

THE TOURNAMENT POLICY BOARD

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the PGA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the PGA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner, conducts tournament play.

A MESSAGE FROM THE COMMISSIONER

Deane R. Beman

As the most visible organization in golf, the PGA TOUR shoulders an important responsibility to encourage, indeed to inspire, continued growth and expansion of our great game, both at the professional and amateur levels. We have tried to approach that responsibility with vigor and enthusiasm, and we will continue to press forward in the years ahead.

The rapid growth of the PGA TOUR over the past several years has been documented in many ways, and we expect this trend to continue to 1984.

As recently as 1979, the competitive scope of the PGA TOUR was limited to the 45 cities which hosted Regular TOUR events. With the additions, however, of the Senior PGA TOUR and Tournament Players Series since that time, a dramatic



increase in penetration of new market areas has been achieved. In 1984, the number of events under PGA TOUR auspices will total 79, an increase of 76 percent in just five years.

The Regular TOUR consists of 44 events this year, while the Senior TOUR is scheduled for 25 stops and the TPS for 10. The total of 79 constitutes an increase of eight over last year alone.

The steady rise in tournament purses will also continue in 1984, with the total of our three circuits expected to approximate \$26.7 million, up from \$22.3 million last year.

Regular TOUR purses will easily exceed \$19 million, reflecting an increase of approximately \$2 million since last year; Senior prize money will jump by well over \$1 million to more than \$5 million in all; and Tournament Players Series purses will rise by nearly \$300,000 with the addition of a tenth event.

Charitable contributions by PGA TOUR events also continue to swell. A record total of \$7.8 million was contributed to charity in 1983, up nearly \$750,000 over the previous year's then-record total.

In the important television area, our current position is stronger than it has been since the 1970's. After three consecutive years of ratings increases, the TOUR was able to secure last summer the most lucrative network contract in our history, covering the next five years at CBS and the next three at NBC.

We continue to explore the expansion of our television involvement beyond live tournament coverage, including, but certainly not limited to, use of the terrific Shell's Wonderful World of Golf series, to which we obtained the rights last year.

The successful and professional conduct of the tournaments on our three tours remains the most important priority of the PGA TOUR. It is, and should remain, the central function of our organization. But it is through our continued efforts in related areas of promotion, designed to broaden golf's limited base, that the PGA TOUR can make its greatest contribution to the betterment of the game.

We are proud of our role as a leader in the golf industry, and we will continue to work for the advancement of our game.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PGA TOUR

The precise start of the PGA TOUR defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 80th anniversary and continues to thrive on the PGA TOUR with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the PGA TOUR started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDer-

mott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass., and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's PGA TOUR is traced to the early Twenties when, in the winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas, and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the summer. The summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, and Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic polgnancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this Tour Book, our records such as leading money winner, growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth.)

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of PGA TOUR events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the TPA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into purses, accounting for the doubling of prize money in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the value of tournament purses has escalated at an unprecedented rate, PGA TOUR assets have grown from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$15 million today, and total revenues have increased from \$3.9 million to over \$20 million in the same time span.

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR is much broader than a decade ago, due to the introduction of the Senior PGA TOUR and Tournament Players Series in recent years.

In October of 1980, the PGA TOUR moved to its present National Headquarters Building in Ponte Vedra, FL, and just three weeks later, the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass (owned and operated by the TOUR) beckoned in the era of Stadium Golf.

The Tournament Players Club concept has since been expanded to other cities, and a burgeoning family of such facilities is anticipated in the coming years.

ALL EXEMPT TOUR PRIORITY RANKINGS

The 1983 PGA TOUR season represented one of major format change with the introduction of the All Exempt TOUR. For the first time in nearly 20 years, there was no regular ritual of Monday Qualifying for TOUR events; every PGA TOUR member carried exempt status into EVERY open tournament on the circuit.

The result is a PGA TOUR which frees its members of the unnecessary expense and inconvenience of traveling to a tournament site where a single competitive round (Monday Qualifying) determined whether or not they would be able to compete. The very players who normally could least afford such a financial "gamble" were the ones most penalized by Monday Qualifying.

PGA TOUR membership, under provisions of the All Exempt format, includes a sizeable group of players with "special exemptions", those who finished in the top 150 on the final 1983 Official Money List, the low 50 scorers and ties from the Fall Qualifying Tournament, and past champion members.


Each PGA TOUR player has earned a rung on the priority ranking system that will be used in selecting tournament fields. The complete ranking system, in order of priority, is as follows:

I. SPECIAL EXEMPTIONS

- Winners of PGA Championship or U.S. Open prior to 1970 or in the last 10 calendar years.
- Winners of the TOURNAMENT PLAYERS CHAMPIONSHIP in the last 10 calendar years, beginning in 1976.
- 3. Winners of the WORLD SERIES OF GOLF in the last 10 calendar years.
- 4. Winners of The Masters in the last 10 calendar years.
- 5. The leader in PGA TOUR official earnings in each of the last five calendar years.
- 6. Winners of PGA TOUR co-sponsored or approved events (except Team events) within the last two calendar years, or during the current year. (Note: Former tournament winners who previously were exempt from performance review under previous Tournament Regulations will be exempt for open events as follows: 1981 winners exempt for 1984 and 1985; 1980 winners exempt for 1984. Winners of tournaments since 1982 and thereafter are exempt for two years following the end of the calendar year in which they won the events.)
- 7. Members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team.
- 8. Leaders in official PGA TOUR career earnings, as follows:
 - a. Players among the Top 50 in career earnings as of the end of the preceding calendar year may elect to use a one-time, one-year exemption for the next year, provided such player has not previously used (under previous versions of these regulations) one or more years of career money list exemption.
 - b. Players among the Top 25 in career earnings as of the end of the preceding calendar year may elect to use this special exemption for a second year, provided that the player has not previously used both years of this exemption and that the player remains among the Top 25 on the career money list.
- Sponsor exemptions (a maximum of eight, which may include amateurs with handicaps of two or less), on the following basis:
 - Not less than two sponsor invitees shall be PGA TOUR Regular, Life or Past Champion members not otherwise exempt.
 - b. Not less than two of the top 50 finishers and ties from the last Qualifying Tournament, if not all of them can otherwise be accommodated.
 - (Note: PGA TOUR members may receive unlimited number of sponsor invitations. Non-TOUR members may receive maximum of five per year.)
- 10. Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.

The All Exempt TOUR: (cont'd)

- 11. The current PGA Club Professional Champion for a maximum of three open events, in addition to any sponsor selections.
- 12. PGA Section Champion of the Section in which the tournament is played.
- Four members of the PGA Section in which the tournament is played, who qualify through Sectional qualifying competitions.
- Four low scorers at Open Qualifying, which shall normally be held on Monday of tournament week.
- 15. Past champions of the particular event being contested that week, if cosponsored by the PGA TOUR and the same tournament sponsor (except for Team events), as follows:
 - Winners prior to 1970 unlimited exemptions for such events.
 - Winners since 1970 ten years of exemptions for such events.
- II. TOP 125, PREVIOUS YEAR'S OFFICIAL MONEY LIST If not exempt under "Special Exemptions", the top 125 finishers on the previous year's Official Money List, in order of their positions on the list.
- III TPS LEADING MONEY WINNER The leader of the Tournament Players Series Official Money List for the previous calendar year (Russ Cochran in 1984).
- IV. QUALIFYING TOURNAMENT The low 50 scorers and ties from the previous year's PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament, in order of their finish in the tournament.
- 126-150, PREVIOUS YEAR'S OFFICIAL MONEY LIST If needed to fill the field, finishers from 126th through 150th on the previous year's Official Money List, in order of their positions on the list.
- VI. SPECIAL MEMBERS/MEDICAL If granted by the Commissioner, if not otherwise eligible, and if needed to fill the field, Special Members/Medical.
- VII. PAST CHAMPION MEMBERS If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, Past Champion Members, in order of the total number of co-sponsored or approved events won, excluding Team events. If two or more players are tied, the player who is higher on the PGA TOUR Career Money List shall be eligible.

PLAYERS CLUB FAMILY GROWING

If there were an opportunity to create, without major restrictions, the ideal championship golf course, the parameters laid out by Commissioner Deane Beman and designer Pete Dye for the Tournament Players Club® at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra, FL, would provide a fitting model. As home of the Tournaments Players Championship, site of the PGA TOUR's National Headquarters and the "home course" for its members, the Players Club was to be special from the beginning.

The competitive testing of the practical application of those parameters began in 1982 when the course became the fifth and permanent home of the TPC, a tournament which has been contested over four notable courses in the past.

Among the parameters laid down for the Tournament Players Club were provisions for a variety of par five holes. One was to be short and very reachable by virtually every TPC player. Two others, of medium length, would afford skilled and strong players a reasonable option of going for the green in two — but not without the threat of penalty. And the fourth would be a supreme challenge, forcing all players to play it as a three-shot hole.

For the four three-pars, the thinking was to have one short one with a high degree of risk—which the 132-yard 17th hole certainly offers with its island green. Two others, of medium length, require a high degree of skill with medium irons. And the fourth is of substantial length, offering a fittingly larger target green.

The 10 par four holes, likewise, provide a blend of short, medium and long challenges, each with a unique blend of subtleties reflected in waste areas, bunkering, trees, water and length of approach shot. Demands for accuracy from the tee are balanced, as the longer holes provide more spacious fairways, the shorter demanding precision placement.

The overall concept of the course included unprecedented attention to the provisions for galleries, and acres of large spectator mounds afford spectators broad vistas. And the course route plan loops back to proximity of the clubhouse area every three or four holes.

And finally, each hole is a visual pleasure as well as a competitive challenge, together presenting the player with a tremendous variety of strategic decisions to be made and shots to be executed. As a whole, the course was intended to provide such a thorough examination of skill that any deficiency in one area of the game could not be completely overcome by unusual skill in another.

Tournament Players Clubs (cont'd.)

Designed as a prototype for future PGA TOUR tournament facilities, the Players Club at Sawgrass has already fostered three "children", with confirmations of other anticipated in the near future.

The Tournament Players Club at Plum Creek at Castle Rock, CO, was the first of the offspring to be confirmed. Located just 25 minutes south of Denver, the Players Club at Plum Creek will become the permanent home of the Senior TOUR's Denver Post Champions of Golf, perhaps as soon as this summer.

Coral Springs, FL, near Ft. Lauderdale, was the next site selected, and the Tournament Players Club at Eagle Trace is the impressive result. The new home of the Honda Classic, the Eagle Trace facility was officially opened for play December 3, 1983.

The Houston Coca-Cola Open will be the beneficiary of the third confirmed Players Club development at the prestigious Woodlands residential area north of the Houston airport. Under the terms of the agreement, the existing Woodlands East Course will undergo modifications over the next two years to bring it into line with the requirements of a Tournament Players Course, including addition of spectator mounds, etc.

Hopefully by 1985, the tournament will be moved from the West Course to the modified East. The second stage of the agreement with the Woodlands Corporation calls for an all-new Tournament Players Club to be constructed within nine years, also on the grounds of the Woodlands development.

MATCH PLAY RETURNS WITH SEIKO'S HELP

The return of a match play championship to the PGA TOUR schedule for the first time since 1973 is a reality in 1984, thanks largely to the foresight and open-mindedness of Seiko Time Corporation, the commercial sponsor, and the Tucson Conquistadores, the local sponsoring organization.

The Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship, the season's first event, replaces the Tucson Open on the schedule, and provides an interesting format to begin the 1984 campaign. The six-day event includes a Thursday pro-am competition, featuring both Regular and Senior TOUR players.

A total of \$1,014,000 in prize money will be distributed between two segments of the competition, one featuring 128 Regular TOUR players, and the other 24 Senior PGA TOUR stars. The Regular TOUR portion of the purse is \$708,000, while the Seniors will share \$306,000.

Qualification for the Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship was based upon players' standing on the 1983 Seiko Grand Prix Points Lists. In the Regular TOUR portion of the event, the top eight points leaders earned seeds into the fifth round of competition (Saturday), the next eight points earners received first-round byes, and the next 103 points leaders gained entry into the tournament's first round. Nine miscellaneous exemptions complete the starting field of 128.

On the Senior side, the top eight Grand Prix points leaders earned first-round byes, while the next 12 qualified for first-round action. Four special exemptions brings the total number of Senior players to 24.

On the Regular TOUR, Fuzzy Zoeller emerged as the top qualifier, finishing the 1983 season with 583.190 Seiko Grand Prix points to runner-up Hal Sutton's 572. Miller Barber out-distanced Don January for top honors on the Senior TOUR.

Seiko Grand Prix points are awarded to players based upon their performance in individual PGA TOUR events. The winner of each event receives 60 points, the runner-up 48, the third-place finisher 46, fourth place 44, and so on in decrements of two down to 25th place, which is worth two points.



VANTAGE SCOREBOARDS

In an age when the revenue from video games could just about wipe out the national deficit, very little in the way of technology surprises us anymore. Grade school children sit with assurance at computer consoles. Psychological studies are commissioned on the soothing effects of Pac-Man on the business executive. And E.T. really CAN phone home.

Nevertheless, the electronic Vantage Scoreboard systems that travel the PGA TOUR are indeed a phenomenon. Not only do they bring status reports, current scores, biographical and statistical information, special reports and messages to players and fans spread out over many acres, but they also survive a gamut of weather conditions as well as the vagaries of travel as the two systems leapfrog around the nation.

Each of the two systems contains 20 scoreboards, one "big board" for the 18th green, two Digital PDP computers, scoring terminals for each green, a 1,000-pound capacity crane, 30,000 feet of cable and all the necessary lesser hardware. It all fits neatly into custom-designed trailers that also house the computer room in the forward end, and the trailers are pulled along the nation's highways by Peterbilt tractors with turbocharged diesel engines.

Since introduced to the TOUR in 1981 through the sponsorship of the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, the Vantage Scoreboards have amazed millions of spectators with the speed and accuracy of the information provided, and more is planned in 1984. As the Vantage Scoreboard computers are made compatible with the TOUR's on-site statistical computer and the main computer system at TOUR headquarters, the scoreboards will be providing more upto-date information on players' statistical standings, how particular holes are playing in relation to par, and a wealth of other information that will add to the enjoyment of attending a PGA TOUR event

As part of its ongoing commitment to golf, R.J. Reynolds will also continue to bring the Vantage World of Golf display to tournament cities prior to TOUR events and on-site during the event itself. This modern exhibit includes information and displays on the origin of golf, leading players and tournaments, a film on the PGA TOUR, details on the manufacture of modern golf equipment, a putting green for public use and much more.

The Vantage Scoreboards and the Vantage World of Golf are major components of the PGA TOUR's commitment to attract new interest in the game and to make professional golf the world's greatest spectator sport.

John Adams really doesn't remember how old he was when he started to play golf. Smiling, he says, "All I know is I was as young as I could be and still hold a club."

In those days, he does know he played crosshanded and putted the same way. "When I was about three-years old, I finally gave up playing crosshanded, but all my life, I've putted crosshanded."

His father was a golf professional in the Midland, TX, area, but retired when John still was a youngster. However, his father was the man who coached him through the years.

He played in junior events around Texas, although he admits he never won anything. He headed for Brevard Junior College and then off to Arizona State University, and while there, he won the 1975 Arizona State amateur championship.

His success on the PGA TOUR was anything but immediate, but says "I finally found a course I could play, and now we're not playing it any longer."

He was referring to Pinehurst No. 2. In the fall of 1982, he tied with Jay Haas in the Hall of Fame Classic, but lost in the playoff when he bogeyed the second extra hole. However, his check for \$27,000 was more than he had won in any single season. It boosted his season earnings to \$54,014, and that's more than he had won through his first four years on TOUR combined.

"I was so calm all week," he said, "but after the tournament was over, I became real hyper. I will admit that during the tournament, I was playing so well that I didn't want to quit."

He kept telling himself, "just keep doing what you're doing, because whatever happens, it still will be your best week ever."

On the second extra hole, Haas made a routine par, but Adams missed the green. He chipped to within 10 feet and his par putt lipped out of the cup.

His only other top 10 finish came in the Tallahassee Open as a final-round 67 gave him a tie for fifth.

One thing you'll notice about John's record is that he plays a lot. He was in 33 events in 1982 and in 34 in 1983. He upped his money to \$59,287 with the help of two strong finishes near the end of the year. He tied for fifth in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and then tied for third in the B.C. Open.

Isao Aoki hit the shot that was heard around the golfing world in 1983, and Jack Renner still

shakes his head in disbelief whenever someone mentions it.

The stage was the Waialae Country Club at the Hawaiian Open and the set was the 18th hole. Renner was in the scoring tent behind the green, carefully going over his card. He was finished with a

19-under par total of 269 The final group of the day was walking down the 18th fairway, and Isao Aoki was in it. At this point, as he headed for his golf ball in the left rough, some 128 yards from the flagstick on this par five hole, he was one-stroke behind Renner. He needed a birdie to tie, but it would not be easy to get, coming from the tall grass with his third shot.

As Renner studied his card, he heard a roar from the crowd that would shake the palm trees. He

assumed Isao had hit the ball close.

Instead, Japan's greatest player had holed out with a pitching wedge for an eagle three and the victory. "This is the greatest thrill of my career," he was to say later. He thus became the first player from Japan ever to win on the PGA TOUR.

He came close to winning again in the Buick Open, but Wayne Levi came from well back to win

by one over Aoki and Calvin Peete.

Isao was introduced to golf as a caddy at the Abiko Golf Club while attending Abiko Junior High School. During that time, he was known as the "Tokyo Tower," named after the Eiffel Tower, for he was the tallest among the caddies.

He practiced early in the mornings and every evening when there were no members playing the course. Even at that time, it was said he was a good putter and short-game player. Today, if you ask

him what is the strongest part of his game, without hesitation, he would say, "putting."

The 1983 Tour statistics support his claim. He was No. 1 in sand saves, No. 2 in putting and No. 3

in driving accuracy.

He turned professional in 1964 but it took him seven long years to win his first tournament, the Kanto PGA. In his 18-year professional career, he has won 39 tournaments in Japan — including four of the last five PGA Match Play titles — and one in England, the 1978 World Match Play Championship. Five times he has been Japan's leading money winner.

He has won most of the important events in Japan but never the National Open. However, he has been a runner-up four times. He has said, "I will continue to play golf until I do win the Japan

Open.

Although he had played in the United States for several years at such selected events as the Masters Tournament and the World Series of Golf, he first received prominent national attention when he was paired with Jack Nicklaus for four rounds in the 1980 U.S. Open at Baltusrol. He finished second, only two strokes back.

In 1981, he tied for third in the World Series of Golf and tied for fourth in the PGA Championship, while in 1982, he had another third-place finish in the World Series of Golf, two strokes out of the Craig

Stadler-Raymond Floyd playoff.

George Archer will tell you that these days, it's nice to be able to enjoy the scenery and play golf. "I try not to let anything bother me," he has said. "I'm just delighted to be out here playing decently.

Although he didn't collect as much money as he would have liked in 1983, he also will tell you, "It was a good year in many ways. First of all, I was healthy, and that's the most important thing.

He has had his problems in the last decade, first with a wrist and then with an aching back. The last few years, though, he has been relatively pain free, and the big fellow is a pleasant addition whenever he's in the field.

George has been one of the TOUR's finest players for a number of years — when health permitted — but one has to wonder how great he could have been if he had been able to remain healthy. He grins and says, "I'd like to thank my wife publicly for putting up with me and my ailments for the 20-plus years I've been on Tour.

Twice in the last eight years, George has had major surgery. In 1975, he underwent the knife to repair a torn tendon in his left wrist and his effectiveness in 1974, 1975 and part of 1976 was seriously

affected.

He had an excellent 1977, winning \$113,944, but he then encountered a back problem that required surgery in early 1979. He had two discs fused and it wasn't until July of that year that he was able to return to the front line. Because of the problem, though, he only won a total of \$16,941 in 1978

He came back in 1980 and managed to slip into the 60th position on the money list, and thus assure himself of exempt status.

Over his lengthy career, which started in 1964, George has been known for his putting stroke, so it seems appropriate that he owns the all-time TOUR record for fewest putts in a tournament. In the 1980 Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he only needed 94.

Archer began playing golf at age 12 around his native San Francisco and he gathered an exceptional amateur record before he turned pro 13 years later. In 1963 alone he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, the Northern California Open and the San Francisco City title, reached the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International in his home

As a pro he has won 12 events, including three in 1968, but the year following was his most memorable when he captured the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and his one major championship when he beat out Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf to take The Masters.

After a decade of competing on the PGA TOUR, Wally Armstrong announced that it was time to leave the traveling to others and he wanted to spend more time at home with his family.

He said it publicly for the first time at the Greater Milwaukee Open, and then proceeded to play well for the rest of the year. In fact he was third in the Southern Open, collecting \$17,000 and practically assuring himself of a position among the leading 125 money winners and an exemption into 1984. He clinched it the last week with a tie for 20th in the Pensacola Open.

Along the way, he pointed out, "Since I've told everyone that this would be my last year of full-

time play, I've been very relaxed and I think that has helped my golf game."

Wally started to play at age 12 on a nine-hole course outside his home in Indianapolis, IN. His game progressed steadily through high school and he won the state's interscholastic title in 1963. He accepted a scholarship to the University of Florida, and became the Gators captain in 1967 and earned All-American honors.

He turned professional in 1970 but missed qualifying for his TOUR card on two occasions before passing the test late in 1973. He had played well on the mini-tours prior to that, so was confident he

could play in the big time.

His rookie year was a good one, winning \$30,873. He had a strong finish, placing second in the Sahara Invitational and third in the San Antonio-Texas Open. During that time, his brother, Tom, worked as his caddy and they made an excellent team.

In 1975, he won \$44,076, moved in with the top 60 money winners and remained there enjoying exempt status for three more years.

Last year, he had won only \$5,371 through the first six months, missing the cut in nine of 15 starts. His best finish was a tie for 44th in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

While preparing for Milwaukee, he experimented with his putting. Years ago, he recalled, he used to choke down on the shaft. Friends told him he needed to be more upright, but the new technique never seemed to work for him.

So, he decided to choke down again and the improvement in his putting was almost immediate. After three rounds, he was 10-under par and only one-stroke behind the leader, Don Pooley.

He finally finished in a tie for 18th at the GMO, and said it was good to have the old feeling back. Later in the fall, he was only one off the lead being held by Lyn Lott after two days of the LaJet-Coors Classic and the following week was only one behind halfway leader Jim Colbert in the Texas

"I've hit the ball better this year than I have in a long time," he said, "but the thing that has hurt the most until recently has been my putting. I haven't putted just horrible, but awfully horrible."

He still was a doubtful case in terms of the leading 125 when he headed for the Southern, but then settled it in one of his more enjoyable weeks in several years.

It was several years ago after Seve Ballesteros made a strong run for his first Masters Tourna-

ment title that Jack Nicklaus commented:
"Don't you worry about Seve. He will win several of them before he's through."

The very next Spring, in 1980, Seve did win his first Masters and he won impressively, to say the least. He led by seven strokes after three rounds, and finally won by four. At age 23, he became the youngest ever to win this coveted crown.

Without question, the handsome Spaniard was starting to leave his mark. As they say in the

business, this man can play. In fact, most agree that today, there are none better.

He has come a long way in so many ways since he first appeared in a professional golf tournament. The son of a farmer, whose home bordered a golf course, Seve used to caddy and tag along with older brother Manuel.

When Seve was 17, Peter Oosterhuis won the Italian Open, but Seve finished in the top 10. Now, people started to take notice. Two years later, he won his first significant championship, the Dutch Open and gained world-wide attention when he finished second to Johnny Miller in the British Open at

So much has happened since then. He left his mark for the first time in the United States when he came from 10-strokes behind after two rounds to win the 1978 Greater Greensboro Open.

The next year, he won the British Open at Royal Lytham and in 1980 he captured his first Masters Tournament. All along the way, he was winning such events as the French Open, Swiss Open, Japan Open, German Open, the Spanish Open, the World Match play and three times was the No. 1 money winner on the European circuit.

This past year, he only made eight appearances on the PGA TOUR and won a handsome sum of \$210,933. He captured another Masters Jacket. Trailing Craig Stadler and Raymond Floyd by one stroke after three rounds, he went on to win by four over Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite.

In June, he entered the Manufacturers-Hanover Westchester Classic as a warm-up for the United States Open, which was to be played the following week. So, what does he do? He eagled the par five 18th hole the last afternoon to win by two over Stadler and Andy Bean. He had a good Open championship, too, finishing in a tie for fourth place.

Meanwhile, around the European circuit, he won the British PGA Championship, the Irish Open and the Lancombe trophy. He also was instrumental in the strong showing of the European team

against the U.S. in the Ryder Cup matches in October.

It is interesting to note that the first time Seve saw the U.S. shores was as an 18-year old in the fall of 1975. He tagged along with brother Manuel and they competed in the Walt Disney World Team Championship, and then he entered the TOUR's Qualifying School. Unfortunately, he didn't make it.

While he has made frequent appearances on the PGA TOUR in recent years he is playing the

Tour this year as a regular member. He joined last fall.

Life on the PGA TOUR has not been easy for Dave Barr, but the big Canadian found a ray of sunshine in July of 1981. He emerged from a five-way playoff to win the Quad Cities Open.

Dave was highly-successful playing his native Canadian Tour before finally earning his United States Tour card in the Fall of 1977 Qualifying School.

In 1977, he won the Canadian Order of Merit, and five times won events north of the border. Four times, in 1977, 1978, 1982 and again last fall, he was selected to represent his homeland in the World Cup competition. There were many who regarded him as the finest Canadian player since George Knudson.

During his first three years on the TOUR, though, Dave had his problems. "I used to believe I was a pretty good player," he says, "but during the tough years, you begin to wonder about that. I've had to take a back seat to Dan Halldorson and Jim Nelford among the Canadian players.

"It did make a difference when Dan won at Pensacola (in the fall of 1980). He suddenly was the one Canadian everyone recognized, but what it also did was make everyone realize there were Canadians who could play and win on the TOUR," he added.

When the final round started at Quad Cities, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in TOUR history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his elusive triumph.

It was worth \$36,000 and that nearly equaled his entire career earnings to that point, and nearly doubled the amount he won in 1980.

"This is great," he said. "It's what we all play for out here. When things are not going well, you sometimes wonder if you made the right decision. Winning makes it all worth it."

With the new all-exempt TOUR, the victory at Quad Cities placed Dave in a special category and thus will be exempt through 1985.

He had his best money year on TOUR in 1983, winning \$52,800.

A special prize nearly came his way in the summer of 1982, but he lost a playoff in the Canadian PGA Championship to Jim Thorpe.

There is every reason to believe Andy Bean is ready to blossom out as one of the outstanding players in the world. He has been regarded as one of the bright stars in the game for several years, but a wrist injury in 1981 slowed his progress toward the top.

Even though he has been successful moneywise the last two years, he said last fall that "I'm just starting to get the feel back. For the first time since I hurt my wrist, I feel I can play the way I want again. About midway through the year, I could feel the shots coming back. I just have to work on my putting.

Nevertheless, he won nearly \$390,000 in the last two years, so you can imagine what the results might have been if he had been 100% through that period of time. He injured his left wrist at the 1981 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open, but continued to play. A week later, despite some pain, he was at his brilliant best, winning the Bay Hill Classic by seven strokes over Tom Watson.

Although he stayed on TOUR for the next few weeks, he finally had to call it quits at the USF&G Classic in New Orleans as the pain became more intense. His wrist was placed in a cast. In July, when the cast was removed, it still hurt, and closer examination revealed a slight fracture near the base of the thumb. So, he was off the TOUR until the final two events of the year. Even though he only played about a third of the year, he won over \$100,000.

In his first TOUR victory at Doral, Andy led all four days on the Blue Monster course, shooting 67-67-71-72—277. The win became a birthday present; he turned 24 on the final day, March 13. He also won the Doral-Eastern Open in 1982.

During his rookie year of 1976, Bean's play was disappointing, especially to himself, "It was mainly temperament," he says. "I knew I had the game to play out here, but when I'd make a mistake I'd get hot at myself, and that would make everything worse. I wasn't able to manage my game."

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, Ga., where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, Fla., where his father bought a course.

"I've been lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

When Chip Beck first came on the PGA TOUR, those who knew him well from his college days,

put out the good word. "Watch this young man. He's a winner."

Each year, he has been getting better and on two occasions in 1983 he came close to getting the elusive first victory, as he tied for second twice. He won nearly \$150,000 and it is interesting to note that he led the TOUR in eagles, making 15 of them, and was second in scoring birdies, with 394, just five fewer than leader Hal Sutton.

'There has been a vast improvement in my game," he said. "The biggest change is in a more concentrated effort to believe in my ability. I'm getting used to TOUR life and really feel a part of it. I

feel I do belong."

He considers driving the ball and chipping as the two strongest parts of his game. A good combination off the tee, he was 29th in distance and 50th in accuracy last year. When everything is right,

he prefers to play with a slight draw.

Chip well remembers the day he was introduced to golf. He was only 10-years old at the time, and his mother was going to the Highland Golf Club in Fayetteville, NC, to attend a clinic that was to be given by the head professional.

"I really didn't want to go," Chip says with a laugh, "but she woke me up at 7 a.m. so that we

could go together. It was being given on the course where Ray Floyd played as a boy.'

Once he started to hit balls, he was hooked. He played all summer and the golf career of Chip Beck was well underway. By the end of the summer, he won the Pee Wee division at the club.

A journalism major at the University of Georgia, he enjoyed considerable success on the Bulldog golf team before setting his sights on the TOUR. As a senior, he was named the Athlete of the Year, and that's the first time a golfer had ever been honored at Georgia. He won six collegiate events, such as the Southern Intercollegiate three times and the All-America championship hosted by the University of Houston. He also won the Dixie Intercollegiate and was an All-America choice three years, twice being on the first time.

Incidentally, in 1973 he was nosed out of the North Carolina State interscholastic title by Scott Hoch. Twice he won the Carolinas Junior title and followed with two victories in the Carolinas Amateur

His best finish in 1982 on the TOUR was a third place in the Hawaiian Open, but he did have two special "thrills." In the Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he won \$10,000 worth of furniture in a closest-tothe-pin contest; and in the British Open at Royal Troon, he was paired with Jack Nicklaus in the third round.

A few days before he headed for the Southern Open in Columbus, GA, last fall, Ronnie Black confided: "I know I belong on the TOUR after the year I've had. I'm not satisfied, but I know I've played even better than what the money list shows."

At that point, this second-year tourist from Lovington, NM, had quietly accumulated more than \$40,000 and was assured of exempt status for 1984. The finest was yet to come.

He was at his career best on the Green Island course and, when most people were cheering Sam Torrance, the flamboyant Scot who stopped off on his way to the Ryder Cup matches, Ronnie came from three-strokes behind the last day to tie Sam at nine-under par 271.

They matched pars through the first three overtime holes, and then Black gained the victory with a six-foot putt for a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

Ronnie was nine-years old when he first picked up a golf club. His father was the basketball coach at Lovington (NM) High School, so he grew up in a sports atmosphere. "Dad told me then that I couldn't go to the course until I was able to hit the ball from our front yard, across the road and over a fence on the other side. It was a shot of about 75 yards."

His older brother, James, became the head professional at Pinewood Country Club in Beaumont, TX, and as Ronnie became of age, he took him under his wing. "He recruited me for Lamar University and I worked in his shop for awhile," Ronnie said. "Mostly, though, he let me play and practice."

Until he went to Lamar, he had never played on a course with bunkers or one of championship caliber, but he always dreamed of someday playing on the PGA TOUR.

He went to the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1981 and made it. His first stop was the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in January of 1982 and he recalls, "That was the very first TOUR tournament I had ever seen in person. I was low qualifier at Randolph Park with a 66 and thought I was going to knock everyone dead. I have to admit, I had a rude awakening coming."

"I did a lot of watching the first year," he said, "and I definitely was intimidated. I had never seen talent like that and I had to be the greenest person ever to come on TOUR in recent years."

He only won \$6,329 for the year, so it was back to the Qualifying School in the fall. He finished 39th in his class and headed back out for the 1983 campaign.

There were two important lessons he learned. The first was to straighten out his booming tee shots. He is one of the longest drivers in the game, but sometimes had trouble finding his ball for the second shot.

He also learned how to manage his game better and developed enough confidence to be able to turn a potentially bad round into a decent one.

When he is playing at his best, he fades the ball "just a hair. I stay away from the draw, because it tends to get away from me," he said.

Most important, though, when he steps on the first tee now, he has no doubts about his ability to play on the PGA TOUR. He knows this is where he belongs.

The All-Exempt Tour has worked wonders for a number of players, and although Jim Booros enjoyed his new status last year, he believes it also hurt him.

"I had never been exempt before," he said, "and I think I took it for granted once I obtained it. I played too many weeks in 1983 and it resulted in my mis-managing my game."

Nevertheless, when he needed a push to make the top 125, he got it in the final four tournaments. He made the cut in all four, and his best finish was a tie for 14th, in the Walt Disney World Classic, winning \$7,000. The next week, he only tied for 57th in the Pensacola Open, but the \$560 he won let him slip past former U.S. Open champion Lou Graham and into the 125th spot.

If he had missed, it would have been back to the Qualifying School to try and improve his position, and he certainly didn't want that. He has been in the School n ne times, succeeding twice, the last time in the Fall of 1980.

Let's start at the beginning. Jim enjoyed playing golf around his hometown of Reading, Pa., but basketball was his game in those days. He was named to the all-state team in high school and went to Edinboro State College on a basketball scholarship.

However, late in his senior year in high school, he tore a cartilage in his right knee, and he says, "that had a lot to do with my turning to golf."

After one year at Edinboro State, he left school to devote his time to golf. After he won the 1973 Pennsylvania Public Links crown, he played the mini-tours for three years. On his fifth try in the Q-School, he obtained his card at Brownsville, TX, in the Fall of 1976. He won less than \$2,500 the next year and was off the TOUR again.

"That's when I decided to play on the Far East Tour," he said, and he had good success there during his two swings through that part of the world. He continued to tee it up in the Q- Schools, though, and made it again on his ninth attempt in Fresno, CA in the Fall of 1980.

He never has worked with any special teacher, but over the years, has had help from pros in the Reading-Allentown area of eastern Pennsylvania. When he is playing well, he prefers to draw the ball, and considers his short game and putting the strong points.

