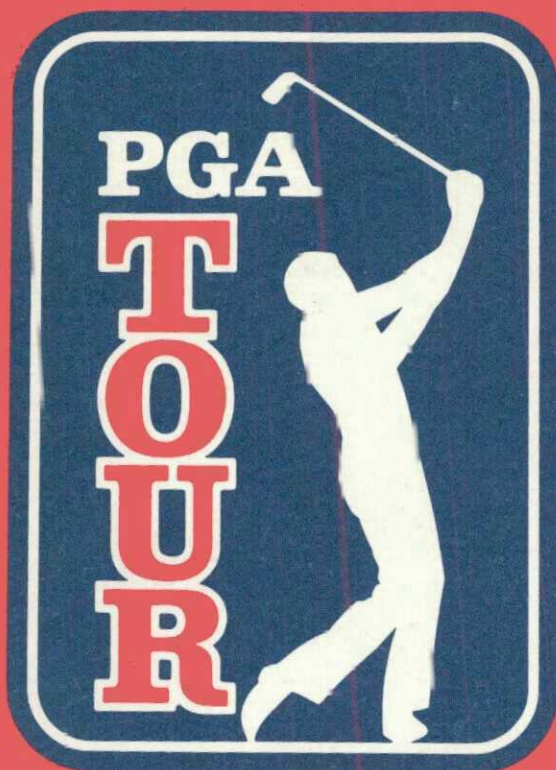

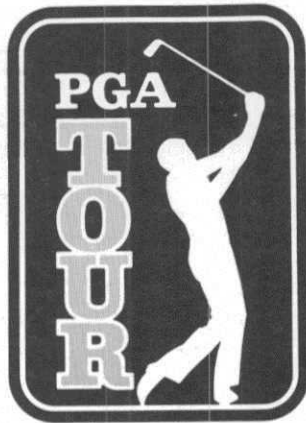

THE TOURNAMENT POLICY BOARD

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the PGA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the PGA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

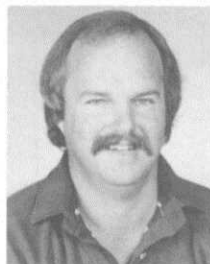
Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner, conducts tournament play.

ABOUT THE COMMISSIONER

Deane R. Beman

Born: April 22, 1938

Entering his 13th year as Commissioner of the PGA TOUR, Deane R. Beman has overseen the most explosive period of growth in the TOUR's history, since succeeding Joseph C. Dey, Jr., on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the "business side" of the PGA TOUR has shown dramatic growth and now includes many heretofore uncharted paths, each designed to help encourage continued prosperity and to ensure the future of the game.

PGA TOUR Investments, Inc., though still in its relative infancy after just four years, has already grown to include 12 "Stadium Golf" facilities nationally. In addition to providing state-of-the-art tournament golf arenas, Tournament Players Clubs have been instrumental in the growth of PGA TOUR assets, which have climbed from \$730,000 to more than \$32 million during the Beman era.

PGA TOUR Properties, the joint marketing venture of the TOUR and PGA of America, continues to make steady progress in its quest to open new opportunities in golf for commercial sponsors and the TOUR's members. This year's introduction of the enormous Vantage Cup/Nabisco Challenge promotion is the latest example of marketing's efforts.

PGA TOUR Productions, introduced last year, is the TOUR's first-ever in-house TV/audio-visual production entity, the creative possibilities of which are nearly limitless. The long-range goals of Productions include the ability to produce the TOUR's non-network, live golf telecasts, though a prudent step-at-a-time approach is being followed in the start-up years.

Other important innovations introduced during the Beman administration include a professional Agronomy department, the Official Statistics program, electronic Vantage Scoreboards, and the Diversified Products physical conditioning facility.

Competitively, the Beman era has witnessed the birth of the Senior PGA TOUR which has increased playing opportunities for professional golfers from 45 events to more than 80. Prize money has increased from \$8.2 million in 1974 to over \$30 million this year.

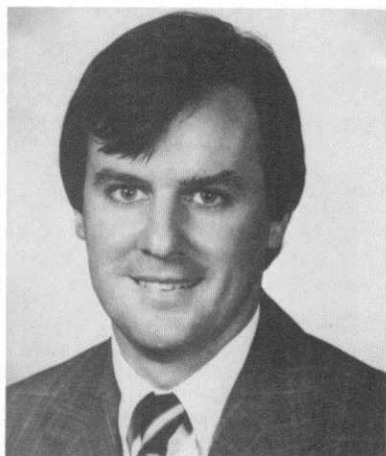
The Player Retirement Plan, inaugurated in 1983, has already contributed \$3 million toward the future benefit of active Plan participants, and larger contributions are expected in future years.

Charity, easily the TOUR's leading money winner during the Beman era, continues to benefit at a yearly record pace. Contributions by American Golf Sponsors to charitable organizations rose to another unprecedented total of \$11.3 million in 1985 and will be substantially supplemented this year by \$2 million in the new Nabisco Challenge Program.

During his active years as a player, Beman established an enviable slate of accomplishments, compiling one of the great amateur records of all time. He won United States Amateur titles in 1960 and 1963 and the British Amateur championship in 1959. As an amateur, Beman was a member of four Walker Cup teams, four World Amateur Cup teams and three U.S. Americas Cup squads.

At the age of 29, in 1967, he left a prosperous insurance brokerage firm in Bethesda, MD, to join the PGA TOUR as a full-time player. During his six-year professional career, he won the 1969 Texas Open, 1970 Greater Milwaukee Open, 1972 Quad Cities Open and 1973 Shrine-Robinson Classic.

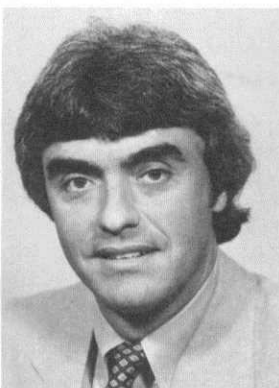
TIMOTHY G. SMITH

After completing assignments in the United States Justice Department and the White House, Tim Smith joined the PGA TOUR as General Counsel and Director of Business Affairs in 1981.

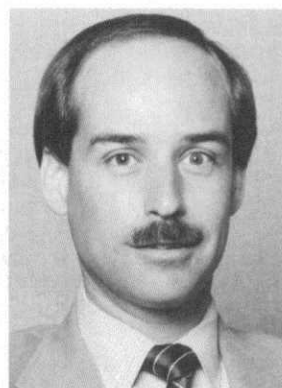

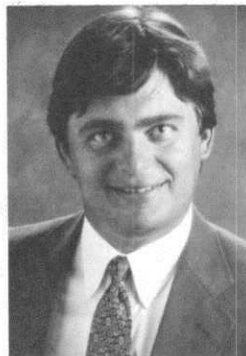

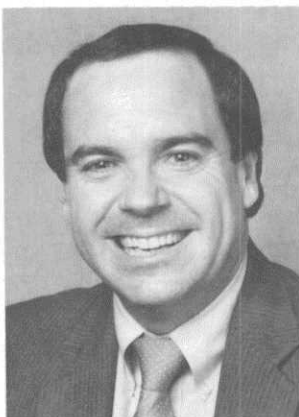

8. Leaders in official PGA TOUR career earnings, as follows:

- a. Players among the Top 50 in career earnings as of the end of the preceding calendar year may elect to use a one-time, one-year exemption for the next year, provided such player has not previously used (under previous versions of these regulations) one or more years of career money list exemption.

- b. Players among the Top 25 in career earnings as of the end of the preceding calendar year may elect to use this special exemption for a second year, provided that the player has not previously used both years of this exemption and that the player remains among the Top 25 on the career money list.

9. Sponsor exemptions (a maximum of eight, which may include amateurs with handicaps of two or less), on the following basis:

- a. Not less than two sponsor invitees shall be PGA TOUR Regular, Life or Past Champion members not otherwise exempt.

- b. Not less than two of the top 50 finishers from the last Qualifying Tournament, if not all of them can otherwise be accommodated.

(Note: PGA TOUR members may receive unlimited number of sponsor invitations. Non-TOUR members may receive maximum of five per year.)

10. Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.

11. The current PGA Club Professional Champion for a maximum of three open events, in addition to any sponsor selections.

12. PGA Section Champion of the Section in which the tournament is played.

13. Four members of the PGA Section in which the tournament is played, who qualify through Sectional qualifying competitions.

The All Exempt TOUR: (cont'd)

14. Four low scorers at Open Qualifying, which shall normally be held on Monday of tournament week.
15. Past champions of the particular event being contested that week, if co-sponsored by the PGA TOUR and the same tournament sponsor (except for Team events), as follows:

Winners prior to July 28, 1970—unlimited exemptions for such events.

Winners after July 28, 1970—ten years of exemptions for such events.

II. TOP 125, PREVIOUS YEAR'S OFFICIAL MONEY LIST—If not exempt under "Special Exemptions," the top 125 finishers on the previous year's Official Money List, in order of their positions on the list.

VI. SPECIAL MEMBERS/MEDICAL—If granted by the Commissioner, if not otherwise eligible, and if needed to fill the field, Special Members/Medical.

VII. PAST CHAMPION MEMBERS—If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, Past Champion Members, in order of the total number of co-sponsored or approved events won, excluding Team events. If two or more players are tied, the player who is higher on the PGA TOUR Career Money List shall be eligible.

VIII. SPECIAL TEMPORARY—If during the course of a PGA TOUR season, a non-member of the PGA TOUR wins an amount of official money (e.g., by playing in PGA TOUR events through sponsor exemptions, Open Qualifying, etc.) equal to the amount won in the preceding year by the 150th finisher on the official money winning list will be eligible for the remainder of the year.

IX. TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP WINNERS—If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, winners of cosponsored team championships, in order of the total number of team championship tournaments won. If two or more players are tied based on the number of such tournaments won, the player who is higher on the official PGA TOUR career money list shall be eligible.

X. VETERAN MEMBERS—If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, Veteran Members (players who have made a minimum of 150 cuts during their career), in order of their standing on the PGA TOUR career money list.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PGA TOUR

The precise start of the PGA TOUR defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 80th anniversary and continues to thrive on the PGA TOUR with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the PGA TOUR started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass., and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's PGA TOUR is traced to the early Twenties when, in the winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas, and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the summer. The summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, and Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic poignancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this TOUR Book, our records such as leading money winner, growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth).

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of PGA TOUR events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the PGA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into purses, accounting for the tripling of prize money in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the value of tournament purses has escalated at an unprecedented rate. PGA TOUR assets have grown from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$32 million today, and total revenues have increased from \$3.9 million to nearly \$29 million in the same time span.

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR is much broader than a decade ago, due to the introduction of the Senior PGA TOUR, the sports success story of the 1980's.

In October of 1980, the PGA TOUR moved to its present National Headquarters Building in Ponte Vedra, FL, and just three weeks later, the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass (owned and operated by the TOUR) beckoned in the era of Stadium Golf.

The Tournament Players Club concept has since been expanded to other cities, and a burgeoning family of such facilities is already a reality.

VANTAGE CUP/NABISCO CHALLENGE EXCITING NEW PROGRAMS IN 1986

In the fall of 1985, the PGA TOUR entered into an agreement with R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company's Vantage Cigarette brand and Nabisco Brands, Inc., both subsidiaries of R. J. Reynolds Industries, Inc., in one of the largest sports promotions of all time.

Starting with this season, Vantage will sponsor a \$2 million player point competition to be called the Vantage Cup, while Nabisco Brands will match a \$1 million contribution by the PGA TOUR in subsidizing a charity team competition called the Nabisco Challenge.

In addition, Nabisco will also sponsor a major advertising campaign to promote the program, including increased support of PGA TOUR televised events.

The Vantage Cup will award \$500,000 to the player who accumulates the most points during the year-long competition. Vantage Cup points will be awarded to players finishing in the top 25 in each PGA TOUR official money event during the year. At the conclusion of the season (Nov. 2), the top 25 cumulative point-earners will share in the \$2 million payoff.

The Nabisco Challenge will distribute \$2 million to the charities of local tournament sponsors through a season-long team competition. At a Nov. 14, 1985, Player Draft meeting in Dallas, each participating tournament selected a five-man team to represent its event. Vantage Cup points earned during the season by each player are credited to his team's account, with the team accumulating the most points earning a \$500,000 bonus for the local charity(ies) involved.

The \$2 million of the Nabisco Challenge will benefit all 41 participating tournaments while the \$2 million of the Vantage Cup will go to the top 25 players on the point list at season's end. In addition, each member of the Nabisco Challenge winning team will pocket \$5,000.

The winner of each official money TOUR event will receive 200 Vantage Cup points, second place finishers receive 195, and so on in decrements of five points through the 25th-place finisher who gets 80 points.

In addition, a bonus of 25 points is awarded for a win, 50 points for two wins, and so on in increments of 25 for each victory posted during the season, up to a maximum of 125.

"It's difficult to overstate the positive effects these programs will have on our game," said PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman. "We're delighted that Vantage and Nabisco have joined us in establishing programs that will benefit players, sponsors, charities and golf enthusiasts alike."

“STADIUM GOLF”...DESIGN CONCEPT OF THE FUTURE

Born in 1980 with the opening of the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass, a bold new concept in golf course design has swept the country, as the PGA TOUR's Tournament Players Club network had grown to 12 members by late 1985, with several others in negotiation stages.

While all of the courses vary in design, and though a number of architects are being utilized, the one common thread which binds them and makes them unique from anything seen previously is the concept of "Stadium Golf," as conceived by PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane Beman and demonstrated by the design of Pete Dye, who created the TPC at Sawgrass.

The TPC at Sawgrass was designed to be the site of the annual Tournament Players Championship and as a home course for the members of the PGA TOUR. It was also intended, however, for the course to serve as a prototype for future "Stadium Golf" facilities the TOUR might develop.

The success of the original course, because of its revolutionary design and its Stadium effects, has spawned a flurry of demand across the nation for courses which embody the elements that made the TPC at Sawgrass unique.

The most prominent feature of the courses is the attention paid to making the sites a most enjoyable experience for the galleries. Large spectator mounds and amphitheaters abound, affording fans the best possible vantage points for viewing golf tournaments.

In fact, Tournament Players Clubs are developed only in places where such courses will substantially improve tournament sites. In short, they are built with the guidance and expertise of the PGA TOUR and financed by the local real estate developers, to provide fans with the best possible atmosphere in which to enjoy tournament golf, and to offer a challenging and rewarding golf experience for members. Only in cases where local tournament sponsoring organizations wholeheartedly endorse such deals are Tournament Players Clubs practical or prudent.

Indeed the first six "offspring" of the Players Club at Sawgrass—the TPC at Plum Creek, the TPC at Eagle Trace, the TPC of Connecticut—TPC at The Woodlands, TPC at Monte Carlo, and TPC at Las Colinas—have all hosted a PGA TOUR or Senior PGA TOUR event already.

Tournament Players Clubs (cont'd.)

Not only do the Players Clubs provide for the fans' comfort and enjoyment, the courses are also designed so as to be cost-efficient in terms of maintenance for member play.

Future Tournament Players Clubs either under construction or in the planning stages as of late 1985 include the layouts at PGA West (Palm Springs, CA), at Avenel (Potomac, MD), at Prestancia (Sarasota, FL), at Star Pass (Tucson, AZ), and Scottsdale, AZ.

In keeping with the already established Players Clubs, all of the new courses are destined to host a PGA TOUR cosponsored event upon completion.

While there is ultimately no definitive number of Tournament Players Clubs planned, the PGA TOUR will always judge a potential site's merits with the concerns of the fans, the developer and the local tournament sponsors in mind.

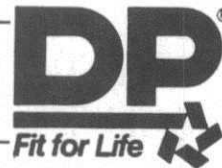
Suffice it to say, though, the concept of "Stadium Golf" and Tournament Players Clubs will have a significant impact on the golf world for years to come.

DIVERSIFIED PRODUCTS FITNESS TRAINING CENTER



Last season, the PGA TOUR Marketing Department, in conjunction with Diversified Products, Centinela Hospital Medical Center and Dr. Frank Jobe of the National Athletic Health Institute introduced a program to assist PGA TOUR players in the areas of injury prevention, physical conditioning and rehabilitation.

The program proved to be not only extremely popular, but extremely beneficial and the DP Fitness Training Center has become a fixture at PGA TOUR events.

Diversified Products (DP) provides a mobile Fitness Center that includes: a training room housing a whirlpool and massage table; an exercise room housing state of the art exercise equipment and a players' lounge featuring a television, stereo, wet bar and a full line of vitamins and nutritional products.

In addition, DP provides each TOUR player with a personal physical conditioning program based on that individual's current level of physical conditioning and/or that individual's desires.

The facility is staffed by TOUR employees Paul Callaway and Gene Lane who are well versed in the areas of physical therapy, athletic training and injuries. In addition, a licensed physican will be available at most TOUR events to diagnose and treat player injuries.

The mobile Fitness Training Center is housed in a 45' trailer (expandable to 24' wide when parked) and provides the player with the opportunity to maintain his peak level of performance through good health at absolutely no charge to the individual player.

The Fitness Training Center will travel to nearly all of the PGA TOUR's 1986 events and the unit will be powered around the circuit by an International Harvester truck. International Harvester is once again providing the TOUR with the finest trucks available in the industry.

Dr. Jobe, a noted Orthopedic Surgeon, serves as the Medical Consultant for the facility and assists in the implementation and guidance of this important program.

One goal of the PGA TOUR is to provide its players with the best possible atmosphere in which to compete. The Diversified Products Fitness Training Center proved to be a worthy addition to the TOUR in 1985 and should continue to benefit the TOUR immeasurably in the years to come.



CENTINELA HOSPITAL MEDICAL CENTER



In 1985, the PGA TOUR named the Centinela Hospital Medical Center as the "Official Hospital of the PGA TOUR." Working in conjunction with the PGA TOUR and Diversified Products, the Centinela Hospital team is headed by the internationally recognized orthopedist, Dr. Frank Jobe.

Dr. Jobe, an expert on sports medicine and team physician for several major league teams, makes periodic visits to TOUR events for personal consultations with the players regarding their physical problems and fitness programs.

Chosen as an "Official Hospital of the 1984 Olympic Games," Centinela Hospital has long enjoyed a reputation as a leader in the medical field. This reputation is so well recognized that both the White House and the State Department have chosen the facility as its treatment center whenever the President or other major dignitaries are in the Los Angeles area.

A major aspect of Centinela Hospital's reputation is its expertise in sports medicine. Centinela staff orthopedists are the team physicians for most of the Los Angeles professional teams, as well as many teams and individual athletes in all sports throughout the United States and Canada. In addition to sports medicine, Centinela Hospital is dedicated to injury prevention, performance testing, research and education.

Housing the National Athletic Health Institute at its Inglewood, California complex, Centinela Hospital stands at the forefront of treatment and research into athletic related health problems. When the PGA TOUR sought to protect the health and enhance the fitness of its players, the obvious choice was for TOUR officials to name Centinela as the "Official Hospital of the PGA TOUR."

As it did at the beginning of the 1985 season, Centinela Hospital will again provide health examinations and physical fitness testing for TOUR players, and then will develop fitness programs for each participant.

In addition, Centinela will continue to assist in the further development of a computer program for the monitoring of the activities associated with the Diversified Products Fitness Training Center.

Centinela Hospital is expected to play an even more expanded role in 1986, with the center becoming involved in publishing several books and brochures based on results of the golf-related research already completed.

Finally, Centinela Hospital will continue to conduct research and develop data to use as a foundation for the continued good health of the participating PGA TOUR members.

A combination of two leaders in their prospective fields, Centinela Hospital and Diversified Products should again prove to be a winning one for PGA TOUR professionals with increased fitness, improved performances, and injury prevention the end result.



VANTAGE SCOREBOARDS

Despite the many advances made for the spectator at PGA TOUR events over the years, one area was always sadly lagging behind. While new concepts such as "Stadium Golf" made the event more enjoyable for the fan, up-to-the-minute information about action on the course was difficult to obtain. However, that was before the advent of the Vantage Scoreboards.

The electronic Vantage Scoreboard systems that travel the PGA TOUR are indeed a phenomenon. Not only do they bring status reports, current scores, biographical and statistical information, special reports and messages to players and fans spread out over many acres, but they also survive a gamut of weather conditions as well as the vagaries of travel as the two systems leapfrog around the nation.

International Harvester, the number one name in trucks, has provided the PGA TOUR with two diesel engine tractors to power the Vantage trailers around the country.

The trailers will need all the pulling power that the powerful International Harvester tractors can provide as each of the self-contained units contain 20 scoreboards, one "big board" for the 18th green, two Digital PDP computers, scoring terminals for each green, a 1,000-pound capacity crane, 30,000 feet of cable and the rest of the lesser hardware necessary for the system to function.

Since introduced to the TOUR in 1981 through the sponsorship of the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company, the Vantage Scoreboards have amazed millions of spectators with the speed and accuracy of the information provided, and more is planned in 1986. As the Vantage Scoreboard computers are made compatible with the TOUR's on-site statistical computer and the main computer system at TOUR headquarters, the scoreboards will be providing more up-to-date information on players' statistical standings, how particular holes are playing in relation to par, and a wealth of other information that will add to the enjoyment of attending a PGA TOUR event.

As part of its ongoing commitment to golf, R.J. Reynolds will also continue to bring the Vantage World of Golf display to tournament cities prior to TOUR events and on-site during the event itself. This modern exhibit includes information and displays on the origin of golf, leading players and tournaments, a film on the PGA TOUR, details on the manufacture of modern golf equipment, a putting green for public use and much more.

The Vantage Scoreboards and the Vantage World of Golf are major components of the PGA TOUR's commitment to attract new interest in the game and to make professional golf the world's greatest spectator sport.

NISSAN WORLD MONEY LIST

A TRUE PERFORMANCE STANDARD

The Nissan World Money List consists of all official money won in cosponsored events on each of the four participating golf circuits (U.S. PGA TOUR, PGA European Tour, Japan PGA, Australia/New Zealand PGA Tour).

The Nissan World Money List was formulated as a qualification vehicle for the 1985 Nissan Cup World Championship of Golf, contested at Kapalua Golf Club, Maui, HI, in November. It soon became evident, however, that the Nissan World Money List also provided a standard by which world-class players could be compared, regardless of whether or not they competed regularly in head-to-head competition.

Since the initial World Money List was compiled, comments from players and golf officials alike have overwhelmingly indicated that they believe the Nissan World Money List will quickly become the world standard for judging professional golfers' performances on an international basis.

For this year, plans call for the Nissan World Money List to be compiled from the first cosponsored event on any of the four circuits after the 1985 Nissan Cup World Championship of Golf to approximately 60 days prior to the 1986 event.

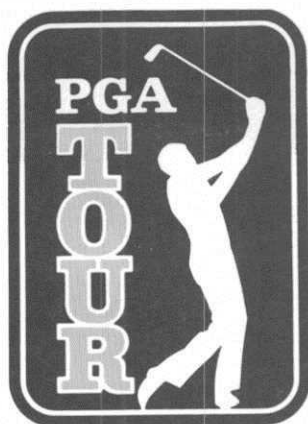

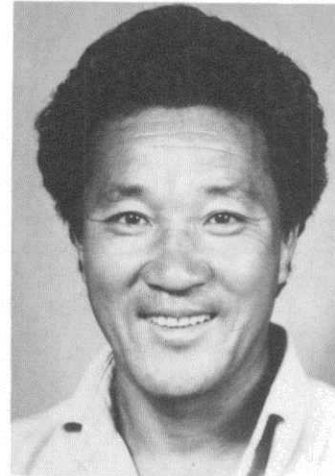

Isao Aoki hit the shot that was heard around the golfing world in 1983, and Jack Renner still shakes his head in disbelief whenever someone mentions it.

The stage was the Waialae Country Club at the Hawaiian Open and the set was the 18th hole. Renner was in the scoring tent behind the green, carefully going over his card. He was finished with a 19-under par total of 269.

The final group of the day was walking down the 18th fairway and Isao Aoki was in it. At this point, as he headed for his golf ball in the left rough, some 128 yards from the flagstick on the par five hole, he was one-stroke behind Renner. He needed a birdie to tie, but it would not be easy to get, coming from the tall grass with his third shot.

As Renner studied his card, he heard a roar from the crowd that would shake the palm trees. He assumed Isao had hit the ball close.

Instead, Japan's greatest player had holed out with a pitching wedge for an eagle three and the victory. "This is the greatest thrill of my career," he was to say later. He thus became the first player from Japan ever to win on the PGA TOUR.

He came close to winning again in the Buick Open, but Wayne Levi came from well back to win by one over Aoki and Calvin Peete.

Last year, he tied for second with Craig Stadler in the Greater Greensboro Open, just one stroke behind Joey Sindelar. He also finished in a tie for seventh in the Tournament Players Championships, thanks to a seven-under par 65 the last day.

Isao was introduced to golf as a caddy at the Abiko Golf Club while attending Abiko Junior High School. During that time, he was known as the "Tower," after the Tokyo Tower, which resembles the Eiffel Tower, for he was the tallest among the caddies.

He practiced early in the mornings and every evening when there were no members playing the course. Even at that time, it was said he was a good putter and short-game player. Today, if you ask him what is the strongest part of his game, without hesitation, he would say, "putting."

The 1983 TOUR statistics support his claim. He was No. 1 in sand saves, No. 2 in putting and No. 3 in driving accuracy.

He turned professional in 1964 but it took him seven long years to win his first tournament, the Kanto PGA. In his 20-year professional career, he has won 41 tournaments in Japan—including five PGA Match Play titles. Twice, he has won in England—the 1978 World Match Play Championship and the 1983 European Open. Five times, he has been Japan's leading money winner.

He has won most of the important events in his homeland, but his most cherished victory came in the Fall of 1983 when he won the Japan Open for the first time. He had been a runner-up on four previous occasions.

Although he had played in the United States for several years at such select events as the Masters Tournament and the World Series of Golf, he first received prominent national attention when he was paired with Jack Nicklaus for four rounds in the 1980 U.S. Open at Baltusrol. He finished second, only two strokes back.

Kikuo Arai had an important decision to make after he was graduated from Toyo University in Japan. His father owned a prosperous lumber business and he thought his first son should join him and carry on the family tradition.

Instead, while a student at Toyo, Kikuo became infatuated with golf and whenever he had a spare moment, he was working on his game. It wasn't easy to tell his father that he wanted to forsake the family business and become a golf professional.

The time was 1967 and he convinced his father that he would not be happy until he at least gave the game a try. He wanted to enter the Japan PGA's professional school and he did promise his father that if he didn't make it, he would return to the business.

Of course, he did make it and Kikuo Arai has been one of Japan's fine playing pros for many years. He has won 14 tournaments during his career and, in 1982, 1983 and 1984, he finished fourth on the Japan PGA Order of Merit.

Three times he earned a position on the Japan team that faced the best from the PGA TOUR in the Goldwin Cup matches. Last Fall, he was one of six Japan PGA players in the inaugural Nissan Cup matches at Kapalua Resort on Maui, Hawaii.

He made a few appearances on the TOUR in 1984 and earned \$4,649. Last year, however, it was a little different. His first start was the Bob Hope Classic and he missed the 72-hole cut by one stroke. The next week in the Phoenix Open, he finished at one-under par and tied for 46th place.

His next tournament was the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur and it was there at Pebble Beach where he had his finest hour. He was five strokes out of the lead after the first day and then moved to within three strokes of the top spot after the second day and stayed there through the third round.

Mark O'Meara was the leader as the field set out on the Pebble Beach links the last afternoon with a six-under par score of 210. Curtis Strange was in second place at 212 and Arai was at 213 with Jay Haas.

It wasn't an easy afternoon for O'Meara but he held on to win, shooting a closing 73 for a five-under par 283. Arai managed a fine 71 and finished at four-under par 284 and in a tie for second place with Strange and Larry Rinker. He earned \$37,333.

He had two more good finishes in his short stay in the United States. A closing 67 moved him into a tie for 12th place in the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic and the following week he tied for sixth place in the rain-shortened USF&G Classic in New Orleans.

In seven starts, he put away \$60,523 which was more than enough to qualify him for membership on the PGA TOUR.

Incidentally, he is known as the "Hat Man" in Japan and if you see him, you will know why. He always wears a snappy-looking hat when playing.

George Archer keeps telling people it's nice to be able to enjoy the scenery and play golf for a living. "I try not to let anything bother me. I'm delighted to be out here playing the game I enjoy."

You can imagine how "delighted" he was in 1984 when he was able to win again—at age 44—in the Bank of Boston Classic. It was his first victory in eight injury-riddled years. He trailed Joey Sindelar by one stroke at the start of the final round at the Pleasant Valley Country Club and then shot a six-under par 65 to win by six strokes.

It was a great year, as he won \$207,543. He said it was all due to the "strict exercise program" his wife devised for him. He has made the variety of exercises part of his daily routine.

Last year, he won more than \$100,000 for the eighth time in his long career, due mainly to consistently good play.

George has been one of the TOUR's finest players for a number of years—when health permitted—but one has to wonder how great he could have been if he had been able to remain healthy. He grins and says, "I'd like to thank my wife publicly for putting up with me and my ailments for the 20-plus years I've been on TOUR."

Twice in the last nine years, George has had major surgery. In 1975, he underwent the knife to repair a torn tendon in his left wrist and his effectiveness in 1974, 1975 and part of 1976 was seriously affected.

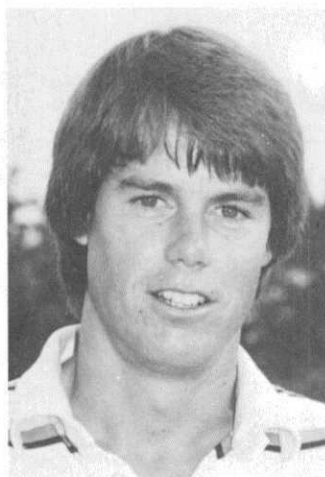
He had an excellent 1977, winning \$113,944, but he then encountered a back problem that required surgery in early 1979. He had two discs fused and it wasn't until July of that year that he was able to return to the front line.

Over his lengthy career, which started in 1964, George has been known for his putting stroke, so it seems appropriate that he owns the all-time TOUR record for fewest putts in a tournament. In the 1980 Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he only needed 94.

Archer began playing golf at age 12 around his native San Francisco and he gathered an exceptional amateur record before he turned pro 13 years later. In 1963 alone he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, the Northern California Open and the San Francisco City title, reached the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International in his home town.

As a pro he has won 13 events, including three in 1968, but the year following was his most memorable when he captured the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and his one major championship when he beat out Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf to take The Masters.

Paul Azinger says his career in the game is "amazing, really." When he tells you how he has advanced up the ladder, you tend to agree with him. His story is "amazing, really."

As a senior in high school, he couldn't break 40, he said, because "I didn't play much and didn't practice at all." He was busy working in his father's marina in Sarasota pumping gas along with scraping and painting boats.

When it was time to go to college, he decided he wanted to play more golf. His first stop was Brevard Junior College where Jim Suttie was his coach. "He introduced me to John Redman and John has taken me to the level I'm at now."

As Paul points out, back in 1979, "my average score was about 77. The next year, working with John, it was down to around 72. Two years later, in the Fall of 1981, I earned my TOUR card in the Qualifying School."

He only won \$10,655 in 1982 and lost his playing privileges. Nevertheless, Paul thought he had a great year. "I idolized everyone out here so much and I went from hardly being able to play at all to suddenly being on the TOUR in about three years."

He'll never forget his first tournament. He qualified for the 1982 Phoenix Open and he ended up playing the final day with Don January and Bill Rogers. Nervous? You bet.

He went back to the Q-School in the Fall of 1982 and didn't make it. So, he played the mini-tours in 1983. It was what he needed for his confidence because he played very well. In the Fall of 1983, he did make it through the School.

He finished 144th on the 1984 money list which meant he could continue to play in 1985, but would be near the end of the exempt priority list. He went back to the School in the Fall at La Quinta, CA, hoping to improve his position. He did, indeed. He was the medalist.

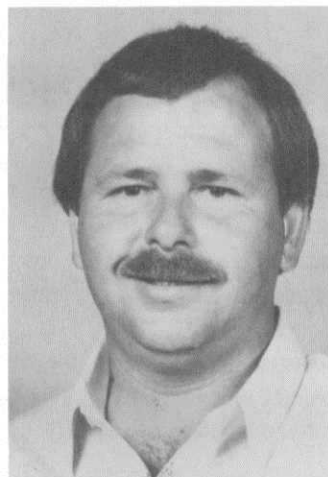
He made the most of his opportunity in 1985 with his best week coming in the Spring when he tied for fifth place in the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. A second-round 65 gave him a one-stroke lead. He faltered to a 74 the third day but rebounded with a 70 on Sunday.

"It was very timely," he said of his effort at Bay Hill. "It definitely was a breakthrough and let me break the five-digit barrier." He won \$18,250. He broke the "five-digit barrier" on three other occasions as he finished tie 10th in the Memorial Tournament and was 11th in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

After his second round at Bay Hill, he admitted to the media, "playing the last couple of holes, I knew I'd have to come in here (News center) and I was scared to death. I thought about what I'd have to say and what you'd ask me."

Paul first played the game as a five-year old because "my parents played and they took me along. They're still good players around Florida." He played on his junior high school team and was progressing well when he entered high school, but by the time he was a senior, he had lost some of his interest. He needed a year-or-two away from golf to re-kindle the flames.

It took a few years but Dave Barr has developed into a solid PGA TOUR player. It wasn't easy for the big fellow from Canada, but he learned to manage his game and he was rewarded with \$ 100,000-plus years in 1984 and 1985.

Dave did win the Quad Cities Open in 1981 but he received considerable national attention in the 1985 United States Open championship when he battled Andy North all the way to the wire before finishing in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Tze-Chung Chen.

A torn rib muscle slowed him down early in the year, but once he was healthy again, he made money in 15 straight tournaments. "When I was hurt," he said, "I never lost confidence because I had such a good year in 1984. I knew I could play well when I was healthy again. And, I did."

Dave has always been successful in his native Canada, too. Last year won the Canadian—PGA and the Quebec Open. He also was named to represent his homeland in the World Cup for the fifth time. In 1983, he won the World Cup individual title.

During his first three years on the TOUR, Dave had his problems. "I used to believe I was a pretty good player," he said, "but during the tough years, you begin to wonder about that."

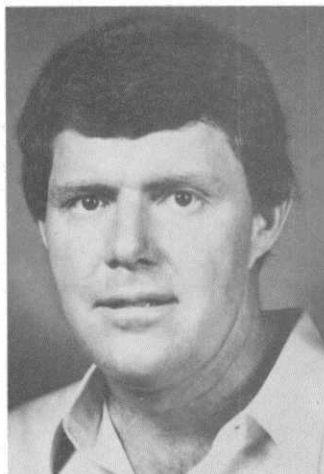
When the final round started at the 1981 Quad Cities Open, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in TOUR history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his elusive triumph.

It was worth \$36,000 and that nearly equaled his entire career earnings to that point, and nearly doubled the amount he won in 1980.

"This is great," he said. "It's what we all play for out here. When things are not going well, you sometimes wonder if you made the right decision. Winning makes it all worth it."

Andy Bean has all the tools necessary to be one of the truly great players in the game, and he came close to being the very best in the business in 1984.

You can't look back and think about what might have been, but his followers know he won the Greater Greensboro Open for the ninth victory of his fine career, but they also know he came within a stroke of winning two others. He lost the Honda Classic in a playoff to Bruce Lietzke and the Memorial Tournament in a playoff to Jack Nicklaus.

In addition, he was in the heart of the battle in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational to the final hole before bowing to Denis Watson.

He still enjoyed his most successful money year, finished in third place with \$422,995. He had 10 top 10 finishes in 30 starts. It wasn't as productive last year. "Just say it was a slow year," he said. "My overall game wasn't as solid, but it wasn't because I didn't practice. I worked just as hard as ever." And, he is one of the hardest workers on TOUR.

Although he has played well the last few years, a wrist injury in 1981 slowed his progress. He only played about one-third of the campaign that year because of a slight fracture near the base of the left thumb.

Even though he was able to cash some healthy checks, Andy revealed in the Fall of 1983, "for the first time since I hurt my wrist, I feel I can play the way I want to play. About midway through the year, I could feel the shots coming back. I just have to work on my putting."

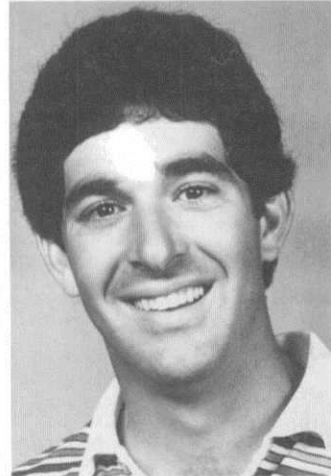
In his first TOUR victory at Doral, Andy led all four days on the Blue Monster course, shooting 67-67-71-72—277. The win became a birthday present; he turned 24 on the final day, March 13. He also won the Doral-Eastern in 1982.

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, GA, where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, FL, where his father bought a course.

"I've been lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

This year, he will be representing both the River Wilderness and Windstar Country Club in Naples, Florida.

When Chip Beck first came on the PGA TOUR, those who knew him well from his college days, put out the good word. "Watch this young man. He's a winner."

One two occasions in 1983 he came close to getting the elusive first victory, as he tied for second twice. He won nearly \$150,000 and it is interesting to note that he led the TOUR in eagles, making 15 of them, and was second in scoring birdies, with 394, just five fewer than leader Hal Sutton.

He followed a similar pattern in 1984 and enjoyed his best money year. He had four third-place finishes in the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open, where he was one stroke out of the Gary Koch-Gary Hallberg playoff; in the Hawaiian Open; in the Memorial Tournament and also in the Walt Disney World Classic.

His week in Hawaii was highlighted by a 65 the second day and a superb eight-under par 64 in the final round.

Even though his productivity dropped in 1985, he wasn't too discouraged. "Say it was a rebuilding year," he said. "I felt my game reached a certain plateau in 1983 and 1984 and I needed to make a couple of minor swing changes to get better. I worked hard on it and believe my game will become more consistent because of it."

He considers driving the ball and chipping as two of the stronger parts of his game and when everything is right, he prefers to play with a slight draw.

Chip well remembers the day he was introduced to golf. He was only 10-years old at the time, and his mother was going to the Highland Golf Club in Fayetteville, NC, to attend a clinic that was to be given by the head professional.

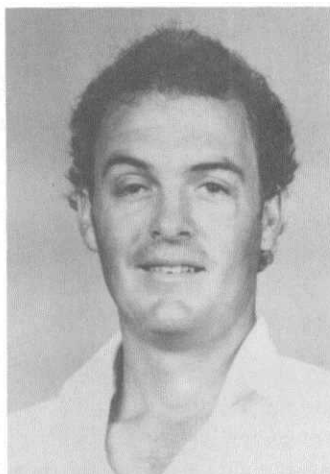
"I really didn't want to go," Chip says with a laugh, "but she woke me up a 7 a.m. so that we could go together. It was being given on the course where Ray Floyd played as a boy."

Once he started to hit balls, he was hooked. He played all summer and the golf career of Chip Beck was well under way. By the end of the summer, he won the Pee Wee division at the club.

A journalism major at the University of Georgia, he enjoyed considerable success on the Bulldog golf team before setting his sights on the TOUR. As a senior, he was named the Athlete of the Year, and that's the first time a golfer had ever been honored at Georgia. He won six collegiate events, such as the Southern Intercollegiate three times and the All-America championship hosted by the University of Houston. He also won the Dixie Intercollegiate and was an All-America choice three years, twice being on the first team.

Incidentally, in 1973 he was nosed out of the North Carolina State interscholastic title by Scott Hoch. Twice he won the Carolinas Junior title and followed with two victories in the Carolinas Amateur championship.

A few days before he headed for the Southern Open in Columbus, GA, in the Fall of 1983, Ronnie Black confided: "I know I belong on the TOUR after the year I've had. I'm not satisfied, but I know I've played even better than what the money list shows."

At that point, he had quietly accumulated more than \$40,000 and was assured of exempt status for 1984. The finest was yet to come.

He was at his career best on the Green Island course and, when most people were cheering Sam Torrance, the flamboyant Scot who stopped off on his way to the Ryder Cup matches, Ronnie came from three-strokes behind the last day to tie Sam at nine-under par 271. Then, Black gained the victory with a six-foot putt for a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

It was just a warm-up for the 1984 campaign. His biggest day came on the Kingsmill course in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He trailed Willie Wood by seven strokes entering the last round, but he shot an eight-under par 63 to edge Wood by a stroke.

The 1985 season was a disappointing one for Black on the golf course, but it was quite a year for him overall. In addition to getting married, he also moved into a new home. It had some effect on his game.

"This was a transition year for me," stated Black. "I got married and moved into a new home so golf was not the priority it had been in the past."

"I felt like I had a real good year in 1984 and maybe I had a little letdown last year," he added. "I'm going to put in a lot of work this off season and maybe I'll get off to a good start in 1986."

Ronnie was nine-years-old when he first picked up a golf club. His father was the basketball coach at Lovington (NM) High School, so he grew up in a sports atmosphere. "Dad told me then that I couldn't go to the course until I was able to hit the ball from our front yard, across the road and over a fence on the other side. It was a shot of about 75 yards."

His older brother, James, became the head professional at Pinewood Country Club in Beaumont, TX, and as Ronnie became of age, James took him under his wing. "He recruited me for Lamar University and I worked in his shop for a while," Ronnie said. "Mostly, though, he let me play and practice."

Until he went to Lamar, he had never played on a course with bunkers or one of championship caliber, but he always dreamed of someday playing on the PGA TOUR.

