tie for 12th in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic, just days after he was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in Pinehurst, N.C.

But despite his second straight season out of the Top 60—he had been among that group for 22 years in a row before that—Casper still believes he has the ability to grab a 52nd victory. "I think I have another five years of good golf left in me," says Billy.

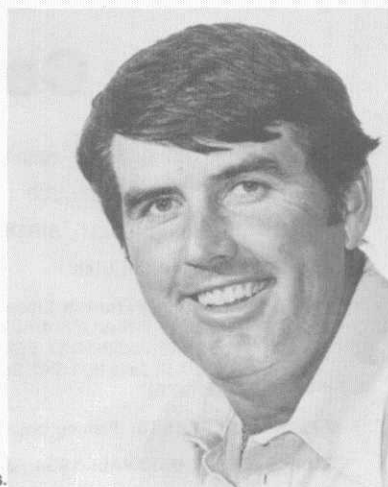
In 1975 Casper topped the \$100,000 mark for the eighth time in a ten-year stretch, and was the leading money winner on the PGA Tour in 1966 and 1968, when he won six tournaments and earned more than \$200,000. Also in 1975, after skipping three straight events while wife Shirley was presenting him with their 10th child, Billy won the New Orleans Open with a 17-under total of 271.

Often forgotten is the fact that Casper was the second man to earn \$1 million in purses, when he won the Los Angeles Open in January 1970. He topped the golden barrier less than two years after Arnold Palmer did so.

The year 1970 also was notable for his winning the Masters title in an 18-hole playoff with fellow San Diego great Gene Littler.

Five times Casper won the Vardon Trophy, which is awarded annually to the member of the PGA of America with the lowest scoring average for at least 80 official rounds on Tour. Casper also qualified to play on eight straight Ryder Cup teams, from 1961 through 1975.

Charles Coody failed to make the Top 60 in 1978 for the first time in 14 years. The tall, quiet Texan with the distinctive follow-through didn't miss by much, however.

On the Tour's Western swing, it looked like Coody was heading toward another fine year. He tied for fourth in the year's first tournament, the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open. A few weeks later, Charles tied for fourth again, this time in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open.

But Coody was to finish in the top ten just once more in 1978, that a tie for fifth in the Kemper Open.

Coody ventured out on the PGA Tour 15 years ago after a productive amateur career which included 30 victories in his native Texas alone. He qualified for the 1960 and '61 U.S. Opens while serving a three-year hitch in the Air Force. He reached the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur in 1962, earning an invitation to play in the Masters. This major championship was to provide Coody with perhaps his greatest moments in the game.

He led the 1969 Masters by a single stroke with three holes to play, but he decided to play defensively and he bogeyed in to fall to fifth place. Two years later he closed with birdie-birdie-par-par and won.

That major title earned him a spot in the 1971 World Series of Golf, then a four-man event, and he won the \$50,000 first prize, which was considered unofficial money at the time.

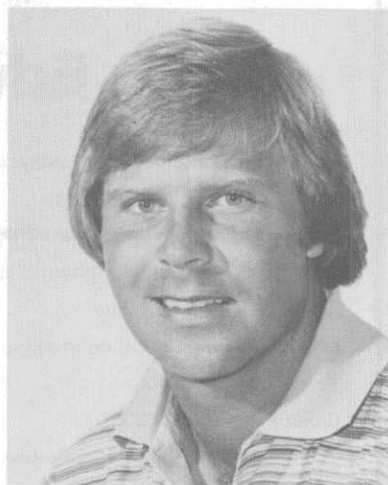
Coody has been winless since then on the PGA Tour, but in 1973 he won twice in Great Britain, the Wills Open in England and the John Player Classic in Turnberry, Scotland.

The year 1975 was to yield his second highest total in dollars to that time, more than \$86,000, although he began modestly enough by missing the cut in three of his first four tournaments. In 1976 his most notable performances included a tie for fifth in the Masters and a tie for eighth in the PGA Championship.

During the rain-interrupted PGA at Congressional CC outside Washington, Coody fired a third-round 67 for a two-stroke lead. However, he slipped to 10 strokes higher in the last round.

The year 1978 was one of disappointments and "almosts" for Ben Crenshaw, though he topped the \$100,000 mark for the third consecutive time.

In his second event, the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, Ben lost in a playoff to Tom Watson (it was the first either had been involved in). At the TPC, Crenshaw was tied for the lead after the first and second rounds, but a 77-74 weekend dropped him to a tie for fourth, three shots behind winner Jack Nicklaus.

In the Canadian Open, Ben tied for third, just two shots off Bruce Lietzke's victorious pace. In that event, he was leading after 17 holes of the second round, but took a disastrous quadruple-bogey nine on his final hole of the day.

Perhaps the toughest "non-win" to take, though, was the San Antonio-Texas Open. After brilliant opening rounds of 65 and 63, Ben led by a pair. After an even-par 70 on Saturday, he clung to a one-shot edge. But a 69 on the final day was not enough, as he succumbed to the best back-to-back rounds of golf ever played on the PGA Tour: young Ron Streck's 63-62. Crenshaw finished fourth, two strokes back.

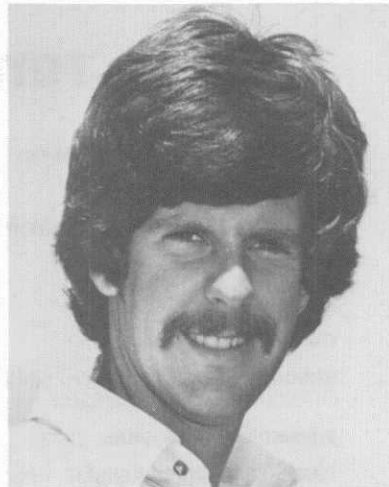
Crenshaw won the Colonial Invitation and more than \$123,000 in 1977, but even that performance paled by comparison to his previous campaign, when he won three tournaments and more than a quarter of a million dollars.

Crenshaw came to the Tour in the Fall of 1973 after compiling an amateur record seldom authored by anyone. It didn't include the U.S. Amateur title, but he did win the NCAA championship three years running, sharing it with U. of Texas teammate Tom Kite in 1972.

In his first appearance after earning his approved Tournament Player's card for the PGA Tour, he won the San Antonio-Texas Open. He followed with a second place in the 1973 World Open, then a 144-hole, \$500,000 event, and wound up the short year with more than \$76,000 earned in only nine tournaments. He also averaged 69.9 strokes for 42 competitive rounds.

He was winless the next two years while undergoing a thorough examination of his long swing, but he placed in the top 10 in three 1974 events, and in 1975 he finished only a shot back in the U.S. Open at Medinah after his two iron from the 71st tee splashed in the lake and resulted in a double-bogey five.

Danny Edwards made it into the Top 60 again in 1978—but just barely. It took a pair of high finishes late in the year to keep him on the exempt list, since his only top ten finish during the first eight months of the season was a tie for 10th in the Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic.

After starting 70-72-72 in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic at the end of August, Danny closed with his best round of the year—a six-under 65 on Pinehurst No. 2—to finish fifth. That check for \$10,250, along with the \$5,225 he earned for a tie for eighth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic, provided the bulk of what he needed to retain his Top 60 status.

Edwards had far less trouble in 1977, when he won his first tournament and nearly \$100,000. Danny was victorious at the Greater Greensboro with a 12-under 276, four strokes ahead of Larry Nelson and George Burns.

Danny Edwards did not start playing golf until he was 14, but since then he has been hooked on the game. To illustrate his early disinterest in the game, he still recalls with a smile that as a youngster in Oklahoma, he and his friends "used to set off firecrackers on the Fourth of July on this great big lawn. It wasn't until years later that I realized the lawn was a fairway on a golf course."

Although he started to play five or six years later than most of his peers on the Tour, Edwards went about the game with determination and soon began to plan a professional career in golf.

At Oklahoma State he became the Big 8 champion in 1972 and 1973 and was named to the All-America teams in the same years. He also won the Southeastern Amateur, in Columbus, Ga., in 1972.

As a member of the 1973 Walker Cup team, he remained overseas to compete in that year's British Open and finished as low amateur. He turned pro later that year but failed to pass the PGA Tour Qualifying School.

He immediately began to prepare himself for another try at the Qualifying School by playing in Europe, Japan and Australia. He showed steady improvement overseas, including a 10th place finish in the Swiss Open, ninth in the German Open and fifth in the British Open, all in 1974. After further competition in the Far East, Edwards returned to the United States and earned his playing privileges at the Qualifying School.

He played in 33 tournaments in 1975 and won money in 23. His best finished were T13 in the Byron Nelson Classic; T15 in the IVB-Philadelphia and T16 in the Kemper Open.

In 1976 Edwards played in 32 tournaments and won money in 17. He was encouraged by one finish in the top ten. That was the Ohio Kings Island Open where he tied for fourth.

Dave Eichelberger is proud to be a Texan, but he will always have a special place in his heart for Milwaukee.

He has won two events since joining the PGA Tour in 1967 and both were the Greater Milwaukee Open, in 1971 and in 1977. In the years around those victories, he admits he has had to do some struggling.

His biggest year was 1971, when he earned \$108,312 to finish ninth on the money list. "That year took me by complete surprise," he says. "I always thought I was capable, but I never dreamed I would be that successful in one year."

He believes that may have led to some of his problems since then. "I tried too hard to duplicate it and I'd lose patience quickly. I worked hard at my game, beat a lot of balls, but it didn't do much good."

He did return to the Top 60 in 1973 with a tie for second in the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas being the one that put him over the hump. For a variety of reasons, he slumped to \$12,780 in 1975, his lowest since 1969.

Gradually, his game started to come back in 1976, and early in 1977 it began to resemble his 1971 form.

"I started to hit it better in the Spring than I had for four or five years, and I can't tell you why," he said. "Several players have given me little bits of information that I've tried, but nothing in particular seemed to work. Mainly, I think my problem was one of alignment."

Prior to the triumphant return to Milwaukee, Dave tied for sixth in the Houston Open and duplicated that finish in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

Dave enjoyed his second most lucrative year in 1978, though he never finished higher than fifth. He may have experienced his biggest thrill and greatest disappointment of the year in the same event, the Atlanta Classic. He opened the event with his best round ever on the PGA Tour, a ten-under 62 on the Atlanta C.C. layout. After a second-round 69, he led by three, but a 77-74 weekend caused him to slide to a tie for 33rd.

Dave started in the game at age 13 in the junior program at his family's club in Waco, Texas. It wasn't until he went on to Oklahoma State University that he decided that he wanted to make a career in the game.

Lee Elder, who will turn 45 on July 14, enjoyed his finest season on the PGA Tour in 1978. In truth, however, Lee's season boiled down to an absolutely torrid stretch in July and August, during which he won two events and earned more than \$116,000.

Elder's streak began at the Greater Milwaukee Open, where he held or shared the lead after every round. At the end of regulation, he and Lee Trevino were knotted at 13-under 275, forcing a playoff. And what a playoff it was: the two Lees matched scores for the first seven holes on the Tuckaway C.C. course. Finally, on the eighth hole, Trevino bogied and Elder made par to end the second longest sudden-death playoff in Tour history.

The next two weeks, Elder tied for sixth in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic and tied for second in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. Then, following so-so performances in the PGA Championship and the American Optical Classic, Lee won the Westchester Classic and its \$60,000 winner's share.

After opening 71-68-68 on the Westchester C.C. layout, Elder was two strokes behind leaders Gibby Gilbert and Alan Tapie. He closed with a five-under 67, making a birdie four on the final hole to edge Mark Hayes by a shot.

At Pensacola in 1974, Elder came through with his first triumph by sinking an 18-foot birdie putt on the fourth playoff hole of the Monsanto Open. That was drama enough for anyone, but the victory also qualified him to become the first black to earn an invitation to play in the Masters.

Almost exactly two years after the Pensacola triumph, Elder won the 1976 Houston Open while he was sitting in the clubhouse. Because the first round was rained out, a double round was scheduled that Sunday and Elder, although only six shots back of the lead, was in the first threesome to tee off in the morning. He shot a five-under 67 to trail by one and, while the other leaders were teeing off No. 1 in the afternoon Elder was starting on the 10th.

He closed with a 69 for a 10-under 278 total and was persuaded to stay, although he wanted to catch a flight home to Washington, D.C., before the awards ceremonies were scheduled. An hour and a half later the remainder of the field finished and he won by one stroke over Forrest Fezler.

The year between those two victories was disappointing to Lee. Not only did he fail to survive the cut in the 1975 Masters, but he wound up the year in 81st position on the money list with only three top-10 finishes. It was only the second time in his eight years on Tour that he missed the Top 60 money list.

Elder qualified for the PGA Tour in the Fall of 1967 and in his first full year he caused a stir by tying for first in the American Golf Classic and taking Jack Nicklaus to the fifth extra hole before losing.

Keith Fergus had been listed among the top 60 money winners through most of 1978, but when it came time for the final individual event of the year, the Pensacola Open, he found himself in 62nd place, a little more than \$2,500 behind the 60th man.

"Sure, I wanted to have a good finish at Pensacola and gain exempt status," he said, "but I decided not to be concerned about it. I figured I had enjoyed a fairly good year, and if I made it, great. But, I wasn't going to worry about it."

He finished sixth at Pensacola, earning \$4,500 and jumped to 58th place on the official list with \$55,773. "My attitude at Pensacola had a lot to do with that finish," he said. "I didn't put any pressure on myself."

It was his fourth top ten finish of the year, his best being a tie for fourth in the season opener in Tucson.

During his first year of 1977, he said, "It took me three or four months to get used to the Tour, to get to know the other players, and to get used to playing in front of crowds."

"When I started 1978, I had a lot more confidence, not only in my game, but also in everything I was doing. I felt I belonged on the Tour. Now, I knew when to practice, how to practice and when it was time to go home and rest."

Keith started to play golf at age eight. He played all sports through his first couple of years in high school, but then decided it was time to concentrate on golf.

He won the Texas State Junior championship in 1971 and was runner-up in the state high school tournament the following year. He went on to the University of Houston and gained All-American status his final three years. In the summer of 1975, he lost to Fred Ridley in the final of the United States Amateur.

His first attempt at qualifying for the Tour was in the fall of 1976 at Brownsville, Texas, and Keith won medalist honors by 10 strokes.

Last year was not a good one for Ray Floyd, considering the standard he had set for himself in previous seasons. He failed to crack the \$100,000 barrier for the first time since 1973; he didn't win a tournament for the first time since 1974.

Two of Ray's best 1978 showings came in the events at which he was the defending champion. In the American Optical Classic at Pleasant Valley C.C.—the scene of his last triumph—he recorded his best finish, a tie for second. In the Byron Nelson Classic Ray placed seventh, but might have notched a second straight win in the event were it not for a second-round 75. His other scores were 68, 67 and 67, and he finished five strokes behind the winner, Tom Watson.

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, N.C., the son of an Army man who is now co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray almost chose to pursue baseball, until he won the National Jaycees Junior Golf Title in 1960. He turned pro the following year, joined the Tour in 1963, won the St. Petersburg Open as a rookie and only twice has failed to finish among the Top 60 money-winners since.

In 1972 and 1973 Raymond was in a slump, but he rebounded smartly with more than \$100,000 in earnings in 1974 and then started to win again. Perhaps his most notable victory was in the 1976 Masters. Raymond won it by eight strokes, tying Jack Nicklaus' tournament record of 17-under 271.

In 1977 he was tied with Ben Crenshaw for the lead after three rounds of the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas and he held a three-shot lead entering the final day of the Pleasant Valley Classic. On both occasions he reported in with two-under 69s in the final round to win, beating out Nicklaus and a designated field in the latter event at Sutton, Mass.

When Rod Funseth finished second in the 1978 Masters, it was further proof to many that this soft-spoken Californian always plays the tough courses well—but not well enough to win. He was a fellow, they said, who could keep it around par on any course; thus, his history of good finishes at venues where higher scores are the order.

But Rod fooled them all by winning the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford on a Wethersfield C.C. layout where even-par in 1978 meant a tie for 73rd and no check. Funseth not only paced the field by four strokes to claim the \$42,000 winner's reward, but he did so with the lowest score of the year on the PGA Tour. One shot behind Phil Hancock and Howard Twitty entering the final round, Rod tacked a 64 onto opening efforts of 65, 67 and 68 for a total of 264—20 strokes under par.

What made Funseth's third Tour win—and first since 1973—even more remarkable was the fact that it came following a month layoff. And on his first competitive nine holes in four weeks, he fired a 29 to tie a course record.

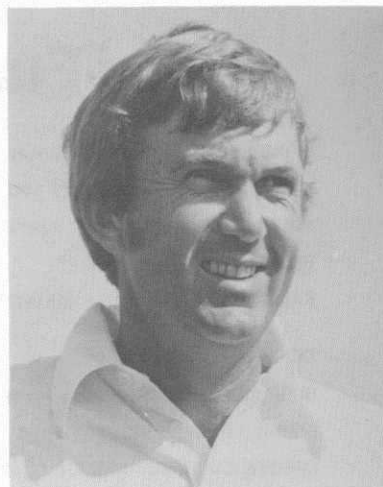
The victory was crucial to Rod. Without it or a return to the Top 60, he would have lost his exempt status in 1979 for the first time in ten years. "If I wasn't exempt for the next year," said Funseth at the time, "I wasn't sure I would play."

A year earlier Rod was literally unsure of his ability to play. After injuring the tendons in his hand late in the Summer of 1977, he was unable to grip the club for a number of weeks and he dropped off the Tour for the month of September. His best finishes that year were a tie for ninth in the Andy Williams San Diego Open and a tie for tenth in the U.S. Open.

Funseth, who will turn 46 in April, worked as an assistant pro for five years before joining the Tour in 1961, and it was another four years before he garnered his first victory—the 1965 Phoenix Open—and made it to the Top 60. From that year through 1973, a season he started by winning the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, he dropped out of the Top 60 just once.

In 1975, 1977 and 1978, Rod retained his exemption as one of the top 50 career money-winners on the Tour.

In January of 1978, Al Geiberger underwent surgery for the removal of a growth in the lower intestine area. Fortunately, the growth was benign, yet Al was unable to rejoin the PGA Tour until the Greater Greensboro Open in April.

Though Geiberger's showing at Greensboro was certainly respectable—he shot even-par 288 to finish tied for 28th—it became evident as the year wore on that Al was not in top form. He never placed in the top ten and, though he was in the money in nearly every tournament he entered, his earnings dipped substantially in this curtailed campaign.

An off-year could not overshadow, however, Geiberger's record-smashing achievement of 1977, when he shot the lowest score in the history of the PGA Tour. That incredible 59, carded in the second round of the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic (June 10), included 11 birdies, one eagle and six pars. Starting on the tenth hole, Geiberger blitzed the 7,249-yard Colonial C.C. layout in sides of 30 and 29 en route to the 13-under-par effort. His barrier-busting eight-footer on the final hole was only his 23rd putt of the afternoon.

