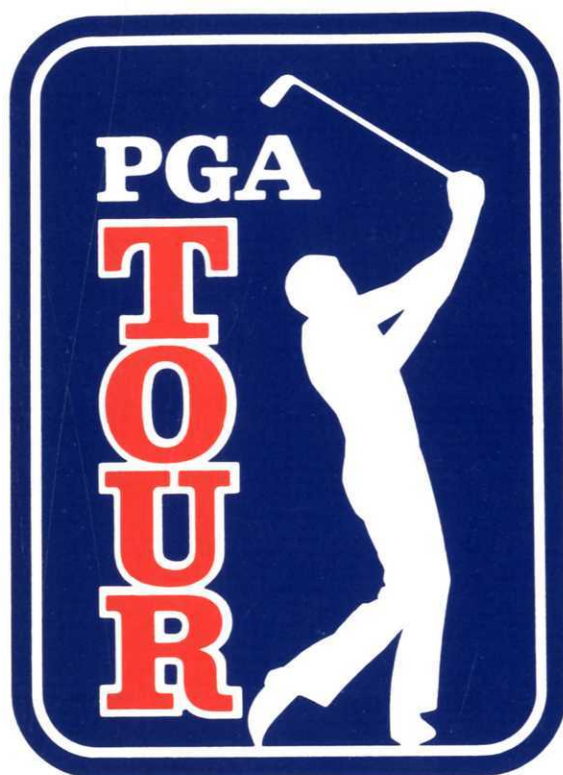

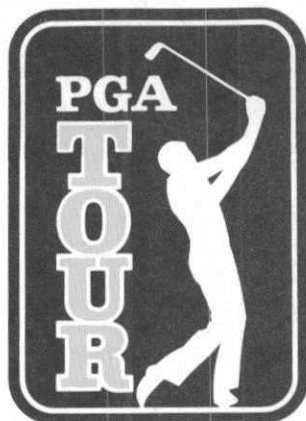

THE TOURNAMENT POLICY BOARD

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the PGA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the PGA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

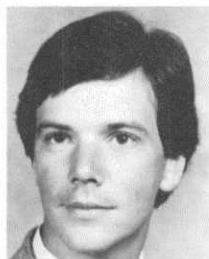
Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner, conducts tournament play.

ABOUT THE COMMISSIONER

Deane R. Beman

Entering his 15th year as Commissioner of the PGA TOUR, Deane R. Beman has overseen the most explosive period of growth in the TOUR's history, since succeeding Joseph C. Dey, Jr., on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the "business side" of the PGA TOUR has shown dramatic growth and now includes many heretofore uncharted paths, each designed to help encourage continued prosperity and to ensure the future of the game.

PGA TOUR Investments, Inc., created just five years ago, has already grown to include 12 "Stadium Golf" facilities nationally, and opened in December, 1986, in Clearwater, FL, the first in a network of "Family Golf Centers." In addition to providing state-of-the-art tournament and teaching golf arenas, Tournament Players Clubs and Family Golf Centers have been instrumental in the growth of PGA TOUR assets, which have climbed from \$730,000 to more than \$62 million during the Beman era.

PGA TOUR Properties, the joint marketing venture of the TOUR and PGA of America, continues to make steady progress in its quest to open new opportunities in golf for commercial sponsors and the TOUR's members. The Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf on the Regular TOUR and the Vantage involvement with the Senior TOUR, an infusion of millions of dollars combined for players, sponsors and charities, is the largest example of marketing's efforts.

PGA TOUR Productions, introduced in 1985, is the TOUR's first-ever in-house TV/audio-visual production entity, the creative possibilities of which are nearly limitless. Tournament highlight films, vignettes, commercials, specialty pieces and the acclaimed "Inside the PGA TOUR" weekly half-hour show airing on ESPN are several of Production's successful projects.

Other important innovations introduced during the Beman administration include a professional Agronomy department, the Nabisco Stats program, electronic scoreboards, "Official Golf Destinations" and the Centinela Fitness Training Center.

Competitively, the Beman era has witnessed the birth of the SENIOR PGA TOUR which started in 1980 with two events and has grown to 37 events this year. In all, almost 90 tournaments are on the combined slate with prize money having increased from \$8.2 million in 1974 to close to \$50 million this year.