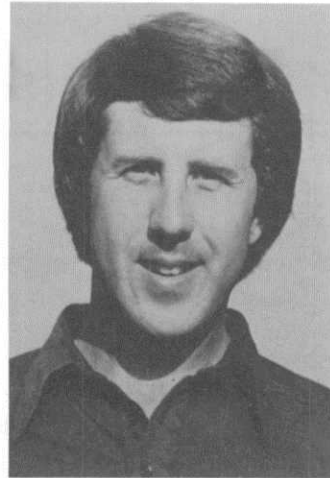
He went to the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1981 and made it. His first stop was the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in January of 1982 and he recalls, "That was the very first TOUR tournament I had ever seen in person. I was low qualifier at Randolph Park with a 66 and thought I was going to knock everyone dead. I have to admit, I had a rude awakening coming."

"I did a lot of watching the first year," he said, "and I definitely was intimidated. I had never seen talent like that and I had to be the greenest person ever to come on TOUR in recent years."

He only won \$6,329 for the year, so it was back to the Qualifying School in the Fall. He finished 39th in his class and headed back out for the 1983 campaign.

Most important, though, when he steps on the first tee now, he has no doubts about his ability to pay on the PGA TOUR. He knows this is where he belongs.

If you're looking for the most improved golfer on the PGA TOUR in 1985, you could put up a strong argument for Woody Blackburn as your choice.

In his first nine years on TOUR, Blackburn had only about \$150,000 although he had won a TOUR event, the 1976 Walt Disney World National Team Play Championship where he combined with Bill Kratzert to beat Gay Brewer and Bobby Nichols in a playoff.

However, that was his only taste of glory for several years although he did lose in a five-man playoff at the 1981 Quad Cities Open to Dave Barr.

His best season prior to 1985 was the 1982 campaign in which he won \$54,165. He fell back off the next two years, though, and in 1984 he won only \$29,074 to finish 141st on the money list.

He returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984 and finished in a T31 to improve his position on TOUR for the 1985 season and he took full advantage of the opportunity.

After an indifferent start, Blackburn came to life in the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open where his opening rounds of 66-66-66 gave him the lead heading into the final round. Ron Streck caught him on Sunday though at 19-under par 269, and a playoff ensued.

Both players matched pars on the first three extra holes, but when Streck dropped his second shot into the water on the par-five 18th hole at Torrey Pines, Blackburn merely needed to play it safe.

He didn't do that, though. Instead he went for the green and made it and then made a three-putt par to clinch his first individual title.

"My purpose when I joined the TOUR was to win tournaments," said Blackburn afterward. "Just winning is enough to me; money is not the reason I'm playing golf."

After a solid career at the University of Florida where he had helped the Gators to the NCAA Championship in 1973, Blackburn was a co-medalist with Bob Shearer at the 1976 Qualifying Tournament, but it wasn't until he visited Peter Kostis at the end of 1983 season that Blackburn started to realize his potential.

"The best thing I ever did was go to see Peter Kostis," said Blackburn. "My swing is much more consistent now."

"We mainly worked on the basics," he added. "If you do the basics well, you can play pretty good. Sometimes you can get too technical."

Blackburn used his victory and a strong effort in the NEC World Series of Golf to finish 57th on the 1985 money list with \$139,257. That figure represented nearly as much as he had won on TOUR in his previous nine years.

With a new found sense of confidence, don't be surprised to see Woody Blackburn's name on the leader board many times in the future.

At 6' 7" and 250 pounds, Phil Blackmar had just the kind of year that you'd expect from someone of that stature—big.

The rookie from Corpus Christi broke onto the PGA TOUR scene in a big way becoming only the 12th rookie in TOUR history to win over \$100,000 and he collected a victory along the way as well.

The victory came at the Canon Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open where he won in a playoff with Jodie Mudd and Dan Pohl by birdieing the first extra hole. The win was worth \$108,000 and while it may have surprised some people to see a rookie win, it didn't especially surprise Blackmar.

"It wasn't really a surprise, but I hadn't planned on it, either," said Blackmar. "I did know that if I got hot, I could win. It's just a question of being lucky and getting hot at the right time."

Phil started in the game as a youngster and he had a teacher with good credentials—his father. Phil's dad won the National Left-handers title in 1965 and he introduced Phil to the game.

In fact, Phil's dad caddied for him during the early part of the season last year and Phil says that it won't be the last time, either.

"I wanted to take him to the West Coast last year until I got my feet on the ground," he said. "He'll continue to caddy for me in all of the big tournaments for quite some time."

Phil was a three-time All-Southwest Conference selection while at the University of Texas and he enjoyed similar success on the mini-tour circuit after graduation from UT in 1979.

He won four mini-tour events and he also collected the 1983 Missouri State Open championship before attending the Fall, 1984 Qualifying Tournament.

He performed splendidly at the final Qualifying Tournament in the Palm Springs, CA, area shooting rounds of 69-72-70-66-70-72—419 to finish one shot in back of medalist Paul Azinger.

With his TOUR card firmly in hand, Blackmar headed out on TOUR with a good attitude and a plan of attack.

"I recognize my limitations, I'm not one of the pure strikers out here," said the biggest man on TOUR. "However, when I get hot I'm going to try and run the table."

After tying for eighth at both the Houston Open and the Byron Nelson Classic, Blackmar did just that at the Canon Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open.

Ken Brown has enjoyed success on his home tour in Europe and now he would like to enjoy the same level of success on the PGA TOUR. During the last two years, he split his time, travelling back and forth across the pond. Both years, he has needed strong finishes at the end of the year to qualify for exempt status.

"Last year, I wanted to play well enough on the European tour to make the Ryder Cup team. I did that, especially after I won the Four Star National Pro-Celebrity tournament."

It was his fourth Ryder Cup experience but this one was the best since the European team upset the United States at the Belfry Club in England.

As a result of his shuttling, however, he didn't play as well on the PGA TOUR as he knows he can. When he did come back in mid-September, he played well and easily clinched his position among the leading 125 money winners.

In 1986, he said he plans to concentrate more on the U.S. tour. "I don't think I'm the type of player who can win two or three times in a year," he said, "but I feel I'm good enough to win over here."

Two years ago, when he headed for the Pensacola Open, which was the final official event of the year, he was in 151st place on the money list. He played exceptionally well, finishing in a tie for second place and earning \$26,400. He leaped into 112th place.

"Once you get into the heat of it," he said, "you bear down more. I knew I had to play well at Pensacola and at the end of last year, too, so I think you tend to concentrate more on every shot. Earlier in the year, I was trying to do too many things."

Ken started in the game at age 12. There was a golf course nearby his home, and he said, "it was a natural thing to go over there and caddy and play."

When he was 15-years old, he thought he'd like to play on the professional tour, and did turn pro when he was 18. He worked in a golf shop for a year, and then headed out on the British/European circuit.

He advanced rapidly, and as a 20-year old in 1977, found himself on the Ryder Cup team for the matches against the U. S. at Royal Lytham in England. He won the Irish Open in 1978 and again played in the Ryder Cup competition in 1979.

During his first six years, he only had the one victory but a lot of good finishes. "I was putting too much pressure on myself, especially the last day," he explained, "Once I learned to relax, I played much better."

Three years ago, after winning the Dutch and Kenya Opens, he decided to give the PGA TOUR a try. In the Qualifying School in the Fall, he tied for 20th place. Two years ago, in a break from the U. S. tour, he won the Glasgow Classic.

When George Burns suffered through a disappointing 1983 season, he put himself to work on his game. The 1984 season paid dividends on that effort, but last year made all the work seem worthwhile.

Last year saw Burns pick up his first victory in five years when he tore up the field at the Bank of Boston Classic where his scores of 67-66-68-66—267 gave him a six-shot victory. Earlier in the season he lost in a playoff at the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic to Roger Maltbie. In all, it was his best year ever as he won \$223,352.

"Everything just sort of came together," Burns recalled. "I'd been working hard on my game and it paid off. I drove the ball well, hit a lot of greens and putted well."

Burns credits Jim Flick with helping him get his swing on track saying, "I really didn't know how to play with the swing I had."

George's first victory came in 1979 at the Walt Disney World National Team Play event and he had Ben Crenshaw for a partner. At the time, he said Ben gave him the boost he needed, and certain it would pay off, confidence-wise.

Early the next year, it did just that as he won the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur and soared on to a \$219,928 year.

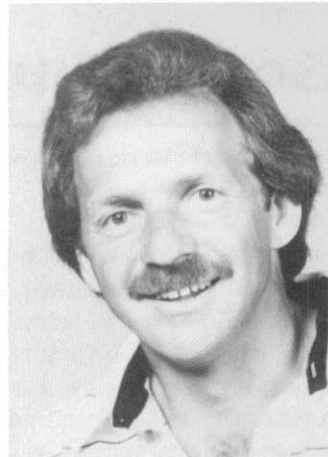
Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

However, it was a full year after his graduation before he blossomed as a force in amateur golf. While working for two years in the New York City area in sales and promotion, he had a chance to play often, and in 1973 he won the Canadian Amateur. The following year Burns won the Porter Cup, North-South Amateur and the New York State Amateur.

Burns was selected to play on the Walker Cup team in 1975 and also on the U.S. side in the World Amateur team championship. "Playing for my country on those teams always will be among the biggest enjoyments I've had in sports," he says.

Rex Caldwell was tied for the lead after three rounds of the 1983 Las Vegas Pro-Celebrity Classic, and he made it very clear what he wanted to do.

"I want to win," he said. "I've been on the TOUR for nine years now, and I think I'm the only guy out here who hasn't won. Just one week, I would like to be able to say I was the best; I beat them all. I don't care about the money. They can give me just \$10 if they want. I want to win."

He didn't have to wait long. He finished second for the fourth time in the year at Vegas; but the very next week, he won in his new home town of Abilene, TX, in the LaJet Golf Classic.

Rex simply went out and won it. He was six-strokes behind Lee Trevino going into the windy final day, and proceeded to shoot a nifty little six-under par 66 for a six-under par total of 282. He put his number on the board early and no one could catch him. Trevino finished second, one-shot behind.

"It's the thrill of a lifetime," he said. "I'm kind of speechless, and as you know, that's unusual for me." He said of the 66, "Yes, under the circumstances, it was the best round of my life."

Earlier in 1983, Rex gained national attention for finishing second three straight weeks, twice losing in playoffs. Keith Fergus bumped him on the first extra hole in the Bob Hope Classic. Bob Gilder needed eight extra holes to beat him in the Phoenix Open, and the he tied for second in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am.

Incidentally, when he did win LaJet, he accepted his check for \$63,000. Interestingly enough, the biggest check of his career came the week before when he was second to Fuzzy Zoeller in Las Vegas, \$81,000.

In December of 1983, he joined with John Cook to represent Uncle Sam in the World Cup competition, and they combined to win the team title.

Rex went over the \$100,000 mark again in 1984 but his driving cost him more. "I broke the driver I had been using for six years," he said, "and couldn't find a replacement." He came on strong toward the end of the year and made it his second most profitable.

After he joined the TOUR for the start of 1975, he experienced three slow years and blamed most of it on his putting. After three-putting himself out of the 1978 Hawaiian Open, he went home and spent an entire week practicing his putting, from dawn to dusk, as he said. He went to the Bob Hope Desert Classic the next week and finished fourth, and has been cruising ever since.

Rex started to play the game at age 14. He was convinced that this was his game after a few trips to the club with father. He made the Lompoc (CA) High School team as a sophomore.

After two years at junior college, he earned a golf scholarship to San Fernando Valley State and began to take his game seriously. He had dreams of playing on the PGA TOUR, but it wasn't until after he worked one summer at the Arnold Palmer Golf Academy at Stratton, CT, and then spent two years on the mini-tours that he felt his game was ready.

He entered the 1974 Fall Qualifying School and made it.

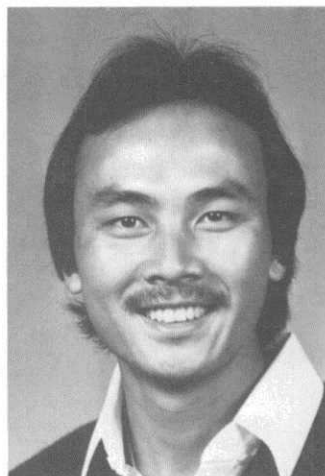
Two of his great victories came in the 1959 and 1966 United States Open Championships, and to help make his record complete, he won the U.S. Seniors' Open in 1983.

One of the great players of all time, Billy won 51 tournaments on the regular TOUR from 1956 through 1975. He played on eight straight Ryder Cup teams and, in 1979, was honored to serve as the Captain of the U.S. team. Twice he has been the Player-of-the-Year.

Arnold Palmer was the first man to pass the \$1 million mark in TOUR earnings, and Billy was the second, reaching the figure in 1970.

There have been few in the game any better than this Hall of Famer.

Tze-Chung Chen was 17-years old when he started to play golf in his native Taiwan, but eight years later, he found himself challenging the finest players in the world.

He gained a certain level of notoriety when he tied for the lead in the 1983 Kemper Open with four other players, only to lose in the playoff to Fred Couples. He gained world-wide attention at the 1985 United States Open championship at Oakland Hills, Michigan.

He equaled the competitive course record with a first-day five-under par 65. He added a 69 for a six-under par 134 and held a one-stroke lead after two rounds. He increased it to two strokes over Andy North after another 69 put him at seven-under par 203.

His dream came to a shattering halt on the fifth hole when he suffered a quadruple-bogey eight (at one point he double hit the ball trying to pitch from deep rough) and then bogeyed the next three. He finished the day with a 77 and finished in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Dave Barr, one stroke behind the new champion, North.

T.C., as he generally is known, finished fifth in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1982 and went on to have a very successful first year in 1983. In fact, the only player who did better from the particular class was Ronnie Black.

The TOUR is very hard," he said, "and a difficult way to make money. For me, travel and transportation was the biggest problem my first year because I had to go pretty much on my own."

His older brother, Tze-Ming Chen, started him in the game, and he still does very well on the Asian/Japan Tours. In the fall of 1983, Tze-Ming won the Dunlop Phoenix tournament in Japan by defeating Tom Watson in a playoff. Tze-Ming qualified for the 1984 World Series of Golf, and during the week at Firestone Country Club, T.C. caddied for his brother.

The Chens lived near a golf course in Taipei, and he said, "everyday, I would watch people play golf, and then I would caddy for my brother."

He progressed so rapidly, that in 1980, he was selected to play on Taiwan's World Amateur Cup team and competition was held in Pinehurst. "I finished second to Hal Sutton," he said proudly.

He turned professional just after that, and played on the Asian Tour for two years, "I thought it would be good for me to come over here and try for the experience," he said. Driving the ball is his strong point. "I'm not very long, but I can hit it straight," he said.

When he needs help he goes to his brother, but it is difficult since he is so far away. "It takes 15 hours from Los Angeles," he pointed out. It will be easier this year since T.M. is also playing on the PGA TOUR.

Few players have come on the PGA TOUR with the fanfare that greeted Bobby Clampett back in the summer of 1980. During the next two years, he proceeded to demonstrate how genuine his credentials really were.

In 1981, he finished second four times, twice losing in playoffs. His first victory came near the end of 1982 in the Southern Open. It seemed likely that his star would shine brightly for many years.

His consistency level slipped in 1983 and 1984. He said, "I probably learned more about golf and my game (in 1984) than during any previous year of my career."

He always has been one of the keenest students of the game. "This past year, I showed some progress over 1984, mostly in ball-striking, and if I can continue with this progress, I should see some real positive signs in the next year or so. I'll continue to work hard at it."

Bobby joined the TOUR in August of 1980. His big check came in the Buick Open, when he won \$7,250 and that, added to his previous winnings, provided more than enough to meet the minimum money guideline of \$8,000 that was needed to become a member without going through the rigors of the Qualifying School.

Bobby started to play golf at age 10, using his father's old clubs. Lee Martin, who was the pro at the Carmel Valley Ranch at the time, gave him his first lessons. "I worked at the club, doing odd jobs," he recalls, "and my pay was playing privileges. Mainly, I picked up range balls."

When he was 13, Ben Doyle assumed duties at the club, and he became Bobby's tutor—and he still is.

He started playing tournament golf at age 11, and the next summer, he made a big decision. "I gave up a chance to be a starting pitcher on a Little League team to concentrate on golf," he recalls.

He was successful in California Junior golf, and in 1976 and 1977, he was the state's leading point getter. In 1977, he won the California State junior title.

He moved on to Brigham Young University, where, for three years, he worked on his golfing skills and his education. "I wanted that balance," he said, "and that is why I chose BYU."

He received an associates degree in French in 1980, and speaks the language fluently.

Since he played in six tournaments in 1980, he was not eligible for rookie-of-the-year honors in 1981. However, Bobby Clampett is destined to win many other honors in golf before he leaves the tournament trail.

Lennie Clements is another of those fellows who was so determined that he would make it onto the PGA TOUR, that he worked exceptionally hard until he did. And, when he earned his TOUR card in April of 1981, he proved he belonged.

He earned the right to play in the big time the hard way. After failing to make it in the TOUR school, he made it via the Open Qualifying, finally meeting the minimum money guideline in his 10th and final chance at the Magnolia Classic. He won \$3,150 there after a tie for fifth, and became a member the next week at the Tallahassee Open.

This past year turned out to be his finest in several different areas. He not only won more money than ever, but he was pleased with his consistency. He made a higher percentage of cuts and added, "I know I had more rounds in the 60s. Several weeks, one bad round would cost me a higher finish."

He had two strong finishes in 1982 on two of the toughest courses on TOUR. He tied for fourth in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open after making five straight birdies in the last round en route to a closing 66 at the Riviera Country Club.

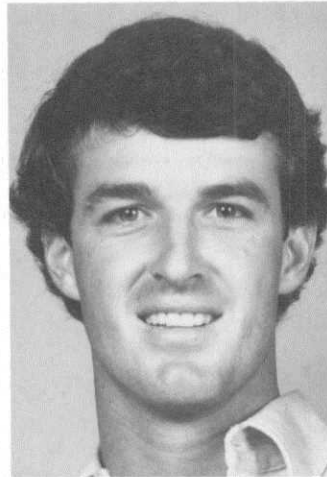
He tied for fifth place in the Colonial National Invitation. He was informed on the Tuesday morning of the tournament that he was in the field and he proceeded to shoot 66-69 at the Colonial Country Club to take the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Tom Kite.

It is safe to say Russ Cochran is the finest lefthanded golfer on the PGA TOUR and probably is the best since Bob Charles of New Zealand was winning TOUR events in the 60's and early 70's.

The Tournament Players Series in 1983 gave him the break he needed for 1984, and he certainly made the most of his opportunity. He won \$133,342 with a tie for second place in the B.C. Open his best.

"The Magnolia Classic (opposite the Masters Tournament) was the first of the Tournament Players Series. I wanted to go there to see how I would do, but if I didn't do well, I would have to go home and try to find a sponsor for the rest of the year. I was hoping to get a sponsor's exemption at Magnolia, and I did."

The result was a victory and a check for \$27,000, setting him up for the rest of the year.

He only won \$7,968 in 18 regular TOUR events, but he added another victory in the Greater Baltimore Open on the TPS circuit and won \$100,863 in eight starts. He was the leading money winner and thus gained exempt status on the regular TOUR for 1984.

This past season was a little bit disappointing to Russ as he made most of his money in three events — a T3 at Memphis, a T4 at Houston and a T8 at the Byron Nelson.

"I made the bulk of my money in three events and didn't do much the rest of the year," said Cochran. "I wasn't healthy enough to be as consistent as I was in 1984, but I'm excited about my new son (Russell L. Reed) and I'm looking forward to getting back on track this year."

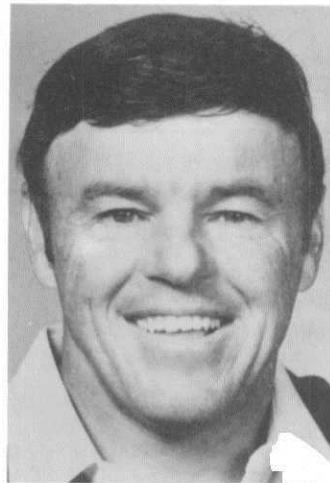
Russ started in golf when he was about 10-years-old. He used to go to a neighboring course with his older brother. A couple of years later, when he won a state age-group tournament, he truly was hooked. He played junior golf in the area and then through high school, winning the state scholastic title in 1975. He went to the University of Kentucky and played for three more years.

"I had friends who were playing the mini-tours, so I decided to give it a try," he recalls. "I went to the TOUR school but didn't make it until my third try in the Fall of 1982."

Oh, yes, he does play lefthanded. "When I was younger, I used ladies' clubs because they were the only lefthanded ones I could find. Several people told me I should switch around and try to play right-handed, but no one made a real effort to change me, so I stayed with it. I do everything left-handed, anyway."

Including, as it turned out, accepting healthy checks on the PGA TOUR.

Jim Colbert set a couple of goals when 1983 started and for a fellow heading for his 42nd birthday and 18th year on the PGA TOUR, they seemed rather lofty. He wanted to win at least two tournaments during the year and also \$200,000.

"They were not pipe dreams," he said, even though he had never accomplished either one during his career. He even went so far as to promise his secretary that if he achieved them, he would give her an all-expense paid vacation to Hawaii.

Well, she got her trip because Jim did have the greatest year of his life, winning the Colonial National Invitation after a playoff with Fuzzy Zoeller, and then the Texas Open in San Antonio. He also raked in \$223,810.

He knew that sooner or later he would win in San Antonio. It has a special place in his heart. It was there in 1966 that he won his first check as a member of the TOUR, and it was there in the 1982 Texas Open that he went over the \$1 million mark in career earnings.

He went over the \$100,000 mark for the fourth time in his career in 1984 but he slipped just under the mark in 1985. He said of last year, "It was a good year for our golf course business (in Las Vegas) but not so good for my golf game. I just didn't devote enough time to it."

Jim was an all-state football player in Kansas and went to Kansas State University on a scholarship, but he switched to golf full-time when he lost his desire for combat after his freshman year.

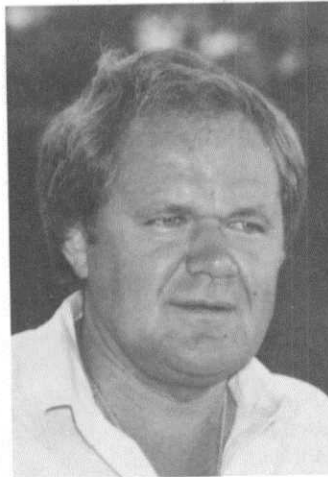
He won the Kansas State junior golf title at age 11, so he knew at an early age he could play this game, too. He was second in the 1964 NCAA tournament and won the 1965 Kansas Amateur. That fall, he went to the TOUR's Qualifying School and made it.

The first victory was a long time coming, in the 1969 Monsanto Open in Pensacola. His most memorable victory might have been in the 1974 American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club in Akron. He had to defeat Raymond Floyd, Gay Brewer and Forrest Fezler in the playoff.

The next few years, Jim suffered with knee and back problems, but he continued to work hard at his game, grinding out whatever he could. His perseverance finally paid off in 1979 and he has been playing well since.

He has served four terms as a member of the TOUR's Policy Board as a Player Director. His first term was in 1974-to-1976, and he was re-elected to his last term in the Fall of 1983.

There are only two men in sports who can claim they have played in United States Open Championships in golf and tennis. Frank Conner is one of them and Ellsworth Vines is the other. While Frank started to play tennis as a 10-year old in Belleville, IL, he didn't begin to swing the clubs until 1970, when he was 24 years old.

"When I decided to switch to golf," he says, "I did so with the intention of being a professional. I felt I wasn't going anywhere in tennis, beyond what I had already done."

As a sophomore and junior at Trinity University, he was an All-American choice in tennis. He won the National Junior tennis title at age 17 and played in three Opens at Forest Hills.

During the transition period, he would teach tennis at Northern Hills Country Club in San Antonio five days a week, and play the mini-tour golf series that was in San Antonio the other two. When that series was completed, he moved on to the mini-tours in Phoenix area, and was quite successful.

"I knew then that I could earn money playing golf, but not that much playing tennis," he admits.

Four times he attempted to earn his TOUR card, but missed in the Qualifying Schools. Finally, in the Fall of 1974, he made it. In recent years, he has played numerous practice rounds with Lee Trevino, and says, "That has helped me tremendously, just watching how he plays the game and thinks his way around a course."

Frank has had his good moments on the TOUR, such as finishing in a tie for second in the 1979 New Orleans Open, one behind Hubert Green. He led the 1980 IVB-Philadelphia Classic after three rounds, but Doug Tewell came on strong to win.

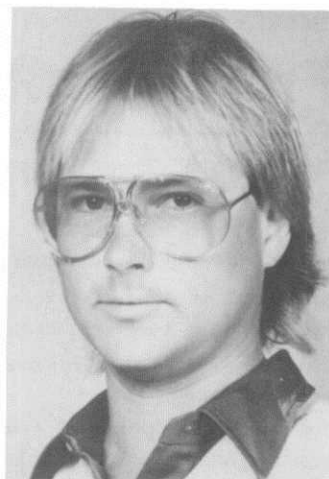
In 1981, he tied with four others in the Quad Cities Open but Canadian Dave Barr won the playoff. He played the strong courses well, as he tied for sixth in the U.S. Open at Merion, was sixth alone in the Colonial National Invitation and tied for eighth in the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass.

He made another strong bid for victory in the 1982 Sea Pines Heritage Classic. He led by one after three rounds, but Tom Watson caught him the last afternoon and then won on the third extra hole of the playoff. Actually, Watson was in the lead until Frank holed a 30 footer for birdie at the par three 17th.

He had a chance to win it on the second extra hole, but missed a 12 footer for birdie, and then on the third extra hole (the 18th on the course), his two iron approach slid left of the green and he suffered a bogey.

He called last year "an average one," but he did start to work with noted teacher Peter Kostis. "I feel confident that his help will let me improve: let me become a better all-around player."

Everyone loves to see a young man rewarded for hard work, so it was especially pleasing to see John Cook enjoy a great year such as he experienced in 1983. As they say, nice things happen to nice people.

John was injured a good part of 1982, and unfortunately, he was below par physically in 1984, too. The results on the TOUR reflect it. He took some time off in the spring when a new addition to the family came along, and then he re-injured an elbow in mid-summer and was off the TOUR for more than a month.

Last year was not a good one financially on TOUR, but he said, "I learned more about my game and learned how to relax more. I'm becoming a better player mentally, too, and believe I'm on the verge of playing very well."

In 1983 when he earned \$216,868, he won the Canadian Open in a stirring six-hole playoff over Johnny Miller and accumulated seven top ten finishes. The one that got away, though, left a scar for awhile.

Hal Sutton was in the scoring tent behind the 18th green after his final round of the Tournament Players Championship with a five-under par 283. John was on the 18th tee, needing a par four to tie. Unfortunately, he hooked his tee shot into the water at the Players' Club, suffered a double bogey and tied for third place.

In 1982 John suffered an injury to his left wrist and elbow at the Honda-Inverrary Classic, but instead of taking the necessary time to recover, he continued to play, this aggravating the situation.

One of his best-ever efforts on TOUR came in the 1981 Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, when he was tied with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. John finally won the title on the third extra hole, ousting Irwin. Crenshaw, Clampett and Thompson were eliminated on the first extra hole. Due to heavy rains, it was a 54-hole tournament.

He has always known of the thrill of victory. He tasted it early when in 1974 he defeated Gary Hallberg for the World Junior crown. John's biggest title came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur Championship. The next year, he lost in the final to Mark O'Meara.

At Ohio State University, he was an All-American choice three years, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. That same year, he represented the United States in the World Amateur Cup team. In December of 1983, he was on the U.S. World Cup team with Rex Caldwell and they combined to win the team championship.

John started to play golf at an early age, and while his parents encouraged him, they didn't push. He played high school basketball and some football.

Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf convinced him he should go to Ohio State, even though his school years were spent in southern California. Years ago, his father had coached in Ohio, and also worked for Firestone Tire & Rubber Company in Akron.

John earned his player's card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979. For most of his golfing career, Ken Venturi has been his primary tutor.

There are few young players in the game with the potential for greatness that is possessed by Fred Couples. During his years on the TOUR, he continually displayed an ability to rise to the occasion, especially on the more difficult courses.

It was never more clearly demonstrated than in the 1984 Tournament Players Championship on the Tournament Players Club course where every shot must be precise.

Fred took the lead the second day with a brilliant record-tying eight-under par 64 and he stayed in front the rest of the way. He had to fight off the challenges of the game's finest players to get the victory. Seve Ballesteros and Tom Watson were chasing him after the third round and the final margin was only one stroke over Lee Trevino.

"Winning here was something I never thought would happen," he said modestly. "My biggest accomplishment was beating the course."

Last year, he didn't win but a big disappointment came in the Honda Classic. He was tied with Curtis Strange for the third-round lead and then shot a closing 78 to tie for fourth. "Bad last days cost me a couple of chances to win," he said.

Fred's first victory came the hard way in the Kemper Open on the demanding Congressional Country Club course. He had to defeat Gil Morgan, Scott Simpson, Barry Jaeckel and Tze-Chung Chen in a playoff. On the second extra hole, the 211-yard 16th, he hit a splendid five-iron shot within two feet of the hole and he made it for his victory. "I felt like crying," he said. "I've never hit a shot that amounted to so much."

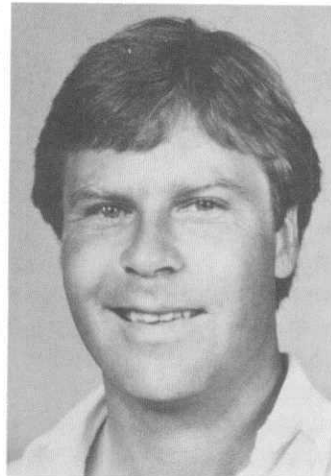
Fred has worked with former Masters champion Gay Brewer in recent years, and although bothered by a bad back at times, he has learned to harness his immense power off the tee and thus become a more consistent player.

He convinced a lot of people at the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa that his future is very bright indeed. Fred shot a closing four-under par 66 to gain a tie for third place, but during the first round, he really had eyes popping. He birdied the last six holes for a championship record score of 29.

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. Within a few years, he was competing in junior events in the Seattle area, and then, in high school, came the big decision, one forced because the golf and baseball seasons overlapped.

At the University of Houston, Couples became a standout, earning All-American honors in 1978 and 1979. After a somewhat disappointing junior season, when Fred finished a solid eighth individually in the NCAA Championship but watched as his Cougar team missed the cut, he decided to drop out of school and tackle the TOUR a year early.

As Ben Crenshaw thought about what he had accomplished in winning the Masters Tournament in the Spring of 1984, he said slowly, "It's a sweet, sweet thing. I don't think there ever will be anything sweeter for me."

His victory at the Augusta National Golf Club was one of the more popular of the year—or any year—for there probably is not a player in the game who is more loved by his colleagues.

Ben's 67 gave him the first-round lead over Lee Trevino by one stroke, but he slipped back the next two days. He was four-strokes behind Mark Lye after two days and two-strokes behind Tom Kite after the third.

Through the final round, he shot a four-under par 68 and won by two over Tom Watson with an 11-under par 277. "Ben deserved it," Watson said later. "He's been in the hunt in a lot of major championships. This is his first, and I know what it must mean to him."

He went on to have a very good year, his second straight prosperous year, but it was a totally different story in 1985. He struggled through the poorest season of his 13-year TOUR career.

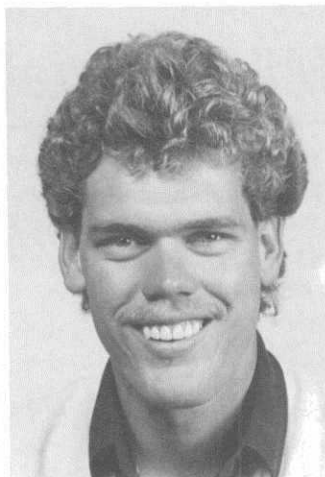
Rather than getting into details, he said with a grin, "just say it was a lean year, but I did play a lot better towards the end of the year."

His most profitable year on TOUR was in 1983 when he won the Byron Nelson Classic and was a standout performer in the Ryder Cup matches against the Great Britain-European team. Incidentally, he also finished second in the Masters Tournament to Seve Ballesteros.

He joined the TOUR in the Fall of 1973 after compiling an excellent amateur record. He won the NCAA Championship three straight years for the University of Texas, although he shared it in 1974 with team-mate Tom Kite.

Ben earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1973, gaining medalist honors by an incredible 12 strokes over runner-up Gil Morgan. In his first start, the San Antonio-Texas Open, he won by two over Orville Moody. The next event was the 144-hole \$500,000 World Open at Pinehurst, and he finished second to Miller Barber.

Jay Delsing had a day to remember in the second round of the 1985 B. C. Open. He played a near flawless round as he matched the En Joie Golf Club tournament record with a nine-under par 62. He equaled the mark established by Fuzzy Zoeller in the 1982 tournament.

"I finally had the hole get in the way most of the day," the lanky former UCLA standout said. "I had almost the identical putts yesterday in the first round when I shot a 73, but they didn't go in. It's a crazy game."

It was Delsing's first year on the PGA TOUR and he made the most of it. He went on to tie for seventh place in the B. C. Open and he also had a tie for ninth place in the Hawaiian Open, his second start of the year. Those two events served as the springboard to a 125th place finish on the money list with \$46,480.

He was born into a sports atmosphere. His father, Jim Delsing, played for many years as an outfielder in the major leagues with such teams as the Yankees, White Sox, Tigers, St. Louis Browns and Kansas City As.

"I love baseball probably more than golf," Jay said, "but I took up golf when I was about 14 because I wanted something I could do myself."

During his days at St. Louis University High School in St. Louis, the 6' 5½" Delsing was an outstanding basketball player, but UCLA recruited him for his golf and not basketball. With the Bruins, he was a teammate of Corey Pavin and Steve Pate.

After earning his degree in economics, he played the mini-tours for a year to gain more experience. Then he tried the TOUR's Qualifying School in 1984. He finished 24th and was on his way.

He missed the cut in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, his first start. The next week, he finished with a six-under par 66 and tied for ninth in the Hawaiian Open, earning \$13,000.

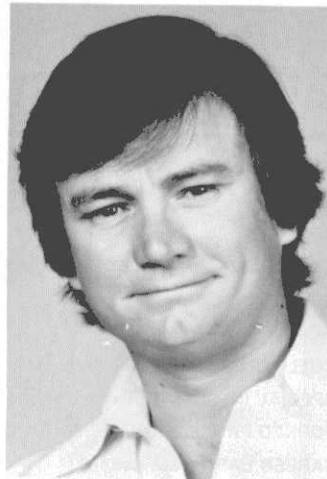
He displayed considerable talent as the year progressed, but it took the 62 at the B. C. to put his name in the headlines. He had nine birdies and only twice did he miss greens. On both occasions, excellent pitches helped him save his pars. "I once shot 61 when I was in high school," he said, "but this is my best in competition."

Going into the week, he said he made up his mind, "to go out and play and have some fun. I've been putting too much pressure on myself. My style always has been aggressive, but I've backed away from it too often this year."

Incidentally, Jay never had the pleasure of watching his dad in the major leagues. He was the fourth of five children and Jimmy had put his spikes away by the time Jay was old enough to know what was going on. "I did see him play in an old-timers game, though, and that was special."

Last Fall, Jay was married to Kathy Lyons, his UCLA sweetheart.

If you are looking for a good example of what perseverance can do for you, you need look no further than to Mike Donald.

He has had to work hard in order to move up the ladder on the PGA TOUR—harder than most people, but in 1984, he was able to enjoy some of the game's rewards.

For the first time in his career, he earned well over \$100,000. "It was a good step upward," he said. "The only thing better would be to win a tournament. I've become more patient with myself and my game. I'm not forcing things to happen."

He has been working with Gardner Dickinson since 1980, refining the swing.

Twice in 1984 he finished third—in the Kemper Open and the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic—so he knows the feeling of challenging. Then, in December, he joined with Vicki Alvarez of the LPGA to win the J.C. Penney Mixed Team Classic.

Last year, he struggled early on but some consistency returned to his game in the latter half of the year. "I can't pinpoint what happened," he said. "When I hit the ball well, my putting was off."

When Mike was in the ninth grade, he gave up baseball to concentrate on golf. It was a good move. He went on to Broward Community College and won the National Junior College championship. It earned him a Chris Schenkel scholarship to Georgia Southern College.

In his first tournament at Georgia Southern, he finished fifth, not bad at all when you consider the players who were 1-2 respectively were Jay Haas of Wake Forest and Chip Beck of Georgia. His parade didn't last long though, because "I had a conflict with the coach and they took my scholarship away."

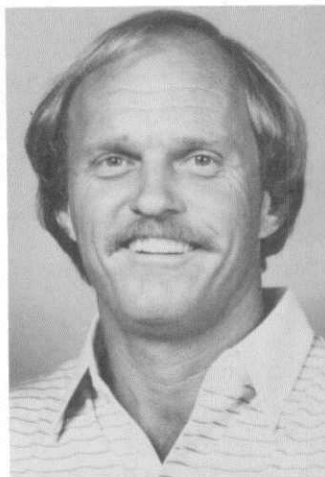
So Mike headed for home. "I didn't have any money, so I delivered flowers and umpired baseball games for a year." Georgia Southern brought in a new coach the next year and Mike was back in school. Before he returned though, Mike was impressive again as he went to the finals of the 1978 North and South Amateur before losing to Gary Hallberg.

His first attempt at the TOUR Qualifying School was in the Spring of 1979 but he didn't make it. Determined as always, he went back in the Fall of that year and passed with flying colors.

Mike started in the game at age 12. "My parents bought me a set of clubs because they didn't know what else to buy me. I loved to play baseball and I had everything I needed for that sport. They just wanted to get me something different and, even though they didn't play golf, they thought it would be a good sport for me."

And, as is usually the case, Mom and Dad were right.

Bob Eastwood found it difficult to sum up his performances in 1984. So, he simply said, "Incredible. I knew I was capable of winning. It was just a matter of time for me to get everything together." "Time" turned out to be in his 13th year as an active player, and he not only broke through with his first victory, but he won his second as well.

"A lot of players have told me I have a good swing," he said. "I wasn't a super-star when I came out on TOUR. I'm still learning."

Last year, he added the Byron Nelson Classic to his list of victories but it came in an unexpected fashion. He trailed Payne Stewart but Payne double bogeyed the final hole at the Las Colinas Sports Club and Bob suddenly found himself in a playoff. He won it with a bogey on the first extra hole.

He had increased his winnings each season for eight straight years until he slipped a little last year, but he says, "I'm just getting better with age. Physically, I'm in good shape and each year I seem to think a little better on the course. I know I'm striking the ball better and understand my swing better."

His first victory was in the 1984 USF&G Classic in New Orleans and then he won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He also tied for third in the World Series of Golf that year and said it was a "most satisfying" effort.

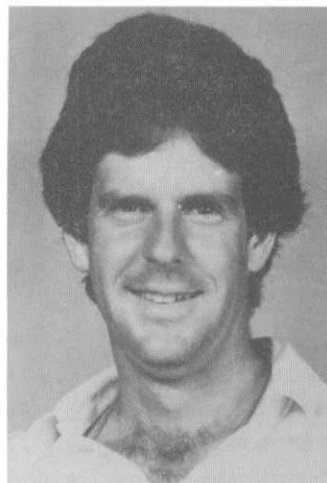
He was four years old when he started to play golf. His father was in the golf business in Stockton, CA., and helped to build the Dry Creek Ranch golf club in the 1960s. It was a family affair.

His skills surfaced early, as he won city amateur titles in Stockton and Sacramento. He won the 1966 California State Amateur and while at San Jose State, he won the West Coast Athletic Conference title.

Bob headed for the TOUR Qualifying school in the Spring of 1969 and he not only made it through, but he was the medalist. His life on the TOUR had to wait awhile, though. In October of that year, he went into the Army and was not discharged until October of 1971. So, he really didn't join the TOUR full-time until 1972.

Several people have helped him along the way, such as Bob Warner in junior golf, Tom LoPresti during his college and early days on TOUR; but in recent years, Butch Baird has been his guiding hand on the practice tee.

Danny Edwards has been able to enjoy the best of two worlds in recent years, competing primarily on the PGA TOUR, but also sitting behind the wheel of one of his racing cars.

He will tell you that golf is his profession, while racing is more of an avocation. In his life, he knows one compliments the other. He had been racing approximately 12 weekends a year in Formula Fords, and then switched to endurance races.

After enjoying good years in 1982 and 1983—winning a tournament plus more than \$100,000 each season—he had a disappointing year in 1984. "It wasn't much fun," he said. "I put a lot of work into my game and didn't get the results."

He did get the results last year and it turned out to be a profitable one. "I was back in contention several times and in position to win," he said. "I made some improvements in my golf swing and hit the ball a lot better. Now, I'm devoting more of my time to the TOUR and my corporate golf schools and a little less on racing."

It was after a mediocre year in 1981 that Danny developed a "more relaxed" attitude to the game, and the results were almost immediate, winning the Greater Greensboro Open in 1982. The next year, he won the Miller High Life-QCO in a playoff over Morris Hatafsky.

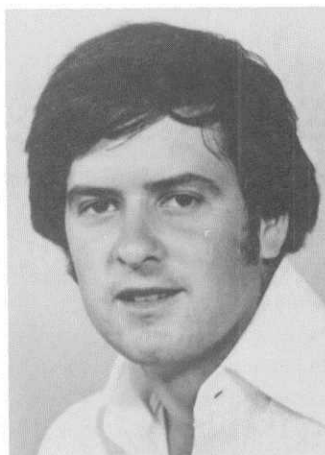
After a splendid amateur career, Danny joined the TOUR for the start of 1975. His first victory came in the 1977 Greater Greensboro Open by four strokes over George Burns and Larry Nelson. In 1980, he joined with brother David and they won the Walt Disney World National Team Play title.

Danny was 14 when he started to play golf and he knew at an early age that golf would be his game. He went on to Oklahoma State University and won the 1972 and 1973 Big Eight championships. In 1973, he was named to Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team.

He turned professional in 1973 and played on the world circuit for a year. He went to the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall of that year and made it.