His best TOUR finish was a tie for fourth in the 1981 Southern Open, but he considers his tie for 10th in the TPC in 1982 one of the highlights of his career. Last year in the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open, he tied for eighth place, but after five holes the first day, he was six-OVER par. Bob Boyd has seen professional golf from both sides of the counter and every step along the way has been a profitable one, especially experiencewise.

His first year on the PGA TOUR was a good one as he qualified for exempt status as the 122nd money winner on the final list.

"The two things that benefited me the most," he said, "was developing patience with my game and the experience of playing nearly every week, plus meeting so many wonderful people whom I know will be friends for a lifetime. Probably the most satisfying thing was being able to finish among the low 125 money winners my first year on Tour."

He said he knew the TOUR was made up of exceptional players, but until someone is out there, every day, watching the proceedings, it is difficult to imagine just how good they are.

"I'm amazed at how similar all the players are in abilities," he said, adding that "although there is little difference, it's also amazing how big the difference is, when it comes time to play under pressure."

He started to play golf at age seven when the family moved from Mt. Olive, NC, to Wilmington, NC. "It was in the summer, and too late to get on a baseball tearn," he said. "We lived about a block from a golf course and since my parents both played, it was a natural thing for me to do, too."

In high school, he played varsity baseball and golf, but received a full scholarship to the University of Maryland to play golf. His senior year at Maryland, he was the team captain.

He was graduated in the Spring of 1977 and tried the TOUR's Qualifying School at Pinehurst, but missed by a stroke. For the next eight months, he was an assistant at Willow Creek in High Point, NC.

He tried the Q-School again in the Spring of 1978, and missed again by a narrow margin. So, he went to work for Buck Adams at the Country Club of North Carolina and stayed there for more than two years. In July of 1980, he earned Class A status in the PGA of America.

He moved on as the head professional at the Country Club of Charleston, SC, and held that position for two-and-a-half years. He was having some success as a player, such as winning the 1982 Carolinas Open, and the competition bug bit him again. He entered the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall of 1982 and made it, finishing seventh.

His best finish during the past year was a tie for sixth place in the Houston Coca-Cola Open. With the year's experience, he believes he will be better able to find a level of consistency.

His ability to put the tee shot in the fairway has been a strong point, and, when he is on his game, he prefers to play with a slight fade.

Brad Bryant enjoyed moderate success through his first three full years on the PGA TOUR, but his game now has developed to the stage where he is a genuine contender. His two secondplace finishes in 1982 attest to that. He nearly won it all in the Tournament Players Championship and he nearly caught Payne Stewart the final day of the Quad Cities Open.

The end result was that he came within \$424 of earning \$100,000 for the year and as everyone who plays the game knows, that is the mark of true success.

Last year, he had another second-place finish, this time in the Byron Nelson Classic, but he picked a week when Ben Crenshaw was near his all-time best.

"It was a little frustrating in 1983," Brad said, trying to sum it up, "but also very promising. I played very, very well, even better than the year before much of the time, but I would have one-ortwo holes a round that would hold me back. I played a lot better than I scored because I was able to concentrate better.'

Brad started in the game at age 10, going to the course with his father in Rosebud, TX. At age 15, he started to work hard on his game, and he says you can't believe how many golf balls he hit when he was 15-and-16 years old.

The effort made him the terror of New Mexico junior golf. He won the state high school championship as a sophomore and senior, and was third his junior year. As a senior, he won 11 of 12 events entered and carried a plus-four handicap.

He went on to the University of New Mexico and in his third start, won the Harvey Penick Invitational in Austin, TX, sinking a birdie putt on the final hole to edge Keith Fergus of the University of Houston.

About that time, his college coach decided to change Brad's swing "to get me lower to the ball." With the change, went his game. Finally, a few years ago, Brad went to Bill Eschenbrenner at the El Paso Country Club and "he helped me get my game back to TOUR status."

During the TPC in 1982, Brad was tied with Bruce Lietzke after three rounds at six-under par 210. Jerry Pate, the eventual winner, was three strokes back.

"I thought I was going to win it until I had a bad lie at the 11th and took a bogey," Brad said. "But, when I birdied the 14th, I felt I had a chance again." He was in a tie for the lead with the brothers-in-law, Pate and Lietzke.

However, Brad three putted the 15th, and even though he came back with a birdie at the 16th, he couldn't catch Pate who birdied the final two. So, Brad finally tied with Scott Simpson, two behind Pate.

After George Burns matched the Congressional Country Club course record with a brilliant eight-under par 64 in the first round of the Kemper Open, he said, "It was a magic round."

He then revealed, "I've been working with Jim Flick, and we've torn my swing apart. I've been on the Tour all these years and really didn't know how to play with the swing I've been using. This hasn't been a good year, but I'm going to stay with the changes, because I feel they will help me in years to

By George Burns' standards, it did not turn out to be a good year. "I had some injuries," he said, "but I feel I've been learning the ropes all over again."

It was a difficult year for him because through his career, he has been used to seeing his name on the leader board frequently. His best finish was a solo third in the Doral-Eastern Open. Incidentally, he finally finished in a tie for 13th in the Kemper Open.

George's first victory came in 1979 at the Walt Disney World National Team Play event and he had Ben Crenshaw for a partner. At the time, he said Ben gave him the boost he needed, and was certain it would pay off, confidence-wise.

Early the next year, it did just that as he won the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur and soared on to a \$219,928 year.

Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

However, it was a full year after his graduation before he blossomed as a force in amateur golf. While working for two years in the New York City area in sales and promotion, he had a chance to play often, and in 1973 he won the Canadian Amateur. The following year Burns won the Porter Cup, North-South Amateur and the New York State Amateur.

Burns was selected to play on the Walker Cup team in 1975 and also on the U.S. side in the World Amateur team championship. "Playing for my country on those teams always will be among the biggest enjoyments I've had in sports," he says today.

There was both sadness and joy for George Cadle at the Greater Milwaukee Open last July. He was disappointed that he lost the playoff to Morris Hatalsky, but he was delighted to collect the runner-up check for \$27,000.

It was the closest he had ever been to victory through his nine years on the TOUR, and it was a last-day 64 at the Tuckaway Country Club that made it possible for him to reach the playoff.

In 1982, George finished 127th on the money list, so, early in the year he didn't have too many opportunities to compete. "It was tough sitting at home watching television and seeing the guys I felt I could beat playing the TOUR. I was determined to get back into the top 125."

He said his poor showing in 1982 "took some of the enthusiasm for the game away from me." His Milwaukee finish and a tie for eight in the Texas Open gave him \$51,458 for the year and 99th place.

Only once before was George able to enjoy exempt status. In 1980, starting with the Greater Milwaukee Open, he collected checks in 10 of his last 11 starts, finishing with \$75,265 and 55th place.

Although he makes his living playing golf, his friends believe his heart is on the auto race tracks of the world. "I've always liked cars," he said, "and when I was growing up in Kentucky, it was something all my buddies were involved in, so I was involved, too."

George started to play golf at about age seven in his hometown of Middlesboro, KY. The junior dues at the local nine-hole course were only \$12-a-year. "I'd play until I ran out of golf balls, and then I'd rake the creeks to find some more," he recalls. "I played every day."

After he was graduated from high school, he was lured to the University of Houston, and was in the freshman class with John Mahaffey and Tom Jenkins. After three semesters, he transferred to the University of Tennessee.

Early in 1970, an old friend from Middlesboro and former TOUR player, Moon Mullins, invited him to the new resort, Half Moon Bay, Calif.

From there, George played the mini-Tours, and three times tried to obtain his PGA TOUR card before finally succeeding in the fall of 1974.

"I kept getting a little better each year," he said, "until 1978, and then I slipped back." That was when he started to work a little more on his game, and it payed off.

He prefers to fade the ball off the tee, but believes his irons are the strongest part of his game. "I was ninth in hitting greens in regulation last year," he said, "so I must be a pretty good iron player."

Rex Caldwell was tied for the lead after three rounds of the five-day Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity

Classic, and he made it very clear what he wanted to do.

"I want to win," he said. "I've been on the TOUR for nine years now, and I think I'm the only guy out here who hasn't won. Just one week, I would like to be able to say I was the best; I beat them all. I don't care about the money. They can give me just \$10 if they want. I want to win."

He didn't have to wait long. He finished second for the fourth time in the year at Vegas; but the

next week, he won in his new home town of Abilene, TX, in the LaJet Coors Classic.

Rex simply went out and won it. He was six-strokes behind Lee Trevino going into the windy final day, and proceeded to shoot a nifty little six-under par 66 for a six-under par total of 282. He put his number on the board early and no one could catch him. Trevino finished second, one-shot behind.

'It's the thrill of a lifetime," he said. "I'm kind of speechless, and as you know, that's unusual for

me." He said of the 66, "Yes, under the circumstances, it was the best round of my life."

Earlier in the year, Rex gained national attention for finishing second three straight weeks, twice losing in playoffs. Keith Fergus bumped him on the first extra hole in the Bob Hope Classic. Bob Gilder needed eight extra holes to beat him in the Phoenix Open, and then he tied for second in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am.

Incidentally, when he did win at the LaJet, he accepted his check for \$63,000. Interestingly enough, the biggest check of his career came the week before when he was second to Fuzzy Zoeller in Las Vegas, \$81,000.

In December, he joined with John Cook to represent the United States in the World Cup competi-

Rex is no stranger to the front-running role. He received considerable national attention in 1979 when he led the PGA Championship at Oakland Hills by two strokes after three rounds over Ben Crenshaw. Rex had a final-day 71, but David Graham and Crenshaw were in the playoff while Rex had to settle for third place.

After he joined the TOUR for the start of 1975, he experienced three slow years and blamed most of it on his putting. After three-putting himself out of the 1978 Hawaiian Open, he went home and spent an entire week practicing his putting, from dawn to dusk, as he said. He went to the Bob Hope Desert Classic the next week and finished fourth, and has been cruising ever since.

Rex started to play the game at age 14. He was convinced that this was his game after a few trips to the club with his father. He made the Lompoc (CA) High School team as a sophomore.

After two years at Junior college, he earned a golf scholarship to San Fernando Valley State and began to take his game seriously. He had dreams of playing on the PGA TOUR, but it wasn't until after he worked one summer at the Arnold Palmer Golf Academy at Stratton, VT, and then spent two years on the mini-tours that he felt his game was ready

Arnold Palmer was the first man to pass the \$1 million mark in TOUR earnings, and Billy was the second, reaching the figure in 1970.

There have been few in the game any better than this Hall of Famer.

Tze-Chung Chen didn't start to play golf in his native Taiwan until he was 17-years old, and now, here he is, eight-years later, competing against the finest professionals in the world.

As a matter of fact, he quietly challenged them last year and did very well, indeed. He won \$79,030. The only player from the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1982 who did better was Ronnie Black.

"The Tour is very hard," he said, "and a difficult way to make money. For me, travel and transportation was the biggest problem, because I had to go pretty much on my own."

He finished fifth in the Q-School and in his third start on the TOUR, he tied for seventh in the Bob Hope Classic, thanks to a brilliant final-round eight-under par 64 at LaQuinta.

His best finish was in the Kemper Open at the Congressional Country Club in Bethesda, MD. He was in a playoff with Fred Couples — the eventual winner — Gil Morgan, Scott Simpson and Barry Jaeckel.

He had rounds of 69, 73 and 69, but the last day all the top contenders collapsed, so he was right in line with his 76 for a 287 total. "I do my very best, that's all, "he said of the 76.

The most costly hole to him was the 17th, when he suffered a double bogey. He was over the green with his tee shot on the par three hole, chipped on and three putted. Smilling, he admitted, "I can't chip very well out of long grass."

His older brother, Tze-Ming Chen, started him in the game, and he still does very well on the Asian/Japan tours. In fact, Tze-Ming won the Chunichi Crowns event in Japan in 1982. "I would like him to come to the United States and play with me, T.C. said. "I think he would do well," too."

The Chens lived near a golf course in Taipei, and he said, "everyday, I would watch people play golf, and then I would caddy for my brother."

He progressed so rapidly, that in 1980, he was selected to play on Taiwan's World Amateur Cup team and competition was held in Pinehurst. "I finished second to Hal Sutton," he said proudly.

He turned professional just after that, and played on the Asian Tour for two years, "I thought it would be good for me to come over here and try for the experience," he said.

A very personable fellow, he is called T.C. by his friends. Driving the ball is his strong point. "I'm not very long, but I can hit it straight," he said.

When he needs help, he goes to his brother, but it is difficult since he is so far away. He said he went home three times in 1983. "It takes 15 hours from Los Angeles," he pointed out.

There seems to be little doubt that Bobby Clampett will win many times during his career on the PGA TOUR and that his star will shine brightly for years.

It took him longer than he expected to win his first event, the 1982 Southern Open, but after finishing second four times in 1981—twice losing in playoffs—his peers knew he was here to stay.

While his first two full years were very productive and satisfying, Bobby says he learned a valuable lesson in the less-than pleasing 1983.

"From a playing standpoint," he said, "it was a rather disappointing year, but in all types of adversity, there's always good and some good did come out of the year. When things are not going well, you learn to appreciate everything more.'

Although he had two fifth-place finishes, his strongest bid for victory came in the Tournament Players Championship. He was one-stroke off the pace being set by John Cook after three rounds, but finished with a 77 to tie for 10th place.

He joined the TOUR in August of 1980 after winning \$7,250 in the Buick Open. That gave him more than the minimum guideline of \$8,000 needed to become a member without going through the rigors of the Qualifying School.

Bobby started to play golf at age 10, using his father's old clubs. Lee Martin, who was the pro at the Carmel Valley Ranch at the time, gave him his first lessons. "I worked at the club, doing odd jobs," he recalls, "and my pay was playing privileges. Mainly, I picked up range balls."

When he was 13, Ben Doyle assumed duties at the club, and he became Bobby's tutor — and he still is.

He started playing tournament golf at age 11, and the next summer, he made a big decision. "I gave up a chance to be a starting pitcher on a Little League team to concentrate on golf," he recalls.

He was successful in California Junior golf, and in 1976 and 1977, he was the state's leading point getter. In 1977, he won the California State junior title.

He moved on to Brigham Young University, where, for three years, he worked on his golfing skills and his education. "I wanted that balance," he said, "and that is why I chose BYU."

He received an associates degree in French in 1980, and speaks the language fluently.

Since he played in six tournaments in 1980, he was not eligible for rookie-of-the-year honors in 1981. However, Bobby Clampett is destined to win many other honors in golf before he leaves the tournament trail.

Lennie Clements is another of those fellows who was so determined that he would make it onto the PGA TOUR, that he worked exceptionally hard until he did. And, when he earned his TOUR card in April of 1981, he proved he belonged.

He earned the right to play in the big time the hard way. After failing to make it in the TOUR school, he made it via the Open Qualifying/making the cut route, finally meeting the minimum money guideline in his 10th and final chance at the Magnolia Classic. He won \$3,150 there after a tie for fifth, and became a member the next week at the Tallahassee Open.

He had two strong finishes in 1982 on two of the toughest courses on TOUR. He tied for fourth in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open after making five straight birdies in the last round en route to a closing 66 at the Riviera Country Club.

He was paired with Jack Nicklaus for the third round at the Colonial National Invitation at the Colonial Country Club. Lennie was the second-day leader, one ahead of Nicklaus and Tom Kite, but a third-round 75 cost him a chance for victory. Still he tied for fifth.

It is interesting to note that Lennie shot 66-69 for his first two rounds in his inaugural NIT, yet he did not receive a call to compete until early Tuesday morning of that week after another player had withdrawn.

It was a special treat to be paired with Nicklaus, but before the round, he was asked if he knew Jack. Grinning, he replied, "I met him once at Pebble Beach, but I'm sure he doesn't remember me."

Last year, a tie for third in the Miller High-Life QCO was his best, but his next two high finishes came in the United States Open (tie 13th) and the Tournament Players Championship (tie 19); once again showing his ability to play the hardest courses well.

"Without the Monday qualifying this past year," he said, "I felt more comfortable. It was a good year to get used to the over-all life on TOUR."

He said he has been working to lengthen his game off the tee. "I've made a couple of other positive changes in my swing, changes I had to make to stay on TOUR."

Two fellows from San Diego, Jack Harden and Ben Stewart, have been the most instrumental in molding his game. Driving, short irons and putting are the strong points, and, when things are going well, he plays the ball left to right.

A new dimension was added to the PGA TOUR in 1983, and a young lefthanded golfer named Russell Earl Cochran from Paducah, KY, was delighted with it.

Russ finished in the second 50 scorers in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1982 and when the Tournament Players Series blossomed onto the scene last Spring, he was eligible to participate.

The result was he collected two victories — Magnolia Classic and Greater Baltimore Open won \$100,863 in eight starts to be the leading money winner and thus gained his exempt status on the regular TOUR for 1984.

He only collected \$7,968 in 18 Tour events, but his position on the TPS Tour elevated him into the 126th position on the exempt list. Each year, the leading money winner on the TPS Tour will follow the 125th money winner on the priority list.

It is interesting how quickly everything turned around for him early last year. "I was sponsoring myself," he explains, "but after the first three months, I was running out of money." He had won only \$3,500

'The Magnolia Classic (opposite the Masters Tournament) was the first of the Tournament Players Series. I wanted to go there to see how I would do, but if I didn't do well, I would have to go home and try to find a sponsor for the rest of the year. I was hoping to get a sponsor's exemption at Magnolia, and I did.'

The result was a victory and a check for \$27,000, setting him up for the rest of the year.

The first year on TOUR," he said, "it doesn't take long to realize you control your own destiny. It's your performance that counts, so you tend to worry about your game, instead of going out and playing the way you believe you can.'


Russ started in golf when he was about 10-years old. He used to to a neighboring course with his older brother. A couple of years later, when he won a state age-group tournament, he truly was hooked. He played junior golf in the area and then through high school, winning the state scholastic title in 1975. He then went to the University of Kentucky and played for three more years.

Thad friends who were playing the mini-tours, so I decided to give it a try," he recalls. "I went to the TOUR school but didn't make it until my third try in the Fall of 1982."

After a pause, he added, "I'm not sure what would have happened without the Tourname-t Players Series. To this point, it turned my career around."

Oh, yes, he does play lefthanded. "When I was younger, I used lacies' clubs because they were the only lefthanded ones I could find. Several people told me I should switch around and try to play righthanded, but no one made a real effort to change me, so I stayed with it. I do everything lefhanded, anyway.

Including, as it turned out, accepting healthy checks on the Tournament Players Series.

Jim Colbert set a couple of goals when 1983 started and for a fellow heading for his 42d birthday and 18th year on the PGA TOUR, they seemed rather lofty. He wanted to win at least two tournaments during the year and also \$200,000.

"They were not pipe dreams," he said, even though he had never accomplished either one before during his career. He even went to far as to promise his secretary that if he achieved them, he would give her an all-expense paid vacation to Hawaii.

Well, she got her trip because Jim did have the greatest year of his life, winning the Colonial National Invitation after a playoff with Fuzzy Zoeller, and then the Texas Open in San Antonio. He also raked in \$223,810.

He knew that sooner or later he would win in San Antonio. It has a special place in his heart. It was there in 1966 that he won his first check as a member of the TOUR, and it was there in the 1982 Texas Open that he went over the \$1 million mark in career earnings.

Jim was an all-state football player in Kansas and went to Kansas State University on a scholarship, but he switched to golf full-time when he lost his desire for combat after his freshman year.

He won the Kansas State junior golf title at age 11, so he knew at an early age he could play this game, too. He was second in the 1964 NCAA tournament and won the 1965 Kansas Amateur. That fall, he went to the TOUR's Qualifying School and made it.

The first victory was a long time coming, in the 1969 Monsanto Open in Pensacola. His most memorable victory might have been in the 1974 American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club in Akron. He had to defeat Raymond Floyd, Gay Brewer and Forrest Fezler in the playoff.

The next few years, Jim suffered with knee and back problems, but he continued to work hard at his game, grinding out whatever he could. His perseverance finally paid off in 1979 and he has been playing well since.

The fine 1980 season was highlighted by a victory in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. Because of rain-and-flood conditions, he didn't nail it down until Tuesday afternoon, winning by four over Dan Halldorson at Tucson National Golf Club.

He currently is serving his third term as a member of the TOUR's Policy Board. He was a Player Director in 1974-to-1976; again in 1981-to-1983; and was re-elected last fall to a four-year term.

There are only two men in sports who can claim they have played in United States Open Charnpionships in golf and tennis. Frank Conner is one of them and Ellsworth Vines is the other.

While Frank started to play tennis as a 10-year old in Belleville, III., he didn't begin to swing the

clubs until 1970, when he was 24 years old.

"When I decided to switch to golf," he says, "I did so with the intention of being a professional. I felt I wasn't going anywhere in tennis, beyond what I had already done."

As a sophomore and junior at Trinity University, he was an All-American choice in tennis. He won the National Junior tennis title at age 17 and played in three Opens at Forrest Hills

During the transition period, he would teach tennis at Northern Hills Country Club in San Antonic five days a week, and play the mini-tour golf series that was in San Antonio the other two. When that series was completed, he moved on to the mini-tours in the Phoenix area, and was quite successful

"I knew then that I could earn money playing golf, but not that much playing tennis," he admits Four times he attempted to earn his TOUR card, but missed in the Qualifying Schools. Finally, in the Fall of 1974, he made it. In recent years, he has played numerous practice rounds with Lee Trevino, and says, "That has helped me tremendously, just watching how he plays the game and thinks his way around a course."

Frank has had his good moments on the TOUR, such as finishing in a tie for second in the 1979 New Orleans Open, one behind Hubert Green. He led the 1980 IVB-Philadelphia Classic after three rounds, but Doug Tewell came on strong to win.

In 1981, he tied with four others in the Quad Cities Open but Canadian Dave Barr won the playoff. He played the strong courses well, as he tied for sixth in the U.S. Open at Merion, was sixth alone in the Colonial National Invitation and tied for eighth in the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass.

He made another strong bid for victory in the 1982 Sea Pines Heritage Classic. He led by one after three rounds, but Tom Watson caught him the last afternoon and then won on the third extra hole of the playoff. Actually, Watson was in the lead until Frank holed a 30 footer for birdie at the pathree 17th.

He had a chance to win it on the second extra hole, but missed a 12 footer for birdie, and then on the third extra hole (the 18th on the course), his two iron approach slid left of the green and he suffered a bogey

Last year, a tie for fifth place in the Buick Open was his best, but he said it was an "unusual year for me because I didn't putt well. That's usually one of my strong points.'

Everyone loves to see a young man rewarded for hard work, so it was especially pleasing to see John Cook have his finest year by a wide margin. As they say, nice things do happen to nice people John was injured a good part of 1982 and his results on the TOUR reflected it. Last year, he says "I was semi-healthy, but in the Fall of 1982, I worked hard to get my game in shape and I continued to

work hard all year. It's gratifying to have it pay off."

After a pause, he added, "Hopefully, it will pay off in the years to come, too."

He won the Canadian Open in a stirring six-hole playoff over Johnny Miller and accumulatec

seven top ten finishes. The one that got away, though, left a scar for awhile.

Hal Sutton was in the scoring tent behind the 18th green after his final round of the Tournament Players Championship with a five-under par 283. John was on the 18th tee, needing a par four to tie. Unfortunately, he hooked his tee shot into the water at the Players' Club, suffered a double bogey and tied for third place.

In 1982, John suffered an injury to his left wrist and elbow at the Honda-Inverrary Classic, but instead of taking the necessary time to recover, he continued to play, thus aggravating the situation.

One of his best-ever efforts on TOUR came in the 1981 Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, when he was tied with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. John finally won the title on the third extra hole, ousting Irwin. Crenshaw, Clampett and Thompson were eliminated on the first extra hole. Due to heavy rains, it was a 54-hole tournament.

He has always known of the thrill of victory. He tasted it early when in 1974 he defeated Gary Hallberg for the World Junior crown. John's biggest title came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur

Championship. The next year, he lost in the final to Mark O'Meara.

At Ohio State University, he was an All-American choice three years, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. That same year, he represented the United States in the World Amateur Cup team. Last December, he was on Uncle Sam's World Cup team with Rex Caldwell.

John started to play golf at an early age, and while his parents encouraged him, they didn't push.

He played high school basketball and some football.

Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf convinced him he should go to Ohio State, even though his school years were spent in southern California. Years ago, his father had coached in Ohio, and also worked for Firestone Tire & Rubber Company in Akron.

Choosing between two sports when careers in each are imminent is one thing. It is another thing entirely to choose between two sports when a freshman in high school — and prove nine years later that the decision was absolutely correct. But that was the case with Fred Couples, who was forced to decide whether he would play baseball or golf as a freshman prep star in Seattle. From the looks of his first three years on the PGA TOUR, Couples would have been hard-pressed to make any decision

Those close to the game knew it was just a matter of time before he wrapped up his first victory, and that came last June in the Kemper Open on the tough Congressional course in Bethesda, MD. It wasn't easy. He had to turn back Tze-Chung Chen, Barry Jaeckel, Scott Simpson and Gil Morgan in a

On the second extra hole, the 211-yard 16th, Fred hit a five iron inside two feet of the hole. He made it for the victory. "I felt like crying," he said, "I've never hit a shot that amounted to so much." It amounted to \$72,000.

Fred has been working with former Masters champion Gay Brewer in recent years, and although bothered by a bad back at times, he has learned to harness his immense power off the tee and thus become a more consistent player.

He only cashed checks in 10 of 28 tournaments in 1982, and last year boosted his production to checks in 23 of 30 starts. "It was just a terrific year for me," he said.

He convinced a lot of people at the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa that his future is very bright indeed. Fred shot a closing four-under par 66 to gain a tie for third place, but during the first round, he really had eyes popping. He birdied the last six holes for a championship record

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. His older brother became a baseball player at the semi-pro level, but even he played on weekends, and eventually the younger Fred joined them.

Within a few years, he was competing in junior events in the Seattle area, and then, in high school, came the big decision, one forced because the golf and baseball seasons overlapped.

At the University of Houston, Couples became a standout, earning All-American honors in 1978 and 1979. After a somewhat disappointing junior season, when Fred finished a solid eighth individually in the NCAA Championship but watched as his Cougar team missed the cut, he decided to drop out of school and tackle the TOUR a year early.

He sailed through the Fall, 1980 Qualifying School and, as 1981 proved conclusively, he again made the right decision.

After he missed the cut in the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills, Ben Crenshaw said he was heading for home and planned "to get away" from the game for awhile. It had been a frustrating year for Gentle Ben, and even 1981 was not up to his standards.

He was ready to play when 1983 dawned, however, and his faithful followers were rewarded with exceptional performances through most of the year. He certainly had his best money year, as he collected \$275,474 and his victory in the Byron Nelson Classic produced one of the most satisfying weeks he has ever enjoyed.

"The first five months or so were very good," Ben said, "because I was so consistent. I was a little up-and-down the rest of the way, but basically it was a very good year. After 1982, it was a particularly satisfying year. In a capsule, all I did was go back to the basics."

He finished his year with a fine performance in the Ryder Cup matches against the European team. The last afternoon, he won an important singles match against Scotland's Sandy Lyle.

Ben finished second in two of his favorite events in 1983 — the Masters Tournament and the Memorial Tournament. Seve Ballesteros was in command at Augusta, but Ben was just one-stroke away from winner Hale Irwin at the Memorial. It was his back-to-back third places early in the year at the Hawaiian Open and then the Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open that assured his fans he was back on track.

He joined the TOUR in the Fall of 1973 after compiling an excellent amateur record. He won the NCAA Championship three straight years for the University of Texas, although he shared it in 1972 with teammate Tom Kite.

Ben earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1973, gaining medalist honors by an incredible 12 strokes over runner-up Gil Morgan. In his first start, the San Antonio-Texas Open, he won by two over Orville Moody. The next event was the 144-hole \$500,000 World Open at Pinehurst, and he finished second to Miller Barber.

Jim Dent turned on one of his brightest smiles and proclaimed, "Oh, yeah, it was a good year in 1983. I played pretty good on the regular Tour and I really enjoyed the new Tournament Players Series."

That he did. He won \$40,423 on the main Tour, but collected a healthy \$35,871 in four TPS starts. One of them was a victory in the Michelob-Chattanooga Gold Cup, worth \$27,000.

Still grinning, he added, "It's a little easier game on the Players Series and it's given me 10-more years of enthusiasm."

Only once before was Jim able to enjoy the luxury of a season-long exemption, so his position among the top 125 money winners on the All-Exempt Tour last year came as a welcome relief. During his 13 years on TOUR, his closest brush with victory was a runner-up finish to Jack Nicklaus in the 1972 Walt Disney World Classic.

During his first three years on TOUR, starting in 1971, Jim says he was known as a "pro golfer," and not a "professional golfer." He wanted to make that change, and be known as a good one in his business.

He was known as the king of the big hitters and was recognized by one-and-all as the longest driver on TOUR. His problem, he says, was finding his golf ball after he hit it.

He had to learn to play all the shots, not just boom the tee ball 300-plus yards. John Goodman gave him some of his early technical training, and Paul Runyan worked with Jim on the short game. For later improvements, he went to Jimmy Ballard.

Jim started in golf as a caddy at the Augusta Country Club, but while in high school in Augusta, he was quite a football player. He never had the opportunity to play much golf in those days, but whenever he could, he would slip over to the "cabbage patch," a local municipal course.

He moved to New Jersey for a short while, and then it was on to Los Angeles where he started to mold his game. "I started to think about playing on the TOUR when I'd see other guys going to the Qualifying School, and, I knew I was better than a lot of them."

He qualified for the TOUR in 1970 and that fact alone, Jim says, gave him more enjoyment than anything else he has done in the game. "It's a privilege," he says.

His only venture into the top 60 money winners, thus earning an exemption, was in 1974 when he finished 59th. He had four top 10 finishes in 31 events that year and only missed the cut three times.

Jim also won the Florida Section PGA championship three straight years, starting in 1976.

Mike Donald always knew he wanted to be a part of the PGA TOUR. After all, that was part of the reason he gave up baseball in the ninth and 10th grade, because he wanted to spend more time on the course.

He knew he could play and so did a lot of other people, especially after he won the National Junior College championship while attending Broward Community College. That earned him a Chris Schenkel scholarship to Georgia Southern University, and now he knew he was well on his way.

In his first tournament, he finished fifth, not bad at all when you consider the players who were 1-2 respectively were Jay Haas of Wake Forest and Chip Beck of Georgia. His parade didn't last long, though, because "I had a conflict with the coach and they took my scholarship away."

So, Mike headed for home. "I didn't have any money, so I delivered flowers and umpired baseball games for a year." Georgia Southern brought in a new coach the next year and Mike was back in school. Before he returned, though, Mike was impressive again as he went to the finals of the 1978 North and South Amateur before losing to Gary Hallberg.

His first attempt at the TOUR Qualifying School was in the Spring of 1979 but he didn't make it. Determined as always, he went back in the Fall of that year and passed with flying colors.

After a so-so first year, he came on strong in 1981 with four top 10 finishes, entering 37 tournaments. Last year, his production slipped slightly, but there were signs of coming back as he made the cut in eight of his last 11 starts. For the second straight year, he was in an ironman role, entering 37 events.

A little more consistency helped Mike to his best money year in 1983, with the biggest checks coming for a tie for third place in the Honda-Inverrary Classic and a tie for fourth at the Byron Nelson Classic. Once again, he didn't miss many. He entered 34 tournaments.

Mike started in the game at age 12. "My parents bought me a set of clubs because they didn't know what else to buy me. I loved to play baseball and I had everything I needed for that sport. They just wanted to get me something different and, even though they didn't play golf, they thought it would be a good sport for me."

And, as is usually the case, Mom and Dad were right.

It is difficult to explain the career of Bob Eastwood, except to say, like a bottle of fine wine, he gets better and better with each passing year.

Since 1976, he has improved his money winnings each campaign to a high of \$157,640 last year. He says with a satisfied smile, "I'm just getting better with age. Physically, I'm in good shape and each year I seem to think a little better on the course. I know I'm striking the ball better.

He points out that for several years, he had a bad case of tendinitis in his elbow, and thus was just making enough on the TOUR to get by. Towards the end of 1980, he started to feel better and the results show it.

This past year, he had his all-time best finish, a second place in the Tournament Players Championship, one-stroke behind Hal Sutton. "I really played well, and deserved to finish that high," he said proudly. He was especially pleased with the fact that on the last day, he had three birdies and no bogeys at the Players' Club for a 69.

He was four years old when he started to play golf. His father was in the golf business in Stockton, CA., and helped to build the Dry Creek Ranch golf club in the 1960s. It was a family affair.

His skills surfaced early, as he won city amateur titles in Stockton and Sacramento. He won the 1966 California State Amateur and while at San Jose State, he won the West Coast Athletic Conference title.

Bob headed for the TOUR Qualifying School in the Spring of 1969 and he not only made it through, but he was the medalist. His life on the TOUR had to wait awhile, though. In October of that year, he went into the Army and was not discharged until October of 1971. So, he really didn't join the TOUR full-time until 1972.

Several people have helped him along the way, such as Bob Warner in junior golf, Tom LoPresti during his college and early days on TOUR; but in recent years, Butch Baird has been his guiding hand on the practice tee.

Putting and long irons have been strong parts of his game, in addition to his sand play. In fact, in 1980, he led the TOUR statistics in sand saves and last year finished fourth.

Danny Edwards may qualify as the busiest man on the PGA TOUR. Maybe we should make that the "PGA and Autor Racing TOURS."

"I would like to play in about 28 golf tournaments again in 1984," he said, "but I also plan to spend about 12 weekends racing (Formula Fords). I plan to enter a serious racing program.

He says his record proves he can split his time between the two sports, pointing out that he has won a tournament in each of the last two years and has walked away with more than \$100,000 in each of those campaigns. His victory last July in the Miller High-Life QCO came after a playoff with Morris Hatalsky.

It was after a mediocre year in 1981 that Danny decided to develop "a more relaxed attitude and let things happen." The result was a victory in the 1982 Greater Greensboro Open.

After a splendid amateur record, Danny joined the TOUR for the start of 1975. His first victory came in the 1977 Greater Greensboro Open by four strokes over George Burns and Larry Nelson. In 1980, he joined with brother David and they won the Walt Disney World National Team Play title.