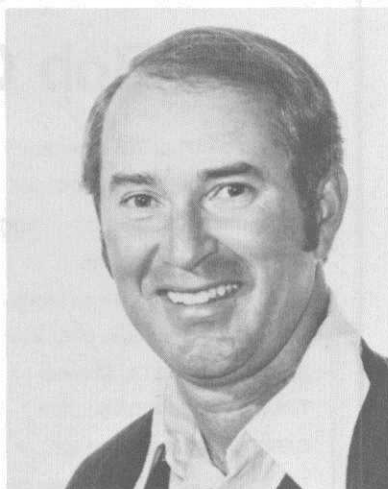
Almost lost in the excitement is the fact that Al went on to win the tournament, but not without a fight. The 59 was sandwiched between rounds of 72, and it took a closing 70 to hold off Gary Player and Jerry McGee. Geiberger was tied briefly by Player during the final round, but came back to win by three.

Another high point in Al's long and successful career also took place on a course called Colonial, this one in Fort Worth, Tex. When the Tournament Players Championship was held there in 1975, Geiberger toured the excellent layout in 10-under 270, three strokes better than runnerup Dave Stockton. His 72-hole total was the best ever recorded there, though Lee Trevino shaved two more strokes off the mark in 1978.

His victory in the 1966 PGA Championship at Firestone, where he won by a comfortable four-stroke margin, is not easily forgotten, either. But after gaining that title, Al endured a succession of personal and physical problems, the latter sending him home to California for long periods.

In June of 1977, Gibby Gilbert pulled a muscle in his rib cage while hitting a shot in the second round of the Kemper Open and missed 11 weeks of play. He entered 26 events that year, though, and earned just \$27,892. Gibby, christened C.L. and never given a first name, was 88th on the money list and faced the loss of his exemption.

But Gilbert saved his best for last, teaming with Grier Jones to win the Walt Disney World National Team Championship. When Jones dropped a four-foot birdie putt on the final hole, Gibby had his exemption for another year.

Losing his exemption was a problem Gibby didn't have to worry about in 1978. He finished in the top ten six times, including a tie for second in the First NBC New Orleans Open. In that tournament, Gilbert was tied for the lead after three rounds and fired a five-under 67 on the last day. That would normally be good enough for victory, but Lon Hinkle birdied the final hole for 66 to edge Gibby and Fuzzy Zoeller by a stroke.

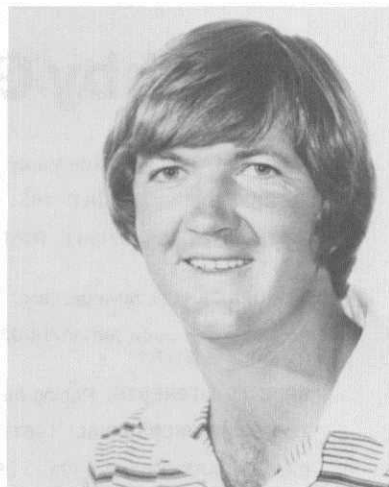
Despite the lack of a given name, Gibby began to make a name for himself in golf early in his native Chattanooga, after taking up the game at age 13. In 1962 he quit the University of Chattanooga, married and two years later became an assistant pro in Hollywood, Fla.

Gilbert finished second to Bobby Cole in the 1967 Qualifying School but struggled for 2 1/2 years before winning the Houston Champions tournament. Recalling that victory years later, he said "I didn't consider myself a good player, but I believe I have become one in the last couple of years."

In 1971 he recorded six straight birdies in the Westchester Classic and finished the year again over the \$60,000 level. But he slipped badly in 1972, and by the following Spring he was considering giving up the Tour, when his play improved suddenly.

A highlight of 1973 was a course-record 62 at Pinehurst No. 2 during the World Open. It shattered the record on the famed course by three strokes, although Tom Watson matched it a week later during the 144-hole event.

It took Bob Gilder three years to qualify for the PGA Tour, but once he made it, he let everyone know he was here to stay. He won the second tournament of his rookie year, the 1976 Phoenix Open, and went on to become only the fourth first-year player to break the \$100,000 mark.

Bob opened that year by missing the cut in the Tucson Open, but the victory the next week at the Phoenix Country Club was especially pleasing because he was graduated from nearby Arizona State University, and he beat out Lee Trevino and Roger Maltbie to get the title.

He also had a chance to win the B.C. Open that year, but bogeyed the final hole as Bob Wynn won by a stroke.

His \$101,262 and the victory might have qualified him as the rookie-of-the-year, but that honor went to Jerry Pate.

Bob starred for the Arizona State golf team and was a teammate of Tour regulars Tom Purtzer, Howard Twitty and Morris Hatafsky. After he was graduated in 1973, he tried for his Tour card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974 he went "down under" and won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Bob Charles and Jack Newton.

Finally, in the Fall of 1976, Bob earned his card.

After his excellent start, no one was more disappointed with his sophomore year than Bob, as he fell to \$36,844 and 72nd place on the money list, thus losing his exemption.

"I knew that first year wasn't a fluke," he explained, "but I didn't have a national amateur record when I came on Tour, and I wanted to prove to others that I could play. I put pressure on myself.

"I'm normally a good putter, but I putted terrible my second year. Then, I lost all confidence. I couldn't remember what I did when I putted well," he added.

He also believes a swing change may have hurt his game. "The first year, I never hit a hook. The left side was not a part of my game. So, I tried to release more down the line, turning through the shot. I had been sliding my knees through the shot and dipping my head. I wanted to get away from the head dip."

This past year, he believes he refined the action and now is able to draw the ball with confidence. "It doesn't come overnight, but, hopefully, this new swing will hold up over the long haul."

His first strong finish in 1978 came in the Hawaiian Open as he tied for ninth, thanks to a final-day 65. He had eight top 10 finishes with ties for fourth at the Doral-Eastern Open (he had another 65) and the Anheuser-Busch Classic his best.

It was another productive year for David Graham, even though he failed to win for the second straight season. Since his banner year of 1976, when he won the Westchester Classic and the American Golf Classic in the space of six weeks, David has been a runner-up twice, finishing in the top ten nine times.

Graham's best chance at victory in 1977 came in the Doral-Eastern Open, where he finished a shot behind Andy Bean. In 1978, he came closest in another Florida tournament, the Citrus Open. He was tied for the lead with Mac McLendon, the eventual winner, entering Sunday's 36-hole finale, but an opening 73 left him four strokes back with 18 holes to play.

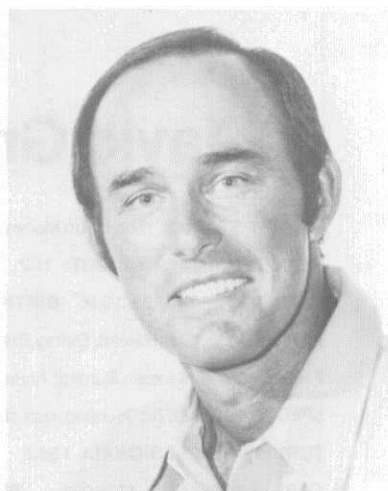
David made a run at McLendon on the final nine holes, recording three birdies and an eagle on the way to a 66, but Mac responded with a 68 to hold off the challenge by a pair.

Graham's best stretch of 1978 came early in the Spring, when he notched three top-ten finishes in four starts. After an opening 75, he came back with rounds of 69, 67 and 72 to place ninth in the Masters. After a tie for 49th in the Houston Open, he tied for tenth in his next two events, the Byron Nelson Classic and the Memorial Tournament.

Graham was only 16 when he turned pro, but his tournament career did not begin until the late 1960s in his native Australia and on the Far East circuit. A tournament-record 62 helped him tie for first in the 1969 Singapore Open but he lost the playoff. He came to America the following year and failed to earn his playing card at the 1970 Qualifying School, but the very next week he and Bruce Devlin won the World Cup for Australia.

In 1971, in addition to winning the Caracas Open and the Japan Air Lines Open, Graham succeeded in the Tour School. In his rookie year of 1972, a full decade after turning pro, he won the Cleveland Open by beating Devlin on the second playoff hole.

Lou Graham may be the best player who has not won a tournament in the last three years. When he passes the million-dollar mark in PGA Tour earnings sometime in 1979, he will have done so with—by far—the fewest number of victories of any member of this elite group.

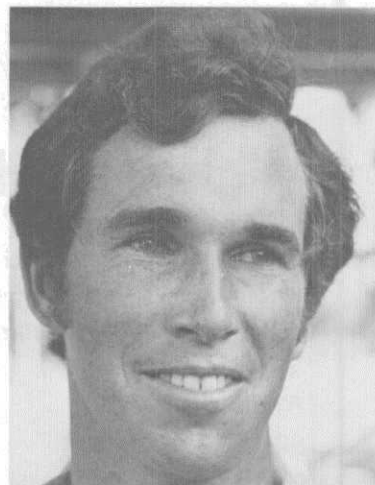
In 1978, Lou topped \$100,000 in winnings for the third straight year; the last time he was under six figures was 1975, the year he won the U.S. Open at Medinah in a playoff with John Mahaffey. During his winless three years, Graham finished in the top ten in more than a quarter of his starts!

Last year, among eight top-ten showings, Lou was second in the Tournament Players Championship and the Atlanta Classic. In the former, he tailed winner Jack Nicklaus for the entire Championship: one stroke back after 18 holes, tied after 36, one back at the end of 54. In the end, Nicklaus had to make a difficult par on Sawgrass's treacherous final hole to prevent a playoff with Lou, who always plays the tough courses well.

The year before, 1977, Graham notched nine finishes in the top ten. His best showing was, predictably, in the U.S. Open at Southern Hills, where he fell just one stroke shy of forcing a playoff with Hubert Green.

Graham turned pro after discharge from the Army in 1962 and worked at two clubs near Baltimore before striking out on the Tour in 1964. He won his first Tour event, the Minnesota Classic, three years later and only once since then, when he needed surgery to repair tendinitis in his left hand in 1969, has he failed to finish among the Top 60 money winners.

Hubert Green experienced his best year financially in 1978, and had a couple of "almosts" come through, it would have been even better.

Both of Hubert's 1978 victories came relatively early in the season. At the Hawaiian Open, he took the lead at the mid-way point with rounds of 69 and 66. He extended the margin to three with a third-round 68, but finished with a 71 and was tied by Bill Kratzert, who shot 68. Green claimed his 13th PGA Tour victory with a par on the second playoff hole.

The next win came in March, at the Sea Pines Heritage Classic. Hubert trailed by five strokes after three straight 70s, but a final 67 gave him a three-shot triumph over Hale Irwin and his second Heritage title in three years. The \$45,000 winner's check made Hubert the 16th member of the PGA Tour "Millionaire Club".

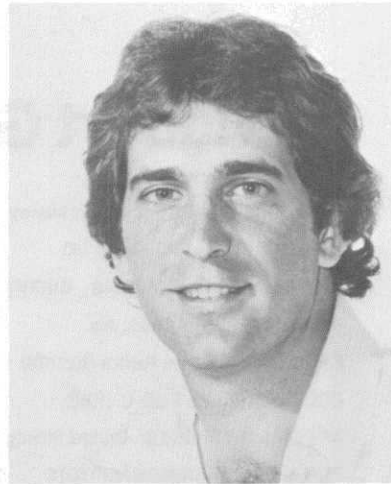
The two biggest disappointments came in the Masters and the World Series of Golf. At Augusta, Green fired a sparkling 65—seven under par—in the third round to go with previous efforts of 72 and 69. He entered the final 18 with a three-shot lead, but fell victim to Gary Player's record—equalling 64. On the final green, after a brilliant eight iron to within three feet, Hubert's putt slid by to the right. A birdie would have forced a playoff; his par left him tied for second with Tom Watson and Rod Funseth. At the World Series, Hubert shot 70-67-71-70. A birdie on the 72nd hole put him in a playoff with Gil Morgan, but he lost a chance at the \$100,000 first prize by three-putting the first extra hole. Green had led by two after the second and third rounds, extending the margin to four with birdies on the first three holes of the final round. There were no more birdies, however, until the 18th, and three-putt greens on eight and 12 accounted for half of his bogeys.

In 1977, Hubert did not match his achievement of a year earlier, when he won three consecutive tournaments: the Doral-Eastern Open, the Greater Jacksonville Open and the Heritage Classic. However, he netted the biggest prize of his career, winning the U.S. Open.

Green was never out of first place in the 77th U.S. Open Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa, and millions recall that he beat Lou Graham by a stroke after playing the final four holes knowing there had been a telephoned threat to his life.

It was a foregone conclusion that Jay Haas would become a professional golfer. His uncle, Bob Goalby, started him in the game at an early age and helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together."

Jay was seven when he played in his first tournament—and won his first trophy. It was the National Pee Wee championship in Orlando, Fla. "We played five holes each day and I scored 26-26—52 to finish third," he said.

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U. S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

He earned his PGA Tour card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1976. He said of his rookie year: "It probably was not as good as I had hoped for, but as I look back at it, I realize it wasn't too bad at all."

He won \$32,326 to finish 77th on the money list, with a tie for fifth in the U. S. Open his best.

"I learned a lot. You have to be mentally strong, really strong. You have to know how to condition yourself, mentally and physically," he explained.

He was playing well early in 1978, but not spectacularly as the PGA Tour headed for the Andy Williams San Diego Open at Torrey Pines. He opened with an even-par 72 and was six strokes off the lead. The second day, he took charge with a brilliant eight-under 64, highlighted by a six-under 30 on the back nine of the North course. With an eight-under 136, he led by three.

The third day, Haas finished birdie-eagle to gain a one-stroke margin over Gene Littler at eight-under 208; he finally won by three strokes with a closing 70 for a 10-under 278.

Phil Hancock enjoyed his days of glory while playing varsity football and basketball at Greenville High in Alabama, but there never was any doubt in his mind which sport was number one. It was golf, all the way.

"I enjoyed the other sports," Phil says, "but I knew golf would be my sport in college and that one day I would turn professional."

He started to play golf as a nine-year-old through the encouragement of his father and an older brother and has been successful all along the way. He won both the Alabama State Junior and Amateur crowns; went on to the University of Florida and twice won the Southeastern Conference title. While at Florida, he was a teammate of Andy Bean and Gary Koch.

His biggest disappointment in the game came in the Fall of 1976 when he enrolled in the PGA Tour's Qualifying School and failed to get his card. "One thing you have to learn in this game and on the Tour," he says, "is to be patient."

He was that, and when it came time for the School in June of 1977, he was ready. He won medalist honors. His first start as a regular Tour member was a good one, too. He tied for ninth in the Western Open, earning \$5,000.

He finished the year with \$24,450, with a nice chunk of that coming from a tie for second in the Southern Open.

This past year, he says the first half was something of a disappointment, but he did play well the second half. "It was the first time I had seen most of those courses early in the year," he said, "and I just wasn't ready for some of them."

Phil gained considerable attention at the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open when he started with 64-64—128 and led by two strokes. A 71-75 finish dropped him well back, but he said he learned another lesson in patience. "I didn't come close to making a bogey the first two days," he said, but felt he put too much pressure on himself trying to continue at that pace.

He saved his best finish of the year for the Southern Open, again, finishing second by himself to earn \$19,950. "That one was extremely important because it assured me of a place in the top 60," he said.

Although he considers himself a good tee-to-green player and a better than average putter, he believes his short game is the one that needs the most work. When he is playing well, he prefers to move the ball from right-to-left.

In 1978 Mark Hayes failed to win a tournament for the first time since 1975, but by any other consideration, it was a fine year for the quiet Oklahoman. Mark had trouble finding his game the first part of the season, with a tie for ninth in the Hawaiian Open his only top ten finish before June.

From the Kemper Open, where he tied for second, until the end of the year, Hayes played his best golf since joining the PGA Tour in 1973. During one span in the late Summer, Mark finished high in four straight events beginning with the American Optical Classic.

In that tournament, Hayes led after the second and third rounds, but a final-round 74 dropped him to a tie for fourth. The next week, in the Westchester Classic, Hayes' closing effort was slightly different—he fired a five-under 66 that gave him the temporary lead at 275. As Mark waited, Lee Elder caught and ultimately passed him with a birdie on the 72nd hole.

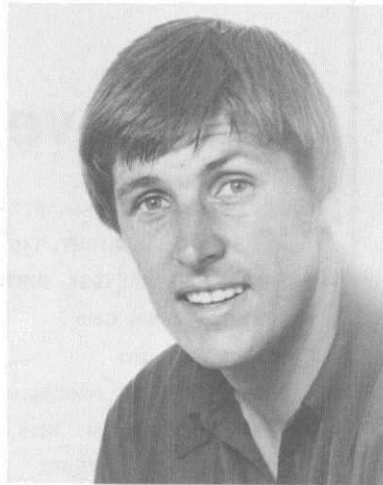
In his next start, the B.C. Open, Hayes claimed sole possession of second place once again. In that event, however, even a 65-68 performance in the last two rounds was not enough, as winner Tom Kite finished five strokes ahead of him. Mark capped off his admirable stretch the next week, when he tied for eighth in the Southern Open.

Mark's most recent victory was also his most significant. In a gutsy finish, Hayes won the 1977 Tournament Players Championship and the 10-year exemption and \$60,000 first prize that go with the title. His highest round of the tournament was a two-over 74 on the second day, but in the gale winds of that Friday at Sawgrass a 74 was remarkable. Mark was a stroke behind co-leaders Tom Watson and Mike McCullough starting the last round, and shot 72 to win by a pair.

Hayes arrived on the PGA Tour in the Fall of 1973 and he arrived as a genuine star in his third full year on the circuit, 1976, when he led the Byron Nelson Classic from the opening bell, playing the first 43 holes without a bogey. He also won the Pensacola Open that year.

Mark started playing golf at age 6 under the eye of his father, a high school physical education teacher and golf coach. Not many years passed before he picked out his career. "One of the reasons I was so dedicated," Hayes said not long ago, "was that I was small for my age and couldn't do anything else. I practiced every day. I never thought of doing anything else for a living but play golf."

Jerry Heard came back in 1978. Not coincidentally, Jerry Heard's back also came back in 1978. When Jerry won the Atlanta Classic in May with a tournament-record 269—19 under par on the Atlanta C.C. course—it signaled the return of the man who enjoyed so much success in the early 1970s but had fallen on difficult times in the recent past.

Two weeks before the Atlanta triumph, there were definite signs that Heard was ready to return to the winner's circle after a four-year hiatus. Jerry tied for second in the Colonial Invitation with eight-under 272, a score that would have won outright or tied for the lead in every of 30 previous editions of the event (including 1972, when Heard himself won it with a score of 275). Unfortunately for Jerry, it was not enough in 1978; Lee Trevino won the tournament with a record-setting 268.

Jerry's previous two years were, in a word, miserable. Nagging back injuries forced him off the PGA Tour for more than three months in 1976, and he entered only 19 events. Things were even worse in 1977: he was sidelined from February until August and started just 12 times.

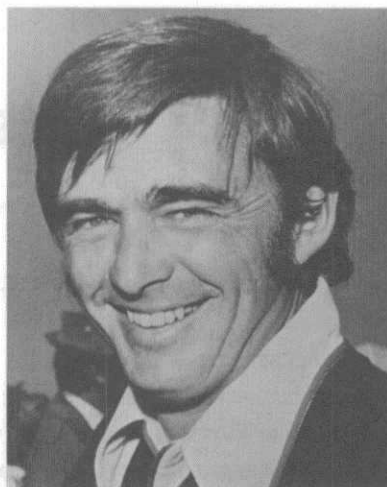
It is possible that Heard's back problems began with his brush with lightning in the 1975 Western Open, but no one will ever be sure. In the second round of that Western at Butler National, Jerry was admitted to the hospital along with Lee Trevino and Bobby Nichols after lightning struck nearby. However, because of a rainout, Jerry returned to the tournament and followed his opening 69 with 74-72-73 and a total of 288 to tie for fourth place, incredibly enough. Certainly there were no warnings of back problems that weekend.