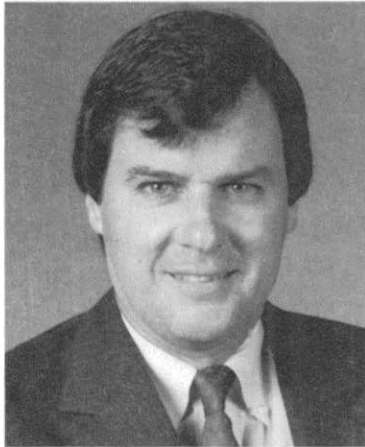
The Player Retirement Plan, inaugurated in 1983, has already contributed \$4.4 million toward the future benefit of active Plan participants, and larger contributions are expected in future years.

Charity, easily the TOUR's leading money winner during the Beman era, continues to benefit at a yearly record pace. Contributions by American Golf Sponsors to charitable organizations rose to another unprecedented total of \$176 million and will again be substantially supplemented by \$2 million in the Nabisco Grand Prix Program.

During his active years as a player, Beman established an enviable slate of accomplishments, compiling one of the great amateur records of all time. He won United States Amateur titles in 1960 and 1963 and the British Amateur championship in 1959. As an amateur, Beman was a member of four Walker Cup teams, four World Amateur Cup teams and three U.S. Americas Cup squads.

At the age of 29, in 1967, he left a prosperous insurance brokerage firm in Bethesda, MD, to join the PGA TOUR as a full-time player. During his six-year professional career, he won the 1969 Texas Open, 1970 Greater Milwaukee Open, 1972 Quad Cities Open and 1973 Shrine-Robinson Classic.

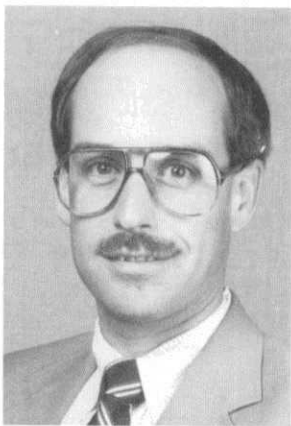

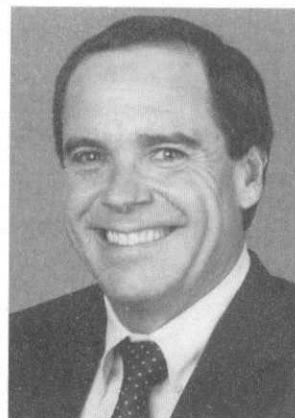

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PGA TOUR

The precise start of the PGA TOUR defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 80th anniversary and continues to thrive on the PGA TOUR with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the PGA TOUR started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass. and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's PGA TOUR is traced to the early Twenties when, in the winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas, and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the summer. The summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, and Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic poignancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this TOUR Book, our records such as leading money winner, growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth).

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of PGA TOUR events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the PGA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into purses, accounting for the tripling of prize money in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the value of tournament purses has escalated at an unprecedented rate; PGA TOUR assets have grown from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$62 million today, and total revenues have increased from \$3.9 million to more than \$105 million in the same time span.

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR is much broader than a decade ago, due to the introduction of the Senior PGA TOUR, the sports success story of the '80's.

In October of 1980, the PGA TOUR moved to its present National Headquarters Building in Ponte Vedra, FL, and just three weeks later, the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass (owned and operated by the TOUR) beckoned in the era of Stadium Golf.

The Tournament Players Club concept has since been expanded to 12 other cities, and two years ago the PGA TOUR opened its first Family Golf Center in Clearwater, FL. This new addition to the TOUR family is expected to grow at a rate similar to that of the Tournament Players Clubs.

ALL EXEMPT TOUR PRIORITY RANKINGS

Each PGA TOUR player has earned a rung on the priority ranking system that will be used in selecting tournament fields. The complete ranking system, in order of priority, is as follows:

VII. SPECIAL TEMPORARY—If during the course of a PGA TOUR season, a non-member of the PGA TOUR wins an amount of official money (e.g., by playing in PGA TOUR events through sponsor exemptions, Open Qualifying, etc.) equal to the amount won in the preceding year by the 152nd finisher on the official money winning list will be eligible for the remainder of the year.