Danny was 14 when he started to play golf and he knew at an early age that golf would be his game. He went on to Oklahoma State University and won the 1972 and 1973 Big Eight championships. In 1973, he was named to Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team.

He turned professional in 1973 and played on the world circuit for a year, through 1974. He went to the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall of that year and made it.

During his years on TOUR, brother David has been his biggest booster and helper. "David knows my game better than anyone," Danny says. "We don't work together as much as we used to, but when I do have a problem, we talk it over.'

David Edwards knows exactly how he got started in golf. "I was about 12 years old," he said, "and I played because my brother Danny played. That's all there was to it."

Danny is five years older than David, "and all I did when I was growing up was tag along. I did whatever he did. He was the one who talked me into getting a set of clubs."

In the fall of 1980, they carried their brother relationship to the ultimate, winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship.

"During the last round," David said, "I happened to notice a little kid trying to hit rocks with a stick. I thought, 'that's just the way I used to be.' When I was little, Mom and Dad would take me to the tournaments to see Danny play, but all I wanted to do then was just what that little kid was doing at Disney World."

David has enjoyed his share of success during his career, but he said it hasn't been easy. "At every level, from juniors, through high school, then college and now on the TOUR, I have had to start at the bottom and work my way up. I haven't been any instant success."

He always found that success, though. He won the Oklahoma State Junior title in 1973, and won the National Collegiate championship for Oklahoma State in 1978, and twice was named to the collegiate All-America team.

While Danny has been his biggest booster and helper through the years, David also gave credit to Art Proctor, the head professional at the municipal course in Edmond for getting him started properly. He worked for Proctor during his high school years.

Now, he knows he has a fine balance to his game, and he was rewarded with his best money year in 1983. "It's the first time I've been over \$100,000," he said, "so it has to be my best."

"I was better in most phases of the game. I was more accurate off the tee and better around the greens. I even putted better, so I know I saved about one shot a round."

His first real challenge came in the 1980 Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur. He held a twostroke lead over Gil Morgan and Larry Nelson after three rounds, but a closing 75 at Pebble Beach dropped him into a tie for seventh, only three strokes back.

Later in the year, he pointed out that the experience at Pebble, being in a hunt, helped when he joined with brother Danny in the title drive at Disney World.

You know there never will be a dull moment when Dave Eichelberger is around and this big friendly fellow is around a lot of the time on the PGA TOUR. He averages approximately 34 tournaments a year and it does not seem likely he will slow down for the next few years. He likes to keep his clubs humming.

He only managed two top ten finishes in 1983, but he played steadily enough the rest of the time to comfortably finish among the leading 125 money winners. His last victory was in the 1981 Tallahassee Open and it came after a playoff against Bob Murphy and Mark O'Meara. He finished it on the first extra hole, but at the 72nd hole, Dave missed a three footer for birdle that would have ended it right there.

His game has had its peaks and valleys and through the years, it usually depended on his putting stroke. He is long off the tee and generally a fine iron player.

Dave started in the game at age 13 in the junior programs at his family's club in Waco, Texas. However, it wasn't until he went to Oklahoma State that his game started to blossom. He reached the semifinals in the 1964 U.S. Amateur at Canterbury and the next year, represented Uncle Sam on the Walker Cup and Americas Cup team.

He came out of the TOUR's Qualifying School in 1967 and steadily worked his way toward a \$108,312 year in 1971 that included a victory in the Greater Milwaukee Open. He admits that for the next few years, he may not have worked hard enough on his game, but he gained victory again in 1977 in Milwaukee.

In March of 1980, he had everything working as he mastered the cold wind to win the Bay Hill Classic near Orlando. He admitted that he put his Texas-born knowledge of the low punch shot to good use that week.

In 1980, Dave ran away with Eagle honors in the statistical program, making 16 of them. It prompted the question, "How many Eichels does Eagleberger have?"

In 1981, the eagles were a little more difficult to catch. He finished the year with six. He had two of them at Tallahassee, though, making it possible for him to claim the victory.

Lee Elder has enjoyed a successful career on the PGA TOUR, winning four times and representing his country in the 1979 Ryder Cup matches at the Greenbrier.

His first triumph was a memorable one. It came in the 1974 Monsanto Open at the Pensacola Country Club. He birdied three of the last four holes to catch Peter Oosterhuis and then won with an 18-foot birdie putt on the fourth extra hole. The triumph earned Lee his first trip to the Augusta National Golf Club for the 1975 Masters Tournament.

His biggest year was 1978, when he had a blazing streak in mid-summer. He tied with Lee Trevino in the Greater Milwaukee Open, and the playoff lasted for eight holes before winning. A month later, he birdied the final hole in the Westchester Classic to edge Mark Hayes by one.

Elder qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1967. In his first year, he created considerable excitement as he tied Frank Beard and Jack Nicklaus at the end of regulation play in the American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club. Beard was eliminated on the first extra hole, but Lee carried Jack to the fifth extra hole before bowing out.

In the Fall of 1979, he enjoyed one of his greatest moments in the game. His fine play in 1978 earned him a position on the Ryder Cup team. That was one of his life-long goals and the one experience he said he never will forget.

In 1974, he established the Lee Elder Scholarship Fund, Inc., a national fund which aides financially underprivileged youths in obtaining college educations. For the past 13 years, Lee has hosted the Lee Elder Celebrity Pro-Am, the major fundraiser for the Foundation. This annual event is supported by many of his touring professional friends and national celebrities. The Pro-Am is primarily held in locations on the East Coast.

He will be teeing it up on the Senior PGA TOUR before this year is over, and he difinitely will be a major force on that circuit for players 50 and over. Last year had to be one of his most satisfying in recent years, since it was his best financially since 1978.

The biggest check came in his tie for second, with Lee Trevino, in the Houston Coca-Cola Open. The last day, he was one-over par on the front nine and then birdied five of the last seven holes for his strong finish.

Nick Faldo has shed his role as one of the more promising young players to come out of Great Britain in recent years. He now wears the robes of a superstar of the European PGA Tour.

After playing in 11 tournaments on the PGA TOUR and winning \$32,652, he headed for home with the intention of competing in a few events and then returning to the United States.

So, what did he do? He won three straight events, starting with the French Open. "That changed my plans," he said. "I realized I now had a chance to be Europe's No. 1 player, so I stayed."

He went on to win two more tournaments, finished second in two and third in three others. In 16 tournaments, he had 11 top 10 finishes and compiled an astonishing stroke average of 69.03. He easily finished as the leading money winner with nearly \$180,000.

He then came back to the United States and starred on the European Ryder Cup team that nearly pulled an upset. At that point, he found himself 126th on the money list, \$631 behind the man in 125th place. He entered the Walt Disney World Classic, knowing he needed a good finish to retain his exempt status on the PGA TOUR.

After a first-round 72, he followed with a seven-under par 65 and went on to tie with Mark McCumber for second place, two strokes behind Payne Stewart. "I hit some super shots all week," he said later. "It was very gratifying. It was a week when I knew I had to play well, and I almost won it."

He said late in the year, "I never would have had the year in Europe that I had without the experience I gained in the States. My play has improved so much just by playing here and watching the other fellows. I've made some swing changes because of what I learned and you know the result."

Nick has been one of the better players on the European Tour almost from the start. He was the Rookie-of-the-Year in 1977, and his hold on the PGA Championship is envied by his peers. He won it in 1978 at Royal Birkdale. He won it again at Royal St. George's in 1980 and followed with another victory in 1981 at Ganton.

Although he had played on the TOUR on a few special occasions, it wasn't until the start of 1981 that he decided to give it a try. By the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open, where he tied for ninth, he easily passed the minimum money guideline for membership. He officially became a member the next week at the Bay Hill Classic. The week before Los Angeles, he grabbed a few headlines at the Hawaiian Open with his course-record 10-under par 62 at the Waialae Country Club in the second round.

He has been a fine player in Ryder Cup competition. The former English Amateur champion is unbeaten in singles competition, having defeated Tom Watson, Lee Elder, Johnny Miller and Jay Haas in the last four renewals.

Even though Keith Fergus enjoyed his most profitable year in 1983, he believes he learned a valuable lesson.

"I won early at the Bob Hope Classic and really played well for the first few weeks, but I think I became lackadaisical. I still worked hard on my game, but I probably lost a little aggressiveness," he

His victory in the Hope was an exciting one. As he approached the 18th hole, he was one stroke behind Rex Caldwell. Keith needed to make a 20-foot birdie putt to tie, and he did. It gave him his third-straight 65, and then he won it with a par on the first extra hole.

Fergus has demonstrated clearly that when his game is right, he can play with anyone and on any type of course. He generally was considered the finest young player on TOUR without a victory until his big day in May of 1981 when he won the prestigious Memorial Tournament on the demanding Muirfield Village course in Ohio.

"I wondered what it would feel like to win," he said, "and often wondered if it really was worth the effort. Now, I can tell you it is worth it. I've played well enough to win the last couple of years."

Keith, an All-American choice at the University of Houston for three years, had gone $4\frac{1}{2}$ years without tasting victory, and "I've always believed winning is what sports is all about. You have to forget about the money, because if you win and play well, the money will be there."

In 1982, facing the pressure of having to battle Raymond Floyd in a playoff at the rain-interrupted Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, Keith won again on the first extra hole with a birdie. He posted six-under par 66s in the first and third rounds.

Keith started to play golf at age eight. "My Dad played a lot," he recalls, "and I would go out and caddy for him." He says his father and Lee Williams, the head pro at Killeen Municipal Course, helped him with his game through the early stages.

He played football and basketball through the first couple of years in high school, "but I started to concentrate on golf after that." He said he realized he enjoyed practicing golf more than he did practicing the other sports.

He won the Texas State Junior championship in 1971 and was runner-up in the state high school tournament the following year. He went to the University of Houston and gained All-American status. In the summer of 1975, he lost to Fred Ridley in the final of the United States Amateur.

He believes the strongest part of his game is his driving. "I found out a long time ago that it is easier to make par or birdie from the middle of the fairway than it is from the trees." Generally, he prefers to draw the ball, although he can work it both ways.

One of the better success stories on the TOUR is being composed by Ed Fiori as he continues to let his fine work with his clubs do all the writing.

"I'm becoming more patient with my game," says the fellow who has been known to show a slight touch of temper. "I'm playing more within my game. I know what my strong suits are and my weak suits."

While he didn't win in 1983, he did boost his bank account by a career high of \$175,619. He won well over \$100,000 of it in just three tournaments. The biggest check came as he finished third in the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity, earning \$51,000. That was the second largest of his career. He also was third in the Doral-Eastern Open, and a tie for eighth in the Tournament Players Championship returned handsome profits.

He has shown in his six years on the TOUR that he knows how to win. In 1979, he won the Southern Open in a playoff over Tom Weiskopf. In 1981, he won the Western Open by four strokes. After starting with a 74, he finished at the tough Butler National course with rounds of 67-69-67.

Two years ago, he won the Bob Hope Classic in a playoff over Tom Kite, playing brilliantly along the way with rounds of 70, 65, 66, 67 and 67.

It's quite a record for a fellow who is known as the "Grip" by his peers because of the rather unorthodox way he holds the golf club.

The stocky Fiori started in the game at age seven. "We lived next to a course in Downey, Calif., and I used to sneak through the strands of barbed wire to play. About twice a week, they would catch me and my pal and chase us off. A neighbor had given me a few clubs to use."

After high school, Ed started to work at odd jobs around southern California, mainly in construction work. He also found enough time to play considerable golf, "wherever I could find a game."

One of those golf excursions took him to a tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico. He birdied the last four holes to get into a playoff with Craig Stadler and Jack Renner. Stadler won the playoff, but a University of Houston alumnus was there and was impressed. He recommended him to the Cougars.

"I had been out of high school for four years, so I went to Wharton Junior Colege for a semester, sat out a semester and then transferred to Houston."

His second year, the Cougars won the NCAA team title, and Ed was named to the All-American team. "Until then, I had not thought much about joining the PGA TOUR, but that was all the guys on the team talked about getting on the TOUR."

He dropped our of Houston in the spring of 1977, played in a few mini-Tour events and then headed for the Q-School.

When Bruce Fleisher joined the PGA TOUR for the start of the 1972 schedule, he did so with high expectations. After all, he had compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1968 United States Amateur Championship at Scioto in Columbus, OH.

He also was a member of Uncle Sam's teams in Walker Cup and World Amateur Cup competition. This young man with the bold swagger could play. Just before obtaining his TOUR card in the Fall of 1971, he won the Brazilian Open.

Just as important, with his bubbling, pleasing personality, he was expected to be a favorite with the galleries wherever he went. That part has not changed, but Bruce has seen the peaks and valleys with his game in the last decade.

He will tell you, though, that 1983 was the most enjoyable year he has ever had on TOUR. He collected \$36,658 in 1982 to finish 110th on the money list and thus gain exempt status for the first time.

"You have no idea what that meant to a player such as myself," he said. "I was able to plan my year and play more golf then ever before. The result was, I played better than ever, too."

He finished with \$50,285 and thus became exempt again for 1984. He was pleased with his consistency, making the cut in 22 events with 12 coming in a row at one stretch.

One of the more interesting days of Bruce's life came in the 1969 Masters Tournament. As the Amateur champion, he was paired with Arnold Palmer for the first round, and proceeded to shoot a splendid 69 to Arnold's 73.

'It was a great thrill to play in the Masters," he said, "but to find out I would be paired with him, well, that's something else. I've always loved him dearly.'

Certainly a young man with his talents has had his good days and good tournaments. His problem has been trying to string them together.

After he won the Amateur, and when asked to compare his game with that on the pro circuit, he commented, "It's a different game altogether on the TOUR. There isn't any way to compare the two. Professional golf is so much more intense because of the strategy involved. Concentration is so important, and that has been one of my problems over the years. Each person has to find his own selfdiscipline, and it is more difficult for some than others.

When he won the Amateur, incidentally, he was only the second person to win it at age 19. The other was Jack Nicklaus.

When Raymond Floyd tells you he has played the best golf in his brilliant career during the last

When hay florid proyecting you have to believe him. His record tells it all.

He has won seven times in that period and a healthy sum of \$1,147,515. And, that doesn't include the staggering amounts he won in other lurcative events around the world.

Even though he didn't add to his victory column last year, it was satisfying from the point of view. that he teed it up in 22 tournaments and cashed checks in all 22. Eight times, he finished among the top 10 with his runner-up position in the MONY-Tournament of Champions his best.

The two greatest years of his career came in 1981 and 1982. He won three times in '81 and earned \$359,360, finishing second only to Tom Kite. The next year, he won three more and reaped a harvest of \$386,809, easily his all-time high, and was second again on the money list, this time to Craig

One of his 1982 victories came in the PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa and he led all the way. He started with a seven-under par 63 and called it, "without a doubt, the best round of golf I've ever played, anywhere in my life.

His second and third round totals of 132 and 200 respectively established PGA Championship records and he was heading for a 72-hole mark until he double bogeyed the last hole for a 272, missing the record by one. "I wasn't concerned about the record at all," he said, "I just wanted the

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, N. C., the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray chose to pursue baseball until he won the National Jaycees Golf title in 1960. He turned pro the following year, joined the TOUR in 1963 and won the St. Petersburg Open as a rookie. At age 20 years and six months, he was the third youngest ever to win on TOUR

There have been numerous highlights to his career, but the most notable probably was the 1976 Masters Tournament. He won by eight strokes, and his total of 17-under par 271 equaled the tournament record set by Nicklaus in 1965.

As Dan Forsman reflected on his first year on the PGA TOUR, he smiled and said slowly, "It's a tremendous leading experience. You think you have the game when you come out, but you soon realize you need a lot of fine tuning. You have to learn how and when to use every club in your bag playing a variety of shots."

After a pause, he continued, "Getting used to all of the travelling was a big step, and my wife, Trudy, was very important in everything I did.

"I missed the cut in my first five tournaments. Maybe it was because I was sort of walking around looking at everything. I guess I was awe-struck. Being around the best players in the world is very educational."

He had his good moments. At the Honda-Inverrary Classic, for example, he challenged until the final holes. At the Byron Nelson Classic, a second-round 64 let him press the leaders the rest of the week. At the Miller High Life-QCO, he held a one-stroke lead after three rounds, but dropped back the last day.

While he may have been slightly disappointed with some of those finishes, this slender young man did show his peers that he can play this game and figures to be around for a long time. As he once said, "There are a lot of people who believe in me. It's time now for me to believe in me."

Dan started to play golf at age 13, being introduced to the game by his father, an avid gclfer. Although he was born in Wisconsin, the family moved to the San Francisco area "when I was about two."

He played his golf at the Los Altos Country Club and started to play in the Northern California junior program, competing against the likes of Bobby Clampett and Joey Rassett.

After high school, where he also played basketball and some football, he headed for Arizona State University. "I wanted to keep playing golf," he said, "and I knew they had a good program there with such players as Tom Purtzer and Howard Twitty on the TOUR.

One of the matches was against an Alumni team, and Joe Porter, who played the TOUR for many years, said to him, "You can play out there. Just be patient with your game, work on it and it'll come."

Dan qualified for the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach and it was the first time he had ever competed against the TOUR pros. He was fortunate one day to have a practice round with Seve Ballesteros. At the time, Dan was working as an apprentice at the Camelback Country Club.

After enjoying some success in sectional PGA events, he felt it was time to try the TOUR. He went to the School in the Fall of 1982 and made it.

Now, it seems Dan and Trudy Forsman have found a home for many years.

John Fought would like to believe he finally has arrived as the player his followers knew he could be. After his exceptional rookie season of 1979, his star didn't shine as brightly as many expected, but it started to peek through again last year.

He was so frustrated with his game two years ago that he took off four months in the summer to go and work in the accounting office of his father. He soon realized that golf was what he wanted, even though he said he loves accounting.

"The lay-off helped me in several ways," he said. "I developed a more positive approach to the game. I needed that time off to think things through, and the result was I had the most consistent year of my career."

His best finish was a tie for fourth place in the Bob Hope Classic, where he held a two-stroke lead after three rounds, thanks to a third-day 62 at Indian Wells.

After John won the 1977 United States Amateur title, he appeared to be a shoe-in for stardom on the TOUR. In fact, he once said his goal as a first-year player was not just to make the top 60 money winners, but to win a tournament.

Well, in his first two attempts to obtain a TOUR card, he didn't make it. He succeeded in the Fall of 1978.

Through the first eight months of the year, he had not been impressive. Nevertheless, a tie for 13th at the Western Open and a tie for 14th at Hartford let him know he could play a little.

At the Buick Open in Grand Blanc, MI, the stocky six-footer from Brigham Young University was two-strokes out of the lead entering the final round, but he finally dropped a 10-foot birdle putt at the 18th hole to tie Jim Simons and then won it with a par on the second extra hole. The birdle at the 18th was quite an accomplishment when you consider that in the first three rounds, he played the 18th with two double bogeys and a bogey.

The next week at the Anheuser-Busch Classic at the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA, there was a five-way tie for the lead when John played the last hole, and he birdied for his victory. Roger Maltbie in 1975 had been the last rookie to win back-to-back tournaments.

At the time, his \$108,427 was the third highest amount ever won by a rookie. After what Hal Sutton did this past year, John's total now is the fourth highest all-time.

A solid collegiate career, during which he won the 1975 Pacific Coast Amateur and the 1976 Pacific Northwest Open, set the stage for his one-stroke victory in the 1977 U.S. Amateur at Aronomink, Near Philadelphia.

Buddy Gardner would like to believe the sad days on the PGA TOUR are behind him now and that he will be able to maintain his position as one of the better players in the game.

He has had his share of ups-and-downs, the latter due mainly to physical problems that cut into his effectiveness. After six years of touring, he feels he has found the right combination for success.

He will tell you - and rightly so - that he took a big step late last Spring when he married Susan, a nurse from Birmingham. He has had a tendency to take his game for granted and not devote the time to it that is necessary. Now, he says, "Susan gave me a reason to work on it and I love it."

Buddy first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1977, but in his first full year of 1978, he won only \$5,637 and lost his card. He went back to the Q-School in the Fall of that year and earned it back. Starting in 1979, he failed to qualify for the first four events, and then hit paydirt. He tied for second behind Bruce Lietzke in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. It set up a very good year, winning a careerhigh \$71,468. He also tied for second in the Anheuser-Busch Classic in the fall.

"I wasn't ready the next year," he admits. "I didn't use the time to my advantage. I enjoyed the

exempt status and paid dearly for it because I didn't perform.

To make matters worse, at the Walt Disney World Team Championship, he was in a pick-up football game and, running for a pass, tripped over a lawn chair and tore all the ligaments in his left wrist. He tried to play with it, but eventually had to have the wrist put in a cast for two months.

'It still hurt after the cast was off," he said, "and I altered my golf swing so I could play. It destroyed my game, but I fought it for a year-and-a-half."

He reached a low of \$6,214 in 1982, finishing 192nd on the money list. It was back to the Qualifying School.

In the regional qualifier at Dallas, he made an adjustment in his alignment after the first round because of the high winds. "All I did was move the ball back six-seven inches in my stance and tried to hit three-quarter shots. By the time I hit the third ball, I knew it was right, and I played well all the way through the school." He was sixth in the final qualifier at the Tournament Players Club.

This past year, he made a fine comeback. After missing the cut in six of his first nine starts, he settled down and made it in 19 of his next 20 tournaments.

'Getting married (May 28) certainly changed my lifestyle," he said, "but people who really know me also know I'm not a quitter. I was determined to make it

Buddy started in the game at age five. "We lived about 100 yards from the first tee of the Bonnie Crest Country Club in Montgomery (AL). Everyone in the family played golf, so it was natural for me to play, too.

At one time, Buddy recalls, the juniors competition in that area was pretty tough, "with the likes of Bill Rogers, Mike Reid, Mac McLendon and myself competing against each other

He won the Alabama State high school golf championship as a senior and went to Auburn University on a scholarship. His most important amateur title was the 1976 Dixie Amateur, and he edged Ron Streck in that one.

If there were such a category as "most comebacks from surgery" in the all-time PGA TOUR records, Al Geiberger would be leading it by such a wide margin that no one would ever catch him.

Yet, this lanky fellow keeps smiling and telling everyone that what has happened is history, and it's just great to be able to play on the TOUR again. One wonders how brilliant a record he would have had if he had been healthy for the past decade.

First, it was a nervous stomach disorder that nearly ended his career late in the 1960's and early 1970's. He battled back from that to win the 1974 Sahara Invitational, ending a victory drought of more than eight years.

Just when his long irons were whistling with incredible accuracy, he was struck down again early in 1978 when he needed intestinal surgery, and then late in 1979 with knee surgery. Seemingly healthy again, he suffered a severe attack while in Vail, Colo., for the Jerry Ford Invitational in July of 1980 and emergency surgery had to be performed for the removal of his colon. In all, he underwent three separate operations in approximately two months for an ileostomy.

As long as golf is played, Al will be remembered for the afternoon at the Colonial Country Club during the 1977 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he became the first player ever to break 60 in a PGA TOUR event. He had a 13-under par 59. It came on June 10, during the second round and was a master blend of 11 birdies and one eagle. He used only 23 putts in the 30-29 effort, culminating in an eight footer for a birdie on the final hole.

He went on to win the tournament, although he had to hold off late challenges by Gary Player and Jerry McGee to do it.

Over the years, he has done well on the toughest tracks, such as Firestone Country Club in winning the 1965 American Golf Classic and the 1966 PGA Championship; 1975 Tournament Players Championship and the 1979 Colonial National Invitation, both at the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth; and the 1976 Western Open at the Butler National.

Gibby Gilbert will be the first to tell you he is leading the good life these days. He will play 15-to-20 tournaments a year, win enough money to retain his exempt status, and spend the rest of his time at home in Chattanooga, TN.

He did just that in 1983, winning \$22,400 with a tie for second place in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open providing a healthy portion of that sum. He started his week at Rancho Park with rounds of 65 and 66 to lead by three over Fuzzy Zoeller and then finished with 72 and 69.

My goal at the start of the year," he said, "was to make the top 125 money winners and be exempt for 1984; but I also want to win \$1 million before I'm finished." He now has \$899,028.

Back home in Chattanooga, Gibby is part-owner in the Brainerd Golf Club. "I grew up on that course," he said, "and that's where all my buddies play, so it was a great feeling for me to be able to buy it a few years ago. It was something I always wanted to do."

Despite the lack of a given name — it's C. L. Gilbert, Jr. — Gibby began to make a name for himself in golf early in his native Chattanooga. He started in the game at age 13. He left the University of Chattanooga in 1962 to be married, and later accepted a job as assistant professional in Hollywood, Fla.

He went to the Qualifying School in 1967 and finished second to Bobby Cole. It was 2½ years later that he won his first event, the Houston Champions International in a playoff over Bruce Crampton. Even today, he'll tell you "I wasn't a good player when I won then," but he certainly has become one since then.

In 1972, he suffered a setback, and finished 73rd on the money list. Faced with non-exempt status, he thought seriously about leaving the TOUR, but stuck with it for one more year. He won \$60,636 in 1973 for 48th place, and he has been a steady performer ever since. Only one other year did he drop from the top 60, and that was in 1977. He suffered rib injuries in the spring, and missed almost all of the summer tournaments. However, he retained his exempt status when he joined with Grier Jones late in the year and they won the Walt Disney World National Team title.

A highlight of his career came in 1973 at the World Open. He set a course-record 62 on Pinehurst No. 2. It shattered the best previous mark by three strokes.

Maybe Bob Gilder had dreamed of having a year such as he enjoyed in 1982, but he probably never really expected to have one.

Three times he went to the winner's circle and each time he put on a marvelous display of scoring. He always has been known as a player capable of shooting low numbers, and his winning score of 14-under par 266 in the Byron Nelson Classic was the lowest ever shot in the 16 years the tournament was played at Preston Trail.

His 19-under par 261 in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic set a tournament standard and his week was highlighted by a double eagle two on the 509-yard 18th hole the third day. He only needed a driver and three wood.

Finally, he won the Bank of Boston Classic and with his other strong finishes, he collected \$308,648, good for sixth place. He was named to the PGA TOUR team that faced Japan in the Goldwin Cup and also joined with Bobby Clampett as the U.S. representatives in the World Cup.

After the first five weeks of 1983, he was heading for another terrific year. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Rex Caldwell, Johnny Miller and Mark O'Meara, tied for fourth in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am and tied for seventh in the Bob Hope Classic.

His game cooled after that, but he did come on strong at the end of the year and distinguished himself in his first appearance on a Ryder Cup team.

Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team — winning the 1973 Western Atheltic Conference title — and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After he was graduated in 1973, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charles.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

He became only the fourth first-year player to win more than \$100,000, and would have been the "rookie-of-the-year," if Jerry Pate had not won the U.S. and Canadian Opens and \$153,102.

Normally an excellent striker of the ball, he has the ability to move his shots in either direction and, that, he says, "is an excellent feeling because you can't always play the same shot."

There have been many highlights in the spectacular career of David Graham, too many to mention, but everyone knows his victories in the 1979 PGA Championship and the 1981 United States Open Championship would be enough to last many a man a lifetime.

David, the proud man that he is, will treasure those moments forever, but he also is particularly pleased to be ranked as the all-time money winner among the talented Australians who have played

the Tour. He slipped past Bruce Crampton last year.

He also points with pride to the fact that, for the first time in his career, he topped the \$200,000 mark in a single season in 1983. He came from five strokes back the last day to win the Houston Coca-Cola Open going away, and compiled 10 top ten finishes in 23 starts.

That's not bad for a fellow who started in the game with a pick-up set of left-handed clubs. At the Merion Golf Club in the U.S. Open championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a three-under par 67 for a total of seven-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the

last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Not many of his eight victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he

had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Deviln, in a playoff.
When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the
18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.
In the Memorial Tournament three years ago, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory,

but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

He came back to Australia 21/2-years later and worked for a club manufacturer and it was there

that his love for designing clubs began.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

There may never have been another week in the life of Lou Graham guite like the one he experienced in June of 1975 at wet-and-soggy Medinah Country Club in Chicago. That's when he overcame the challenges of many, and especially John Mahaffey, to win the United States Open Cham-

He has been reaping the benefits ever since, with his 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR cosponsored events one of the major ones. It couldn't have happened to a nicer gentleman. At Medinah, he was 11-strokes off the pace being set by Tom Watson after 36 holes, but a splendid 67 the third day let him leap to within four strokes of Frank Beard, who became the third-round leader

Despite the thunderstorms and delays, Lou managed a two-over par 73 the last afternoon and that left him in a tie with Mahaffey at three-over par 287. Lou won it all the next day, 71 to 73.

That came in Lou's 12th year on TOUR, and he posted only two other victories. Yet, for some unexplained reason, he went on a tear late in 1979 and won three more tournaments within a space of eight weeks. He couldn't begin to explain the new-found success. He defeated Bobby Wadkins in a playoff at the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, then won the American Optical Classic at Pleasant Valley and finally the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Lou started to play the game at age 10 in his native Nashville, TN. He earned a scholarship to Memphis State University and he stayed for three years. Golf was his game, though, and not text-

He enlisted in the Army and served in the President's Honor Guard, but he didn't care for the service any more than he did the textbooks. He says with his sly grin, "I wanted out the day I got in."

After his discharge in 1962, he worked at two clubs near Baltimore before he found the financial backing to head for the TOUR in 1964. He has been an exempt player ever since 1967 except for 1969 when he was 68th on the money list. He underwent surgery to repair tendonitis in his left hand.

As an example of his strong consistent play, he was selected to three United States Ryder Cup

Lou says 1984 will be a critical year for him. "At this stage of my career, it's a day-to-day thing. My health has been good, but my game was too inconsistent in 1983. One week it was putting, the next week my driving was off. The third round seemed to kill me. I just couldn't shoot a low number and get in contention.

He added, "I plan to play a full schedule in 1984 (he entered 29 events in 1983) and see what happens.

When Thomas Gray headed for the LaJet Classic in Abilene, TX late in 1982, he had all of his plans made for attending the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School.

When the week was over, though, Thomas was \$37,800 richer for his second-place finish to Wayne Levi. No, make that \$38,800 richer. He later would receive a refund on the \$1,000 entry fee to the O-School.

He was well back in the pack after two rounds at the Fairway Oaks Country Club. His 73-71—144 left him nine strokes in back of Levi. However, playing some of the finest golf of his life, he moved closer with a six-under par 66 in the third round and then a splendid five-under 67 the last day for an 11-under par total of 277.

"I've been waiting all year for this," he said. "Last weekend I put a new Bullseye putter in my bag, and after I shot a 67 in the Qualifier on Monday, I decided to stay with it." The last afternoon, he only needed 25 putts for the round.

He was 160th on the money list with a little over \$14,000 going to LaJet, but his big payday helped to propel him to 87th in the final standings.

With so much at stake, he said it was extremely satisfying to play so well under the pressure the last afternoon. "I went out with the idea of keeping the ball on the golf course somewhere, and out of the water and away from the out-of-bounds."

Thomas started in golf at age seven, going to the course in Prescott, AZ, with his father. In 1974, he was a member of the high school team that won the state championship. That paved the way for him going to Arizona State, where he was graduated in 1980 with a degree in criminal justice. It was while at ASU that he thought about trying his talents on the TOUR.

During those collegiate years he tasted victory, winning the 1977 Arizona State Amateur championship and the 1978 Western Athletic Conference championship. He also was named to the NCAA All-America team in 1978.

While he won \$21,608 as a first-year player, he felt the experience gained that year definitely helped in 1982 and that he played better than the results he achieved, except, of course, at LaJet. It also was a help to get married in the Spring of 1981, adding more stability to his life.

Although his earnings dipped a little last year, he said, "It's still a learning process for me. I'm getting better in certain areas and I hope to continue along that line. It's easier for me to cope with the bad rounds now because my attitude and confidence have improved."

Hubert Green never has been one to make excuses when his level of performance dipped below the high standard he always set for himself. So, it came as quite a surprise to many when they discovered late in 1983 that he had suffered through most of the year with a bad shoulder.

When asked to sum up the year, he merely smiled and said, "I just played bad."

The truth was, his shoulder was hurting more than anyone realized, and early in October, he underwent microscopic surgery to repair the damage. He was back at the Walt Disney World Classic two weeks later saying "it feels much better."

He always has been a hard worker and also admits, "I've always been hard on myself and that's a trait of Hubert Green. I want to do well in everything."

Hubert had stretch of about seven years through the 1970s when he was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. During one three-week period in 1976, he won three straight tournaments — Doral-Eastern Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

The next year, he won the United States Open in a gutty performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them."

As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf and during his high school days spent considerable time during the summer months playing in the many special invitationals held throughout his native Alabama. The next step was Florida State University.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, Pa. He qualified for his TOUR card in the fall of that year.

Success came quickly. In the Houston Champions Invitational, he tied Don January and then birdied the first extra hole for the victory. He was named the "rookie-of-the-year."

Ken Green's father was the principal at the American School in Honduras for three years, and he readily admits that if it were not for that tour of duty, he probably would not be on the PGA TOUR today.

"I was 12-years old when Dad went down there," he said, "and I had nothing else to do. It was either golf or soccer, and I decided it was better to try and hit the ball than kick it. Chances are I never would have started to play the game if it wasn't for that."

When the family returned to Danbury, CT, Ken played a little high school golf, but says he still wasn't very good. Then it was off to Palm Beach Junior College and then the mini-tours.

Twice he tried to make it on the TOUR through the Qualifying School, with no success, but the third time was the charm in the Fall of 1981. "It was a progression of nerves," he said, "The first time, I was so nervous I couldn't handle it. The next time, I almost made it."

With a laugh, he added, "Now, I can equate the progression of nerves with my play on the TOUR. Hopefully, I'm handling it better each year. My first year was pretty bad. I had some problems, and found myself getting mad too quickly. As a result, I didn't learn much."

Just before the Walt Disney World Classic in the Fall of 1982, he went to a hypnotist. "I had bottomed out and he helped to turn my confidence around. I have to give him credit."

He said his game is much better than what it was a couple of years ago. "I believe I'm a smarter golfer," he added.

It was evident at the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in 1983 that he was much improved. He led by three strokes after two rounds with scores of 66 and 68 for a 10-under par 134. He finally finished tied for seventh place.

That was a great week," he recalled. "I didn't get as nervous as I thought I would. I played well. My confidence level was rising with every hole."