Heard began playing golf at age 11, and he was scoring around par a year later, the result of constant practice on a municipal course operated by his father in California. He dropped out of Fresno State College in 1968 in order to try the Tour Qualifying School. He passed, and he earned barely \$10,000 in his rookie year of 1969.

Heard started out 1970 by earning \$133 in his first five events, but his game improved suddenly and he recorded five top 10 finishes and crashed the Top 60 money list.

He won four tournaments in the next four years and topped \$100,000 each year he won, including the two-victory year of 1972.

Dave Hill further reduced his schedule in 1978, and his earnings dipped to their lowest level since his rookie year of 1959. And Dave, a student of the game, is perplexed by his problems of the past two seasons.

"I can't figure out why I hit it so crooked sometimes," he said last Summer, "because it feels so good. Back in 1974, I was swinging the club some kind of good and then it disappeared. I've been trying to find it ever since."

Hill's last good year was 1976, when he won the Greater Milwaukee Open and earned over \$100,000 for the fourth time in his long career. Six weeks after the victory in Milwaukee, he tied for 22nd in the PGA Championship—worth \$2,064—and became the 11th player to earn more than \$1 million in PGA Tour purses.

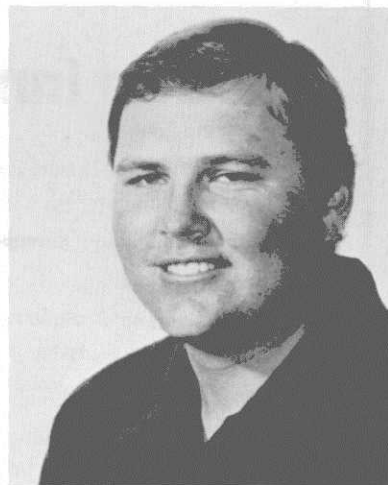
In 1977, however, Dave cut his schedule by one third, and his earnings dropped more than \$100,000. He teamed with brother Mike to tie for third in the Disney World National Team Championship in the Fall. His best individual performance that year was a tie for 10th in the Phoenix Open, the first event of the season.

One year after Dave joined the PGA Tour in 1959, he climbed into the Top 60 money list and was to remain there for 17 straight years. Ten years after coming on the Tour he won three tournaments, finished second to Frank Beard in the money rankings and won the Vardon Trophy for 1969 with a stroke average of 70.344 for 90 rounds.

He won \$100,000 again in 1970, then began to reduce his playing schedule. He limited his appearances still further in 1972 but he played more efficiently, winning the Monsanto Open and placing in the top 10 in seven other events.

In 1973, Hill won at Memphis for the fourth time and recorded nine top 10 finishes, missed the cut only once and qualified for his second Ryder Cup team. Dave underwent surgery in late 1973 for removal of cartilage in a knee which had troubled him for some time, and that decision probably contributed to his second most profitable year in 1974, when he won at Houston.

Lon Hinkle's improvement over the last few seasons has come in quantum leaps and bounds. During his first five years on the PGA Tour, Lon lolled in the lower depths of the money list. In 1977, when he won more than \$51,000 and squeaked into the Top 60, things started to roll.

Last year, Hinkle truly got his game together, earning more than \$135,000 and gaining his first PGA Tour victory.

"My goals had been too low," Lon said earlier in the year. "Before, my goal was to survive. When things would go bad here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game... My goal this year was to win enough by Greensboro to be assured of a place in the Top 60."

Lon accomplished that goal handily. A solo third in the Tournament Players Championship—his fourth top ten finish of the young season—gave him \$55,051 for 1978. Not satisfied, Hinkle set, and met, another aim: to finish among the top 20 money winners for the year.

Lon went a long way toward that end by winning the First NBC New Orleans Open. Remarkably, he did so after opening with a two-over-par 74 on the Lakewood C.C. course that put him in danger of missing the cut. Hinkle rebounded in the second round with a 67, good enough to make the cut by two strokes but still eight shots off the lead.

He made up all eight the next day with a sparkling 64, and entered the final round tied at the top with Gary Player (who had won three in a row), Fuzzy Zoeller, Gibby Gilbert and Homero Blancas. Quickly, it became a three-man race, and when Gilbert and Zoeller both shot 67, Hinkle, playing in the last group, needed a par on the last hole to tie and birdie to win outright.

After a good drive, Lon knocked a 140-yard wedge to within eight feet and rolled in the putt for his first Tour win and the \$40,000 first prize.

Hinkle came close to winning again in the San Antonio-Texas Open. After a 68-67-67 start, he closed with a six-under 64 that put him in a tie for second with Hubert Green at 266, just one stroke behind winner Ron Streck, who shot a 62.

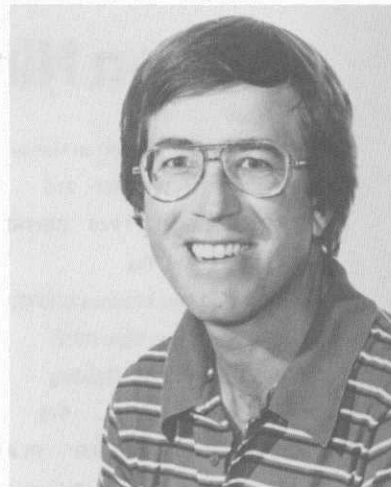
In 1977, Lon's best chance for victory came in the Tallahassee Open. Leading by two strokes with three holes to play, Hinkle figured he could win by paring in. Ed Sneed thwarted those plans, however, rolling in long birdie putts at 16 and 18 to force a playoff. Ed then holed another long one on the first extra hole to win.

Lon started in the game at age 13, shortly after his family moved from Granville, Ohio to the San Diego area. "I was a good baseball player," he says, "but I started to have trouble with my eyes, so I switched to golf. I'd play all day, whenever I could. I loved it."

The oldest of seven children, his entire family played in those days, and, in junior tournaments around Southern California, it wasn't unusual to find half a dozen Hinkles in the field.

Joe Inman summed up the situation nicely. "I've been a consistent money-winner," he said last summer, "and I've won a tournament, but now I have to learn to be a consistent winner."

In 1978, for the fourth straight year, Inman was firmly entrenched in the Top 60. He counted among his best finishes a tie for third in the Byron Nelson Classic and a tie for sixth in the Phoenix Open.

In the Sammy Davis, Jr. Greater Hartford Open, Inman finished tied for seventh, but the highlight of that week was a second-round, nine-under 62, Joe's best score in six years on the PGA Tour.

Inman played the significant championships well in 1978. In the Masters, where he tied for ninth, a pair of 69s were bookends for rounds of 73 and 72. Joe tied for 12th in the U.S. Open, and could have challenged for the PGA Championship, but a final-round 77 left him tied for 11th.

In 1977, Inman's highest finish was a tie for second in the Florida Citrus Open, where he scored under par all four rounds to finish two shots back of winner Gary Koch.

Overall, Joe's performance the last two years has been steadier than 1976, the year in which he won the Kemper Open. That victory was worth \$50,000, but for the rest of the year he won less than \$20,000.

While attending Wake Forest, Inman won the 1968 Carolinas Open and the 1969 North-South Amateur, earning a spot on the '69 Walker Cup team. He also won the 1970 North Carolina Amateur. After graduating from Wake in 1970, he spent two more years as an amateur and graduated from the PGA Tour Qualifying School in the Fall of 1973.

At the end of his rookie year in 1974, Inman tied for 13th in the San Antonio-Texas Open to finish 55th on the Exemption Point list. Twice in 1975 he closed with 67s to wind up in third place at Houston and Las Vegas. In late Spring of 1976, he finally won a PGA Tour event.

"I can't believe this," Joe said after his victorious Kemper. "I was off to a bad start, mainly due to my putting, but I could feel it getting better. I didn't seem to be motivated at the start of the year. I couldn't get my mind on it."

Hale Irwin probably best described his year: "Frustrating, but a pleasantly frustrating season. This year, on numerous occasions, I've done enough things right to win, but someone else has been doing them just a little better. I'm playing well enough, doing enough things right, to win at any time."

But the wins never came for Hale in 1978, the first time that had happened since 1972. All Irwin did last year was cash more than \$191,000 in checks, make every cut and finish in the top ten an amazing 13 of 22 times. His earnings were the most ever won in a season on the PGA Tour without a victory, and his string of 86 consecutive cuts made (he last missed at the 1975 Tucson Open) is the third longest in Tour history.

In 1978, Hale was a runnerup twice; he finished third or tied for third four times. Aside from a four-tournament "slump", in which his worst finish was a tie for 40th, Irwin never went longer than two starts without a top ten showing. A typical four-event stretch looked like this: tied for fifth in the Kemper Open, tied for fourth in the U.S. Open and Western Open, and tied for third in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic.

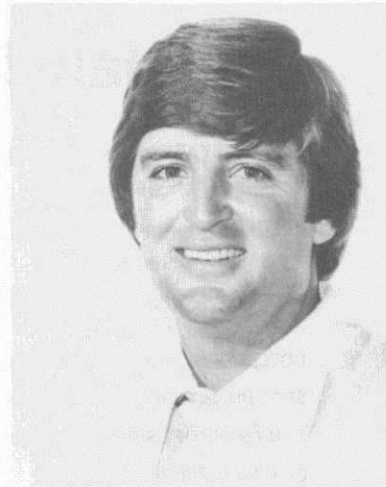
Perhaps 1977 was Hale's most satisfying of 10 years on the Tour. He won three tournaments—a personal high—and his most notable performance came in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic. In that event, Irwin devastated Pinehurst's revered No. 2 course in a record smashing 264—20 under par—to win by five strokes. He also passed the \$200,000 mark for the third consecutive time, a feat equaled in the same years by just one other player, Jack Nicklaus.

Irwin left the University of Colorado in 1968 with a degree in marketing, an NCAA golf title and the honor of having been selected twice as an All-Big Eight Conference defensive back. He joined the PGA Tour that fall and climbed steadily on the money list each year through 1976.

Although he twice won the Heritage Classic on the demanding Harbour Town Links on Hilton Head Island, S.C., Hale was among the less familiar U.S. Open champions when he captured that major championship in 1974 at Winged Foot.

In 1975 he won his first Atlanta Classic and also the Western Open at Butler National. In 1976 he won two weeks apart, at Los Angeles and Orlando. His second place in the 1976 World Series lifted him over \$1 million in career earnings.

One of the truisms of golf holds that it is impossible to play well in a PGA Tour event when it is competed in the player's hometown. Barry Jaeckel proved to be an exception to that rule in the 1978 Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open.

Playing before family, friends and fellow club members at Riviera Country Club, Barry scored 285 and tied for fourth place. It was his highest finish in a PGA Tour event—he pocketed a check for \$7,800—since he earned his playing privileges in the 1975 Spring Qualifying School. The week's experience boosted his confidence.

He played well the following week in the Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic and again in the Sea Pines Heritage and Greater Greensboro Open. He said: "I felt I was playing in the Top 60 range, and things were looking up."

Jaeckel turned his year around on the final day of the 1978 Tallahassee Open. Heavy rains on Thursday had forced postponement of the opening round until Friday and the cut-down field was scheduled to go 36 holes on Sunday. After 36 holes Jaeckel was trailing leader Jim Nelford by four strokes. After 54 holes he was behind leader Bruce Lietzke's 203 by five strokes. With only nine holes to play, Jaeckel was three behind Lietzke.

Over the last nine holes, Jaeckel scored a 30 for a 65 and that stretch included three chip-ins, two for birds and one for an eagle. Barry birdied the 18th while Bruce bogeyed and the two were tied at 273. On the first hole of sudden death, Jaeckel scored a par to win.

Suddenly Jaeckel picked up his largest check, \$16,000; invitations to the 1979 Masters and Tournament of Champions, plus status as an exempt player.

It had been a long haul for the handsome Californian who first played golf as a boy. He recalled: "I visited a friend's house when I was a kid, I can't remember how old I was, and he had this golf club. It really felt good to swing that thing and I thought I'd like to play the game."

By the time he reached high school, Jaeckel made the varsity golf team. Meanwhile, his parents had joined Riviera Country Club and Barry has been a member ever since.

In 1968 he won the Southern California Amateur title and, in 1971, he was runnerup in the Pacific Coast Amateur and a semi-finalist in the Trans-Miss Amateur. He was attending Santa Monica College and decided to turn pro. He competed on the mini-tours and overseas. In 1972 he won the French Open championship. After barely missing out in four Qualifying School competitions, Jaeckel made it in the Spring of 1975.

He is the son of Richard Jaeckel, a character actor who has had roles in dozens of movies and many television series.

Don January narrowly missed the Top 60 in 1978, something he's accomplished 19 times since joining the PGA Tour in 1956. Don's best tournaments were the Byron Nelson Classic and the Southern Open; he tied for third in both.

In the Byron Nelson, January finished 67-67 to wind up four shots behind winner Tom Watson. He also ended up four strokes off the pace at the Southern, which was taken by Jerry Pate.

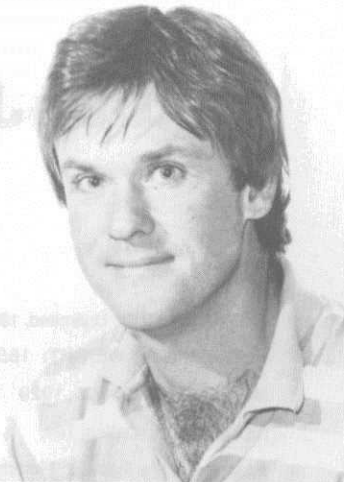
Few golfers have ever played so consistently well over so long a period than Don. January, who will turn 50 in November, once said that his annual schedule ended as soon as he earned around \$60,000. A look at his record would seem to bear this out.

But in his banner year of 1976, Don failed to abide by his rule. His winnings of \$163,622 were nearly \$100,000 more than in his next most lucrative campaign. In addition to winning the Tournament of Champions that year, January tied for second in two events and tied for third in three others. One of his runnerup finishes came in the PGA Championship at Congressional; a closing 72—after rounds of 70-69-71—put him in a tie with Ray Floyd at 282, just one shot behind Dave Stockton.

January's earnings returned to "normal" in 1977, when his best showing was a tie for second in the Hawaiian Open. After three rounds, he was tied for the lead with Bruce Lietzke, but finished with a 72 to Bruce's 69.

In 1972, Don left the Tour to devote his time to golf course construction in the Dallas area. When financing became difficult during the recession, he rejoined the Tour in 1975, soon after his 45th birthday. His remarkable comeback season was highlighted in his home state, when he defeated Larry Hinson in a playoff to win the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Grier Jones put another fine year under his belt, but what will probably be most remembered about his 1978 campaign is something Grier would just as soon forget.

In the final round of the Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic, Jones was working on a five-under 67 and was apparently emerging from a crowded pack for his fourth PGA Tour triumph. But then, in one of the great stretch drives of all time, Jack Nicklaus birdied the last five holes—chipping in twice along the way—for a 65 to overhaul Grier by a stroke.

That finish was Jones' best of the year and one of six top ten showings overall. His most consistent stretch thereafter came later in the season, when he placed among the top 25 in six straight starts. Beginning with a tie for 21st in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, Grier finished, in order: tied for seventh in the Greater Milwaukee Open; tied for ninth in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open; tied for 16th in the PGA Championship; tied for 10th in the Westchester Classic; and tied for 25th in the B.C. Open.

The year 1978 was Jones' third straight in the Top 60. His turnaround from a dismal 1975 began at the end of that year with a visit to noted teacher Bob Toski.

"He taught me a lot about the game," Grier recalled. "I had developed some bad habits, and Bob worked to get me back to my old swing, the one that had worked for me before."

In 1976, Jones improved by more than \$50,000 in official earnings and climbed back to 40th on the money list, thanks largely to five top ten finishes.

The next year his improvement continued, as Grier finished in the top ten in seven tournaments and jumped to 35th in winnings. The climax came in the Walt Disney World National Team Championship, where he joined with Gibby Gilbert for his third PGA Tour victory.

Jones arrived on the Tour in 1968 with impressive credentials. While at Oklahoma State, he won the 1966 NCAA championship, the Big Eight Conference title, the Oklahoma Intercollegiate and the Oklahoma Invitational. He led the Fall 1968 Qualifying School and in 1969 was named Rookie of the Year with more than \$37,000 in earnings.

Two of Grier's Tour wins came in 1972 after playoffs: he defeated Bob Murphy in the Hawaiian Open and Dave Marad in the Robinson Classic. After topping \$140,000 that year, he began suffering physical problems with his back and right hand. In one stretch in the Summer of 1974 he was forced to withdraw from six of seven tournaments. In 1975, he missed 10 weeks after catching pneumonia the week following the PGA Championship.

A little more than two years separated Tom Kite's PGA Tour victories, but to Tom it must have seemed like an eternity. From his first win, the 1976 IVB-Philadelphia Golf Classic, until his triumph in the 1978 B.C. Open, Kite had come close to winning on numerous occasions.

In 1977, Tom was runnerup to Ben Crenshaw in the Ohio Kings Island Open, finished third in the Canadian Open and the San Antonio-Texas Open, and tied for third in the Masters.

It looked for a while as though 1978 would be another lucrative—but winless—year for Kite. He finished third in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic and the Western Open, tied for third in the Florida Citrus Open and tied for second in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

In the latter event, a freakish mistake may have cost him a chance to win. On the fifth hole of the last round, Tom had a tap-in of less than a foot for par. As he set his putter down the ball moved about a quarter of an inch, and Kite called the one-stroke penalty on himself. He finished the tournament one shot behind winner Tom Watson.

Kite obviously did not let his bad fortune bother him for long. The very next week he convincingly won the B.C. Open, blistering the En-Joie Golf Course in 66-65-68-68. Tom held or shared the lead after every round, and his 17-under 267 total was five strokes ahead of runnerup Mark Hayes.

In his Philadelphia victory, Tom was three shots off the pace entering the final round, but shot a five-under 66 to tie Terry Diehl at the end of 72 holes. He won the playoff on the fifth extra hole with a par.

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to take a swipe. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

Before his 21st birthday in 1970, Tom was medalist in the Western Amateur, runnerup to Lanny Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, second in the Southern Amateur and was named to the four-man U.S. team in the World Amateur Team Championship.

The following year he was chosen on the U.S. Walker Cup team and, in 1972, he shared the NCAA title with his U. of Texas schoolmate, Ben Crenshaw, before turning pro and joining the Tour. In 1973, Tom won the Hope of Tomorrow Second Tour event and was named rookie of the year after missing the cut in only three of 35 events.

The year 1978 was Gary Koch's best financially. Ironically, it was also the first year in which he failed to win a tournament.

A graduate of the Fall 1975 Qualifying School, Gary was a winner in his rookie year on the PGA Tour. In April of 1976, he was five strokes behind the leader after two rounds of the Tallahassee Open, but finished 67-70 to nip John Mahaffey by a shot.

In 1977, again in his home state of Florida early in the schedule, Koch took the lead in the Florida Citrus Open with a third-round 65 and held on to win with another closing 70.