VIII. TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP WINNERS—If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, winners of cosponsored team championships, in order of the total number of team championship tournaments won. If two or more players are tied based on the number of such tournaments won, the player who is higher on the official PGA TOUR career money list shall be eligible.

IX. VETERAN MEMBERS—If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, Veteran Members (players who have made a minimum of 150 cuts during their career), in order of their standing on the PGA TOUR career money list.

NABISCO GRAND PRIX OF GOLF AND PGA TOUR SET FOR SECOND SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Year-long consistency will once again be a premium on the 1988 PGA TOUR due largely to the impact of the \$5 million Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf. The program was designed to reward players for quality and consistency of play and, in keeping with the PGA TOUR tradition of providing contributions to charity throughout North America. Year-long races for individual and team honors will culminate with the Nabisco Championships of Golf—the TOUR's richest event offering a \$2 million purse and a \$360,000 first prize, November 10-13 at a site to be determined.

The program was in response to the popular Nabisco Challenge and Vantage Cup competitions of 1986 which were consolidated into a stronger, more cohesive program. RJR/Nabisco assumed sponsorship activities on the PGA TOUR including the electronic scoreboard systems which have enhanced on-site spectator viewing since 1981.

The following components make up the Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf.

Individual Competition

The Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf Individual Competition awards PGA TOUR pros for year-long consistency and excellence. This season-long competition offers a \$1 million Bonus Pool with a \$175,000 first prize for the player who has earned the most money at season's conclusion. Significantly, all Bonus Pool payouts count as official money. The top 30 PGA TOUR members will also earn the right to compete at the season-ending Nabisco Championships. Last year Tom Watson broke out of a three-year victory drought to claim the individual crown in the Nabisco Championships while leading money winner Curtis Strange earned the Bonus Pool \$175,000 for his year-long consistency.

Team Charity Competition.

The Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf Team Charity Competition, formerly the Nabisco Challenge, promises an exciting finish when it also culminates at the Nabisco Championships of Golf. On November 16, 1987 each participating PGA TOUR tournament sponsor selected a four-man "team." The Players Championship made Payne Stewart the Draft's first pick (the second straight year Stewart had this distinction)—to represent their event at the third annual PGA TOUR Player Draft. Any dollars earned by each member in the Individual Competition will be credited to his team, and at season's end, \$2 million will again be donated to the charities represented by the participating tournaments. First prize is \$500,000. The charity team competition will be decided by the cumulative official money totals for the four team members (excluding official money won in the Centel Clasic played directly opposite the Nabisco Championships of Golf).

Nabisco Championships of Golf

The Nabisco Championships of Golf will not only culminate the Nabisco Grand Prix, but it will serve as an exciting, dramatic conclusion to the PGA TOUR campaign. The TOUR's largest purse, \$2,000,000 will be at stake for the top 30 pros. Eligibility will be limited to the top 30 money winners (PGA TOUR members) through the event preceeding the Nabisco Championships of Golf. In addition the \$2 million Team Charity Competition will be settled as will the year-long Bonus Pool. The \$5 million Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf prize monies will be decided at the Nabisco Championships. Moreover, the Arnold Palmer Award, symbolic of leading the PGA TOUR official money list, will probably be contingent on the outcome of the Nabisco Championships.

NABISCO STATS

A integral part of the PGA TOUR since 1980, the Nabisco Stats program has helped to clearly indicate who the most skilled TOUR players are in a variety of categories.

A total of 10 statistical categories are charted each week of the season with Nabisco rewarding the 10 individual champions with a \$25,000 bonus at season's end.

The ten stat categories are: Scoring, Driving Distance, Driving Accuracy, Greens In Regulation, Par-Breakers, Putting, Eagles, Birdies, Sand Saves and All-Around.

Statistics are gathered at each TOUR event by the walking scorers who accompany each group of players. The TOUR's Official Statistician then enters the raw data into an on-site computer, which then feeds the information back to TOUR Headquarters in Florida. There the weekly lists and standings are tabulated. Epson computer products are used to gather and compile the data.

Since its inception, the Nabisco Stats program has proven to be a real eye-opener. Prior to 1980, only the most sophisticated golf fans would have recognized Calvin Peete's amazing accuracy off the tee. However, with Calvin now winning the last seven consecutive Driving Accuracy titles, almost everyone realizes that Calvin is the game's most accurate player.