He added two other fine finishes, a tie for 12th in the Miller High Life-QCO and a tie for 14th in the Greater Milwaukee Open.

"This last year, I was playing seven, eight, nine weeks in a row, and that's too much," he said.
"I'll space my time a little better. When you're a young player, you want to keep going, but it's hard to do."

He says his main strength is his putting, and his ball striking is improving each year. When everything is right, he prefers to play with a little fade.

Jay Haas always has been able to look at the bright side of a situation. For example, he won

twice in 1981 and again in 1982, but wasn't able to grab the brass ring in 1983.

Nevertheless, he said at the end of the year, "It's been successful. A victory would have made it complete, but after the first few weeks, I started to play more consistently. Even though I won twice in 1981, I don't believe I played as well all year then as I did this past year. My game is much better now.

In 1982, he missed the cut in only two of 29 events and last year, there were only three t mes in 28 starts when he didn't go the distance, so he has become one of the more consistent players in the

A highlight of the year came in October when he was a member of Uncle Sam's Ryder Cup team and played well.

With former Masters Champion Bob Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob started him early, and has helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a gr p on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together.

Jay was seven when he played his first tournament - and won his first trophy. It was the National Pee Wee Championship in Orlando, Fla. "We played five holes each day and I scored 26-26—52 to finish third," he said.

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

He earned his TOUR card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1976.

After two very disappointing years, Gary Hallberg responded with a profitable one in 1983, with a victory in the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open the highlight.

"I've matured as a golfer and a person," he said. "I've been able to organize my time a little better and that takes longer for some people than others.

"When I first started on TOUR, I thought all I had to do was play golf. It came so easy the first few weeks, but I now know there is a lot more to the learning process."

After a moment's pause, he grinned and added, "Besides all of that, some fatherly advice that my Dad has been giving me the last few years finally started to sink in."

His victory was something of a surprise to him. He trailed Tom Kite by four strokes entering the last round at Torrey Pines, and proceeded to shoot a six-under par 66 to edge Kite by one. He had an eight-foot birdie putt at the final hole and he made it. "My heart was pumping like it's never pumped before." he said

Gary was an impressive winner all through his amateur career and instant stardom was expected once he joined the PGA TOUR. He did very well through his first few months out of the chute. He was the first player ever to earn his TOUR card by winning the minimum \$8,000 needed at that time to obtain playing privileges without going through the Qualifying School. In 11 tournaments, he won \$64,244. He finished the year with six top 10 finishes.

Gary started in the game at age nine when his father brought home a set of old clubs. He thought it would be a fine idea for his son to play golf instead of baseball.

"Dad figured he could drop me off at the course on his way to work and pick me up on his way home," Gary said. "If I played baseball, it would only take two-or-three hours."

Once he started to play, he loved the game and worked diligently at it. So much so, in fact, that his Dad finally had to tell him to ease up and not be so serious.

When Gary was about 15-years old, he and his Dad turned some of their 15 acres into a course where Gary could play at home all the time. He eventually earned a scholarship to Wake Forest, and he went on to become the first four-time, first-team All-America choice. He was the NCAA champion in 1979 and won a total of 14 college tournaments.

During his early teen years, he also played hockey, and it wasn't until he went to Wake Forest that he started to think about being a professional golfer.

Dan Halldorson has been regarded as the finest player to come out of Canada since George Knudson, although last year, his career suffered a set-back because of back-and-hand problems.

"I had eczema on the hands," he explained. "It started at the LaJet in 1982, and I shouldn't have come back as early as I did this past year, but I kept trying to play." There were weeks when his hands seemed to be almost raw as the skin peeled off.

By the end of the year, everything was returning to normal and, hopefully, his game was too. With the back problems, he said, "I changed my swing. Now, I have to get it back to where it was."

It was in 1980 that he enjoyed his biggest year. He won the Pensacola Open and then joined with Jim Nelford to give Canada the World Cup team title.

Dan first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1974, but he only won \$619 in 1975 and lost his card. He spent the next three years playing all across Canada. "I knew my game wasn't good enough for the TOUR," he said.

He won a few times and piled up a number of second-place finishes, but decided in 1978 that he wasn't going anywhere in the game while playing in his homeland. He wanted another shot at the U.S. TOUR.

He made it through the Qualifying School, and early in 1979, he tasted success. After two rounds of the Hawaiian Open, he was tied for the lead with Fuzzy Zoeller and George Burns, but finally tied for seventh.

Even though he finished 116th on the 1979 money list, he believed the top 60 in 1980 was a realistic goal. After he finished second to Jim Colbert in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, winning \$32,400, he knew it was.

He already was assured of exempt status for 1981 with a position among the top 60 money winners when he headed for Pensacola. After two rounds of 68-67 at Perdido Bay, he was tied with Gary Hallberg and Tom Kite at nine-under 135. A 70 the third day left him three in back of Bob Mann, but his final-round 70 was all he needed to regain the lead.

The Halldorson family lived across the street from a golf course in Winnipeg, so he started in the game at an early age. He even built his practice range in his back yard.

In his home province, he has won the Manitoba Juniors, the Manitoba PGA and three time the Manitoba Open. In 1981 and 1982, he was honored as the Canadian Playing Professional of the Year.

When Ben Crenshaw won medalist honors by 12 strokes in the Fall Qualifying School of 1973, his performance was labeled "incredible." Indeed it was.

Well, in the Fall of 1982, Donnie Hammond did him two better. He was the medalist by an astounding 14 strokes with a six-day, 13-under par score of 419. He had opening rounds of 66 and 68, followed with a 71, and then stunned everyone with a record seven-under par 65 on the tough Tournament Players Club course in Ponte Vedra, FL.

One of the keys, he said, came the first day. He started at No. 10 at the TPC and "when I walked to the 18th green (his ninth hole), I looked up and there was my Dad in the stands. I was three under at the time and I stayed pumped up all week."

His father has had a tremendous amount of influence on Donnie.

His home was in Frederick, MD, and the Baltimore Colts of the NFL have their pre-season training camp not too far away at Westminster College. "I would go with Dad to watch them, and then he'd play a nine-hole course there. I only had four-or-five irons, but I seemed to pick it up quickly. When he saw that, he bought me a set. I was 13 at the time."

Donnie played at Frederick High School and then went to Jacksonville University. In three years, he won five college events, including the Sun Belt Conference title in 1979 by six strokes. He played on the Space Coast tour for three years.

When he started in the Q-School at the TPC, it was his fourth attempt at obtaining a TOUR card. "All I did that week," he said, "was work to avoid the double and triple bogeys. I hit a lot of irons off the par four holes, working for position.

The highlight of his first year was his fine play in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am. He was tied for second place after three rounds, only two strokes off the pace being set by Tom Kite, the eventual winner.

"Jim Ireland, the Vice-President of Foot-Joy, was my amateur partner, and we made the cut in team play, too. The last day, we were paired with Tom Kite and it was a great thrill to watch such a good player."

Unfortunately, Donnie shot a last-round 79 and tied for 14th place. It was, however, an important learning experience.

Another such situation came in the third round of the U.S. Open, when he was paired with Jack Nicklaus.

Maybe the biggest thrill of his rookie year came in the Kemper Open. "My Dad used to take me to all the junior tournaments, but at the Kemper, he actually caddied for me. I'll never forget that week."

When he is playing well, driving is a strong point because he is able to keep the ball in play. His weakest point was his putting, but feels certain he can correct that situation.

There have been several ups-and-downs to the career of Phil Hancock, and the level of excellence seems to vary with the condition of his back. He has had problems with it, and all one has to do is check his money winning record to see when the pain flared up.

He was in good shape in 1980 and the result was a victory in the Hall of Fame Classic on one of his favorite courses, No. 2 at Pinehurst. He went on to a \$105,489 year.

"It took a lot of hard work," he said of the victory, "and I pointed to winning a tournament for sometime. I always felt I could win on the TOUR, but you can play well out here for a long time and either not win at all or not win as much as you would like."

He considered last year a good one because "I played as consistently as I've ever played. I had a bad stretch of putting, and that kept the results from being better, but I really didn't have many bad rounds or tournaments.

Phil always has enjoyed success at golf. Although he was an All-Conference quarterback at Greenville (Ala.) High School and also excelled in basketball, golf was his sport. "I knew that would be the one I'd play in college and that one day I would turn professional," he said.

He started as a nine-year old on the encouragement of his father and an older brother. He won the Alabama State Junior title in 1969 and the Alabama State Amateur in 1972. He went on to the University of Florida and twice won the Southeastern Conference crown. While there, he was a teammate of Andy Bean, Gary Koch and Mike Sullivan.

It came as a shock to him when he enrolled in the Fall 1976 PGA TOUR Qualifying School and

When it was time for the School in the Spring of 1977, he was ready. He won medalist honors, and in his first start as a member of the TOUR, he tied for ninth in the Western Open.

In the 1978 Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, Phil played some of the finest golf of his career for the first two rounds. He shot 64-64-128, and led by two. He learned a valuable lesson in

"The first two days," he recalled, "I didn't come close to making a bogey, but I put too much pressure on myself trying to continue at that pace."

Although he considers himself a good tee-to-green player and a better than average putter, his short game was one that needed work, and he has improved on that too. When he is playing well, he prefers to move the ball from right-to-left.

Morris Hatalsky is a classic example of what rewards will come your way with hard work, patience and faith.

He has experienced his highs and lows during his years on the PGA TOUR, but he knew it was not going to be easy. After all, as he points out, "I was in five Qualifying Schools before I made it," in the Spring of 1976.

'Every year seems to be different," he said. "Every year has a special ingredient. I learn more about myself and my personal priorities; more about my game; my liabilities and my assets."

Last year, he enjoyed his most profitable year, yet says, "I had a good year in July. The rest of the time I played mediocre golf, but now I have to try and extend myself and my golf.

In July of 1983, he won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over George Cadle. The next week, he lost a playoff to Danny Edwards in the Miller High Life-QCO and then tied for eighth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. he went on to his first \$100,000-plus year.

The first time he reaped the rewards of his dedication was in the Fall of 1982 when he won the Hall of Fame Classic on the famed No. 2 course at Pinehurst, winning by two strokes over Jerry Pate and D.A. Weibring.

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Living in San Diego, it wasn't long until he was competing on the junior level and winning. At age 17, for example, he won the Mexico National Junior title, and in 1969, was the San Diego high school golfer of the year.

After two years at Arizona State University, he transferred to the United States International University and continued to play well.

During his first full year on the TOUR, in 1977, he finished second to Dave Eichelberger in the Greater Milwaukee Open. He admits the next year was a "disaster". I realized I had no firm foundation to my game but relied on my chipping and putting.

At the end of the year, he went to Ken Venturi for help and the improvement was immediate. "I was committed to stay on TOUR as long as I could," he said, "but it wasn't a case of winning then; it was a case of making money.'

Venturi changed the fundamentals of his swing and his thoughts about how to play the game. The records tell the rest of the story.

Mark Hayes started to play golf at age six, under the watchful eye of his father, a high school physical education teacher and golf coach.

Since that time, Mark has gone about his way, dedicating himself to succeeding in the game, and he has been successful. His biggest victory came in the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, and with it, a 10-year exemption on the TOUR.

The last two years, he has been working on a major swing change and felt comfortable about his progress entering the 1984 campaign.

"I wanted to get a bigger turn," he explained. "I've always been able to generate a tremendous thrust with my lower body, but didn't use any arms to full advantage, swinging my arms better. I've learned how to release the club and can play with a draw. Two years ago, I couldn't hit a draw.'

At the age of 13, the family returned to Stillwater, where Mark was born and there he came under the tutelage of Labron Harris, Sr., the Oklahoma State University coach and a close friend of Mark's Dad.

"One of the reasons I was so dedicated to the game," Mark says, "was that I was small for my age and I couldn't do anything else well. I practiced every day. I never thought about doing anything else for a living but playing golf."

One highlight of his blossoming career came in the annual Texas vs. Oklahoma Junior matches, and he defeated Tom Kite in the final.

During his years at Stillwater High and Oklahoma State, he was a teammate of Doug Tewell, and it was Mark who eventually convinced Doug that he should play the TOUR for a living, and not work in

After leaving college, he went into the Army for two years and spent most of his time at Fort Jackson, S. C., working in the golf shop. There at the same time was Joe Inman.

He arrived on the TOUR in the Fall of 1973 and broke through with two victories in 1976. He led the Byron Nelson Classic from wire-to-wire and closed the year with a victory in the Pensacola Open.

His closest brush with victory in the last few years was in the 1981 Greater Greensboro Open. He was leading Larry Nelson by two, approaching the final green, but Nelson made a near impossible bunker shot for a birdie, and Mark, stunned by the turn of events, made bogey from the back fringe. Larry won it all with a birdie on the second extra hole of their playoff.

A three-time All-American at North Carolina State, Vance Heafner had justifiably big expectations when he turned pro in 1978 and tried to earn his PGA TOUR card. Several frustrating experiences in Qualifying Schools, however, delayed his start until June of 1980. But his 1981 season demonstrated fully the potential that observers had noted during his amateur career.

After his splendid 1982 when he had six top 10 finishes and won more than \$111,000, his followers knew he was well on his way to becoming one of the better players in the game.

This past year, however, his earnings dipped slightly. "It wasn't as good a year as I wanted it to be," he said. "My first couple of years on the TOUR, I played so many tournaments that it started to get to me. I've finally realized I can't play 35 or more weeks a year, such as I was doing."

The strapping six-footer, who is the son of the late Clayton Heafner, a noted player in the 1940's and 50's, got his feet wet with earnings of \$11,398 in 18 tournaments over the last half of the 1980 season. He was aiming directly at an exempt Top 60 spot as the 1981 season opened — and he reached that goal in dramatic fashion in the season's last two weeks.

Indeed, it came down to the last two holes at the Pensacola Open, where he ran home birdie putts to tie for 10th place, earning the \$4,433 which lifted him past Gibby Gilbert into the 60th and final exempt position.

"I think every player aims for exempt status in his first year. I'm not really a goal-oriented person, but I have to say that those last two weeks of the season were the most exciting and enjoyable times I've had in golf," he said.

Heafner's enthusiasm carried over into the next week, where he and partner Mike Holland ran off with the Walt Disney World National Team Championship. They won with a record-breaking score of 42-under par 246, leaving the second-place team five shots back.

As Clayton Heafner's son, his exposure to golf was early. But with his father's death, when Vance was six years old, his athletic interests broadened, and he became a better-than-average high school basketball and football player. Golf continually beckoned, however, and he gave up the other sports to concentrate on golf in his senior year, a decision for which he was rewarded with a golf scholarship to North Carolina State.

His college coach, Richard Sykes, and then Roger Watson, became the guiding forces in his playing career. Watson, especially, helped the young Heafner build a game which has proven capable of success on the PGA TOUR.

When you look at the PGA TOUR record of Lon Hinkle, you have to believe it was compiled by two different men. In his first five years he won a grand total of \$40,876. In the next year alone, he easily surpassed that total, and since then, he has topped the century mark each year with a high of \$247,693 in 1979, until his injury-plagued 1982.

"Early in my career," he says, "my goals were too low. My main goal was to survive. When things would go bad over here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game."

On one of those trips, he met Edith, a Swiss beauty, and she gave him a new purpose to life. Since then, his career has shot straight for the stars.

While his first victory was in the 1978 New Orleans Open, he had his biggest year in 1979 winning the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in a playoff over Mark Hayes and Andy Bean. He also won the World Series of Golf, outlasting Larry Nelson to the wire.

Lon's father is a Professor in Literature at San Diego State University, and Lon started in the game of golf at age 13, shortly after the family moved from Granville, Ohio, to San Diego. He'd play golf every day.

There are seven Hinkle children and in the early days, it wasn't unusual for all of them to be competing in junior golf tournaments around southern California.

Lon received a mental boost in 1980 when he finished third to Jack Nicklaus in the United States Open and PGA Championships. Although Jack won both by comfortable margins, Lon learned in those two experiences that he could win the significant championships.

His biggest enjoyment in 1981 came in the National Long Drive contest. He won with a belt of 338 yards, six inches and became the first TOUR player ever to win it.

Late in the Fall of 1981, he injured his shoulder. He tried to play in the first event of 1982, but did not fare well and missed the cut. He didn't play again until the Masters Tournament in April, missing 12 tournaments. While he had some good moments, he was not able to play with his old authoratative style. He rebounded last year, winning more than \$100,000 for the fifth time. A tie for second in the year's final event, the Pensacola Open, put him over the mark.

When Scott Hoch joined the PGA TOUR following the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979, he did so with impressive credentials. He was expected to do well.

Before he had a chance to tee it up in his first start, the 1980 Phoenix Open, he jarred his back and had to withdraw. The pain became so severe he could not even swing a club. It wasn't until the Atlanta Classic in June — the 23rd tournament of the year — that he was able to play 72 holes. He went 15 weeks without even trying to enter.

A few weeks later, in the Quad Cities Open, he shot a course-record 63 the first day and never was headed. He went on to set a tournament-record 14-under par 266 and edged two of his former Wake Forest teammates, Curtis Strange who was second, and Gary Hallberg, who finished third.

The back continued to bother him the rest of the year. In fact, there still are times when he can not go full bore. That was part of the reason he had what he considered a disappointing 1981. However, in July of that year, he was married, and he said that has made all the difference in the

He opened 1982 at the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, and, after only a few days of practice, he tied for 15th. The next week, he was fourth alone in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Bouyed by such a fine start, he continued to play well and won again in the rain-shortened USF&G Classic in New Orleans.

He was only one stroke in back of Bob Shearer after the first round, but the next day, he traded places with the Australian. The third round wasn't completed until Monday because of weather problems, and Scott's two-under par 70 gave him a three-round total of 10-under 206. He was declared the winner over Shearer and Tom Watson.

Three strong weeks at the end of 1983 boosted him well over the \$100,000 mark again. He tied for fourth in Las Vegas, tied for sixth at the Southern Open and then was fourth alone at Walt Disney World. An injury to his left thumb early in the year cut into his effectiveness in the early Spring, preventing him from practicing.

He was raised in an athletic family and started to play golf at age eight. His father, Art, preceded him at Wake Forest, earning All-American honors in baseball and then played professionally until injuries shortened a promising career. Scott's brother, Buddy, is a professional bowler.

At Wake Forest, he was a teammate of Strange, Jay Haas, Bob Byman and David Thore when the Demons won the 1975 NCAA team title.

There was a short time - maybe three weeks - during which Mike Holland didn't know whether or not he liked golf. That's how long it took him to go from a backyard introduction to the game by a 10-year-old classmate who had been playing two years to beating that friend on the ninehole course in Bishopsville.

"I guess the game came pretty natural for me," said Holland, looking back over 16 years of steady progress in golf since that backyard introduction. "When you're the first member of your family to take up the game, you don't really know what all the possibilities are, but maybe that was

What did transpire was that Holland became a very solid high school player, solid enough to earn a golf scholarship to the University of South Carolina, where he decided his skills warranted a serious consideration of golf as a career.

It was during his junior year at South Carolina that Holland went through several minor changes in his game which, in the final analysis, gave him the opportunity to become a truly fine player.

"Being largely self-taught, I did have several minor things in my swing which were not quite right. I had a nice sophomore season and was playing pretty well, but to advance, I had to go through a transition period, and I was fortunate to have Grant Bennett, from Columbia (SC) to oversee that process. He gave me a solid foundation."

"Another factor in my development, I think, was the fact that I did not have any great successes early. I was a pretty consistent top-ten finisher in college, but I didn't win. That made me hungry, and I probably needed to be that way since I tend to be too easygoing," he smiled.

After All-American honors in 1978, coming on the heels of the 1976 South Carolina Amateur Championship, which he won during his successful sophomore season, he turned professional and headed for TOUR Qualifying

Holland gained his card in the Spring of 1980 and earned only \$1,961 in 16 events over the last half of the year. But he felt he was making progress, and began to show it during 1981

He wrapped up the individual season with a solid tournament, tying for 10th in the Pensacola Open, and that event served as a springboard for both he and partner Vance Heafner in the Walt Disney World Team Championship. They went into the event on a high note, got the first-round lead and were never headed.

His big week in 1982 came at the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic where he birdied three of the last six holes to finish second to Raymond Floyd. It was worth \$43,200. "Nothing will replace the thrill of winning with Vance last year," he said, "but the important thing about this finish is that I did it

Last year was one he wants to forget. He kept trying to play despite a circulatory problem that left his hands and arms numb. In October, he underwent corrective surgery.

If you ever had to pick someone to be a good-will ambassador for the world, Joe Inman might be your man. One of the more enthusiastic people in the game of golf, Joe will have a good word for you, no matter what the subject may be. He doesn't hesitate to spread his feelings among his colleagues.

"I know I'm playing better these days," he said, "and even if I'm not striking it as well as I did early in my career, my life itself is better. I'm not unhappy with my progress.

Then he added, "I've worked for 20 years on my game just to be an overnight success. This past year, I was a star in the Friday morning newspapers, but I couldn't hold onto the good start. I put too much pressure on myself."

As a youngster, Joe tried his hand at most sports, but readily admits, "I wasn't good enough in most of them, so I ended up with golf."

He won the Carolinas Juniors championship and eventually headed for Wake Forest University where he was a teammate of Lanny Wadkins and Leonard Thompson. He won the 1968 Carolinas Open and the 1969 North and South Amateur, thus earning a position on the 1969 U.S. Walker Cup team.

After he was graduated from Wake Forest in 1970, Joe spent some time in the Army, with part of it being at Fort Jackson, S. C., where Mark Hayes also was stationed. After he was discharged, Joe headed for the TOUR School in the Fall of 1973 and made it.

His first victory came in the 1976 Kemper Open and it is possible that there never has been a happier TOUR winner in the history of the game. The Kemper was being played in Charlotte, NC, that year, and there were hundreds of Joe Inman followers there that week. When the victory was assured, he kept repeating with a bright smile, "I can't believe this."

Although not a long hitter off the tee, Joe believes his course management is the strongest part of his game and prefers to play with a fade. Paul Obermeyer of the Ping Company is the man Joe seeks when he needs help.

One of Joe's best tournaments during his years on TOUR came in the 1979 Atlanta Classic. Joe finished second, three strokes ahead of David Graham and Grier Jones with a 15-under par score of 273. However, Andy Bean was at his brilliant best that week and won by eight strokes over Joe at 23-under 265.

Asked it he had ever been 15-under par before and lost, Joe laughed, "I've never been 15 under before, period. Andy was like a robot."

The great players always seem to find a way to win, to keep a good round going, to keep a streak alive. Even during those moments when the situation appears near impossible, they have the skills to

Hale Irwin has been known as one of the brilliant shotmakers in the game, and when you mix in the competitive heart he possesses, you have a man who knows no boundries, no limits to the success he seeks

As an example of his consistency, during the last nine campaigns, covering the 180 PGA TOUR events he has entered, he has failed to go the distance only 19 times. He went from early 1975 through the 1978 schedule — covering 86 tournaments — without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in TOUR history.

At the end of last year, he had another streak of 26 going, and that was the best current streak on TOUR at the time. He went the distance in all 20 starts in 1983, and one resulted in a most satisfying victory in the Memorial Tournament.

It was the 15th triumph of his sparkling career, and he said of it, "I've always wanted to win the Memorial Tournament. My desire has been very high ever since the first year. This is one we all point for; and if you don't, you are not aware of what tournament golf is."

That was a vintage Irwin statement. He appreciates all that is good about the game and knows

what it takes to maintain a high-level image.

In 1981, after going for nearly 20 months without a victory, he won twice in impressive style, the Hawaiian Open and the Buick Open and both came after spending a week vacationing with his family at the resort he represents, Kapalua on Maui in Hawaii.

He said of the winless stretch, "It hurt my pride." With a laugh, he added, "You have to tell yourself you are not immortal. You're not sitting on Zeus' throne, but while you are up there, you can believe you really are citing there and it's a good feeling."

The last few years, Hale has been spending more time with his family and will play the bulk of his schedule during the first six months of the year. The problem is, as he admits, "You have to play to be

Irwin joined the TOUR in June of 1968. A graduate of the University of Colorado, he won the 1967 NCAA title for the Buffaloes. He also was named twice to the All-Big Eight football team as a defensive

His first victory was in the 1971 Heritage Classic, but two of the highest points of his career came in triumphs in the 1974 U.S. Open at Winged Foot and the 1979 Open at Inverness.

Peter Jacobsen seems to be on the verge of blossoming out as the star everyone has expected him to be. Each year, his golf game gets a little bit better.

"I had several chances to win in 1983," he said, "but on the TOUR you have to learn how to win. Hopefully, in the next few years, I'll be able to win a couple times each year. When I came on the TOUR, my main goal was to become a major contender.

"You have to learn who you are and what you mean to the TOUR. I believe I understand that now and I'm ready to move on. The PGA Championship (at Riviera) showed me I have the ability to be a factor in major championships." He was third behind Hal Sutton and Jack Nicklaus.

His single victory came in the 1980 Buick-Goodwrench Open, and the following year, he lost in a playoff to Hale Irwin at the Buick.

Most important, Peter remains his happy, personable self, a delight to sponsors and gallerites at every stop he makes on the TOUR.

Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

He went to the University of Oregon and won the PAC-8 Conference championship in 1974. He was named to the collegiate All-America team three years. In 1976, he won the Oregon Open and the Northern California Open.

"I didn't know how good I was, really," he says, "because I had not played that much amateur golf nationally."

Nevertheless, he qualified for the TOUR the first time he tried, in the Fall of 1976. He has been on the rise ever since.

Along with his playing skills, Peter also is in demand for clinics and exhibitions, and especially, to do his skits imitating other players. "I used to do some of that stuff in high school," he said. "I enjoy doing it, and I know it has helped me to relax in front of people. From that standpoint, I know it has helped me on the course playing in front of people."

Barry Jaeckel would like to believe he gets closer each year to being the type of consistent player he feels he can be. "I'm looking for more consistency," he said, "more of the middle line. I still have too many ups-and-downs.'

He definitely had an "up" the week of the Kemper Open at the Congressional Country Club when he tied with four others, but he lost in the playoff which eventually was won by Fred Couples. Laughing, he said, "that was my semi-annual week to play a tough course in a big tournament well. It

Barry isn't the type to look back and think about what might have been, but even though he has had a fine career, he can be excused if he occasionally recalls the duel he had with Raymond Floyd in the Spring of 1981.

In the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, Barry held a one-stroke lead after two rounds and three strokes after three, but Floyd and Curtis Strange came on strong the last afternoon to force a tie. Then, Raymond defeated Barry and Curtis on the first extra hole.

"I don't feel I lost it," the classy Jaeckel said. "A great player beat me and a great player tied me. I'll go away smiling." That's vintage Jaeckel, and he did go away smiling.

His first victory came in the 1978 Tallahassee Open when he defeated Bruce Lietzke in a playoff. Over the years, Barry has had to work to keep his slightly unorthodox swing pattern in the groove. It requires constant attention. As difficult as it can be for him to maintain consistency, he can play very well when all the parts are properly meshed — as they were at the TPC. His short game is excellent.

The handsome Californian started in the game in rather unusual fashion. "I visted a friend's house when I was a kid. I don't remember how old I was, but he had this golf club. It felt good to swing and I thought I'd like to try the game."

He went on to make his high school golf team, and played most of his golf at the famed Riviera Country Club, where his parents were members. His first important title was the 1968 Southern California Amateur and he was runner-up in the 1971 Pacific Coast Amateur.

After turning professional in 1971, he played the mini-tours and overseas, winning the 1972 French Open. He attempted to qualify for the TOUR, but missed four times before succeeding in June

He is the son of Richard Jaeckel, a character actor who has had roles in dozens of movies and many television series.

Don January was one of the leading players on the PGA TOUR for many years, and now he has assumed the same role—and more—on the Senior PGA TOUR.

While Don won 11 tournaments from 1956 through 1976 on the regular TOUR, he now has established himself as the dominant force among the Seniors. Last year, for example, he had entered 14 tournaments through the end of November, won six of them and placed seventh or better in all of them.

When the Senior PGA TOUR officially started in June of 1980, Don won the opener. It was the Atlantic City Seniors, and he collected \$20,000 for his efforts. Later in the fall, he won the Australian Seniors, so his game knows no boundary or age limit.

Before he joined the TOUR in 1956, Don played for the NCAA championship team at North Texas State University. In his first year, he won twice, the Dallas Open and the Apple Valley Clambake. His biggest victory was in the 1967 PGA Championship, as he edged Don Massengale in a playoff

In 1972, Don left the TOUR to devote his time to golf course construction in the Dallas area. When financing became difficult during the recession, he rejoined the TOUR in 1975, soon after his 45th birthday. His remarkable comeback was highlighted in his home state when he defeated Larry Hinson in a playoff to win the San Antonio-Texas Open.

When Tom Jenkins was in his early teen years, his love was baseball. Golf never really entered his mind. One day, while pitching as a 14-year old, he tore a muscle in his right pitching arm and his days on the mound were over.

"I have a brother who is about three years older," he said, "and he played golf. So, I started to go out with him. I played along for a couple of years, and when I was 16, I started to get involved."

He played junior tournaments around Houston, and it just so happened that Dave Williams, the University of Houston golf coach, ran most of the junior events in that area.

It was natural, therefore, for Tom to move on to the University, and even today, he says, "Dave Williams is the man who was the most influential on my career.

John Mahaffey was the star of the team in 1970, the year the Cougars won the NCAA crown. In the Fall of 1972, Jenkins headed for the PGA TOUR after going through the Qualifying School. "I even surprised myself in my first two full years and then I won the IVB-Philadelphia Classic my third year, in 1975.

At Philadelphia, he led by five shots after the second and third rounds, and finally won by one after Johnny Miller made a late charge.

He played well in 1976, too, and then a skid started. By 1978, he was all the way down to 186th on the money list and could lift himself up to only 171st by 1979 and 137th in 1980.

"I was married and moved from Houston to Florida," he said, "and my priorities changed. We had a daughter in 1979, and my family became the most important thing to me. I let my game suffer."

A friend of his named Dave Pelz, who lived in Baltimore at the time, planted the seed that made him think about getting competitive again. "He got me motivated, back to work and practicing late in 1980," he said. "In eight years on the TOUR, I never practiced after the TOUR ended in the fall. I'd just go home and relax."

With hard work and words of encouragement from Pelz, Tom started 1981 with a new outlook on the game. In his fourth start, the Wickes-Andy Williams San Diego Open, he was one off the lead after three rounds, and finished in a tie with Bruce Lietzke and Raymond Floyd at 10-under 278. Lietzke won it with a birdie on the second extra hole.

Nevertheless, Tom knew then that he could play again and he went on to enjoy his richest year, winning \$78,127.

It may be a long time before anyone has a year quite like the one Tom Kite enjoyed in 1981, but he came close in 1982 and appeared headed for a great one in 1983 through the first four months of

He had a stretch early in the year where he won the Bing Crosby Pro-Am — thanks to a courserecord 62 the third day at Pebble Beach — and then was second in the Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open, tied for fourth in the Doral-Eastern Open and tied for sixth in the Honda-Inverrary Classic.

He said at the time he couldn't remember ever playing better golf than he did in those first two

events. Through April, with a tie for second in the Masters, he had won \$191,869.

You remember how brilliantly consistent he was in 1981, winning the inaugural PGA TOUR Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner; capturing the Vardon Trophy for his 69.80 stroke average; and compiling an incredible 21 top 10 finishes in 26 starts. He was eighth or better in his last 10 starts and later was honored by the Golf Writers of America as the Player-of-the-Year.

Just as in 1981, Tom claimed only one victory in 1982, as he defeated Jack Nicklaus and Denis Watson in the Bay Hill Classic, but he also lost another, the Bob Hope Desert Classic, in a playoff to Ed

He did win his second straight Vardon Trophy with a 70.21 average; and only missed the cut once in 25 starts. When he missed it in the Canadian Open, it ended a string of 53 successful tour-

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to take a swipe. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

Before his 21st birthday in 1970, Tom was medalist in the Western Amateur, runnerup to Lanny Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, second in the Southern Amateur and was named to the four-man U.S. team in the World Amateur Team Championship.

The following year he was chosen on the U.S. Walker Cup team and, in 1972, he shared the NCAA title with his University of Texas teammate, Ben Crenshaw.

Gary Koch said quite simply that he was playing for his golfing life when the TOUR headed for Abilene, TX and the LaJet Classic in the Fall of 1982. He was sitting on the 125th spot on the money list and needed a strong finish to the year to earn exempt status for 1983.

He performed when the pressure was on, finishing fifth at the LaJet collecting \$14,000 and finally earning the 98th spot on the year-end list.

It set the stage for his best year on the TOUR, as he won the Doral-Eastern Open in February of last year and collected a career-high \$168,330 by the time it was all over

His victory was highlighted by a hole-in-one at the 225-yard fourth hole, and said, "It's the first I've ever had on TOUR.

Later, he said, "It's been a long time since my last victory — six years. There have been a lot of holes played, many of them not very well, and a lot of self doubts."

Now, there are no "self-doubts." He knows he can play with the best.

Gary was a brilliant amateur player. He won such titles as the 1970 U.S. Junior, three Florida State juniors and won the 1969 Florida State Open as a 16-year old. He won 10 tournaments at the University of Florida and was a runner-up twice in the NCAA Championship gaining All-America honors three times.

Twice, he played for Uncle Sam in Walker Cup competition and once on a World Amateur Cup

When he came out on the TOUR for the start of 1976, he won early in the Tallahassee Open by a stroke over John Mahaffey. The next year, he won the Florida Citrus Open by two strokes. He played well until part way through 1978 when he tore ligaments in his left thumb. "I continued to play with it, and made it worse," he said.

At the end of 1979, he had to have an operation and "it took quite a while for me to get back on track. I feel I'm there, now.

Through the years, his short game has been excellent and, normally, he prefers to play with a draw. He has worked with Charlie Malone and Bob Toski, but currently, when needing help, he goes to Peter Kostis.

This will be an important year in the golfing career of Bill Kratzert and, as he said at the end of 1983, "I'm feeling fine now, but next year will tell the tale of whether I will be playing on the TOUR for a long time or not.

Bill has had some physical problems the last three years, and a glance at his money winnings over that period tell you something had to be wrong.

"Besides having to overcome some things physically," he said, "my game deteriorated because I created bad swing habits. The main priority in 1984 will be to work those things out. I feel confident I can do just that."

Those who know Bill Kratzert well, know there is no fiercer competitor playing the game.