During his years on TOUR, brother David has been his biggest booster and helper. "David knows my game better than anyone," Danny says. "We don't work together as much as we used to, but when one of us does have a problem, we talk it over."

It was a strange but rather pleasant experience in 1984 for David Edwards, one he had never encountered in his golf career. "I surpassed so many of the goals I had set for myself by the end of May, that I didn't know what to do."

What he did, was take most of the rest of the year off. After the Memorial Tournament the last weekend in May, he only played in three official PGA TOUR events the rest of the year. "It was by far my best year," he said. "After I had the good year in 1983, I wanted to build on it and keep improving. I did what I wanted to do in 1984 and more."

David's biggest week of 1984 came in the Los Angeles Open on the famed Riviera Country Club course. He shot a magnificent final-round seven-under par 64 to win by three over Jack Renner.

"Riviera always has been one of my favorite courses, and because of that, the Los Angeles Open always has been my No. 1 choice. So, to win there was something very special to me."

The victory put him in the Masters Tournament for the first time and the experience was all he expected it to be—and more. A final-round 67 boosted him into a tie for third place.

"I had some very good final rounds," he pointed out, such as the 65 at the Byron Nelson to give him a second-place finish; and a 66 in the Tournament Players Championship. "They were the key to my successes," he said.

Last year was one for him to forget. It was, by far, his poorest. "I drove the ball well," he said, "but that was the sum total of my game. Nothing else seemed to work."

David enjoys telling people how he got started in the game. "I was about 12-years old," he said, "and I played because my brother Danny (who is five years older) played. That's all there was to it. All I did when I was growing up was tag along. I did whatever he did. He was the one who talked me into getting a set of clubs."

In the fall of 1980, they carried their brother relationship to the ultimate, winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship.

David has enjoyed his share of success during his career, but he said it hasn't been easy. "At every level, from juniors, through high school, then college and now on the TOUR, I have had to start at the bottom and work my way up. I haven't been any instant success."

He always found that success, though. He won the Oklahoma State Junior title in 1973, and won the National Collegiate championship for Oklahoma State in 1978, and twice was named to the collegiate All-America team.

While Danny has been his biggest booster and helper through the years, David also gave credit to Art Proctor, the head professional at the municipal course in Edmond for getting him started properly. He worked for Proctor during his high school years.

It didn't take a ton of bricks to fall on his head, but it did take a life-threatening rockfall to convince Brad Fabel that life as a professional golfer wasn't so bad.

After a standout high school career in Kentucky, Fabel enrolled at the University of Houston to play golf. One season later, though, Fabel had transferred out to Brevard JC in Florida where he stayed for another year.

He then returned home to Kentucky "burned out on golf" and went to work in the coal mines of his native state. He quit playing altogether for three years before a mining accident changed his mind about the game.

"I just about got killed in a rockfall and I never went back down into the mines again," recalled Fabel. "After that, those four footers didn't look so bad."

Fabel then enrolled at Western Kentucky University and resumed playing golf with an eye on joining the PGA TOUR eventually.

"I didn't intend to be out here until now," Fabel said last fall. "I was patient, I thought it would take me about three years to get out on TOUR."

He finished in a T8 at the Fall 1984 Qualifying Tournament and immediately enjoyed success on the West Coast swing picking up a check in four of his first five outings including a T11 at the Phoenix Open that was worth \$10,350 to him.

After another T11 at the Honda Classic, Fabel went into a slump that saw him miss the cut in 11 of his next 13 outings. However, he regained his stride at the Lite Quad Cities Open when his scores of 69-67-68-65—269 were good for a T3 and a check of \$17,400.

"Once I finished third at the Quad Cities Open and made over \$17,000, I figured that I was safe and would keep my card for 1986," said Fabel.

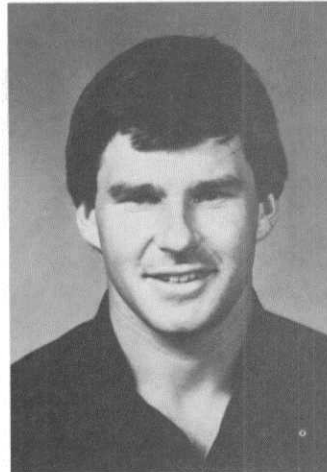
Fabel then went on to post a couple more strong finishes down the stretch including another T3, this one at the Greater Milwaukee Open and finished his rookie season with \$74,425, 100th on the Official Money List.

"My first year was a struggle," Fabel related. "I played well early and late, but I had a frustrating dry spell in the middle."

"I was just happy to survive my rookie year and I'm looking forward to coming out swinging the next time around," he added.

It figured that he would make it, though. Anyone who can survive a rockfall in the coal mines can surely survive his rookie year on the PGA TOUR.

Nick Faldo knew he had the game to win on the PGA TOUR. It simply was a case of putting the good rounds together and he certainly did that in the 1984 Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

The lanky Englishman took the lead the second day on the precise Harbour Town Golf Links and went on to win by two strokes over Tom Watson. Nick shot all four rounds in the 60s and his 14-under par 270 equaled the tournament record.

Although he has been one of the stars on the European Tour for several years, he may never experience a year quite like 1983. After playing in 11 tournaments on the PGA TOUR and winning \$32,652, he headed for home with the intention of competing in a few events and then returning to the United States.

So, what did he do? He won three straight events, starting with the French Open. "That changed my plans," he said. "I realized I now had a chance to be Europe's No. 1 player, so I stayed."

He went on to win two more tournaments, finished second in two and third in three others. In 16 tournaments, he had 11 top 10 finishes and compiled an astonishing stroke average of 69.03. He easily finished as the leading money winner with nearly \$180,000.

He then came back to the United States and starred on the European Ryder Cup team that nearly pulled an upset. At that point, he found himself 126th on the money list, \$631 behind the man in 125th place. He entered the Walt Disney World Classic, knowing he needed a good finish to retain his exempt status on the PGA TOUR.

After a first-round 72, he followed with a seven-under par 65 and went on to tie with Mark McCumber for second place, two strokes behind Payne Stewart.

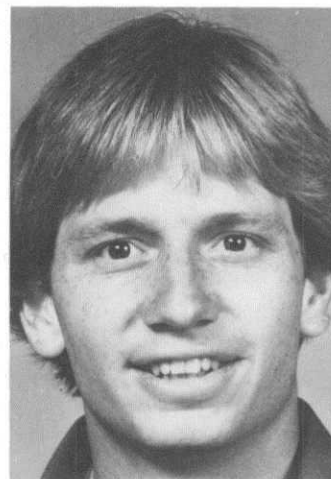
He said late in the year, "I never would have had the year in Europe that I had without the experience I gained in the States. My play has improved so much just by playing here."

Nick has been one of the better players on the European Tour almost from the start. He was the Rookie-of-the-Year in 1977, and has won the PGA Championship three times. He won it in 1978 at Royal Birkdale. He won it again at Royal St. George's in 1980 and followed with another victory in 1981 at Ganton.

Although he had played the TOUR on a few special occasions, it wasn't until the start of 1981 that he decided to give it a try. By the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open, where he tied for ninth, he easily passed the minimum money guideline for membership. He officially became a member the next week at the Bay Hill Classic.

He has been a fine player in Ryder Cup competition. The former English Amateur champion was unbeaten in singles competition, having defeated Tom Watson, Lee Elder, Johnny Miller and Jay Haas in his first four matches, but this past year, he lost to Hubert Green.

When Brad Faxon was enjoying a very successful season during his final year at Furman University, he started to think about the game of golf as a career. "It wasn't until then," he said, "that I realized I was good enough to play on the TOUR."

There wasn't any doubt in the minds of those who followed him through his young career that he was good enough. Brad has enjoyed success at all levels of the game.

Three times he won the Rhode Island State Junior championship. Twice he won the Rhode Island State Amateur and on two other occasions, in 1980 and 1981, he won the New England Amateur titles.

He won 11 times during his collegiate days, and in 1983, won three of the finest awards given to college golfers, the Fred Haskins, Golf Magazine and the NCAA Coaches award as the Player-of-the-Year. He also was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team that year.

During those later years, he had a taste of TOUR competition. He played in three U.S. Opens, and in 1983 at Oakmont, was the low amateur.

At one time, Brad's grandfather owned a golf course on Cape Cod, and that's where his father, a scratch golfer, learned to play. "I was about five-or-six years old when Dad started me," Brad said, "and I played in my first tournament when I was 13. The next year, I won the Rhode Island State Juniors for the first time."

It was with that sort of background that Brad launched his PGA TOUR career in the Fall of 1983. He entered the Qualifying School and had little trouble making the grade.

He quickly established himself as a solid performer when he survived the cut in his first seven tournaments. He will tell you though, "I didn't play as well through most of the year as I know I can."

He says the past two years have been "part of the learning experience," and, although he enjoyed more success in his first year, he believes he learned things in 1985 that will benefit him in the years to come.

David Leadbeater of Grenelefe, FL, has been his primary teacher for the last couple of years and the results of their work together have been gratifying.

"When I was in college," he said, "I had an erratic swing. I could have a bad round and still win. That's not possible out here. David and I have been working on refining the swing, making it as simple as we can."

In the Summer of 1984, he visited with Dr. Bob Rotella, the noted sports psychologist. "I had heard of Dr. Rotella when I was in college," Brad said, "and I've always been interested in sports psychology. He has helped me with the mental aspects of the game."

Shortly after their first conference, Brad tied for sixth in the Greater Milwaukee Open and later in the year, had a tie for third in the Walt Disney World Classic. While 1985 may not have been as productive as he had hoped it would be, he was able to retain his exempt status.

Brad said his natural shot "probably is a draw," but has the ability to play the ball both ways, depending on the circumstances.

Keith Fergus has clearly demonstrated that when his game is right, he can play with anyone on any type of course. He will be the first to tell you, though, that he has a tendency to become a little lackadaisical.

He said that's "probably what happened" after he won the 1983 Bob Hope Classic in a playoff over Rex Caldwell. "I still worked hard on my game the rest of the year," he said, "but I probably lost a little aggressiveness."

After having his best year moneywise in 1983, he was looking forward to a profitable 1984. Yet, it turned out to be the first time since 1979 that he did not win at least \$100,000.

"When the year started," he explained, "I didn't have a method in my mind. I usually start well and I assumed I would again, but I didn't."

He finished strong at the end of 1984, however, and it carried over into a profitable 1985 when he went over the \$100,000 mark for the fifth time in the last six years. Grinning, he said, "it was a nice, smooth year."

Keith started on TOUR in 1977 but his first victory did not come until May of 1981 when he won the Memorial Tournament on the demanding Muirfield Village course in Ohio.

"I wondered what it would feel like to win," he said moments after the victory, "and often wondered if it really was worth the effort. Now, I can tell you it is worth it."

Keith, an All-American choice at the University of Houston for three years, had gone 4½ years without tasting victory, and "I've always believed winning is what sports is all about. You have to forget about the money, because if you win and play well, the money will be there."

In 1982, facing the pressure of having to battle Raymond Floyd in a playoff at the rain-interrupted Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, Keith won again on the first extra hole with a birdie. He posted six-under par 66s in the first and third round.

Keith started to play golf at age eight. "My Dad played a lot," he recalls, "and I would go out and caddy for him." He says his father and Lee Williams, the head pro at Killeen Municipal Course, helped him with his game through the early stages.

He played football and basketball through the first couple of years in high school, "but I started to concentrate on golf after that." He said he realized he enjoyed practicing golf more than he did practicing the other sports.

He won the Texas State Junior championship in 1971 and was runner-up in the state high school tournament the following year. In the summer of 1975, he lost to Fred Ridley in the final of the United States Amateur.

He believes the strongest part of his game is his driving. "I found out a long time ago that it is easier to make par or birdie from the middle of the fairway than it is from the trees." Generally, he prefers to draw the ball, although he can work it both ways.

Ed Fiori returned to the leader boards last year after struggling through the season of 1984. He played very well early in the year, with four top 10 finishes in five starts on the West Coast. He injured his back at the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic and his game wasn't quite as sharp the rest of the way, but he did prove that the previous year was something of a "fluke."

Those who know him well, knew he would rebound since he is one of the toughest battlers on the TOUR.

During his years on the PGA TOUR, he has demonstrated an ability to win. His first victory came in the 1979 Southern Open when he defeated Tom Weiskopf in a playoff. Two years later, he won the Western Open by four strokes. He started the week with a 74, but fought back with rounds of 67, 69 and 67 on the difficult Butler National course.

He was at his finest in the 1982 Bob Hope Classic. He played brilliantly with rounds of 70, 65, 66, 67 and 67 to tie Tom Kite and then won the title in a playoff.

In 1984, for reasons even he can't explain, he never was a serious challenger. Although it was a non-Tour event, he did find one ray of sunshine in Vail, CO, when he won \$20,000 in the annual Jerry Ford Invitational.

His game started to improve once he returned to the TOUR. He commented, "It's been a lack of confidence. I've been driving it poorly and at the wrong time."

The stocky Fiori started in the game at the age seven. "We lived next to a course in Downey, CA and I used to sneak through the strands of barbed wire to play. About twice a week, they would catch me and my pal and chase us off. A neighbor had given me a few clubs to use."

After high school, Ed started to work at odd jobs around southern California, mainly in construction work. He also found enough time to play considerable golf, "wherever I could find a game."

One of those golf excursions took him to a tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico. He birdied the last four holes to get into a playoff with Craig Stadler and Jack Renner. Stadler won the playoff, but a University of Houston alumnus was there and was impressed. He recommended him to the Cougars.

"I had been out of high school for four years, so I went to Wharton Junior College for a semester, sat out a semester and then transferred to Houston."

His second year, the Cougars won the NCAA team title, and Ed was named to the All-American team. "Until then, I had not thought much about joining the PGA TOUR, but that was all the guys on the team talked about... getting on the TOUR."

He dropped out of Houston in the spring of 1977, played in a few mini-Tour events and then headed for the Q-School.

Raymond Floyd surely will be remembered as one of the most remarkable players in the history of the PGA TOUR. Just when people begin to wonder if his clubs are starting to cool, he responds by playing brilliantly.

Toward the end of the 1970s, there were indications that maybe, just maybe, he was nearing the end of his career. Instead, he came back with years that made him the envy of the TOUR. He won well over \$350,000 in 1981 and 1982 and a total of six tournaments.

Another slide started to set in, but Raymond returned last year with the second most-profitable season of his astonishing career. He won \$378,989. He won the Houston Open and lost in a playoff in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic. He also finished second in the Masters Tournament.

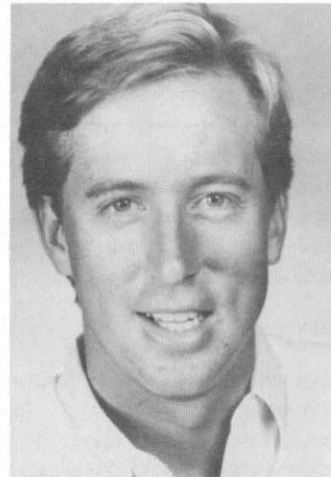
Even though he did not win in 1983, he teed it up in 22 tournaments and made the cut in them all, for one of the best consistency marks on TOUR. At the beginning of 1984, he switched to lightweight clubs, and says that was a mistake. "I didn't perform up to my capabilities early in the year, and I'm sure it was because of that," he said.

His victory in the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa was extremely impressive. He started with a seven-under par 63 and led all the way. He said of the 63, "without a doubt, it was the best round of golf I've ever played, anywhere in my life."

His second and third round totals of 132 and 200 respectively established PGA Championship records and he was heading for a 72-hole mark until he double bogeyed the last hole for a 272, missing the record by one. "I wasn't concerned about the record at all," he said, "I just wanted the victory."

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, N. C., the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray chose to pursue baseball until he won the National Jaycees golf title in 1960. He turned pro the following year, joined the TOUR in 1963 and won the St. Petersburg Open as a rookie. At age 20 years and six months, he was the fourth youngest ever to win on TOUR.

Dan Forsman knew he had the game to play on the PGA TOUR and after the Lite Quad Cities Open last year, everyone else knew it too.

He was six strokes behind Bob Tway after two rounds, but then shot a superb seven-under par 63 at the Oakwood Country Club the third day and suddenly found himself in the lead by one stroke. A solid 67 the next afternoon let him win by one over Tway.

"It gave me a sense of belonging out here," he said of his first victory. "I have refined my game and I'm better able to eliminate the mistakes. I'm more relaxed."

As he talked of his first year on TOUR in 1983, he said, "It was a tremendous learning experience. You think you have the game when you come out, but you soon realize you need a lot of fine tuning. You have to learn how and when to use every club in your bag, playing a variety of shots."

During his first three years, this young man has shown that he can play this game and figures to be around for a long time. As he once said, "There are a lot of people who believe in me. It's time now for me to believe in me."

Dan started to play golf at age 13, being introduced to the game by his father, an avid golfer. Although he was born in Wisconsin, the family moved to the San Francisco area "When I was about two."

He played his golf at the Los Altos Country Club and started to play in the Northern California junior program, competing against the likes of Bobby Clampett and Joey Rasset.

After high school, where he also played basketball and some football, he headed for Arizona State University. "I wanted to keep playing golf," he said, "and I knew they had a good program there with such players as Tom Purtzer and Howard Twitty on the TOUR."

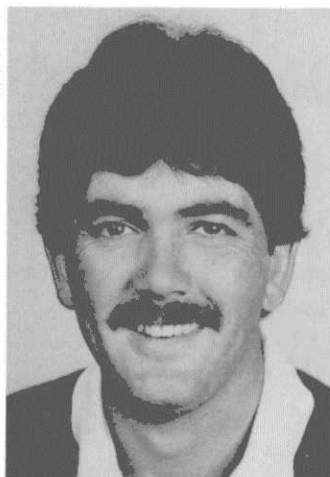

When David Frost joined the PGA TOUR for the start of the 1985 campaign, he wasn't that well known on this side of the pond. It didn't take him long, though, to establish himself as one of the better young players in the game.

In fact, there were only three players who were in their first-full year in 1985 who earned more money than this handsome South African. He came close to getting his first victory in the Houston Open. He was only one-stroke away from the lead after three rounds and even though he shot a closing 69, he still finished one behind Raymond Floyd. It was worth \$44,000.

A few weeks later, he was in position to win the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic. A third-round 64 at the Atlanta Country Club moved him into a third round tie with Danny Edwards. Unfortunately, he shot a closing 74 and dropped back into a tie for fourth place. It was worth another \$22,000, so in those two events, he more than earned enough to gain exempt status for 1986.

David started in the game at age 14. "I would caddy for my Dad," he said. He played in his first South African Amateur when he was 18. At age 20, he won the Western Province match play title in Cape Town as an amateur and in 1980, he still was an amateur when he lost in the final of the South African match play. He also played in the British Amateur that year. Three times he was selected to play on the South African National amateur team.

The trend was being established as he steadily refined his game. He turned professional in 1981. The following year, he ventured to the United States and "I tried to play on the mini-tour, but I didn't do much."

He went back home and in the 1982-83 season, he finished second in the South African Order of Merit. Then he was off to the European tour and he continued to play well. In 1984, he won the Cannes Open in France as he made a 20-footer to save par at the 17th hole and another 20-footer for a birdie to win at the 18th.

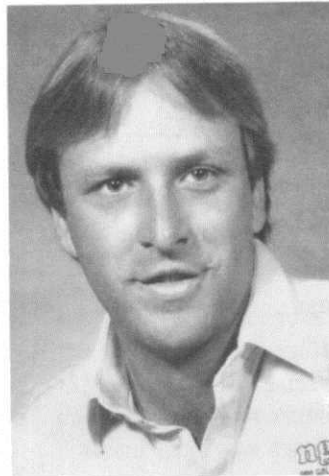
He said he had planned to play for four years in Europe but was successful enough in his first two that he headed for the PGA TOUR Qualifying School in the Fall of 1984. He made it rather easily.

It was the experience he gained in Europe and South Africa that helped him to his strong finish in Houston. He shot 67, 71, 71 and 69. "As a rookie," he said, "the first three-or-four times you're in a position to win, people expect you to hold back a bit, but I have experience equivalent to perhaps three years on this TOUR."

In recent years, he has been working under the eye of David Leadbetter in Florida, joining such others as Denis Watson and Nick Price in his camp. He also points out that "I've always looked up to Gary Player as a man and a player."

It is interesting to note that at age 18, he was "drafted" into national service as a police constable in Cape Town. His duties, however, called for him to be a clerk in the salary department and "play golf with a lot of generals."

When Jim Gallagher Jr., set out on the 1985 Tournament Players Series (TPS) trail, he had one goal in mind—to be the leading money winner and re-gain his exempt status on the PGA TOUR.

After winning the rain-shortened Magnolia Classic in a playoff to start the TPS season, he was well on his way towards achieving that goal. In his next TPS start he was eighth at the Tallahassee Open and then, in his third outing of the year, he rolled home a 25-foot birdie putt on the final hole to win the Charley Pride Golf Fiesta, and he was home free.

He eventually wound up winning \$70,857 on the TPS circuit and the wins on the TPS gave the young man from Indiana a boost heading into this season.

"I want to raise my goals for this year and maybe even win out here," said the personable Gallagher. "The wins on the TPS got me used to winning again and it was a good feeling."

A former star at the University of Tennessee, Gallagher comes from a golfing family and there was little doubt that Jim Jr., would be a golfer.

"My dad has been a club professional for 25 years and he started me at age two," remembered Gallagher. "He didn't always have time to teach me, though, so I learned together with my Mom."

His father is the professional at Meshingomesia CC in Marion, IN, and that's where Jim played most of his early golf.

"I used to sneak out on the course, but my Dad would always catch me," laughed Gallagher. "I wasn't old enough to be out there and he caught me every single time."

Like most youngsters, Gallagher played all sports. However, he was cut from his high school basketball team when he was a sophomore and he decided to cast his lot with golf.

"Getting cut was the best thing that ever happened to me," he said.

After attending Tennessee, Gallagher joined the PGA TOUR and qualified in the Fall of 1983 on his first try. His first year, though, was a bit of a disappointment to him as he finished 148th on the money list earning \$22,249.

"I didn't play a whole lot early in the year, but I finished in the Top 150," said Gallagher of 1984. "It was a good first year, but I was disappointed that I had to go back and play in the Fall (1984) Q-School."

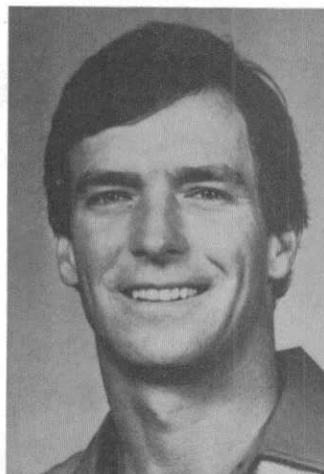
"Losing my card was good for me because it got me hungry again," he said. "I went out on the TPS last year with a goal and accomplished what I wanted."

Playing when he was able to last year on the regular TOUR, Gallagher managed to perform well winning a total of \$19,061. He was the first round co-leader at the Canadian Open along with Greg Norman before falling back.

"It was a good year overall and I'm looking forward to this year," said Gallagher. "It will be a heck of a lot easier to be able to make out a schedule in advance."

Now that the young man from Indiana has tasted the winners circle in the professional ranks, he may be around for a long time to come.

The golfing career of Buddy Gardner continues on the upward swing as he has been able to put together two very good years. Those who know him well are delighted because they know he has had to overcome numerous obstacles to reach his present level of success.

In 1984, for example, he won more money than he had won in the previous four campaigns combined. The high point was a second in the Houston Coca-Cola Open as he finished one stroke in back of Corey Pavin.

Buddy first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1977, but in his first full year of 1978, he won only \$5,637 and lost his card. He went back to the Q-School the Fall of that year and earned it back. Starting in 1979, he failed to qualify for the first four events, and then hit paydirt. He tied for second behind Bruce Lietzke in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. It set up a very good year, winning \$71,468. He also tied for second in the Anheuser-Busch Classic in the fall.

"I wasn't ready the next year," he admits. "I didn't use the time to my advantage. I enjoyed the exempt status and paid dearly for it because I didn't perform."

To make matters worse, at the Walt Disney World Team Championship, he was in a pick-up football game. Running for a pass, he tripped over a lawn chair and tore all the ligaments in his left wrist. He tried to play with it, but eventually had to have the wrist put in a cast for two months.

"It still hurt after the cast was off," he said, "and I altered my golf swing so I could play. It destroyed my game, but I fought it for a year-and-a-half."

He reached a low of \$6,214 in 1982, finishing 192nd on the money list. It was back to the Qualifying School.

In the regional qualifier at Dallas, he made an adjustment in his alignment after the first round because of the high winds. "All I did was move the ball back six-seven inches in my stance and tried to hit three-quarter shots. By the time I hit the third ball, I knew it was right, and I played well all the way through the school." He was sixth in the final qualifier at the Tournament Players Club.

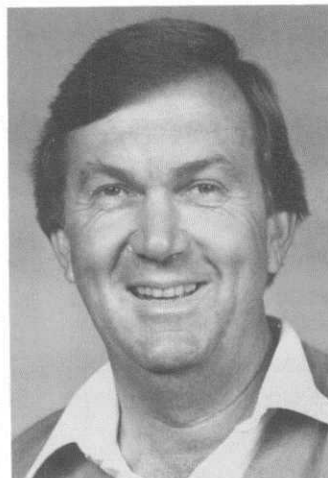
A big change in his life occurred on May 28 in 1983 when he married Susan, a nurse from Birmingham, AL. "It certainly changed my lifestyle," he said, "and it also gave me the reason I needed to work hard on my game."

Buddy started in the game at age five. "We lived about 100 yards from the first tee of the Bonnie Crest Country Club in Montgomery (AL). Everyone in the family played golf, so it was natural for me to play, too."

At one time, Buddy recalls, the juniors competition in that area was pretty tough, "with the likes of Bill Rogers, Mike Reid, Mac McLendon and myself competing against each other."

He won the Alabama State high school golf championship as a senior and went to Auburn University on a scholarship. His most important amateur title was the 1976 Dixie Amateur, and he edged Ron Streck in that one.

As long as golf is played, Al will be remembered for the afternoon at the Colonial Country Club during the 1977 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he became the first player ever to break 60 in a PGA TOUR event. He had a 13-under par 59. It came on June 10, during the second round and was a master blend of 11 birdies and one eagle. He used only 23 putts in the 30-29 effort, culminating in an eight footer for a birdie on the final hole.

He went on to win the tournament, although he had to hold off late challenges by Gary Player and Jerry McGee to do it.

Al represents the Beaver Creek Resort course in Vail, CO, and last Fall the resort hosted a Mr. 59 tournament. Several LPGA players were invited and if anyone had been able to shoot 59 or lower, the reward would have been \$1 million. Laughing, Al said, "Fortunately, no one came close and the best I could do was 69."

Over the years, he has done well on the toughest tracks, such as Firestone Country Club in winning the 1965 American Golf Classic and the 1966 PGA Championship; 1975 Tournament Players Championship and the 1979 Colonial National Invitation, both at the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth; and the 1976 Western Open at the Butler National.

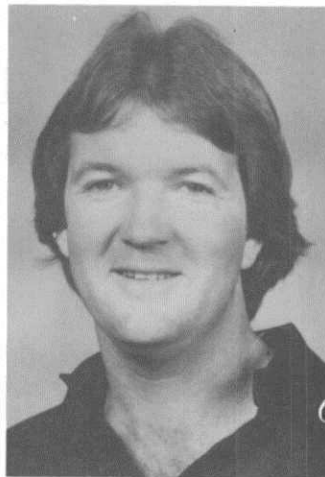
If there were such a category as "most comebacks from surgery" in the all-time PGA TOUR records, Al Geiberger would be leading it by such a wide margin that no one would ever catch him.

Yet, this lanky fellow keeps smiling and telling everyone that what has happened is history, and it's just great to be able to play on the TOUR again. One wonders how brilliant a record he would have had if he had been healthy for the past decade.

First, it was a nervous stomach disorder that nearly ended his career late in the 1960's and early 1970's. He battled back from that to win the 1974 Sahara Invitational, ending a victory drought of more than eight years.

Just when his long irons were whistling with incredible accuracy, he was struck down again early in 1978 when he needed intestinal surgery, and then late in 1979 with knee surgery. Seemingly healthy again, he suffered a severe attack while in Vail, CO, for the Jerry Ford Invitational in July of 1980 and emergency surgery had to be performed for the removal of his colon. In all, he underwent three separate operations in approximately two months for an ileostomy.

Bob Gilder is trying to find a way to light the flame again, to find a way to get his old enthusiasm for the game back. It hasn't been easy the last couple of years.

It's hard to imagine a player of Gilder's skills having to battle to retain his exempt status and finish among the leading 125 money winners. Yet, that has been the case.

Players dream of having years such as he enjoyed in 1982 when he won three times and earned \$308,648. He was sixth on the money list and his exceptional play earned him a position on the 1983 Ryder Cup team.

"Maybe I played too much in 1982 and 1983," he said at the end of last year. "I was worn out mentally and physically and now it's tough mentally trying to find a way to play."

One thing he did do in mid-summer was switch to using a cross-handed grip on his putter. "It did help with the longer putts," he said.

Last year, he made the cut in his last seven starts and earned just enough to finish in the 123rd spot.

Each time he won in 1982, he put on a marvelous display of scoring. His winning total of 14-under par 266 in the Byron Nelson Classic was the lowest ever shot in the 16 years the tournament was played at Preston Trail.

His 19-under par 261 in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic set a tournament standard and his week was highlighted by a double eagle two on the 509-yard 18th hole the third day. He only needed a driver and three wood. Finally, he won the Bank of Boston Classic.

After the first five weeks of 1983, he was heading for another terrific year. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Rex Caldwell, Johnny Miller and Mark O'Meara.

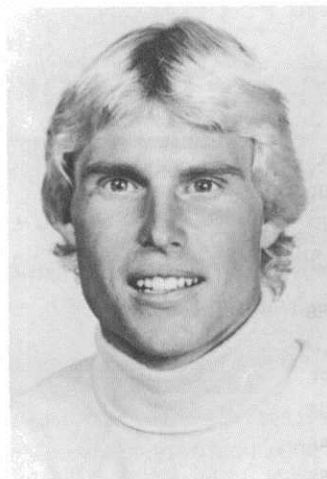
Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team—winning the 1973 Western Athletic Conference title—and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After he was graduated in 1973, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charles.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

He became only the fourth first-year player to win more than \$100,000, and would have been the "rookie-of-the-year," if Jerry Pate had not won the U.S. and Canadian Opens and \$153,102.

When Bill Glasson won the PGA TOUR's Driving Distance title in 1984 and then lost his player's card, a lot of people probably thought that this was just another long hitter who couldn't play the game.

Well, in 1985 Bill Glasson proved those people wrong.

After earning only \$17,845 in his rookie season of 1984 to finish 162nd on the money list, Glasson returned to the Fall, 1984 Qualifying Tournament in hopes of regaining his playing privileges.

At the conclusion of six grueling days of play, Glasson and five other players were forced to enter into a sudden death playoff for the final four available spots. He made it and returned to the PGA TOUR in 1985 with a renewed confidence.

"It's kind of scary when you first come out here being around all the superstars of the game," recalls Glasson. "Of course, I'm still a little intimidated by them, but I felt a lot more comfortable this past season.

"It takes awhile to get familiar with the courses and the people," he added.

Once Glasson got more comfortable out on TOUR, though, there was no stopping him.

After missing the cut in his first outing of the year, he promptly turned in the first top ten effort of his young career at the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open, grabbing eighth place and with it a check for \$11,200.

Two stops later he took home another big check, this one for \$18,250 after his T5 at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic and in his next stop, he collected another \$18,050 at the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational.

Feeling instilled with confidence, and with his card all but assured for 1986, Glasson travelled to the long and difficult Congressional Country Club for the Kemper Open.

After three rounds, Glasson stood at four-under par 212, six shots back of Larry Mize.

However, Glasson caught fire on Sunday while Mize struggled and when Glasson reached the par-four 18th hole, he needed a 50-foot putt to claim the lead. His long putt ran true and dropped in the hole for a stunning birdie that held up as the final groups finished behind him.

His long putt was one of the most exciting moments on the PGA TOUR in 1985 and the victory was worth \$90,000 to the blonde youngster from Oral Roberts.

Pained by bad knees that have faced surgery three times, the victory had a second benefit beyond the money. It allowed Bill to pick his spots the rest of the season and to rest his knees whenever necessary, something he'll continue to do this year.

"I don't have to play as much as before," he said. "I'll be able to pick my tournaments and I'm going to strive to be a more accomplished player."

This is one long hitter who indeed can play the game.

There is a good reason why the 1984 German Open holds a special place in Wayne Grady's heart. He went through a stretch of nearly six years without winning, but he had 17 second-place finishes during that time.

With a laugh, he adds, "Now I've been second in 20 tournaments since I finished as the runner-up in the Buick Open (last year)."

Wayne has come along this past year to be another in the long line of very good players from Australia. He admits, "I've had better success than I thought I would have for my first year over here."

He was in excellent position to win the Buick Open in mid-August, but said, "I sort of let it get away. I was two-strokes ahead with eight holes to play." Ken Green, however, came on strong at the finish to win his first PGA TOUR event.

As a youngster, Wayne wanted to be a pilot in the Australian Air Force. He didn't start to play golf until he was 14 years of age and then turned professional two-years later. He worked in pro shops, but realized it was not the life he wanted, at least not at that time.

He applied to get his amateur status back and was able to do so later in the year. He played a lot of amateur golf around Queensland and then turned professional again in 1978 when he was 21-years old. During those years, he worked under the wing of Charlie Earp at Royal Queensland. He's the same man who has worked with Greg Norman for years.

Later in 1978, he did win the West Lakes Classic in Australia and collected \$12,000. "I thought this was an easy way to make a living," he says, "and I got lazy. I was only 21 and had a load of money in my pocket. I wanted to enjoy life."

He continued to play on the Asian tour but with little success. Along about 1983, he realized it was time to buckle down and go to work on his game. It was the start of his success story.

He played for a short while in Europe in 1983 and showed a little profit. The next year, his earnings leaped, thanks to the victory in the German Open. The week prior to his triumph, he was second in the Benson & Hedges International after Sam Torrance birdied the last hole to beat him.

Wayne made a few appearances on the PGA TOUR in 1984 because "I wanted to see what it was like." He shot a 68 the first day in the Byron Nelson Classic and was only one-stroke out of the lead. A last-day 77, however, dropped him well off the pace. It was enough to let him know that this was where he wanted to play his golf.

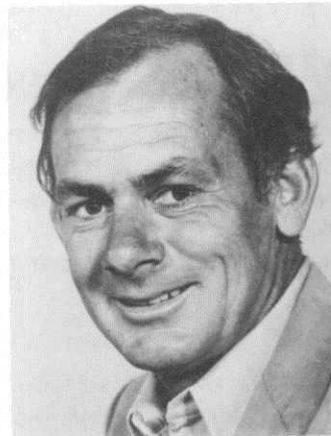
"I played in about seven tournaments on a foreign exemption," he said, "and didn't feel all that comfortable, but I was determined to give it a try in the Qualifying School." He finished in sixth place at LaQuinta, CA.

It has been hard work this past year, but he's known as one of the harder workers in the game. "It's the only way I know how to get the job done," he said.

He believes his long iron play is the weakest part of his game, "but the rest of it is good."

It seems likely he will be on the TOUR for many years, following in the footsteps of Peter Thomson, Bruce Crampton, Bruce Devlin and David Graham.

There have been many highlights in the spectacular career of David Graham, too many to mention, but everyone knows his victories in the 1979 PGA Championship and the 1981 United States Open Championship would be enough to last many a man a lifetime.

David, the proud man that he is, will treasure those moments forever, but he also is particularly pleased to be ranked as the all-time money winner among the talented Australians who have played the TOUR. He slipped past Bruce Crampton in 1983.

He won well over \$100,000 in six straight seasons, with the high mark being reached in 1983. He collected the tidy sum of \$244,924. One of the highlights of that year was a victory in the Houston Coca-Cola Open when he came from five strokes behind the last afternoon.

David has established a remarkable record for a fellow who started in the game with a pick-up set of left-handed clubs.

At the Merion Golf Club in the 1981 U.S. Open championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a three-under par 67 for a total of seven-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Not many of his eight victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Devlin, in a playoff.

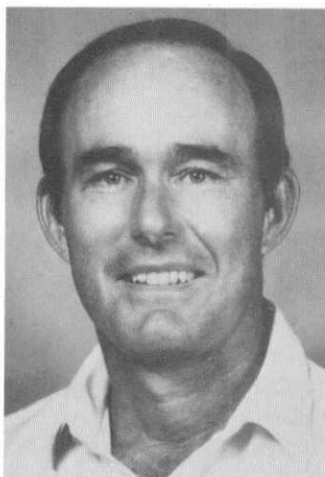
When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the 18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.

In the Memorial Tournament in 1980, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory, but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

There may never have been another week in the life of Lou Graham quite like the one he experienced in June of 1975 at wet-and-soggy Medinah Country Club in Chicago. That's when he over-came the challenges of many, and especially John Mahaffey, to win the United States Open Championship.

He has been reaping the benefits ever since and it couldn't have happened to a nicer guy. At Medinah, he was 11-strokes off the pace being set by Tom Watson after 36 holes, but a splendid 67 the third day let him leap to within four strokes of Frank Beard, who became the third-round leader.

Despite the thunderstorms and delays, Lou managed a two-over par 73 the last afternoon and that left him in a tie with Mahaffey at three-over par 287. Lou won it all the next day, 71 to 73.

That came in Lou's 12th year on TOUR, and he posted only two other victories. Yet, for some unexplained reason, he went on a tear late in 1979 and won three more tournaments within a space of eight weeks. He couldn't begin to explain the new-found success. He defeated Bobby Wadkins in a playoff at the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, then won the American Optical Classic at Pleasant Valley and finally the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Lou started to play the game at age 10 in his native Nashville, TN. He earned a scholarship to Memphis State University and he stayed for three years. Golf was his game, though, and not text-books.

He enlisted in the Army and served in the President's Honor Guard, but he didn't care for the service any more than he did the textbooks. He says with his sly grin, "I wanted out the day I got in."

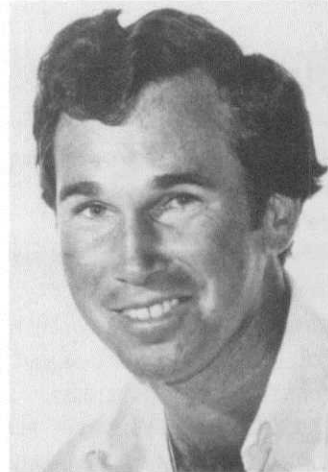
After his discharge in 1962, he worked at two clubs near Baltimore before he found the financial backing to head for the TOUR in 1964. He has been an exempt player ever since 1967 except for 1969 when he was 68th on the money list. He underwent surgery to repair tendonitis in his left hand.

As an example of his strong consistent play, he was selected to three United States Ryder Cup teams.

The last couple of years, Lou says with a smile, "I'm trying to re-discover my golf game. I'm looking forward to the Seniors' TOUR, and that's definitely the reason I'm still out here."

He said his consistency has been a problem the last year or so. "One week my driving would be off a little, and the next week it would be my putting."

Toward the end of 1984, when Hubert Green was asked to summarize his performance during the year, he grinned and answered, "Just say it was a little bit better."

As a matter of fact, it became considerably better before the season was over as he ended a three-year winless stretch and captured the Southern Open. His strong play continued into 1985 and the highlight of the campaign had to be his stirring victory over Lee Trevino in the PGA Championship at Cherry Hills.

He was two strokes behind Trevino after two rounds, but moved three strokes in front of Lee after the third round. Hubert was able to hold his game together on the treacherous greens and win by two over Trevino for the 19th victory of a very fine career.

The last two years have been especially satisfying because he had to come back from a disappointing 1983. At the end of that year, he underwent microscopic surgery on his shoulder.

Throughout his career, Hubert has been a hard worker. As a result, he says, "I want to do everything well. I've always been hard on myself and that's a trait of Hubert Green."

Hubert had stretch of about seven years through the 1970s when he was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. During one three-week period in 1976, he won three straight tournaments—Doral-Eastern Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

The next year, he won the United States Open in a gutsy performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

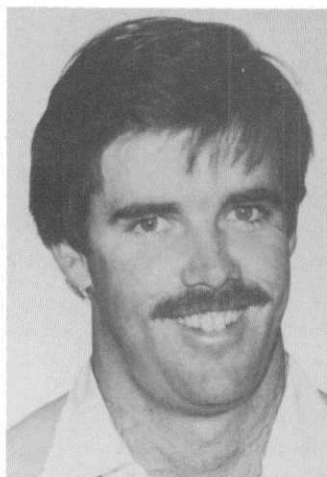
Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them."

As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf and during his high school days spent considerable time during the summer months playing in the many special invitationals held throughout his native Alabama. The next step was Florida State University.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, PA. He qualified for his TOUR card in the fall of that year.

Success came quickly. In the Houston Champions International, he tied Don January and then birdied the first extra hole for the victory. He was named the "Rookie-of-the year."

The Ken Green story is one of perseverance and this past year, his fourth on the PGA TOUR, his dedication and trust in himself paid off handsomely.

After struggling for three years on TOUR and having to regain his playing privileges twice, Green broke through in a big way in 1985 making the top 125 for the second time in his career. He also picked up his first PGA TOUR victory at the Buick Open and he did it in record style.

When Ken travelled to the Warwick Hills CC last August, he had already posted his best money winning year ever and looked like a cinch bet to retain his player's card. By the end of the week there was no question that Green would be around for the next few years at least after he fired rounds of 69-65-67-67—268, 20-under par as he breezed to a four-shot win and set a new tournament record in winning the \$81,000 first place check.

"I've been waiting for this for a long, long time," said Green in the interview after the round. "No matter what happens in the future, I can say I won on the PGA TOUR and that's not an easy thing to do.

"I've thought about this ever since I was a kid sneaking on golf courses," he added.