Another benefit of the Nabisco Stats program is felt by the players. Many of today's TOUR players have found the statistical printouts available at each TOUR site to be an excellent source of information about their own respective games. For example, a player can be working on his bunker play in practice and can chart on a weekly basis his progress through the keeping of statistics.

In order to be eligible for the Nabisco Stats program, a player must complete a minimum of 50 rounds in 1988.

NABISCO SCOREBOARDS

The PGA TOUR over the years has introduced many innovations to enhance the spectator enjoyment of the tournaments. One such innovation was "Stadium Golf," another was the electronic scoreboards. The introduction of the Nabisco Scoreboards in 1981 provided up-to-the-minute information about action on the course to all spectators.

The electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems that travel the PGA TOUR are indeed a phenomenon. Not only do they bring status reports, current scores, biographical and statistical information, special reports and messages to players and fans spread out over many acres, but they also survive a gamut of weather conditions as well as the vagaries of travel as the two systems leapfrog around the nation.

And, in 1988 they will become even more phenomenal with the introduction of new state-of-the-art technology. By the end of the 1988 TOUR schedule the existing systems will be replaced by scoreboards featuring the new "Glowcube" technology from Daktronics Inc. of Brookings, S.D.—the manufacturer of the electronic scoreboards for the 1988 Winter Olympics. This "Glowcube" technology driven by new Epson computers will allow for faster scoring, better graphics and will feature the use of radio signals to transmit the data. The need for telephone lines from the greens to the scoreboards and from the scoreboards to the computer center in the van will be eliminated.

RJRN Golf (Reynolds Tobacco/Nabisco Brands, Inc.) will be responsible for the transport, set up and maintenance of the new electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems while PGA TOUR personnel will be responsible for the on-course operation during tournament week.

The Nabisco Scoreboard system is all just a part of Nabisco's major contribution to the PGA TOUR, the Nabisco Grand Prix of Golf. The interest of Nabisco Brands, Inc., is helping the PGA TOUR towards its goal of making professional golf the world's greatest spectator sport.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS PASS THE \$100 MILLION MARK

In keeping with the TOUR's motto of "the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR is Charity," the PGA TOUR and the American Golf Sponsors (AGS) were delighted to announce in late 1987 that charitable contributions from TOUR events had passed the \$100 million mark.

Additionally, 1987 was the 11th straight record breaking year according to AGS figures with some \$17.6 million going to charitable concerns across the country last year. That figure exceeded the year old mark of \$16.1 million raised in 1986.

Beginning in 1938 with a \$10,000 pledge to charity at the Palm Beach Invitational, several TOUR events now donate in excess of \$1 million annually. In fact, every PGA TOUR event donates its net revenue to charitable organizations of every kind.

It is, of course, the hard work of thousands of dedicated volunteers at each TOUR stop that have made this largesse possible and it is they who are the heroes in this story.

"We have said for years that charity is our leading money winner," said Commissioner Deane R. Beman. "We have never meant for that saying to be just a catch phrase, we've always meant it and there's no doubt that the golf world has been doing its fair share to help others who are less fortunate."

People from all walks of life have benefitted from the \$100-plus million that has been contributed to charity. TOUR events annually benefit hospitals, youth groups, research groups, educational foundations and countless other projects.

"This past year was a landmark year for the American Golf Sponsors and the PGA TOUR," said AGS President Ted May. "We are not only delighted to announce a new one season record, but we are especially pleased to have reached an historic milestone in the \$100 million figure."

TOURNAMENT PLAYERS CLUBS

The brainchild of PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman, the Tournament Players Club concept has within the decade of the 80's gone from a dream to a network that now encompasses 12 courses in seven states.

It was Beman's view that the spectator had been left out in golf course design throughout the years and when it came time for the PGA TOUR to build its own course, the opportunity presented itself for Beman to build a course that not only challenged the players, but allowed spectators to see the action as never before.

It's called "Stadium Golf" and once you've viewed a tournament on a Stadium Golf Course, you'll understand why the network has grown so rapidly in such a short period of time.

Spectator mounds abound that afford fans unrestricted views whether on tee shots, fairway shots or on the greens. In fact, the 18th hole at the original TPC at Sawgrass can accommodate crowds of some 30,000 people—all with a clean view of the action. You won't see any periscopes at an event on a Players Club.