His last victory was in the 1980 Greater Milwaukee Open, and it came at a good time. "Until then, I had gone three years without winning (1977 Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open). I had played well but I couldn't eliminate the bad holes.'

It also was a beneficial one. As a result, he is exempt through 1984, so even though he slipped out of the top 125 money winners, his position on the TOUR is secure.

Milwaukee also was his first start after obtaining his TOUR card in the Spring of 1976 and the following year, he won the tournament for his first individual victory. In the Fall of 1976, Bill and Woody Blackburn defeated Gay Brewer and Bobby Nichols in a playoff to win the Walt Disney World National Team Play title.

Kratzert was practically born into the game, the son of the head pro at Fort Wayne, Ind., CC for the last 20 years. "I didn't start to play until I was about 13," Bill says. "My dad never pushed me into it. It was just always there. It wasn't until I was 14 or 15 years old that I decided that golf was my game.'

He won the Indiana State Amateur at age 16 and the Indiana Open a year later. Allen Miller, who befriended Bill when he became ill during the Sunnehanna Amateur, influenced him to go to the University of Georgia, where he was chosen All-Southeastern Conference all four years and All-

After he failed in his first try in the TOUR Qualifying School, Kratzert quit the game in frustration, went home to Fort Wayne and worked six months as a fork-lift operator. But in the Spring of 1975 he accepted an assistant pro's job at a club and returned to the game to stay.

While the majority of young players follow the road through the Qualifying School to become members of the PGA TOUR, Ralph Landrum used the United States Open Championship as his front door.

Five times he tried to obtain his players' card in the Q-School and never was able to succeed. Yet, he contined to believe in his ability.

He did qualify for the Open in June at Oakmont Country Club and says, "before it even started, I felt I could win. I know that sounds strange, but I played well in the qualifying rounds."

During the first two days, he didn't do anything spectacular, with rounds of 75 and 73, but the third day he was paired with Larry Nelson and Tom Weiskopf.

Nelson was getting most of the attention that afternoon, en route to a six-under par 65, but Landrum was making a little noise, too. Ralph smiles and says, "That was a great break for me. I was five-under par with three holes to play, but I bogeyed the 16th and double bogeyed the last for a 69,"

The final afternoon, he had a 74, yet finished in a tie for eighth place and collected \$10,711. That wasn't enough to obtain his TOUR card, but the shot of confidence it gave him set the stage for a \$46,808 year and 106th place on the money list.

The best was yet to come. A month later, he tied for fifth place in the Anheuser-Busch Classic and the following week, tied for fourth in the Canadian Open. He held a one-stroke lead over Tom Purtzer after three rounds at Glen Abbey, but finished with a one-under par 72 and only two strokes out of the John Cook-Johnny Miller playoff.


It was his check for \$13,300 at the Anheuser-Busch Classic that put him over the minimum money guideline and qualified him for a position on the TOUR.

Ralph started in golf at age 10, as a caddy for his mother and father. He started to play tournament golf a year or so later. In high school, he lost the Kentucky State Interscholastic title in 1975 to fellow PGA TOUR member Russ Cochran. Although he also played high school basketball, he went to the University of Kentucky on a golf scholarship.

He won the 1975 Kentucky State Junior title and was semi-finalist in the 1977 U.S. Amateur.

After turning professional in 1979, he served as head professional at the World of Golf Club in Florence, KY until he made it on the TOUR.

He believes driving and putting are his strong suits, and prefers to play with a draw.

If Wayne Levi ever decided to focus all of his energies on his golf game, it is hard to imagine what the end result would be.

As it is, he has developed into one of the finest players in the game, and has the ability to be a multiple winner every year. He skipped the first five weeks of 1983 in order to be at home with his wife, Judy, as she awaited the arrival of their second child.

He later said, "I just felt that was where I should be. It was more important than a golf tournament."

Prior to the Buick Open in mid-August, he skipped five of the preceding six events, saying, "I wanted to be home to see Lauren crawl (their second born) and I want to be there to see her walk. There will be many more tournaments, but you get to see that only once."

He was near his best at the Buick, winning for the sixth time since starting on Tour in the Spring of 1977. In his next four starts, he never finished worse than a tie for 13th.

On a historial note, when he won the 1982 Hawaiian Open, he did so using Wilson's Optic Orange ball. He thus became the first player to win a TOUR event while using a colored golf ball.

Wayne started to play golf at age 13, mainly because his pals were playing the game. He fell in love with the game, almost immediately. During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and won the 1970 New York State Interscholastic title. During his two years at Oswego State College, he only lost once.

In the summer of 1972, he headed for Florida so that he could devote 12 months of the year to his game. After two years of mini-tour action, he tried for his TOUR card, but didn't make it on his first two attempts. Meanwhile, he played wherever he could find a game throughout Florida and, during the summer months, on the New England circuit. He won numerous events, and his first was the 1973 New Hampshire Open.

He is proud of the fact, and rightly so, that he played well enough on the mini-tours in 1974 and 1975 to be able to sponsor himself. In June of 1977, he made it through the Qualifying School.

He broke through with a victory near the end of 1978, as he teamed with Bob Mann and they won the Walt Disney World National Team Play title. He won the Houston Open in 1979 and the next year, he defeated Gil Morgan in a playoff for the Pleasant Valley-Jimmy Fund Classic title.

When Bruce Lietzke's game is right — and it usually is — he is one of the finest players in the game. It has been said, and rightly so, that he is capable of winning anywhere at any time under any

He didn't make it into the victor's circle last year, but by most standards, it was a profitable year, even if his money total of \$153,255 was the lowest since 1978.

He skipped the last 11 events on the regular schedule, choosing instead to be at home with his wife, Rosemarie, who was expecting their first child. Stephen Taylor Lietzke was born Oct. 5.

In his last three starts, he was seventh in the Anheuser-Busch Classic and tied for seventh in the Canadian Open, and then finished his year with a tie for sixth in the PGA Championship.

His last victory was in the 1982 Canadian Open, and through most of the week, he insisted he didn't expect to win. Even though he led by two strokes going into the last round, he said he didn't expect to win, but felt he had a very good chance to win. He did, of course, by two over Hal Sutton.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston.

'I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get

Six months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR, but he made it in the spring of 1975.

He played well on TOUR almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kan., gave him a cut-down set of clubs. While at Beaumont Forest Park High School in Texas, he won the Texas State Scholastic title as a sophomore and helped his team to one championship and three seconds in his four years. While at the University of Houston - where he roomed with Bill Rogers — he won the 1971 Texas State Amateur.

Pat Lindsey always knew he could put low numbers on the scoreboard, but to do it under heavy pressure, well, he wasn't certain he could accomplish that until after the B.C. Open.

He played what he called the "two finest rounds of my life" the second-and-third days on the En-Joie Golf Club course in Endicott, NY, posting a seven-under par 64 and following with a 65. That gave him a four-stroke lead over Victor Regalado heading into the final day.

He was off to a shaky start with a bogey at the first hole, but he came on strong, played aggressively the rest of the way, and won by four strokes over Gil Morgan.

"Now, I feel very positive about myself and my game," he said. "I know I can play the TOUR. When I've had some chances for good finishes, I've usually faded at the end, partly because I wasn't aggressive enough, especially with the putter."

Pat showed a touch of class as the 1982 PGA TOUR schedule headed into the final weeks. He certainly was in a precarious position in regards to his exempt status for 1983, but he settled the issue by making the cut in his last five starts. More important, in the last two events, he tied for ninth in the Pensacola Open and tied for seventh in the Walt Disney World Golf Classic.

He started to play the game at age 10. He would follow his father around the course and occasionally hit a few golf balls himself.

He qualified for the TOUR in the Spring School of 1979, and each year he has won a little more, topped by the \$45,979 last year. The most exciting day he has had in his golfing career, he says, came when he shot a 68 on the Pinehurst No. 6 course to earn his TOUR card.

When his game is right, his driving and short irons are the strong parts, and he can either draw the ball or fade it. "It depends on which way it is bending on the practice tee," he says with a laugh in response to which way he prefers.

Pat was graduated from the University of South Florida and in 1974 was named the school's Athlete of the Year. He also won the Miami Tournament of Champions in 1975 and was second to Gary Koch in the 1974 Florida Intercollegiate tournament.

There was another big day in Pat's life in 1983. His wife, Julia, presented him with their first born, Margaret Boone, on June 17.

Shortly after Jack Renner came out on the PGA TOUR, he was asked if he had any idols, was there anyone he would like to emulate.

Without hesitation, he said, "Gene Littler. I grew up in the San Diego area and Gene has lived there all of his life. I can assure you, there isn't one single person, anywhere, who can or would say one bad thing about Gene Littler."

No one could have said it better. Gene has had his share of glory since starting on TOUR in 1954, and he has known adversity, too. In the Spring of 1972, for example, he underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands. Most thought he never would reappear on TOUR. Yet, he did, by the end of 1972. In July of 1973, about 16 months after surgery, he won the St. Louis Children's Hospital Classic.

In 1975, he won three times, and in 1977 he won again, giving him a grand total of 29 TOUR triumphs. He now is focusing his main attention on the Seniors TOUR and has won seven times, including three last year.

Gene won the 1953 United States Amateur and his first TOUR victory came in his hometown, the 1954 San Diego Open. He was an amateur at the time, the next week he turned professional and headed for the Thunderbird Classic in Palm Springs. As a result of the victory and then his triumph in the 1961 United States Open, he never was subjected to qualifying for a TOUR event.

As long as Mark Lye is playing golf, there never will be another afternoon such as the hot-andhumid one at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in Sutton, MA, last September

After seven years of battling on the TOUR, he finally won his first tournament, coming from eightstrokes behind the last day with a brilliant eight-under par 64 to win by one shot over John Mahaffey, Jim Thorpe and Sammy Rachels. He finished birdie, par, birdie, birdie.

An emotional sort, Mark said, "I was beginning to believe winning was out of my reach. It isn't that you're not good enough, it's just that some people can't rise to it.

He added, "I wish you know the feeling I have now. It's been worth the waiting. It's been worth

Mark's story is one of determination and it is because of that desire to excel that he has been able to enjoy success on the PGA TOUR. All of his golfing life, Mark has had to work hard for his rewards

Although he now resides in Tallahassee, FL, he grew up on the fairways of the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA and it was there in 1979 that he nearly won his first tournament. With the cheers of his hometown friends ringing in his ears, he was tied with Lon Hinkle for the third-round lead, but finally had to settle for something less as several others came on strong at the wire.

As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year-old, and he played every day, all day.

"I was small for my age," Mark recalls, "but I could beat the bigger guys in golf. I didn't start to grow until I was in college, so playing golf was the only way I could be competitive.

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the state's point system. As a 12-and-13-year old, he was winning tournaments.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After being graduated from San Jose State, he set his sights on the TOUR, but first headed for Europe for more experience. He tried the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975 and missed and again in the Spring of 1976 and missed. He was off to Europe, and then Australia after that, and blossomed as a winner. In fact, he won the 1976 Australian Order of Merit. In the Fall of 1976, he was back in the Qualifying School, and he made it.

When John Mahaffey's game is right, there are few who can strike the golf ball with the same authority. His only problem over the years has been physical. He has had more than his share of injuries, mostly the result of strange occurrences, although you never will hear him complain.

He once said, "With my type of game, I have to practice a lot. It's all due to timing." Those

who follow John know that when he is on his game, he can be deadly.

He came back with a good year in 1983, mainly because of a swing change. "It was a transition year," he said. "I made some positive changes to help my longevity on TOUR. I added some distance without jeopardizing a lot of accuracy. It's given me a more positive outlook."

John joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970

NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977. He reached the point where he wondered if he would ever play the TOUR again.

In the spring, he received the go-ahead to play, but before he had a chance, he fell off a ladder in his garage and broke a finger. He wasn't able to rejoin the TOUR until July.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978, and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate, and the next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sut-

He was named to the World Cup team that played in Hawaii, and he won medalist honors,

When the new year dawned, he won the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Within a month, hard luck struck him again. Trying to blast out of a bunker at Pebble Beach in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, his clubhead tore into the heavy sod on the lip and came to a sudden halt. The result was that all of the tendons on the back of the hand and wrist gave away. He tried to play in Hawaii the next week but had to withdraw. It was three months before he could

With everything back to normal, he won the 1980 Kemper Open and the following year added the Anheuser-Busch Classic, both on difficult courses.

If there was an award for hard work, Roger Maltbie would be one of the leading contenders.

The personable Californian was one of the brightest young stars in the game in 1976, but three years later, he was almost a forgotten man and he fell to 155th on the money list. With hard work and dedication, he pulled himself back into the front line in 1981, and came close to winning twice.

After shooting a third-round 64 in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, he led the field by two with a 197 total. "It's been a long time since I've been in this situation," he said softly. "I told my caddy coming down 17 that it was like running into an old friend."

He had a most respectable 68 the final afternoon, but Hubert Green had a 64 and edged him by one.

The next week in the Buick Open, he finished one stroke out of the four-way playoff, and he said, "For the first time in a long time, the game is at my fingertips."

He had two of the finest rounds of his career opening the 1982 Memorial Tournament with a 68 and 66 for a tournament record 36-hole total of 10-under par 134. He led by six strokes.

After three rounds, he was tied with Gil Morgan, but only after Morgan eagled the final hole to catch him. He finally tied for second place with three others as Raymond Floyd snared the victory.

His next best effort was in the Tournament Players Championship as four solid rounds left him alone in fifth place.

Now, he says, "I've become more consistent, but haven't been able to generate any real sustained good play." His best efforts came back-to-back in June at the Kemper Open and Manufacturers-Hanover Westchester Classic as he finished in the top 10 both weeks.

Roger was as amazed as anyone by his startling performances midway through his rookie year of 1975. He won back-to-back tournaments, the Ed McMahon-Quad Cities Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic. After the latter, he left his winner's check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one, and, at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

Roger was a teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, Calif. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

In his first attempt at qualifying for the TOUR, he missed in the Fall of 1973, but the next year, he made it.

Gary McCord was on center stage after his first-round 64 in the 1981 Michelob-Houston Open. It gave him a one-stroke lead over three fellows named Ben Crenshaw, Tom Kite and Hale Irwin.

He was explaining to one and all why he was there. "It was out of my hands," he told them

was playing in a tri-zonal time warp. My force field was very strong. My plume, the swirling force of energy, normally extends about six-feet above my head. Today, it must have been 10-feet tall."

He told them it all was a part of his experiment of playing in the third dimension, because, you see, he really was an unknown magician from the planet Blothar, and he was sent down this particular day to take over the body of Gary McCord. "I'm on kind of a recreational reconnaissance and colf seems like a nice game.

After a few minutes of tale-telling, he said in a whisper that was just loud enough for everyone to

"This is great. These guys are writing down everything I say. During the night, his "plume" left him.

That was typical Gary McCord and because of it he is one of the more popular people to play the

There is another side to this bright fellow, and his peers recognize it. He is the one credited with the plan for the All-Exempt Tour which went into effect at the start of 1983.

As he recalls, "At Doral in 1981, I talked with Jack Nicklaus and some others about the idea. I

went home and spent six weeks in my den, pouring over the records and all the other information I could find, trying to come up with a system that would eliminate Monday qualifying and work.

'I felt the time had come for a change in the way we presented the TOUR as far as the format was concerned. There were too many guys not making enough money, but having to assume the high cost of traveling.

'A system had to be devised to allow all participants on the PGA TOUR to play on an exempt basis.

Later in the Fall of 1981, the basic plan was presented by Commissioner Deane Beman to the players and it received overwhelming approval.

As everything turned out, Gary became a victim of his own system in 1982 when he finished 130th on the money list and only 125 would be exempt in 1983. He returned to the Qualifying School that fall, and finished 10th.

Last year, he won a career high of \$55,756 with a tie for fourth at the Byron Nelson Classic his

Gary started to play the game at age 15. He was a pretty fair baseball pitcher as a teenager in Garden Grove, Calif., but his family moved to Riverside. "I was 15 then, and I didn't know anyone. So, I started going out to the golf course, and I played every day all summer.'

He developed into a fine player at the University of California-Riverside earning All-America honors twice and winning the College Division NCAA crown. "It was a futuristic dream, but I started to think this would be a great way to make a living."

After missing in the PGA Tour qualifying school twice, he finally made it in the fall of 1973

Last fall, he was elected to a three-year term as a Player Director on the TOUR's Policy Board.

There are times when it appears as if Mike McCullough will come on to be the fine player many people believe he should be. He had such a stretch in late Winter of 1983 when in six tournaments, he won nearly \$30,000.

He seemed to be well on his way to the finest of his 11 years on TOUR, but it wasn't to be, and he

only won approximately \$9,000 the rest of the way.

"I've always tried to keep my family and my golf separate," he said. "I want to be home more and play when I want to play. But, there are so many good players on the TOUR now, that you can't do that for long. You have to compete."

He usually has been able to come up with a healthy check when the need arises. In 1982, for example, it appeared as if he might not make the leading 125 money winners for his exemption, but he fashioned the strong finishes down the stretch. He won \$17,400 for his tie for third in the Bank of Boston Classic and added another \$5,500 two weeks later in the Southern Open as he tied for 12th, so he was set for this year.

Mike always has been a fine striker of the golf ball, but, by his own admission, there have been times when he lacked confidence in his ability. He said he prefers to play the fade with his woods and long irons, but tends to draw the ball with the shorter irons.

As a youngster, he played whatever sport was in season around his hometown of Coshocton, OH. It wasn't until after he was graduated from Bowling Green State University in 1968 that he decided to devote more time to golf.

His first experience with golf came as a six-year old, mainly because the backyard of his home bordered the eighth hole of the country club. "Actually, I liked baseball better in those days, but I did try to play some golf, too," he said.

His first year out of college, he taught physical education in the Monroe (Mich.) system and then he headed for Florida to play the mini-tours. Before doing so, he won the 1970 Ohio Amateur championship. Twice he tried for his PGA TOUR card and missed, in the Fall of 1970 and again in 1971. Finally, he made it in 1972.

He progressed slowly, but steadily, through his early years on TOUR, and then his big breakthrough came when least expected, in the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass. He was the first-round leader with a brilliant six-under par 66. He finished in the extremely windy-and-cold conditions with 74, 76 and 75 to wind up two strokes behind winner Mark Hayes. He won \$34,200.

Later in the Spring, he won the Magnolia Classic and added another \$7,000 to his bankroll. Mike played well in the 1978 TPC, too. Although he tied for 12th, his third-round 69 was the only sub-70 round of the tournament.

It was more than a learning year for Mark McCumber in 1982. What he learned about himself and his golf game set the stage for one of the great stories of 1983.

"For the last six months of that year," he said, "I worked hard on the mental part of the game. When I won the Doral-Eastern Open in 1979, I was able to isolate each shot. I looked at films of the tournament and saw that I had the exact same pre-shot routine; the same number of waggles, everything.

"That was when I decided to see Bert Yancey to talk about the pre-shot routine and its importance. My third-and-fourth round scores really had been poor, which meant I was doing something different from the first two days.

Once he established in his mind what he wanted to do, Mark finished the year by making the last seven cuts. A tie for ninth in the Pensacola Open was his best effort. He won approximately half of his year's total of \$31,684 in that stretch.

"All of my stats went up dramatically in that period, too," he said. "I always felt I could play as well as most of the players on TOUR, but the fact that I wasn't getting the results meant something else was wrong.

In 1983, he did more than just "play as well as most players." He was one of the outstanding competitors, winning twice and finishing eighth on the money list with \$268,294. That's an increase of \$236,610 in a year.

"I worked hard on my pitching and putting," he said, "because I felt I needed to improve more there than any other part of the game. The greatest test came at the Western, and I passed it."

He had two top 10 finishes leading into the Western, and the week before Pensacola, he tied for second in the Walt Disney World Classic. So, he knew his game was ready

As he headed for the Doral-Eastern Open in 1979, winning was not on his mind. In the six previous events that year, he missed the cut four times and did not qualify for two others. Rounds of 67, 71 and 69 left him one-stroke out of the third-round lead. His even-par 72 the last afternoon was good enough to give him a one-stroke margin over Bill Rogers.

After being graduated from high school, Mark studied for the ministry for two years at Brooklyn Bethel College. Golf was his game, though, and he turned professional in 1974. He tried for his TOUR card five times before he made it in the Spring of 1978.

Along with playing, he also is busy in the golf course design business with his brothers. A part of the Master Links Company, they have worked on 17 courses in the last four years,

In addition, Mark recently signed as the director of Golf at the Ravines Resort in Middleburg, FL, a complex designed by the McCumber family. He will head the Corporate Golf School there.

Pat McGowan recalls with a laugh how he received his introduction to the game. "I was about eight-and-a-half years old at the time," he said, "and I used to play tennis four-or-five hours a day with my two older brothers at the Colusa (CA) Golf and Country Club. We were crazy about tennis.

"Then one day the pro at the club, Warren MacCarty, had a putting contest for all the kids and we did reasonably well. The next day, one of my brothers, Mike, and I asked for jobs picking up golf balls at the range. We did that for the next eight years. The tennis racquets went into the closet to stay as soon as we started to work."

He won several junior titles and went to Brigham Young University where he played on teams with the likes of Mike Reid, Jim Nelford, John Fought, Mike Brannan. He continued to win through college with one of his big victories being the 1977 Pacific Coast Intercollegiate.

He made it onto the TOUR after his first attempt at qualifying in the Fall of 1977 and had an excellent rookie year, winning \$47,091. That was his best money year until 1982, and then he far surpassed them both this past year.

"I developed more consistency," he explained it. "My short game was better, especially the wand on the greens. It was a combination of hard work and patience."

One of his biggest thrills in the game came in the 1978 Canadian Open. He finished second to Bruce Lietzke, but at the difficult 18th, he holed a sand wedge from 80 yards one day for an eagle three.

In the Quad Cities Open in 1982, he was tied with Calvin Peete and Jeff Mitchell after three rounds and eventually tied for second. He had a final-round 67, but Payne Stewart won it with a closing 63. It was his best finish since the '78 Canadian and it was especially pleasing since his father had flown in from Sacramento the night before to see the final round.

Karl Tucker, the head golf coach at BYU, had a big influence on his game, but in recent times, Peggy Kirk Bell, his mother-in-law who is one of the leading instructors in the game, has helped him at their Pine Needles course in Pinehurst.

While in high school, Pat was named all-conference in both football and basketball for three years, and in 1973, was Valedictorian of his class.

There have been several superb golfers come out of South Africa, and it would appear that Mark McNulty has all the ingredients to become one of the very best.

He has won numerous events around the world already, so it now seems likely he will be a regular part of the PGA TOUR for many years. He obtained his player's card in June of 1982 after finishing in a tie for 17th at the Kemper Open, and thus had earned enough money in five events to meet the minimum money guidelines. The next week, he played in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and was fourth. Later in the summer, after a 66-65 start, he tied for fourth place in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open.

Mark was born in Zimbabwe and, although he grew up in a farming environment, he became interested in golf at an early age because his mother played the game.

"I was about eight-years old when I started," he said, "but by the time I was 10, I knew that someday, I would turn professional."


As a youngster following golf, Arnold Palmer was "like an idol to me," but Mark also said that as his game progressed, it was Gary Player who served as the model for what he wanted to accomplish.

Mark won the Rhodesian Amateur in 1974, but at the age of 23, he moved to South Africa because he felt it would be in the best interest of his golf career. He led the South African Order of Merit twice, 1980 and 1981, but he also won such events as the German Open in 1980, the Malaysian Open in 1980 and the Greater Manchester Open in England in 1979.

Early in 1982, while playing the South African circuit, he won four events, including three in a row. It marked quite a comeback, since in the Fall of 1981, he was in an automobile accident at home and the car was totally demolished.

He first played in the United States in the 1981 Open at Merion and tied for 53rd. He came back for the World Series of Golf and finished 12th.

He said of his performance in 1983, "I didn't play very well the first part of the year, but after the British Open, I started to play the way I like to play." In the Open Championship at Royal Birkdale, he was only four strokes off the lead after three rounds, but a poor last day cost him dearly.

Allen Miller said he was "just a normal kid looking for something to do" when he strolled across the street from his home to the Osceola Golf Club in Pensacola. The pro there, a fellow named Gordy Glenz, was conducting a junior clinic, and Allen, at age 11, thought it might be fun.

Glenz was so impressed by what he saw in the young Miller that he suggested he get more individual attention so that his apparent natural talents could blossom. As a result, Gordy worked with Allen for about four years.

Now, of course, Gordy still keeps a close eye on his young man. He has been a PGA TOUR Tournament official for well over a decade.

Allen established an outstanding record as an amateur. His first two titles of any significance were the 1965 Junior Orange Bowl championship in Miami and the Florida State High School championship. He then headed for the University of Georgia.

While with the Bulldogs, he was a teammate of Terry Diehl, Lyn Lott and Pete Davison, the latter the Director of Golf at the Players Club.

Twice he was on the Walker Cup team, playing at Cherry Hills in Denver in 1969 and St. Andrews, Scotland, in 1971. He also was on the 1970 U.S. Eisenhower Cup team.

He had an exceptional year in 1970, winning six significant amateur titles, including the Canadian by 10 strokes and the Trans-Mississippi for a second time.

He qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1971, finishing fifth in a strong class. Although Allen has had his share of physical problems through the years, he did gain a victory in the 1974 Tallahassee Open by a stroke over Dan Sikes, Joe Inman and Eddie Pearce.

"It was like the whole world got off my back," he said at the time.

Recent years have not been particularly kind to his golf game, but he was back on track in 1982, winning \$48,301, his best money year since 1973. A large part of the turn-around was because of his new lifestyle. He was married in 1981 to Cindy Kessler, formerly of the LPGA Tour and they now have a daughter.

Allen prefers to play the ball from left to right and does so consistently now. A few years ago, he tried to make several swing changes, and that, plus the tendinitis in his left elbow, caused him considerable grief.

Throughout his career, when Johnny has been playing well, he has been awesome. He always has been able to make the game appear so easy, driving the ball long-and-straight; rifling his irons dead on the flagsticks and holing putts from all corners of the greens.

Miller's arrival as a star always has been tied to his final-round 63 and victory in the 1973 U.S. Open at Oakmont, but it was in 1974 that he won eight times and set what was then a record of \$353,021. He won the first three events of that year.

The next year, Johnny's clubs were blazing again. He won the Phoenix Open to start the year with a 24-under par score, and the next week won the Tucson Open with a 25-under score. In each tournament, he had a round of 61

No one has touched back-to-back efforts like that since.

In 1966, Johnny first gained national notoriety when he signed up to caddy in the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in his native San Francisco. However, he eventually qualified to play in the tournament, and went on to an eighth-place finish.

He started in the game at age five, and one of his first titles was the U.S. Juniors in 1964. He went to Brigham Young University and was graduated in 1969. Later that year, he qualified for the TOUR.

"Golf is such an unpredictable sport — I've wondered many times whether or not I should be doing this for a living.

So said the "old" Jeff Mitchell, the one who had won just \$81,246 in three years on the PGA TOUR, never finishing higher than fourth in any tournament.

All that changed, however, when the Texas Tech product vaulted past the field at the 1980 Phoenix Open, winning easily by four shots and pocketing \$54,000 in one fell swoop

His winnings for 1980 totaled \$111,217, a rather tidy sum for a fellow who two years earlier had suffered through physical problems and won only \$12,184.

There were times in 1983 when he had to reflect on his original statement. "I hurt my elbow the first week of the year," this pleasant young man said, "by lifting luggage. I played hurt for the first seven months." As a result, he missed the 36-hole cut in 12 of 16 starts during that stretch and his best finish was a tie for 54th at the Doral-Eastern Open.

He was having some back problems, too, but during the latter half of the year, he started on a weight-lifting program. "It's helped a lot," he said, adding that he was confident he could regain his old form in 1984.

Mitchell, who started playing golf at 14, won the 1978 Texas State Open in a playoff against Ben Crenshaw. His amateur career was highlighted by two consecutive victories (1975-76) in the West Texas Championships, and by a runner-up finish in the 1976 Southwest Conference tournament — to TOUR regular Keith Fergus.

Mitchell's win at Phoenix came relatively easily as he was never seriously threatened down the stretch on Sunday, carrying a four-shot lead into the par-3 15th at Phoenix Country Club.

"That was the only time I really got worried," he admitted. "The pin was set directly over the water, and I felt the only way I could lose the tournament would be to knock it in the drink, so I said to myself, 'it won't be easy to two-putt from the back of the green, but you can bet I'm gonna be there!' ... and I was.'

Mitchell credits his middle and short iron play as the best part of his game. "I think I've become a pretty decent striker of the ball, but I've got some work to do on my putting," he says.

Just when it appeared as if Larry Mize had no chance to make the exempt list for 1983, he fooled everyone by playing the way he knew he could play this game. He had won \$14,787 with two tournaments remaining on the 1982 schedule, so it appeared as if his chances were slim, indeed, of making the top 125 money winners.

However, he proceeded to tie for ninth in the Pensacola Open and then tie for 11th in the Walt Disney World Classic to win \$14,000 and finish the year in 124th place with \$28,787. In the Pensacola Open, he started with rounds of 66 and 68 to put himself in position for a strong finish, and at Disney World, he finished with 69-67. One shot less, and he would not have made the top 125.

Those performances should have served as a clue to all followers of the game to keep their eye on this fellow. He made the most of his exempt status and became a winner in 1983, capturing the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic in rather dramatic fashion.

He was dueling Fuzzy Zoeller, Chip Beck, John Mahaffey, Sammy Rachels and others down the stretch in a tight drive, but he clinched it with a pressure-packed 25-foot putt for a birdie on the final hole at the Colonial Country Club.

The victory still was a surprise to him. "I had taken two weeks off just before going there. All I wanted was a good, solid showing, but the winning part came so fast that it took awhile for me to realize what I had done."

Larry had two other top 10 finishes and collected \$146,325 for the year. "I learned a lot the first year and even more this past year," he said. "There is such an advantage being able to play with the people who have won a lot of tournaments and seeing how they handle certain situations."

Since the first time he picked up a club at the age of nine, Larry Mize has been totally in love with the game. He only had a few lessons in the formative years, as his father, a scratch handicapper, pointed him in the right direction.

His mother made certain he played in a number of junior tournaments, and he rewarded her with consistent second-and-third place finishes. He was the No. 1 man on the Augusta (GA) Prep team, and then went on to Georgia Tech, where he was No. 1 for three years and captain of the team for two. Along the way he also won an Atlanta Amateur championship.

It was an important year for Larry experiencewise in 1980 when he competed in five TOUR events. He attempted to obtain his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981 but missed by a stroke, but he was successful in the Fall of 1981.

Talking proudly about her son, his mother commented, "He loves the game more than you can imagine, but sometimes I wonder if he isn't too nice on the course. Maybe he needs more of a killer instinct." He found some of that, too, in 1983.

When Orville Moody arrived at the Houston Champions Golf Club for the 1969 United States Open, there was only one person, other than Orville himself, who thought he had a chance.

His pal, Lee Trevino, told him, "If I don't win it this week, I think you will, Sarge."

Those words meant a lot to Orville, and he did go on to win the Open in one of the Championship's biggest surprises. He was only two years out of the Army and only a year away from giving up the Tour completely.

There have not been many other highlights to Orville's PGA TOUR career, but later in that year, he joined with Trevino and they won the World Cup title for the United States. He also won such things as the 1958 All-Army Championship and the 1962 All-Service Championship, definitely highlights in his mind.

Orville's father was a golf course superintendent in Oklahoma and he says, "I've been playing the game for as long as I can remember." He won the Oklahoma State high school crown.

He was offered an athletic scholarship to the University of Oklahoma, but left college shortly after enrolling and enlisted in the Army. After a stint as a rifle instructor, his golfing talents were recognized, and was placed in charge of maintenance, instruction and supervision of Army courses. He served in Japan, Korea, Germany and the United States. He even won three Korean Opens.

In 1967, while stationed at Fort Hood in Killeen, TX., he decided to give up his 14-year career in the Army — he was a Staff Sergeant — and try the Tour. He gave himself two years to make good, or he would return to the Army.

He made it through the 1967 Qualifying School, but it was not an easy year in 1968, winning \$12,950. A few times, he was on the verge of quitting, but decided to stick by his original plan to give the Tour at least two years.

Orville, who is part Choctaw Indian, only plays a limited schedule now, but his victory in the Open Championship gave him unlimited exempt status.

He is looking forward to a busy 1984, though. He had his 50th birthday last December and thus qualified for the Senior PGA TOUR. "I'll be playing in a few events on the regular Tour," he said, "but I plan to play in all the Seniors' tournaments that I can."

Gil Morgan is a personable, quiet sort of fellow who can slip by unnoticed, but when he's on the golf course, his colleagues know where he stands.

In the first two tournaments of 1983, all they had to do was look atop the leader boards, and there they would find his name. He won the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins and Curtis Strange; and the next week he won the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open by two strokes

He had his other strong moments during the year, such as losing the Kemper Open in a playoff to Fred Couples; and finishing second to Pat Lindsey in the B.C. Open, plus his third-place finish in the United States Open.

He received a special bonus because of his superb play. He was named to the U.S. Ryder Cup

His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson. With his powerful, fluid swing action, he always has been able to play the more difficult courses well.

Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma. he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship in 1967, but waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

His best national amateur performances came in the Western Amateur and Porter Cup, finishing second in 1972. He entered the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1972, but did not make it. After a stint on the mini-tours, he returned in 1973 and passed his test.

Although he did not gain a lot of national amateur attention, Danny Edwards said that the players around Oklahoma knew all about him. "Oh, yeah, we knew all about the fellow named Morgan who lived in Wewoka.

He progressed steadily up the ladder on the TOUR until he won the 1977 B.C. Open by five strokes over Lee Elder. The next year, he won the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open and then the World Series of Golf. He pocketed \$267,459 for the year.

Bob Murphy was forced to miss the first nine tournaments of 1982 because of a hand injury and even when he came back, the crispness was lacking his usually-steady game.

In fact, he was able to post only two top 10 finishes and his money total was the lowest in his 15 years on TOUR. Yet, he always seemed to be smiling and at times, left the fairways to climb into the television booth to assist as a color analyst. He seemed to be as much at home behind a mike as he is

"It was at the Colonial National Invitation last year," he said, "when I started to play some golf again. My hands didn't swell-up and I wasn't having any more trouble with them." At the Colonial, he had his best finish, too, a tie for fifth place.