But those victories were pretty much the whole story for Gary in those years; he only had one other top ten finish in each campaign. After his Florida Citrus triumph, he earned less than \$17,000 the rest of the way, although a callous on his left thumb "caused me some painful problems the end of that year."

Things were different in 1978. Though he didn't win, Gary's performance was more consistent. He placed in the top ten six times, including a torrid stretch in the Spring. In a span of five weeks, Koch tied for eighth at Tallahassee, tied for ninth in both the Houston and New Orleans Opens, tied for 22nd in the Byron Nelson Classic and finished seventh in the Colonial National Invitation.

Another indicator of Gary's increased consistency: in 1978, he missed just eight cuts in 31 starts; in the same number of events the year before, he missed 15.

During his amateur career, Koch gained a reputation as an excellent putter, and a remarkable amateur career it was. He won the 1969 Florida Open before his 17th birthday and he also won the U.S. Junior title in 1970.

While at the University of Florida he won the 1973 Trans-Mississippi and played on the first of two Walker Cup teams that same year. He also played for his country in the 1974 World Amateur Team Championship.

Gary said once that his formula for playing the Tour was to "drive it in the fairway, hit it on the green and make a few putts." Nothing remarkable there, except that he has obviously been able to follow his simple battle plan very successfully.

Bill Kratzert, after only two full years on the PGA Tour, finds himself in pretty fast company. Like Hale Irwin, Bill was among the Tour's ten leading money winners in 1978 without a victory. It was Kratzert's second straight year in the top ten, and though he failed to win, his earnings increased nearly \$50,000 over 1977.

It didn't take Bill long to establish himself as one of the best young players in the game. After coming out of the Spring 1976 Qualifying School, Bill teamed with Woody Blackburn at the end of that year to win the National Team Play at Disney World. He took advantage of his 1977 exemption, finishing in the top ten in 11 of 32 starts. The year was highlighted by his victory in the Sammy Davis, Jr. Greater Hartford Open, where he blitzed Wethersfield C.C. in 66-66-64-69—265 for a three-shot triumph over Larry Nelson and Grier Jones.

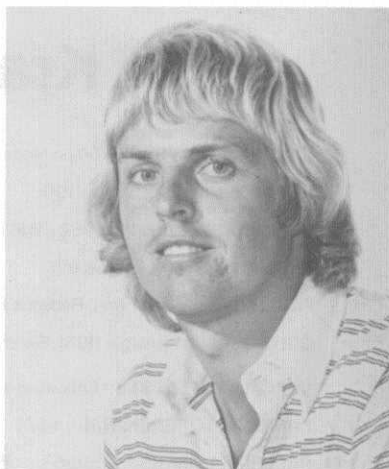
Kratzert notched even more top ten showings in 1978, including runnerup finishes in the Hawaiian Open and Memorial Tournament and a tie for second in the Greater Hartford. In the Hawaiian, Bill lost a playoff to Hubert Green; in the Memorial, Jim Simons' long putt for par on the 72nd hole edged him by a stroke.

Kratzert was practically born into the game, the son of the head pro at Fort Wayne, Ind., CC for the last 19 years. "I didn't start to play until I was about 13," Bill says. "My dad never pushed me into it. It was just always there. It wasn't until I was 14 or 15 years old that I decided that golf was my game."

He won the Indiana State Amateur at age 16 and the Indiana Open a year later. Allen Miller, who befriended Bill when he became ill during the Sunnehanna Amateur, influenced him to going to the University of Georgia, where he was chosen All-Southeastern Conference all four years and All-American his last two.

After he failed in his first try in the Tour Qualifying School, Kratzert quit the game in frustration, went home to Fort Wayne and worked six months as a fork-lift operator. But in the Spring of 1975 he accepted an assistant pro's job at a club and returned to the game to stay.

Bob Mann described Wayne Levi's play in the Walt Disney World National Team Play Championship as "awesome." He was there as Wayne's partner, so he had a front-row seat as they combined to win the title by three strokes over Lanny and Bobby Wadkins.

Wayne's play was rather spectacular on the Magnolia Course at Disney World the last two days as he canned 15 of the team's 19 birdies. That let them come from three strokes off the pace after 36 holes.

Those who followed the Pensacola Open the week before knew of Wayne's talents. In the third round, he equaled the Perdido Bay course record with an eight-under-par 64, making four birdies and two eagles. He finished third, just one stroke out of a playoff.

He lists "confidence and a lot of practice" as the keys to his successes at the end of the year. "I love to practice," he said, "and the more I practiced, the more confident I became. Everything seemed to jell."

Wayne started to play the game at age 13, mainly because his close friends were playing golf and he wanted to be with them. He admits it wasn't long until he was hooked completely.

During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and in two years at nearby Oswego State College, he only lost once.

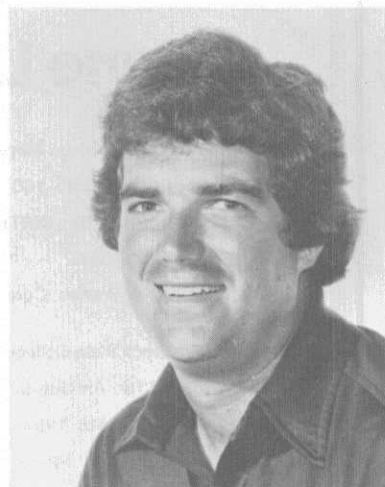
In the Summer of 1972, he headed for Florida so he could devote 12 months of the year to his game. After two years on the mini-tours, he tried for his PGA Tour card, but, in his first two attempts, he did not make it. Finally, in June of 1977, at Pinehurst, he qualified.

"I had a couple of good tournaments right away when I came out," he said, such as a tie for 22nd in Milwaukee and then a tie for 12th the next week in the Quad Cities Open. He had a first-round 65 at Quad Cities for his low round of the year.

"I couldn't keep it going, though," he added, "and did not finish well at all toward the end of the year. It carried over into the start of 1978 and it affected my attitude. I was getting down on myself."

It wasn't until mid-year that his confidence started to come back, and he gave considerable credit to the pretty young girl who became his wife in the Fall. "Judy kept after me," he said, smiling, "and that's what made the difference."

Bruce Lietzke's performance fell off somewhat in 1978, but it would have been a tough task under any circumstances to equal the year he had in 1977. Bruce came out on the PGA Tour in '77 at Phoenix after having played his last five official rounds of 1976 at par or better. Five tournaments later, he still hadn't strayed over par. His impressive streak of 26 rounds no worse than par lasted through the five-day Bob Hope Desert Classic.

During those five events, Lietzke won at Tucson in a playoff with Gene Littler, won again at Hawaii and placed second in the Hope.

Bruce's 1978 West Coast swing was not nearly as pleasant. A pulled muscle in his stomach, suffered at the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, hampered his play for nearly a month. He had no high finishes until the Tour moved to Florida. In back-to-back tournaments, the Florida Citrus Open and the Doral-Eastern Open, Lietzke tied for sixth and tied for eighth, respectively.

A few weeks later, Bruce finished second in the Tallahassee Open. The leader after three rounds, Lietzke came to the 72nd hole on the Killeam C.C. course with a two-shot edge over playing partner Barry Jaeckel. Bruce bogeyed, Barry birdied, and Lietzke went on to lose the playoff on the first extra hole. (Lietzke wouldn't have been in Tallahassee had it not been for another playoff defeat exactly a year before, when he lost on the third extra hole to Jack Nicklaus in the 1977 Tournament of Champions.)

Bruce experienced another slump of sorts after Tallahassee, but finally, at the Canadian Open in June, he returned to the winner's circle. He probably entertained few thoughts of victory after a first-round 76 on the demanding Glan Abbey G.C., but consecutive 67s brought him from nine shots back to a two-stroke lead.

No serious challenges were mounted against him on the final day, and his closing 73 was good enough for a one-shot victory over Pat McGowan.

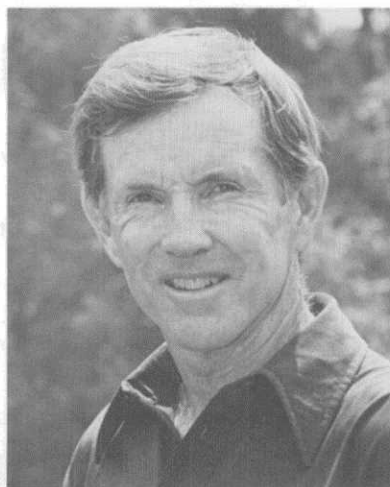
"Winning this golf tournament means more to me than winning any of the others," Bruce said at the time. "It tells me last year wasn't just a streak. It tells me I can win when I'm not playing at my absolute peak."

Lietzke started playing the game at age 5 when brother Duane, then an assistant pro in Wichita, Kan., gave him a cut-down set of clubs. While at Forest Park High School in Beaumont, Tex., he won the Texas State scholastic title as a sophomore and helped the team to one championship and three seconds in his four years. At the University of Houston he captured the 1971 Texas State Amateur.

Late in the Spring of 1973, Bruce closed the closet door on his golf clubs and declared he was finished with the game. "I had played so much through high school and in college I was tired of it. I suppose in the back of my mind I knew I would come back, but at that point I was tired mentally of the competition and needed the time to think about some other things."

His retirement lasted six months and he turned pro in 1974. He missed by a stroke in his first try in the Tour School but made it in the Spring of 1975.

Gene Littler's earnings dropped by more than 50 per cent in 1978, yet the soft-spoken veteran was among the Top 60 money-winners for the 24th time in 25 years on the PGA Tour.

In the early part of the year, however, it looked as though Gene would keep stride with his 1977 pace. In three straight Winter Tour events—the Andy Williams San Diego Open, the Hawaiian Open and the Bob Hope Desert Classic—he finished tied for second, sixth and tied for 11th, respectively. But Littler's highest finish thereafter was a tie for 14th in the Greater Greensboro Open.

In his hometown of San Diego, Gene's second straight 68 in the third round left him just a shot behind the leader, Jay Haas. But he finished with an even-par 72 to Haas' 70 and wound up three strokes back, tied with John Schroeder and Andy Bean.

It certainly would have been difficult for Littler, who will turn 49 in July, to match his 1977 campaign, when he handily won the Houston Open and lost playoffs to Bruce Lietzke in the Tucson Open and Lanny Wadkins in the PGA Championship. In the former, he caught Lietzke with a finishing 67, only to watch Bruce roll in an 80-footer on the fourth extra hole. In the PGA, Gene's final 76 forced the playoff, which Wadkins won with a par on the third extra hole.

Littler's battle with cancer is a story that bears repeating. He underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands in the Spring of 1972, and the then winner of 24 Tour events in 18 years appeared at the end of his career. However, he rejoined the Tour that October and in July of 1973, about 16 months after his surgery, he won the St. Louis Children's Hospital Classic.

He did not win again in 1974 but he did top \$100,000 in official purses for the second time in his long career, and 1975 was truly remarkable. He won three times in 1975, including the Westchester Classic in a playoff with Julius Boros, two weeks after his 45th birthday.

Littler was uncharacteristically erratic in 1976, dipping to barely \$60,000 in earnings and missing the cut in six of 25 tournaments. His best finish was a tie for fourth at New Orleans. He was experiencing back ailments but, typical of the man, he made no excuses.

John Mahaffey must be convinced of the verity of the old adage, "when it rains, it pours". After nearly five years' absence from the winner's circle and a dismal campaign in 1977, Mahaffey returned to the spotlight in August of 1978 with stunning, back-to-back victories in the PGA Championship and the American Optical Classic.

In those two weeks, the 1970 NCAA champion killed a couple of old, annoying birds with one stone. Gone were the fears that his game would never return from an array of personal problems and physical woes. And banished was the "bridesmaid" tag that came with a number of "almosts", most notably in the 1975 and 1976 U.S. Opens.

Mahaffey's triumph in the PGA at Oakmont was one of the year's most thrilling. At the start of the final round, he trailed leader Tom Watson by seven strokes, but a hot putter down the stretch that led to a five-under-par 66 put John in a deadlock with Watson and Jerry Pate at the end of 72 holes. In the sudden-death playoff, Mahaffey's putter came through again, and the 12-footer he canned on the second extra hole gave him his first win since the 1973 Sahara Invitational.

The following week, at the Pleasant Valley C.C., John's torrid play continued, and his tournament-record 270—14 under par—was a pair better than his closest pursuers, Gil Morgan and Ray Floyd.

All this came just a year after John had hit the depths. After a sparkling collegiate career at the University of Houston, Mahaffey immediately made his presence felt on the Tour. In his first full year, 1972, he was among the Top 60, and for the next three seasons he topped \$100,000 in earnings.

The physical problems began, ironically, during the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional, when he suffered what was later diagnosed as a hyperextended tendon in the left elbow. His earnings that year dipped from a career-high \$141,471 in 1975 to "just" \$77,843.

Recovery was slow. He was virtually unable to compete during the first part of 1977, and, just days before his expected return to action, Mahaffey fell off a ladder in his garage and broke the little finger on his right hand. He finally rejoined the Tour in July, but finished the year with less than \$10,000, having made a check in just five of 15 events.

Indeed, there were signs that Mahaffey was on the trail back in 1978—he finished third at Doral and tied for eighth in the Colonial—but the convincing manner in which he completed his comeback was certainly a surprise—a very pleasant surprise.

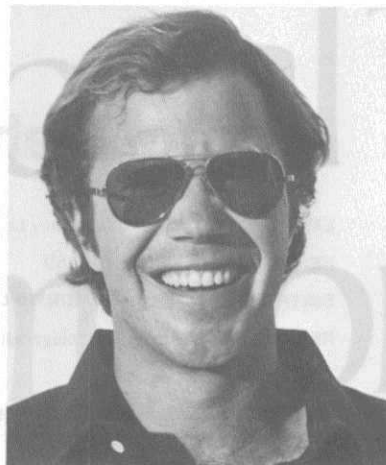

Bob Mann will tell you that the best move he has ever made was getting Wayne Levi as his partner for the 1978 Walt Disney World National Team Play Championship.

"Wayne wasn't sure he wanted to play in the tournament," Bob was saying, "but when we were at the Anheuser-Busch Classic, I talked him into it."

They teamed so well that they went on to win the Disney title and thus became exempt from qualifying for 1979. They were three strokes out of the lead after two rounds, but a third-day, 10-under 62 put them in front to stay and a final-round 63 clinched it.

Bob believes his game is ready to blossom. "When I came out on Tour as a PGA member in April of 1977, my game just wasn't good enough. I don't believe I had any specific weaknesses, but I needed to improve all aspects of my game."

He pointed out that "In the last year or so, I have missed a lot of cuts, but many of them were just by a stroke."

He also pointed out that during his career, he has been a "slow comer."

Twice he won the Wisconsin State Junior championship, and then went to the University of Indiana. "I wasn't good enough to make the team the first two years," he said, "but I was good enough the last two years, and we won the Big Ten team title my senior year."

After he was graduated in 1973, he remained at the university for three years as an assistant professional to Bob Fitch, and Mann credits him with teaching him the fine points of the game.

One tournament he lost was the Indiana State Assistant Professionals championship, getting nipped in the final by a young fellow from Fort Wayne named Bill Kratzert.

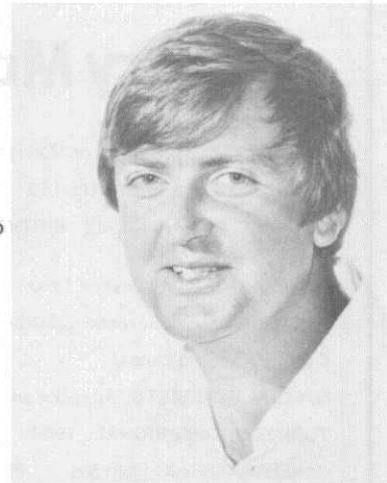
Before he became eligible to join the PGA Tour in the Spring of 1977, Bob played the mini-circuit in Florida. Interestingly enough, in his last event, he won when Wayne Levi bogeyed the final hole.

This past year, his best finish was a tie for 22nd in the Phoenix Open, but it was back-to-back money finishes at the B.C. and Southern Opens that convinced him his game was on the right track.

Levi made most of the birdies in the Disney triumph, but he pointed out that, "There were several times when I was completely out of the hole, and Bob came through either with a birdie of his own or saved the par. And, he was playing so steadily, that I could go for the flag on nearly every hole."

Mike McCullough's earnings dropped off slightly in 1978, as did his frequency of play. Yet he made the Top 60 for the second consecutive time after five years of non-exempt status.

Mike might have played more consistently in 1978, however. He recorded five top ten finishes in 28 starts, as opposed to four in 34 events the year before. His best finish was a tie for fifth in the Canadian Open.

In 1977, McCullough garnered more than half of his winnings in his two best showings, earning \$34,200 as the runnerup in the Tournament Players Championship and \$7,000 for winning the Magnolia Classic in Hattiesburg, Miss., a Second Tour stop.

In the TPC at Sawgrass that year, Mike surprised many with his scoring. He was the first-round leader with a brilliant, six-under 66; he finished 74-76-75 to wind up two strokes behind winner Mark Hayes. McCullough played Sawgrass well in 1978, too. Though he "only" tied for 12th, his third-round 69 was the only sub-70 score of the tournament.

Mike is one of the game's more tenacious players. As a boy, he played all sports. It wasn't until after he was graduated from Bowling Green State University in 1968 that he decided to devote more time to golf.

His first year out of college, he taught physical education in the Monroe (Mich.) school system; then he headed for Florida to play the mini-tours. Before doing so, he won the 1970 Ohio Amateur championship.

Twice, he tried to obtain his PGA Tour card and missed, in the fall of 1970 and again in 1971. Finally, he made it in 1972.

Jerry McGee did not have a good year. Not for Jerry McGee.

In 1978 Jerry won less than \$100,000 for the first time since 1975. He recorded only two top ten finishes, compared with seven the year before, when he earned a berth on the 1977 Ryder Cup team.

But an off-year for McGee is a fine year by most standards. In one exemplary stretch from the Masters through the Atlanta Classic (he tied for 11th in both), Jerry placed within the top 15 in five of seven starts, including a tie for tenth in the Byron Nelson Classic.

Jerry's best opportunity to gain a third PGA Tour win came in the Bob Hope Desert Classic, where he was one shot off the pace with two rounds left. He finished 70-67, but it wasn't enough, as winner Bill Rogers played the last two rounds in 67-69 to beat back McGee by a pair.

As usual, Jerry was nothing if not consistent in 1978: he missed but two cuts all year.

McGee, for years better known for his quick wit than being one of Ohio State's gang of standout golf products, suffered pulled ligaments in his thumb in the Summer of 1971, an injury which seriously disrupted his steady progress since joining the PGA Tour in 1967.

He sat out the last several months of 1971, and the injury apparently continued to bother him for about two more years. "The longer I was home," he said, "the more I wondered if I'd ever play again." However, he pulled out of his long slump in 1974 by earning checks in 25 of 35 tournaments and regaining a spot in the Top 60 list. And the following year he won his first PGA Tour event.

His winning week at Pensacola in 1975 found him taking the lead with rounds of 69-66-66 and, after faltering on the front nine the last day, birdying three holes on the back for 70-271 to win by two.

Before the 1978 Florida Citrus Open, Benson Rayfield McLendon (known to all as Mac) had never finished a PGA Tour event with a score lower than 12 under par. That was in the 1976 Hawaiian Open, and he tied for eighth.