The network began with the club at Sawgrass where it annually hosts the The Players Championship and quickly grew into the present number of 12. All TPC's are designed to host PGA TOUR or Senior PGA TOUR events and to date the clubs have been designed by some of the top architects in the business—Pete Dye, Arnold Palmer, Arthur Hills, Jay Morrish, Bob Cupp and the Von Hagge/Devlin team to name a few.

In addition, one of the things that adds a bit of spice to all TPC's is that a PGA TOUR player (or in some cases, two) are assigned to serve as a consultant to the designer. To date, Ed Sneed, Tom Weiskopf, Fuzzy Zoeller, Hubert Green, Craig Stadler and Ben Crenshaw have been among those lending their expertise to the TPC Network.

Truly a nationwide country club, a membership at one TPC affords the member a chance to play at any of the other clubs across the country and an opportunity to view the greatest players in the world in action on his own course once a year.

In fact, Tournament Players Clubs are developed only in places where such courses will substantially improve tournament sites. In short, they are built with the guidance and expertise of the PGA TOUR and financed by the local real estate developers, to provide fans with the best possible atmosphere in which to enjoy tournament golf, and to offer a challenging and rewarding golf experience for members. Only in cases where local tournament sponsoring organizations whole-heartedly endorse such deals are Tournament Players Clubs practical or prudent.

While there is ultimately no definitive number of Tournament Players Clubs planned, the PGA TOUR will always judge a potential site's merits with the concerns of the fans, the developer and the local tournament sponsors in mind.

Since the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass opened in 1980, the TPC Network has now truly become "the best set of clubs in America."

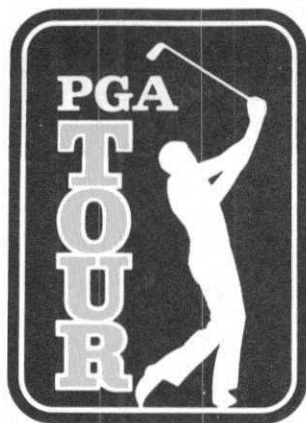

Fulton Allem has been a strong player on the South African Tour for the last couple of years, but little did he know what it would mean when he won the South African PGA Championship early last year.

The victory carried an invitation to the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club in Akron and it was the trip to Akron that turned his career around.

He played four solid rounds and finished alone in second place, just three strokes behind Curtis Strange with a score of 2-under-par 278. He earned \$86,400 and that was more than enough for him to qualify for his TOUR player's card. And, it also let him finish among the top 125 money winners for the year and thus gain exempt status.

"I was planning on going to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall," he said, "but I wasn't looking forward to all the pressure that goes with it. I felt I could play well enough to be on the PGA TOUR if I had the opportunity.

"What I accomplished through the World Series finish was exactly what I was aiming for when I came over here with five exemptions (sponsors), plus being able to play at Westchester through the Monday (Open) qualifier.

"You can't believe what a weight it takes off a man's shoulders," he said with a broad smile.

The husky Allem did try the Tour's Qualifying Tournament once. It was 10-years ago when he still was in his teens but was not successful.

Allem has been a winner on his home circuit but he points out, "I had 18 second-place finishes before I finally won."

As it was reported in South Africa, "The dynamic Allem couldn't break through after 10 tough years of trying but he subsequently annexed four titles in one year.

"The cherry on top was his superb win in the Lexington PGA over a difficult Wanderers course in late January (1987) where he outdueled a plucky Hugh Baiocchi over the final stretch to claim the most important success of his career thus far."

Fulton started to play golf at age 7 under the encouragement of his father. Through the years, it has been his father who has been there to teach him the fine points of the game.

He was a good junior player but did not travel extensively to establish himself as an international amateur.

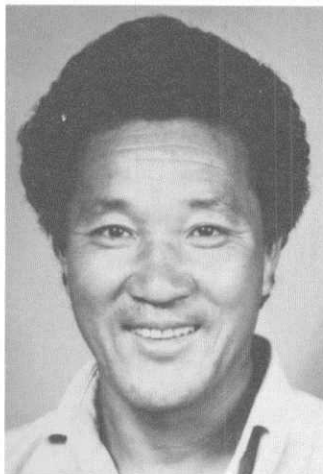
"Gary Player was a big influence," he said. "He was so serious about his golf that I tended to be the same way. I couldn't take it lightly like some of the amateurs, so, I decided to take the plunge and I turned pro when I was just 19."