Ken started playing golf at age 12 when his family moved to Honduras where his father was the principal at the American School.

"The only choices we had in Honduras were to play soccer or golf," Green recalled. "I didn't want to kick the ball, so I just went to golf."

Three years later the family moved back to Connecticut where Ken continued his interest in golf by playing and caddying whenever possible. He also snuck out on a few golf courses during those days.

"I got kicked off the course about 800 times," Green laughed. "I didn't figure they would throw a kid in jail, so I just kept trying."

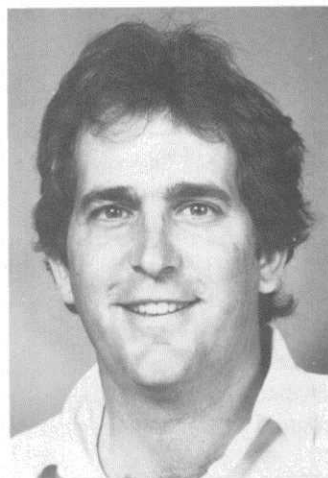
After playing a little high school golf, Green headed south for Palm Beach JC where his game started to blossom. He then headed for the PGA TOUR's Qualifying Tournament, but failed to earn his card on his first two tries. He finally succeeded in the Fall of 1981, but lost his card when he won only \$11,899 in 1982 and returned to the Q-School.

He regained his playing privileges and broke through into the top 125 in 1983 by winning \$40,263, but he slumped in 1984 to only \$20,160 and again had to re-qualify at the Q-Tournament. He did so and went on to make 1985 a season to remember and the fulfillment of a childhood dream.

"I've thought of nothing else but playing on the TOUR since I was 15 years old," said Green. "Even though I wasn't any good, I still had the dream."

It's a dream no longer for Ken Green.

Jay Haas has been one of the more highly-regarded players on the PGA TOUR for several years and one of the most popular among his colleagues.

Jay quietly goes about his business, wins a few tournaments, challenges numerous times and collects a healthy amount of money. Even when he is in a stretch of sub-par golf—for him—he finds something positive and cheerful to say.

He had his seventh straight \$100,000-plus year in 1985, but he wasn't overly happy with his play. "More than anything, it probably was my putting. I hit the ball well but wasn't able to score."

With a grin, he added, "Maybe I need to practice more than I have in the last two or three years. And I need to play more. It's just that I enjoy being at home, and when I'm there, I rarely play or practice."

Jay's biggest seasons were in 1981 and 1982. He won twice each year, and it was his performance late in 1982 and early 1983 that earned him a position on the U. S. Ryder Cup team.

With former Masters champion Bob Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob started him early, and has helped him through every stage of his career.

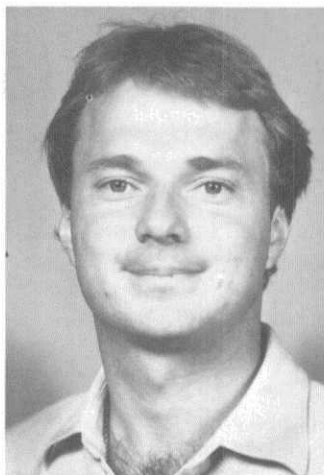
"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together."

Jay was seven when he played his first tournament—and won his first trophy. It was the National Pee Wee Championship in Orlando, Fla. "We played five holes each day and I scored 26-26—52 to finish third," he said.

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

He earned his TOUR card in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1976.

Gary Hallberg enjoyed his finest year in 1984 due mainly to improved consistency, but it was the same element of his game that haunted him through 1985. When he was good a year ago, he was very good indeed.

He went over the century mark in earnings for his third straight season, but more than three-fourths of it was earned in three events. He finished fourth in the Tournament Players Championship to collect \$43,000; he tied for fourth in the Buick Open to earn \$18,600; and tied for sixth place in the Masters Tournament to win \$22,663.

Gary's first TOUR victory came in the 1983 Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open and he nearly won it again in 1984. He would have too, except that Gary Koch shot a final-round 65 at Torrey Pines to tie him and then Koch won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole. Last year, he tied for 12th place.

His victory was something of a surprise. He trailed Tom Kite by four strokes entering the last round at Torrey Pines, and proceeded to shoot a six-under par 66 to edge Kite by one. He had an eight-foot birdie putt at the final hole and he made it. "My heart was pumping like it's never pumped before," he said.

His first two full years were a disappointment. He explained, "When I first started on TOUR, I thought all I had to do was play golf. It came so easy the first few weeks, but I now know there is a lot more to the learning process."

Gary was an impressive winner all through his amateur career and instant stardom was expected once he joined the PGA TOUR. He did very well through his first few months out of the chute. He was the first player ever to earn his TOUR card by winning the minimum \$8,000 needed at the time to obtain playing privileges without going through the Qualifying School. In 11 tournaments, he won \$64,244. He finished the year with six top 10 finishes.

Gary started in the game at age nine when his father brought home a set of old clubs. He thought it would be a fine idea for his son to play golf instead of baseball.

"Dad figured he could drop me off at the course on his way to work and pick me up on his way home," Gary said. "If I played baseball, it would only take two-or-three hours."

Once he started to play, he loved the game and worked diligently at it. So much so, in fact, that his Dad finally had to tell him to ease up and not be so serious. He eventually earned a scholarship to Wake Forest, and he went on to become the first four-time, first-team All-America choice. He was the NCAA champion in 1979 and won a total of 14 college tournaments.

During his early teen years, he also played hockey, and it wasn't until he went to Wake Forest that he started to think about being a professional golfer.

Dan Halldorson is another of the fine players to come out of Canada and, after some physical problems in 1983 and in early 1984, he appears to be on the winning track again.

He developed eczema on his hands in the Fall of 1982. He said he tried to come back too soon in 1983, but he kept playing. Instead, his hands became worse and he developed bad habits in his golf swing.

His old game started to return late in 1984 and last year he was all the way back as he collected well over \$100,000 for the second time in his career. "I was more consistent," he said, "and I was healthy again. Because of that, I was able to practice more and my confidence improved."

His biggest weeks came in a tie for fourth place in the Western Open and a tie for fifth in the Tournament Players Championship.

It was in 1980 that he enjoyed his biggest year. He won the Pensacola Open and then joined with Jim Nelford to give Canada the World Cup team title.

Dan first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1974, but he only won \$619 in 1975 and lost his card. He spent the next three years playing all across Canada. "I knew my game wasn't good enough for the TOUR," he said.

He won a few times and piled up a number of second-place finishes, but decided in 1978 that he wasn't going anywhere in the game while playing in his homeland. He wanted another shot at the U.S. TOUR.

He made it through the Qualifying School, and early in 1979, he tasted success. After two rounds of the Hawaiian Open, he was tied for the lead with Fuzzy Zoeller and George Burns, but finally tied for seventh.

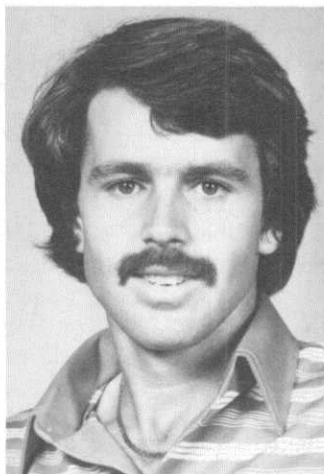
Even though he finished 116th on the 1979 money list, he believed the top 60 in 1980 was a realistic goal. After he finished second to Jim Colbert in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, winning \$32,400, he knew it was.

He already was assured of exempt status for 1981 with a position among the top 60 money winners when he headed for Pensacola. After two rounds of 68-67 at Perdido Bay, he was tied with Gary Hallberg and Tim Kite at nine-under 135. A 70 the third day left him three in back of Bob Mann, but his final-round 70 was all he needed to regain the lead.

The Halldorson family lived across the street from a golf course in Winnipeg, so he started in the game at an early age. He even built a practice range in his back yard.

In his home province, he has won the Manitoba Juniors, the Manitoba PGA and four times the Manitoba Open. In 1981 and 1982, he was honored as the Canadian Playing Professional of the Year.

When Ben Crenshaw won medalist honors by 12 strokes in the Fall Qualifying School of 1973, his performance was labeled "incredible." Indeed it was.

Well, in the Fall of 1982, Donnie Hammond did him two better. He was the medalist by an astounding 14 strokes with a six-day, 13-under par score of 419. He had opening rounds of 66 and 68, followed with a 71, and then stunned everyone with a record seven-under par 65 on the tough Tournament Players Club course in Ponte Vedra, FL.

One of the keys, he said, came the first day. He started at No. 10 at the TPC and "When I walked to the 18th green (his ninth hole), I looked up and there was my Dad in the stands. I was three under at the time and I stayed pumped up all week."

His father has had a tremendous amount of influence on Donnie.

His home was in Frederick, MD, and the old Baltimore Colts of the NFL had their pre-season training camp not too far away at Westminster College. "I would go with Dad to watch them, and then he'd play a nine-hole course there. I only had four-or-five irons, but I seemed to pick it up quickly. When he saw that, he bought me a set. I was 13 at the time."

Donnie played at Frederick High School and then went to Jacksonville University. In three years, he won five college events, including the Sun Belt Conference title in 1979 by six strokes. He played on the Space Coast tour for three years.

The highlight of his first year was his fine play in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am. He was tied for second place after three rounds, only two strokes off the pace being set by Tom Kite, the eventual winner.

"Jim Ireland, the Vice-President of Foot-Joy, was my amateur partner, and we made the cut in team play, too. The last day, we were paired with Tom Kite and it was a great thrill to watch such a good player."

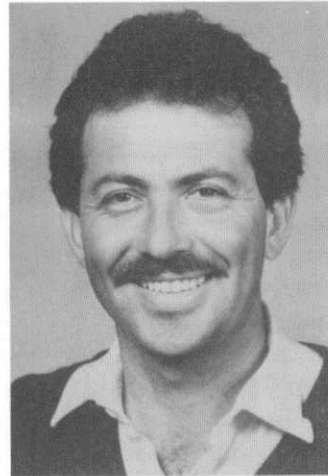
Maybe the biggest thrill of his rookie year came in the Kemper Open. "My Dad used to take me to all the junior tournaments, but at the Kemper, he actually caddied for me. I'll never forget that week."

Donnie has increased his money winnings each year, although he said, "I wasn't as consistent in 1985 as I was the year before. I missed more cuts, but I had four top 10 finishes and I made more money."

He said he is starting "to feel more comfortable" on the TOUR. "Since it was my third time around last year, I was more familiar with the courses and everything else you have to know about playing the TOUR."

Morris Hatafsky knows the meaning of hard work, patience and faith. He will tell you, "to be successful, you have to be willing to pay the price to get better."

He has known success, winning twice, but in an effort to take the next step ahead, he went to Peter Kostis for help two years ago. "I'm still learning about my golf game," he says, "and how to manage it. My goal is to be able to win at least one tournament a year."

He experienced something of an off-year in 1984 because "I worked so hard on being a better ball-striker, I tended to neglect my chipping and putting. The majority of my energy has been focused on the mechanics of the golf swing."

He knows his ability to score has improved. "I know the pains of the last couple of years will pay off for many years. It was something I had to do. I've not only learned a lot about the golf swing, but about myself as well."

Last year, he opened with a tie for second place in the Phoenix Open and went on to have his second-best money year since starting on TOUR in the Spring of 1976.

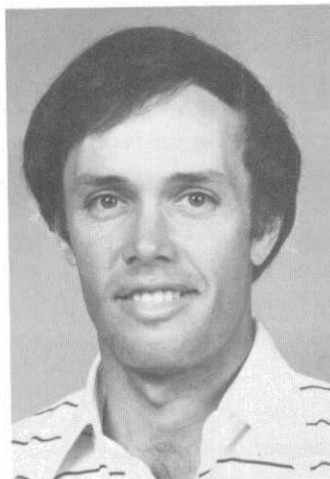
In July of 1983, he won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over George Cadle. The next week, he lost a playoff to Danny Edwards in the Miller High Life QCO and then tied for eighth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He went on to his first \$100,000-plus year.

The first time he reaped the rewards of his dedication was in the Fall of 1982 when he won the Hall of Fame Classic on the famed No. 2 course at Pinehurst, winning by two strokes over Jerry Pate and D.A. Weibring.

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Living in San Diego, it wasn't long until he was competing on the junior level and winning. At age 17, for example, he won the Mexico National Junior title, and in 1969, was the San Diego high school golfer of the year.

After two years at Arizona State University, he transferred to the United States International University and continued to play well. While a freshman at Arizona State, he was a teammate of Howard Twitty, Tom Purtzer and Bob Gilder.

Mark Hayes started to play golf at age six, under the watchful eye of his father, a high school physical education teacher and golf coach.

Since that time, Mark has gone about his way, dedicating himself to succeeding in the game, and he has been successful. His biggest victory came in the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, and with it, a 10-year exemption on the TOUR.

A few years ago, Mark started to make a major swing change, primarily getting a bigger turn and using his upper body more. The last two years, he also has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. "I've always been a positive person," Mark said, "but he has taught me how to relax more. It's difficult, though, when you're not playing well."

This past year, he saved his best for near the end of the year as he tied for third in the Texas Open. The \$20,000 he won boosted him over the \$1-million mark in earnings.

At the age of 13, the family returned to Stillwater, where Mark was born and there he came under the tutelage of Labron Harris, Sr., the Oklahoma State University coach and a close friend of Mark's Dad.

"One of the reasons I was so dedicated to the game," Mark says, "was that I was small for my age and I couldn't do anything else well. I practiced every day. I never thought about doing anything else for a living but playing golf."

One highlight of his blossoming career came in the annual Texas vs. Oklahoma Junior matches, and he defeated Tom Kite in the final.

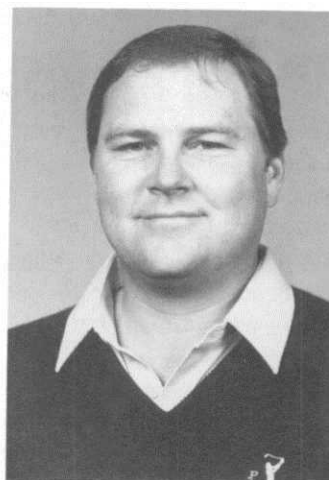
During his years at Stillwater High and Oklahoma State, he was a teammate of Doug Tewell, and it was Mark who eventually convinced Doug that he should play the TOUR for a living, and not work in a pro shop.

After leaving college, he went into the Army for two years and spent most of his time at Fort Jackson, S. C., working in the golf shop. There at the same time was Joe Inman.

He arrived on the TOUR in the Fall of 1973 and broke through with two victories in 1976. He led the Byron Nelson Classic from wire-to-wire and closed the year with a victory in the Pensacola Open.

His closest brush with victory in the last few years was in the 1981 Greater Greensboro Open. He was leading Larry Nelson by two, approaching the final green, but Nelson made a near impossible bunker shot for a birdie, and Mark, stunned by the turn of events, made bogey from the back fringe. Larry won it all with a birdie on the second extra hole of their playoff.

When you look at the PGA TOUR record of Lon Hinkle, it appears as if it was compiled by two different players. In his first five years, he won a grand total of \$40,876. In the next year alone, he easily surpassed that figure. Since then, he has been one of the leading players in the game.

He hit a high mark in 1979, winning \$247,693 and finishing third on the money list. His earnings dipped in 1982 when he suffered with a shoulder injury. But, he rebounded in 1983 with another \$100,000-plus year and generally has played well ever since. This past year, he became affiliated with the Eagle Bend Country Club in Big Fork, Montana. "We're going to spend the summers up there," he said, "and it's given me a new lease on my golfing life."

Chatting about his early days on TOUR, he says, "my goals were too low. My main goal was to survive. When things would go bad over here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game."

On one of those trips, he met Edith, a Swiss beauty, and she gave him a new purpose to life. Since then, his career has shot straight for the stars.

While his first victory was in the 1978 New Orleans Open, he had his biggest year in 1979, winning the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in a playoff over Mark Hayes and Andy Bean. He also won the World Series of Golf, outlasting Larry Nelson to the wire.

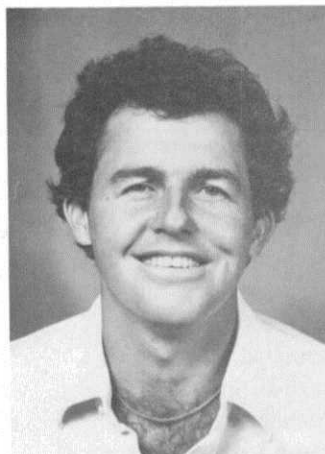
Lon's father is a Professor in Literature at San Diego State University, and Lon started in the game of golf at age 13, shortly after the family moved from Granville, Ohio, to San Diego. He'd play golf every day.

There are seven Hinkle children and in the early days, it wasn't unusual for all of them to be competing in junior golf tournaments around southern California.

Lon received a mental boost in 1980 when he finished third to Jack Nicklaus in the United States Open and PGA Championships. Although Jack won both by comfortable margins, Lon learned in those two experiences that he could win the significant championships.

His biggest enjoyment in 1981 came in the National Long Drive contest. He won with a belt of 338 yards, six inches and became the first TOUR player ever to win it.

Scott Hoch should have had the feeling right from the start that 1984 was going to be a good year. In the Seiko-Tucson Match Play, he went all the way to the semi-finals before being edged by Tom Watson, 2 and 1, but he captured third place with a 2 and 1 decision over Lanny Wadkins.

He saved his best for a two-month period in the summer when he won the Lite Quad Cities Open for the second time, finished third at the Kemper and Buick Opens, was fourth in the Western Open and sixth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic.

At Quad Cities, he had two 67s and two 66s to win by five strokes. It was the third victory of his career. Late in the season, he tied for second in the Southern Open behind Hubert Green.

He was off to a slow start last year but he finished strong to enjoy another profitable year. A solo third at the Colonial National Invitation was the highlight. "I made some swing changes early in the year," he said, "and it took awhile for me to start playing decently again."

Scott qualified for the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1979 but before he had a chance to tee it up in his first start, the 1980 Phoenix Open, he jarred his back and had to withdraw. The pain became so severe he could not even swing a club. It wasn't until the Atlanta Classic in June—the 23rd tournament of the year—that he was able to play 72 holes. He went 15 weeks without even trying to enter.

A few weeks later, in the Quad Cities Open, he shot a course-record 63 the first day and never was headed. He went on to set a tournament record 14-under par 266 and edged two of his former Wake Forest teammates, Curtis Strange who was second, and Gary Hallberg, who finished third.

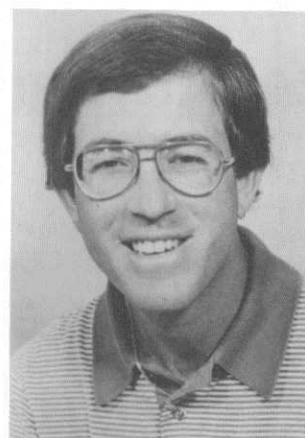
The back continued to bother him the rest of the year. In fact, there still are times when he can not go full bore.

He opened 1982 at the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, and, after only a few days of practice, he tied for 15th. The next week, he was fourth alone in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Bouyed by such a fine start, he continued to play well and won again in the rain-shortened USF&G Classic in New Orleans.

He was raised in an athletic family and started to play golf at age eight. His father, Art, preceded him at Wake Forest, earning All-American honors in baseball and then played professionally until injuries shortened a promising career. Scott's brother, Buddy, is a professional bowler.

At Wake Forest, he was a teammate of Strange, Jay Haas, Bob Byman and David Thore when the Demons won the 1975 NCAA team title.

If you ever had to pick someone to be a good-will ambassador for the world, Joe Inman might be your man. One of the more enthusiastic people in the game of golf, Joe will have a good word for you, no matter what the subject may be. He doesn't hesitate to spread his feelings among his colleagues.

Typical of Joe, he is extremely proud of the accomplishments of his younger brother, John, who won the NCAA championship for the University of North Carolina and also the Western Amateur in 1984.

"John has been a motivation for me," Joe says. "It's such a pleasure to see young people develop and John is truly a fine person."

Looking back at 1985, he said, "I feel I played well but when I needed the really good round, I couldn't pull it off. Like at New Orleans (USF&G Classic), I was one behind Seve Ballesteros and then I bogeyed three of the last seven holes to finish sixth. Those are the holes that make a career."

As a youngster, Joe tried his hand at most sports, but readily admits, "I wasn't good enough in most of them, so I ended up with golf."

He won the Carolinas Juniors championship and eventually headed for Wake Forest University where he was a teammate of Lanny Wadkins and Leonard Thompson. He won the 1968 Carolinas Open and the 1969 North and South Amateur, thus earning a position on the 1969 U. S. Walker Cup team.

After he was graduated from Wake Forest in 1970, Joe spent some time in the Army, with part of it being at Fort Jackson, S.C., where Mark Hayes also was stationed. After he was discharged, Joe headed for the TOUR School in the Fall of 1973 and made it.

His first victory came in the 1976 Kemper Open and it is possible that there never has been a happier TOUR winner in the history of the game. The Kemper was being played in Charlotte, NC, that year, and there were hundreds of Joe Inman followers there. When the victory was assured, he kept repeating with a bright smile, "I can't believe this."

Although not a long hitter off the tee, Joe believes his course management is the strongest part of his game and prefers to play with a fade. Paul Obermeyer of the Ping Company is the man Joe seeks when he needs help.

One of Joe's best tournaments during his years on TOUR came in the 1979 Atlanta Classic. Joe finished second, three strokes ahead of David Graham and Grier Jones with a 15-under par score of 273. However, Andy Bean was at his brilliant best that week and won by eight strokes over Joe at 23-under 265.

Asked if he had ever been 15-under par before and lost, Joe laughed, "I've never been 15-under before, period. Andy was like a robot."

The great players always seem to find a way to win, to keep a good round going, to keep a streak alive. Even during those moments when the situation appears near impossible, they have the skills to execute.

Hale Irwin has been known as one of the brilliant shotmakers in the game, and when you mix in the competitive heart he possesses, you have a man who knows no boundaries, no limits to the success he seeks.

As an example of his consistency, he went from early 1975 through the 1978 schedule—covering 86 tournaments—without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in TOUR history.

He went the distance in all 20 starts in 1983, and one resulted in a most satisfying victory in the Memorial Tournament. He said of it, "I've always wanted to win the Memorial Tournament. My desire has been very high ever since the first year. This is one we all point for, and if you don't, you are not aware of what tournament golf is."

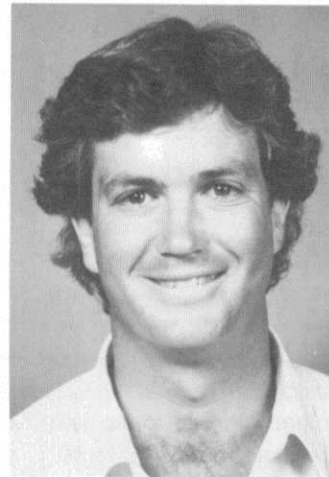
Last year, he won it again by outdueling Lanny Wadkins down the stretch. "The Memorial was the highlight of the year," he said, "but it wasn't a banner year overall. I'm still hopeful of keeping my game together with a sharp competitive edge after 17 years on TOUR. I have more varied interests now than I did when I started."

In 1981, after going for nearly 20 months without a victory, he won twice in impressive style, the Hawaiian Open and the Buick Open and both came after spending a week vacationing with his family at the resort he represents, Kapalua on Maui in Hawaii.

In 1984, he gained a victory in a rather unusual fashion. In the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, he needed a birdie on the testy 18th at Pebble Beach to tie Jim Nelford, who already had finished his round. Hale's tee shot went far to the left, hit a rock on the Carmel Bay beach and ricocheted back onto the fairway. He made his birdie. On the second extra hole of the playoff, he hit a poor three wood into a bunker, but then struck one of the great two irons of his career to nine feet and he made it for the victory.

His first victory was in the 1971 Heritage Classic, but two of the highest points of his career came in triumphs in the 1974 U. S. Open at Winged Foot and the 1979 Open at Inverness.

Many years ago, someone coined the phrase, "Nice things happen to nice people." Whoever said it first, must have had someone such as Peter Jacobsen in mind.

His first victory was in the 1980 Buick-Goodwrench Open. The next year, he nearly won it again, only to lose in a playoff to Hale Irwin. Two years ago, he finished third in the PGA Championship at Riviera Country Club and the effort was especially satisfying. "It showed me I do have the ability to be a factor in major championships."

Most important, Peter remains his happy, personable self, a delight to sponsors and galleries at every stop he makes on the TOUR.

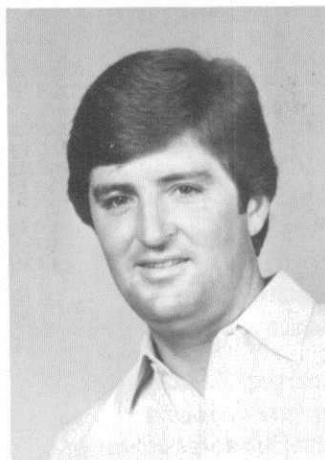
Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

Barry Jaeckel would like to believe he gets closer each year to being the type of consistent player he feels he can be. "I'm looking for more consistency," he said, "more of the middle line. I still have too many ups-and-downs."

Last year, he saw a vast improvement. "It was the most consistent year I've ever had and I have to give credit to Lee Trevino for some advice he gave me on course management. He talked about things you can do on a course and the things you can't do. It made a huge difference."

He definitely had an "up" week in the 1983 Kemper Open at the Congressional Country when he tied with four others, but he lost in the playoff which eventually was won by Fred Couples. Laughing, he said, "that was my semi-annual week to play a tough course in a big tournament well. It was a good feeling."

Barry isn't the type to look back and think about what might have been, but even though he has had a fine career, he can be excused if he occasionally recalls the duel he had with Raymond Floyd in the Spring of 1981.

In the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, Barry held a one-stroke lead after two rounds and three strokes after three, but Floyd and Curtis Strange came on strong the last afternoon to force a tie. Then, Raymond defeated Barry and Curtis on the first extra hole.

"I don't feel I lost it," the classy Jaeckel said. "A great player beat me and a great player tied me. I'll go away smiling." That's vintage Jaeckel, and he did go away smiling.

His first victory came in the 1978 Tallahassee Open when he defeated Bruce Lietzke in a playoff. Over the years, Barry has had to work to keep his slightly unorthodox swing pattern in the groove. It requires constant attention. His short game is excellent.

The handsome Californian started in the game in rather unusual fashion. "I visited a friend's house when I was a kid. I don't remember how old I was, but he had this golf club. It felt good to swing and I thought I'd like to try the game."

He went on to make his high school golf team, and played most of his golf at the famed Riviera Country Club, where his parents were members. His first important title was the 1968 Southern California Amateur and he was runner-up in the 1971 Pacific Coast Amateur.

After turning professional in 1971, he played the mini-tours and overseas, winning the 1972 French Open. He attempted to qualify for the TOUR, but missed four times before succeeding in June of 1975.

He is the son of Richard Jaeckel, a character actor who has had roles in dozens of movies and many television series.

It may be a long time before anyone has a year quite like the one Tom Kite enjoyed in 1981, but he keeps getting close to a repeat.

You remember how brilliantly consistent he was in 1981, winning the inaugural PGA TOUR Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner; capturing the Vardon Trophy for his 69.80 stroke average; and compiling an incredible 21 top 10 finishes in 26 starts. He was eighth or better in his last 10 starts and later was honored by the Golf Writers of America as the Player-of-the-Year.

Just as in 1981, Tom claimed only one victory in 1982, as he defeated Jack Nicklaus and Denis Watson in the Bay Hill Classic, but he also lost another, the Bob Hope Desert Classic, in a playoff to Ed Fiori. He did win his second straight Vardon Trophy with a 70.21 average; and only missed the cut once in 25 starts. When he missed it in the Canadian Open, it ended a string of 53 successful tournaments.

He won the 1983 Bing Crosby Pro-Am—thanks to a course-record 62 the third day at Pebble Beach. The year 1984 was one he will remember. It was a year for things to happen in twos. For the first time, he won two tournaments—the Doral-Eastern Open and the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic—and his wife Christy presented him with two sons—twins David Thomas and Paul Christopher.

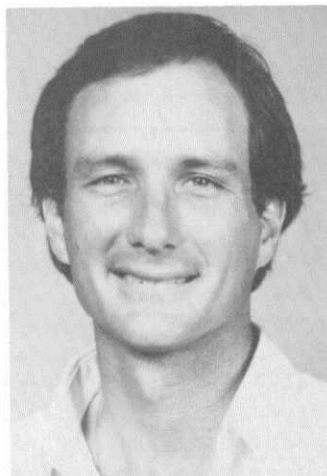
Last year, Tom was at his best again in the MONY Tournament of Champions. He equaled the LaCosta course record with a 64 the first day and never was headed, winning by six shots.

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to take a swipe. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

Before his 21st birthday in 1970, Tom was medalist in the Western Amateur, runnerup to Larry Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, second in the Southern Amateur and was named to the four-man U. S. team in the World Amateur Team Championship.

The following year he was chosen on the U. S. Walker Cup team and, in 1972, he shared the NCAA title with his University of Texas teammate, Ben Crenshaw.

After seven years of so-so success on the PGA TOUR, Gary Koch has emerged as one of the truly fine players in the game. His is an example of perseverance and many others would like to follow in his footsteps.

In the Fall of 1982, he was playing for what he called, "my golfing life." He needed a good showing at one of the final events of the year to finish among the low 125 money winners and earn exempt status for 1983. He gained it at the LaJeta Classic, finishing fifth and collecting \$14,000.

He went on from there to have an excellent campaign in 1983, winning the Doral-Eastern Open. His victory was highlighted by a hole-in-one on the 225th yard fourth hole.

In 1984, he did even better. He won twice and both times he came from six strokes behind the last day to catch the leader and then win in playoffs. He defeated Gary Hallberg in the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open and George Burns in the Bay Hill Classic. In both instances, he did it with a birdie on the second extra hole.

The 1985 season, while not up to his standards of the previous year, was his third straight campaign in which he earned over \$100,000 finishing with \$121,566. However, he was in serious contention only a few times and it left him hungry for the new season.

"Last year was a little disappointing after 1984," said Koch. "I did some hard work, though, and spent a lot of time with Peter Kostis and I'm looking forward to this year."

Gary was a brilliant amateur player. He won such titles as the 1970 U.S. Junior, three Florida State juniors and won the 1969 Florida State Open as a 16-year-old. He won 10 tournaments at the University of Florida and was a runner-up twice in the NCAA Championship gaining All-America honors three times.

Twice, he played for Uncle Sam in Walker Cup competition and once on a World Amateur Cup team.

When he came out on the TOUR for the start of 1976, he won early in the Tallahassee Open by a stroke over John Mahaffey. The next year, he won the Florida Citrus Open by two strokes. He played well until part way through 1978 when he tore ligaments in his left thumb. "I continued to play with it, and made it worse," he said.

At the end of 1979, he had to have an operation and "it took quite a while for me to get back on track. I feel I'm there, now."

Bill Kratzert was one of the most promising young players on TOUR during his first few years in the late 70's, but injuries set him back in the early 80's. However, the Indianan is completely back on his game now.

He encountered physical problems shortly after his victory in the 1980 Greater Milwaukee Open, and through the next three years, he developed bad swing habits. He even gave some thought to leaving the TOUR, but he started to spend some time on the practice tee with Phil Rodgers and, gradually, the pieces started to fit together again.

He completed the cycle in grand style in the 1984 Pensacola Open, coming from two strokes behind with four to go with a string of three birdies to win it all by two strokes. "I can't tell you the importance of this to me," he said.

The 1985 season was more of the same for Kratzert as he finished 37th on the Official Money List with \$180,331. He had six top ten finishes with his best showing coming in a third place effort at the Memorial Tournament.

"Last year was a good year for me," said Kratzert. "I drove the ball well and my ball striking was good, so I didn't put a lot of pressure on my putting and short game."

Bill obtained his TOUR card in the Spring of 1976 and a few months later, he was a winner. He joined with Woody Blackburn and they won the Walt Disney World National Team title in a playoff over Bobby Nichols and Gay Brewer.

His father has been the head professional at the Fort Wayne, IN. Country Club for more than 20 years, so it was natural for him to play the game.

"I didn't start to play until I was about 13," Bill says. "My dad never pushed me into it. It was just always there. It wasn't until I was 14 or 15 years old that I decided that golf was my game."

He won the Indiana State Amateur at age 16 and the Indiana Open a year later. Allen Miller, who befriended Bill when he became ill during the Sunnehanna Amateur, influenced him to go to the University of Georgia, where he was chosen All-Southeastern Conference all four years and All-American his last two.

After he failed in his first try in the TOUR Qualifying School, Kratzert quit the game in frustration, went home to Fort Wayne and worked six months as a fork-lift operator. But in the Spring of 1975, he accepted an assistant pro's job at a club and returned to the game to stay.

Bernhard Langer moved from out of the shadows and into the sunshine as one of the world's outstanding players in 1985, especially after his back-to-back victories in the Masters Tournament and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

Bernhard was six-strokes off the pace at the halfway mark at the Augusta National Golf Club, and he was at his brilliant best during the final two rounds. He shot a pair of 68s to overtake a struggling Curtis Strange and won by two strokes over Strange, Raymond Floyd and Seve Ballesteros.

The next week, Langer took the lead after the third round on the Harbour Town links and then was tied by Bobby Wadkins, but the German star won it all on the first extra hole with a par. Bernhard already was considered one of the better players on the European Tour when he headed for the United States and the 1981 World Series of Golf at the Firestone Country Club.

It was his first exposure to life on the PGA TOUR and he wanted to make a good impression. He did that—and more. "At one point early in the back nine the last day," he recalls vividly, "I was tied for the lead. It was a good feeling because I knew then that I could play over here. Until you do it, you never can be certain." He went on to finish in a tie for sixth place.

In the Spring of 1984, he played in eight PGA TOUR events, made the cut in all eight and had three top 10 finishes. He earned \$82,465, easily enough to qualify for his TOUR card.

Bernhard started in the game as a caddy at age nine at the Augsburg Country Club in his hometown of Anhausen, West Germany. After a few weeks, he decided he wanted to play. With a laugh, he said, "They made me play up-and-down the practice range until I reached a certain standard and then they let me on the course."

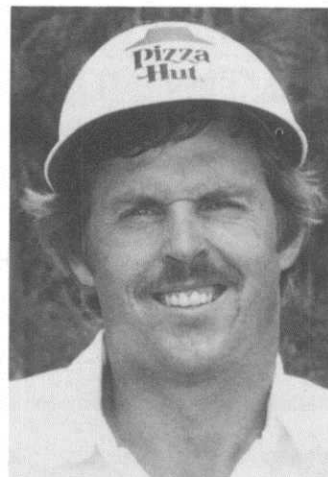
For the next seven years, he would play, practice and caddy whenever he could. In 1972, when he was finished with his formal schooling at age 15, he headed for Munich and went to work as an assistant professional at the Munich Golf and Country Club. Heinz Fehring was the head pro, and he became Bernhard's first and only teacher.

After a few months, Fehring asked him "What's your target? Do you want to be a teacher or player?" Bernhard told him he didn't know how good a player he was, but he would rather be a player. By the same token, he wanted to learn more about the golf profession.

When he completed the apprentice program at age 18, he set out on the European tour and in 1979 won his first event, the World Under-25 Championship in France. The next year, he won three times. He was on his way to stardom.

One of his most satisfying victories came in the 1981 German Open because he became the first native-born German to win it. He also won it in 1982 and 1985.

Wayne Levi has a good reason to be proud of his record. He has averaged a victory a year through his first eight full years on the Tour and he has played in the MONY Tournament of Champions every year.

His victory in 1985 — the eighth of his career — was in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic in a playoff over young Steve Pate. "I played some really good golf last year," he said, "but if I had putted just a little better, I would have earned a lot more money."

As it was, he reached a milestone in 1984 when he went over the \$1-million mark in earnings. "That was a great accomplishment for me," he said.

He has been able to reach these goals without devoting 100 percent of his efforts to the game. His family is very important and he spends as much time as possible with them.

As an example, he skipped the first five weeks of 1983 in order to be at home with his wife, Judy, as she awaited the birth of their second child.

Prior to his victory in the 1983 Buick Open, he skipped five of the preceding six events, saying, "I wanted to be home to see Lauren crawl (their second-born) and I want to be there to see her walk. There will be many more tournaments, but you get to see that only once."

His "annual" victory in 1984 came in the B.C. Open and it was especially satisfying because his home is not too far to the north of Endicott, NY.

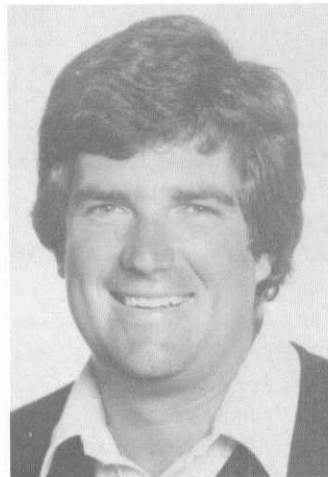
On a historical note, when he won the 1982 Hawaiian Open, he did so using Wilson's Optic Orange ball. He thus became the first player to win a TOUR event while using a colored golf ball.

Wayne started to play golf at age 13, mainly because his pals were playing the game. He fell in love with the game almost immediately. During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and won the 1970 New York State Interscholastic title. During his two years at Oswego State College, he lost only once.

In the summer of 1972, he headed for Florida so that he could devote 12 months of the year to his game. After two years of mini-tour action, he tried for his TOUR card, but didn't make it on his first two attempts. Meanwhile, he played wherever he could find a game throughout Florida and, during the summer months, on the New England circuit. He won numerous events, and his first was the 1973 New Hampshire Open.

He is proud of the fact, and rightly so, that he played well enough on the mini-tours in 1974 and 1975 to be able to sponsor himself. In June of 1977, he made it through the Qualifying School.

When Bruce Lietzke's game is right—and it usually is—he is one of the finest players in the game. It has been said, and rightly so, that he is capable of winning anywhere at any time under any condition.

So, it wasn't a surprise when he came from four strokes behind during the last round of the Honda Classic in 1984 to tie Andy Bean and then win the tournament on the first extra hole.

Even though it was his only victory of the year, he said, "In many ways, it was my second best year on the TOUR, second only to 1981 (when he won three times). I played well all through the year. If there was a disappointment, it was in the NEC World Series of Golf. I had a chance to win, but finished second."

He is playing more of a limited schedule now, explaining, "I play where I really want to play and the result is I've played more quality golf. I want to be anxious to play when I get to a tournament site."

During the week of the 1982 Canadian Open, even though he was playing well, he kept insisting that he didn't expect to win. He held a two-stroke lead going into the final round at Glen Abbey, and told everyone he felt he had a good chance to win, but didn't expect to win. He did, of course, by two strokes over Hal Sutton.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the Spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston.

"I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get back to it."

Six months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR, but he made it in the Spring of 1975.

He played well on TOUR almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kan., gave him a cut-down set of clubs. While at Beaumont Forest Park High School in Texas, he won the Texas State Scholastic title as a sophomore and helped his team to one championship and three seconds in his four years. While at the University of Houston—where he roomed with Bill Rogers—he won the 1971 Texas State Amateur.

Pat Lindsey always knew he could put low numbers on the scoreboard, but to do it under heavy pressure, well, he wasn't certain he could accomplish that until after the 1983 B.C. Open.

He played what he called the "two finest rounds of my life" the second and third days on the En-Jole Golf Club course in Endicott, NY, posting a seven-under par 64 and following with a 65. That gave him a four-stroke lead over Victor Regalado heading into the final day.

He was off to a shaky start with a bogey at the first hole, but he came on strong, played aggressively the rest of the way, and won by four strokes over Gil Morgan.

The 1985 season was a disappointing one for Pat, but top ten finishes late in the year at the B.C. Open and Southwest Classic helped boost him into the top 125 and salvaged his year.

"It's tough out here," noted Lindsey. "I've been working with Jimmy Ballard on my swing and it's improving. I'm looking forward to more consistency in the future."

"Now, I feel very positive about myself and my game," he said. "I know I can play the TOUR. When I've had some chances for good finishes, I've usually faded at the end, partly because I wasn't aggressive enough, especially with the putter."

He called 1984 "a slow year," but he was especially pleased with his performance in the World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club. He shot a final-round 66 on the demanding South Course and leaped into a seventh-place finish. "That salvaged the year for me," he said.

Pat showed a touch of class as the 1982 PGA TOUR schedule headed into the final weeks. He certainly was in a precarious position in regards to his exempt status for 1983, but he settled the issue by making the cut in his last five starts. More important, in the last two events, he tied for ninth in the Pensacola Open and tied for seventh in the Walt Disney World Golf Classic.

He started to play the game at age 10. He would follow his father around the course and occasionally hit a few golf balls himself.

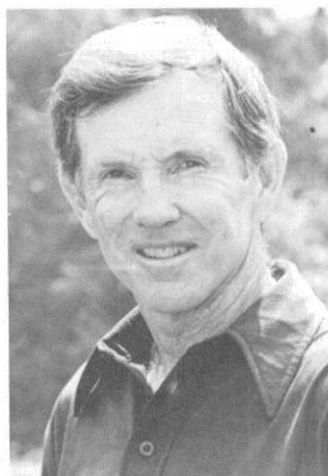
He qualified for the TOUR in the Spring School of 1979. The most exciting day he has had in his golfing career, he says, came when he shot a 68 on the Pinehurst No. 6 course to earn his TOUR card.

When his game is right, his driving and short irons are the strong parts, and he can either draw the ball or fade it. "It depends on which way it is pending on the practice tee," he says with a laugh in response to which way he prefers.

Pat was graduated from the University of South Florida and in 1974 was named the school's Athlete of the Year. He also won the Miami Tournament of Champions in 1975 and was second to Gary Koch in the 1974 Florida Intercollegiate tournament.