During his fine career, he has been able to win four times, but it is interesting to note that this strong competitor has lost five times in six playoffs. The last was in the 1981 Tallahassee Open when Dave Eichelberger gained the victory.

Bob's career started in a rather unusual fashion. He went to the University of Florida on a baseball scholarship as a pitcher, but he injured a shoulder in a pick-up football game as a freshman.

He took up golf as a physical education course and it was love at first sight. He said he would even skip class to practice.

Before he was graduated with a degree in physical education, he won the 1965 United States Amateur championship, the 1966 NCAA title for the Gators, two Florida Amateur titles, the 1967 Florida Open, and played on U.S. World Amateur Cup and Walker Cup teams.

He turned professional and went to the PGA TOUR School in 1967, and passed easily. In his rookie year of 1968, he set a goal of winning \$40,000. He won \$105,595, a record for a first-year player at that time, and two tournaments, the Philadelphia and Thunderbird Classics, back-to-back. Just prior to his first victory, he was second in the Westchester Classic.

He has won twice since then, the 1970 Greater Hartford Open and the 1975 Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic.

He had off years in 1976 and 1977, due mainly to a uric acid condition that gave him hand problems, came back slightly in 1978 and then, for the first time in his TOUR career, slipped from the list of top 60 money winners in 1979. He was 62nd, only \$770 behind the 60th man. He figured he needed one more putt, somewhere, to keep his streak alive.

Tsuneyuki (Tommy) Nakajima has followed in the footsteps of Isao Aoki, becoming a member of the PGA TOUR and carrying an impressive set of credentials along the way.

He has been the leader in the Japanese Order of Merit the last two years, and in 1983 he collected seven victories, but a special moment came when he shot a brilliant 65 the last day to win individual honors in the U.S. vs. Japan team matches last November. He posted the score on a cold, windy day when most players were struggling to match par.

He considers winning the Japan Amateur championship in 1973 at the age of 19 as his greatest accomplishment, but last year won his second Japan PGA title, and such other events as the Suntory Open, Japan Match Play and the Mitsubishi Gallant.

He also played well in eight U.S. appearances, with a solo fourth in the Greater Greensboro Open his best. The week before, he tied for 16th in the Tournament Players Championship.

He also tied for 16th in the Masters Tournament the week after the GGO. He was only four strokes off the lead after three rounds (72-70-72), but a final-round 76 dropped him back.

He said at the time, that his main purpose of playing here was to win enough money to qualify for a PGA TOUR card. He collected \$46,351, easily enough for membership without having to go through the Qualifying School. He tied for 13th in the World Series of Golf, pocketing \$8,125, but since he qualified through the Japan Tour, the money was unofficial.

He obtained the nickname Tommy while playing in the 1981 Australian Masters. The television announcers could not pronounce Tsuneyuki, and Tommy seemed to be close enough.

Tommy started to play golf as a nine-year old with the help of his father. Through the early years, his father was his only teacher. He turned professional in 1975 at the age of 22 and his progress has been steady. In 1981, he was second only to Aoki on the Japan Order of Merit, and the following year, he collected a record \$270,000 with five victories.

Today, close followers of the Japan circuit will tell you that he is the heir apparent to Aoki's throne as Japan's leading player and is expected to continue on and one day be regarded as its greatest player.

As expected, Aoki and Jack Nicklaus are his two "most admired" people in the game, but when Aoki holed the wedge shot to win the 1983 Hawaiian Open, Tommy didn't know about it for a day or two. He was competing in Australia.

He considers the strongest part of his game the driver through the three iron, but his short game and putting have been improving each year.

A very personable-and-pleasant fellow, he is a welcomed addition to the PGA TOUR.

Jim Nelford will tell you that "for the first time in my career, I really felt a part of the TOUR," in

1983. "I may be one of the best examples of how the All-Exempt TOUR has helped someone.
"I hated the old Monday qualifiers," he added, now able to smile about it. "I'm better able to

organize my schedule and thus get the best out of my game."

He did that last year, winning a career-high \$111,932 and finishing in 50th place. For those

who keep track of such items, he was the low Canadian on the money list.

He almost clinched his first victory, too. He was head-to-head with Fuzzy Zoeller coming down the stretch in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic after birdies at the 13th and 14th holes; but he bogeyed the 15th and double bogeyed the 16th to finish two strokes behind Zoeller in second

It was a definite plus for golf and the PGA TOUR when Jim decided that his future in sports was not in hockey but on the fairways of the world. However, some of the things he learned on the ice rinks of his native Canada have been useful in golf.

"I played hockey from the time I was six until I was 17," he said. "It was mostly club hockey. I really enjoyed it, but I felt my size might not let me go as far as I would have liked, so that's when I concentrated on golf.

Normally a righthander, he started to play the game at age nine as a lefthander because he had to borrow his father's clubs — and they were lefties, "My Dad switched me over to righthanced at an early age," he said, but he continued to putt lefthanded, and still does today. "It was more comfortable for me to putt that way, and that's probably because my best shot in hockey was from

He caddied some for his father in those early days, but his real start in the game came when his uncle would take him to his cabin in Saskatchewan and they would venture to a nearby course.

In his early teens, he started to think more seriously about golf, and one day he read in a magazine about how colleges gave scholarships for golf. He liked that idea, so he would practice whenever he could in his native Vancouver.

Happily, he received a scholarship to Brigham Young University, and there he teamed with Mike Reid, Pat McGowan, John Fought and Mike Brannan. Later, Bill Sander joined the team.

He was a fine amateur, winning the Canadian Amateur in 1975 and 1976 and the Western Amateur in 1977. He won the 1976 Pan American and Pacific Coast Intercollegiate events. He was All-Western Athletic Conference for three years, and twice was named second-team All-American.

In the Fall of 1977, he turned professional and headed for the TOUR's Qualifying School. He

Twice he has represented Canada in World Cup competition, and in 1980 he joined with Dan Halldorson to win the team title.

Last year, he returned to Canada to play in the new Tournament Players Series' event in Windsor at the Essex Club, and he won it.

With each passing year, the people in the sports world are becoming more impressed with a soft-spoken Georgian named Larry Nelson. The bigger the challenge, the better he seems to respond.

Heading into the United States Open at the Oakmont Country Club last June, he was not enjoying a good year by his lofty standards. He slipped into town almost unnoticed, and stayed that way through the first two rounds. His 75-73—148 left him seven strokes off the pace.

Then came the challenge; a challenge he issued to himself, and he responded brilliantly. His sixunder par 65 in the third round lifted him to within one stroke of the co-leaders, Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros.

During the rain-interrupted last round, it was a battle between Larry and his good friend Watson. Play had to be halted late in the afternoon with Nelson on the 16th tee and Watson on the 15th green.

When it resumed the next morning, Larry hit a four wood to the back level of the green on the 226-yard hole, some 62 feet from the cup. He was hoping he wouldn't three putt. Instead, he made it for a near impossible birdie two and went on to a one-stroke victory over Watson. His 10-under par 132 for the last two rounds set a U.S. Open record.

It was his second major championship, since he won the 1981 PGA title before thousands of his hometown followers at the Atlanta Athletic Club. His margin was four strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller.

Larry started on TOUR in 1974, but his first victory didn't come until six years later in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. Later that same year, he defeated Ben Crenshaw for the Western Open title.

There are not many stories on the PGA TOUR more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he had his Approved Tournament Players card. "I really wasn't ready," he said later, but he got ready in a hurry, as witness his steady climb up the money rankings since then.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried school again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, Ga. He turned pro six months after that. He tried the mini-tours briefly and, in 1973, finished bogey-bogey in the Florida State Open to lose by a shot. That was his lone 72-hole event before earning his TOUR card that fall.

While some of the magic may be missing from Bobby Nichols' golf bag these days, he still remains one of the most popular figures in the game.

He only makes a limited number of appearances on the TOUR, but before he moves on to the Senior PGA TOUR in a couple of years, he would like to reach the \$1 million mark in earnings, and it appears likely he will make it.

It has been a wonderful career for the big handsome fellow who came very close to not being able to play the game at all.

Since he started on the PGA TOUR in 1960, Bobby has won 12 times, including the 1964 PGA Championship at the Columbus (OH) Country Club. It was there that he seemingly made great shots from all corners of the golf course and holed putts from one end of the state to the other. He won by

three over Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer.

Several years earlier, Bobby was an outstanding football and basketball player at St. Xavier High School in Louisville, Ky. On September 3, 1952, he was critically injured when a car in which he was a passenger failed to make a curve and crashed.

He suffered a broken pelvis, back injuries, a brain concussion and internal injuries. He was paralyzed from the waist down and was unconscious for 13 days. He was hospitalized for 96 days.

His football and basketball days were over, but he still could play golf, when he finally regained the use of his legs. While going on to win junior golf titles in Kentucky, he met Bear Bryant, then the football coach at the University of Kentucky. Bryant went on to Texas A&M, and proceeded to give Bobby a scholarship to play golf for the Aggies.

Bobby won the 1956 Southwestern Conference title, and after he was graduated, spent two years in the Army. He held the rank of Captain in the reserves.

He came out on TOUR in 1960, and two years later was honored by the Golf Writers Association of America with the Ben Hogan Award for his courageous comeback.

He had another terrifying moment at the 1975 Western Open. That was when he felt the effects of a bolt of lightning and was taken to the hospital with Lee Trevino and Jerry Heard. He has not play∈d with the same effectiveness since.

He has won five Masters Tournaments and five PGA Championships; four U.S. Opens; three Tournament Players Championships and British Opens; one World Series of Golf; and two U.S.

Amateur Championships.
On the PGA TOUR, he has won 69 times but few realize he has been second an astonishing 54 times and third on 34 occasions. He finished second three times last year and two of those came in his last two starts — the PGA Championship and World Series of Golf

Even so, he said his biggest thrill in the game came last fall when he captained the United States Ryder Cup team to a thrilling one-point victory over the European team. It is an amazing record for a truly amazing man.

Mike Nicolette had been fighting the odds — and losing — for too many years on the PGA TOUR to let his one big chance for glory slip away.

He was competing in the Bay Hill Classic and playing as never before. After three rounds, he was six strokes ahead of Greg Norman of Australia and Seve Ballesteros of Spain. Everyone knows six shots is not a bunch when you have two of the best in the world next in line.

Seve's hopes of making a move evaporated when he bogeyed four in a row, starting at the 11th,

but Norman was making moves. After 16 holes, Mike and Greg were tied.

They parred the 17th, and then at the demanding 18th hole, Mike recalls, "After my tee shot, I had 203 yards to carry the lake to the green. I thought, 'This is your chance to win. Go for it'."He also told himself that his boyhood idol — and the tournament sponsor, Arnold Palmer — would go for it. So, he did.

His shot was a good one and rolled to the back fringe. He eventually bogeyed, but so did Nor-

man, who also was long with his approach. On the first extra hole, Mike received his reward, winning with a par as Norman three putted

from 33 feet for a bogey. He later laughed, "Seve owns Spain and Greg just bought a house here in Bay Hill and a \$73,000

Ferrari. I've been worried about making my next rent payment." It was another a dream come true for Mike in the final round of the 1982 Doral-Eastern Open. He was in the next-to-last group and paired with Jack Nicklaus. "Every young player dreams of that," Mike said, "and being with him, plus in contention to win, well, it was an experience I'll never forget."

Jack may not forget it either, because Mike shot a final-round 70 and tied for second place, just one stroke behind the winner, Andy Bean. Jack had to settle for a 74 and a tie for 11th.

It is interesting to note that Mike shot a four-over par 76 in the Monday qualifier and was the last man to get into the tournament. "I practiced well all week," he said, "and everything did get better each day.

Mike started to play golf at age 10 because his parents played. He says he never really worked at it "until I was 14 or 15, and then I played in a couple of junior tournaments. I liked the competition,

so I stayed with the game. He played varsity golf through high school and then at Rollins College. He left school to try for his TOUR card in the Spring of 1978 and made it. Although his first two years on TOUR were not overly productive, he felt he was making progress. He knew he was playing better and felt the scoring would come if he stayed with it.

Then came 1981, and neither his game nor his personal life worked out well. By the end of the year, playing a limited schedule, he had won only \$512. He was off the TOUR and back in the Qualifying School. He made it again with no particular problem.

Greg Norman has always established high standards for himself and at every step along the way through his golfing career, he has met or surpassed his goals.

Last Fall, as he prepared to enter his first full season on the PGA TOUR, he said he had set very high goals again, but didn't care to reveal what they were. "But, believe me," he said, "they are high."

He had good reason to be optimistic. When he won \$100,000 in the Kapalua International last November, it was his seventh victory of the year — and fifth in his last six starts worldwide.

The handsome Australian never played the game until he was 16, and then one day, he caddied for his mother, a three handicapper. When she finished the round, he borrowed her clubs and played a few holes on his own.

In two years, this son of a mining engineer went from a 27 handicapper to scratch. His secret to success came from two books his mother gave him, both written by Jack Nicklaus — "Golf My Way," and "55 Ways to Play Golf."

Greg will tell you, "I didn't try to copy Jack, just pick up the basics."

Today, Greg is known for his prodigious drives, but that was part of his early training, as he was told to hit it as hard as he could, and then work on straightening it out.

The victories started to come early and by 1982 — just three years after he joined the European Tour full time, he was the leading money winner.

His first appearance in the United States was in the 1977 Memorial Tournament, but he missed the cut. Since then, though, he has been in 24 U.S. events, and has missed the cut in only two others.

In the 1981 Masters Tournament, he finished fourth, but he gained considerable attention with his "shark-hunting" stories, and thus became known as the "Great White Shark." He says he actually never went hunting for sharks, only shot at a few when "I became irritated because they were eating my fish. And, I only did that a few times."

Nevertheless, the nickname Shark has caught on, and he even has puppet shark headcovers for his woods.

Last year, Greg entered nine PGA TOUR events and made the cut in all nine, collecting \$71,411. He easily surpassed the minimum money guideline for membership, and last Fall announced his intention to play the TOUR full time.

In his first 1983 start, he tied with Mike Nicolette in the Bay Hill Classic, coming from six strokes behind the last day, but lost the playoff on the first extra hole. The next week, he was fifth in the USF&G Classic.

Only one other player in the history of the PGA TOUR has shot a lower 72-hole score than Tim Norris. Mike Souchak won the 1955 Texas Open in San Antonio with a 27-under par 257.

When Norris blitzed the Wethersfield Country Club course in the 1982 Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, he shot a 25-under par 259. Only Byron Nelson, in the 1945 Seattle Open, and Chandler Harper, in the 1954 Texas Open, have ever shot as low as 259. Tim was on the verge of matching Souchak's mark until he bogeyed two of the final four.

He really could not explain his superlative play except to say he had very positive thoughts all week. Although his record did not show it, he said, "I had been playing well for several weeks, but everything just jelled at Hartford."

Prior to his victory, Tim went to a little longer shaft in his irons. "That enabled me to hit the ball a little further, higher and softer into the greens. I figured if I could shorten each hole by 10 yards, that

After a fine amateur record, Tim was able to earn his TOUR card in the Fall of 1980 and went on to have a decent rookie year, winning \$32,424. Late in the Fall, he suffered a sprained right hand. He tried to qualify for the first tournament, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, but the pain was too intense. He did not return to the TOUR until the Tallahassee Open in late April where he tied for 45th. He didn't make another cut until the Greater Milwaukee Open in early July. Unfortunately, the hand still gave him problems through the end of the year.

A tireless worker, he will spend hours on the practice tee when he is right physically. "That's what it takes," he said. "I want to give the TOUR my best shot and if it doesn't work out, I always can go home and get a job."

He underwent a hand operation in the Fall of 1982 and didn't return to the TOUR last year until the Tournament Players Championship. He was in rare form at the Anheuser-Busch Classic in late July, however, as three rounds in the 60s lifted him into a second-place finish, one behind Calvin

He started in the game at age six in Fresno, CA. He had a few tennis lessons and didn't care for that game, and then moved on to golf, encouraged by his stepfather.

"I took a liking to it right away," he said. As he grew older, he would watch golf on television. He didn't make his high school team until his senior year. He went on to Fresno State, and played well there. He was selected as an All-American twice. In his first start as a professional, he won the 1980 California State Open by five strokes.

He entered the TOUR regional qualifier in Modesto, CA, and won by five strokes. He went to the final school and easily qualified for his TOUR card.

Andy North knew there was something wrong with his right elbow. The pain was severe enough that he hardly practiced at all during 1983.

"There isn't any way you can compete on the TOUR," he said matter-of-factly, "if you can't practice. The elbow had been bothering me for nearly a year-and-a-half, but you don't say anything because so many of the guys play hurt. You just play and do the best you can."

At first, he thought it was tendonitis, but after close examination at home last fall, the doctors discovered a small bone spur. "When they took it out," Andy said, "it was about the size of a piece of gravel."

With that behind him and a healthy elbow again, Andy was looking forward to a return to a more consistent form in 1984. Last year, he made the cut in 16 of his first 19 starts through late July. He only teed it up four more times the rest of the year and wasn't able to go the distance.

His time at home gave him the opportunity to get even closer to his beloved University of Wisconsin football team.

Andy's greatest week in golf came in June of 1978 when he won the United States Open at Cherry Hills in Denver. He led by two after 36 holes and by one after 54. He increased his lead to four strokes with five to play, but he saw that evaporate quickly and faced the last hole needing a bogey to win. That's just what he scored, too, after being bunkered in three, blasting to four feet and holing the putt for the victory.

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, WI. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf — If he rode in a cart.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

Mac O'Grady believes he set a PGA TOUR record even before he became a member of the TOUR. "I went through the Qualifying School 17 times before I made it," he said. "The first time was in October of 1971."

After he finally succeeded in the Fall of 1982, he made the most of his opportunity and collected \$50,379 to easily place among the leading money winners in 1983.

He said early in the year, "I've played so many places around the world during the last 10 years or so, being on the PGA TOUR is like celebrating Christmas every day."

He added, "A friend told me, 'You've had your nose up against the candy store window for years — and now you're inside"."

The Mac O'Grady story is an intriguing one. Actually, his real name is Phil McGleno, but in 1978, for a variety of reasons, he changed it to Phillip McClelland O'Grady. McClelland is for Bob McClelland, a fellow who has been like a father to him for years; and O'Grady was his mother's maicen name.

Mac was one of seven children and they lived in Minneapolis, MN until moving to Los Angeles n 1960. He started to caddy when he was 12, both at Riviera and Bel-Air Country Clubs. Later, several of the men for whom he caddied, would serve as his sponsors.

As a youth, he was filled with frustrations, and in an attempt to wash them away, he did everything from ride a bike for great distances, practice yoga and even worked hard on being able to play the game right-and-left handed. Of course, he plays right-handed now, but still putts left-handed.

He said he loves marathoning, and misses those long, peaceful runs on the beach of Malibu.

His best effort of the past year was in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic. A second-round 65 gave him a seven-under par 133 and a one-stroke lead over Bob Eastwood. A 73 the next day dropped him into a tie for third, two strokes behind front-running Fuzzy Zoeller.

Mac was in a position to make a strong move the last afternoon, but four bogeys on the second nine left him four behind Zoeller, the winner. He was delighted.

Later in the fall, his position was not secure among the top 125 money winners. At the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic, he was 111th, and said, "I need to make a good check this week."

After three rounds of the five-day event, he was only one-stroke out of the lead, but a last-day 74 dropped him into a tie for 12th. Still, he won \$15,188 and was home free for the year.

Mark O'Meara made a few changes in his golf swing in 1983, and now believes he will be able to play the game the way he would like to play it.

"I've always played on natural instincts," he explains, "but I knew I needed something better. I've been working with Hank Haney in Houston (as has Gary Hallberg), and he has me swinging more on a plane. I was always too upright and that led to inconsistency. Now, I understand the swing so much better."

He had another close brush with victory. In the Phoenix Open, he was tied with Bob Gilder, Rex Caldwell and Johnny Miller after 72 holes, but Gilder won it all.

In his rookie year of 1981, when he won a career high of \$76,063, he lost in a playoff to Dave Eichelberger in the Tallahassee Open. He also was named "rookie-of-the-year."

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo. A golf course was directly below their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

"My Dad played," he said, "but that wasn't the main reason I started. Once I did, I liked it, and then I started to set the goals."

He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University. His next goal was to be classified as an All-American, and he made the third team as a freshman and second team as a senior.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals. He won the California State Amateur, defeating Lennie Clements in the final and also won the Mexican Amateur, defeating Gary Hallberg the last day.

"That convinced me I could play," he said. Because of his U.S. title, he was able to play in the Masters Tournament, two World Series of Golf, the Byron Nelson Classic and the Colonial National Invitation.

He prefers to play with a draw off the tee, and with a slight fade with the irons.

tional; 1980 Illinois State Open.

If you ask David Ogrin when he was introduced to the game of golf, he'll smile and tell you, "Legend has it I was born with a club in my hands. When I was two-years old, my dad had one of his clubs break, so he sawed off the shaft, put a grip on it and I started to swing away.

"By the time I was five, I was breaking 60. I still have some scorecards from when I was five; and I was in my first competition at seven."

There was a time when David was considering baseball as a career. "I had dreams of being a switch-hitting catcher," he says with a laugh, "but my love of golf was too much. When I started to miss one-or-two games in Little League to play golf, my coach said, 'Good-bye."

In 1975, his Waukegan East high school team won the Illinois State Interscholastic title. Then he went to Texas A&M on a scholarship. "Bob Ellis is the coach at A&M and he originally was from Illinois. He kept in touch and wanted me to go there, so I did."

He won three collegiate events, including the 1979 Harvey Penick Invitational in Austin. Hal Sutton was the runner-up.

"I wanted to go as far as I could in the game," he said, "and I made it through the TOUR's Qualifying School on my fourth attempt." That was in the Fall of 1982 at the Tournament Players Club.

"It isn't often one dreams a dream," he said, "and then when he reaches the dream, realizes it is even better than the dream. The TOUR is all I dreamed it would be, and more."

Summing up his first year, he commented, "For years, I had to watch the great players from afar. I tried to emulate them. Now, I have the chance to actually ask them things and watch them up close. I don't want unsolicited suggestions, but I appreciate being able to ask them."

He said the highlight of 1983 was the United States Open. After shooting 75 and 69, he was only three strokes off the lead. He finished tied for 13th, his highest of the year.

He also had opportunities at the Kemper Open and the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic, but grins and says, "disaster struck. Maybe with a little more maturity, I would have won a lot more money, but that's part of the learning experience."

When everything is right, he plays with a slight fade. His strong point seems to be his ability to "grind out the par in tough situations." He admits, "I'm not a birdie machine."

When Jack Nicklaus completed his final round in the 1981 Canadian Open Championship, he walked toward the scorer's tent, approached Peter Oosterhuis and congratulated him on his victory.

"I'm happy for you, Peter," he said. "You've been very patient waiting for this first win."

Oosterhuis's smile grew even wider, and he replied, "Thanks, Jack, but rather than being patient, I think I was just stubborn.'

Oosterhuis was a big winner on the European circuit when he left the shores of his native England to seek his fame on the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1974.

He did not win again until he mastered the difficulties of the Glen Abbey course in Oakville, Ontario, winning with a four-under par score of 280. Just one stroke back were Nicklaus, Bruce Lietzke and Andy North.

The \$76,500 first prize represented more than he had ever won in an entire season. His best previous year was 1977 when he won \$60,083.

A fine amateur, Peter was a member of Britain's Walker Cup team in 1967 and the Eisenhower Trophy team in 1968. In the early 1970's, he was the leading player on the European circuit. Starting in 1971, he led the British Order of Merit for four straight years. That is the same as being the number one money winner on the PGA TOUR.

He won 19 times, including such titles as the 1973 and 1974 French Opens and 1974 Italian Open. In fact, the latter was his last victory prior to the Canadian.

Oosterhuis was the third-round leader in the 1973 Masters Tournament and finished alone in third place. In the 1974 Monsanto Open at Pensacola, he was the leader coming down the stretch, but Lee Elder birdied three of the last four holes to tie him, and then Lee won the playoff.

Early in 1981, Peter admits his game was going nowhere. While at the Heritage Classic, his longtime friend, Bert Yancey, told him he needed a better routine over the ball.

"I was never set in my own mind what I wanted to do with each shot, even when I was over the ball," Peter confessed. "Bert stressed the importance of knowing what I wanted to do before addressing it, develop a routine and stay with it."

Gradually, his game started to come together again. All he lacked was the consistency to put four solid rounds together. He did that at Glen Abbey. He has played well ever since.

Peter was born in London. His father was from Holland, and he went to England during World War II, where he met his bride-to-be.

Arnold Palmer has been honored by many people from many nations during his distinguished career as an athlete and businessman, but one of his most cherished moments came late in 1980 when it was announced by Commissioner Deane R. Beman that, starting in 1981, the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR would receive the Arnold Palmer Awarc.

Tom Kite was the first recipient.

Since Arnold was the TOUR's leading money winner for many years, the first player to reach the \$1 million mark in winnings, and, generally, done so much to popularize the game, Commissioner Beman said it would be appropriate to give the 1980 inaugural award to Arnold himself.

Palmer won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1954 and joined the TOUR the next year.

Jerry Pate has a flair for the dramatic and it never was more evident than during the closing stages of the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, which was being held for the first time on the demanding Tournament Players Club course.

He was battling Brad Bryant, Bruce Lietzke and Scott Simpson for the lead and the coveted victory and just when it appeared a playoff was imminent, Pate birdied the treacherous little 17th hole with a 15-foot putt; and then birdied the 440-yard 18th by lofting a five iron brilliantly to within two feet for another birdie. On one of the more difficult courses on TOUR, he played the final seven holes in four-under par.

Then, as he stood on the final green at the awards ceremony, he coaxed TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman and course architect Pete Dye to the edge of the bulkhead and pushed them both in the lake. Finally, he dove in himself.

Even though that was his only victory, it still was a good year for Pate, as he accumulated 10 top ten finishes in 26 starts and came within \$500 of matching his best money year of \$280,627 in 1981.

When Jerry leaped into the lake at the TPC, it was his second such act of showmanship. He did it the first time after winning the 1981 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

A severe neck muscle pull suffered in mid-1982, bothered him all last year, making it nearly impossible for him to play. Thus, he suffered through his worst year.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a twoshot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie until Hal Sutton bettered it in 1982.

Conrad Rehling, who developed Bob Murphy while coaching at the University of Florida in the early 1960s, found another champion-to-be about a decade later while coaching at a small college near Pensacola. Pate was still in high school when he came under Rehling's wing. When Rehling moved to the University of Alabama, Pate followed. In 1974, like Murphy nine years earlier, Pate won the U.S. and Florida Amateur titles.

Jerry also helped Uncle Sam win the 1974 World Amateur Team championship, the 1975 Walker Cup matches and the 1981 Ryder Cup matches.

The Calvin Peete story continues in its own beautiful way, and, as it has been said before, there are few in any sport more inspirational than this one. His performances on-and-off the golf courses of the world have elevated him to the pinnacle of the game.

Two years ago, he won four times, and last year added two more triumphs. He went over the \$1-million mark in TOUR earnings, and has enjoyed such honors as being named to the United States Ryder Cup team for 1983; the U.S. World Cup team for 1982 and the last two U.S. teams that faced Japan. Unfortunately, at the last moment, he was unable to compete on the World Cup team because

As he looked back on everything, he said, "1983 has been my best year even though I did win four times in 1982. My overall performance was much better and, being able to play on the Ryder Cup

team last fall, well, that's the epitome of golf in my opinion.

His 1983 victories came in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic — thanks to a last-day 63 — and he won the Anheuser-Busch Classic for a second straight time. He was No. 1 in driving accuracy and hitting greens in regulation for a third straight year and his 70.62 stroke average was second only to Raymond Floyd.

Calvin was 23 years old when he first picked up a golf club back in 1966. The game was of no

interest to him because he had to struggle to make a living for himself and his family.

Born in Detroit, Mich., Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters — through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

"Like so many black families," Peete said, "most of us kids had to get jobs as soon as we were

old enough to work so we could help out with the expenses."

While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, N.Y.

Peete had friends in Rochester, and each year his buddles would invite him to play golf.
"I always turned them down," Peete said. "I thought the game was silly. Who wants to chase a

little ball around under the hot sun?"

Finally, in 1966, Calvin tried the game with his friends and he was hooked. He recalls: "Just about that same time I saw a tournament on television and learned that Jack Nicklaus was making around \$200,000 a year chasing that ball. I figured I could be happy with one-third that amount, so I decided to give it a try.

Peete improved rapidly and he began to play in amateur tournaments wherever he could. Even-tually he entered the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School. Like so many others, Peete failed on his first try.

And the second. But he made it the third time, in the Spring of 1975.

Some players take longer than others to develop on the PGA TOUR and it would appear as if Mark Pfeil is one of those. When he won the 1980 Tallahassee Open and earned \$52,704 for the year, it was a big step. That was more money than he had won during his first four years on TOUR combined.

Although his money total slipped in 1981, he has been getting better and better ever since and has reached the stage where he is expected to be a consistent money winner for years.

He accumulated a career high of \$85,477 in 1983 on the regular TOUR, and added another \$36,000 when he won the Anderson-Pacific Classic on the Tournament Players Series tour in Sacramento

He nearly won again in the Texas Open in San Antonio, but Jim Colbert simply was too strong for everyone that week. However, Mark had back-to-back 63s for the middle two rounds, and the 126 total represented the lowest 36 holes on Tour all year. He finished second.

"Overall, I'm pleased," he said afterwards, "because I did win this year in the Anderson-Pacific. I believe my game is better than it has ever been, but I still tend to give away too many shots."

Pfeil comes from good golfing stock. Both of his parents are fine players and it was with them, at the Palos Verdes Country Club, that Pfeil first started to play the game at age 10. Over the years, Bud Oakley at the Palos Verdes Club has been his primary teacher.

Mark played little competitive golf as a junior, but at Palos Verdes High he made rapid progress and, in his junior year, won the California Interscholastic Federation title. After two years at El Camino Junior College, he moved on to Southern Cal where he achieved All-America honors twice. He captained the Trojans in 1974 and won such titles as the Pacific Coast Amateur twice and the Southern California Amateur.

He turned professional in 1974 and graduated from the Fall, 1975, Qualifying School. After earning less than \$500, he returned to the Q-School in Fall, 1976. This time the lesson took, and the 1973 Walker Cup team member has since worked his game into shape to be a contender in TOUR competition.

Other victories include: 1957 Australian PGA, 1972 and 1974 Brazilian Open, and 1976 South African Dunlop Masters. Member World Golf Hall of Fame, 1980 Chile Open.

As long as the game is played, the name Gary Player will be listed with the greats. He has compiled a brilliant record all over the globe during his three decades as an international competitor, but even more important, he is known everywhere as one of the finest gentlemen in all of sports.

One has to wonder what sort of record he would have compiled in the United States if he had chosen to play the PGA TOUR full-time for the last quarter-century.

The figures probably would have been staggering. Stopping off between flights to other tournaments around the world, he managed to win 21 times and collect nearly \$1.7 million in earnings. He has won 127 times worldwide, including the Open championship of his South Africa homeland 13 times

His love for his native land and his family, though, made it far more important for him to keep his roots there rather than move elsewhere in search of additional fame and glory. He was one of the original inductees into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst.

He has won the Masters Tournament and the British Open each three times. He has won the PGA Championship twice and in 1965, captured the United States Open.

He admits that he is looking forward to competing on the Senior PGA TOUR, but, meanwhile, he thoroughly enjoys playing against the younger stars. He hasn't changed his style, though. He still plays every shot as meticulously as his first tee shot of the day.

Dan Pohl has established himself as one of the longest hitters on the PGA TOUR, but he also is getting a reputation for being able to play well in some of the more significant championships.

For example, he was third in the 1981 PGA Championship and in 1982, lost the Masters Tournament in a playoff to Craig Stadler and also tied for third in the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach.

Last year, he finished eighth in both the Masters and PGA Championship. His earnings were down slightly for the year, but he explained, "My mind wasn't totally on golf. We bought a new home in Phoenix, and I was busy doing a lot of work around it. I enjoy that sort of thing.

As for his length off the tee, Dan was the TOUR leader the first two years such statistics were kept, but in 1982, he relinquished the title to free-swinging Bill Calfee, 275.3 yards to 274.6. In Dan's

best year, he averaged 280.1 in 1981. He finished sixth in 1983 at 271.2 per drive.

"I know it would be even better than that," he says, "if I could use the driver off every tee on the measured holes. Sometimes, I have to back off to the three wood or one iron."

His zest for power made him an outstanding baseball hitter for Mt. Pleasant High in Michigan, although he was a pitcher. When he first started to play golf, he continued to swing viciously, but soon realized it also was important to keep the ball on the course, somewhere.

It's always been natural for me to swing hard," he said, "but I had to learn to swing hard and with

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves. He was so competitive, though, that he wanted to play everything. He played four years of high school golf, and had improved enough by his senior year that "Steve Robbins, my high school coach, wrote to several colleges. Arizona responded, so that was where I went."

Even today, he credits Robbins and Arizona coach John Gibson with helping him the most. He earned his TOUR card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing

With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis

Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was

putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the greens on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them.

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a strong faith in the Lord.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendonitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on TOUR that year.

The next two years were good ones for Don, even if not as profitable as in 1980, but he was rolling again last year, collecting nearly \$146,000. His best opportunity for victory came in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, where he tied for second after Calvin Peete shot a last-round 63 to win it.

"This was the best year I've ever had from a playing stand point," he said, "because I did make more cuts than ever before. I was in contention to win on the last day about five times."

A swing change in recent years has added considerably to his length off the tee. "The change helped with my release and I draw the ball now instead of fading it. This past year was very good ball-hitting," he said.

Early in the year, he went 22-straight rounds without being over par, and that was the best streak on TOUR. It enabled him to challenge for the coveted Vardon Trophy for low stroke average.

Looking back to 1979, the first step to success came in November and December. Feeling better physically, he entered mini-tour events in Phoenix and won two of them. He played well enough in the others to collect \$12,000.

His wife Margaret was to have a baby early in January, so he skipped the first month of the 1980 TOUR. He tried to qualify for the Bing Crosby, and did not make it. He tried again the next week for the Hawaiian Open, and was second alternate. On Tuesday night, while at home in Tucson, he received a call from the Island, that he was in. Without a practice round, Don tied for 14th, won \$6,063 and was on his way to the banner year.