Even today, Player is his favorite. "I have the highest respect for Gary and what he has done," Fulton said, "but I've always liked Jack Nicklaus, too.

"What I admire so much about Gary is that he has grinded all the way from nothing and has beaten the giants. He has guts and determination. He never gives up. I just love the man."

He is considered one of the more flamboyant individuals on the South African Tour and as he explains, "I've always been an emotional sort. I get very cross with myself when I play badly but I'm only cross with myself and not with what's happening around me."

Isao Aoki hit the shot that was heard around the golfing world in 1983, and Jack Renner still shakes his head in disbelief whenever someone mentions it.

The stage was the Waialae Country Club at the Hawaiian Open and the set was the 18th hole. Renner was in the scoring tent behind the green, carefully going over his card. He was finished with a 19-under par total of 269.

The final group of the day was walking down the 18th fairway and Isao Aoki was in it. At this point, as he headed for his golf ball in the left rough, some 128 yards from the flagstick on the par five hole, he was one-stroke behind Renner. He needed a birdie to tie, but it would not be easy to get, coming from the tall grass with his third shot.

As Renner studied his card, he heard a roar from the crowd that would shake the palm trees. He assumed Isao had hit the ball close.

Instead, Japan's greatest player had holed out with a pitching wedge for an eagle three and the victory. "This is the greatest thrill of my career," he was to say later. He thus became the first player from Japan ever to win on the PGA TOUR.

A sore elbow hindered his play in 1986. He came back last year and in a limited number of appearances, he turned in his third best money year on TOUR. A tie for fifth in the Honda Classic was his best.

Isao was introduced to golf as a caddy at the Abiko Golf Club while attending Abiko Junior High School. During that time, he was known as the "Tower," after the Tokyo Tower, which resembles the Eiffel Tower, for he was the tallest among the caddies.

He practiced early in the mornings and every evening when there were no members playing the course. Even at that time, it was said he was a good putter and short-game player. Today, if you ask him what is the strongest part of his game, without hesitation, he will say, "putting."

The 1983 TOUR statistics support his claim. He was No. 1 in sand saves, No. 2 in putting and No. 3 in driving accuracy.

He turned professional in 1964 but it took him seven years to win his first tournament, the Kanto PGA. In his 24-year professional career, he has won 52 tournaments in Japan—including five PGA Match Play titles. Twice, he has won in England—the 1978 World Match Play Championship and the 1983 European Open. Five times, he has been Japan's leading money winner. He won it again last fall.

He has won most of the important events in his homeland, but his most cherished victory came in the Fall of 1983 when he won the Japan Open for the first time. He had been a runner-up on four previous occasions. He won it again last year.

George Archer keeps telling people it's nice to be able to enjoy the scenery and play golf for a living. "I try not to let anything bother me. I'm delighted to be out here playing the game I enjoy."

You can imagine how "delighted" he was in 1984 when he was able to win again—at age 44—in the Bank of Boston Classic. It was his first victory in eight injury-riddled years. He trailed Joey Sindelar by one stroke at the start of the final round at the Pleasant Valley Country Club and then shot a six-under-par 65 to win by six strokes.

When he tied for second place in the Southern Open in 1986, he was almost as pleased. "I made enough money (\$23,100) to be assured of finishing among the top 125 money winners and keeping my exempt status," he said.

He wasn't able to enjoy the exempt status, however, as he underwent an operation on his left shoulder that put him on the shelf for nearly all of the first half of 1987. He only played in nine events.

For this year, he was granted a "special medical extension," so he will be able to play the entire year.

George has been one of the TOUR's finest players for a number of years—when health permitted—but one has to wonder how great he could have been if he had been able to remain healthy. He grins and says, "I'd like to thank my wife publicly for putting up with me and my ailments for the 20-plus years I've been on TOUR."

Three times, George has had major surgery. In 1975, he underwent the knife to repair a torn tendon in his left wrist and his effectiveness in 1974, 1975 and part of 1976 was seriously affected.