There was another big day in Pat's life in 1983. His wife, Julia, presented him with their first born, Margaret Boone, on June 17.

Shortly after Jack Renner came out on the PGA TOUR, he was asked if he had any idols, was there anyone he would like to emulate.

Without hesitation, he said, "Gene Littler. I grew up in the San Diego area and Gene has lived there all of his life. I can assure you, there isn't one single person, anywhere, who can or would say one bad thing about Gene Littler."

No one could have said it better. Gene has had his share of glory since starting on TOUR in 1954, and he has known adversity, too. In the Spring of 1972, for example, he underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands. Most thought he never would reappear on TOUR. Yet, he did, by the end of 1972. In July of 1973, about 16 months after surgery, he won the St. Louis Children's Hospital Classic.

In 1975, he won three times, and in 1977 he won again, giving him a grand total of 29 TOUR triumphs. On the Seniors TOUR he has won eight times, including the Seiko-Tucson Match Play to start the year. However, in a freak accident at home a few weeks later, he suffered a broken left arm and did not resume play until early August.

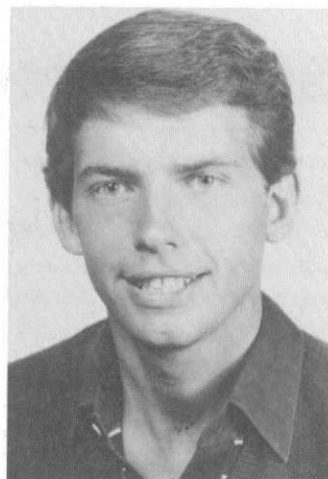

Robert Lohr surprised a few people when his name popped up on the leader board at the Houston Open, but he let people know by his performance at The Woodlands that he is here to stay for a long time.

Those who know Robert know he has the game and the temperament to succeed on the PGA TOUR, so when he finished in a tie for second place on the new Tournament Players Club course, they knew he was on his way.

"The good finish happened early enough in the year," he said, "to let me enjoy the rest of the year. It took what-ever pressure there might have been off of me and let me play my game. It also helped me get into a couple of tournaments because of my position on the money list."

His next start was two weeks later in the Byron Nelson Classic and he tied for ninth place. In those two weeks, he easily won enough to earn his exempt status for this year and he made the most of his opportunity.

After he came out of the Qualifying School last Fall, he didn't set any specific goals, "except to finish among the 125 money winners. I've never been a goal-oriented person," he explained. "Sometimes you can reach a goal and where do you go from there? I just want to continue to improve and learn what I can."

Two years ago, he played on the Tournament Players Series and says he learned a valuable lesson. "I realized more than ever that you have to play the course itself and not the other players. When I came out on the regular TOUR, it was easy to look at a leader board and think, 'How can I ever beat these guys.'"

"If you play your own game and put a good score on the board, it doesn't make any difference what the other people do. It sounds simple enough, but it is something you have to learn and adjust to it."

With a smile, he adds, "I've followed the TOUR for years, but you don't realize how good these guys are until you play with them week-in, week-out. The quality of play really did surprise me."

Robert started to play the game at a relatively-young age, but he also was an outstanding baseball pitcher as a youngster. He continued to pitch through high school, but when he went to Miami University in Ohio, he had to make a decision, since both sports were played in the Spring. It wasn't an easy decision, but he decided to stay with golf.

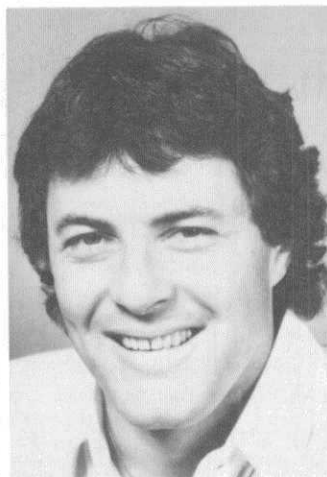
Although he didn't become a major force in amateur golf, he became good enough to earn all-Mid-America Conference honors for three years.

Now that he is on the TOUR, he said there are special advantages. "Everything is for free," he said with a grin. He explained, "I'm not talking about material things. I used to pay \$10-or-so to watch Jack Nicklaus and Tom Watson hit balls on the practice range. Now, I can watch all the great players for as long as I want for nothing. I can see the way they act, the way they swing and the way they manage their games."

Is there pressure on the TOUR? He says there is some but adds, "Pressure is when you're on the mound, the bases are loaded, it's the bottom of the ninth and you have a 3-and-0 count on the batter."

Wherever the "pressure" is found, he's managed to handle it well.

As long as Mark Lye is playing golf, there never will be another afternoon such as the hot-and-humid one at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in Sutton MA, in September of 1983.

After seven years of battling on the TOUR, he finally won his first tournament, coming from eight strokes behind the last day with a brilliant eight-under par 64 to win by one shot over John Mahaffey, Jim Thorpe, and Sammy Rachels. He finished birdie, par, birdie, birdie.

An emotional sort, Mark said, "I was beginning to believe winning was out of my reach. It isn't that you're not good enough, it's just that some people can't rise to it."

He came back with another very good year in 1984, with his performance in the Masters Tournament standing out. He led by two strokes after two rounds and was the center of national media attention. He finally finished tied for sixth.

He had the finest round of his career in the third round of the 1984 Walt Disney World Classic. He shot a course record 11-under par 61 at the Lake Buena Vista Country Club.

He said he "worked on a lot of new things," last year, and it turned out to be a profitable one. "I also need to work more on conditioning through the season, but I still get excited everytime I tee it up. It's fun and I look forward to the pressure."

Although he now resides in Tallahassee, FL, he grew up on the fairways of the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA and it was there in 1979 that he nearly won his first tournament. With the cheers of his hometown friends ringing in his ears, he was tied with Lon Hinkle for the third-round lead, but finally had to settle for something less as several others came on strong at the wire.

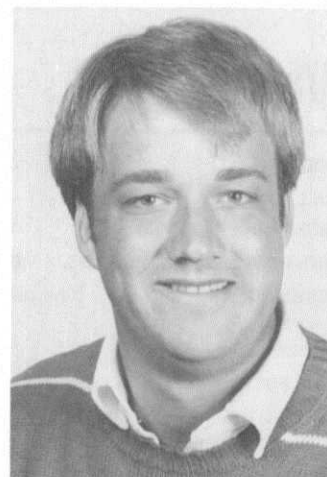
As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year-old, and he played every day, all day.

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the state's point system. As a 12-and 13-year old, he was winning tournaments.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After being graduated from San Jose State, he set his sights on the TOUR, but first headed for Europe for more experience. Andrew Magee said he "definitely" was satisfied with his first year on the PGA TOUR. "My first goal was to make the all-exempt list by finishing among the leading 125 money winners. I attained that position earlier than I expected.

"When I started the year, I had to learn how to play every day. I never did that as an amateur," he pointed out. "I knew the travelling would be a grind, but you have to be able to adjust to it. You have to find the good places to stay.

"Earlier in the year, I worked really hard on my game because I thought it was the thing to do. I know you have to practice, but you have to learn how and when to practice and coordinate it with the rest of the schedule. Later in the year, I learned how to relax more."

There were several definite highlights to the season.

"The first one was being paired with Jack Nicklaus during the third round of the Doral-Eastern Open. I'll never forget it." Andrew tied for 10th place and it was his first healthy check of the year.

The second one was two weeks later in the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic. After rounds of 73, 69 and 68, he was only two strokes out of the lead which was being shared by Fuzzy Zoeller and Curtis Strange. He was paired with them the last afternoon, but Andrew didn't fare as well as he had hoped. "The experience of being there with them was great," he said.

The next one was in the Byron Nelson Classic when he shot a first-round seven-under par 64. It also was the day Mac O'Grady set a course record at Las Colinas with a 63. It was especially satisfying because he spent many of his growing up years in the Dallas area.

Finally, he played some of his finest golf of the year at the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. He had a 65 the third day en route to a tie for sixth place and he earned his biggest check of the year—\$19,425. "It was the check that put me over the hump for my exemption," he said.

There also was a satisfied feeling the last day of the Texas Open when he scorched the Oak Hills course with a 64 and leaped into a tie for sixth place.

Andrew started to play at about age 11 after being urged to do so by his older brother. So, it was a special week for the Magee boys at the Bank of Boston Classic. "He's a Captain in the Army now," Andrew said, "and he caddied for me that week."

His first victory came a year after he started. "I shot a 94 in the 12-years-and-under group in a tournament in North Dallas," he remembers vividly.

He progressed gradually until he reached the University of Oklahoma. He had a good Spring as a sophomore and then his game took the quantum leap. He became a three-time All-America choice.

"I started to think about the TOUR because I had a few older friends who were going to the Qualifying Schools and making it, fellows such as Willie Wood and Mark Brooks."

He received a shot of confidence on the European tour in the summer of 1984 as he finished fifth in the Dutch Open and seventh in the Irish Open.

Andrew prefers to play the ball from left to right. And, when he needs help, he goes to see David Yates, his coach at Oklahoma. "He's been a very important person to me," he said.

When John Mahaffey's game is right, there are few who can strike the ball with the same authority. Such has been the case for most of the last two years when he has enjoyed the most profitable campaigns of his splendid career.

He won the Bob Hope Classic in 1984 in a playoff over Jim Simons and last year he won the Texas Open in a playoff over Jodie Mudd. "I've been playing more consistently," he says, "but I should have won a couple that I didn't get."

He was referring to the Anheuser-Busch Classic when Mark Wiebe birdied the first extra hole to beat him. Then, in the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch, a Senior/Junior team event on the Senior TOUR, John and Gene Littler lost in a playoff to Miller Barber and Ben Crenshaw.

Part of his success is related to a swing change he made in 1983. "I made some positive changes to help my longevity on TOUR. I added some distance without jeopardizing a lot of accuracy. It gave me a more positive outlook."

John joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970 NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977.

In the spring, he received the go-ahead to play, but before he had a chance, he fell off a ladder in his garage and broke a finger. He wasn't able to rejoin the TOUR until July.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978, and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate, and the next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sutton, Mass.

He was named to the World Cup team that played in Hawaii, and he won medalist honors. When the new year dawned, he won the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Within a month, hard luck struck him again. Trying to blast out of a bunker at Pebble Beach in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, his clubhead tore into the heavy sod on the lip and came to a sudden halt. The result was that all of the tendons on the back of the hand and wrist gave away. He tried to play in Hawaii the next week but had to withdraw. It was three months before he could return.

If there was an award for hard work, Roger Maltbie would be one of the leading contenders.

The personable Californian was one of the brightest young stars in the game in 1976, but three years later, he was almost a forgotten man and he fell to 155th on the money list. With hard work and dedication, he pulled himself back into the front line in 1981, and came close to winning twice.

He challenged again the next three years without breaking through, but in 1985 Maltbie returned to the top of the golf world with victories at the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and the NEC World Series of Golf.

At Westchester, Maltbie birdied the final hole to pull into a tie with Ray Floyd and George Burns, and then won the playoff on the fourth extra hole with a birdie.

He was brilliant at Firestone CC in winning the NEC World Series of Golf shooting rounds of 65-69-68-66—268 to win by four shots. It all added up to his best season by far as he collected \$360,554 and finished in among the top ten money winners for the first time.

"Winning at Westchester was a great thrill, especially in the fashion that I won," said Maltbie. "My swing held up and it gave me back the belief in myself as a player."

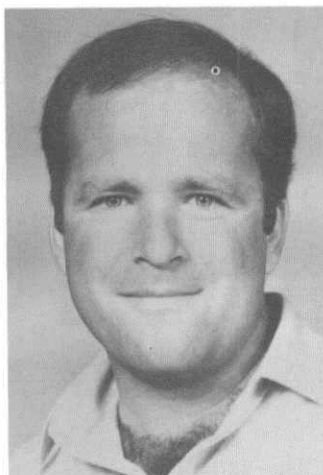
Roger was as amazed as anyone by his startling performances midway through his rookie year of 1975. He won back-to-back tournaments, the Ed McMahon-Quad Cities Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic. After the latter, he left his winner's check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one, and at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

Roger was teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, Calif. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

In his first attempt at qualifying for the TOUR, he missed in the Fall of 1973, but the next year, he made it.

Mark McCumber wasn't certain what to expect when he headed for the Doral-Eastern Open in late February last year. His left hand still was hurting and he had missed the cut in his only two West Coast appearances because of it.

"Gene Lane and Paul Callaway in the DP (Fit for Life) fitness van helped me considerably," he said and, as a result, he went on to have his best tournament of the year. He fought off the challenges of Jack Nicklaus, Tom Kite and Roger Maltbie to win for a second time on Doral's Blue Monster Course.

"It was a great thrill," he said, "to play with-and-against Jack the last day and win. He's an exceptional man."

He also won at Doral in 1979, but he believes a turning point in his career came in mid-1982 when he went to see Bert Yancey to talk about "the pre-shot routine and its importance." Mark had struggled after the early victory, but knew his third-and-fourth round scores "really had been poor, which meant I was doing something different from the first two days."

The next year, in 1983, he was one of the game's finest. He won the Western Open, the Pensacola Open and earned \$268,294 for the year. That represented an increase of \$236,610 in a year. Early in 1984, he had back-to-back fourth place finishes in the Los Angeles Open and Honda Classic. Two of his most enjoyable experiences came in finishing eighth in the British Open and making a hole-in-one during the U.S. Open.

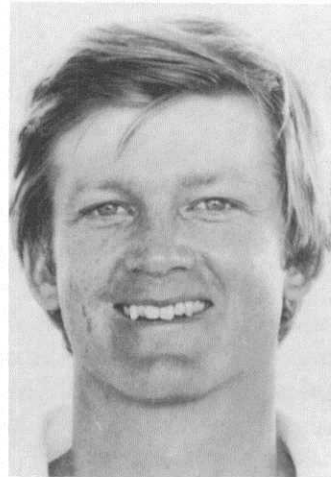
As he headed for the Doral-Eastern Open in 1979, winning was not on his mind. In the six previous events that year, he missed the cut four times and did not qualify for two others. Rounds of 67, 71 and 69 left him one-stroke out of the third-round lead. His even-par 72 the last afternoon was good enough to give him a one-stroke margin over Bill Rogers.

After being graduated from high school, Mark studied for the ministry for two years at Brooklyn Bethel College. Golf was his game, though, and he turned professional in 1974. He made it through the TOUR school in the Spring of 1978.

Along with his playing, he also is busy in the golf course design business with his brothers. A part of Mark McCumber and Associates, they have worked on more than 30 courses in the last five years.

In addition, Mark is the Director of Golf at the Ravines Resort in Middleburg, FL, and works with Yancey at the Ravines Classical School of Golf.

Pat McGowan recalls with a laugh how he received his introduction to the game. "I was about eight-and-a-half years old at the time," he said, "and I used to play tennis four or five hours a day with my two older brothers at the Colusa (CA) Golf and Country Club. We were crazy about tennis.

"Then one day the pro at the club, Warren MacCarty, had a putting contest for all the kids and we did reasonably well. The next day, one of my brothers, Mike, and I asked for jobs picking up golf balls at the range. We did that for the next eight years. The tennis racquets went into the closet to stay as soon as we started to work."

He won several junior titles and went to Brigham Young University where he played on teams with the likes of Mike Reid, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Mike Brannan. He continued to win through college with one of his big victories being the 1977 Pacific Coast Intercollegiate.

He made it onto the TOUR after his first attempt at qualifying in the Fall of 1977 and had an excellent rookie year, winning \$47,091. That was his best money year until 1982, and then he far surpassed them both in 1983.

One of the great thrills of his career came in the 1984 Sacramento Classic in the Tournament Players Series. He won by defeating Steve Hart in a playoff, but there were many, many of his close friends in the gallery from his hometown of Colusa. The check for \$36,000 was the largest of his career.

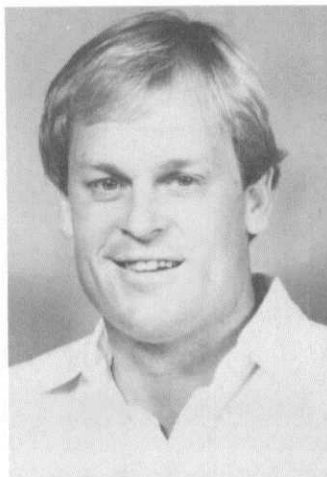
His first strong showing on the TOUR came in the 1978 Canadian Open when he finished second to Bruce Lietzke. In the Quad Cities Open in 1982, he was tied with Calvin Peete and Jeff Mitchell after three rounds and eventually tied for second. He had a final-round 67, but Payne Stewart won it with a closing 63. It was his best finish since the '78 Canadian and it was especially pleasing since his father had flown in from Sacramento the night before to see the final round.

Last year was another good one for him. He finished 69-65 in the Greater Milwaukee Open to tie for third place although his biggest check of the year—\$20,700—came as a result of a 12th place in the Tournament Players Championship.

Karl Tucker, the head golf coach at BYU, had a big influence on his game, but in recent times, Peggy Kirk Bell, his mother-in-law who is one of the leading instructors in the game, has helped him at their Pine Needles course in Pinehurst.

While in high school, Pat was named all-conference in both football and basketball for three years, and in 1973, was Valedictorian of his class.

Throughout his career, when Johnny Miller has been playing well, he has been awesome. He always has been able to make the game appear so easy, driving the ball long-and-straight; rifling his irons dead on the flagsticks and holing putts from all corners of the greens.

Miller's arrival as a star always has been tied to his final-round 63 and victory in the 1973 U.S. Open at Oakmont, but it was in 1974 that he won eight times and set what was then a record of \$353,021. He won the first three events of the year.

The next year, Johnny's clubs were blazing again. He won the Phoenix Open to start the year with a 24-under par score, and the next week won the Tucson Open with a 25-under score. In each tournament, he had a round of 61.

No one has touched back-to-back efforts like that since.

Johnny trimmed his schedule to 15 events in 1984 and to 17 last year and even though he did not win, he had some strong performances. He had five top 10 finishes in 1984 with a third in the Bob Hope Classic and a tie for fourth in the U.S. Open his best. Last year, he also had five in the top 10 with a tie for fourth place in the Canadian Open his best effort.

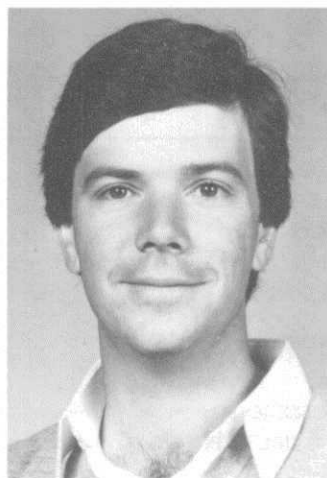
He made it over the \$100,000 mark last year for the sixth straight season and the 10th of his exceptional career.

He came close to having a banner year in 1983. He did win the Honda-Inverrary Classic but he lost two others in playoffs—the Phoenix Open to Bob Gilder and the Canadian Open to John Cook. In mid-December, he joined with Jack Nicklaus and they won the Chrysler Team Invitational. It was especially significant since Johnny is the tournament's official host.

In 1966, Johnny first gained national notoriety when he signed up to caddy in the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in his native San Francisco. However, he eventually qualified to play in the tournament, and went on to an eighth-place finish.

He started in the game at age five, and one of his first titles was the U.S. Juniors in 1964. He went to Brigham Young University and was graduated in 1969. Later that year, he qualified for the TOUR.

Just when it appeared as if Larry Mize had no chance to make the exempt list for 1983, he fooled everyone by playing the way he knew he could play this game. He had won \$14,787 with two tournaments remaining on the 1982 schedule, so it appeared as if his chances were slim, indeed, of making the top 125 money winners.

However, he proceeded to tie for ninth in the Pensacola Open and then tie for 11th in the Walt Disney World Classic to win \$14,000 and finish the year in 124th place with \$28,787. In the Pensacola Open, he started with rounds of 66 and 68 to put himself in position for a strong finish, and at Disney World, he finished with 69-67. One shot more, and he would not have made the top 125.

Those performances should have served as a clue to all followers of the game to keep their eye on this fellow. He made the most of his exempt status and became a winner in 1983, capturing the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic in rather dramatic fashion.

He was dueling Fuzzy Zoeller, Chip Beck, John Mahaffey, Sammy Rachels and others down the stretch in a tight drive, but he clinched it with a pressure-packed 25-foot putt for a birdie on the final hole at the Colonial Country Club. Larry had two other top 10 finishes and collected \$146,325 for the year.

1984 was more of the same for Larry and then last season was his best yet as he won \$231,041, placing him 17th on the Official Money List.

He led going into the final round at the Kemper, but Bill Glasson's 50-foot birdie putt on the final hole edged him by one shot. He had eight top ten finishes all together.

"It was a good year for me," said Mize. "I was in contention a lot more times and I learned from it. Hopefully in future years I'll be able to put that to good use and win rather than contend."

Since the first time he picked up a club at the age of nine, Larry Mize has been totally in love with the game. He only had a few lessons in the formative years, as his father, a scratch handicapper, pointed him in the right direction.

He was the No. 1 man on the Augusta (GA) Prep team, and then went on to Georgia Tech, where he was No. 1 for three years and captain of the team for two. Along the way he also won an Atlanta Amateur championship.

It was an important year for Larry experience-wise in 1980 when he competed in five TOUR events. He attempted to obtain his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981 but missed by a stroke, but he was successful in the Fall of 1981.

When Orville Moody arrived at the Houston Champions Golf Club for the 1969 United States Open, there was only one person, other than Orville himself, who thought he had a chance.

His Pal, Lee Trevino, told him, "If I don't win it this week, I think you will, Sarge."

Those words meant a lot to Orville, and he did go on to win the Open in one of the championship's biggest surprises. He was only two years out of the Army and only a year away from giving up the TOUR completely.

There have not been many other highlights to Orville's PGA TOUR career, but later in that year, he joined with Trevino and they won the World Cup title for the United States. He also won such things as the 1958 All-Army Championship and the 1962 All-Service Championship, definitely highlights in his mind.

Starting in 1980, Orville only made occasional appearances on the regular TOUR, but he was waiting for the day he turned 50 and could compete on the Senior PGA TOUR. He reached that milestone in December of 1983, and as a "rookie" among the Seniors in 1984, he did very well, indeed.

He won the Daytona Beach Senior Classic in a playoff over Arnold Palmer and Dan Sikes and the MONY-Senior Tournament of Champions by seven strokes. He also won an unofficial event, the Viceroy Panama Open.

Orville's father was a golf course superintendent in Oklahoma and he says, "I've been playing the game for as long as I can remember." He won the Oklahoma State high school crown.

He was offered an athletic scholarship to the University of Oklahoma, but left college shortly after enrolling and enlisted in the Army. After a stint as a rifle instructor, his golfing talents were recognized, and he was placed in charge of maintenance, instruction and supervision of Army courses. He served in Japan, Korea, Germany and the United States. He even won three Korean Opens.

In 1967, while stationed at Fort Hood in Killeen, TX, he decided to give up his 14-year career in the Army—he was a Staff Sergeant—and try the TOUR. He gave himself two years to make good, or he would return to the Army.

He made it through the 1967 Qualifying School, but it was not an easy year in 1968, winning \$12,950. A few times, he was on the verge of quitting, but decided to stick by his original plan to give the TOUR at least two years.

Gil Morgan is a personable, quiet sort of fellow who can slip by unnoticed, but when he's on the golf course, his colleagues know where he stands.

In the first two tournaments of 1983, all they had to do was look atop the leader boards, and there they would find his name. He won the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins and Curtis Strange; and the next week he won the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open by two strokes.

In 1984, he opened the season in the Seiko-Tucson Match Play and reached the final before bowing to Tom Watson, 2 and 1. That was as close as he would come to victory. He said, "I was disappointed I didn't win, but from a standpoint of consistent play, I was pleased because it may have been my best year."

Last year, he survived the cut in only three of his first nine starts due to a painful left shoulder. "I'm not sure how I strained it," he said, "maybe lifting luggage." Then, starting in late April, he played very well the rest of the year with a tie for third in the St. Jude Memphis Classic his best effort.

His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson. With his powerful, fluid swing action, he always has been able to play the more difficult courses well.

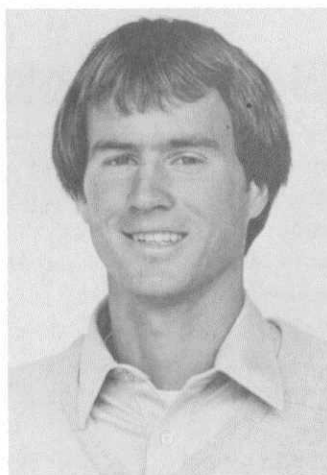
Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma, he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship in 1967, but waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

His best national amateur performances came in the Western Amateur and Porter Cup, finishing second in 1972. He entered the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1972, but did not make it. After a stint on the mini-tour, he returned in 1973 and passed his test.

Although he did not gain a lot of national amateur attention, Danny Edwards said that the players around Oklahoma knew all about him. "Oh, yeah, we knew all about the fellow named Morgan who lived in Wewoka."

He progressed steadily up the ladder on the TOUR until he won the 1977 B.C. Open by five strokes over Lee Elder. The next year, he won the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open and then the World Series of Golf. He pocketed \$267,459 for the year.

Those who have followed Jodie Mudd throughout his career knew he had the game to be successful. He was only 22-years old when he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1982 and it took him a couple of years to become comfortable with life on the road.

His game started to fall into place in the latter half of 1984 and last year, he blossomed out as a genuine contender. He finished second three times and on two of those occasions, he lost in playoffs.

Phil Blackmar emerged as the victor in the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open as he birdied the first extra hole to leave Jodie and Dan Pohl in a tie for second place.

Jodie appeared to have the Texas Open in San Antonio in his hip pocket, but John Mahaffey birdied three of the last four holes to tie him and then Mahaffey won the playoff on the second extra hole.

As disappointed as he was, Jodie looked at those losses as valuable stepping stones. Last year, he won nearly as much as he did in the first three years combined.

He said he is more at ease with himself, having realized that "golf is not a do-or-die situation. You have to learn how to take advantage of the good shots and save strokes and wash the bad ones out of your mind. I've learned a lot about myself and how to handle the good and the bad."

Jodie became an official member of the PGA TOUR in April of 1982, the week after the Masters Tournament. As an amateur, he tied for 20th at Augusta that year. His first pro start was the Tallahassee Open and he tied for 30th, winning \$675. The next week, he played in the USF&G Classic and tied for fifth place, pocketing \$10,537.

That was sufficient for him to meet the minimum money guideline that was in effect at that time, and he was a TOUR regular the next week in the Houston Open.

Jodie came from a golfing family, and in the early days, he caddied for his father. He continued to play golf in high school but also excelled in basketball. "I gave up basketball in my senior year, though," he said, "so I could concentrate on golf."

After playing in a couple of events in Florida, he accepted a scholarship to Georgia Southern College. There, his game blossomed. Twice he won the United States Public Links Championships, in 1980 and 1981. He won the prestigious Sunnehanna Amateur in 1981 and was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team the same year. He won eight collegiate events and was the runner-up on another seven occasions.

There wasn't any doubt about his ability to play the game. As his success continued, he started to think about playing on the PGA TOUR. "I felt my game would be good enough," he said.

Just when Bob Murphy should have been enjoying some of the finest years of his PGA TOUR career, he has had to overcome physical problems in order to play at all.

First it was a hand injury and then back problems that prevented him from playing the game with his usual vigor. Through it all, he has kept smiling.

He came back strong last year winning \$99,031, his best showing since 1980.

"Last year was totally different since my hand was better," said Murphy. "I got off to a good start and it gave me a lot of enthusiasm to play again."

The highlight of his year was his second place effort at the Colonial NIT where he picked up the largest paycheck of his career—\$54,000.

In 1982, Bob suffered through his lowest money year since he has been on TOUR, mainly because of the hand problem. He had to miss the first nine events. He came back with a respectable season in 1983, only to suffer with back problems last year.

Frequently, Bob will serve as a color analyst for CBS telecasts and his work is well received.

Bob's career started in a rather unusual fashion. He went to the University of Florida on a baseball scholarship as a pitcher, but he injured a shoulder in a pick-up football game as a freshman.

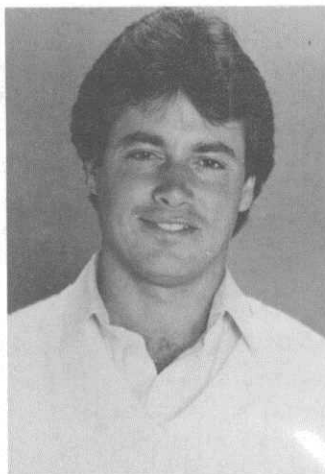
He took up golf as a physical education course and it was love at first sight. He said he would even skip class to practice.

Before he was graduated with a degree in physical education, he won the 1965 United States Amateur championship, the 1966 NCAA title for the Gators, two Florida Amateur titles, the 1967 Florida Open, and played on U.S. World Amateur Cup and Walker Cup teams.

He turned professional and went to the PGA TOUR School in 1967, and passed easily. In his rookie year of 1968, he set a goal of winning \$40,000. He won \$105,595, a record for a first-year player at that time, and two tournaments, the Philadelphia and Thunderbird Classic, back-to-back. Just prior to his first victory, he was second in the Westchester Classic.

He had off years in 1976 and 1977, due mainly to a uric acid condition that gave him hand problems, came back slightly in 1978 and then, for the first time in his TOUR career, slipped from the list of top 60 money winners in 1979. He was 62nd, only \$770 behind the 60th man. He figured he needed one more putt, somewhere, to keep his streak alive.

Last Fall, Jim Nelford started to count the days until he would be able to re-join his colleagues on the PGA TOUR. He made it clear, he had every intention of making it all the way back.

Jim suffered extensive damage to his right arm—plus other lacerations—in a water skiing accident near Phoenix on September 8, 1985. He said at the end of the year. "I'm really making good progress but I'm not certain when I will be ready to play again. I'm very positive about it, though. I will play again."

Meanwhile, last Fall, he was signed to assist with the commentary on two tournaments for ESPN. He has worked for CBC-television on the Canadian Open and those in the business says he has a fine future as an announcer should he ever choose to go that route.

Jim may never come as close to a victory as he did in the 1984 Bing Crosby Pro-Amateur, only to have it pulled from his grasp in the most unusual finish of the year.

Jim shot a final round four-under par 68 at Pebble Beach and was in the clubhouse at 10-under par 278. Hale Irwin was nine-under par with two holes to play. Hale parred the 17th and then on the 18th tee, he pulled his drive far to the left. The ball appeared headed for Carmel Bay but it hit among the rocks and somehow bounced back onto the fairway.

Irwin then reached the green in regulation, placing his approach only five feet from the cup on the par five hole, and he made it for the birdie and the tie.

On the second extra hole, Irwin hit a poor drive into a bunker, and then hit a career two iron shot nine feet from the hole. He made it for the birdie and the victory.

It was a definite plus for golf and the PGA TOUR when Jim decided that his future in sports was not in hockey. However, some of the things he learned on the ice rinks of his native Canada have been useful in golf.

"I played hockey from the time I was six until I was 17," he said. "It was mostly club hockey."

Normally a righthander, he started to play the game at age nine as a lefthander because he had to borrow his father's clubs—and they were lefties. "My Dad switched me over to righthanded at an early age," he said, but he continued to putt lefthanded, and still does today. "It was more comfortable for me to putt that way, and that's probably because my best shot in hockey was from the left side."

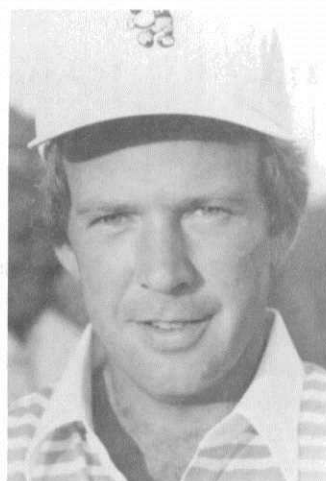
In his early teens, he started to think more seriously about golf, and one day he read in a magazine about how colleges gave scholarships for golf. Happily, he received a scholarship to Brigham Young University, and there he teamed with Mike Reid, Pat McGowan, John Fought and Mike Brannan.

He was a fine amateur, winning the Canadian Amateur in 1975 and 1976 and the Western Amateur in 1977. He won the 1976 Pan American and Pacific Coast Intercollegiate events. He was All-Western Athletic Conference for three years, and twice was named second-team All-American.

The stronger the challenge the better Larry Nelson seems to play. He was not enjoying a banner year in 1984 but he made it a good one with an impressive performance in his final event, the Walt Disney World Classic. He won by a stroke over Hubert Green with a tournament record 22-under par 266.

The previous year, he was off to a slow start and arrived on the scene for the United States Open at Oakmont Country Club practically unnoticed. He stayed that way through his first two rounds. His 75-73—146 left him seven strokes off the pace.

Then came another challenge; a challenge he issued to himself, and he responded brilliantly. His six-under par 65 in the third round lifted him to within one stroke of the co-leaders, Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros.

During the rain-interrupted last round, it was a battle between Larry and his good friend Watson. Play had to be halted late in the afternoon with Nelson on the 16th tee and Watson on the 15th green.

When it resumed the next morning, Larry hit a four wood to the back level of the green on the 226-yard hole, some 62 feet from the cup. He was hoping he wouldn't three putt. Instead, he made it for a near impossible birdie two and went on to a one-stroke victory over Watson. His 10-under par 132 for the last two rounds set a U.S. Open record.

It was his second major championship, since he won the 1981 PGA title before thousands of his hometown followers at the Atlanta Athletic Club. His margin was four strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller.

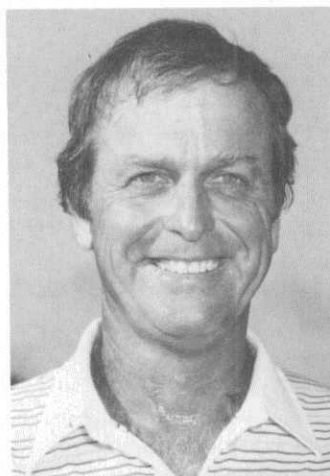
Larry started on TOUR in 1974, but his first victory didn't come until six years later in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. Later that same year, he defeated Ben Crenshaw for the Western Open title.

There are not many stories on the PGA TOUR more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he had his Approved Tournament Players card. "I really wasn't ready," he said later, but he got ready in a hurry, as witness his steady climb up the money rankings since then.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried school again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, Ga. He turned pro six months after that. He tried the mini-tours briefly and, in 1973, finished bogey-bogey in the Florida State Open to lose by a shot. That was his lone 72-hole event before earning his TOUR card that fall.

While some of the magic may be missing from Bobby Nichols' golf bag these days, he still remains one of the most popular figures in the game.

The last few years, he has made only limited appearances on the TOUR, trying to keep a competitive edge on his game. This year, he was moving in with many of his old colleagues as he became eligible for the Senior PGA TOUR.

It has been a wonderful career for the big handsome fellow who came very close to not being able to play the game at all.

Since he started on the PGA TOUR in 1960, Bobby has won 12 times, including the 1964 PGA Championship at the Columbus (OH) Country Club. It was there that he seemingly made great shots from all corners of the golf course and holed putts from one end of the state to the other. He won by three over Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer.

Several years earlier, Bobby was an outstanding football and basketball player at St. Xavier High School in Louisville, Ky. On September 3, 1952, he was critically injured when a car in which he was a passenger failed to make a curve and crashed.

He suffered a broken pelvis, back injuries, a brain concussion and internal injuries. He was paralyzed from the waist down and was unconscious for 13 days. He was hospitalized for 96 days.

His football, and basketball days were over, but he still could play golf, when he finally regained the use of his legs. While going on to win junior golf titles in Kentucky, he met Bear Bryant, then the football coach at the University of Kentucky. Bryant went on to Texas A&M, and proceeded to give Bobby a scholarship to play golf for the Aggies.

Bobby won the 1956 Southwestern Conference title, and after he was graduated, spent two years in the Army. He held the rank of Captain in the reserves.

He came out on TOUR in 1960, and two years later was honored by the Golf Writers Association of America with the Ben Hogan Award for his courageous comeback.

He had another terrifying moment at the 1975 Western Open. That was when he felt the effects of a bolt of lightning and was taken to the hospital with Lee Trevino and Jerry Heard. He has not played with the same effectiveness since.

Jack William Nicklaus—he truly is the one-and-only.

Greg Norman has always established high standards for himself and throughout his golfing career, he usually has met and surpassed his goals. Last year, it was a little different. He had a good year by the standards of many players, but not by his. Twice he tied for second place—in the Canadian Open and Bank of Boston Classic—but he didn't win in the U.S.

His first full season on the TOUR was in 1984 and he said he set "very high goals" but didn't care to reveal what they were. "But, believe me," he said, "they are high."

Whatever the goals happened to be, Greg reached the highest plateau during an unbelievable six-week stretch in early summer. After a so-so start for the year with only one top ten finish in nine attempts, he went on a rampage.

He won the Kemper Open in a breeze. He led by seven strokes after three rounds and finally won by an easy five. He skipped the next tournament, but went into the U.S. Open with his clubs smoking. He saved three great pars on the last three holes, the final one with a putt of 40 feet to tie Fuzzy Zoeller. Unfortunately for Greg, he was drained the next day and Fuzzy won the playoff, 67 to 75.

After a tie for 10th place in Atlanta, he won the Canadian Open the following week in a tense duel with Jack Nicklaus, and then in the Western Open, he lost another playoff, this one to Tom Watson.

The handsome Australian never played the game until he was 16, and then one day, he caddied for his mother, a three handicapper. When she finished the round, he borrowed her clubs and played a few holes on his own.

In two years, this son of a mining engineer went from a 27 handicapper to scratch. His secret to success came from two books his mother gave him, both written by Jack Nicklaus—"Golf My Way," and "55 Ways to Play Golf."

Greg will tell you, "I didn't try to copy Jack, just pick up the basics."

Today, Greg is known for his prodigious drives, but that was part of his early training, as he was told to hit it as hard as he could, and then work on straightening it out.

The victories started to come early and by 1982—just three years after he joined the European tour full time, he was the leading money winner.

His first appearance in the United States was in the 1977 Memorial Tournament.

In the 1981 Masters Tournament, he finished fourth, but he gained considerable attention with his "shark-hunting" stories, and thus became known as the "Great White Shark." He says he actually never went hunting for sharks, only shot at a few when "I became irritated because they were eating my fish. And, I only did that a few times."

Nevertheless, the nickname Shark has caught on, and he even has puppet shark headcovers for his woods.

In 1983, Greg entered nine PGA TOUR events and made the cut in all nine, collecting \$71,411. He easily surpassed the minimum money guideline for membership. In his first 1983 start, he tied with Mike Nicolette in the Bay Hill Classic, coming from six strokes behind the last day, but lost the playoff on the first extra hole.

Only one other player in the history of the PGA TOUR has shot a lower 72-hole score than Tim Norris. Mike Souchak won the 1955 Texas Open in San Antonio with a 27-under par 257.

When Norris blitzed the Wethersfield Country Club course in the 1982 Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, he shot a 25-under par 259. Only Byron Nelson, in the 1945 Seattle Open, and Chandler Harper, in the 1954 Texas Open, have ever shot as low as 259. Tim was on the verge of matching Souchak's mark until he bogeyed two of the final four.

He really could not explain his superlative play except to say he had very positive thoughts all week. Although his record did not show it, he said, "I had been playing well for several weeks, but everything just jelled at Hartford."

Prior to his victory, Tim went to a little longer shaft in his irons. "That enabled me to hit the ball a little further, higher and softer into the greens. I figured if I could shorten each hole by 10 yards, that has to help me."

After a fine amateur record, Tim was able to earn his TOUR card in the Fall of 1980 and went on to have a decent rookie year, winning \$32,424. Late in the fall, he suffered a sprained right hand. He tried to qualify for the first tournament, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, but the pain was too intense. He did not return to the TOUR until the Tallahassee Open in late April where he tied for 45th. He didn't make another cut until the Greater Milwaukee Open in early July. Unfortunately, the hand still gave him problems through the end of the year.

He underwent a hand operation in the Fall of 1982 and didn't return to the TOUR in 1983 until the Tournament Players Championship.

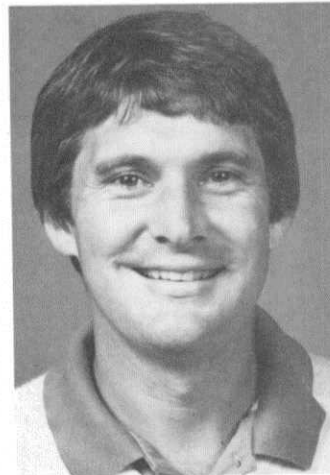
Last year was the most financially-rewarding one of his career and he believes he knows why. "I started to change just about everything in my swing in August of 1984 and since then it's been a matter of doing those things right all the time."

He has been working with teaching pro Chuck Cook of Austin TX, and Dr. Dick Coop, an educational psychologist at the University of North Carolina.

He started in the game at age six in Fresno, CA. He had a few tennis lessons and didn't care for that game, and then moved on to golf, encouraged by his stepfather.

"I took a liking to it right away," he said. As he grew older, he would watch golf on television. He didn't make his high school team until his senior year. He went on to Fresno State, and played well there. He was selected as an All-American twice. In his first start as a professional, he won the 1980 California State Open by five strokes.

Andy North has enjoyed some wonderful days on the PGA TOUR and he always thought there never would be another week like the one he enjoyed in 1978 when he won the United States Open Championship at Cherry Hills in Denver.

But, there was another. It came last summer at Oakland Hills in Birmingham, MI, when he won the Open Championship again, this time in a tense duel with several players who had opportunities to win. At the end, it was Andy at one-under par 279 and one stroke better than Tze-Chung Chen of Taiwan, Dave Barr of Canada and Denis Watson of South Africa.

At Cherry Hills, he led by two strokes after 36 holes and by one after the third round, but midway through the second nine on the final day, he appeared to be coasting home. He led by four strokes with five holes to play.