But at Rio Pinar C.C. last March, Mac eclipsed his personal mark by five strokes, firing a 17-under 281. He also won the tournament and its \$40,000 winner's check. It was his third PGA Tour triumph and first in nearly a year and a half.

After an opening 69, which left him four strokes behind the early leaders, McLendon followed with a seven-under 65—his best round of the year—to move into a tie for the lead with David Graham. Due to a rainout on Thursday, the final 36 holes were played on Sunday and Mac withstood the rigors of such a long day.

"Oh, I got a little tired after about 27 holes," he said at the time, "but it mostly was just in my legs."

Another 69 in the third round gave Mac the lead by himself, one stroke ahead of Tom Kite and four in front of Graham, who provided the strongest challenge to McLendon over the final 18. David played the backside in 31 strokes, but Mac responded with a 33 to hold off the Australian by two shots.

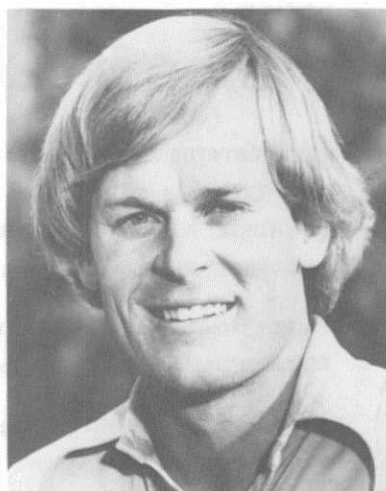
Mac won again in the Pensacola Open, the final official event of the year. With rounds of 65, 67 and 67 on the Perdido Bay course, he led after each of the first three rounds, but he slipped to a one-over 73 on Sunday to fall into a tie after 72 holes with Mike Reid, who shot 66. Reid bogeyed the first extra hole, and McLendon closed out the year by doubling his pre-1978 victory total.

McLendon won the first PGA Tour event he competed in, the 1968 Magnolia Classic, a Second Tour tournament which did not contribute to his official earnings. However, he did place in the Top 60 at the end of his first two years on Tour.

Then he found himself in a five-year slump which caused him to consider a more rewarding career, such as, perhaps, using his accounting degree from Louisiana State to more advantage. However, at the end of 1974, Mac hooked up with Hubert Green to win the Walt Disney World National Team Championship and an exemption for the following 12 months.

Given that opportunity, Mac more than doubled his official earnings in 1975 and twice almost won, when he tied for second at Jacksonville and placed second alone in the Pleasant Valley Classic.

The plot of "The Johnny Miller Mystery" thickened in 1978. The media, other players and Johnny himself all asked the inevitable question: What's gone wrong?

"People keep asking me what happened," says Miller. "If I knew, I'd be the first person to tell the answer."

In 1978, Miller's performance fell off drastically. He failed to crack the Top 60 for the first time since his rookie year of 1969—and in that campaign he played only the second half of the season. In 15 events—the fewest he's ever played—Johnny had but one top ten finish, a tie for sixth in the U.S. Open. In that event, Miller showed—for two rounds—a flash of the brilliance he'd displayed from 1971 to 1976, when he won 17 tournaments and more than a million dollars.

After an opening 78 at Cherry Hills, Miller fought back with rounds of 69 and 68 that put him just four shots behind leader Andy North. It was in a similar situation, five years earlier at Oakmont, that Johnny had fired his now-legendary 63 to come from six strokes back and win the Open.

But this time Miller finished with a three-over 74, ending up with the same four-shot margin between himself and North.

To add injury to insult, Johnny pulled a back muscle in a pro-am event a week after his best 1978 showing and needed more than a month before returning to competition. He wound up playing in only three more PGA Tour events the rest of the year.

Miller's arrival as a star has always been tied to his '73 Oakmont triumph. But he enjoyed his finest season the following year, winning eight tournaments and \$353,021, a record sum until 1978, when Tom Watson earned \$362,429. Johnny opened that amazing campaign with 23 consecutive rounds of par or better, winning the first three events of the year, the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, the Phoenix Open and the Tucson Open.

In 1975 Johnny devastated the desert once again. In the season opener at Phoenix C.C. he had rounds of 67, 61, 68 and 64 en route to a 24-under 260 and finished 14 strokes ahead of runnerup Jerry Heard. The next week at Tucson Miller was 25 under par, recording scores of 66, 69, 67 and 61 for a nine-shot victory over John Mahaffey.

Johnny's last PGA Tour win came at the 1976 Bob Hope Desert Classic, and with that victory he became the ninth player to pass \$1 million in career earnings on the Tour.

Orville Moody enjoyed a resurgence in 1978, but at the beginning of the campaign it certainly looked as though his woes of recent years would continue. He missed the cut in his first seven starts, and after the TPC his stroke average was a dismal 74.76.

But then a nice thing happened to Moody; he started making money. After making his first cut of the year at the Sea Pines Heritage Classic, "Sarge" finished 67-71 to grab a share of third place and garner a check for \$13,275. That was his biggest check since the 1973 San Antonio-Texas Open.

The next two weeks Moody tied for 14th at Greensboro and for 16th at Houston and was well on his way to his finest year since 1973.

There have been numerous highlights to his long career in golf including his victory in the 1969 U.S. Open Championship, joining with Lee Trevino to give Uncle Sam the 1969 World Cup team title, as well as triumphs in the 1958 All-Army Championship and the 1962 All-Service Championship.

"They all mean a great deal to me," Orville said recently.

It was a good year in 1969 when he won the Open and \$79,176. He had another in 1973, when he managed three second-place finishes and collected \$74,286. In the Bing Crosby that year Orville held a four-stroke lead with 18 to play. He fell into a three-way tie with Jack Nicklaus and Ray Floyd when he three-putted the final green. Nicklaus won the playoff.

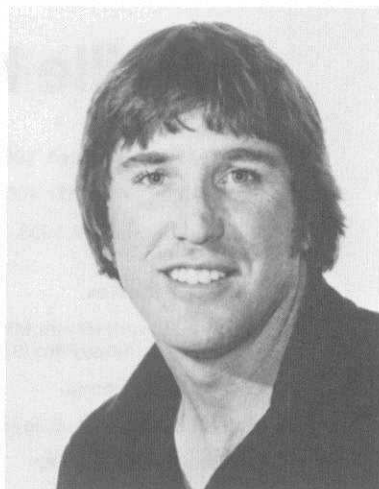
Times have not been easy for him the last few years. He left the PGA Tour for most of 1975 and 1976 to devote his energies to his golf course business in the Denver area, but rejoined the Tour as a fulltimer in 1977 and plans to stay with it for awhile.

Orville's father was greens superintendent in Chickasha, Okla. "I grew up on the golf course and have played the game since I was about three," he said. "I never played on anything but sand greens until I was 13 or 14."

Orville, who is part Cherokee Indian, joined the Army in 1953 and stayed for 14½ years. He saw duty in both the European and Pacific zones and was a staff Sergeant (E-6), when he was discharged.

The way he's been going lately, Dr. Gil Morgan will have to put off plans of a full-time optometry practice for quite a while.

In 1978, Gil established himself as one of the true stars of the PGA Tour. His steady climb up the money list since joining the Tour has been impressive, and in '78 he nearly made it to the pinnacle.

The highlight of Gil's year, of course, was his victory in the World Series of Golf. After opening 71-72 on the Firestone C.C. South Course, Morgan moved into contention with a third-round 67, three under par. He posted a 68 on the final day, putting him in a tie with Hubert Green, who shot 70. Hubert three-putted the first playoff hole, while Gil made a routine par to capture the title and its benefits: a \$100,000 winner's check and a ten-year exemption.

Of course, Gil had to play excellent golf to get into the World Series. The first half of his World Series qualification took place toward the end of 1977, when he nailed down his first Tour win at the B.C. Open.

Morgan won again early in the 1978 season, battling Jack Nicklaus down the stretch to a triumph in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open. Shooting 66-69-73-70 for a six-under 278, Gil held or shared the lead the entire distance over the Riviera C.C. layout.

Overall, Morgan notched 11 top ten finishes in 1978, more than double his output of a year earlier.

Gil has made a habit of strong finishes at the end of most of his years on Tour. Not only did he win his first tournament late in the 1977 season, but in 1974 and 1975 he made a move almost as rewarding. At the end of his rookie year, 1974, he won about \$11,000 in his last four events. A year later he needed something similar to crack the Top 60, like \$7,000 in the 1975 San Antonio-Texas Open. He led at the halfway mark but appeared to have ruined his chances with a third-round 75. A closing 68 lifted him to third place—worth \$8,875—and a final position of precisely 60th.

Gil began playing golf at about age 15 and decided he would pursue it as a career along with optometry when he was a junior at East Central State College in Oklahoma. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship before graduation in 1968 but he did not turn pro until after earning his doctorate four years later.

He was second in the Western Amateur and Porter Cup before entering the Fall 1972 Tour Qualifying School. He failed to win his player's card, but a year later, after subsisting on the mini-tour circuit, Morgan passed.

At the beginning of 1978, it looked as though Bob Murphy might have as much trouble maintaining the Top 60 status he's enjoyed his entire career as he had the two previous years. After his ninth event, the Sea Pines Heritage Classic, Bob had earned just over \$4,000, with his best finish a tie for 24th in the Florida Citrus Open.

But Murphy busted out of the slump in April with three straight top ten finishes and left the month some \$20,000 richer than he'd entered it. After a tie for eighth in the Tallahassee Open, he tied for third in the Houston Open and tied for fifth in the First NBC New Orleans Open.

Four weeks later, Bob tied for second in the Atlanta Golf Classic, and came within a whisker of winning for the first time since the 1975 Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic. After opening 64-70-67, he led by a shot over Jerry Heard. After a birdie on the 17th hole the final day, he and Heard were deadlocked at 18 under par. But Jerry birdied the last hole and Bob made an expensive bogey that gave him a 70 and dropped him into a tie with Tom Watson and Lou Graham.

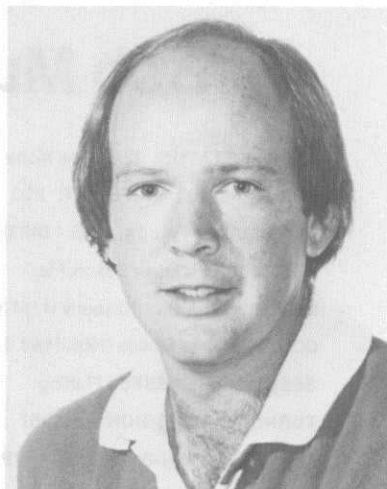
Murphy's performance in 1976 and 1977 was not characteristic of his professional career. A painful hand, finally diagnosed as a uric acid condition, damaged his game for most of the Summer of 1976, and that year he maintained his Top 60 streak by a margin of just \$250.

Murphy's introduction to competitive golf was little short of miraculous. He entered the University of Florida in the early 1960s as a baseball prospect but he turned to golf when an injury kept him off the diamond his freshman year. Suddenly he won the 1965 U.S. Amateur championship, then the following Spring the NCAA title as a senior.

He almost exploded as a pro, too, after gaining his player's card in 1968. As a rookie, he won the Philadelphia and Thunderbird tournaments on consecutive weeks and more than \$100,000 for the year, easily the most money banked by a rookie to that time.

In his first six years on the Tour, Murphy wound up no lower than 32nd on the money list. He dropped to 44th position at the end of 1974, the result of a thumb injury which sidelined him for four months and limited him to 19 events.

Larry Nelson's quest for that elusive first win continued to bear no fruit in 1978, but the slender Georgian played well enough to easily make the Top 60 for the third straight year.

After a slow start, Larry found his game at the Tournament Players Championship, where he finished in a tie for fourth. The following week, in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he had his best bid for victory number one, but troubles on Harbour Town's treacherous back side in the final round dropped him to a tie for third.

After two rounds in that event, Nelson, who started 69-68, was tied for the lead with four others. After another 68 in the third round, however, Larry was alone at the top, two strokes ahead of David Graham and Craig Stadler.

Nelson's chances were effectively ended after a double bogey on the par five 15th hole preceded a bogey on the 16th. Larry went on to shoot 76, while victor Hubert Green scorched the final nine in four-under 31 on the way to a 67.

In 1977, when he won just a hair under \$100,000, Larry tied for second three times—at San Diego, Greensboro and Hartford. But the closest he came to winning was a solo third in the Phoenix Open, where he finished just one stroke out of the playoff between Jerry Pate and Dave Stockton. In his three ties for second, he finished between three and five shots back.

There are not many stories on the PGA Tour more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he had his Approved Tournament Players card. "I really wasn't ready," he said later, but he got ready in a hurry, as witness his steady climb up the money rankings since then.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried school again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree club in Kennesaw, Ga., turned pro six months after that. He tried the mini-tours briefly and, in 1973, finished bogey-bogey in the Florida State Open to lose by a shot. That was his lone 72-hole event before earning his Tour card that fall.

Jack Newton had always enjoyed success as a professional golfer, winning tournaments in England, Europe, Africa, New Zealand and his native Australia. But playing on the PGA Tour after making it through the Fall 1976 Qualifying School was, he says, "a whole different ballgame."

Indeed, Newton's first year on the American Tour could have been his last. It took a tie for tenth in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic late in the season to give him enough money to meet the guidelines, and he wound up 156th on the 1977 money list.

"That year was kind of an initiation program for me," Newton says. "I hadn't had to qualify since 1971, and I really found it tough."

Things didn't look much better during the first part of 1978, with a tie for 14th at New Orleans providing Newton's only four-figure check. But Jack made his move to change his American fortunes in the second round of the Buick-Goodwrench Open.

It was a nasty day, with intermittent showers and gusting winds—not unlike the climate, he noted at the time, in which he had won a tournament or two in the British Isles. Newton fired a five-under 67 that gave him a share of the lead. He was also tied for the lead after 54 and 72 holes, and the 15-foot birdie putt that defeated Mike Sullivan on the first playoff hole finally brought North America onto his list of winning continents.

Newton came by his golf skills honestly. He began playing at the age of 12, tutored by his father, a Sydney detective who still boasts a scratch handicap. But his true love was rugby, and he engaged mostly in that sport until, at 16, he suffered an injury to the cartilage in his left knee.

"I had a choice," says Jack. "I could have the cartilage removed—which was a rather risky operation—or I could quit rugby." He obviously opted for the latter.

After a successful amateur career in Australia, Newton turned professional in 1971, leaving to play the European tour the following year. It was not a very encouraging inaugural campaign for Jack, and only a good check in the last tournament of the year enabled him to afford another try in 1973. That year things improved dramatically, as he won two events and was the second-leading money winner on the Continent.

All along, however, Newton wanted to play the American Tour. "I planned to stay in Europe only until I was financially secure enough to play (in the U.S.) for two years without a sponsor," he says.

Newton was ready by 1975, but he failed to earn his playing card at the Spring School in Myrtle Beach, S.C.

Just a few weeks later, he suffered another disappointment. On the 72nd hole of the British Open at Carnoustie, Tom Watson needed to sink a 25-foot putt to tie Newton for the lead. Watson made the putt, and the next day edged Newton in a playoff, shooting 71 to Jack's 72.

But Newton won't be looking back now. With a PGA Tour win under his belt, Jack seems ready to make his mark on yet another part of the golf world.

In a sense, Bobby Nichols has the best of all worlds. He is head professional at one of the finest clubs in the nation—Firestone C.C. in Akron, Ohio—and can play the PGA Tour whenever business permits. But the way Bobby has played the past few years, it could be less than satisfying.

In 1978, Nichols earned less than \$10,000 and was out of the top 100 for the third straight year—after 16 straight among the Top 60. His best finish came in the PGA Championship at Oakmont, an event he won 14 years earlier. His only other finish in the first 25 came in the initial tournament of the year, when he tied for 20th in the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open.

Bobby endured a serious auto accident while in high school in Kentucky, where he was a standout football and basketball player, and was forced to switch his interest to golf. Before he was graduated from Texas A&M with a business degree in 1958, he won the Southwest Conference golf title.

Nichols turned pro a year later and joined the PGA Tour in 1960, and in his first 16 years he never once finished out of the Top 60 list. His best year in earnings was 1974, when he won twice for the third time and collected almost \$125,000 in checks. He almost repeated at San Diego in 1975 but lost the playoff. Two months later he tied for fourth in the Masters, after leading the first round with 67.

His most vivid memory of 1975 is a terrifying one. At the Western Open in late June he felt the effects of a bolt of lightning and was taken to the hospital along with Lee Trevino and Jerry Heard. He was discharged after a couple days observation.

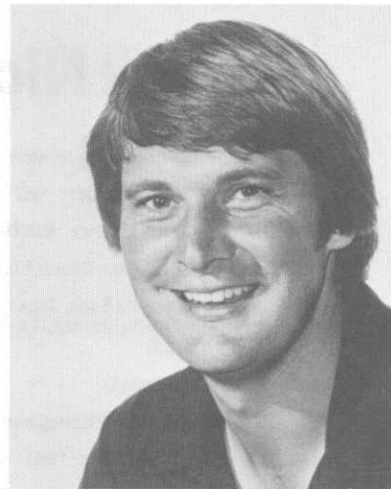
He birdied the last five holes—chipping in twice along the way—to win the Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic for the second straight time. Two starts later, he won the Tournament Players Championship for the third time in five years.

In the event preceding each of those victories, Nicklaus placed second. He finished two shots behind Gil Morgan in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open; in the Doral-Eastern Open, he ended up one stroke behind Tom Weiskopf.

In July, Jack won the British Open at St. Andrew's. The week after capturing his third British title, Nicklaus won the designated IVB-Philadelphia Classic.

Andy North abruptly thrust himself into the spotlight in 1978 by winning the U.S. Open at Cherry Hills. Although a constant member of the Top 60 money winners since 1974, his second year on the PGA Tour, North's only previous victory came in the 1977 Westchester Classic.

Understandably enough, Andy was not considered among the favorites to claim the 78th edition of the Open. But the manner in which he won proved to all that the victory was anything but a fluke.

Andy took the lead at the midway point of the tournament, carding back-to-back 70s on the suburban Denver course for a two-stroke edge over J.C. Snead, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player. After an even-par 71 on Saturday, North held a one-shot lead over Gary Player and was three ahead of Snead and Dave Stockton.

Andy's mettle was certainly tested on the final day. Holding a four-stroke margin with five holes to play, North frittered away the lead with a bogey on the 14th and a double bogey on 15. He came to the final hole needing a bogey to win, and that's what he got. An excellent fourth shot from a bunker left him a four-footer for victory; after backing away twice, Andy stroked it into the center of the cup.

North's first comment to the press after the win: "Thank heavens it's over."

The Open was one of six top ten finishes for Andy in 1978, by far his best year on the Tour. In his last tournament before the Cherry Hills triumph, North tied for second in the Kemper Open. Earlier in the season, he had also tied for second in the Tournament of Champions and tied for fourth in the Tournament Players Championship.

At Westchester in 1977, Andy got in position with 66-70-65 and closed with a 71 to defeat George Archer by two strokes.