"I made some changes in my set-up to a more open stance," he said, "and in my putting, to be more erect, but winning \$100,000 never entered my mind back then."

The victory he wanted came at the B.C. Open in late August. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, and Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday. His father was — and still is — an avid golfer and they play in father-son events at Victoria Country Club in Riverside, Calif.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card.

Nick Price was competing in the World Series of Golf for the first time after having qualified as the leader of South Africa's Order of Merit.

He was impressed with everything he saw at the Firestone Country Club in Akron, OH. "I've watched the World Series on television back home, and always thought this would be a nice place to play."

As his first round started, he parred the first and second holes, but bogeyed the third and fourth, missing the greens in each case. "At that point, I was just trying to hold the round together. I told myself to be patient and work on each shot."

What happened from that point on was, he not only held the round together, but he neatly put his entire golf career together.

Nick birdied the sixth hole that day, and then birdied five of the first seven holes on the second nine for a 36-30—66. He was in the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Bobby Clampett. And, that's where he stayed the rest of the week, winning by four strokes over Nicklaus with a 10-under par 270.

The victory was worth \$100,000, but more important, it gave him a 10-year exemption for all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events. Since he qualified for the World Series by virtue of his play on the South African Tour earlier in the year, his \$100,000 did not count in official earnings. Thus, his record only shows \$49,435 won last year.

As he said later, "The exempton means everything. The money is just icing on the cake. I feel fantastic. I can't believe it was that easy to win."

Nick started in the game as an eight-year old caddy for his brother in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). He progressed rapid as a player, and by the time he was 17, he had an invitation to compete in the Junior World tournament at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. "Everyone said I should go," he recalls, "so my mother and brother paid my way. They figured that if I didn't do well, I would get competitive golf out of my system."

He fooled them. He not only played well, but he won. "From that point on, they were behind me 100 per cent," Nick said.

He played on the South Africa and the European Tour as an amateur in 1975, and then went into the Rhodesian Air Force for the next two years. He was out in time to play on the South African Tour as a professional in the Fall of 1977. The next year, he was second in the Dutch Open.

In 1980, he said his game "took off." He won the Swiss Open and the South African Masters and finished second in four other South African events.

His greatest disappointment came at Royal Troon in Scotland in the 1982 British Open. He led by three strokes with six holes to play but dropped four shots on his way to the clubhouse, letting Tom Watson slip in with the victory.

His goal was to play on the U.S. Tour, and he easily made it through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1982, finishing third.

Everyone agrees that Tom Purtzer is a solid player, one who generally plays the more difficult courses well. He can drive it for great distances and his smooth, powerful swing keeps the irons on line most of the time, too.

The only question is why hasn't he won more often? Even Tom finds it puzzling, although his overall record for the last five years is one of the better ones on the PGA TOUR.

His lone victory was in the 1977 Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open on the challenging Riviera Country Club course. Consistency was a problem early in his career, but he has improved steadily in that area. Last year, he only missed the cut five times in 26 starts.

He surpassed the \$100,000 mark in earnings for a fifth straight time last year, but he wasn't completely satisfied. "I believe I played even better than I scored," is the way he summed up the year.

As an example of how consistently long he is with the driver, he averaged 275.6 yards in 1981 for the third best mark on TOUR. In 1982, he averaged 270.1 yards and last year, was back over a 273 yard average on the measured holes.

His strongest performances the last few years have been in such events as the Memorial Tournament twice, the Canadian Open, the Colonial National Invitation and the Doral-Eastern Open, all played on difficult courses.

Tom got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball, I guess, when we were eight or nine.

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

The next year, 1973, Tom won the Broadmoor Men's Invitational and also was named to the All-America Collegiate golf team. He turned pro not long after being graduated with a business degree.

Tom failed to earn his playing privileges at the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School twice. He recalls: "The first time was only by two shots but the second was by a bunch."

Sammy Rachels believes he has the greatest job in the world. "I don't think I could find an easier, more fun way to make a living," he will tell you.

He had reason to be happy after last year. He pocketed \$75,238, and that nearly equaled the total amount he won through his first eight years on the PGA TOUR.

With Sammy, it all depends on the condition of his back. He has had four back operations, the last one in the Spring of 1982. With a smile, the good-natured Rachels says, "I always wanted to have some sort of TOUR record, and now I have one. I doubt if anyone will ever top me."

The problem is chronic. "It runs in the family," he said. "I even had a lot of trouble when I was in high school. It's a mystery back. Three times, I've had a ruptured disc.

'I've been resigned to the fact that I can't play on the TOUR because of it," he said, "but I keep

coming back. I can get by for 15 weeks on a budget of \$15,000 or less. He travels in a camper-topped truck, mainly because he can sleep more comfortably in the back

end of it than he can on a motel bed.

"I'm not what you would call a good, steady player," he says, "but when I have a good week, I feel I can play with anyone. I can compete well enough to satisfy myself."

Last year, he tied for second twice, in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and the Bank of Boston Classic. He finished sixth in the U.S. Open at Merion in 1981, and was third another year in the

Houston Open.

Those were weeks when he might have won, but he doesn't look at it that way. "How can I be disappointed?" he added, "when they pay you close to \$30,000 for finishing second."

At Memphis, he had four round in the 60s at the Colonial Country Club and finished one-stroke behind Larry Mize. He said of those weeks, "I leave with a good taste in my mouth because I did my good playing right into the clubhouse, down the stretch."

"This past year," he continued, "I conquered some of the jitters and my game materialized noticeably."

noticeably.

Sammy started to play golf at age 14 on the nine-hole course in DeFuniak Springs, FL. His mother was — and still is — a good player. He received his first set of clubs when he was 16-years old. He played through high school and then at Chipola Junior College. "In those days, I didn't know what professional golf was," he admits.

He moved on to Columbus (GA) College and it was there that he started to think about making a

living in the game.

He entered the Qualifying School in 1973 but had to withdraw on the morning of the first round.

He entered the Qualifying School in 1973 but had to withdraw after nine holes. In 1975, he was able to play and he made it.

Now, he says, "I'm not the ball striker I used to be, but I'm a much better player."

Victor Regalado made a slight change in his golf swing toward the end of last year, and now he is hopeful it will carry hime back into the winners' circle.

"I've always had a tendency to swing too fast," he said, "so I worked to slow it down. When I did, I became more consistent. Even though I didn't win as much money as the year before, I made a lot more cuts."

He won more than half of his \$50,395 total in a four-tournament span late in the summer. He tied for eighth in the B.C. Open for his best finish of the year, and later tied for 16th in the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic and the next week tied for 18th in the LaJet-Coors Classic. Those were important, positive signs for Victor because in each of those events, he was able to post low numbers on the

Another of his problems over the years, he admits, is concentration and being able to maintain the high level needed for all 18 holes. Earlier, he had stated, "My confidence became so bad in 1982 that I even thought about quitting. I would play well and make mental mistakes. That comes from not concentrating. I put too much pressure on myself.

During the recent years, Victor has received considerable help from Phil Rodgers, the former TOUR winner who is highly-regarded for his ability to help others.

Victor grew up in Tijuana, Mexico, two blocks from the Tijuana Country Club and started in golf at age 11. The first tournament he entered was the Pan-American Juniors at his course and he won it at age 14.

The most impressive of his early titles throughout Central America were the Mexican Amateur in 1970, the Mexican PGA in 1972 and the Mexican Masters in 1972 and 1973. He represented Mexico in the World Amateur Team Championships of 1968 and 1970, the latter year winning the individual title in Spain. He also represented his country in the 1972 and 1973 World Cup tournaments.

As a PGA TOUR rookie in 1973, Regalado played with negligible results, but in 1974 he won the Pleasant Valley Classic and it appeared he would join the handful of foreign superstars playing here. However, early in 1975, he injured his right thumb. "I couldn't practice for six months, but I kept trying to play," Victor recalled.

He added another victory in the 1978 Ed McMahon-Quad Cities Open. He nearly won there again in 1981, but lost in a playoff to Dave Barr.

Mike Reid enjoyed a rare privilege last August when he teamed with Bob Goalby for the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Park City, UT. This was a Senior PGA TOUR event, and the elder statesmen of the links were to choose a player from the regular TOUR.

Well, Mike and Bob teamed perfectly and they won by a stroke over the Billy Casper-Jim Nelford combination. While Mike collected \$99,135 in official money on the regular TOUR, he added another \$25,000 from the Shootout.

It was a privilege, you see, because in recent years, this soft-spoken young man has been considered one of the finest players in the game without an official victory.

Like Calvin Peete, Mike's key to success is keeping the ball in play and hitting a lot of greens. In 1981, he was second only to Peete, and finished third in 1982 in driving accuracy.

He believes he can play well on any type of course, and he tries to model his game after the likes of Billy Casper, and Gene Littler. "Week after week," he said, "when they were playing well, they always finished up high."

Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

His older brother, Bill, is head professional at the Tournament Players Club at Plum Creek, south of Denver, CO. and has been Mike's biggest teacher. He also credits the John Geerstens, Senior and Junior, at Monterey Peninsula Country Club with assisting him.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Mike Brannan, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his TOUR card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978 Pensacola Open. He lost in a playoff to Mac McLendon.

In December of 1979, he took a major step. He was married, and ever since, he has said that Randolyn has played an important role in his success. "I'm more at peace with myself," he says, "and not fighting the game as much as I once did. Besides, it is nice to have someone out there pulling for you besides your caddy."

Since then two daughters have been added to the close-knit family.

Jack Renner has enjoyed success all through his golf career, and one of the reasons is because he always has set lofty goals, and then worked tirelessly to meet them.

In 1981, he was having what he considered his most consistent year on TOUR as he headed for the Pleasant Valley-Jimmy Fund Classic. "I told my Dad that unless I won, though, people would think I was having a mediocre year."

A few days later, he had his victory, the second of his six-year career as he edged Scott Simpson by two strokes. "Now, I know I've had my best year," he said happily.

Last year at the Hawaiian Open, he thought he had won for the third time on TOUR. He was onestroke ahead of Isao Aoki of Japan as he sat in the scoring tent, checking his card. Aoki was in the left rough on the par five 18th hole, some 128 yards from the flagstick.

Then Jack heard the tremendous roar. "At first, I thought he must have hit it close, and if he made the putt for a birdie, we would have a playoff." Instead, Aoki HOLED the pitching wedge shot for an eagle and the victory.

"It was one of those years," he said. "I had opportunities but I didn't make as many birdies on the weekend as I should have."

He started on TOUR as a 20-year old and his first victory came in the 1977 Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic. His performances slipped slightly in 1980 after suffering mononucleosis early in the year. It was several months before he regained his full strength.

Jack is easily identified. Rail thin, he always wears a white cap, similar to the type Ben Hogan wore for years. However, Jack says he has always worn that style because it is lightweight, comfortable, and during his years of growing up around Palm Springs, "I needed something to protect my head from the sun."

As a youngster, he was the king of the junior tournaments in the San Diego area. He won such titles as the 1972 World Junior and the 1973 United States Junior. His short game always has been excellent, and he believes he refined it by playing so many par three courses as a youth.

During his school days, he chose not to play varsity golf because he felt he could progress more rapidly by working on his own game, rather than spending the time travelling to matches.

The Renners are an avid golf family. Sister Jane has been a part of the LPGA Tour and younger brother Jim is a professional. When one of them needs help, they seek out a member of the family.

Chi Chi's the name and golf is his game, but for nearly two decades on the PGA TOUR, he has been one of the most popular figures in sports. He has played and beaten the best and while galleryites have recognized his talents, they love him for the man he is.

Two years ago at the World Series of Golf, he was given the first Ambassador of Golf Award for all of his humanitarian deeds. He is in demand everywhere for clinics and exhibitions, and Chi Chi Rodriguez has never disappointed.

Chi Chi gravitated to golf as a boy in Puerto Rico by hitting tin cans with limbs from a guava tree. A caddy much of the time, he joined the Army at age 19 because he could make more money to help his large family than he could by working at home.

He arrived on the PGA TOUR in 1960 and did not finish higher than sixth place until he won the 1963 Denver Open. He remained among the top 60 money winners until surgery limited his schedule in 1971, but he rebounded the next year by winning the Bryon Nelson Classic in a playoff over Billy Casper.

He won two other tournaments in playoffs, downing Don January in the 1964 Lucky International Open in San Francisco and Dale Douglass in the 1968 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas.

After his victory in the 1973 Greater Greensboro Open, he did not win again until the 1979 Tallahassee Open. He established a tournament record with a 19-under par 269 that week, bettering the former mark by four strokes. He had an eagle, 20 birdies and only three bogeys that

After several productive years, Chi Chi slipped on the money list in 1982. He suffered at times with back and neck problems. One of the highlights of his year, though, came in September when he was selected to play for two days with Gerald R. Ford, the former President of the United States; and Mouley Abdellah, the Royal Prince of Morocco, in the President's Invitational in Vail, CO

Chi Chi is certain to be a major attraction on the Senior PGA TOUR in two years. Meanwhile, he will remain an exempt player on the regular TOUR in 1984 through career earnings.

Through most of his golfing career, enthusiasm for the game has been one of the strong points for Bill Rogers. Not so, the last couple of years, he says, "but I'm going to have to get the old desire back if I want to start playing really well again."

He had it for a couple of weeks last year, and he tied for third in the Bay Hill Classic and went on to win the USF&G Classic in New Orleans the next. "I had a very positive attitude about everything those weeks," the popular Rogers said. "It was never the same after that."

He can be excused for not having his mind on his game. Bill and Beth waited a long time for their first born to come along, and she did on June 6.

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on TOUR, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open in Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

Always an aggressive player, he never could figure out why he didn't win more. Through his first six years, his only triumph was in the 1978 Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Bill started to play the game at age nine in Montgomery, AL, and was playing competitively by the time he was 13 and the family was living in Texarkana, Texas. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkana, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything and I still don't, but I have slowed down some."

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa. "Dad retired as a colonel and he still is a good player. He played in a lot of major Air Force tournaments when he was in the service."

It took Clarence Rose nearly five months to get his spikes solidly into the turf during his rookie year, but once he did, he went on to have a fine year and collect \$41,075. Through his first 15 starts, he cashed only two small checks, and then came the tie for 24th in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic.

His best finish was a tie for 11th in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and it was a second-round 63 that made it all possible. It also turned out to be his low round of the year. It was his check for \$6,600 there that assured him of a position among the top 125 money winners and thus an exemption for 1983.

He started to develop a little more consistency last year and the result was a slight increase in his money winnings. He came up with his best finish in two years on the Tour, a tie for sixth in the Western Open on the tough Butler National course.

His Western finish could have been even better but he bogeyed the last two holes. "I guess I was thinking about the money," he said grinning, "and I've learned you can't do that out here."

He has been working on his course management. "I try to go for the birdies and I make a lot of them, but I make too many mistakes, too." He had well over 300 birdies last year.

He can sock it off the tee, too. In the Byron Nelson Classic, he had little help from Mother Nature, but he had a drive of 392 yards, and that was the longest on Tour.

Clarence's father was a "very good golfer," and he started him at about age 12. "I played baseball all the time, but once I started into golf, that ended my days in baseball," he said.

He won his first junior tournament at age 14, the North Carolina State Jaycees. He went on to win the North Carolina State Amateur, too.

He gained All-American status while at Clemson and in June of 1981, he tried the PGA TOUR School. He made it easily, gaining a tie for fourth at Walt Disney World. "My last year at Clemson," he said, "I started to think about the possibility of being on the TOUR. I knew that's what I wanted, so I left school and spent about eight months just getting ready for it."

Until he started on TOUR, he played from right to left, but he changed his game over and now favors the fade.

He constantly checks his weekly statistics, and through those numbers, he believes he is better able to diagnose his strengths and weaknesses.

Bob Shearer was at a loss for words whenever he tried to explain his sudden burst of success in the Spring of 1982. In a four-week stretch, he won the Tallahassee Open; lost the Michelob-Houston Open in a playoff; tied for second in the USF&G Classic and tied for sixth in the Byron Nelson Classic.

"I had to give it a lot of thought," the personable Australian said, "because everyone was asking what I was doing differently. The answer was 'Nothing,' at least, nothing that I could think of."

Nevertheless, the record shows that in the span of four weeks, he won a total of \$93,351. His best previous entire year on the PGA TOUR was 1978 when he won \$61,878.

Obviously, he was playing better than ever, but he believes it all started in the Fall of 1981.

"I went home to Melbourne and spent some time with my coach, Harold Knight," he explained. "I've always played better after a visit with him."

Later in the fall, he won the Shell-Air New Zealand Open and the next week won the New Zealand Open. "That was a big boost to my confidence," he said. He went on to win the Australian Order of Merit for a third time.

A treasured moment came in the Fall of 1983 when he won the inaugural Jack Newton Classic in Australia. The event was held for the benefit of the PGA TOUR member who was seriously injured last summer when struck by an airplane propeller, ending his TOUR career. He was one of Shearer's closest friends.

Bob started in the game as a youngster in Dingley, a suburb of Melbourne. He still lives there about six months of the year, near the Southern Golf Club where it all started for him. He spends the rest of the year being based out of North Myrtle Beach, SC.

He obtained his TOUR card in June of 1976 after being co-medalist with Woody Blackburn in the Qualifying School. His earnings reached a high point in 1978, and then he was stricken with paracreaitis. He was only able to play a limited number of events the next year, and his earnings dropped significantly.

It was at that time, that he was experiencing difficulties on the greens. "I couldn't putt at all," he said. So, one day in the New Orleans Open, he was paired with two players who putted crosshanded.

"They seemed to be making everything and I wasn't making anything,; he said. "I decided to try it on the back nine, and I made a couple of long ones. I've been putting that way ever since."

If there ever was an award given for perseverance, surely Tony Sills would be a prime candidate. He attempted to qualify for the PGA TOUR six times before he made it at the Tournament Players. Club in the Fall of 1982. Twice, he remembers vividly, he missed in the finals by two shots. "That just told me I wasn't ready," he says.

"All through those years," he continued, "I was living on a dream. Playing on the TOUR was something I knew I was going to do. Now, I know dreams do come true."

Even his first year should serve as a lesson for those who are easily discouraged. Tony tied for 30th place in his first start, the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. That was a great week because he is from Los Angeles, so many of his pals were there to see him perform.

In his next 10 tournaments, through the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, he failed to survive the 36-hole cut. There he was, through the first of June and with only one paycheck to show for his efforts.

In his last 15 starts, though, he only missed three times and it was the third-place finish in the Texas Open that assured him of a position among the leading 125 money winners. He had rounds of 67, 64, 69 and 67.

What he has had to go through to reach this level, borders on the incredible.

His first exposure to the game was as a five-year old. "My father started to play for health reasons. The doctor encouraged him because of the exercise he needed, so I started to follow him around."

He entered junior competition at age 11, and then played through high school, junior college and finally at the University of Southern California.

During those years when he was attempting to get on the TOUR, he said, "I had a lot of different jobs. I stayed at home with my parents to keep expenses down, but I did everything from delivering pizzas to grinding clubs in Jerry Barber's golf factory.

"I even worked for a beer distributor, but my best job was at the Los Angeles Country Club. I worked part time on the driving range, so that I could have a half day to practice. During those years, I lived on practically nothing money-wise. I was determined to see this thing through."

He has had to overcome serious physical problems even to play the game, so serious, in fact, that many others would have turned and gone in another direction.

When he is playing well, he prefers a slight draw. "I'm not long off the tee," he said, "but I've always been pretty accurate. My putting needs to improve and it has improved in the last year."

There are two sides to the Jim Simons story. While he has enjoyed fine success on the PGA TOUR, winning three times through the 1983 campaign, a new career continues to blossom.

He also is an Investment Executive with Shearson/American Express and since 1980, has been spending more-and-more time in the brokerage business. He has specialized in managed money, using the best people in a particular product area. The majority of his time now is spent studying equity fund managers and computerized managed commodity programs.

His two most productive years on the TOUR came in 1981 and 1982 when he earned more than \$100,000 each year and one of his more important victories came in 1982 when he overtook Craig Stadler the last day of the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and won by two strokes.

It was there he revealed he is "legally blind" without proper corrective lenses. At the Crosby, he wore two contacts over the left eye — a soft lens against the eye and a hard lens over the soft one — to correct vision and astigmatism.

Jim's initial victory was in the 1977 First NBC-New Orleans Open and then he won the 1978 Memorial Tournament in a rather suspenseful style. Five times in the last seven holes, he saved par with one-putts; and, at the final hole, he made a 21-footer for par to win by one.

Jim Simons will be the first to say that his early years on the PGA TOUR were not up to expectations. He probably won't mention, however, that he was hampered with physical ailments. He had tendinitis in his left wrist, but more painful was his left shoulder which was diagnosed as a "looseness in the joint — a minor dislocation." It was the result of some "horsing-around" in his fraternity house at Wake Forest.

Simons was graduated from the Fall 1972 PGA TOUR Qualifying School and did not have an opportunity to compete in many events. During his first year he was in considerable pain, mainly, it developed, because his injury had not yet been diagnosed properly. He recalls, "I was doing stretching exercises because I felt a tightness, but that was just the opposite of what I needed."

Jim's father started him in golf at Butler, Pa., Country Club at the age of nine. He started competition at the age of 13 and his progress was rapid. He first enrolled at the University of Houston but, after a year, transferred to Wake Forest. He was on the 1971 Walker Cup team and remained overseas for the 1971 British Amateur, reaching the final round where he lost to Steve Melnyk.

Scott Simpton is one of those players who quietly goes about his business, sometimes almost unnoticed, but when the final tally is in each week, his name usually is near the top.

Although he only has one victory in his first five years on the TOUR, he is doing quite nicely, thank you. He has won well over \$100,000 in each of the last four campaigns. That tells you he is a

"My game has become more consistent," he will tell you. "I know I'm playing better but I just don't have many great weeks."

He said his first victory came as something of a surprise. It was on the tough Butler National course in the 1980 Western Open. He took the lead after the second day and never was headed, as he posted four rounds of par or better.

"My game was improving," he recalls, "and I knew if I continued to improve, I eventually would win. All of a sudden, I made the big move and won. Yes, I was surprised."

He played exceptionally well in the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, finishing in a tie for second with Brad Bryant, two strokes in back of Jerry Pate. He was one-stroke behind when the last round started, but seemed to fall out of contention with three first nine bogeys the last afternoon. However, he came on very strong to birdie each of the last three holes.

Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup Team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the TOUR's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the Fall of

Scott started in the game as a caddy at age nine for his father, a scratch handicapper in the San Diego area in those days. He was 10 when he entered his first tournament and in the 10-and-under division, Jack Renner was the victor, but Scott tied his brother for fifth. He knew then that he liked the competition

At age 16, he lost in the finals of the U.S. Junior Championships to Bob Byman - now one of his closest friends - and was third in the World Junior.

There is a good reason why Tim Simpson went to play golf for "them 'Dawgs" at the University of Georgia, because he has a little bit of the bulldog in himself. It is his tenacity, though, that continues to carry him to greater heights in the game.

Those who follow Tim closely will tell you that every part of his game gets better each year and it was evident in 1983 when he enjoyed his most profitable year. "I worked hard on my putting and it finally started to come around." he said of his improved play. "My life is more settled, too. Kathy has made a big difference, giving me new goals, and encouraging me."

Tim's father, Jack, started him in the game as a seven-year old, and he went on to win the junior championships of Georgia and Atlanta. "I owe a lot to my father," Tim has said. "He worked hard so I could afford to play and he has always stood behind me. He has been the guiding force in my life. He has helped to give me a more positive outlook."

Another who has helped Tim mold his game in later years has been John Gerring, the head professional at Atlanta Country Club. Art Kraft, Jr., Gardner Dickinsor, and Dave Pelz also have offered strong advice.

Tim went to the University of Georgia and earned All-Southeastern Conference and All-American honors. He won the 1976 Southern Amateur, too.

In the Spring of 1977, he earned his Player's card, but only collected \$2,778 through the end of that year. He upped it to \$38,714 for his first full year in 1978. Although his earnings dropped the next couple of years, it was a case of tendinitis in his left elbow that hindered his progress, but he bounced back with a fine year in 1981.

Still striving for a victory on the TOUR, he did receive a lft when he won the 1981 World Series-25 championship in France. He considers it one of his most satisfying accomplishments in the

"There is such a fine line, a very fine line, between being an average player and a great player on TOUR, it's incredible," he said.

Now, he would like to step across it.

It was another profitable year for J.C. Snead, as he topped the century mark in earnings for the sixth time, and, while he admits to playing well for most of the campaign, he also says it could have been better.

"There seemed to be one round each week that killed me," he said. "I had several this year where I didn't make any birdies at all, and that's unusual for me."

His strongest tournament was the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic. He was tied with Fuzzy Zoeller took charge the next day with a brilliant 64. Nevertheless, J.C. finished tied for fourth, his best of the year.

Certainly one of the game's more colorful people, J. C. has a reputation of occasionally shying away from interviews, but those who follow the game closely know that once they take a few minutes to chat with him, they will be rewarded with one of the better stories of the day.

He has a wonderful sense of humor. Several years ago, he decided he wanted to go by his full name, Jesse Carlyle. After a few weeks of not playing well, he informed everyone he was going back to using J. C. because "Jesse Carlyle hasn't been playing worth a damn."

One of his strongest loves is hunting, and he will spend hours in search of game, especially around his home area of Hot Springs, Va. J. C. and his wife Sue also have a home at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla.

In 1978, when his earnings dipped to \$63,561, he suffered a broken bone in his wrist in a farming accident in Hot Springs and was off the TOUR for seven weeks. It happened shortly after he tied for second in the U.S. Open.

Jesse Carlyle, although constantly mentioned as the nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, stands on his own performance record. He was a superb athlete in other sports while growing up in Hot Springs, and at one time, sought a career in baseball. He was in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a career in 1964.

He worked for head pro Charlie Beverage at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, N.Y. while twice failing to pass the PGA TOUR Qualifying Test. It was a total of four years before he earned his card in 1968. Following three so-so years, J. C. burst into prominence in 1971 by winning twice in a three-week period, at Tucson and Doral, immediately before and after the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

Shortly after he defeated Bob Shearer on the first-extra hole of their playoff in the 1982 Michelob-Houston Open, Ed Sneed slumped into the easy chair in the interview room.

Solemnly, as if a weight had been lifted from his shoulders, he exclaimed: "It's a great feeling to win again. It's been five years - five long years - and three years since Augusta. A lot of people have asked me if the Masters affected me. I didn't think so, but maybe it did.

It was the fourth victory of his fine career and his first since he defeated Lon Hinkle in a playoff at the 1977 Tallahassee Open. At the 1979 Masters Tournament, Ed bogeyed each of the last three holes to drop back into a tie with Fuzzy Zoeller and Tom Watson, and Zoeller won it all on the second

For awhile, he was concerned that the Michelob-Houston title would get away from him, too. He led by two after 36 holes, but Shearer shot a splendid seven-under par 64 the third day to gain a fivestroke lead over Sneed. The last day, Shearer had problems, and Sneed was able to tie him. On the first extra hole, a par three, his seven iron was to within four feet and he made it for the winning birdle.

The victory served as the cornerstone to his finest money year on TOUR, winning \$148,170. Last year, a back problem curtailed his effectiveness

It probably is safe to say that no one in TOUR history ever has won a tournament the way Edwon his first.

In the Fall of 1973, he was in Australia. He won the New South Wales Open with an eagle at the 17th hole, making a 10-footer at the 18th. He caught a plane that night for San Francisco and, thanks to the International dateline, he arrived in Napa, Calif., in time for the Monday qualifier for the Kaiser International Open. He went on to tie John Schlee at the end of regulation play, and won it all in a

Ed started to play golf at age 12 under the watchful eye of his grandfather and grandmother in Roanoke, VA. He was an excellent basketball player in high school and went on to Ohio State University to play golf and basketball. Eventually, he concentrated on golf.

He earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1968, but only played the TOUR part-time. He was working under head pro Walker Inman at Scioto Country Club in Columbus, OH.

Driving accuracy always has been a strong part of his game, and in recent years, his putting has improved dramatically. "For years," he admits, "I was just a mediocre putter."

Through the years, Luke Barnes and Glen Reynolds at the Roanoke Country Club helped Ed as a

junior player; the late Bob Kepler was instrumental in molding his game at Ohio State; and since 1976, George Fazio has been his primary instructor, although Ken Venturi has helped with his wedge play.

Craig Stadler had another excellent campaign in 1983, but he was so awesome in 1982, that his efforts paled by comparison. He had 11 top 10 finishes and collected well over \$200,000, but it was the year before when he became a genuine superstar. He did end his year on a strong note, though, performing admirably in his first Ryder Cup venture.

He won four times in 1982, starting the year by capturing the first tournament, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He won two of the year's more significant events, the Masters Tournament in a playoff over Dan Pohl and the World Series of Golf in a playoff over Raymond Floyd. His other victory was by a whopping seven strokes in the Kemper Open.

He easily won the money title with \$446,462. Only Tom Watson has ever won more in a single season. He said there were two key factors in his improved play. First of all, he drove the ball better than ever, sacrificing some distance for accuracy; and secondly, he putted much better.

Although he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1976, he didn't get his first victory until the Bob Hope Desert Classic in January of 1980. Later in the year, he added the Greater Greensboro Open title to his laurels.

He knew, and so did his close followers, that he would win on the TOUR. It was a matter of being patient, learning to control his emotions and to work a little harder on his game. Dave Stockton, a close friend, gave Craig some sound advice along those lines just prior to the 1980 Bob Hope, stressing the importance of the mental aspect of the game.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U.S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo. "I just made everything that week," he said.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice for the Trojans in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team.

His first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR came in the Fall of 1975 and he didn't make it. He did succeed in June of 1976.

Craig first played the game at age five with the assistance of his father and really became interested at age "eight or nine." Along the way, he won such titles as the World Junior Championship, the San Diego City Amateur and the Southern California Interscholastic.

It was an amusing incident at the time. When Payne Stewart started to walk into the News Center at the 1983 Walt Disney World Classic, the security guard stopped him, informing him caddies were

not permitted inside unless invited.

As usual, Payne was wearing his plus-fours and cap, which also happens to be the traditional garb of the Disney caddies. The situation quickly was smoothed over and Payne went in for an interview.

By Sunday night, the security people knew all about Payne Stewart. He was the victor by two strokes over Nick Faldo and Mark McCumber. It was the second victory of his career—the first being the 1982 Quad Cities Open.

In his pastel plus-fours, argyle socks and cap, Payne certainly has become the most colorful dresser on TOUR. It has reached the point where people now ask him what he is going to wear each day. Make no mistake about it, though, this young man also is becoming one of the better players in the

He said of 1983, "I was in contention more times because my game has become more consistent. I was knocking on the door for the whole month of July." He finished seventh or better three

straight weeks.

He always knew he wanted to make his living as a professional golfer. From the time his dad, Bill, introduced him to the game at age four, Payne showed an affinity for golf. An accomplished player himself, Bill twice won the Missouri State Amateur and the Missouri Seniors once . . . so it was natural that father and 41/2-year-old son would win a 3-hole tournament in 1961, Payne's first "competitive

Payne's golfing career progressed in an orderly fashion through junior programs, high school and finally to a golf scholarship at Southern Methodist University. While there, Payne won several collegiate events, including the 1979 Co-Championship of the Southwest Conference. Quite simply, he was on a roll when he finished school, and he felt confident he was ready to conquer the PGA TOUR. As so many others before him, Payne failed at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979. It was a

crushing blow. "I really hadn't considered failing," he said.
"At that point, I decided to try the Asian Tour," he explained. "There really wasn't much choice if I intended to try again. In order to maintain a competitive edge, I felt I had to keep playing tournaments."

A two-year stint in Asia (1980-81) proved to be just what the doctor ordered.

"Missing at that first Q School was the best thing that could have happened to me. I came out of college riding high, and I realize now I was too cocky. The experience in Asia really opened my eyes."

With victories in the 1981 Indian and Indonesian Opens under his belt, plus his marriage to an

Australian girl he met while in Malaysia, Payne returned to the U.S. to attend the '81 Spring Q School. This time he was successful, and it was off to the "main event"

'I learned a lot about what it would be like while in Asia," he explained. "The travel, the Monday qualifying, the pro-ams, all of those things require an adjustment period . . . I was fortunate to have already gone through it when I got out here.'

For many years, Dave Stockton has been one of golf's finest good-will ambassadors. He is in constant demand for clinics and exhibitions because of his knowledge of the game and his smooth rapport with the golfing public.

During the late 1960s and through the 1970s, he also was one of the finest players in the world and the fact that he won two PGA Championships will attest to that. For nearly two decades, he has been regarded as one of the premier putters and short-game players in the game.

Dave is a descendant of a Declaration of Independence signer from New Jersey. He started to play golf seriously at age 17, following an injury to his back in a surfing accident. Dave, just as his father Gail, did, went to the University of Southern California and became captain of the golf team.

He turned professional after leaving school, but struggled for three years before winning the prestigious Colonial National Invitation in 1967. He was invited to the NIT as a Past Champions' choice.

While he has won a total of 11 times, his greatest triumphs have been in two PGAs. The first was in 1970 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, as he outdueled Arnold Palmer down the stretch. He won another in 1976 at the Congressional Country Club, holing a par-saving 13-footer on the final hole to edge Ray Floyd and Don January.

His most productive year was 1974 as he won three times. A brilliant 235-yard three wood shot on the difficult 18th hole at Riviera Country Club set up his one-stroke margin over Sam Snead and John Mahaffey at the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open. He also won the Quad Cities Open and the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. After the latter, he received a phone call from then-President Gerald Ford. He was just leaving the press tent when the call came.

These days, he is receiving more enjoyment than ever watching his two sons, David and Ronald, competing in junior events.

Curtis Strange is one of the more determined — and talented — players in the game, anc it is his great desire to save every possible stroke that has made him one of the more successful men in the business.

He went through a winless spell after his two victories in 1980, but he knew that if he kept knocking at the door, sooner-or-later, it would open. It did last August and he captured the Sammy Davis Jr.—Greater Hartford Open.

The year before, he collected the tidy sum of \$263,378 — high for his career — and that established a PGA TOUR mark for the most money won without a victory. He had 12 top 10 finishes this year, with two second places and three thirds. He had a stretch late in the season of finishing fourth or better for five straight weeks.