There were some anxious moments before he was through, though. When he hit his tee shot on the 18th hole, he needed a bogey to win—and that's what he scored. After being bunkered in three, he blasted to four feet. It wasn't an easy putt, but he made it to gain the victory.

It was a struggle for Andy in 1983 and 1984, due mainly to a painful right elbow. It was thought to be tendonitis, but closer examination revealed a bone spur. He underwent an operation and had it removed in the Fall of 1983. As it turned out, it was "about the size of a piece of gravel."

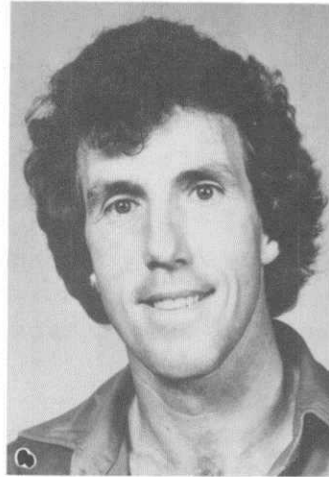
It takes time to get the proper swing place back, but towards the end of 1984, there were good signs. "I was encouraged," he said, "because I started to play decent again. I accomplished a lot."

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, WI. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf—if he rode in a cart.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

Mac O'Grady believes he set a PGA TOUR record even before he became a member of the TOUR. "I went through the Qualifying School 17 times before I made it," he said. "The first time was in October of 1971."

After he finally succeeded in the Fall of 1982, he has made the most of his opportunities. Last year, he broke through and established himself as a truly fine player. He finished third three times; one of them being at the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and it was worth \$64,000. That one week, he won more than he had in either of his first two years.

A high note was hit during the Byron Nelson Classic when he set a course record of eight-under par 64 the first day at Las Colinas. He finished tied for third place.

He once said, "I've played so many places around the world during the last 10 years or so, being on the PGA TOUR is like celebrating Christmas every day."

He added, "A friend told me, 'You've had your nose up against the candy store window for years—and now you're inside.'"

The Mac O'Grady story is an intriguing one. Actually, his real name is Phil McGleno, but in 1978, for a variety of reasons, he changed it to Phillip McClelland O'Grady. McClelland is for Bob McClelland, a fellow who has been like a father to him for years; and O'Grady was his mother's maiden name.

Mac was one of seven children and they lived in Minneapolis, MN, until moving to Los Angeles in 1960. He started to caddy when he was 12, both at Riviera and Bel-Air Country Clubs. Later, several of the men for whom he caddied, would serve as his sponsors.

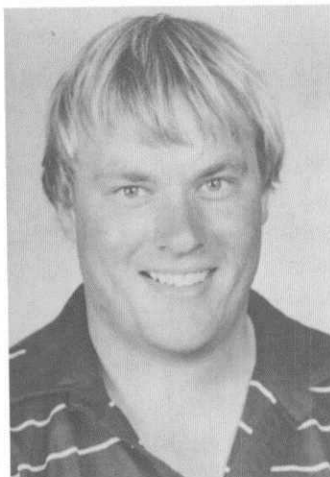
As a youth, he was filled with frustrations, and in an attempt to wash them away, he did everything from ride a bike for great distances, practice yoga and even worked hard on being able to play the game right-and-left handed. Of course, he plays right-handed now, but still putts left-handed.

He said he loves marathoning, and misses those long, peaceful runs on the beach of Malibu.

His first strong effort on TOUR was in the 1983 Sea Pines Heritage Classic. A second-round 65 gave him a seven-under par 133 and a one-stroke lead over Bob Eastwood. A 73 the next day dropped him into a tie for third, two strokes behind front-running Fuzzy Zoeller.

He was in a position to make a strong move the last afternoon, but four bogeys on the second nine left him four behind Zoeller and in a tie for third place. Nevertheless, he was delighted.

David Ogrin came close to getting his first victory on the TOUR at the St. Jude Memphis Classic last year but Hal Sutton had other ideas.

"I felt I finally played to my potential," David said. "I played an entire tournament my way and found out it was good enough. Except for Hal's great putt, I might have been the winner."

Sutton came on strong the last afternoon with a seven-under par 65 at the Colonial Country Club to tie Ogrin at nine-under par 279. On the first extra hole, Sutton rolled in a long birdie putt from the back fringe to win it.

"I've been working hard on my swing," David said, "and Hank Haney has helped me."

If you ask David when he was introduced to the game, he'll smile and tell you, "Legend has it I was born with a club in my hands. When I was two-years old, my dad had one of his clubs break, so he sawed off the shaft, put a grip on it and I started to swing away."

"By the time I was five, I was breaking 60. I still have some scorecards from when I was five; and I was in my first competition at seven."

There was a time when David was considering baseball as a career. "I had dreams of being a switch-hitting catcher," he says with a laugh, "but my love of golf was too much."

In 1975, his Waukegan East high school team won the Illinois State Interscholastic title. Then he went to Texas A&M on a scholarship. "Bob Ellis is the coach at A&M and he originally was from Illinois. He kept in touch and wanted me to go there, so I did."

He won three collegiate events, including the 1979 Harvey Penick Invitational in Austin. Hal Sutton was the runner-up.

"I wanted to go as far as I could in the game," he said, "and I made it through the TOUR's Qualifying School on my fourth attempt." That was in the Fall of 1982 at the Tournament Players Club.

"It isn't often one dreams a dream" he said, "and then when he reaches the dream, realizes it is even better than the dream. The TOUR is all I dreamed it would be, and more."

Summing up his first year, he commented, "For years, I had to watch the great players from afar. I tried to emulate them. Now, I have the chance to actually ask them things and watch them up close. I don't want unsolicited suggestions, but I appreciate being able to ask them."

He said the highlight of 1983 was the United States Open. After shooting 75 and 69, he was only three strokes off the lead. He finished tied for 13th, his highest of the year.

As long as Mark O'Meara plays the game, he probably will never experience another year such as 1984. He won his first TOUR tournament, the Greater Milwaukee Open, but victories—such as the back-to-back triumphs in the 1985 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and the Hawaiian Open—are expected of this talented young man.

What made 1984 so unusual was the rest of the story. He finished second five times, third three times and had a total of 15 top ten finishes—high on the TOUR. He earned \$465,873 and finished second to Tom Watson in the race for the Arnold Palmer Award as the year's leading money winner. He only trailed Watson by \$10,387.

Every time he was asked to explain his sudden rise to the top, he always pointed the finger at Hank Haney, the man from Houston who turned his game around.

"I've always played on natural instincts," Mark has said, "but I knew I needed something better. Hank has me swinging more on a plane. I was always too upright and that led to inconsistency. Now, I understand the swing much better."

Although he played well through the latter half of last year, his performances generally were not up to his own expectations. "After I won the two tournaments early, maybe I needed to set higher goals."

He did earn berths on two distinguished U.S. teams, the Ryder Cup and the Nissan Cup.

Prior to 1984, he twice had lost tournaments in playoffs. The first was in his rookie season of 1981 when he bowed to Dave Eichelberger in the Tallahassee Open; and then in 1983 to Bob Gilder in the Phoenix Open.

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo, CA. A golf course was next to their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

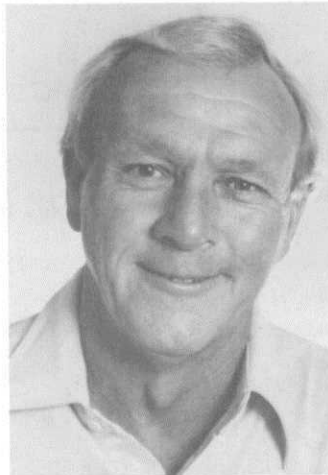
He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University. His next goal was to be classified as an All-American, and he made the third team as a freshman and second team as a senior.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals. He won the California State Amateur, defeating Lennie Clements in the final and also won the Mexican Amateur, defeating Gary Hallberg the last day.

Tom Kite was the first recipient.

Since Arnold was the TOUR's leading money winner for so many years, the first player to reach the \$1 million mark in winnings, and, generally, done so much to popularize the game, Commissioner Beman said it would be appropriate to give the 1980 inaugural award to Arnold himself.

Palmer won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1954 and joined the TOUR the next year.

Jerry Pate has a flair for the dramatic and it never was more evident than during the closing stages of the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, which was being held for the first time on the demanding Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass course.

He was battling Brad Bryant, Bruce Lietzke and Scott Simpson for the lead and the coveted victory. Just when it appeared a playoff was imminent, Pate birdied the treacherous little 17th hole with a 15-foot putt; and then birdied the 440-yard 18th by lofting a five iron brilliantly to within two feet for another birdie. On one of the more difficult courses on TOUR, he played the final seven holes in four-under par.

Then, as he stood on the final green at the awards ceremony, he coaxed TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman and course architect Pete Dye to the edge of the bulkhead and pushed them both in the lake. Finally, he dove in himself.

It was his second such act of showmanship. He did it the first time after winning the 1981 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, diving into the large lake to the left of the 18th green.

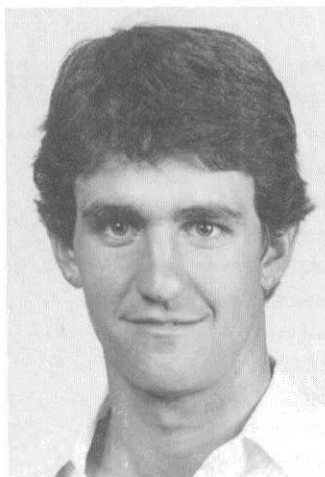
A severe neck muscle injury in mid-1982 threatened to end his once brilliant career. He underwent many tests but it wasn't until the Spring of 1985 that Dr. Jim Andrews of Columbus, GA, discovered a torn cartilage in his left shoulder. It would get caught between the joints and cause considerable pain, but Dr. Andrews explained that cartilages don't show on most tests.

An operation was performed on June 17 to remove "about one-half of the cartilage. His return to the TOUR was at the Southern Open in early October.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a two-shot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie until Hal Sutton bettered it in 1982.

Conrac Rehling, who developed Bob Murphy while coaching at the University of Florida in the early 1960s, found another champion-to-be about a decade later while coaching at a small college near Pensacola. Pate was still in high school when he came under Rehling's wing. When Rehling moved to the University of Alabama, Pate followed. In 1974, like Murphy nine years earlier, Pate won the U.S. and Florida Amateur titles.

Just when it appeared as if Steve Pate might win his first tournament on the PGA TOUR, Wayne Levi came along and changed the script. It was in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic last year, and Levi claimed the victory with a birdie on the second extra hole of their playoff.

As they were heading down the home stretch, the young man from UCLA birdied the 15th hole to move in front. Levi tied him with a birdie at the 17th hole and they both birdied the par 5 18th hole at the Atlanta Country Club. Levi made a 15-footer and Steve dropped a 12-footer on top of it.

After they parred the first extra hole, Levi claimed the victory on the second. Steve was short of the green in two and chipped six-feet beyond the hole. Levi had a 12-footer and he made it.

"Yes, I'm a little disappointed," Steve said, "but Wayne had to birdie three of the last four holes we played to beat me. I was having fun and it was a blast being on television."

His effort was worth \$54,000 and it came at the perfect time for him. Steve finished seventh in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1984 and had high expectations when the year started. However, prior to Atlanta, he had entered 13 tournaments and missed the cut in seven. His best finish was a tie for 53rd place in the Doral-Eastern Open.

"I was discouraged," he said. "I thought I could play, yet I had won only about \$5,000 up to that point. I kept trying to do the same thing and, for some reason, everything came together in Atlanta. It took all the pressure off of me because I knew I would be back the next year."

He had two more top 10 finishes before the year ran its course—tie for ninth at the Western Open and a tie for 10th at the Bank of Boston Classic.

Steve started to play golf at the age of nine, mainly because his parents played and they encouraged him. In his first competition, at age 11, he recalls shooting a 107. He progressed well enough to make his high school team in Santa Barbara as a freshman. In his senior year, he won the California Interscholastic Federation title.

He moved on to UCLA and it was a good decision. He came under the wing of noted teacher and professional Eddie Merrins, the head pro at Bel-Air Country Club who also coaches the Bruins. He still works with Eddie.

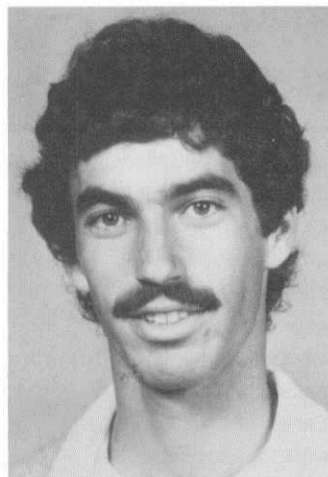
Jim Petralia of the Annandale Country Club in Pasadena also has been a big help. "He was in Santa Barbara for awhile and I started to work for him when I was 16," Steve said.

He's always believed putting to be one of the strongest parts of his game. Grinning, he said, "Early in the year, I reached the point where I couldn't make it from a foot but starting at Atlanta, I went for about three months when I didn't think I could miss."

He can work the ball both ways but prefers right to left.

Oh, yes, he does get asked frequently if he is related to Jerry Pate. The answer is no.

Corey Pavin will be on the PGA TOUR for many, many years. The only question is how high will his star rise? In just two years, he established himself as one of the very best in the game.

In his first year of 1984, the young man from UCLA not only won the Houston Coca-Cola Open, he also earned far more than any other first-year player in the history of the TOUR. He collected \$260,536 as he had five top 10 finishes and missed the cut on only three occasions.

Last year, he had more top 10 finishes than any other player with 13 of them and his earnings of \$367,506 put him in sixth place. His victory was an impressive one in the prestigious Colonial National Invitation. He opened with a 66, added a 64 and then finished with a pair of 68s to win by four strokes. His 266 established a tournament record.

Before joining the TOUR, Corey gathered considerable experience playing around the world and, so, it didn't take long for his skills to surface here.

He missed the cut in the 1984 Bob Hope Classic, his first official start, but the next week, he fought Tom Purtzer to the wire before Purtzer finally won it with a birdie at the final hole. He earned \$43,200, which was more than enough to solidify his position among the top 125 money winners for the year.

It was three months later at The Woodlands in the Houston Coca-Cola Open when he shot three straight 68s to edge Buddy Gardner by one stroke and gain the victory.

The first time he attempted to obtain his PGA TOUR card was in the Fall of 1982, but he didn't make it. In the Fall of 1983, he tied for seventh.

"I wouldn't want to go through that again," he said. "The pressure is unbelievable. I worked 18 years on my game, but I only had six days to prove I belonged on the TOUR."

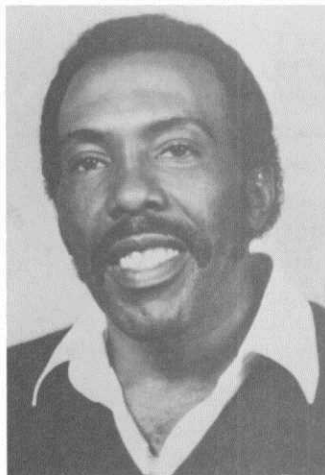
Corey started in the game at age eight and it wasn't long before he was receiving his first taste of competition. It was in 1977 that he won his first two important titles. As a 17-year old, he captured the Junior World crown and also became the youngest ever to win the Los Angeles City Men's Amateur.

He was very successful during his years at UCLA, winning 11 tournaments including the PAC-10 championship in 1982. He also received the Fred Haskins award as the outstanding collegiate player that year.

When Corey failed to get his TOUR card in his first attempt, he took his golf game overseas in 1983. He was successful, to say the least. He won the South African Open, the German Open and the Calberson Classic in France. He finished his European swing with more than \$75,000 in earnings.

Now, he was ready for the PGA TOUR, and he says life on the TOUR is about what he expected. "I had a good taste of the travelling part of it when I was overseas, and I did play in the Los Angeles Open twice as an amateur."

The Calvin Peete story continues in its own beautiful way. There are few in any sport more inspirational than this one. His performances on-and-off the courses have elevated him to the very top in his profession.

He has won 10 times in the last seven years but his greatest accomplishment came last March when he won the prestigious Tournament Players Championship. It assured him of exempt status for the next 10 years.

Four of his victories came in a brilliant 1982 campaign and he has been a leader in such statistical categories as driving accuracy and greens in regulation almost from the beginning of the program. He has played on the last two Ryder Cup teams and last Fall, was on the six-man U. S. Nissan Cup team that played at Kapalua Bay Resort on Maui in Hawaii.

He won the Golf Writers' Ben Hogan award in 1983. It goes annually to the individual who had to overcome a physical handicap or illness to play the game. As a youngster, Calvin suffered a broken left elbow and even today, he cannot extend the arm. So much for golfs straight-left arm principle.

In 1984, when Calvin won the Texas Open in San Antonio, he had two rounds of 67 and two rounds of 66. It assured him of his first Vardon Trophy for low stroke average—70.56.

He said, "Winning the Vardon would be like winning a tournament to me, so today, I feel as if I've won twice."

Born in Detroit, Mich., Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters—through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, N.Y.

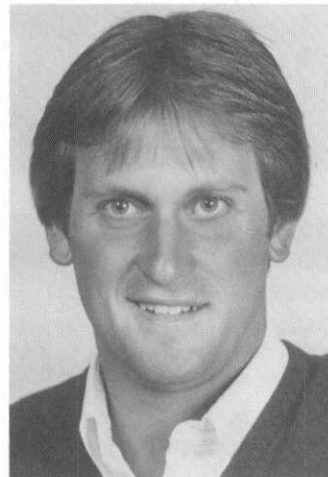
Peete had friends in Rochester, and each year his buddies would invite him to play golf.

"I always turned them down," Peete said, "I thought the game was silly. Who wants to chase a little ball around under the hot sun?"

Finally, in 1966, when he was 23 years old, Calvin tried the game with his friends and he was hooked. He recalls, "Just about that same time I saw a tournament on television and learned that Jack Nicklaus was making around \$200,000 a year chasing that ball. I figured I could be happy with one-third that amount, so I decided to give it a try."

Peete improved rapidly and he began to play in amateur tournaments wherever he could. Eventually he entered the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School. Like so many others, Peete failed on his first try. And the second. But he made it the third time, in the Spring of 1975.

There was a time when Chris Perry had to make a very big decision. As a strong-armed righthander, he compiled a 9-0 pitching record as an ninth grader with a 0.91 earned run average and he also carried a healthy .325 batting average.

But, he also loved to play golf.

"My Dad never said I had to follow him," Chris remembers, "but he did say things are so specialized in sports today that I would have to make a decision. I couldn't do everything."

His dad, Jim Perry, knew something about such things. He was an outstanding pitcher for many years in the major leagues, starring for Cleveland, Minnesota, Detroit and finally with Oakland.

"By the time I was 13 or 14 years old," Chris adds, "I knew I wanted to play professional golf. In Minnesota (his dad pitched for the Twins for 10 years), you play golf and baseball for six months and skate for six months." And skate he did. High school ice hockey is a big, big sport there and Chris was captain of his team his senior year. "I played hockey for eight-or-nine years as a defenseman," he said.

When it was time to move on to college, he selected Ohio State University "because of its great tradition. Being from the north, I didn't want to go south and play golf 12 months of the year. As soon as I saw Ohio State, I fell in love with everything about it."

The feeling was mutual. Chris went on to win 14 collegiate events, shattering the "victory" record of Jack Nicklaus. He was a first-team All-America choice for three years.

After he was graduated in 1984, he made his first attempt at the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall and he made it easily, finishing in a tie for 13th place.

His first year was a successful one. He only had one top 10 finish and that was a tie for 10th place in the Bank of Boston Classic, but he did make the cut in 22 of the 30 events he entered. He made more cuts than any other first-year player and he is proud of that fact.

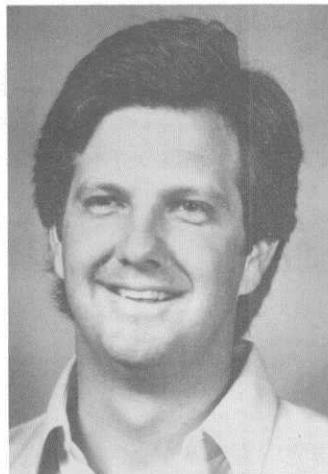
"I didn't shoot many low numbers to get better finishes," he said, "but I didn't have many high ones either. For the most part, I was very consistent."

He prefers to play the ball from right to left, "but I like to work it both ways. My iron game improved a lot during the year."

A weakness early in 1985 was his putting, but he could see improvements as the year went along.

Oh, yes, his dad played a major role in his development as a young player. "We'd go to spring training with him and play the courses in Florida. He's still a good player and carries about a 4 handicap now, but I sure wouldn't give him 2 strokes a side."

Maybe Mark Pfeil has not enjoyed the total success on the PGA TOUR that a few others have, but he has had his weeks when he has played with the best of them. Maybe even more important, however, Mark has left his "mark" all around the circuit as one of the more personable people in the game.

He's always been a welcomed addition to any tournament or special outing. His biggest year financially was in 1984 when he collected \$101,878 and his three best finishes came in three important events—a tie for third in the Canadian Open, tie for fourth in the Colonial National Invitation and a tie for sixth in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational.

His only TOUR victory was in the 1980 Tallahassee Open. In 1983, he earned \$85,477 on the regular TOUR, plus \$36,000 for his victory in the Anderson-Pacific Classic on the Tournament Players Series in Sacramento.

He nearly won again in the 1983 Texas Open but Jim Colbert was too strong for everyone that week. However, Mark had back-to-back 63s for the middle two rounds and the 126 total represented the lowest 36 holes on TOUR that year. He finished in second place.

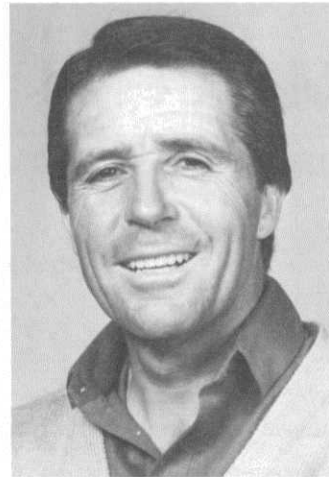
While last year was not as good financially as some of the others, he did pocket an extra \$20,000 for winning the Jerry Ford Invitational in Vail, CO, a special non-TOUR attraction.

Pfeil comes from good golfing stock. Both of his parents are fine players and it was with them, at the Palos Verdes Country Club, that he first started to play the game at age 10. Over the years, Bud Oakley at the Palos Verdes Club has been his primary teacher.

Mark played little competitive golf as a junior, but at Palos Verdes High he made rapid progress and, in his junior year, won the California Interscholastic Federation title. After two years at El Camino Junior College, he moved on to Southern Cal where he achieved All-America honors twice. He captained the Trojans in 1974 and won such titles as the Pacific Cost Amateur twice and the Southern California Amateur.

He turned professional in 1974 and graduated from the Fall, 1975, Qualifying School. After earning less than \$500, he returned to the Q-School in Fall, 1976 and regained his card. He has been a pleasant addition to the TOUR scene ever since.

Gary Player admitted on several occasions that he was anxious to reach the age of 50 so he could become a member of the Senior PGA TOUR. The day came last Nov. 1 and everyone fully expected him to make just as strong an impression among the Seniors as he has done for nearly 30 years on the regular PGA TOUR.

His brilliant record around the world speaks for itself. He truly is one of the all-time greats but, just as important, he is known everywhere as one of the finest gentlemen in all of sports.

His record is positively amazing when you realize what he has gone through during the last three decades, travelling all around the globe, spreading good will for the game.

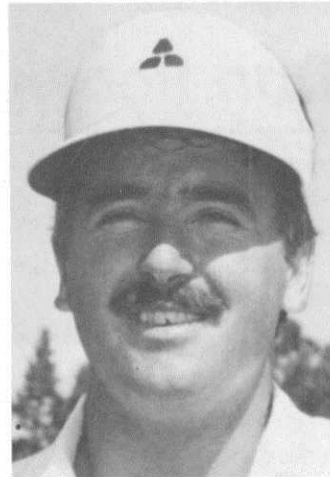
Stopping off between flights to other tournaments around the world, he still managed to win 21 times on the PGA TOUR and win nearly \$1.8 million. He has won 128 times worldwide, including the Open championship of his South Africa homeland 13 times.

His love for his native land and his family, though, made it far more important for him to keep his roots there rather than move elsewhere in search of additional fame and glory. He was one of the original inductees into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst.

He has won the Masters Tournament and the British Open each three times. He has won the PGA Championship twice and in 1965, captured the United States Open.

He showed the world how well he still plays at the PGA Championship at Shoal Creek, AL in 1984. He shot a tournament record nine-under par 63 in the second round to tie for the lead. He battled Lee Trevino and Lanny Wadkins the rest of the way and finally finished tied for second with Wadkins as Trevino came on to win.

Dan Pohl has established himself as one of the longest hitters on the PGA TOUR, but he also has a reputation for being able to play well in some of the more significant championships.

For example, he was third in the 1981 PGA Championship and in 1982 he lost the Masters Tournament in a playoff to Craig Stadler. He also tied for third in the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach in 1983.

By any measuring stick, however, his last two years have been the most productive of his career. He had seven top 10 finishes in 1984 and last year, came within a shot of winning on a couple of occasions.

He lost the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open in a playoff to Phil Blackmar. In the Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open, it looked as if he would be in a playoff, but dropped his long approach shot into the water fronting the 18th green to finally finish fourth.

As for his length off the tee, Dan was the TOUR leader the first two years such statistics were kept. In his best year, he averaged 280.1 in 1981.

"I know it would be even better than that," he says, "if I could use the driver off every tee on the measured holes. Sometimes, I have to back off to the three wood or one iron."

His zest for power made him an outstanding baseball hitter for Mt. Pleasant High in Michigan, although he was a pitcher. When he first started to play golf, he continued to swing viciously, but soon realized it also was important to keep the ball on the course, somewhere.

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves. He was so competitive, though, that he wanted to play everything. He played four years of high school golf, and had improved enough by his senior year that "Steve Robbins, my high school coach, wrote to several colleges. Arizona responded, so that was where I went."

Even today, he credits Robbins and Arizona coach John Gibson with helping him the most.

He earned his TOUR card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing privileges.

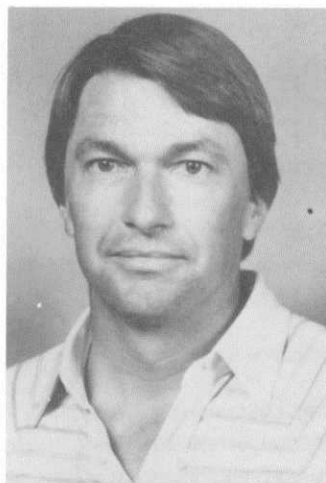
With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the green on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them."

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

As the season moved into the final few tournaments, Don Pooley was waging a close race with such people as Raymond Floyd, Lanny Wadkins and Calvin Peete for the coveted Vardon Trophy. It is awarded annually to the PGA member who has the lowest stroke average.

When asked what it would mean to him, the mild-mannered Pooley said, "To them, it would be just another feather in their cap. For me, it would be the ONLY feather."

Well, he did earn his feather. He played 97 rounds and compiled a splendid average of 70.36. He had 40 rounds in the 60s and only seven scores of more than 74. He has been known as a player who rarely shoots a real low number, but just as rarely shoots a high one. Early in 1983, he went 22 straight rounds without being over par and challenged for the Vardon Trophy.

While he wasn't able to get the victory he wanted last year, he did have his finest money year.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a faithful God.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendonitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on TOUR that year.

The next two years were good ones for Don, even if not as profitable as in 1980, but he was rolling again in 1983, collecting nearly \$146,000. His best opportunity for victory came in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, where he tied for second after Calvin Peete shot a last-round 63 to win it.

One of these years, he figures to win in Atlanta, because he was second again in 1984 and tied for 12th last year.

A swing change in recent years has added to his length off the tee. "The change helped with my release and I draw the ball now instead of fading it."

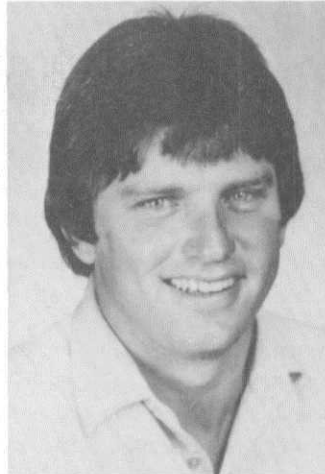
His first victory came at the B.C. Open in 1980. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, and Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday. His father was—and still is—an avid golfer and they play in father-son events at Victoria Country Club in Riverside, Calif.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card.

Nick Price was extremely impressed with everything he saw when he arrived at the Firestone Country Club for the 1983 World Series of Golf. He qualified as the leader on the South African Order of Merit.

"I've watched the World Series on television back home and I always thought this would be a great place to play," he said.

As his first round started, he parred the first and second holes, but bogeyed the third and fourth, missing the greens in each case. "At that point, I was just trying to hold the round together. I told myself to be patient and work on each shot."

What happened from that point on was, he not only held the round together, but he nearly put his entire golf career together.

Nick birdied the sixth hole that day, and then birdied five of the first seven holes on the second nine for a 36-30—66. He was in the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Bobby Clampett. And, that's where he stayed the rest of the week, winning by four strokes over Nicklaus with a 10-under par 270.

The victory was worth \$100,000, but more important, it gave him a 10-year exemption for all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events. Since he qualified for the World Series by virtue of his play on the South African Tour earlier in the year, his \$100,000 did not count in official earnings. Thus, his record only shows \$49,435 won in 1983.

The 1984 season was a solid one for Nick as he won over \$100,000 and he returned last year to win \$96,069. Although he did not contend for a title last year, Nick feels his time is coming.

"One of the most important things I've learned on TOUR is that it takes a long time to get your game into the kind of shape where you can play well regularly," he noted. "Everyone has to go through a three or four year probation period, but I'm looking forward to contending more often now."

Nick started in the game as an eight-year old caddy for his brother in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). He progressed rapidly as a player, and by the time he was 17, he had an invitation to compete in the Junior World tournament at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. "Everyone said I should go," he recalls, "so my mother and brother paid my way. They figured that if I didn't do well, I would get competitive golf out of my system."

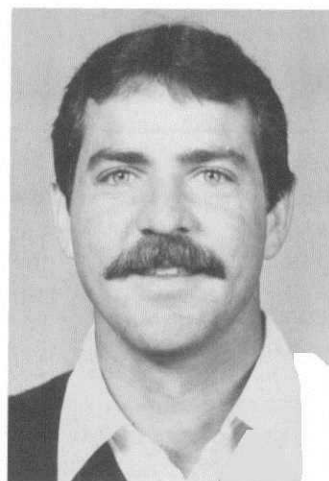
He fooled them. He not only played well, but he won. "From that point on, they were behind me 100 percent," Nick said.

He played on the South Africa and the European Tour as an amateur in 1975, and then went into the Rhodesian Air Force for the next two years. He was out in time to play on the South African Tour as a professional in the Fall of 1977. The next year, he was second in the Dutch Open.

In 1980, he said his game "took off." He won the Swiss Open and the South African Masters and finished second in four other South African events.

His greatest disappointment came at Royal Troon in Scotland in the 1982 British Open. He led by three strokes with six holes to play but dropped four shots on his way to the clubhouse, letting Tom Watson slip in with the victory.

Tom Purtzer will tell you that no matter what else he accomplishes in the game, it isn't likely to give the satisfaction he experienced when he won the 1984 Phoenix Open.

He has spent most of his life in the Phoenix area and through the final round at the Phoenix Country Club, there wasn't any doubt about who most of the thousands in the gallery wanted to win.

He won in rather spectacular fashion, too. On the par 5 18th hole, he put his second shot into a bunker on the right, but he played a brilliant explosion shot. The ball stopped about two feet from the cup. He made the putt for a birdie and a one-stroke victory over Corey Pavin.

It gave Tom a six-under par 65 for the sunny afternoon and a total of 16-under par 268.

It paved the way for his sixth straight \$100,000-plus year, although he says 1984 basically was a rebuilding year. "I had developed some bad habits," he said, "such as sliding over the ball instead of turning. I spend most of the year working on it."

Last year was not vintage-Purtzer. "I had my problems," he said, "in the scoring area, from 100 yards on in to the hole."

One of the longest drivers on TOUR, he has averaged well over 270 yards through each of the last five seasons. Over the years, some of his finest performances have been on the more difficult courses.

His first victory was at Riviera, for example, in the 1977 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

Tom got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball when we were eight or nine."

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

The next year, 1973, Tom won the Broadmoor Men's Invitational and also was named to the All-America Collegiate golf team. He turned pro not long after being graduated with a business degree.

Mike Reid enjoyed a rare treat in August of 1983 when he teamed with Bob Goalby for the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Park City, UT. This was a Senior PGA TOUR event, and the elder statesmen of the links were to choose a player from the regular TOUR.

Well, Mike and Bob teamed perfectly and they won by a stroke over the Billy Casper-Jim Nelford combination. While Mike collected \$99,135 in official money on the regular TOUR, he added another \$25,000 from the Shootout.

It was a privilege, you see, because this soft-spoken young man has been considered one of the finest players in the game without an official victory. Like Calvin Peete. Mike's key to success is keeping the ball in play and hitting a lot of greens.

He believes he can play well on any type of course, and he tries to model his game after the likes of Billy Casper and Gene Littler. "Week after week," he said, "when they were playing well, they always finished up high."

Two of the best weeks of his TOUR career came in September last year. He finished second in the B.C. Open, just one stroke in back of Joey Sindelar. He skipped the next two tournaments and then came back to tie Hal Sutton in the Southwest Golf Classic, only to see Sutton win it with a 30-foot birdie putt on the first extra hole. Nevertheless, he won \$75,600 in those two events.

Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Mike Brannan, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his TOUR card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978 Pensacola Open. He lost in a playoff to Mac McLendon.

In December of 1979, he took a major step. He was married, and ever since, he has said that Randolyn has played an important role in his success. Since then two daughters have been added to the close-knit family.

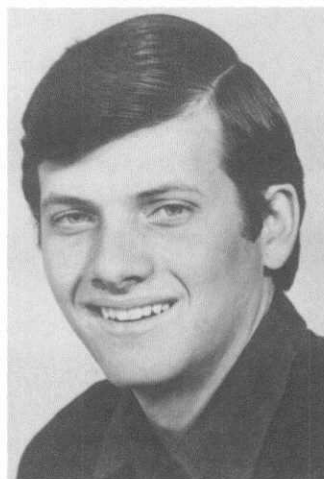

Jack Renner has enjoyed success all through his golf career. One of the reasons is because he always has set lofty goals and then worked tirelessly to meet them.

In 1981, he was having what he considered his most consistent year on TOUR as he headed for the Pleasant Valley-Jimmy Fund Classic. "I told my Dad that unless I won, though, people would think I was having a mediocre year."

A few days later, he had his victory, the second of his six-year career as he edged Scott Simpson by two strokes.

In the 1983 Hawaiian Open, he thought he had won for the third time on TOUR. He was one-stroke ahead of Isao Aoki of Japan as he sat in the scoring tent, checking his card. Aoki was in the left rough on the par five 18th hole, some 128 yards from the flagstick.

Then Jack heard the tremendous roar. "At first, I thought he must have hit it close and if he made the putt for a birdie, we would have a playoff." Instead, Aoki HOLED the pitching wedge shot for an eagle and the victory.

Jack had his reward in the Hawaiian Open the next year. He birdied four of the last seven holes—including the 18th—at the Waialae Country Club to tie Wayne Levi, and then won the title in a playoff. The next week, he was second in the Los Angeles Open and went on to his best money year, earning \$260,153.

He started on TOUR as a 20-year old and his first victory came in the 1977 Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic. His performances slipped slightly in 1980 after suffering mononucleosis early in the year. It was several months before he regained his full strength.

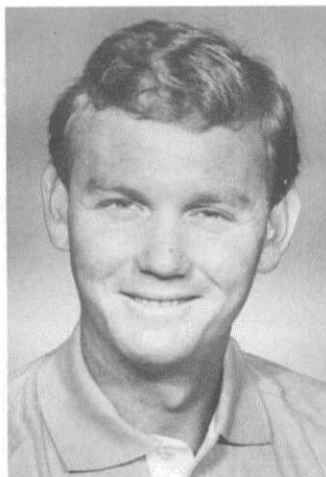
Jack is easily identified. Rail thin, he always wears a white cap, similar to the type Ben Hogan wore for years. However, Jack says he has always worn that style because it is lightweight, comfortable, and during his years of growing up around Palm Springs, "I needed something to protect my head from the sun."

As a youngster, he was the king of the junior tournaments in the San Diego area. He won such titles as the 1972 World Junior and the 1973 United States Junior. His short game always has been excellent, and he believes he refined it by playing so many par three courses as a youth.

During his school days, he chose not to play varsity golf because he felt he could progress more rapidly by working on his own game, rather than spending the time travelling to matches.

The Renners are an avid golf family. Sister Jane has been a part of the LPGA Tour and younger brother Jim is a professional. When one of them needs help, they seek out a member of the family.

Larry Rinker may have been the happiest runner-up on the PGA TOUR in 1984. He finished in that position to Bob Eastwood in the USF&G Classic in New Orleans.

"When the year started," he revealed, "I set a goal of winning at least \$45,000 for the year and making the list of top 125 money winners for my exemption. I accomplished that here today."

He collected \$43,200 in New Orleans, giving him more than \$54,000 at that point of the season and went on to have a splendid year, winning well over \$100,000.

But, as good as a year as it was, it paled by comparison to 1985. "In the first three months of the year," he said, "I already had won more than I had in any other single season."

A tie for second in the Bing Crosby Pro-Am and a solo third in the Tournament Players Championship provided the biggest checks.

"I'm finally learning what it takes to play well out here," he went on. "Each year gets a little better and I get more confidence."

The Rinkers have quite a golfing family. His brother Lee played on the TOUR in 1984. His sister Laura was a winner on the LPGA Tour in 1984 and, Kellii, who is the wife of Larry's brother Laine, also has played on the Ladies' Tour.

"We work with each other," Larry said. "We've all worked with Bob Toski and we all have a good knowledge of the game. We trade off ideas and pull for each other."

Larry started in the game at age six when his brother Laine started to take him to junior clinics. He played in his first Florida State junior tournament at age 12. He played through high school and at the University of Florida.

He then made an effort to obtain his PGA TOUR card, but didn't make it until his fourth try in the Spring of 1981. In the meantime, he played the mini-tours, and it was during the 1980 season, when he won six times, that he felt his game finally might be ready.

He admits he didn't play well during his first year on TOUR. His first national exposure came during the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, "I didn't fall apart," he said, "I played well and the last day, I played the last four holes in two-under par to tie for 15th place. That got me into the 1983 Masters."

He had a reasonably good year in 1983, but he played the final six holes in the Walt Disney World Classic in three-over par and dropped out of the top 125. He went back to the Qualifying School in the fall to try and improve his position and he finished in a tie for 39th.

After Loren Roberts put together four solid rounds in the 1984 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic, and finally finished in a tie for 10th place, he was convinced he belonged on the PGA TOUR.

Two months later at the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, after leading the tournament through the first three rounds, he not only knew he belonged, but was convinced winning was possible.

It wasn't his week to win, as a final-round 76 dropped him into a tie for fifth place. Nevertheless, his confidence level suddenly was moving onto a higher plateau.

When Loren first came out on the TOUR in 1981, he did so with little tournament experience. He has had to learn the hard way and it has been costly. He lost his playing privileges after the 1981 and 1983 seasons.

"I went to the Qualifying School six times, and I've succeeded at three of them" he said. "Now, I hope I never have to go through it again. It takes awhile on the TOUR to learn how to play your own game; to stay within yourself. There's also the intimidation factor, suddenly playing with and against all the players you've read about for years."

Loren didn't start to play the game seriously until he was about 16 years old. He played a lot of tennis and baseball in high school in San Luis Obispo, CA, but the golf coach convinced him to concentrate on golf.

He went on to Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo and played two years of varsity golf. Then, the school dropped the program.

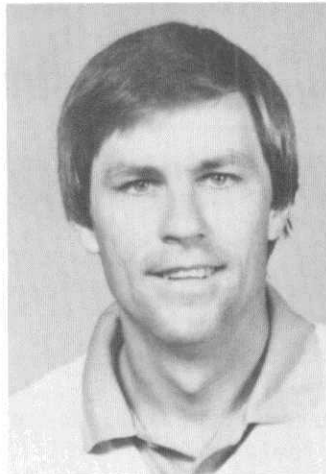
"That's when I started to work as an assistant pro at the San Luis Obispo Country Club," he said. "I didn't really decide to become a golf professional; it just sort of happened."

His dedication to the game paid off last year when he had his best season to date winning \$92,761. His best finish came at the Isuzu Andy Williams San Diego Open where he finished third missing the Woody Blackburn-Ron Streck playoff by a single shot.

He also had a T4 at the the Phoenix Open and a T5 at the Doral-Eastern Open, but he played poorly late in the season. Still, it was a good year for the Californian.

I played really well the first three months, but I was disappointed with the middle of the year," he said. "Still, I'm happy with my performance. As long as I get better each year I can't complain."

Through most of his golfing career, enthusiasm for the game has been one of the strong points for Bill Rogers. Not so, the last couple of years, he says, "but I'm going to have to get the old desire back if I want to start playing really well again."

He had it for a couple of weeks in 1983, and he tied for third in the Bay Hill Classic and went on to win the USF&G Classic in New Orleans the next. "I had a very positive attitude about everything those weeks," the popular Rogers said. "It was never the same after that."

He said last year was "just a continuation of 1984. I still plan to play a respectable schedule, but I've developed new interests, such as golf course design. My life doesn't revolve around playing the game as it once did."