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, Wis. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf—if he rode in a car.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

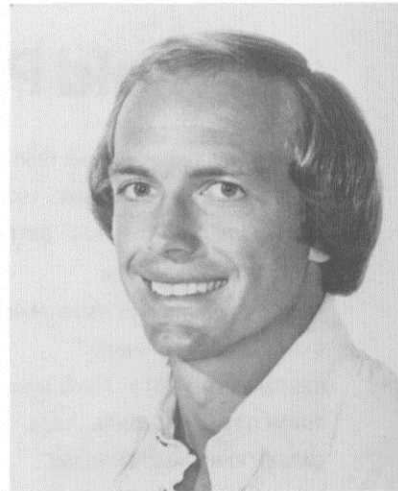
In 1978, the year in which he turned 49, Arnold Palmer's performance on the PGA Tour was better than in his previous two campaigns. In 1976 and 1977, Amie had no finishes in the top ten; last year he placed in the top ten twice.

In his first start of the year, the Phoenix Open, Palmer shot four solid rounds—69, 68, 71 and 67—to finish fifth, nine under par and just three shots behind winner Miller Barber. Amie's other high finish was a tie for eighth in the Canadian Open on the demanding Glen Abbey layout.

Palmer thrilled his millions of fans with great opening rounds in three other events, the Florida Citrus Open, the Byron Nelson Classic and the Kemper Open. At the Orlando tournament, he started with a seven-under 65 that gave him a share of the lead, but finished 73-71-71 and tied for 14th.

In the Byron Nelson (66) and the Kemper (67), Amie was just one shot back after the first round, but couldn't sustain the pace, dropping back to a tie for 63rd and a tie for 20th, respectively.

Jerry Pate was born in Macon, Ga., and lives in Pensacola, Fla., but some of his fondest feelings must belong to Columbus, Ga. It was there that Jerry nailed down his last two PGA Tour wins, gaining victories in the 1977 and 1978 Southern Opens. In 1977, he shot a 14-under 266 on the Green Island C.C. course for a seven-shot triumph over his closest pursuers; last year, a 269 provided him with a one-stroke margin over Phil Hancock.

Though the Southern win was Pate's solitary victory of 1978, it certainly does not tell the whole story of his year. Coming off a season in which injuries to his right shoulder and hand kept him off the Tour for 12 weeks, Jerry bounced back in 1978 with his most lucrative year. He placed in the top ten in nine of 25 starts, including ties for second in the Phoenix Open (where he was defending champion), the Colonial National Invitation and the PGA Championship.

In the PGA at Oakmont, Pate and Tom Watson succumbed to a birdie by John Mahaffey on the second playoff hole, but there would have been no sudden death at all had Jerry not three-putted the final green.

The man with the picture swing played his best golf of 1978 in the Summer. In a five-event stretch that included the PGA and the Southern, Pate also tied for third in the designated IVB-Philadelphia Classic, tied for 29th in the Westchester Classic and was solo sixth in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Jerry's 1977 victories preceded and followed his physical woes. He won Phoenix, the first event of the year, in a playoff with Dave Stockton, while the Southern Open was the second to last official event. Pate also teamed with Hollis Stacy in December to win the Mixed Team Championship.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA Tour rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a two-shot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie.

Conrad Rehling, who developed Bob Murphy while coaching at the University of Florida in the early 1960s, found another champion-to-be about a decade later while coaching at a small college near Pensacola. Pate was still in high school when he came under Rehling's wing. When Rehling moved to the University of Alabama, Pate followed. In 1974, like Murphy nine years earlier, Pate won the U.S. and Florida Amateur titles.

Jerry also helped the U.S. win the 1974 World Amateur Team championship and the 1975 Walker Cup matches. As an amateur he finished sixth in the Pensacola Open and tied for 18th in the U.S. Open, both in 1975.

It had been nearly four years since Gary Player's last PGA Tour victory in the 1974 Danny Thomas Memphis Classic. But when Gary returned to the winner's circle in 1978, he did so with a vengeance. In three weeks in April, his PGA Tour win total leaped from 18 to 21.

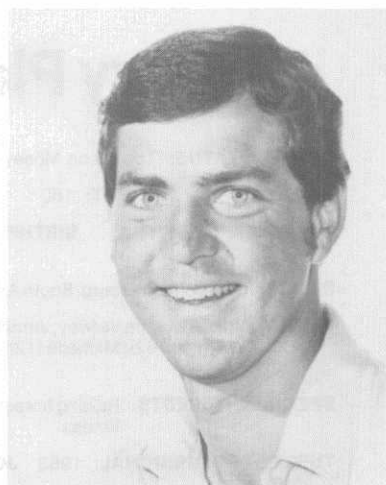
The South African, who will turn 44 in November, stunned the golf world first at the Masters, firing a record-equaling 64 on the Augusta National G.C. in the final round. His eight-under-par tally also brought him from seven strokes back to garner a third green jacket. Player's 277 total—rounds of 72, 72 and 69 preceded the 64—was one stroke better than the trio of Tom Watson, Hubert Green and Rod Funseth.

Lightning struck a second time the following week at La Costa C.C. Gary, the last man to qualify for the Tournament of Champions, opened 70-68-76 and started the final round seven strokes off the pace once again. He shot 67 for seven-under 281 . . . two in a row.

The coup de grace came in the Houston Open the next week. That victory came with relative ease: Player only trailed by three strokes entering the last round after starting 64-67-70. His closing 69 overtook Andy Bean by a shot and made him only the 11th man ever to win three straight events on the PGA Tour.

But Gary's year, his best of 22 on the Tour, wasn't over. He nearly made it four in a row at the First NBC New Orleans Open, but didn't fare as well as a front-runner. After a 69-67-69 start, he shared the lead with four others, but a fourth-round 72 dropped him to a tie for fifth.

In 1978, Tom Purtzer did not win as much money as he did the previous year, nor did the 1977 Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open winner grab a second PGA Tour victory. Yet in many ways the year was more rewarding for Tom.

During 1977, Purtzer entered 30 events, but was in the money just 12 times: the bulk of his earnings came with the Los Angeles triumph, a tie for third in the Tournament of Champions and a solo fourth in the U.S. Open. His other top ten finish was a tie for tenth in the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open.

Last year, Tom was in the top ten six times and was a much more consistent player. In 31 starts, he was in the money 24 times. Purtzer also improved his stroke average; it was 72.00 in 1978, 72.89 in 1977.

Purtzer enjoyed his best success in the late Spring and early Summer. In a four-week stretch that included the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, the U.S. Open, the Canadian Open and the Western Open, Tom tied for fourth, 24th, eighth and 11th, in that order.

Tom Purtzer got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball, I guess, when we were eight or nine.

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball, I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

The next year, 1973, Tom won the Broadmoor Men's Invitational and also was named to the All-America Collegiate golf team. He turned pro not long after graduating with a business degree.

Tom failed to earn his playing privileges at the PGA Qualifying School twice. He recalls: "The first time was only by two shots but the second was by a bunch."

Tom continued to season his game by competing on mini-tours in Arizona and Southern California and also went abroad in 1975. It was during a Far Eastern swing that year that Purtzer won the Thailand Open.

Victor Regalado shot a 15-under 269 in the 1977 Ed McMahon Quad Cities Open, finishing two strokes behind Mike Morley and tied for second. In 1978, Victor shot another 269 at Oakwood C.C., but this time it was good enough to give him his second PGA Tour victory. His first was the 1974 Pleasant Valley Classic.

Regalado was under par every day, as was Fred Marti, his closest pursuer. Victor held a two-stroke lead over Marti and Jack Renner midway through the tournament after opening 67-64. The lead was cut in half after three rounds: Regalado shot 68 and Fred carded a 67.

The two were tied briefly during the final round, but Victor's two-putt birdie on the par five 15th put him ahead to stay. Both players shot 70 in the last round, and the final margin was one stroke.

Though Regalado had been making most of the cuts before his Quad Cities win, most of his checks were modest. His best previous effort had been a tie for ninth in the Tournament Players Championship in March, worth \$7,500.

"My putting has been terrible up until this week," Victor said then. "I changed putters to start the year and I've had only two rounds when I've had less than 30 putts."

Victor grew up in Tijuana, Mexico, two blocks from the Tijuana CC and started in golf at age 11. The first tournament he entered was the Pan-American Juniors at his course and he won it at age 14.

The most impressive of his early titles throughout Central America were the Mexican Amateur in 1970, the Mexican PGA in 1972 and the Mexican Masters in 1972 and 1973. He represented Mexico in the World Amateur Team Championships of 1968 and 1970, the latter year winning the individual title in Spain. He also represented his country in the 1972 and 1973 World Cup tournaments.

As a PGA Tour rookie in 1973, Regalado played with negligible results, but in 1974 he won the Pleasant Valley Classic and it appeared he would join the handful of foreign superstars playing here. However, early in 1975, he injured his right thumb. "I couldn't practice for six months, but I kept trying to play," Victor recalled.

Jack Renner has been told that he was "about two years old" when he started to chip around the back yard with a golf club, and he knows he was about six when he started to play golf competitively.

"I don't remember when I wasn't playing golf competitively," the slim young man says. "I know I have had butterflies in my stomach all my life. At least, it seems that way.

"When my dad and my sister, Jane, would go to the course I would fuss a lot so they would take me along," he recalls. "About all I did in those early days was push the ball around."

That competitiveness, the desire to excel, has always burned fiercely in Jack Renner and has been a major contributing factor to his rise in the game.

He was only 20 when he earned his PGA Tour card in June of 1977, and he went on to win \$12,837 in the second half of the year. His goal for 1978 was to make the top 60 money winners and thus become exempt from qualifying.

"I got to the figure I needed so fast, mainly because I finished second at Greensboro," he said, "that I sort of wandered around the last half of the year. I found it hard to motivate myself, to get interested in what was going on every week."

It was at Greensboro that Jack nearly won. All he had to do was par the final hole to force Spain's Severiano Ballesteros into a playoff. However, he bunkered his approach, blasted to five feet and missed the putt. That left him tied with Fuzzy Zoeller.

"That day, I proved to myself I could play under pressure. Sure, I missed that putt for the par, but I made a lot of other pressure shots to get myself in position to tie. That was important to me."

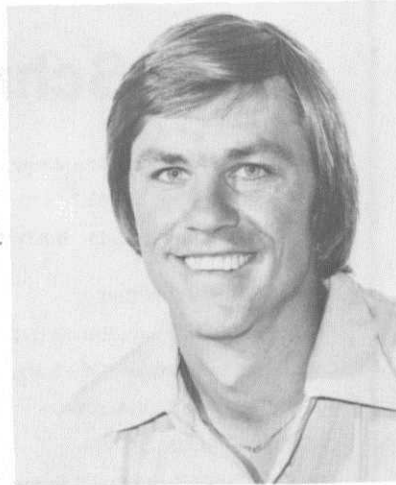
During his first full year, Renner believes his short game carried him most of the way. He developed the touch in his early days while playing par-three courses near home. He was the kingpin of junior golf around the San Diego area.

He won two important junior titles, the 1972 World Junior and the 1973 United States Junior. During his school days, he chose not to play varsity golf, because he felt he could improve faster by working on his own.

The Renners are an avid golfing family. Sister Jane has been part of the LPGA Tour for four years, and younger brother Jim turned professional last year.

When Bill Rogers was attending the University of Houston, he was nicknamed the "Panther" by his roommate, Bruce Lietzke. "I was the jumpy type," he said. "I never wanted to miss anything.

"I was still that way during my first two years on the PGA Tour," he continued. "and they were something of a disappointment to me. I had to learn to adjust."

Bill turned things around in 1977, finishing in the top ten nine times and earning more than \$88,000. Though he had only five finishes among the top ten in 1978, he increased his income by more than \$25,000 and gamered his first PGA Tour victory.

Rogers enjoyed his best success in the early part of the season. Before winning the Bob Hope Desert Classic, he had already notched high finishes in the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open and the Andy Williams San Diego Open, tying for seventh in the former and for sixth in the latter. And the week following his Hope triumph, Bill tied for fourth in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open.

Rogers shot under 70 all five rounds of the Hope Classic, carding 69-67-67-67-69 for a two-stroke victory over Jerry McGee. From the second round on, Bill held or shared the lead at the end of each day. Considering his fine play of the past year, no one was particularly startled by his initial Tour triumph.

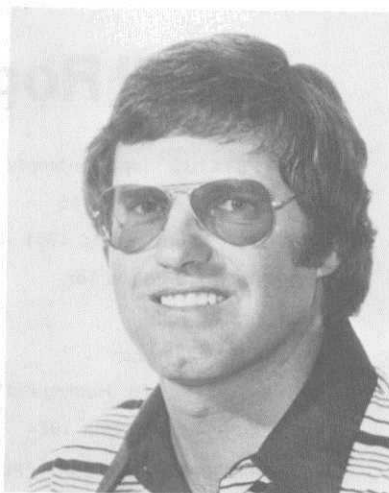
Rogers had another excellent chance for victory in the 1978 Western Open. After rounds of 70, 71 and 69 on the treacherous Butler National G.C., he entered the final day with a two-stroke lead. Bill finished with a respectable, even-par 72, but was caught by Andy Bean, who scorched the course with a six-under 66. Bean won the playoff with a par on the first extra hole.

"I've learned to handle certain situations on the course better," Bill says. "Not only shot situations, but also how to adjust to tournament situations, when to play the percentages."

Bill started to play the game at age nine in Montgomery, Ala., and was playing competitively by the time he was 13 and the family was living in Texarkana, Tex. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at the North Ridge Country Club in Texarkana, who taught him the fine points of the game.

Bill's father was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Air Force, and, from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from ages six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa. "Dad is retired from the Air Force now, and he still is a good player. He played in a lot of the major Air Force tournaments when he was in the service."

John Schroeder enjoyed his most profitable season in ten years on the PGA Tour in 1978, but at the outset of the campaign it looked like he was going to earn a lot more than he did.

By the conclusion of the Tournament Players Championship (where he tied for fourth) in March, John already had amassed close to \$50,000 and finished in the top ten four times. He started fast on the "Arizona Tour", tying for seventh in the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open and for sixth in the Phoenix Open, where he carded four successive 69s.

After a tie for 26th in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, Schroeder tied for second at the Andy Williams San Diego Open in his hometown. After opening 69-72-71, John shot another three-under 69 on the last day to finish three strokes behind winner Jay Haas. It was the second year in a row that he'd tied for runnerup in San Diego.

After the TPC, however, Schroeder's 1978 performance tailed off somewhat. His only top ten finish the rest of the year was a tie for eighth in the Canadian Open.

In the 1977 San Diego event, John finished five strokes behind the winner, Tom Watson. His best chance at victory that year came in the Colonial National Invitation, where he finished one shot behind Ben Crenshaw. Schroeder had led by four after the second round, and by one entering the final round, but Crenshaw closed with a 69, while John shot 71.

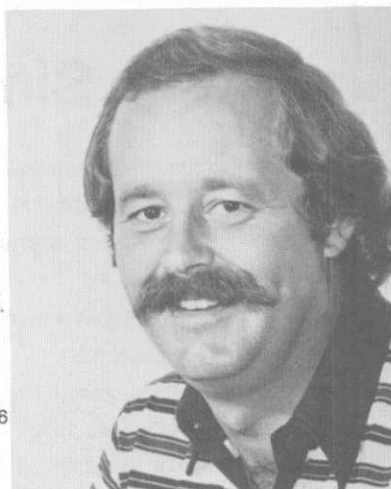
Schroeder credits much of his improvement in the last two seasons to teaching professional Jimmy Ballard, who has worked with a number of PGA Tour players, including Mac McLendon.

Since joining the Tour in 1969, he has one victory, in the 1973 U. S. Professional Match Play championship. Along the way, in order, he defeated Grier Jones, Bud Allin, Lee Trevino (one up) and, in the 18-hole final, DeWitt Weaver, two up.

John is the son of Ted Schroeder, one of the greats in tennis history. Ted won the 1949 Wimbledon championship and was a standout performer on 10 U. S. Davis Cup teams.

Tendonitis in the left hand hindered John's progress periodically from 1974 through 1976, but he believes that is a thing of the past.

Bob Shearer continued to establish himself in 1978 as another in a long line of outstanding Australian golfers. In both of his complete years on the PGA Tour, he has been among the Top 60.

That accomplishment earned him an invitation to play in the World Series of Golf, where he finished 24th.

Bob started in the game as a youngster in Dingley, a suburb of Melbourne. He still lives there much of the year, near the Southern Golf Club where it all started for him.

He established himself as a comer when he won the Victoria Boys' Championship as a 15-year-old. He later won the Australian Amateur in 1969 and turned professional the following year.

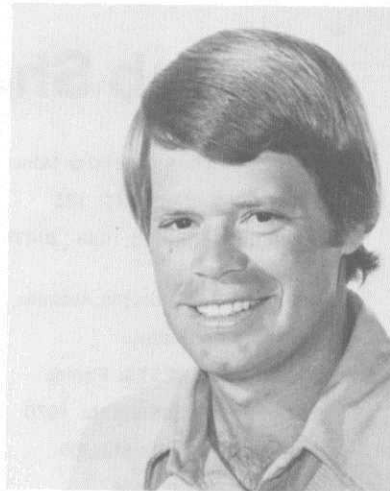
Playing around the world, he enjoyed success, winning such events as the 1974 Tasmanian Open and 1975 Madrid Open, along with several tournaments in Australia and New Zealand.

After a very successful 1975, during which he won three impressive titles and finished second in the British Order of Merit, he considered trying for his U.S. Tour card, but then reasoned, "I didn't think my game was quite ready. Jim Simons proved to everyone that his victory in the 1977 First NBC New Orleans Open was no fluke, coming right back in 1978 to win the Memorial Tournament against a quality invitational field.

Jim showed his mettle in winning on the tough Muirfield Village course. He opened 68-69 to take a two-stroke lead into the third round; a birdie on the 18th for 73 kept him a stroke up on Bill Kratzert entering the final day.

Pursued by Kratzert the entire way, Simons showed a phenomenal short game down the stretch to hold him off by a stroke. Jim successfully met five up-and-down challenges over the last seven holes, each time holing a sizable putt. On the 72nd hole, Jim calmly stroked in a 21-footer for par that gave him a 74 and his second PGA Tour triumph.

At New Orleans in 1977, Simons started the final day three shots behind the leader, Tom Watson. Because of a rainout, 36 holes were scheduled and Simons shot 67-67. His third-round score put him into the lead by one stroke, and he wound up three strokes ahead of Stan Lee and four in front of Watson.

Jim Simons will be the first to say that his early years on the PGA Tour were not up to expectations. He probably won't mention, however, that he was hampered with physical ailments. He had tendonitis in his left wrist, but more painful was his left shoulder which was diagnosed as a "looseness in the joint—a minor dislocation." It was the result of some "horsing-around" in his fraternity house at Wake Forest.

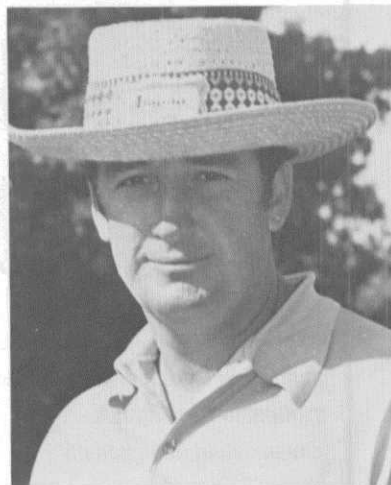
Simons was graduated from the Fall 1972 PGA Tour Qualifying School and did not have an opportunity to compete in many events. During his first year on the Tour he was in considerable pain, mainly, it developed, because his injury had not yet been diagnosed properly. He recalls: "I was doing stretching exercises because I felt a tightness, but that was just the opposite of what I needed."