It carried over to 1983, and this smooth swinger tied Gil Morgan and Lanny Wadkins in the Joe Garagiola—Tucson Open, but Morgan won the playoff.

Curtis has been a winner in golf for most of his life, starting back in his days as a junior golfer in Virginia. He once said, "Physically, I've always had the talent, but I have had to learn how to use it. Patience and maturity are two big keys in the game, and once I learned how to control myself and my game, I was able to improve."

Curtis started to play golf at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va.

His father passed away when Curtis was 14, and then, as Curtis explained, "Chandler Harper, the Hall of Famer, became my teacher."

His first taste of success came when he won the Virginia State Junior at age 15 and he won his first important title in 1973, the Southeastern Amateur. However, he said his biggest thrill came when he won the 1975 Eastern Amateur. "My father won the very first Eastern in 1957, so that had special

Curtis carried such titles as the Western Amateur and the National Collegiate with him when he first attempted to earn his PGA TOUR card in the Fall of 1976, but he missed. He came back in the Spring of 1977 and made it.

The holder of the all-time PGA TOUR record for the lowest two consecutive rounds ever shot is neither Nicklaus nor Hogan nor Snead nor Palmer nor Trevino. It's Ron Streck, and he did it in winning his first title, the 1978 San Antonio-Texas Open.

He was close to losing his card at the end of his second year on TOUR until he shot 63-62 for a 125. There were six times in the TOUR's glorious past when 126s were posted, twice by Sam Snead.

Ron has had one other 62 during his TOUR career, and that came in the third round of the 1981 Michelob-Houston Open at The Woodlands. That gave him a three-day total of 15-under par 198 and a two-stroke lead over Hale Irwin and Jerry Pate.

Then the rains came to stay, through Sunday and even Monday, so the tournament was made official after the 54 holes and Ron had his victory.

He went on to complete a productive year, winning \$114,895, by far his finest.

"I think I've gained a level of maturity over the past couple of years, something that just takes some time out here," he said. "I used to let people and my surroundings bother me too often, but I'm more in control now."

Last year was a difficult one for him physically. In December of 1982, he cracked two ribs skiing in Colorado, and missed the first month of the schedule. Then, just before the Masters Tournament, he suffered a torn cartilage in his knee in a pick-up basketball game and was off another month.

"I've gained a lot of experience in the six years I've been on Tour," he said, "and I was able to salvage a decent year in 1983 because of that experience."

Streck's been involved in golf almost since he was old enough to walk. "My Dad was a member of a country club at home, and he started me out when I was four years old," he recalls.

"I liked the game and continued playing right through high school, but I've never had a golf lesson in my life . . . I guess you could say I taught myself."

Next came a golf scholarship at the University of Tulsa, and by the end of his freshman year, Ron knew he'd like to give the TOUR a try when he finished school.

"It's been a learning process as it is for everyone who plays the TOUR," he says.

He will tell you that the last round of his victory march in the San Antonio-Texas Open was the most exciting of his career. It also is interesting to note that he was a two-time all-state high school basketball player, and far more colleges wanted him for that sport than for golf.

Mike Sullivan is one of those fellows with considerable potential, and when he has been physically ready to go, he has played some marvelous golf. He has had some problems with his back and that doesn't help his big, powerful swing.

His only TOUR victory came in the 1980 Southern Open at Columbus, GA. A second-round 63 gave him the lead he never relinquished and he won by five strokes. The next week, he nearly did it again, finally finishing in a tie for second at the Pensacola Open.

In 1981, he almost made it two Southern titles in a row, as a last-day 64 placed him in a tie with J. C. Snead, but Snead won it in a playoff on the second extra hole.

He won nearly a quarter-of-a-million dollars in those two years, but it was tough for him in 1982, winning only \$37,957. A third-day 66 led to a tie for fourth in the Pensacola Open and his next best finishes were ties for 18th in three events.

There was a definite improvement in his game last year, and he knows why. "In the winter of 1981, I made quite a few swing changes. I became more conscious about the moves, the mechanics of the swing; and neglected what I really was trying to do and that's hit the shot.

"Last year, I got away from so much mechanics and thought more about the shot in front of he said

His biggest year was 1980 and he started like a superstar. He tied for second in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and finished third the next week in the Phoenix Open, earning \$44,600 for those two splendid efforts. He had won, in those two outings, more than he had won in any full season prior to

Three weeks later, Mike suffered severe back muscle spasms and was off the TOUR for five weeks. When he did come back, he missed three straight cuts and every swing was a struggle. By mid-summer, he was in full swing again, and capped the year with his Southern victory.

Mike played a lot of golf with his father when he was a youngster. "He was a scratch amateur, and taught me everything in those days.

Living in Ocala, Fla., his father took him to see the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, and the old Greater Jacksonville Open. He went to the University of Florida briefly — and had Andy Bean for a roommate - but he wanted to play golf, and not go to school.

He missed twice in attempting to qualify for the TOUR, but made it in the Fall of 1976. When he finished fourth in the 1977 Doral-Eastern Open, he felt he was on his way, but he started to press for success. He won \$8,800 at Doral, and only \$11,170 for the entire year.

He improved considerably in 1978. In the Buick Open, he lost in a playoff to Jack Newton of Australia. The next year was something of a disappointment for Mike, but it still was not too bad. Then came his great start in 1980.

Early in the year, when personable Hal Sutton was asked what he could do for an encore after his brilliant performance as a first-year player in 1982, he always replied:

"I would like to continue to improve my game, win a major championship and be the year's

leading money winner.

He always said it so calmly and had such a confident tone to his voice, that you knew he truly believed he could reach those lofty goals. And, he did.

In his first two years on the PGA TOUR, he has done more than any player since Jack Nicklaus

blossomed onto the scene in 1962.

The handsome young man from Louisiana won two of the more prestigeous tournaments in the game — the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA Championship. He was the No. 1 money winner for most of the year, and finally edged Fuzzy Zoeller for the honor with \$426,668.

He had 12 top 10 finishes, compiled an excellent scoring average of 70.94 and climaxed the year by playing on the United States team against Japan in early November.

Summing it up, he said simply, "All the hard work I put into the game paid off. It was a gratifying

As a rookie in 1982, he had eight top 10 finishes en route to a \$237,434 campaign, and his first victory as a professional came in the season's final event, the Walt Disney World Classic. He turned back the challenge of Bill Britton in that one, with a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

Although his father did not play the game, Hal said he always was the "moving force behind me." A friend of his father's sent him a set of clubs when he was 11, and that was the start. "I played some team sports, but it was discouraging because I never seemed to be on a good team. I decided I

wanted to win or lose on my own ability and that's why I chose golf."
As a 12-and-13-year old, he would take his father's cart and "sometimes play 72 holes a day." He said he only had mediocre success until his junior year at Centenary College, although he did win the Louisiana State Junior title in 1974. In college, he became mentally stronger and learned what

"course management" meant.

Hal won the 1980 U.S. Amateur at the Country Club of North Carolina and was named Golf Magazine College Player of the Year, also in 1980. At the time, there was talk that he might forever re-

"I went to work for my Dad and would go as long as a month without playing at all," he said.
"When I did try to play, I didn't have any feel. I had put so much into the game to that point, I felt it was senseless to give it all up. I could always go back into business, but in later years, I couldn't go back to the game at the level I wanted. So, I decided to turn professional and go on TOUR." He easily went through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1981.

Now, the business back home will have to wait a long, long time

The Doug Tewell story is one of the more inspiring on the PGA TOUR. Early in 1979, h∋ came within a putt or two of leaving the TOUR entirely. Today, he is one of the game's better players.

He knows it has taken a lot of hard work and mental discipline, but says it is difficult to pinpoint all the reasons for the drastic improvement. He became a \$100,000 player for the second time last year and, again, it was hard work that put him up there.

"I prepared very well for the year," he explains, "spending a lot of practice time in November and December. The most satisfying part of it was finishing sixth in the Tournament Players Championship and ninth in the PGA (with a 69-67 finish). That's the first time I've ever played well in the big

After the 1979 Bay Hill Classic in March, he was so discouraged with his progress in the game, that he was ready to pack it all in and look for another job. A friend of his encouraged him to "work as hard as you can for the rest of the year, and then see what happens."

He did just that, and won \$84,500 for the year. Following the same advice into 1980, Doug played reasonably well early in the year. He missed the cut in the Tournament Players Championship and then went to the Sea Pines Heritage Classic at Harbour Town the next week. After two rounds of 69-66, he was tied for the lead with Jerry Pate. He still was tied after three, but now with John Mahaffey. The final day, Pate tied him at the end of regulation play, and Doug won his inaugural with a par on the first extra hole.

Buoyed by that success, he continued to play well, and broke through again in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. He was 10-shots back after two rounds, but closed brilliantly with 65-67 to win by one over Tom Kite.

Doug started to play golf at about age 12 and his first teacher was Labron Harris, S. at the Lakeside club in Stillwater, Okla. The Tewell family had a membership there.

Doug and Mark Hayes were classmates and golf teammates through Stillwater High and Oklahoma State. "I was a steady player all through school, but I didn't think I was good enough to play on the TOUR, so I chose to be a club professional," he said. Incidentally, he was the runner-up three times in the Oklahoma State Amateur, losing once to Mark.

He worked as an assistant professional for two years and then moved on as head pro at the Pinetop Country Club in Pinetop, Ariz. During the off seasons, he worked at Camelback in Phoenix. In June, 1975, with his Class A PGA membership in hand, he joined the TOUR, but it was not easy. Winning \$33,162 in 1977 helped to encourage him.

The golf world became a lot brighter for Leonard Thompson in 1983 because near the end of the season, he started to play healthy again. The result was three top 10 finishes in his last eight starts.

"I went about a year-and-a-half," he explains, "when I couldn't play without pain. In December of 1981, I tore the ligaments in my left wrist. Finally, when that healed early in 1983, I suffered a bad cut on my left thumb that required surgery. Those are the breaks."

In 1981, Leonard had a day to remember, as he shot a course record 31-31—62 at Gien Abbey Golf Club in the Canadian Open. He only missed one green but still birdied as he chipped in from off the edge. He used the same golf ball for 18 holes, and then presented it to the Royal Canadian Golf Association for its museum at Glen Abbey.

Leonard joined the TOUR in the Fall of 1971, earning his card in his second attempt at the Qualifying School. He had sharpened his game at Wake Forest University, and was a teammate of such players as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman.

He progressed steadily and in 1974 won the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. When his earnings totaled \$122,349, his followers were sure he would continue on to stardom.

It was shortly afterwards that Leonard started to fight the scales. When his weight reached 230, he decided it was time to start a conditioning program. In mid-November of 1974, he went on a crash diet and in 3½ months, lost nearly 50 pounds.

"Suddenly," he said, "I couldn't stop losing. I went to a low of 183 pounds and didn't have any strength."

His earnings dropped almost as rapidly during the next two years, and that was when he decided it was time to seek out Arnold Palmer for help. The next year, he won \$107,293.

At the end of his successful 1977, he won the Pensacola Open by holing a 50-foot putt on the final hole for a birdie and a two-stroke edge on Curtis Strange.

A native North Carolinian, one of the highlights of his career was the course record seven-under par 29 on the back nine at Pinehurst No. 2, set in the 1977 Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Jim Thorpe continues to improve with the years and most close observers of the game believe his break-through day will come soon. He possesses a tremendous amount of talent in his powerful body, and each season he learns how to harness it just a little bit more.

Several times Jim has challenged and been thrust into the limelight, and each time he has handled the situation well.

This past year, for example, he enjoyed his finest campaign, winning well over \$10C,000. "I learned to be more consistent," he said. "The All-exempt TOUR had a lot to do with it."

Twice he finished in the runner-up position, in the Houston Coca-Cola Open and the Bank of Boston Classic; and also was fourth alone in the Memorial Tournament.

He is the ninth of 12 children. He grew up in a large home off the second fairway at the Roxboro (NC) Golf Club where his father, Elvert, was the greens superintendent. He says with a laugh, "We used to go out after dark and hit shots by the back-porch light."

Jim was quite a football player in high school and earned a scholarship to Morgan State. He was a running back, and a powerful one at that, but after a year, he abandoned the sport and then left school after years to devote more time to golf.

"There were five boys in the family," Jim says, "and my father was the one who started me playing golf, but in those days, I would rather play football. My brother, Chuck, was the best golfer in the family."

Chuck was on the PGA TOUR in the early 1970s and it was Chuck who gave Jim some sound advice regarding the TOUR. "I couldn't hit my long irons very well, so one day Chuck said we should go to Pinehurst and he would help me with my game. We played and practiced and played some more. Finally, one day, Chuck said, 'You're ready.'

Jim obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1975, but he only won \$2,000, the next year, so he went home again. In the Fall of 1978, he was back in the School, this time better prepared, and was comedalist with John Fought in the Q-School. Early the next year, he let everyone know he was indeed ready, as he tied with Tom Watson for second place in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, two strokes

He received more national attention at the 1981 U.S. Open at Merion, as his first-round 66 gave him the lead. It was his first Open "after missing the qualifier five-or-six times." He finished tied for 11th.

Lee Trevino was delighted with the way he finished the year, because he was certain there would be better-and-brighter days ahead when the 1984 campaign dawned.

He finished second to Rex Caldwell in the LaJet-Coors Classic, and made a strong showing in

the Texas Open with four rounds in the 60s, to give his spirits a much-needed boost.

His last victory was in the 1981 MONY-Tournament of Champions, but when he appeared on the verge of winning again at the LaJet in Abilene, he said, "I haven't won lately because I haven't been able to physically. It wasn't because I lost my game.

His problem had been his back. He suffered with pain, sometimes severe, but never complained publicly. He always maintained his "Merry Mex" attitude. Some believe his problems originated when he was struck by lightning at the 1975 Western Open. In November of 1976, he underwent an operation for a herniated disc.

The pain continued, so during the week of the 1981 PGA Championship, he went into the hospital

to have a nerve end deadened. It worked perfectly.
Since then, there has been no pain, but it took awhile to regain his confidence and last year it started to blossom again. "I can play all the shots I've ever been able to play," he said, "with no restrictions whatsoever.

Lee's greatest year on TOUR was 1980 when he collected three titles, \$385,814 and won his fifth Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.73 for 82 rounds. His average was the lowest on TOUR since Sam Snead's 69.23 in 1950 and his money winnings totaled \$150,000 more than he had won in any single season

In September of 1981, he was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst. Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco, and he didn't try the TOUR again until a year later at Baltusrol. He placed sixth in that U.S. Open, and was on the TOUR to stay. Twelve months later, he was entertaining everyone at the marguerita party at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open.

Lee won the U.S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff at Merion, and in a span of five weeks that summer he added the Canadian and British Open titles to his fast-growing collection. He was named "Player of the Year" practically by acclamation.

Howard Twitty knows he may never again play the game as well as he did in a stretch of 31/2 tournaments in mid-summer. He went through 14 rounds with 13 of them being in the 60's and was

One of those weeks ended in a victory, as he defeated Jim Simons on the sixth extra hole in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the others, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, fifth in the Quad Cities Open, and, after the victory, he started 64-66 in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic but then the bubble burst.

"I've worked on a couple of keys," he said of his sudden turn around, "but nothing major. I am getting set up and aligned easily."

The birdies have been harder to find the last three years.

Howard's first TOUR victory came the year before in the B.C. Open when he outplayed two close friends, Tom Purtzer and Doug Tewell on the 72nd hole. They were tied through 71, but Howard managed a par on the home hole and that gave him the victory.

One of the biggest men on the TOUR at six-feet-five, 200 pounds, he once was asked why he didn't concentrate on football. With a grin, he replied, "I like to keep my blood in my body.

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at the start. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6' 3" when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed.'

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when a senior, he finished right behind the Texas co-champions, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite, in the NCAA championship.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and twice failed in the PGA TOUR Qualifying School before meeting success in June 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

Although Bobby Wadkins has enjoyed periods of success during his nine years on the PGA TOUR, it remains something of a mystery why he has not won a tournament. He has been close numerous times, and his best effort was in the 1979 IVB-Philadelphia Classic. He was in command late in the final round, but Lou Graham came from six strokes back with a seven-under par 64 and caught him. In the playoff, Lou birdied the first extra hole and won it all.

Later that same year, he tied for second in the Anheuser-Busch Classic, just one-stroke behind John Fought. Nevertheless, the high finishes paved the way to his best money year, with earnings of \$121,373.

In addition, he was bouyed by a victory in the European Open in the Fall of 1978.

It was a similar story this past year. He shot a wonderous 64 the second day of the Colonial National Invitation and had the lead at eight-under par 132. "It probably was the best round I've played on TOUR," he said. "I made tons and tons of good iron shots."

Then he added with a laugh, "I might call Lanny tonight to see if he will play the last 36 holes for me. It is frustrating to see some players you know you can beat, but they win."

The last two rounds were not as productive, but he did tie for fifth place, his best finish of the year. He said, "My putting has held me back. I make a lot of cuts, but not as much money as I should."

Bobby is approximately 20 months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and now during his years on the TOUR, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

Today Bobby and Lanny often practice together, and when one needs help, he almost always goes to his brother.

After high school — where he also was a standout basketball player — Bobby headed for the University of Houston and his two closest friends there — and now — were Bill Rogers and Bruce Lietzke.

After one year, though, he transferred to East Tennessee State and earned All-American status in 1972 and 1973.

He earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1974.

A highlight in 1977 came the first day of the Memorial Tournament. After going out in 39 on the very difficult course, he came back in seven-under 29, to tie for the lead. He also was in the lead after three rounds, but a bad last day dropped him to a tie for 11th.

Lanny Wadkins' approach to the game of golf is quite simple, really. He attacks the course constantly.

"I get a big kick out of playing that way," he says. "You know, going for the green in two on a par five when the second shot is over water; but I never take a chance if it's a bad risk."

While others must look for the safe way home, Lanny can be bold because he has the shots, possibly more shots than anyone in the game. With a grin, he says, "Some people don't know I have those shots. They see me lashing away but don't understand what I'm doing. I'm always working the ball. Every shot is calculated.

"That's when you win," he adds.

And win he has over the years. When he is on his game — which is most of the time in recent years — there isn't a more feared competitor on the TOUR. That's why he has been able to win some big ones on the most demanding courses.

For example, he won the 1977 PGA Championship in a playoff over Gene Littler at Pebble Beach; and later that summer, won the World Series of Golf in a marvelous performance on the tough Firestone South course.

Two years later, when weather conditions bordered on the unplayable, with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass with a five-under par total of 283 — five better than runner-up Tom Watson.

He won three times in 1982 and came back with two more this past year, winning the MONY—Tournament of Champions for a second straight year. He started 1983 by losing in a playoff to Gil Morgan at the Joe Garagiola—Tucson Open, and the next week was second again, also to Morgan, in the Glen Campbell—Los Angeles Open.

In addition to all of that, he was superb for the third straight time in the Ryder Cup matches against the European team.

Lanny enjoyed a brilliant amateur career, highlighted by his victory in the 1970 U.S. Amateur. It wasn't any surprise when he became an immediate success on the PGA TOUR. After earning his player's card in the Fall of 1971, he went on to win the 1972 Sahara Invitational.

Unfortunately, he has been plagued by health problems through part of his professional career. All you need to do is look at his money-winning record to determine when he has been healthy and when he has been ailing.

Denis Watson has knocked on the door a few times through his first three years on the TOUR, letting everyone know he has the game to be a winner.

He earned his PGA TOUR card in the Spring of 1981, and in only 13 events the rest of that year, he had four top ten finishes. In 1982, his first start was the Bay Hill Classic, and he tied with Tom Kite and Jack Nicklaus after 72 holes, but Kite won the playoff.

Last year, he was tied with Lanny Wadkins and Craig Stadler after three rounds of the Greater Greensboro Open, but finally tied for second with Stadler as Wadkins won.

The consistency he seeks has been lacking, but part of that is due to physical problems, and he also says his attitude sometimes is not what it should be. "I expect to do better," he explained, "and when I don't perform, I let it get to me."

He actually won most of his 1983 money in two events, the Greater Greensboro Open and the Walt Disney World Classic, where a last-round 65 let him tie for ninth place. He collected \$59,284 for the year, and \$46,000 of it came in those two starts.

Denis established himself as one of South Africa's finest players and twice finished as the runner-up in its Order of Merit. His father started him in the game when they lived in Rhodesia. He was 14-years old at the time, and two years later, his handicap was down to a one. "That's when I started to think about turning professional."

He played all sports, including cricket, rugby, tennis and competed in track and field, but golf was his love, no doubt about it.

He turned pro when he was 19. Although he had a dream that someday he would play the United States TOUR, he said it was little more than a dream as long as he lived in Rhodesia. So, he moved to South Africa in 1976.

"Gary Player and Dale Hayes said I sould give the TOUR a try," Watson said. "Then Gil Morgan told me he thought my game was well suited for the American courses and even Howard Twitty encouraged me to come over here. So, I did."

He plays out of the Plantation Golf and Country Club in Venice, Fla., now, and his primary teacher is David Leadbetter of the Grenelefe Club.

Tom Watson was paid the supreme compliment by his good friend and arch rival, Jack Nicklaus, just prior to the Ryder Cup matches at Palm Beach Gardens, FL, last October.

Nicklaus was the team captain, and he announced his plans to play Tom in every match because the "intimidating factor" would be worth a lot of points against the Europeans. Jack was right.

He added that "for a change, I'll enjoy standing back and watching Tom chip."

As long as the game is played, Tom will be regarded as one of the great players of all time; but more than any other single feat, he will be remembered for the brilliantly-executed pitch shot he made from off the 17th green at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open.

As you recall, his two iron off the tee on the par three hole bounced in heavy rough on the left side of the green. He was tied with Jack Nicklaus, who already had completed his round. Par seemed the absolute best Tom could do, but a bogey was far more likely.

Instead, he hit the perfect shot, and holed it for a birdie two. He went on to birdie the last hole and

win his first Open championship by two over Nicklaus.
"Yes," Tom said later, "it was the best shot I've ever hit. It had more meaning than any other single shot I've hit in my career.

A month later, he won the British Open crown at Royal Troon, and with his two other TOUR titles,

he was named the Player-of-the-Year for the fifth time in a six-year span.

This past year was an excellent one by most standards, but not by Watson's. He did win the British Open for the fifth time, but in 17 TOUR starts, the best he could do was finish second twice, in the U.S. Open at Oakmont and then the Western Open. In both events, he appeared to have the victory, only to see someone else slip in and take it away on the closing holes

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won six times on TOUR, plus the British Open, and won a

record \$530,808. He is the only player ever to break the half-million dollar mark.

Since he won \$1,065 for a tie for 28th in his first start on TOUR in the 1971 Kaiser International

Open, this personable fellow has elevated himself to a position with the all-time greats.

Tom was only six years old when his father, a scratch golfer, exposed him to the game. He became a four-time winner of the Missouri State Amateur and played for three years at Stanford University before graduating in 1971 with a degree in psychology. While in high school, Tom also starred in football and basketball.

D. A. Weibring is one of the more popular players on the PGA TOUR, so it was a disappointment to his fans to see him suffer through 1983 with a serious left wrist injury.

He hurt it at the Phoenix Open, and said, "I never could get going, even though I tried to play with it." Finally, he had to take two months off in the early spring.

"I played well after I came back in early June, but I still wasn't 100%," he continued. "Originally, I broke a blood capsule on top of the wrist hitting balls on the practice tee and then I went on to suffer ligament damage. The only cure was rest and therapy."

He did his therapy with the Dallas Cowboys physical staff and adds, "They also helped me to get in the best shape of my life. When I did come back, I was a lot stronger in all ways. They taught me a lot about conditioning and it will pay off."

The setback was frustrating since he was coming off his best money year, winning \$117,941 in 1982, and anticipated even greater returns in 1983. A late season surge in 1982 did it for him. He finished 24th or better in his last five starts with two of them in the top 10.

His lone victory came in the 1979 Quad Cities Open. He was tied with Calvin Peete through 14 holes the last day, but D. A. took charge at the par five 15th, registering an eagle and taking the lead to stay.

It was a popular victory for D. A. A graduate of Illinois State University, he had a number of his followers from his hometown of Quincy, IL, there to cheer him on. He said, "If I had to pick a place to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

His next closest brush with victory came in the 1980 Andy Williams-San Diego Open. He fired a final round 65 and found himself tied with Tom Watson, but Watson went on to win on the first extra hole.

D. A. joined the TOUR in June of 1977, earning his card on his third attempt at the qualifying school. In his first full year of 1978, he won \$41,052, finishing 75th on the money list.

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

"My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

During the last two decades, there have been few people playing the game who have commanded the same attention as Tom Weiskopf.

The possessor of one of the finest swings in the history of golf, Tom has compiled an enviable record since coming out of Ohio State University to join the TOUR in 1965. Even though he has won 15 times and accumulated well over \$2.2 million in earnings to rank sixth all-time, there are some who say he should have done better.

Be that as it may, through all the years Tom has been his own man and his followers have enjoyed the pinnacles of success and also suffered through the depths of despair.

The game has never been all-consuming to him. He has taken time away from the TOUR to be with his family and also to trod through the bush country in search of wildlife trophies, especially sheep and elk. In more recent years, he has devoted more time to golf course architecture.

During his years on the TOUR, he has always responded to the challenge. When winning

became important enough, he won. For example, in 1973 when he set a personal goal, he compiled one of the great streaks in recent years. In an eight-week period, he won five times, including the British and Canadian Opens. Several groups named him the Player-of-the-Year.

For several years through the mid and late 1970s, he suffered with hand injuries, but few knew it.

He still managed to win and be among the leading money collectors.

Few victories have given him as much satisfaction as the 1981 LaJet Classic, because it ended a 31/2-year winless spell, and the 1982 Western Open, because it was a tournament he always wanted to add to his collection. After winning the 1963 Western Amateur, he was invited to participate in the 1964 Western Open. That was his first start as a pro and he won \$487.50. Ever since then, he has contributed a check in that amount each year to the Western's Evans Scholarship Fund

Incidentally, when the top 60 money winners was the prime basis for exempt status, he finished in that group 17 straight years, through the 1982 season. No one on Tour could match that figure.

Last year, he had his bright moments, such as the course-record 65 at Muirfield Village Golf Club that last day of the Memorial Tournament, but it was an off year for him. He missed the first two months with a hand injury.

Few people know what Fuzzy Zoeller has to endure to play golf on the TOUR, but the sports world is far better off because he has been able to succeed and keep smiling despite a serious back problem

He certainly ranks with the all-time colorful personalities in the game and he has the superb talent to keep his name in the headlines.

Last year was a classic example. He won two tournaments—the Sea Pines Heritage Classic and the Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic, and he also lost a playoff to Jim Colbert in the Colonial National Invitation

In all, Fuzzy assembled 12 top 10 finishes and accumulated a tidy bank roll of \$417,597, second only to Hal Sutton.

'It's an old injury," he explains. "One night playing high school basketball, I was submarined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since.

There have been times when he has had to wear a corset; times when he could not bend over to pick the ball out of the cup; and times when he couldn't play at all.

Fuzzy blossomed as a superstar in 1979 when he won the Andy Williams-San Diego Open and also the Masters Tournament. He was six strokes in back of Ed Sneed starting the last round at Augusta National, and when he finished, he was thinking second place. As he sat in the scorers' tent at the 18th green, with Tom Watson, he watched Sneed bogey the last hole to force a three-way playoff. Fuzzy defeated Ed and Tom on the third extra hole.

His victory did surprise the experts, because this was his first trip to the Masters.

Fuzzy first gained "fame" at the 1976 Quad Cities Open when he birdied the last eight holes of the first round to tie Bob Goalby's all-time TOUR record, set in the 1961 St. Petersburg Open.

Zoeller grew up alongside a fairway at the Valley View CC in New Albany, Ind., and it seemed natural when he started swinging a golf club at age three. He entered his first tournament two years later. He enjoyed all sports while growing up, but when he was eight his father said to him, "Son, all we're doing is running back and forth between the golf course and the baseball diamond. You had better choose one.

Fuzzy chose golf, but during his days in high school he played varsity basketball, mainly, he said keep in shape for golf, and in Indiana in the winter you can't play golf.

He was second in the state scholastic golf tournament in 1970 and went to Edison Junior College in Florida, where he won the State Junior College title before entering the University of Houston.

When Richard Zokol was working on his golf game during his teenage years in his native Canada, he always kept an eye on Jim Nelford.

"I didn't know him then," Richard said, even though they both were from the Vancouver area. "Jim was a couple of years ahead of me and he seemed to win everything. When he went on to Brigham Young University, I could see how much his game improved, so I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

When it was time for Richard to head for college, he wrote to Karl Tucker, the golf coach, to inquire about the possibilities of going there. "He told me that since I didn't have a good amateur record, they couldn't offer me a scholarship," he recalls.

Soon afterwards, Zokol and Nelford were competing against each other in the British Columbia Amateur and after three rounds, Zokol was leading. "We talked about it, and Jim said he would call the coach and recommend me. The next thing I know, Coach Tucker said I should come down to Prove".

"The day after the tournament, I drove 24 hours straight through, and entered the school without a scholarship, but I was there. I made the team and for three years, I roomed with Bobby Clampett."

During his senior year, Clampett left for the pro ranks, but Richard is proud of the fact that he captained the team that won the 1981 NCAA title for BYU. "It was their first, ever," he said.

That fall, he qualified for the PGA TOUR on his first try, turning professional right after the U.S. Amateur Championship. He had one very good tournament that first year, as he was tied for the lead in the Greater Milwaukee Open after three rounds and finished tied for fifth. Unfortunately, his \$15,110 for the year left him in 156th place, so he went back to the Q-School in the Fall of 1982 and qualified again.

He gained national attention in Milwaukee. He showed up the first day with a small portable tape player and headset. Between shots, he would listen to soothing music. "It helps me to relax," he explained, "and takes my mind off of a lot of other things."

Even now, he takes the unit with him on the course nearly every day.

Richard started in the game as a 12-year-old caddy. "We lived right across the street from a golf course, and I'd caddy every weekend and also do some work in the golf shop, cleaning clubs, etc.

"When I was about 15, the club wanted me to play in some junior tournaments for them, and once I started, I was hooked on competition."

Although he can work the ball both ways, he normally hits it straight, and considers his strengths to be driving accuracy and ball-striking.





PALMER AWARD GOES TO SUTTON

Hal Sutton must be wondering what he can possibly do for an encore. His 1983 season, which included wins in the Tournament Players Championship and PGA Championship, ended with the affable Louisianan compiling the fourth-best official money total in PGA TOUR history (\$426,668).

Fuzzy Zoeller, who enjoyed the best season of his career, had an opportunity to overtake Sutton at the Pensacola Open, the year's final official money event. Zoeller needed a fourth-place finish, but he ended up tied for

25th, enabling Sutton to win the Arnold Palmer Award in only his second season as a professional.

The Palmer Award, which will be presented to Sutton at the PGA TOUR's National Awards Dinner, Tuesday, February 14, 1984, is a bronze casting of "Arnie", created by sculptor Jack Worthington of Venice, FL. The original casting of the Award was presented to Palmer in 1980, and the first two recipients were Tom Kite and Craig Stadler.

1983 PGA TOUR OFFICIAL STATISTICS

Introduced prior to the start of the 1980 season, the PGA TOUR's Official Statistics Program has brought a new dimension to the game. The nine major categories provide a valuable detailed look at the particular skills of TOUR players.

Had it not been for the Official Statistics, for example, only a handful of golf enthusiasts would have recognized Calvin Peete as the game's "most accurate player", prior to his emergence as a four-time winner in 1982. Peete has dominated the greens in regulation and driving accuracy categories the past three years.

Statistics are gathered at each PGA TOUR event by scorers who accompany each threesome. Official Statistician Byron "Fergie" Ferguson handles the job of compiling the raw data, but the tedious manual system he used in the past was replaced by a computer in 1983.

Thanks to the PGA TOUR's working agreement with CompuServe, a leading home computer information provider, Ferguson keys statistical data directly into CompuServe's Columbus, OH, computer center. From there, the information is fed to the TOUR's computer in Ponte Vedra, FL, where the weekly cumulative standings are tabulated.

All Official Statistics information, as well as other interesting data regarding the PGA TOUR, is immediately available to CompuServe home subscribers.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five four-somes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

The 1985 Ryder Cup Matches will be played at The Belfry Golf Club, Sutton Coldfield, England.

THE RYDER CUP

The USA squad is selected based upon an accumulation of Ryder Cup points from one Ryder Cup to the next. Points are awarded to the first 10 positions in each PGA TOUR event on the following basis:

PGA Championship and World Series of Golf: 1st-115; 2nd-70; 3rd-45; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-10.

All other events: 1st-70; 2nd-42; 3rd-28; 4th-21; 5th-18; 6th-14; 7th-11; 8th-10; 9th-8; 10th-6.

If a player who is ineligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position. In order to be eligible, a player must be a member of the PGA of America.

MEDIA REGULATIONS

General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the Media:

- Remain close up against gallery ropes in such a way as to appear to be a part of the gallery at all times. An ARM BAND is necessary.
- Players are not to be distracted during play. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
- DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
- Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

- 1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
- 2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
- Do not interview during play. The leading players each day and other requested will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

- All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubbouse
- 2. Tape recorders are NOT permitted in the locker room.
- 3. Tape recorders are NOT permitted within the playing area of the golf course.
- 4. If an interview is to be taped in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player and up against the ropes and NOT in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only accredited photographers for RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am).

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and motion picture cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General - All Photographers

A photographer must not ask a player to pose during a round.

If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.

A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.

At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disqualified.

Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.

Photography Regulations (cont'd)

Still Photographers

Only still photographers to whom arm bands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery lines. They must station themselves immediately inside such lines, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE LINES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.

Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to enter gallery lines and possibly to work at the tournament.

Close-up action shots are prohibited.

All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Motion Picture/Videotape Photographers

Motion or videotape pictures may be taken only from *outside gallery lines* or from areas designated by the PGA TOUR. Motion pictures or videotape may be taken from such locations during a stroke.

Only modern equipment which makes a minimum of noise can be used. Motion picture cameras must be equipped with noise-deadening blimps or hoods.

Use of golf carts by news or television photographers is not permitted during play.

A maximum of two working camera crew members will be permitted per camera.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.