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on TOUR, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open in Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

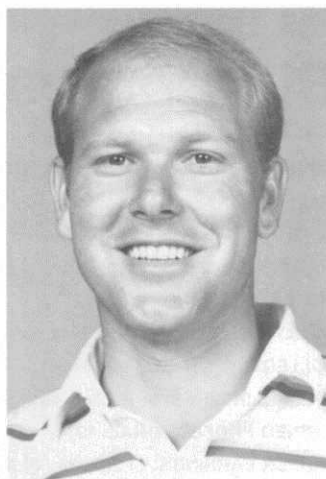
Always an aggressive player, he never could figure out why he didn't win more. Through his first six years, his only triumph was in the 1978 Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Bill started to play the game at age nine in Montgomery, AL, and was playing competitively by the time he was 13 and the family was living in Texarkana, Texas. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkan, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything."

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa. "Dad retired as a colonel and he still is a good player. He played in a lot of major Air Force tournaments when he was in the service."

Clarence Rose has been making steady progress since he joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1981 and believes his higher level of patience has led to better course management.

The result is he has improved his money winnings each year. He made a big jump in 1985, going over the \$100,000 mark for the first time in his four full years on TOUR.

He enjoyed the best week of his career at the Southern Open where he started with a 64 and added three more rounds in the 60s to finish in second place, just two strokes behind his good friend, Tim Simpson.

"My level keeps going up and up," he said. "I've been getting in contention more often and if I can keep knocking on the door, everything will be fine."

He has shown an ability to play the more difficult courses well. On the tough Glen Abbey course in the Canadian Open two years ago, he had a tie for fifth place which was his best finish until the Southern Open.

Three years ago, he tied for sixth place in the Western Open on the rugged Butler National layout and that was after bogeys on each of the last two holes. "I guess I was thinking about the money," he said of the experience, "and I've learned you can't do that."

Regarding course management, he said, "I do try to go for birdies and I make a lot of them, but I'm also trying to cut back on my mistakes." He has had well over 300 birdies in each of the last three years. He's also one of the longer drivers on TOUR.

Clarence's father was a "very good golfer," and he started him at about age 12. "I played baseball all the time, but once I started into golf, that ended my days in baseball," he said.

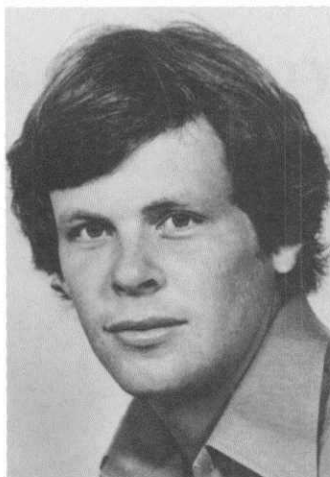
He won his first junior tournament at age 14, the North Carolina State Jaycees. He went on to win the North Carolina State Amateur, too.

He gained All-American status while at Clemson and in June of 1981, he entered the PGA TOUR School. He qualified easily, gaining a tie for fourth at Walt Disney World. "My last year at Clemson," he said, "I started to think about the possibility of being on the TOUR. I knew that's what I wanted, so I left school and spent about eight months just getting ready for it."

Until he started on TOUR, he played from right to left, but he changed his game over and now favors the fade.

He constantly checks his weekly statistics, and through those numbers, he believes he is better able to diagnose his strengths and weaknesses.

When Bill Sander joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1978, he thought "here we go. This is going to be fun."

He had won the U. S. Amateur Championship the summer before at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles. At age 19, he was one of the youngest in modern times to do so. The next year, he played on the Walker Cup and World Amateur Cup teams.

He did miss in his first attempt to obtain his TOUR card in the Fall of 1977 but made it easily the next Spring.

"My first tournament," he recalls vividly, "was the Western Open. I played beautifully and on the last day, I was paired with Andy Bean. Andy won the tournament and I won a nice check. I thought it was great.

"The next week in Milwaukee, I played well again and was one-under par after 35 holes but I was shocked to discover I had missed the cut. The next week, I shot a 69 in the Monday qualifier for the Quad Cities Open and didn't make it.

"That's when I said to myself, 'Welcome to the TOUR'."

The years that followed were not kind to Bill. During his first six years, his best season was 1980 when he won \$13,644. It was a little better in 1984 as he earned \$36,357 but still finished 131st on the money list.

Because of his ranking, his first start in 1985 was the Doral-Eastern Open at the end of February. He finished 81st and won only \$712. He was able to make five more starts through the U. S. Open in mid-June but he never went beyond 36 holes.

After the Open, Bill and his wife Lisa went to Charleston, SC to visit friends. "We played a few times and one day I said I was just going to go out and play like I used to play; get over the ball, pick the target and hit the ball. Don't worry about the mechanics of the swing."

On the Tuesday evening before the St. Jude Memphis Classic, he received a call saying he was in the tournament. Bill made the quick trip and, without a practice round, played in his new, relaxed manner and shot a seven-under par 65. He went on to tie for seventh place. The next week in the Canadian Open, he tied for fourth for his best-ever TOUR finish.

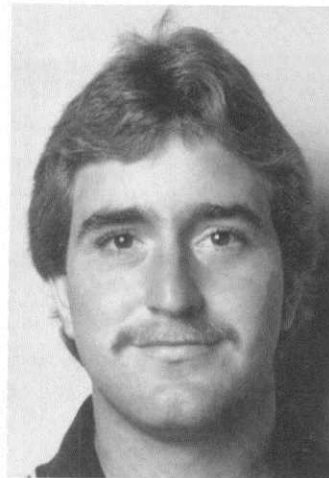
He used his new approach the rest of the year, playing by feel and not worrying about the technical aspects of the game. The end result was his best year, by far.

Bill started to play at age 13 when he was caddying at Inglewood Country Club in Seattle. In high school, he went from shooting in the high 70s as a sophomore to consistently breaking par as a junior. He won three straight Seattle City Amateur titles, the first as a 17-year old.

During his early years, Billy Derrickson, who was the head pro at Inglewood, helped him the most. When he came on TOUR, he started to listen to suggestions from everyone. It took him until last Spring to realize he had to play his own game.

When everything is going right, he prefers to play right to left. "I need to work on my driving accuracy," he said, adding that his iron play, plus chipping and putting, are the strongest parts of his game.

Gene Sauers had to compete on the PGA TOUR the hard way last year—as a member of the 126-150 money list group. Still the youngster from Savannah, GA, was able to parlay his opportunities to play into a fully exempt status for this year.

When Gene joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1983, he was the youngest man on the circuit and he struggled early in 1984 as he often did not get to play during the early part of the schedule.

Once the two-time Georgia State Open champion got his chance to play consistently towards the end of the season, he made the most of his chances.

His steady play down the stretch was highlighted by a T5 at Pensacola in the final event of the season. However, his \$36,537 left him about \$1,200 short of making the top 125 money winners and put him in a position of being well down on the priority rankings for 1985.

Was he discouraged? Not really.

"It was frustrating not to make it in 1984, but it was my first year and I thought I did well," said Sauers. "I was a little disappointed, but I figured I was the youngest guy out here and I was doing pretty well. I knew I had played well at the end of the year."

The 1985 season started out in similar fashion as the former Georgia Southern star didn't get to play often in the early going. In mid-season, though, Sauers got his chance to play regularly and capitalized with a strong three-week stretch that saw him finish in a T16 at Quad Cities, a T4 at Buick and a T11 at the B. C. Open. His check for \$18,000 at Buick was the largest of his career and propelled him into the top 125 money winners, a position he would not relinquish.

"I think I did very well to make the top 125 after being down on the priority list and playing as little as I did," said a pleased Sauers.

"It was tough early in the year to sit around waiting and watching everyone on TV and wishing I were playing."

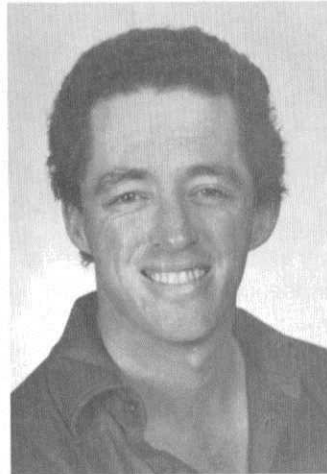
Gene started in the game at age nine when he would tag along with his father and brother out to the golf course on the weekends.

"They'd bring along an extra club and I'd hit it around," Sauers recalls. "My brother was a good golfer (played collegiately at Columbus College) and I'd go out to practice with him and beat balls around."

"Joining the TOUR has been one of my goals since I was about 13 years old," he added. "I've accomplished that and now I've made the top 125. I'll just have to go on from here."

Still one of the youngest players on TOUR, this soft spoken young man from Georgia looks like he has a very promising future indeed.

If there ever was an award given for perseverance, surely Tony Sills would be a prime candidate.

He attempted to qualify for the PGA TOUR six times before he made it at the Tournament Players Club in the Fall of 1982. Twice, he remembers vividly, he missed in the finals by two shots. "That just told me I wasn't ready," he says.

"All through those years," he continued, "I was living on a dream. Playing on the TOUR was something I knew I was going to do. Now, I know dreams do come true."

Even his first year should serve as a lesson for those who are easily discouraged. Tony tied for 30th place in his first start, the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. That was a great week because he is from Los Angeles, so many of his pals were there to see him perform.

In his next 10 tournaments, through the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic, he failed to survive the 36-hole cut. There he was, through the first of June and with only one paycheck to show for his efforts.

In his last 15 starts, though, he only missed three times and it was the third-place in the Texas Open that assured him of a position among the leading 125 money winners. He had rounds of 67, 64, 69 and 67.

He returned last year to have his best season yet winning a total of \$15,255. He had six top 10 finishes and held the lead heading into the final round of the USF&G Classic, but struggled to a 73 and ended up in a T4.

"I wasn't generally pleased with the year, but I think I became a better player," said Sills. "My goal is to win and then win another. I'm not out here to make checks, I'm out here to win."

His first exposure to the game was as a five-year old. "My father started to play for health reasons. The doctor encouraged him because of the exercise he needed, so I started to follow him around."

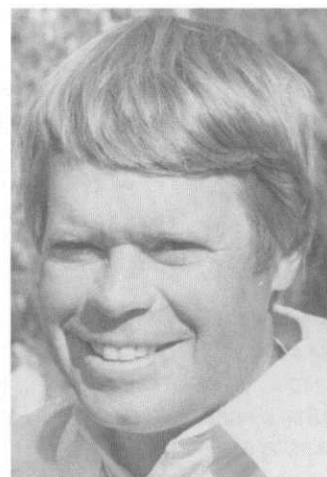
During those years when he was attempting to get on the TOUR, he said, "I had a lot of different jobs. I stayed at home with my parents to keep expenses down, but I did everything from delivering pizzas to grinding clubs in Jerry Barber's golf factory."

"I even worked for a beer distributor, but my best job was at the Los Angeles Country Club. I worked part time on the driving range, so that I could have a half day to practice. During those years, I lived on practically nothing money-wise. I was determined to see this thing through."

He has had to overcome serious physical problems even to play the game, so serious, in fact, that many others would have turned and gone in another direction.

When he is playing well, he prefers a slight draw. "I'm not long off the tee," he said, "but I've always been pretty accurate. My putting needs to improve and it has improved."

There are two sides to the Jim Simons story. While he has enjoyed fine success on the PGA TOUR, winning three times through the 1985 campaign, a new career continues to blossom.

He also is a second vice-president and financial consultant with Shearson/Lehman/American Express and since 1980, has been spending more and more time in the brokerage business. He has specialized in managed money, using the best people in a particular product area. The majority of his time now is spent studying equity fund managers and computerized managed commodity programs.

His two most productive years on the TOUR came in 1981 and 1982 when he earned more than \$100,000 each year and one of his more important victories came in 1982 when he overtook Craig Stadler the last day of the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and won by two strokes.

It was there he revealed he is "legally blind" with proper corrective lenses. At the Crosby, he wore two contacts over the left eye—a soft lens against the eye and a hard lens over the soft one—to correct vision and astigmatism.

Jim's initial victory was in the 1977 First NBC-New Orleans Open and then he won the 1978 Memorial Tournament in a rather suspenseful style. Five times in the last seven holes, he saved par with one-putts; and, at the final hole, he made a 21-footer for par to win by one.

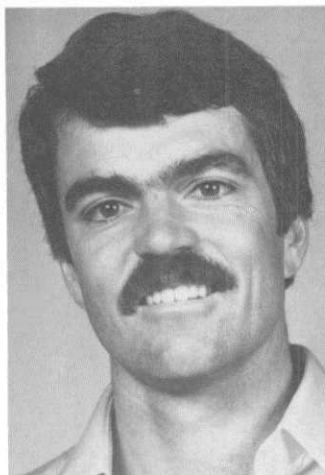
He has lost three tournaments in playoffs and one was in 1984 to John Mahaffey in the Bob Hope Classic. A shoulder injury at the Los Angeles Open put him on the sidelines for nearly four months.

Jim Simons will be the first to say that his early years on the PGA TOUR were not up to expectations. He probably won't mention, however, that he was hampered with physical ailments. He had tendonitis in his left wrist, but more painful was his left shoulder which was diagnosed as a "looseness in the joint—a minor dislocation."

Simons was graduated from the Fall 1972 PGA TOUR Qualifying School and did not have an opportunity to compete in many events. During his first year he was in considerable pain, mainly, it developed, because his injury had not yet been diagnosed properly.

Jim's father started him in golf at Butler, Pa., Country Club at the age of nine. He started competition at the age of 13 and his progress was rapid. He first enrolled at the University of Houston but, after a year, transferred to Wake Forest. He was on the 1971 Walker Cup team and remained overseas for the 1971 British Amateur, reaching the final round where he lost to Steve Melnyk.

Scott Simpson is one of those players who quietly goes about his business and lets his golf game do the talking. And, when his game starts talking everyone notices.

Such was the case at the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic in June of 1984. Scott stayed close to the lead through the first three rounds and then played one of the great rounds of his career. He shot a six-under par 65 in the heat and humidity and won by five strokes.

It was his only victory of the year, but he played very well for most of the season. "I started a little slow," he said, "and then decided to work on the mental part of the game. At that point, everything started to come together. I was more relaxed on the course."

He felt the breakthrough came in Japan in late April of 1984 when he won the Chunichi Crowns title. He came back to the U.S. and proceeded to have his finest year by far.

He said his first victory on the TOUR came as something of a surprise. It was on the tough Butler National course in the 1980 Western Open. He took the lead after the second day and never was headed, as he posted four rounds of par or better.

"My game was improving," he recalls, "and I knew if I continued to improve, I eventually would win. All of a sudden, I made the big move and won. Yes, I was surprised."

He played exceptionally well in the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, finishing in a tie for second with Brad Bryant, two strokes in back of Jerry Pate. He was one-stroke behind when the last round started, but seemed to fall out of contention with three first nine bogeys the last afternoon. However, he came on very strong to birdie each of the last three holes.

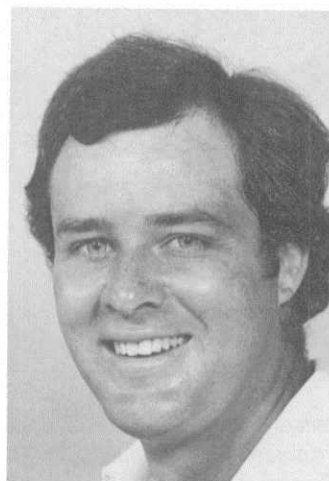
Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the TOUR's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the Fall of 1978.

Scott started in the game as a caddy at age nine for his father, a scratch handicapper in the San Diego area in those days. He was 10 when he entered his first tournament and in the 10-and-under division, Jack Renner was the victor, but Scott tied his brother for fifth. He knew then that he liked the competition.

There may never be another week on the PGA TOUR for Tim Simpson to compare with the one he experienced during the Southern Open last October. It was the week when he took the final step and won his first tournament after eight years of trying.

Tim has always had the talent to succeed—and he has been successful—but if there was any one thing that kept him from the winner's circle, it probably was his putting. For several years, his mental approach was found lacking on occasions, too.

A keen student of psychology, he has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. In fact, they have become close friends.

It was Rotella who told him, "from my observations and from what I've heard from others, the one missing link in your game now is your putting." He stressed the need for Tim to relax more. "You get over the ball," he said, "and you grind on every one. You're too intense."

Tim grins when he tells the story. "And you know," he adds, "Bob was right."

Certainly Tim has all the shots. He is regarded by his peers as one of the better ball strikers on TOUR. He plays with the aggressiveness of a Lanny Wadkins and the tenacity of a Hale Irwin. Just as important, he has never been afraid of hard work. He'll spend as much time on the practice tee as anyone.

During the week of the Southern Open at the Green Island Country Club, the hard work and dedication paid off. His shotmaking was superb. In fact, after he shot 12-under par 64-64—128 the first two days, he said, "In the 22 years I've been playing golf, I've never hit the ball better. I haven't missed a shot in two days."

He held the Southern Open lead through the third and fourth rounds, holding off the challenge of Clarence Rose. When it was over, he said, "I've never been in a tournament and in a position to win, as I was today, and had the inner-peace through the last round that I had here. It's something I can't explain."

Tim's father, Jack, started him in the game as a seven-year old and he went on to win junior championships of Atlanta and Georgia. "I owe a lot to my father," he said. "He worked hard so I could afford to play and he has always stood behind me. He has been the guiding force in my life."

Another who helped to mold his game is Art Kraft Jr., the pro at the Ansley Country Club in Atlanta. "I've been working with Art since I was 15-years old," Tim said.

Tim went on to the University of Georgia and earned all-Southeastern Conference and All-America honors. He won the Southern Amateur in 1976. In the Spring of 1977, he earned his player's card but only collected \$2,778 through the end of the year. He upped his earnings to \$38,714 for his first full year in 1978.

His game started to blossom two years ago when he compiled six top 10 finishes and earned \$157,082. Among his strong finishes were a tie for second in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and a tie for third in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic. Before many of his hometown friends, he shot 68-67 for the last two rounds at the Atlanta Country Club.

Those who know Tim also know there are two other people who helped to turn his career around, his wife, Cathy, and son, Christopher. "There isn't any way I can tell you what they have meant to me. They gave me a purpose to my life," he said proudly.

Winning a tournament was Joey Sindelar's goal last year on the PGA TOUR. He achieved his second year goal and then went one further.

"I was on line with my basic goals until I won the B.C. Open," Sindelar said. "Winning at home made 1985 into a special year. That win put me over the goals I had established for myself."

When he talks of his golf game and his goals, he always says, "we." He'll tell you, "We talked it over and decided . . ." The other party in the "we" is his father, the man who first put a club in Joey's hands when he was six years old. He's still the man Joey goes to when he needs help on almost anything.

"My Dad always stressed that if anything is worth doing, it's worth doing right. He's always been behind everything I've done. When I was playing basketball in high school, and wanted some extra practice, he would make certain we could get in the gym at night."

Joe, Sr., a postal employee in Horseheads for 33 years, was a scratch handicapper a few years ago, Joey proudly points out.

Through high school, Joey also knew that if he was going to go to college, it would have to be on a scholarship, so he worked extra hard on his golf game. There were offers, but he decided on Ohio State because "I had met a few of their players when I would go to amateur tournaments, and they were really nice to me. And, I wanted to go somewhere close to home where they played major college football and basketball and had other good programs."

"The fact that Jack Nicklaus, Tom Weiskopf and Ed Sneed had played for Ohio State helped to influence me, too," he added with a smile.

He was devastating for the Buckeyes. He won 10 collegiate events and in 1981, he won the Big Ten championship by 12 strokes. He was named Ohio State's Athlete-of-the-Year in 1981.

Along the way, he managed to sweep the New York State titles — Junior, Amateur and Open championships.

The PGA TOUR was his goal, though, and he made it through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1983, finishing in a tie for third.

He was successful right from the start of 1984 winning nearly \$18,000 on the West Coast swing. His first start in Florida was the Honda Classic and he finished fifth, collecting another \$20,000.

He went on to win over \$100,000 in his rookie campaign, but he rocketed to stardom last year when he won twice and picked up \$282,762 to finish 12th on the money list.

His first win came at the Greater Greensboro Open when he holed an eight-foot par-saving putt on the 72nd hole to win by one and then later in the year he won again at the B. C. Open edging Mike Reid for the title in front of his hometown fans.

The personable Sindelar looks to be a player with no limitations and the sky is the limit for this young golfer.

When Jeff Sluman was introduced to the game of golf at an early age, he had no goals or aspirations to be a professional golfer. In fact, he didn't decide to become professional until much later in his life.

Started in the game by his family at age four, Sluman didn't even think about turning pro until after his senior year at Florida State University. After a solid collegiate career that saw him win the Metro Conference title, Sluman opted for a career in golf.

"I didn't really decide to turn pro until I graduated from Florida State," remembered Sluman. "I had played well at FSU and had qualified for the U.S. Open as an amateur, so I decided to give it a try. I didn't want to be 35 and wonder what if, so I turned pro."

Sluman turned professional in 1980 and in the Fall of 1982 he earned his PGA TOUR card. However, he won only \$13,643 in 1983 and finished 171st on the money list and lost his playing privileges.

After sitting out the 1984 season, Sluman returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984 and posted rounds of 74-74-69-70-74-72—433 to finish 23rd and regain his player's card.

The start of the 1985 season was a slow one for the Rochester, NY, native, but at the Greater Greensboro Open, his fortunes changed. He led the field through 36-holes and eventually finished in a tie for fifth picking up the largest check of his career, \$13,560.

Approximately one month later, Sluman demolished the Killearn G&CC course to win the Tallahassee Open on the Tournament Players Series with a score of 19-under par 269. During that tournament he fired three rounds of 65 and beat Gary Player and former FSU teammate Kenny Knox by one stroke.

The win was worth \$36,000 to Sluman, but it did something much more important for him—it gave him the confidence he needed.

"After leading the GGO and winning on the TPS, I gained a little more confidence in my abilities," said Sluman. "I found that I felt a little more comfortable on the weekends—not totally at ease, but much more comfortable."

"We had a good field at Tallahassee and when I played well the next week, it just had a snowball effect on my game," he added. "I'd like to try and regain that feeling of confidence."

Sluman went on in 1985 to have several other strong finishes including a T5 at the Southwest Golf Classic and a T7 at the Kemper Open and easily kept his playing card by winning \$100,523 and finishing 78th on the 1985 Official Money List.

It would seem that the young man from New York has found a home on the PGA TOUR for many years to come.

Mike Smith found it hard to believe. He had just finished second in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational—thanks to a last-day 66—and his reward was a check for \$102,600. That was more than he had won in a lifetime on the PGA TOUR.

"What it did," he said, "was let me buy a home and lead a more normal life."

A month later, he finished fifth in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic and went on to have a most profitable season; one that he thought was possible but not certain he would ever attain. After spending a lot of years travelling around the country on the mini-tour circuit, he knows now he has found a home—on the PGA TOUR.

His first real success on the main TOUR came in the 1984 Byron Nelson Classic. He finished in a tie for sixth place and that was the cornerstone around which he built a good year. He finished 116th on the money list and thus was exempt for last year.

"That tournament turned my whole year around," he said. "It let me know I could play out here." Later in the year, he tied for eighth place in the Bank of Boston Classic.

"I got rid of my duck hook," he said, and that's what led to his improved play. "I could play well for 15 holes but hit duck hooks on the other three and took double bogeys. Now, if anything, I fade the ball."

Mike started to play golf at age 12. "I was visiting my grandmother in the hospital in Selma (AL). When I was coming out, I saw a couple of friends of mine playing golf on the course across the street. So, I went over and asked if I could play along."

He was in his first competition as a 14-year old and went on to win the Alabama State Junior title twice. He also won the State Jaycee Junior title twice and also the Dixie Junior Championship.

Bud Burns, the head professional at Selma Country Club, has helped him the most through the years, but when he went to Brevard College in Florida for two years, Floyd Horgan, the coach there, and John Redman, worked on refining his game.

"After that, I went on the mini-tours," he said. "I tried to get my PGA TOUR card six-or-seven times, but didn't make it until the Spring of 1980."

He added, "I like every course we play on the TOUR, but I suppose Hattiesburg might be my favorite (site of the Deposit Guaranty Classic). I've lost twice there in playoffs (to Lance Ten Broeck in 1984 and to Tom Jones in 1982)."

During his early not-so-successful years on the TOUR, he said he spent too much time sight-seeing instead of paying attention to his game. Hopefully, he said, that part's behind him now.

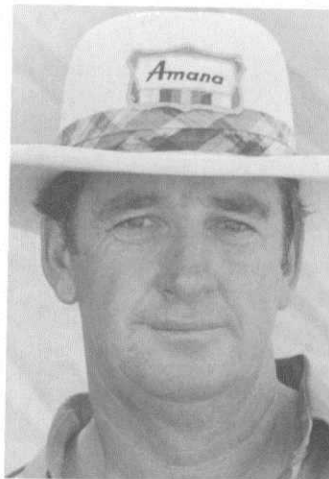

J.C. Snead has been known for years as one of the better shot-makers on the TOUR and, as a result, he has enjoyed considerable success. More-and-more these days his name also is being mentioned as one of the better "teachers" in the game. You hear more players who say they went to J. C. for help and he gives of his time willingly.

Those who know J. C. well, know him as a fellow with a great sense of humor and a heart as big as all-outdoors. However, with a touch of brusqueness and a sly smile, he'll deny it all.

He managed two top 10 finishes last year and the year before, he finished third in the Honda Classic, one stroke out of the Bruce Lietzke-Andy Bean playoff. He may not be as long off the tee as he once was and may not hole as many putts, but he still has the game to challenge at any time.

Certainly one of the game's more colorful people, J. C. has a reputation of occasionally shying away from interviews, but those who follow the game closely know that once they take a few minutes to chat with him, they will be rewarded with one of the better stories of the day.

He has a wonderful sense of humor. Several years ago, he decided he wanted to go by his full name, Jesse Carlyle. After a few weeks of not playing well, he informed everyone he was going back to using J. C. because Jesse Carlyle hasn't been playing worth a damn."

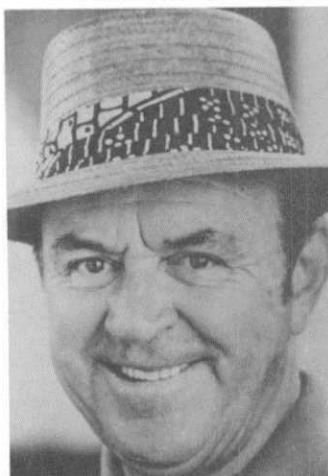
One of his strongest loves is hunting, and he will spend hours in search of game, especially around his home area of Hot Springs, Va. J. C. and his wife Sue also have a home at Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla.

In 1978, when his earnings dipped to \$63,561, he suffered a broken bone in his wrist in a farming accident in Hot Springs and was off the TOUR for seven weeks. It happened shortly after he tied for second in the U. S. Open.

Jesse Carlyle, although constantly mentioned as the nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, stands on his own performance record. He was a superb athlete in other sports while growing up in Hot Springs, and at one time, sought a career in baseball. He was in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a career in 1964.

He worked for head pro Charlie Beverage at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, N.Y. while twice failing to pass the PGA TOUR Qualifying Test. It was a total of four years before he earned his card in 1968. Following three so-so years, J. C. burst into prominence in 1971 by winning twice in a three-week period, at Tucson and Doral, immediately before and after the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

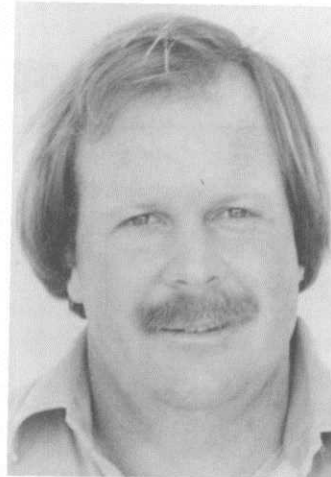

Whatever Craig Stadler accomplishes during the rest of his career, his followers will fondly remember 1982. It was the year he broke away from the field and went from being a good player to a superstar.

He won four times, starting the year by capturing the first event, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He won two of the year's more significant events, the Masters Tournament in a playoff over Dan Pohl and the World Series of Golf in a playoff over Raymond Floyd. His other victory was in the Kemper Open by an impressive seven strokes.

He won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner, as he earned \$446,462. Until this past year, only Tom Watson and Mark O'Meara had won more in a single season. He said there were two keys to his improved play. First of all, he drove the ball better than ever, sacrificing some distance for accuracy and, secondly, he putted much better.

The combination has worked well for him the last two years. He won the Byron Nelson Classic in 1984 with a seven-under par 64 in the third round as the key. He also finished third three times, including in the Tournament Players Championship.

Last year, he led the Bob Hope Classic through the third and fourth rounds but Lanny Wadkins tied him the last afternoon with a 65 and then Lanny won the playoff with a birdie on the fifth extra hole. He also finished second in the Hawaiian Open and tied for second in the Greater Greensboro Open. It's interesting to note that he was 47-under par in the Hope and Hawaiian tournaments, yet finished second twice.

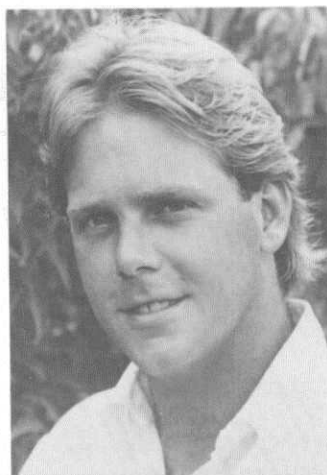
Although he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1976, he didn't get his first victory until the Bob Hope Desert Classic in January of 1980. Later in the year, he added the Greater Greensboro Open title to his laurels.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U. S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo. "I just made everything that week," he said.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice for the Trojans in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team.

Craig first played the game at age five with the assistance of his father and really became interested at age "eight or nine." Along the way, he won such titles as the World Junior Championship, the San Diego City Amateur and the Southern California Interscholastic.

It was an amusing incident at the time. When Payne Stewart started to walk into the News Center at the 1983 Walt Disney World Classic, the security guard stopped him, informing him caddies were not permitted inside unless invited.

As usual, Payne was wearing his plus-fours and cap, which also happens to be the traditional garb of the Disney caddies. By Sunday night, the security people knew all about Payne Stewart. He was the victor by two strokes over Nick Faldo and Mark McCumber. It was the second victory of his career—the first being the 1982 Quad Cities Open.

In his pastel plus-fours, argyle socks and cap, Payne certainly has become the most colorful dresser on TOUR. It has reached the point where people now ask him what he is going to wear each day.

He enjoyed his best money year by far in 1984 and, although he did not win, he was a consistent challenger. His best opportunity came in the Colonial National Invitation where he lost in a playoff to Peter Jacobsen. His \$288,795 for the year was the most money ever won by a player without a victory at the time.

Last year, he was leading the Byron Nelson Classic by two strokes with one hole to play, but he suffered a double bogey and dropped into a tie with Bob Eastwood. He then lost the playoff.

Payne always knew he wanted to be a professional golfer. His father introduced him to the game at the age of four. Bill Stewart was an accomplished player and he was proud of his son's accomplishments.

They were very close. So, last year was a difficult one for Payne as his father died of cancer. "He was a big, big influence on my career," Payne says.

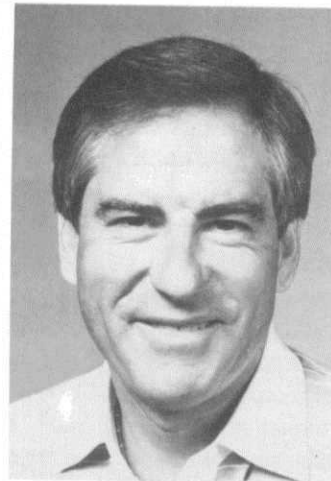
Payne's golfing career progressed in an orderly fashion through junior programs, high school and finally to a golf scholarship at Southern Methodist University. While there, Payne won several collegiate events, including the 1979 Co-Championship of the Southwest Conference. Quite simply, he was on a roll when he finished school, and he felt confident he was ready to conquer the PGA TOUR.

As so many others before him, Payne failed at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979.

A two-year stint in Asia (1980-81) proved to be just what the doctor ordered.

With victories in the 1981 Indian and Indonesian Opens under his belt, plus his marriage to an Australian girl he met while in Malaysia, Payne returned to the U. S. to attend the 1981 Spring Q School. This time he was successful, and it was off to the "main event."

For many years, Dave Stockton has been one of golf's finest good-will ambassadors. He is in constant demand for clinics and exhibitions because of his knowledge of the game and his smooth rapport with the golfing public.

Last year, he did 64 corporate outings and they helped to keep him sharp enough to finish second in the Seattle-Everett Open on the Tournament Players Series.

During the late 1960s and through the 1970s, he also was one of the finest players in the world and the fact that he won two PGA Championships will attest to that. For nearly two decades, he has been regarded as one of the premier putters and short-game players in the game.

Dave is a descendant of a Declaration of Independence signer from New Jersey. He started to play golf seriously at age 17, following an injury to his back in a surfing accident. Dave, just as his father Gail, did, went to the University of Southern California and became captain of the golf team.

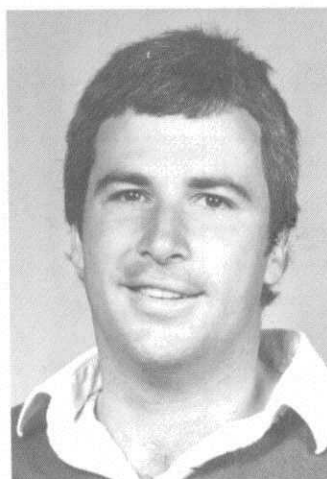
He turned professional after leaving school, but struggled for three years before winning the prestigious Colonial National Invitation in 1967. He was invited to the NIT as a Past Champions' choice.

While he has won a total of 11 times, his greatest triumphs have been in two PGAs. The first was in 1970 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, as he outdueled Arnold Palmer down the stretch. He won another in 1976 at the Congressional Country Club, holing a par-saving 13-footer on the final hole to edge Ray Floyd and Don January.

His most productive year was 1974 as he won three times. A brilliant 235-yard three wood shot on the difficult 18th hole at Riviera Country Club set up his one-stroke margin over Sam Snead and John Mahaffey at the Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open. He also won the Quad Cities Open and the Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. After the latter, he received a phone call from then-President Gerald Ford. He was just leaving the press tent when the call came.

The last few years, he is receiving more enjoyment that ever watching his two sons, David and Ronald, competing in junior events.

Maybe his surge to the top actually started late in 1984 when he was awesome in the LaJet Classic in Abilene, TX. He had a six-stroke lead after three rounds and finally won by two over Mark O'Meara.

On his way to the coveted Arnold Palmer award as the leading money winner last year, he won \$90,000 in his playoff victory over Peter Jacobsen in the Honda Classic; then \$171,000 in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational; and \$86,507 in his Canadian Open triumph.

In 1982, Curtis set a TOUR record for the most money won in a calendar year without a victory. He earned \$263,378, but Payne Stewart set a new standard in 1984. Curtis had 12 top 10 finishes that year and in one stretch late in the season, he finished fourth or better five straight weeks.

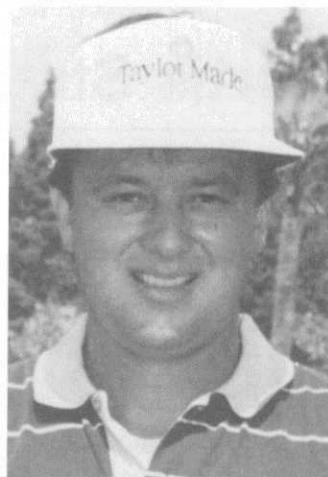
Curtis has been a winner in the game for most of his life, starting back in his days as a junior golfer in Virginia. He started to play at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va.

His father passed away when Curtis was 14, and then, as Curtis explained, "Chandler Harper, the Hall of Famer, became my teacher."

His first taste of success came when he won the Virginia State Junior at age 15 and he won his first important title in 1973, the Southeastern Amateur. However, he said his biggest thrill came when he won the 1975 Eastern Amateur. "My father won the very first Eastern in 1957, so that had special meaning to me."

Curtis carried such titles as the Western Amateur and the National Collegiate with him when he first attempted to earn his PGA TOUR card in the Fall of 1976, but he missed. He came back in the Spring of 1977 and made it.

The holder of the all-time PGA TOUR record for the lowest two consecutive rounds ever shot is neither Nicklaus nor Hogan nor Snead nor Palmer nor Trevino. It's Ron Streck, and he did it in winning his first title, the 1978 San Antonio-Texas Open.

He was close to losing his card at the end of his second year on TOUR until he shot 63-62 for a 125. There have been six times in the TOUR's glorious past when 126s have been posted, twice by Sam Snead.

Ron has had two other 62's during his TOUR career, and one came in the third round of the 1981 Michelob-Houston Open at The Woodlands. It gave him a three-day total of 15-under par 198 and a two-stroke lead over Hale Irwin and Jerry Pate.

Then the rains came to stay, through Sunday and even Monday, so the tournament was made official after the 54 holes and Ron had the victory. He went on to complete a productive year, winning \$114,895, by far his finest.

He was in a position to win for a third time at the 1985 Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open. He shot a 19-under par 269 at the Torrey Pines Club to tie Woody Blackburn, but he lost the playoff when he bogeyed the fourth extra hole.

He also was fourth in the Bob Hope Classic, which prompted him to observe, "I had my best start ever on the West Coast and, moneywise, it was my best year. It could have been better, but it was a good year."

It was a difficult year physically for him in 1983. In December of 1982, he cracked two ribs skiing in Colorado, and missed the first month of the schedule. Then, just before the Masters Tournament, he suffered a torn cartilage in his knee in a pick-up basketball game and was off another month.

"I've gained a lot of experience in the years I've been on TOUR," he said, "and I was able to salvage a decent year in 1983 because of that experience."

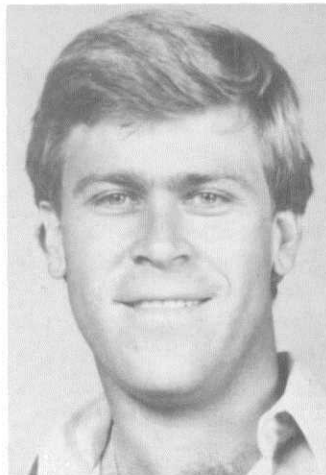
Streck's been involved in golf almost since he was old enough to walk. "My Dad was a member of a country club at home, and he started me out when I was four years old," he recalls.

"I liked the game and continued playing right through high school, but I've never had a golf lesson in my life. . . I guess you could say I taught myself."

Next came a golf scholarship at the University of Tulsa, and by the end of his freshman year, Ron knew he'd like to give the TOUR a try when he finished school.

He will tell you that the last round of his victory march in the San Antonio-Texas Open was the most exciting of his career. It also is interesting to note that he was a two-time all-state high school basketball player, and far more colleges wanted him for that sport than for golf.

It was a special year for Hal Sutton in several ways. First of all, he won twice in 1985 and re-established himself as one of the superstars of the game. The victories came in playoffs over David Ogren in the St. Jude Memphis Classic and over Mike Reid in the Southwest Golf Classic. And, in early October, he was married to the former Denee Miller.

Even though Hal enjoyed a good year in 1984, he learned how fine the line is between winning and challenging. He didn't win but he did have 11 top 10 finishes. "I couldn't make the one putt at the right time," he said.

He also had a tough act to follow, considering the great success he enjoyed as a rookie in 1982 and then the follow-up the next year. Early in 1983, when he was asked what he could do for an encore after his splendid efforts as a first-year player, he always replied:

"I would like to continue to improve my game, win a major championship and be the year's leading money winner." And, he did.

The handsome young man from Louisiana won two of the more prestigious tournaments in the game—the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA Championship. He was the No. 1 money winner for most of the year, and finally edged Fuzzy Zoeller for the honor with \$426,668.

As a rookie in 1982, he had eight top 10 finishes en route to a \$237,434 campaign, and his first victory as a professional came in the season's final event, the Walt Disney World Classic. He turned back the challenge of Bill Britton in that one, with a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

Although his father did not play the game, Hal said he always was the "moving force behind me." A friend of his father's sent him a set of clubs when he was 11, and that was the start. "I played some team sports, but it was discouraging because I never seemed to be on a good team. I decided I wanted to win or lose on my own ability and that's why I chose golf."

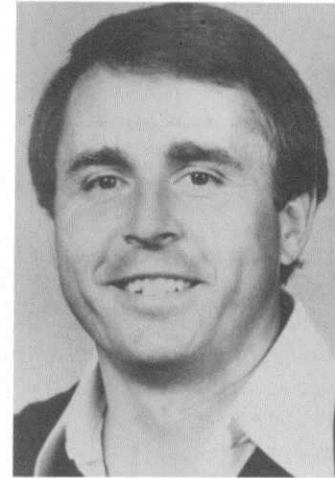
As a 12- and 13-year old, he would take his father's cart and "sometimes play 72 holes a day." He said he only had mediocre success until his junior year at Centenary College, although he did win the Louisiana State Junior title in 1974.

Hal won the 1980 U. S. Amateur at the Country Club of North Carolina and was named Golf Magazine College Player of the Year, also in 1980. At the time, there was talk that he might forever remain an amateur.

"I went to work for my Dad and would go as long as a month without playing at all," he said. "When I did try to play, I didn't have any feel. I had put so much into the game to that point, I felt it was senseless to give it all up. I could always go back into business, but in later years, I couldn't go back to the game at the level I wanted. So I decided to turn professional and go on TOUR."

Now, the business back home will have to wait a long, long time.

The Doug Tewell story is one of the more inspiring on the PGA TOUR. Early in 1979, he came within a putt or two of leaving the TOUR entirely. Today, he is one of the game's better players.

He knows it has taken a lot of hard work and mental discipline, but says it is difficult to pinpoint all the reasons for the drastic improvement. He became a \$100,000 player for the fourth time last year.

Doug said he "will remember forever" his first round in the PGA Championship at Cherry Hills Country Club last August. He shot a course record 64 and went on to a respectable tie for 12th place.