Jim's father started him in golf at Butler, Pa., Country Club at the age of nine. He lived on a farm and says now, "I'd ride over to the club on my bike in the morning and either play or hit balls most of the day and ride back in the evening."

He started competition at the age of 13 and his progress was rapid. He first enrolled at the University of Houston but, after a year, transferred to Wake Forest. He was on the 1971 Walker Cup team and remained overseas for the 1971 British Amateur, reaching the final round where he lost to Steve Melnyk.

In the 1971 U.S. Open, at Merion, he gained national attention by leading the tournament after the third round. He finished in a tie for fifth and was low amateur. He also was low amateur in the 1972 Open at Pebble Beach. He turned pro that Fall.

Although solidly entrenched among the Top 60 money winners in 1978 for the eighth straight year, J.C. Snead was absent from the winner's circle for the second season in a row. Hard luck was probably as much a factor as anything in accounting for this circumstance.

In the late Spring, it looked like it was just a matter of time before Snead would snare a seventh PGA Tour victory. Four solid rounds in the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic gave him a tie for seventh; the following week, J.C. nearly won the U.S. Open.

In that event, Snead stayed near the lead for all four rounds. He trailed by one after an opening 70, and followed up with three consecutive 72s. J.C. was two back after the second round, three behind after the third, and watched with co-runnerup Dave Stockton as Andy North rolled in the nerve-racking four-footer for bogey on the 72nd green that left the two a stroke from a playoff.

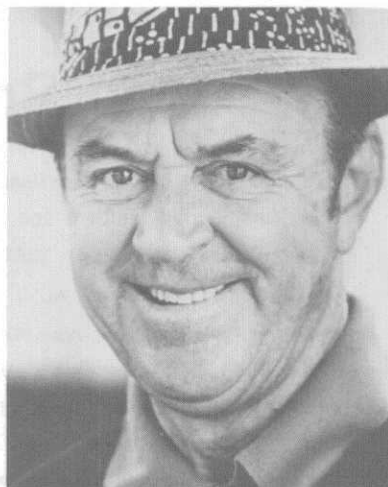
But just as J.C. seemed to be returning to the form that brought him two wins and nearly \$200,000 in 1976, physical problems arose. The week after the Open, he was forced to withdraw from the Canadian Open with a case of the flu. Returning home to Hot Springs, Va., Snead was riding on the back of a haywagon when the vehicle hit a rut. In the ensuing fall, J.C. broke his left wrist, and was out of action for the next seven weeks.

Jesse Carlyle Snead, although still constantly mentioned as the nephew of legendary Sam Snead, can stand on his own performance record. After growing up in Hot Springs, Va., he sought a career in baseball and served in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a pro in 1964.

He worked for head pro Charlie Beverage at the Century CC, Westchester County, N.Y., while twice failing to pass the PGA Tour Qualifying School, and it was four years before he earned his card. Following three so-so years on the Tour, J.C. burst into golf's consciousness by winning twice in a three-week period, at Tucson and Doral, immediately before and after the PGA Championship in Florida.

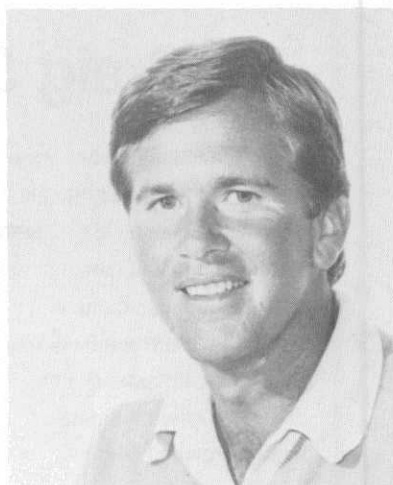

Ed Sneed probably wouldn't mind if half of the PGA Tour schedule were played at Silverado C.C. It was there, in 1971, that he gained his first of three PGA Tour victories. Seven years later, on the same Napa, Calif. courses, Ed finished second to Tom Watson in the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic on the way to his best campaign ever—winless though it was—in ten years on the Tour.

After wading through a slow start in 1978, Sneed asserted himself with a torrid four-event stretch in the Spring in which he earned nearly \$30,000.

In the Byron Nelson Classic, Ed finished with a 68 for a share of third place. After missing the cut in the Colonial Invitation, Sneed came right back with a tie for fourth in the Memorial Tournament, finishing four strokes behind winner Jim Simons. One can only speculate how he would have done there without a 78 in the third round.

Sneed capped off his marvelous streak in his next outing, tying for fifth in the Kemper Open.

In the Anheuser-Busch later in the year, Ed held a share of the lead after each of the first two rounds, opening 66-68. After a third-round 69, he was one stroke back. He finished with a 70, but wound up three behind Watson, who closed with a five-under 67.

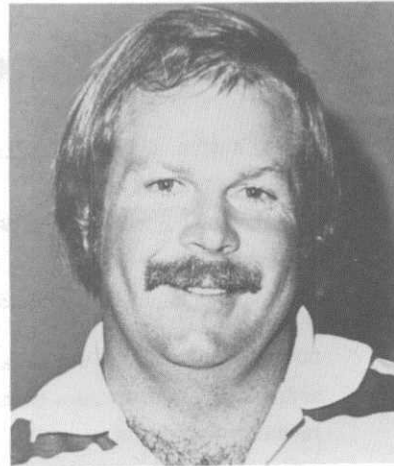
Back in 1976, Sneed was doubtless wondering what it took to win again, after a sizzling streak in the Summer which showed a tie for third at Milwaukee, tie for fifth at Westchester, a fourth in the Canadian Open, and a tie for third in the B.C. Open. Then, after a disappointing showing in the PGA Championship, Ed tied for fourth in the American Golf Classic in Akron. It added up, at the end of 1976, to his most lucrative of seven full years on the Tour.

While serving a so-called four-year apprenticeship on the PGA Tour, during which Sneed never came close to cracking the Top 100 money list, Sneed was told more than once by his fellow Ohio State alumnus, Tom Weiskopf, that there was no reason he shouldn't be among the Top 60. Long Tom proved right, it turned out.

Sneed won the New South Wales Open in Australia late in 1973, grabbed a plane for San Francisco and—gaining a day via the international dateline—arrived in Napa, Calif., in time for Monday qualifying for the Kaiser International. The following Sunday he beat John Schlee in a playoff for his first Tour triumph. The following July, in 1974, Ed led all four rounds at Milwaukee.

Sneed started golf at age 13 in his native Roanoke, Va. He earned his privileges to play the Tour in 1969 but it was another two years before he decided to play full time.

It was a tremendous feeling for Craig Stadler when he won the Magnolia Classic at Hattiesburg, Miss., in early April last year.

"It made the year for me," he said, "maybe even more than finishing among the top 60 money winners for the year. I had won more than my share of tournaments in junior golf and in college, but until the Magnolia, I had gone for quite a while without winning."

Before turning pro, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U.S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo. "I just made everything that week," he said.

"After that, I had thought about not going back to school (University of Southern California), but I did," he said. He was an All-America choice for the Trojans in 1974 and 1975, and also was named to the 1975 U.S. Walker Cup team.

His first attempt at qualifying for the PGA Tour came in the Fall of 1975 and he didn't make it. "That was one of the hardest things I've ever had to swallow," he said. He succeeded in the June, 1976, Qualifying School, but only pocketed \$2,702 for the last half of the year.

"I was just awful," he said, "I seemed to miss the cut or fail to qualify by just one or two strokes each week."

He said he has learned two things. First, the Tour is more of a mental adjustment; and, secondly you never can accumulate enough experience.

He started 1977 in a hurry, with a tie for fifth in the Bing Crosby and a solo fourth in the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open. He had two other top 10 finishes and finished 66th on the money list.

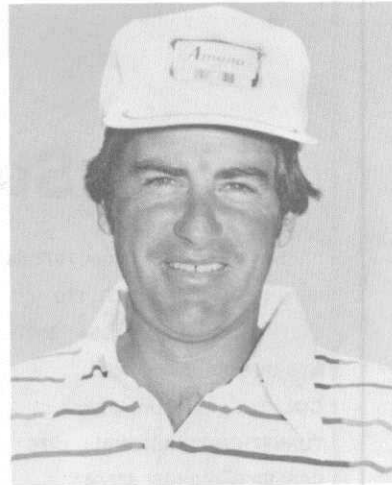
This past year, he had six top 10 finishes. Just prior to his victory in the Magnolia, he tied for fifth in the Heritage Classic and was fourth alone in the Greater Greensboro Open.

He had a stretch of playing 16 weeks, from the Colonial National Invitation in mid-May through the B.C. Open in early September.

"Nearly every check I made in 1978 was for at least \$1,000," he pointed out, "but my need now is to work more on consistency and grind it a little more."

Craig first played the game at age five with the assistance of his father, and really became interested in the game at age "eight or nine." Along the way, he won such titles as the World Junior championship, the San Diego City Amateur and the Southern California Interscholastic.

Dave Stockton easily made the Top 60 in 1978 for the 12th straight time, though he experienced a second straight year without a victory.

Dave, who always plays well in the significant championships, came closest to winning in the U.S. Open at Cherry Hills. He shot 71-73-70-72 to tie J.C. Snead for second, just one shot behind winner Andy North.

Stockton's next best finish was in the Byron Nelson Classic. After starting with a 75, he came back with rounds of 69, 65 and 67 to claim a share of third place. Dave followed a similar pattern in the Westchester Classic, where he tied for fifth. Starting with a three-over 74, he rallied with two 69s and a final 66. In each instance, the gap between his score and the winners' was just four shots.

Stockton's best outing in 1977 came in the year's first event, the Phoenix Open. A seven-under 64 in the third round was the key to his forcing a playoff with Jerry Pate, but Dave bogeyed the first extra hole to lose it. A tie for sixth in the Atlanta Classic was his best showing the rest of the year.

Stockton graduated from the University of California in 1964, turned professional immediately and struggled for three years on the PGA Tour before winning the prestigious Colonial National Invitation in 1967. He hasn't been out of the Top 60 since.

He won his first PGA Championship in 1970, when he fought off extreme heat and a stretch challenge from Arnold Palmer at Southern Hills in Tulsa. Three victories in 1974 resulted in his most productive year. Dave's first win that year was at Los Angeles, where his 235-yard, three wood shot on the 72nd hole set up a 12-foot birdie putt which beat Sam Snead and John Mahaffey.

He didn't win after 1974, however, until the 1976 PGA at Congressional. "I probably was heading for my poorest year," Stockton said, "and I can't tell you why. I was in the best physical condition of my life. I guess it was mental."

Stockton shot 70-72-69 at Congressional, and was four strokes back entering the last round. But he forged in front entering the last nine and then, on the water-guarded 72nd green, rolled in a 13-foot putt to beat Ray Floyd and Don January by a shot each.

It was Friday afternoon at the 1978 San Antonio Texas Open and 62 players were in the process of bettering par 70 at Oak Hills C.C. Ron Streck stood on the tee of his 18th hole, the 160-yard ninth, knowing he needed a par three for a 36-hole 140, the almost certain cutoff figure.

Streck hit a seven iron "fat" and the ball fell into a greenside bunker. He blasted out and faced a six-foot putt. He made it for a 67 and 140. He was one of the last to make the cut.

"After that three, I felt a lot better," Streck said later. "It eased a lot of pressure on me. Then I could concentrate on making a good check." Going into the Texas Open, Streck had earned \$6,932 and stood 156th on the money list.

"I guess you could say I was on the border of losing my card. I had to earn \$10,000 for the year or be within the top 160 players. When I made the cut, I felt it was my chance to earn a decent check and improve myself. I went out and practiced my driving Friday evening."

While Streck practiced, his parents checked back into their hotel. Dr. and Mrs. Warren Streck had come down from Tulsa, Okla., to see their son play. After he shot 73 Thursday, the senior Streck checked out of the hotel the next morning and went to Oak Hills. They checked back in and stayed to see their son win the Texas Open.

Streck went on to blister the Oak Hills course. He scored 63-62 in the last two rounds and won with a 15-under 265. Over the last 36 holes he scored 19 pars, 16 birds and one bogey. His 125 bettered the all-time PGA Tour scoring record for 36 holes—126, held by five players.

Streck was in the third round's first pairing and he stirred the gathering gallery by shooting a six-under 29, the year's fourth 29 on the Tour. Then he carded an eagle three on the 495-yard 10th. He has since recalled his feelings as he walked to the next tee:

"I got to thinking that if I kept up this pace, I'd beat Al Geiberger's 59. But I began thinking too much about making a 58 and my game slipped." Which means he took a bogey and could not bag any more birds and finished with a 63.

On the final day, Streck decided to keep going for birds. He scored five in the first eight holes and then thought about making another 29 on the front side, but he remembered the lesson he learned the day before and promptly forgot about the records.

Ron birdied the 12th and 14th. When his most dangerous pursuer, Ben Crenshaw, took a bogey on the par three 13th, Streck had some breathing room. Ron birdied the par four 17th. When Crenshaw bogeyed the final hole that allowed Lon Hinkle, who carded a final 64, and Hubert Green, who finished with a 66, to tie for second at 266. Crenshaw took fourth with 267.

"I just played as good as I could," said Streck. "In my two years on the Tour I have played with all the stars except Tom Watson. But when the tournaments were over, I was down around 35th place. Yet I felt I was just as good a player as they were."

Alan Tapie started playing golf in high school, simply for something to do. He preferred football and especially baseball.

"I wanted to continue playing baseball," he said, "but I threw my arm out in high school and it required an operation on my right elbow. That ended my career as a pitcher.

"I thought about other sports, but I decided then that golf was the best way for me to get to college," he added. After two years at Los Cerritos Junior College, he obtained a scholarship to Southern California and won the Pac-Eight championship his first year.

He went on to win the Los Angeles City Amateur crown and then turned professional. After winning occasionally on the mini-tour circuit, he qualified for his PGA Tour card in the Fall of 1974.

He earned \$22,547 his first year and was reasonably satisfied with that. The next two years, however, produced almost the same results.

Early last year, he was going along at about the same pace, and decided it was time to make a move. "When we were playing at Doral, I had a talk with myself," he explains. "I wasn't sure what my problem was, but I had negative thoughts. I wouldn't let myself play well."

Suddenly, with a better mental outlook, things began to improve. He finished 69-67 at Doral to tie for eighth. After a tie for 28th in the Tournament Players Championship, he came back with successive ties for fifth in the Heritage Classic and Greater Greensboro Open.

In those four events, he won \$21,570, which was more than he had won in all of 1977.

"Now, when I practice," he says, "I don't look for the things that might work. I know what I have to do, and know how to do it."

He finished the year with seven top 10 finishes, and that included another tie for fifth, this in the Westchester Classic. He was aided in that one by a hole-in-one.

In 1978, Lee Trevino left no doubts that he was totally recovered from the back surgery he underwent in November of 1976. Though he won just one tournament, Lee piled up a remarkable total of five runnerup finishes and came within a few thousand dollars of his best year ever, 1971.

Trevino, with more than \$1.8 million in career earnings, also moved past Billy Casper and Arnold Palmer into second place on the all-time list.

Lee served notice immediately that he was in fine fettle for the 1978 season. In his first four starts, he finished in the top ten three times: tied for fourth in the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open, tied for second in the Phoenix Open and tied for ninth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Trevino's 1978 triumph came in the Colonial National Invitation, just one week after placing solo second in the Byron Nelson Classic. At the Colonial C.C., Lee assumed a one-shot edge after starting 66-68-68, and then hid from the field with another four-under 66 for 268, four strokes ahead of Jerry Pate and Jerry Heard.

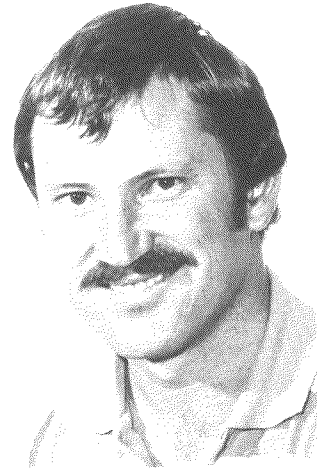
Two starts later, at the Danny Thomas Memphis Classic, Trevino closed with a 65 to force a playoff with Andy Bean, but lost when the big Floridian rolled in a long birdie putt on the first extra hole. Lee lost another playoff in Milwaukee, this one a marathon duel with Lee Elder that ended when Trevino bogeyed the eighth extra hole. Thus, in a seven-tournament stretch from the Byron Nelson through the Greater Milwaukee, Lee won once, finished second three times and tied for third (in the Canadian Open, where he was the defending champion).

Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco, and he didn't try the Tour again until a year later at Baltusrol. He placed sixth in that U.S. Open, and was on the Tour to stay. He was chosen "rookie-of-the-year" for 1967. Twelve months after Baltusrol, the quick-quipping Merry Mex from Dallas was entertaining everyone at a margarita party in the clubhouse at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open.

Lee won the U.S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff at Merion, and in a span of five weeks that Summer he added the Canadian and British Open titles to his fast-growing collection. He was named player of the year practically by acclamation.

Howard Twitty started 1978 with a solo third in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, and the big Arizonian never looked back, garnering seven top ten finishes on the way to his best year—by far—on the PGA Tour.

Three of Howard's high finishes came in a four-tournament stretch a few weeks into the Tour schedule. In back-to-back events, the Jackie Gleason Invitational Classic and the Florida Citrus Open, he tied for seventh and tied for sixth, respectively. Two starts later, Twitty shared the first-round lead in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic with an opening 67, but finished 74-70-72 to wind up in a tie for ninth.

But Howard's best chance for victory came in the Colgate Hall of Fame Classic at the end of August. Millions of television viewers watched as his birdie putt—a 25-footer that would have forced a playoff with Tom Watson—hung agonizingly on the lip of the cup, half a revolution from dropping. It had been a good day for Howard, however. His tap-in gave him a four-under 67 on the testing Pinehurst No. 2 layout and put him in a tie for second with Tom Kite and Hale Irwin.

Exempt status had not come easily for Twitty in 1977. Going into the Anheuser-Busch Classic, one of the last events of the year, he was 62nd on the money list. But in one of the year's best rounds, Howard pummeled the Silverado C.C. layout with a closing 62, a 10-under-par effort that vaulted him to third place. The \$14,200 check put him snugly into the Top 60.

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at the start. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6-3 when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed."

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when a senior, he finished right behind the Texas co-champions, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite, in the NCAA championship.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and twice failed in the PGA Tour Qualifying School before meeting success in June 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

Bobby Wadkins admits he went through a "slow-learning process" during his first three years on the PGA Tour, but also believes that now he has learned his lessons well.

"I needed the time to develop and adjust to the life," he said, "but the main thing for me has been maturing."

He cited examples: "In the Fall of 1977, I decided to do my hunting early and then go to Florida to work on my game and get it ready for the start of 1978. I had never done that before."

This move paid off in a second-place finish in the year's inaugural, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He started with 69-66, and finished three strokes in back of Tom Watson, earning his biggest check, \$22,000. That was more than he had won in all of 1977.

"I also worked more on my putting all year," he said, "but one very valuable lesson I learned was how to practice. In the past, when there would be a crowd around, I would practice only my best shots. I didn't want to look bad in front of them. Now, I know enough to work on my bad habits on the practice tee and not be concerned about the crowd. That's part of maturing."

Bobby is approximately 20 months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and during his first couple of years on the Tour, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

Today Bobby and Lanny usually practice together, and when one needs help, he almost always goes to his brother.

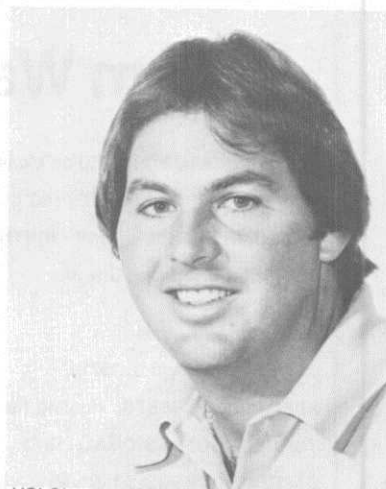
After high school — where he also was a standout basketball player — Bobby headed for the University of Houston and his two closest friends there — and now — were Bill Rogers and Bruce Lietzke.

After one year, though, he transferred to East Tennessee State and earned All-America status in 1972 and 1973.

He earned his Tour card in the Fall of 1974, and was "satisfied" with his first-year earnings of \$23,330. He stayed at approximately the same level the next two years and that was disappointing.

A highlight in 1977 came the first day of the Memorial Tournament. After going out in 39 on the very-difficult course, he came back in seven-under 29, to tie for the lead. He also was in the lead after three rounds, but a bad last day dropped him to a tie for 11th.

Lanny Wadkins did not have a good year in 1978, especially when compared to his comeback season of 1977. That year Lanny (a) Won the PGA Championship at Pebble Beach in a playoff with Gene Littler after making up five strokes over the final nine holes; (b) Won the World Series of Golf at Firestone by five shots with a record-breaking 267; and (c) Finished third on the PGA Tour money list with close to a quarter of a million dollars in earnings.

In 1978, Lanny's best finish came as the defending World Series champion. He closed with a 66—the best round of the tournament—to finish fourth at 282, four strokes behind winner Gil Morgan. His next best showing was a tie for fifth in the Greater Greensboro Open.

Late in the Summer of 1978, Wadkins searched for an answer to his slump. "What can I say? I just haven't played that well. I was hurt at the tail end of last year—a torn rib muscle in my right side—and for a long time I just didn't feel right." (Lanny sustained the injury pulling a suitcase out of the trunk of his car.)

"There isn't anything you can really pinpoint and say, 'That's the problem'. It's just little things."

Lanny enjoyed a brilliant amateur career, highlighted by a victory in the 1970 U.S. Amateur. It wasn't any surprise when he became an immediate success on the PGA Tour. After earning his players' card in the Fall of 1971, he went on to win the 1972 Sahara Invitational.

His superb play continued through 1973, winning \$200,455, with victories in the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas and the USI Classic in Sutton, Mass. His game started to sag in 1974. As the year progressed, he found it difficult to maintain his energy. In the Fall his ailment was diagnosed as a diseased gall bladder and in early December, he underwent an operation for its removal.

Going against doctor's orders, he returned to the PGA Tour in less than three months. Still weak, he developed bad habits and he admits it wasn't until mid-1976 that he was able to get his game back in its original groove.

In 1978, refusing to rest on his laurels, Tom Watson became the first golfer ever to sweep the PGA Tour money title, PGA Player of the Year Award and Vardon Trophy in back-to-back seasons.

After winning four PGA Tour events and the British Open in 1977, Tom cemented his reputation as one of the world's premiere golfers in 1978. Watson won five times, breaking a pair of PGA Tour records—both previously held by Johnny Miller—along the way. His official earnings of \$362,429 topped Miller's old mark of \$353,021, set in 1974.

Watson also earned his first million dollars faster than anyone ever had on the Tour. His career winnings passed seven figures with his victory in the Byron Nelson Classic, approximately six years and seven months after his first check on the Tour. That broke Miller's old standard of six years, nine months.

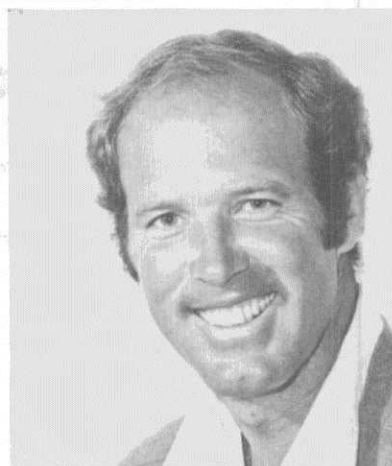
Aside from two consecutive missed cuts in the Doral-Eastern Open and the Tournament Players Championship in March — his only two of the year — Watson's performance never ebbed. He won the first tournament of the year, the Joe Garagiola Tucson Open, leading from wire to wire. He won two weeks later, defeating Ben Crenshaw in a playoff at the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am. He won the Byron Nelson in the middle of the schedule, and his victories in the Colgate Hall of Fame and the Anheuser-Busch Classic came in consecutive starts at the end of the 1978 slate.

At the Masters, Watson nearly made it two green jackets in a row. After a first-round 73, Tom came back with 68-68-69 and tied for second, a single stroke behind Gary Player. In the PGA Championship at Oakmont, Watson started 67-69-67 and led after each of the first three rounds. But he slipped to a 73 on Sunday and was caught by Jerry Pate and John Mahaffey, who won the three-way playoff on the second extra hole.

Tom first gained national attention in 1974. He led the U.S. Open at Winged Foot after three rounds, but a final 79 dropped him to a share of fifth. Shortly thereafter, however, he scored his first PGA Tour victory, coming from six shots back with a closing 69 to win the Western Open.

Watson was only six years old when his father, a scratch golfer, exposed him to the game. He became a four-time winner of the Missouri Amateur and played three years at Stanford University before graduating in 1971 with a degree in Psychology.

Tom Weiskopf earned more than \$100,000 in 1978 for the eighth consecutive year, but made less money than he had in any season since 1971. One factor was his reduced playing schedule: Tom entered 20 events in 1978, compared to 23 in 1977 and 27 in 1976.

Weiskopf snared his 13th PGA Tour victory last year, besting fellow Ohioan Jack Nicklaus in a searing duel in the Doral-Eastern Open. Paired with Nicklaus for the 36-hole finale, (caused by a Thursday rainout) Weiskopf took the lead with a third-round 67 that put him two strokes ahead of his closest pursuers and four in front of Jack.

Both played the front side of the final 18 in 35, but Nicklaus scorched the back nine with two eagles and a pair of birdies for a six-under 30 that gave him a 65 for the round. But Tom was equal to the challenge, responding with a 33 for a finishing 68 that held off Nicklaus by one stroke.

Other than Doral, Weiskopf enjoyed his best 1978 finishes in the U.S. Open and the PGA Championship. He tied for fourth in both events.

In 1977, Tom won the Kemper Open for the third time, closing with a two-under 70 that turned back Bill Rogers and George Burns by two shots. That victory began a torrid four-week stretch in June in which Weiskopf also tied for fourth at Memphis, placed third in the U.S. Open and gained solo fourth in the Western Open.

Long regarded as one of the most talented players on the Tour, Weiskopf proved in one dazzling spell in 1973 that he is capable of reaching unusual heights. During eight weeks that Spring and Summer he won five tournaments, including the British and Canadian Opens. Carrying over to two other tournaments, he shot in the 60s in exactly half of his 40 rounds.

Later in 1973, Weiskopf also won the World Series of Golf and the South African PGA Championship. Although failing to win in 1974, Weiskopf passed the \$1 million barrier in career earnings and finished in the top 10 in nine of 21 events. In 1975 he was a winner again and easily topped \$200,000 for the second time.

Fuzzy Zoeller's statistics have improved geometrically since he joined the PGA Tour after the 1974 Qualifying School. From 1975 through 1978 his money-winnings have jumped by \$45,239, \$23,860 and \$32,638, respectively. During that span, he has lowered his position on the money list by 90, 16 and 20 places.

Fuzzy's best opportunities for victory in 1978 came in a three-tournament stretch in April. At the Greater Greensboro Open, he tied for second with Jack Renner, one stroke behind winner Seve Ballesteros. Two starts later, after missing the cut in the Houston Open, Zoeller tied for second again, this time in the First NBC New Orleans Open.

In the New Orleans event, Fuzzy opened 70-65-70 and entered the final round tied for the lead with Lon Hinkle, Gibby Gilbert, Gary Player and Homero Blancas. Zoeller and Gilbert posted five-under 67s and then watched as Hinkle birdied the last hole for a 66.

Until the Ed McMahon Quad Cities Open of 1976, Fuzzy attracted attention on the PGA Tour principally because of his distinctive first name and the extreme length of his shots. After that event's first round, Zoeller strolled into the press room at Oakwood C.C. and said: "I was told to come down for an interview." "What did you shoot?" someone asked. "I birdied the last eight holes for a 63," he said calmly, before breaking out in a wide grin.

The score not only set a course record, but the string of birdies tied the all-time PGA Tour mark set by Bob Goalby in the 1961 St. Petersburg Open.

Zoeller grew up alongside a fairway at the Valley View CC in New Albany, Ind., and it seemed natural when he started swinging a golf club at age three. He entered his first tournament two years later. He enjoyed all sports while growing up, but when he was eight his father said to him, "Son, all we're doing is running back and forth between the golf course and the baseball diamond. You had better choose one."

Fuzzy chose golf, but during his days in high school he played varsity basketball, mainly, he said to "keep in shape for golf, and in Indiana in the winter you can't play golf."

He was second in the State scholastic golf tournament in 1970 and went to Edison Junior College in Florida, where he won the State Junior College title before entering the University of Houston.

# The Championship

The fourth edition of the new World Series of Golf—truly "The Championship of world class players"—will be contested over the South Course of Firestone Country Club, Akron, Ohio, Sept. 27-30, 1979. The purse will be \$400,000 with \$100,000 going to the Champion.

The field will be a minimum of 36 players.

If it becomes necessary to complete the field, players will be selected from the PGA Tour Official Money List in order after the 10th position at the end of play in the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic on September 23, 1979.

Players eligible for the 1979 Championship include:

- The defending Champion, Gil Morgan.
- Winner, 1979 Tournament Players Championship.
- Winner, 1979 PGA Championship.
- Winner, 1979 U.S. Open.
- Winner, 1979 British Open.
- Winner, 1979 Masters.
- Winner, 1979 U.S. Amateur (provided he is still an amateur).
- Winner, 1979 British Amateur (provided he is still an amateur).
- Winner, 1979 Western Open.
- Winner, 1979 Canadian Open.
- Individual low scorer in 1978 World Cup.
- First three finishers in each of the Seasonal Championships—the Winter Tour, Spring Tour and Summer Tour.
- Winners of two or more cosponsored events on the PGA Tour in the preceding 12-month period.
- The top three leaders in each of the British and Japanese Order of Merit rating systems, and the top two finishers in the South African, Australia and Asia Golf Circuit Order of Merit systems.
- Top ten leaders on the PGA Tour Official Money List, beginning Jan. 1, 1979, concluding Sept. 23, 1979.

## Winter, Spring and Summer Seasonal Championships

The PGA Tour schedule is divided into three seasonal segments to give continuity to the individual tournaments and to honor players who have performed well during the various seasons. The segments are known as the:

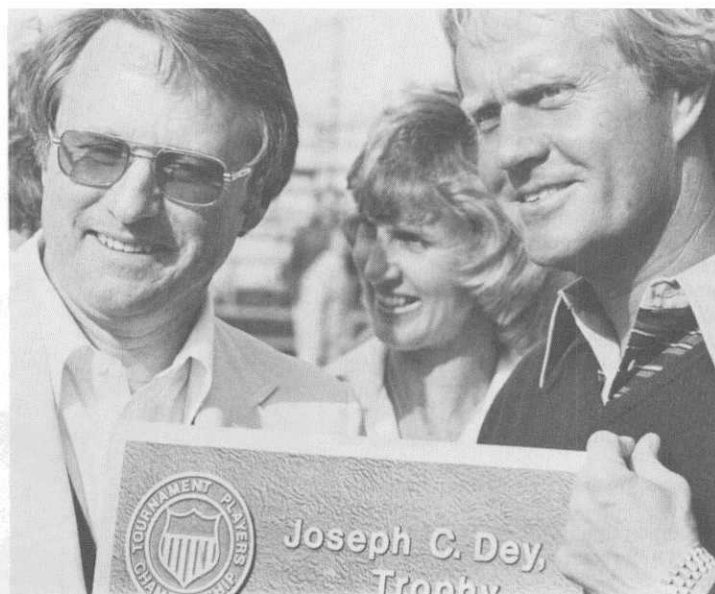
- **WINTER TOUR**, which started with the 1978 Pensacola Open and will conclude with the Doral-Eastern Open, March 18, 1979.
- **SPRING TOUR**, which will start with the 1979 Tournament Players Championship and will conclude with the Atlanta Golf Classic, June 10, 1979.
- **SUMMER TOUR**, which will start with the 1979 U.S. Open and will conclude with the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic, Sept. 23, 1979.

Points are awarded on the following basis: First place, 100 points; second, 57; third, 36; fourth, 22; fifth, 19; sixth, 17; seventh, 15; eighth, 13; ninth, 11; and tenth, 10.

## Nicklaus Scores TPC 'Hat Trick'

Nobody knew quite what to expect at the 1978 Tournament Players Championship. The Sawgrass course had undergone alterations since Mark Hayes won the '77 TPC there with that year's highest victorious score, a one-over par 289.

The par-five fourth hole underwent the most extensive changes. It was redone to play slightly shorter, thus inviting more players to attempt to reach the green in two. (The hole was a little more forgiving, playing to a stroke average of 5.059, compared to 5.144 in 1977.)

Predictions on the winning total in 1978 ranged from even par to eight under. There was just one point of agreement: the treacherous Atlantic winds would once again be the major factor in determining the triumphant tally.

Another factor, as in previous editions of the Championship, would be Jack Nicklaus, winner of the inaugural TPC in 1974 and again in 1976.

It may soon become an axiom that Nicklaus will win the TPC if it's an ever-numbered year, for win it again he did in 1978. And once again, the victor came in at one-over 289. As in 1977, the gusting winds, which abated slightly only for the final round, would not allow low scores to be registered on the 7,139-yard layout. (Mike McCullough's third-round 69 was the only sub-70 score of the tournament.) As Nicklaus commented at the time: "I'm not sure that I won the golf tournament, or if I was the only one left to survive it."

But Jack did not claim his third TPC title without a struggle. He was pursued by a pack of challengers the entire way, and needed to make a difficult par on the 72nd hole to hold off Lou Graham by a stroke.

Seven players were tied for the first-round lead after two-under 70s: Nicklaus, Victor Regalado, Ben Crenshaw, Gary Groh, John Schroeder, Bobby Wadkins and Gibby Gilbert. At the midway point, Nicklaus and Crenshaw were joined at the top by Graham. Ben and Jack carded 71's, while Lou shot 70.

Nicklaus took the lead alone with a third-round 73 that put him at two-under 214, one stroke ahead of Graham. And that's the way it stood as Jack teed it up on the par-five 18th on Sunday: the Golden Bear was one up on Lou, needing a par for a 75 to capture the \$60,000 winner's check.

### Eligibility Requirements for the TPC

The starting field for the 1979 Tournament Players Championship shall consist of 144 players, determined as follows:

- 1) All designated players.
- 2) Winners of major PGA Tour co-sponsored or approved events beginning with the 1978 Tournament Players Championship and concluding with the tournament immediately preceding the 1979 TPC.
- 3) The current British Open champion.
- 4) Leaders in PGA Tour Official Standings as necessary to complete the field, beginning with the 1978 Tournament Players Championship and concluding with the tournament scheduled to end on the Sunday immediately preceding the 1979 TPC, the Doral-Eastern Open.

## ***Morgan Climaxes Fine Year with World Series Triumph***

First he had the lead, and then he lost it. Then he was tied for the lead, but lost it again.

Such was the saga of Hubert Green in the final round of the 1978 World Series of Golf. Green started the last day with a two-shot margin over Dr. Gil Morgan, and after birdies on the first three holes of Firestone C.C.'s South Course, it looked as though he would cruise in to win the \$100,000 winner's share.

But Morgan had other ideas. Playing steady—if unspectacular—golf, Gil caught and passed Hubert on the back side of the demanding, 7,180-yard layout. He finished with a two-under 68 that followed rounds of 71, 72 and 67 and put him at two-under 278 for the tourney.

Playing in the group behind Morgan, Green was faced with the prospect of having to birdie the 465-yard 18th to force a playoff; it had only yielded one birdie that day. Hubert made it two, firing a five-wood to 15 feet and holing his putt.

The sudden-death playoff began—and ended—on the 14th hole. Morgan's second shot on the 410-yard par four was 40 feet from the cup; Green wound up on the back fringe, 25 feet away. Gil stroked his approach putt to within 18 inches, while Hubert's first putt was long and right five feet. Green's second putt also slid by to the right, and Gil tapped in to snare the biggest prize in golf and a ten-year exemption.

The first-round leader was the exciting and talented young Spaniard, Severiano Ballesteros. Seve carded a 69 for a one-shot lead over Green and defending champion Lanny Wadkins. Hubert took the 36-hole lead, shooting a 67 that gave him a two-stroke edge over Ballesteros. At this point, Morgan was six shots back. But Gil lopped four strokes off the lead on Saturday, as Green shot 71 for a 54-hole total of 208, two under par.

Tom Watson finished third, two strokes behind Morgan and Green, and made a little history along the way. His check for \$19,000 gave him \$362,429 for the year, breaking Johnny Miller's four-year-old mark of \$353,021.

Wadkins finished fourth with a creditable 282, but not until the last round did he show the brilliance that smashed the tournament record the year before, when he scorched Firestone in 13-under 267. Lanny's closing 66 was the lowest round in the 1978 World Series.

## RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursomes matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side has been expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

## THE 1979 RYDER CUP

The 1979 Matches will be hosted by The Professional Golfers' Association of America at The Greenbrier in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, September 14-16.

The 1979 PGA champion and the winner of the 1978 World Series of Golf will automatically become members of the 1979 U.S. Ryder Cup team, if otherwise eligible.

Points are awarded to the first 10 positions in each tournament during the appropriate time period on the following basis:

PGA Championship and World Series of Golf: 1st-115; 2nd-70; 3rd-45; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-10.

All other events: 1st-70; 2nd-42; 3rd-28; 4th-21; 5th-18; 6th-14; 7th-11; 8th-10; 9th-8; 10th-6.

If a player who is eligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position.

## THE VARDON TROPHY

The PGA Vardon Trophy, named in honor of the internationally famous British Golfer, Harry Vardon, was placed in competition among American professionals in 1937 as a successor to the Henry E. Radix Trophy, which, prior to that time, had been awarded annually to the professional having the finest tournament record in play in this country.

Today, the Vardon Trophy, a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" x 27" is awarded each year to the member of the PGA of America maintaining the finest playing average in those events cosponsored or so designated by the PGA in each such period. A minimum of 80 rounds in tournaments considered official by PGA is required to win.