It was part of another good year when his best finish was a tie for second in the Phoenix Open and he had three other top 10 finishes.

"I've become a consistently-good money winner," he said, "mainly because of my straight driving and I'm hitting a lot of greens in regulation."

Unfortunately, he continues to be bothered by a bad back and he had more problems with it in 1985 than in previous years. He said it's a "herniated disc."

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won twice, in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff over Jerry Pate; and in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. In the latter event, he was 10-strokes behind after two rounds but closed brilliantly with 65-67 to win by one over Tom Kite.

Doug started to play golf at about age 12 and his first teacher was Labron Harris, Sr. at the Lakeside club in Stillwater, Okla. The Tewell family had a membership there.

Doug and Mark Hayes were classmates and golf teammates through Stillwater High and Oklahoma State. "I was a steady player all through school, but I didn't think I was good enough to play on the TOUR, so I chose to be a club professional," he said. Incidentally, he was the runner-up three times in the Oklahoma State Amateur, losing once to Mark.

He worked as an assistant professional for two years and then moved on as head pro at the Pinetop Country Club in Pinetop, Ariz. During the off seasons, he worked at Camelback in Phoenix. In June, 1975, with his Class A PGA membership in hand, he joined the TOUR, but it was not easy. Winning \$33,162 in 1977 helped to encourage him.

Leonard Thompson saved his best for last in 1985. Needing a good finish in the Pensacola Open to move in with the leading 125 money winners, he shot a final round of seven-under par 64. He won \$2,468 and it was enough to move him into the 122nd spot.

He had reason to sweat it out. The year before, he finished 126th and thus lost his exempt status. "I can't say enough about how nice the sponsors were to me last year," he said. "A lot of them offered me sponsor's exemptions because they said I had been loyal to them for so many years. I'm grateful for what they did."

Late last year, he made a drastic swing change. "I even changed the way I think about hitting the ball," he said. It paid off. The first positive result was a tie for second place in the Bank of Boston Classic.

At Pensacola, he said, "I hit the ball well all week, but I was scared to death at the start of the last round. I knew what the consequences would be if I didn't have a good round. I hit the ball solid, but the difference was I made the putts to go with the rest of the game."

In 1981, Leonard had a day to remember as he shot a course record 31-31—62 at Glen Abbey Golf Club in the Canadian Open. He only missed one green but still birdied as he chipped in from off the edge. He used the same golf ball for 18 holes, and then presented it to the Royal Canadian Golf Association for its museum at Glen Abbey.

Leonard joined the TOUR in the Fall of 1971, earning his card in his second attempt at the Qualifying School. He had sharpened his game at Wake Forest University, and was a teammate of such players as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman.

He progressed steadily and in 1974 won the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. When his earnings totalled \$122,349, his followers were sure he would continue on to stardom.

It was shortly afterwards that Leonard started to fight the scales. When his weight reached 230, he decided it was time to start a conditioning program. In mid-November of 1974, he went on a crash diet and in 3½ months, lost nearly 50 pounds.

His earnings dropped almost as rapidly during the next two years, and that was when he decided it was time to seek out Arnold Palmer for help. The next year, 1977, he won \$107,293. At the end of that year, he won the Pensacola Open by holing a 50-foot putt on the final hole for a birdie and a two-stroke edge on Curtis Strange.

A native North Carolinian, one of the highlights of his career was the course record seven-under par 29 on the back nine at Pinehurst No. 2, set in the 1977 Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Jim Thorpe set out to prove one thing when the year started. He wanted to prove he could be a winner on the PGA TOUR and not just a consistently strong challenger.

He did just that. By the time the 1985 season had run its course, Jim had compiled one of the outstanding records of the year. He won twice, in the Greater Milwaukee Open as he outlasted Jack Nicklaus down the stretch and in the Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship as he defeated Jack Renner in the final match.

He nearly won for a third time. In the Western Open, he came from behind the last afternoon to tie amateur Scott Verplank. Unfortunately for Jim, Verplank won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole. It prompted Jim to kid, "Well, at least it was one week when I did beat all the pros." He finished fourth on the money list with \$379,091.

A powerful man physically but gentle at heart, Jim usually plays the more difficult courses well. He was the first-round leader in the 1981 U.S. Open at Merion after shooting a 66, and finished tied for 11th. He finished fourth in the 1984 Open at Winged Foot and was third in the Kemper Open the same year on the demanding Congressional course.

He is the ninth of 12 children. He grew up in a large home off the second fairway at the Roxboro (NC) Golf Club where his father, Elvert, was the greens superintendent. He says with a laugh, "We used to go out after dark and hit shots by the back porch light."

Jim was quite a football player in high school and earned a scholarship to Morgan State. He was a running back, and a powerful one at that, but after a year, he abandoned the sport and then left school after two years to devote more time to golf.

"There were five boys in the family," Jim says, "and my father was the one who started me playing golf, but in those days, I would rather play football. My brother, Chuck, was the best golfer in the family."

Chuck was on the PGA TOUR in the early 1970s and it was Chuck who gave Jim some sound advice regarding the TOUR. "I couldn't hit my long irons very well, so one day Chuck said we should go to Pinehurst and he would help me with my game. We played and practiced and played some more. Finally, one day, Chuck said, 'You're ready.'"

Jim obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1975, but he only won \$2,000, the next year, so he went home again. In the Fall of 1978, he was back in the School, this time better prepared, and was co-medalist with John Fought in the Q-School. Early the next year, he let everyone know he was indeed ready, as he tied with Tom Watson for second place in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, two strokes behind Bruce Lietzke.

Lee Trevino came close to accomplishing what no one has done in nearly 50 years; win back-to-back PGA Championships.

When Trevino won the PGA crown in 1984 for the second time in his brilliant career, it was one of the outstanding sports stories of the year. At age 44, he outlasted Gary Player and Lanny Wadkins at Shoal Creek, AL, shooting all four rounds in the 60's.

Last year, he was at Cherry Hills, CO, to defend his title and he came within two strokes of winning again. He shot four-under par 280, but his good friend, Hubert Green, won it with a 278 score. The last man to win the title back-to-back was Denny Shute in 1936 and 1937.

Until he won the 1984 PGA, Trevino had gone three-and-a-half years without a victory. He said of the dry spell, "I haven't won because I haven't been able to physically. It's not because I've lost my game." He proved it at Shoal Creek.

His problem had been his back. He suffered with pain, sometimes severe, but never complained publicly. He always maintained his "Merry Mex" attitude. Some believe his problems originated when he was struck by lightning at the 1975 Western Open. In November of 1976, he underwent an operation for a herniated disc.

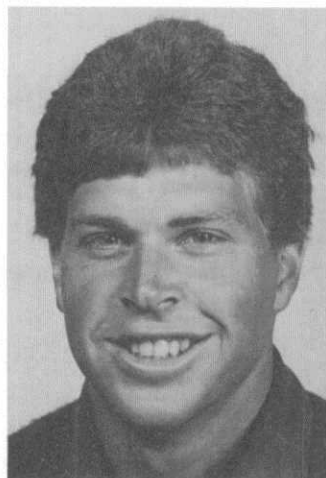
Lee's greatest year on TOUR was 1980 when he collected three titles, \$385,814, and won his fifth Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.73 for 82 rounds. His average was the lowest on TOUR since Sam Snead's 69.23 in 1950 and his money winnings totaled \$150,000.

In September of 1981, he was inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst.

Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco. A year later at Baltusrol, he placed sixth in the U. S. Open, and was on the TOUR to stay. Twelve months later, he was entertaining everyone at the margarita party at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open.

Lee won the U. S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff at Merion, and in a span of five weeks that summer he added the Canadian and British Open titles to his fast growing collection. He was named "Player of the Year" practically by acclamation.

There was no doubt in Bob Tway's mind, that if he could obtain his PGA TOUR card, he would be successful. He knew he could play the game, but needed the chance to do so.

In 1985, he had the opportunity after going through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1984. The result was a second place in the Lite Quad Cities Open, thirds in the Southern Open and Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship, and tie for fifth in the St. Jude Memphis Classic and earnings of \$164,023.

A tall, handsome young man, he is expected to be one of the game's bright stars for many years.

During his years at Oklahoma State University, Bob Tway was a name that commanded attention. He earned All-American status three times. He won the 1981 Fred Haskins award as the outstanding college-player-of-the-year.

Working under the watchful eye of Mike Holder, the golf coach at OSU, his game matured rapidly. However, it seemed he could play well until it came time to tee it up in the Qualifying School. The first three times he tried to get through it, he missed. "It was by a couple of shots each time," he said, shaking his head, "but I was able to play in a few TOUR events each year.

He also played on the Tournament Players Series and in 1983, he won the Sandpiper-Santa Barbara Open.

Bob played wherever he could find a good game. His travels took him on the Asian and European tours. "It was a lot tougher because of the traveling and the playing conditions," he said.

He believes that the experience he gained has been beneficial. He was off to a slow start last year. In his first seven events, his only finish was a tie for 53rd in the Doral-Eastern Open. Then he started to settle down.

He knew he was playing well when he headed for Memphis and, sure enough, he was. As he stood on the 18th tee the last afternoon, he knew he needed a birdie to get in the playoff (Hal Sutton/David Ogriin). "It's a par five hole and I went for the green in two," he recalls, but his second shot was a touch to the left and bounced in the water. He suffered a bogey. He tied for fifth place, two strokes behind Sutton and Ogriin.

A month later, he had another chance to win. At the Lite Quad Cities Open, he was one stroke behind Dan Forsman as they played the last hole. Bob hit his tee shot in the left trees and bogeyed. Forsman also bogeyed, but Dan won by a shot and Bob was alone in second place.

Bob started to play golf at age five. "I'd follow my grandfather and father around the course," he said. He was "about seven" when he played in his first junior tournament.

The family moved to Marietta, GA, when he was a youngster and Bob played basketball during his first two years in high school. Golf was his game, though.

"When I was growing up, I patterned my swing after Tom Weiskopfs. He was a great one and since we have about the same build, I copied his as best I could."

He prefers to play right to left and over the years he has been considered an excellent striker of the ball. His putting also has come along to be a strong part of his game.

It has been a long way back for Howard Twitty so it was pleasing for him to enjoy a relatively-good year in 1985. It turned out to be his best by far since the banner seasons of 1979 and 1980.

The most satisfying week came in Abilene, TX, in the Southwest Classic. He challenged until the end but came up one stroke short of being in the Hal Sutton-Mike Reid playoff. He had all four rounds in the 60's and it had been quite a while since he was able to manage that feat.

He also knows he may never again play the game as well as he did in a stretch of 3½ tournaments in mid-summer of 1980. He went through 14 rounds with 13 of them being in the 60's and was 57-under-par.

One of those weeks ended in a victory, as he defeated Jim Simons on the sixth extra hole in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the others, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, fifth in the Quad Cities Open, and, after the victory, he started 64-66 in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic but then the bubble burst.

Howard's first TOUR victory came the year before in the B. C. Open when he outplayed two close friends, Tom Purtzer and Doug Tewell on the 72nd hole. They were tied through 71, but Howard managed a par on the home hole and that gave him the victory.

One of the biggest men on the TOUR at six-feet-five, 200 pounds, he once was asked why he didn't concentrate on football. With a grin, he replied "I like to keep my blood in my body."

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at an early age. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6'3" when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed."

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when he was a senior, he finished right behind the co-champions of the NCAA championship, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite from the University of Texas.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and twice failed in the PGA TOUR Qualifying School before meeting success in June, 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

It is amazing what a year of experience can do for some players and Brett Upper is a perfect example. As he said, "It's been a great year for me, since I went from 125th place on the money list in 1984 to 61st place last year.

"Mostly, it was experience," he continued. "I learned how to manage my game, manage my schedule and I had better course management. I felt more comfortable in the atmosphere of the TOUR."

He went through one stretch of four tournaments in mid-summer when he finished in the top 10 three times. His best effort was a tie for third in the Lite Quad Cities Open.

Brett took a different route to the PGA TOUR. Instead of going to college, he became an assistant professional right out of high school and worked in pro shops for the next several years.

With a smile, he said, "The golf shop and the mini-tours were my college."

He made it onto the PGA TOUR in 1984, after finishing as the runner-up to Willie Wood in the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1983. His game improved as the year went along and he finally slipped into the 125th money position, thanks to a tie for 44th in the Pensacola Open.

"At the beginning of the year," he said, "it was a big adjustment, getting used to the travel and feeling comfortable with the atmosphere of the TOUR events. I knew I probably would not jump out and be an instant success such as Corey Pavin, because I didn't have the same type of experience.

"But, I was pleased with my progress, and the big boosts came in the Quad Cities Open (tie for eighth), and then the B. C. Open (also tie for eighth) and finally in the LaJet Classic (tie for seventh).

"I've learned patience and concentration are the most important things you have to learn," he continued. "You have to go out and play your own game and learn how to eliminate the distractions."

Brett started in the game at age eight under the watchful eye of his father. He started to play junior golf at the St. Davids Golf Club in Wayne, PA, and through those years, Pete Trenham, the head pro at St. Davids, showed him the way.

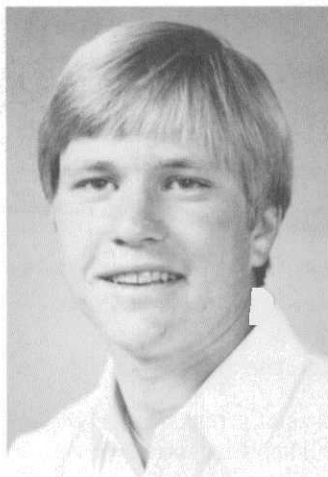
After high school, he went to work in the golf shop at the Lancaster (PA) Country Club in 1977. A couple of years later, he worked under Lew Worsham at Oakmont (PA) Country Club.

He demonstrated an ability to play as he won several PGA Sectional events around Pennsylvania. He started to play the mini-tours in Florida and then set his sights on the PGA TOUR.

The first two times he tried to obtain his card, he didn't make it. In the Fall of 1983, he was ready. A fourth-round 65 at the Tournament Players Club was the highlight of the week because it tied a course record. He finished with a 68 to move to within two strokes of medalist Willie Wood.

Even today, when Brett needs help with his game, he goes to his old friends and teachers, such as Trenham at St. Davids, plus Worsham and Bobby Ford, who is the head pro at Oakmont now.

When Scott Verplank shot a four-under par 68 to take the first-round lead in the 1985 Western Open, everyone thought, "Scott's a nice young man and it's good to see an amateur playing so well."

Few people thought he would be challenging after two rounds, but he added another 68 on the demanding Butler National course and his 136 total gave him a three-stroke lead.

Everyone moved in for a closer look at this 21-year old from Oklahoma State University. As the heat of the competition became more intense, Scott responded as a winner should respond. He never wavered and his 69 before the national television audience in the third round gave him an 11-under par 205 and a two-stroke lead over Jim Thorpe. No one else was really that close.

Consider, if you will, that an amateur had not won an official PGA TOUR event since Gene Littler did it in the 1954 San Diego Open. Doug Sanders won the 1956 Canadian Open as an amateur, but it was not a part of the TOUR in those days.

Most of the experts had been saying for several years that an amateur had a tough enough time trying to survive the cut, so the idea of winning a tournament was out of the question.

Verplank held tough, however, and when the final round was over, his 74 for a nine-under par 279 was good for a tie with Jim Thorpe. Thorpe was bidding for his first TOUR victory and he had to make a marvelous par on the final hole to tie Scott.

They parred the first extra hole and then Scott Verplank made TOUR history by winning the tournament with a par on the second extra hole.

"It gave me a funny feeling," he said. "I've always been one of those who looked in the paper every day to see how the guys were doing. As a little kid, I would study the scores every week and think about how good they were."

With a slight smile, he said sincerely, "I still don't think I'm ready for the TOUR. There are a lot of guys who can beat me. I've only won one tournament and I'll cherish it, but there are a lot of players who have won once."

Scott started to play at age nine. "I was around golf a lot because my grandparents and my parents played." His first competition came a year later. By the time he was in high school, he knew he wanted to play the game forever. "I worked hard on my game because I wanted to get a scholarship."

He went on to Oklahoma State University and was to be graduated from there in the Spring of 1986. Meanwhile, as an amateur, he continued his winning ways. He won the 1984 U.S. and Western Amateurs and was a member of the Walker Cup team last year.

When he is playing well, he fades the ball but "I can take it both ways, which is what I had to do at the Western Open," he said. Putting always has been a strong part of his game.

As a tournament winner, Scott will be eligible to join the TOUR once he completes his senior year at Oklahoma State. In the meantime, he is eligible for a maximum of 10 cosponsored appearances during the 1986 calendar year.

Bobby Wadkins has enjoyed periods of success during his years on the PGA TOUR and, while victory has eluded his grasp, he has been close on several occasions.

Last year, for example, he trailed Bernhard Langer by two strokes after three rounds and played very well the last day on the Harbour Town Links to tie him. However, Langer, who won the Masters Tournament the previous week, still held the hottest hand and won the playoff on the first extra hole.

Bobby thought he had the 1979 IVB-Philadelphia Classic title in his pocket, but Lou Graham came from six strokes back with a brilliant seven-under par 64 the last afternoon and caught him. Lou then won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

He does know how to win, though. In the Fall of 1978 he won the European Open and the next year, he won the Dunlop Phoenix tournament in Japan.

Bobby was in top form in 1984 when he had his best money year since 1979. "I went to see Dr. Bob Rotella (sports psychologist at the University of Virginia) and he had me thinking better. For the first time in 10 years, I developed a routine for each shot. It made quite a difference."

He had one of the finest rounds of his career in the 1983 Colonial National Invitation. He shot a second-round 64 and held the halfway lead at 132. "It probably was the best round I have played on TOUR," he said. "I made tons and tons of good iron shots." He finally finished in a tie for fifth place.

Bobby is approximately 20-months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and now during his years on the TOUR, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

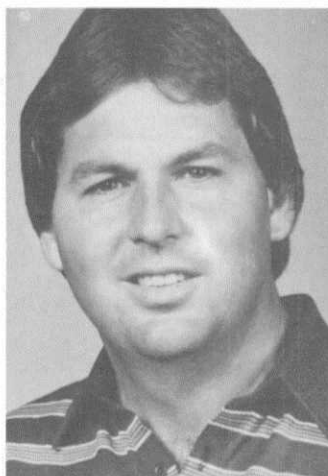
Through the years, Bobby and Lanny have worked on their games together but last Spring, Bobby sought out Peter Kostis for some extra help. "It's the first time I've gone to someone else for a lot of help," he said. "Putting still is what hurts me."

Lanny Wadkins has compiled such a brilliant record during his years on the PGA TOUR that it is difficult to single out his greatest achievements. Chances are, he will tell you one of his greatest moments came last Fall when he was acclaimed as the PGA Player-of-the-Year.

He earned the honor by winning three times and finishing second on the money list with \$446,893, and second in scoring average with a 70.44 mark.

Lanny's approach to the game is quite simple, really. He attacks the course constantly. "I get a big kick out of playing that way," he says. "You know, going for the green in two on a par five when the second shot is over water, but I never take a chance if it's a bad risk."

While others must look for the safe way home, Lanny can be bold because he has the shots, possibly more shots than anyone in the game. With a grin, he says, "Some people don't know I have those shots. They see me lashing away but don't understand what I'm doing. I'm always working the ball. Every shot is calculated."

"That's when you win," he adds.

When he is on his game—which is most of the time in recent years—there isn't a more feared competitor on the TOUR. That's why he has been able to win some big ones on the most demanding courses.

For example, he won the 1977 PGA Championship in a playoff over Gene Littler at Pebble Beach; and later that summer, won the World Series of Golf in a marvelous performance on the tough Firestone South course.

Two years later, when weather conditions bordered on the unplayable, with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass with a five-under par total of 283—five better than runner-up Tom Watson.

Lanny enjoyed a brilliant amateur career, highlighted by his victory in the 1970 U.S. Amateur. It wasn't any surprise when he became an immediate success on the PGA TOUR after earning his player's card in the Fall of 1971.

When Denis Watson was asked to give an assessment of his performance in 1984, he smiled and said, "It was an incredible result to a lot of hard work; a couple of years of hard work."

He joined Tom Watson as the only three-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 1984; came within a whisker of winning PGA Player-of-the-Year honors; and finished fourth on the money list with \$408,562. Compare that, if you will, with his 1983 total of \$59,284, which was his previous best.

Actually, his brilliant performance was centered on three tournaments in a seven-week span late in the summer. He broke through with a victory in the Buick Open, thanks to a 63-68 finish.

After he was 33rd in the PGA Championship, he won the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club. He shot a course record eight-under par 62 the second day and stayed in front the rest of the way to collect a check for \$126,000. He missed the cut in his next two outings, and then won the TOUR's richest payoff of \$162,000 when he won the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational.

While he enjoyed a good season in 1985, he said, "I was within a couple of shots of an unbelievable year." True enough. He finished tied for second in the U.S. Open, just one stroke behind Andy North. Trying to defend his World Series of Golf title, he was tied with Roger Maltbie after three rounds, but Roger shot an exceptional 66 the last day to win it and Denis finished second.

There were several factors that boosted him into prominence. First of all, he has been working for several years with David Leadbetter on his golf swing; and has worked on the mental aspects of the game with Dr. Bob Rotella of the University of Virginia. He gives them both considerable credit.

Denis earned his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981. The next year, his first start was the Bay Hill Classic, and he tied with Tom Kite and Jack Nicklaus, but Kite won the playoff.

His father started him in the game when they lived in Rhodesia. He was 14-years old at the time, and two years later, his handicap was down to a one. "That's when I started to think about turning professional."

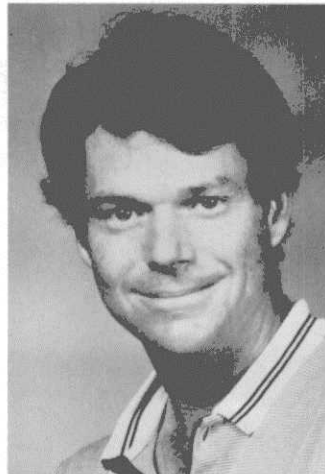
He played all sports, including cricket, rugby, tennis and competed in track and field, but golf was his love, no doubt about it.

He turned pro when he was 19. Although he had a dream that someday he would play the United States TOUR, he said it was little more than a dream as long as he lived in Rhodesia. So, he moved to South Africa in 1976.

"Gary Player and Dale Hayes said I should give the TOUR a try," Watson said. "Then Gil Morgan told me he thought my game was well suited for the American courses and even Howard Twitty encouraged me to come over here. So, I did."

He now plays out of the Plantation Golf and Country Club in Venice, FL.

During the past decade, no one has been as dominant in the game as Tom Watson. Six times he has been named the Payer-of-the-Year. Five times he has been the leading money winner. He has won five British Opens, two Masters Tournaments and a United States Open crown.

Even though 1985 was not a vintage Watson year, he still commands the respect as one of the finest ever to play the game. Through last year, his 31 TOUR victories placed him in a tie for ninth place with Jimmy Demaret among the all-time winners.

As long as the game is played Tom will be remembered for the brilliantly-executed pitch shot he made from off the 17th green at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open.

As you recall, his two iron off the tee on the par three hole bounced in heavy rough on the left side of the green. He was tied with Jack Nicklaus, who already had completed his round. Par seemed the absolute best Tom could do, but a bogey was far more likely.

Instead, he hit the perfect shot, and holed it for a birdie two. He went on to birdie the last hole and win his first Open championship by two over Nicklaus.

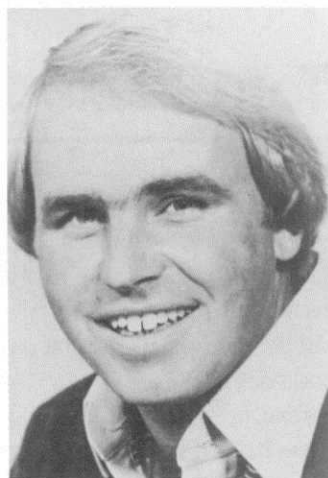
In the Fall of 1983, he was paid a high compliment by his good friend and archrival, Nicklaus. It was prior to the Ryder Cup matches at Palm Beach Gardens, FL. Nicklaus was the team captain and he announced his plans to play Tom in every match because the "intimidating factor" would be worth a lot of points against the Europeans. Jack was right.

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won six times on TOUR, plus the British Open, and won a record \$530,808. He was the first player to break the half-million dollar mark.

Since he won \$1,065 for a tie for 28th in his first start on TOUR in the 1971 Kaiser International Open, this personable fellow has elevated himself to a position with the all-time greats.

Tom was only six years old when his father, a scratch golfer, exposed him to the game. He became a four-time winner of the Missouri State Amateur and played for three years at Stanford University before graduating in 1971 with a degree in psychology.

D. A. Weibring had a good reason to be proud of his performance at the Tournament Players Championship last year. He finished second, mainly because Calvin Peete had a great final round with a six-under par 66 to win the grand prize.

Nevertheless, D. A. did shoot 11-under par 277 on the demanding course to finish in the runner-up spot and collect a check for \$97,200. The important thing was that D. A. withstood the pressure of one of the game's more significant championships and went on to have his best financial year.

He has had his good years but he also has suffered through a few, too, because of injuries. "I'm striving to win again," he said at the end of the year. "I took a good step ahead from the injury in 1983 to have a good year in 1984, and I took another step ahead last year."

D. A. injured his left wrist at the 1983 Phoenix Open. He said, "I never could get going, even though I tried to play with it." Finally, he had to take two months off in the early spring.

"I played well after I came back in early June, but still wasn't 100%, he continued. "Originally, I broke a blood capsule on top of the wrist hitting balls on the practice tee and then I went on to suffer ligament damage. The only cure was rest and therapy."

He did his therapy with the Dallas Cowboys physical staff and adds, "They also helped me to get in the best shape of my life. When I did come back, I was a lot stronger in all ways."

The setback was frustrating since he was coming off his best money year, winning \$117,941 in 1982, and anticipated even greater returns in 1983.

He was in good shape for most of 1984 and the results were evident, he jumped back up with the \$100,000 winners, consistently placing among the money winners.

His lone victory came in the 1979 Quad Cities Open. He was tied with Calvin Peete through 14 holes the last day, but D. A. took charge at the par five 15th, registering an eagle and taking the lead to stay.

It was a popular victory. A graduate of Illinois State University, D. A. had a number of his followers from his hometown of Quincy, IL, there to cheer him on. He said, "If I had to pick a place to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

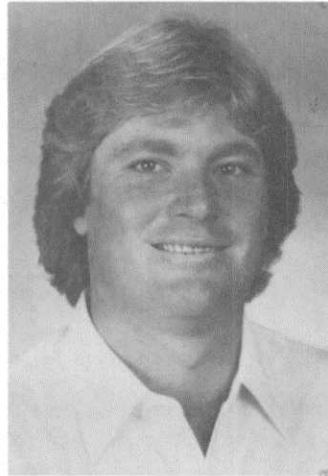
His next closest brush with victory came in the 1980 Andy Williams San Diego Open. He fired a final round 65 and found himself tied with Tom Watson, but Watson went on to win on the first extra hole.

D. A. joined the TOUR in June of 1977 and in his first full year of 1978, he won \$41,052, finishing 75th on the money list.

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

Mark Wiebe found himself with a little extra free time this past winter—he didn't have to go to the PGA TOUR's Qualifying Tournament.

"It was really nice not to have to go back to TOUR school," smiled Wiebe. "I really didn't know what to do this winter, I usually go to TOUR school."

Wiebe was able to relax this winter and enjoy himself by virtue of his outstanding play during the 1985 season, a season in which he won his first PGA TOUR event, the Anheuser-Busch Classic.

His first victory came in a playoff after he had three-putted the final hole for a bogey to force the extra hole of competition. On the first hole of sudden death, Wiebe dropped a birdie putt from behind the hole and defeat John Mahaffey and claim the \$90,000 first place prize.

Mark also went on to post several other strong finishes including three other top ten efforts as he increased his prize earnings from \$16,257 in 1984 to \$181,894 in 1985.

The victory not only added a great deal of money to the Wiebe family's bank account, it also allowed him to rest easy this winter and to plan for this season, a luxury that was new to him.

"The win just changed my schedule around completely and that's the most significant thing that's happened," said Wiebe. "It's allowed me to plan ahead and I haven't always been able to do that."

A two-time high school player of the year, Wiebe attended Palomar Junior College in California and won the state junior college title before going on to star at San Jose State.

Upon leaving the Spartans for whom he earned All-America honors, he decided to join the PGA TOUR. He would be frustrated in his attempts more than once, but finally broke through when he qualified for his TOUR card at the Fall, 1983 Qualifying Tournament.

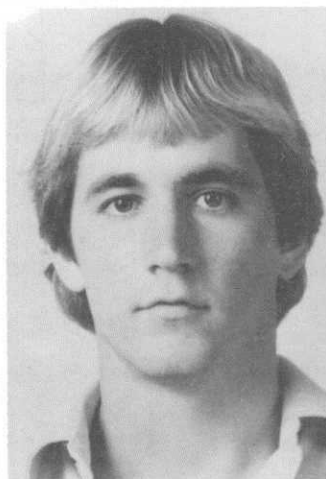
His rookie year, though, was like that of many other newcomers to the world of the PGA TOUR, a disappointment. He earned only \$16,257 and finished 166th on the Official Money list and once again had to return to the Qualifying Tournament.

A solid fourth place finish in the 1985 Q-Tournament allowed Wiebe to play in a number of early season events, but it was not until his fourth place finish at Westchester at mid-season that he collected a big check. One month later he claimed his victory and his future was set. Now he has to establish some new goals.

"I'd like to win again and I want to maintain what I'm doing," said Wiebe. "I've got a lot of rooters now and I want to play up to their expectations of me."

The likeable young man from Denver should have no trouble living up to his end of the bargain.

When Willie Wood came on the PGA TOUR in January of 1984, he carried with him an impressive list of credentials. After he played in five West Coast tournaments, his peers knew he was for real. He won more than \$27,000 and his name seemed to be on the leader board every week.

With a smile, he said, "When I started, I was really fired up. I was excited to be on the TOUR and I was still playing well from the Qualifying School."

Willie West Wood went to the Q School at the Tournament Players Club in the Fall of 1983 with high expectations. He wasn't disappointed. He shot two rounds of 70, two of 71 and two of even par 72 to win medalist honors by two strokes.

Those who have followed Willie's career, know it was a typical performance.

Willie started in the game at age nine, and it was a natural sport for him. His father, Willard, was the head professional at the Shreveport (LA) Country Club at the time. "He's a teaching pro in Lake Charles now," Willie said, "and he still is my only teacher. And, my older sister Deanie has been playing on the LPGA tour."

Willie accepted the challenge of competition immediately, and he has been successful at every level of the game. He won numerous junior titles, the most impressive being the 1977 USGA Junior; the 1978 PGA National Junior and the 1979 Western Junior.

He went on to Oklahoma State University and proceeded to win nine collegiate events. In 1982, he was named the College Golfer-of-the-Year. In 1983, he was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team.

His performance early in his first year on TOUR shouldn't have been a surprise to anyone. He said, "I set one goal for myself when the year started. I wanted to play well enough to never have to go back to the qualifying school. You can't believe how tough that was."

Willie was pleased with his efforts last year because "It was a consistent year. I didn't have any really outstanding weeks, but generally I played well." He did have four top 10 finishes with a third place in the Honda Classic being his best. As a result of his play, he increased his money winnings significantly.

His closest brush with victory came in the 1984 Anheuser-Busch Classic. He tied the Kingsmill Golf Club course record with a eight-under par 63 the first day and led by two strokes. He had a 68 the second day and still was leading by two. After a 66 in the third round for a 16-under par 197, he led by four shots.

The last afternoon, Ronnie Black came from seven strokes behind, shooting a 63 and won the tournament by a stroke over Willie. "I had an even par 71," he said, "and that wasn't too bad. Ronnie just played great the last day."

His all-time low score was a 61 at the 49ers Club in Tucson. He was in senior high school at the time, and had two eagles, nine birdies and two bogeys.

Until the 1984 PGA Championship at Shoal Creek, AL, few people really knew what Fuzzy Zoeller had to endure to play golf on the TOUR. Few people knew he constantly suffered with severe back pains because Fuzzy always was smiling and joking with those around him.

He arrived in Shoal Creek amid a torrent of publicity because of his magnificent performance in winning the United States Open Championship a few weeks earlier at Winged Foot. In the Open, he was tied with Greg Norman after 72 holes, and then the next day, Fuzzy was at his brilliant best, winning the 18-hole playoff by eight strokes, 67 to 75.

The morning he was to play his first round in the PGA, his back was so painful he barely could move. He was rushed to the hospital and remained there for nearly a week.

A month later, he was in Las Vegas to defend his title in the Panasonic Invitational, but his back condition worsened and he went to the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City. The diagnosis was that a "couple of discs had ruptured" and surgery was necessary.

Because of boney-tissue growth, they had to chisel one disc out and could only do repair on the other. Fuzzy was back on TOUR last year for the Doral-Eastern Open at the end of February. He was delighted to tie for 46th place. The next week, he tied for 20th in the Honda Classic and then he won the Hertz Bay Hill Classic by shooting 66-67 the last two days. He went on to enjoy his second-best money year.

"The back problem started when I was playing high school basketball," he explains. "I was sub-marined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since."

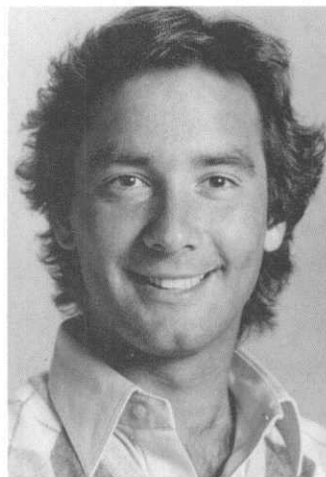
Fuzzy blossomed as a superstar in 1979 when he won the Andy Williams San Diego Open and also the Masters Tournament. He was six strokes in back of Ed Sneed starting the last round at Augusta National, and when he finished, he was thinking second place. As he sat in the scorers' tent at the 18th green, with Tom Watson, he watched Sneed bogey the last hole to force a three-way playoff. Fuzzy defeated Ed and Tom on the second extra hole.

His victory did surprise the experts, because this was his first trip to the Masters. Fuzzy first gained "fame" at the 1976 Quad Cities Open when he birdied the last eight holes of the first round to tie Bob Goalby's all-time TOUR record, set in the 1961 St. Petersburg Open.

Zoeller grew up alongside a fairway at the Valley View CC in New Albany, Ind., and it seemed natural when he started swinging a golf club at age three. He entered his first tournament two years later. He enjoyed all sports while growing up, but when he was eight his father said to him, "Son, all we're doing is running back and forth between the golf course and the baseball diamond. You had better choose one."

Fuzzy chose golf, but during his days in high school he played varsity basketball mainly, he said to "keep in shape for golf, and in Indiana in the winter you can't play golf."

Each year, Richard Zokol has been able to take another step up the ladder, posting better scores and increasing his money winnings. Last year, for example, he had a 64 the third day of the Southwest Classic and went on to his best-ever finish, a fourth place.

"I've been getting more consistent," he said, "making more cuts, but I'm still looking for more high finishes. I found the first couple of years to be very difficult, but I've become more comfortable with the TOUR each year."

When Richard was working on his golf game during his teenage years in his native Canada, he always kept an eye on Jim Nelford.

"I didn't know him then," Richard said, even though they both were from the Vancouver area. "Jim was a couple of years ahead of me and he seemed to win everything. When he went on to Brigham Young University, I could see how much his game improved, so I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

When it was time for Richard to head for college, he wrote to Karl Tucker, the golf coach, to inquire about the possibilities of going there. "He told me that since I didn't have a good amateur record, they couldn't offer me a scholarship," he recalls.

Soon afterwards, Zokol and Nelford were competing against each other in the British Columbia Amateur and after three rounds, Zokol was leading. "We talked about it, and Jim said he would call the coach and recommend me. The next thing I know, Coach Tucker said I should come down to Provo."

"The day after the tournament, I drove 24 hours straight through, and entered the school without a scholarship, but I was there. I made the team and for three years, I roomed with Bobby Clampett."

During his senior year, Clampett left for the pro ranks, but Richard is proud of the fact that he captained the team that won the 1981 NCAA title for BYU. "It was their first, ever," he said.

That fall, he qualified for the PGA TOUR on his first try, turning professional right after the U.S. Amateur Championship.

He gained national attention at the 1982 Greater Milwaukee Open. He showed up the first day with a small portable tape player and headset. Between shots, he would listen to soothing music. "It helps me to relax," he explained. He continued to use it through his second year on TOUR, but now says, "It helped me get over the concentration block, but I don't need it now."

He enjoyed an especially proud moment at the 1984 Canadian Open. He tied for fifth place, and that represented the best finish by a Canadian in their national championship in 26 years.

Richard started in the game as a 12-year-old caddy. "We lived right across the street from a golf course, and I'd caddy every weekend and also do some work in the golf shop, cleaning clubs, etc."

Although he can work the ball both ways, he normally hits it straight, and considers his strengths to be driving accuracy and ball-striking.

CURTIS STRANGE CAPTURES PALMER AWARD

Curtis Strange, with a record total of \$542,321 won during the 1985 season, was the winner of the Arnold Palmer Award. A winner three times during the season, Strange's earnings topped the five-year-old record of Tom Watson who won \$530,808 during the 1980 campaign.

Lanny Wadkins, who also won three times last year, entered the season's final event with a chance of catching and passing Strange, but he needed a victory at the Seiko-Tucson Match Play Championship to do so. He was an upset loser in the first round, though, and he ended the year in second place on the final Official Money List with \$446,893.

The Palmer Award, presented for the first time in 1981 to Tom Kite, will be awarded to Strange at the PGA TOUR's National Awards Dinner. The trophy, a bronze casting of "Arnie", was created by sculptor Jack Worthington of Venice, FL, who presented the original to Palmer in 1980. The other recipients of the award are Craig Stadler, Hal Sutton and Tom Watson.

EPSON TO SPONSOR OFFICIAL STATISTICS PROGRAM

EPSON

Introduced prior to the start of the 1980 season, the PGA TOUR's Official Statistics Program has brought a new dimension to the game. The nine major categories provide a valuable detailed look at the particular skills of TOUR players.

Beginning in 1986, the Epson Computer Company is providing overall sponsorship of the Official Statistics Program, including the awarding of cash prizes to the winners of each statistical category. Epson will award each statistical champion with \$25,000 at season's end.

Statistics are gathered at each PGA TOUR event by scorers who accompany each threesome. Official Statistician Byron Ferguson then enters the raw data into Epson's on-site computer, which feeds the information back to TOUR Headquarters in Ponte Vedra, FL. There the weekly money lists and statistical standings are tabulated.

Had it not been for the Official Statistics, only a handful of golf enthusiasts would have recognized Calvin Peete as the game's most accurate player, prior to his emergence as a four-time winner in 1982. Peete has dominated the greens in regulation and driving accuracy categories from the beginning.

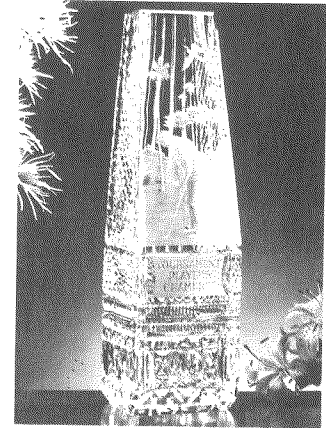

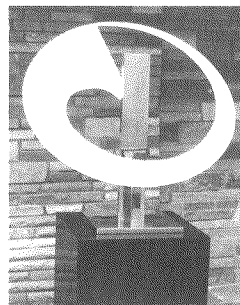

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TDP members who are residents of European nations.

The 1987 Ryder Cup Matches will be played September 25-27 at Muirfield Village GC, Dublin, Ohio.

THE RYDER CUP

The USA squad is selected based upon an accumulation of Ryder Cup points from the beginning of the calendar year through the PGA Championship. Points are awarded to the first 10 positions in each PGA TOUR event on the following basis:

PGA Championship, U. S. Open and Tournament Players Championship: 1st-115; 2nd-70; 3rd-45; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-10.

All other events: 1st-70; 2nd-42; 3rd-28; 4th-21; 5th-18; 6th-14; 7th-11; 8th-10; 9th-8; 10th-6.

If a player who is ineligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position. In order to be eligible, a player must be a U.S. citizen and a member or apprentice of the PGA of America. The PGA Champion and the U.S. Open Champion automatically make the team, provided they are U. S. citizens.

MEDIA REGULATIONS

The General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by *all* members of the Media:

1. Remain close up against gallery ropes in such a way as to appear to be a part of the gallery at all times. An ARM BAND is necessary.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
3. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day—and others requested—will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

1. All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
2. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted within the playing area of the golf course.
4. If an interview is to be taped in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player and up against the ropes and NOT in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only accredited photographers for RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am).

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and videotape cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General—All Photographers

A photographer must not ask a player to pose or in any way verbally distract a player during a round.

If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.

A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.

At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disqualified.

Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.

Use of golf carts or other means of transportation on the course during tournament play is prohibited.

Photography Regulations (cont'd)

Still Photographers

Only still photographers to whom armbands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery ropes. They must station themselves immediately inside such ropes, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE ROPES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open. Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to working inside the ropes and possibly to work at the tournament.

Close-up action shots are prohibited.

All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

When working at a green, photographers must not position themselves directly in a player's putting line.

Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Television/Videotape Cameramen

Television and videotape filming may be done from inside the gallery ropes, or from areas approved by the PGA TOUR. All camera personnel who have been issued PHOTO armbands will be permitted inside the gallery lines but this does not include other members of the crew. Camera personnel must station themselves immediately inside the gallery lines, not more than an arm's length from those lines, so as to blend into the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.

Filming may be done from such locations during a player's stroke, provided modern equipment that produces a minimum of noise is used.

Post-round interviews must be filmed far enough away from the arena of play to eliminate the possibility of distraction to those competing.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.