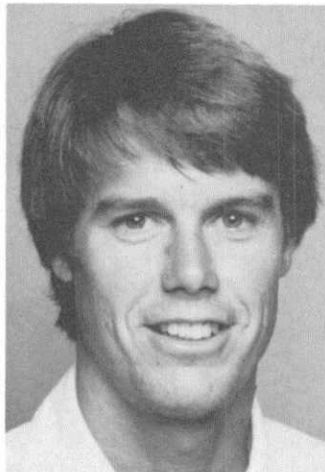
He had an excellent 1977, winning \$113,944, but he then encountered a back problem that required surgery in early 1979. He had two discs fused and then again in 1986.

Over his lengthy career, which started in 1964, George has been known for his putting stroke, so it seems appropriate that he owns the all-time TOUR record for fewest putts in a tournament. In the 1980 Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he only needed 94.

Archer began playing golf at age 12 around his native San Francisco and he compiled an exceptional amateur record before he turned pro 13 years later. In 1963 alone he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, the Northern California Open and the San Francisco City title, reached the semifinals of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International in his home town.

As a pro he has won 13 events, including three in 1968, but the year following was his most memorable when he captured the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and his one major championship when he beat out Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf in The Masters Tournament.

Every young player in the game could learn a valuable lesson from Paul Azinger. Even he admits his career has been "amazing" and truly it has.

In just a few short years, he has gone from struggling to make a living on the PGA TOUR to the very head of the class. Last year, he won three times and was named Player-of-the-Year by the PGA and Golf World magazine.

After enjoying a fine season in 1986, he started the new year by winning his first start, the Phoenix Open with a 65-67 finish. His next victory was in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and it came in dramatic fashion. He holed a putt of 30 feet for an eagle three on the last hole.

He also won the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and finished the year in grand style with \$822,481 in official money. He was second to Curtis Strange.

He gained world-wide attention at Muirfield in Scotland in the British Open. He led Nick Faldo by one stroke with two holes to play, but a bogey-bogey finish dropped him in to the runner-up spot.

As a senior in high school, he couldn't break 40, he said, because "I didn't play much and didn't practice at all." He was busy working in his father's marina in Sarasota pumping gas along with scraping and painting boats.

When it was time to go to college, he decided he wanted to play more golf. His first stop was Brevard Junior College where Jim Suttie was his coach. "He introduced me to John Redman and John has taken me to the level I'm at now."

As Paul points out, back in 1979, "my average score was about 77. The next year, working with John, it was down to around 72. Two years later, in the Fall of 1981, I earned my TOUR card in the Qualifying School."

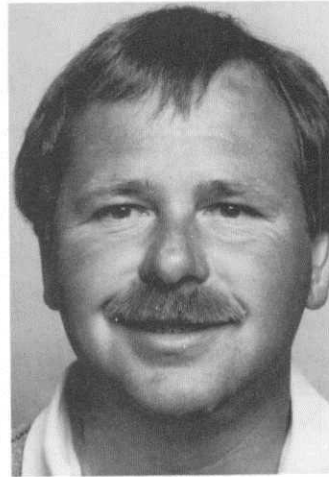
He only won \$10,655 in 1982 and lost his playing privileges.

He went back to the Q-School in the Fall of 1982 and didn't make it. So, he played the mini-tours in 1983. It was what he needed for his confidence because he played very well. In the Fall of 1983, he did make it through the School.

He finished 144th on the 1984 money list and went back to the School in the Fall, hoping to improve his position. He did, indeed. He was the medalist.

Paul first played the game as a five-year old because "my parents played and they took me along. They're still good players around Florida."

It had been six long years since his last win, but the drought finally ended in impressive fashion for Dave Barr at the 1987 Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic where he won with a brilliant 23-under 265 score.

"Winning again was a great feeling," said Barr. "I'd been knocking at the door and it's nice to get that feeling of winning again. You wonder if you'll ever win again when it's been six years." It took a few years but Dave Barr has developed into a solid PGA TOUR player. It wasn't easy for the big fellow from Canada, but he learned to manage his game and he was rewarded with \$100,000-plus years in 1984, 1985 and 1986.

He had easily his best year last year when he topped the \$200,000 mark for the first time, collecting \$206,816 to finish 54th on the money list.

Dave did win the Quad Cities Open in 1981 but he received considerable national attention in the 1985 United States Open championship when he battled Andy North all the way to the wire before finishing in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Tze-Chung Chen.

A torn rib muscle slowed him down early in 1985, but once he was healthy again, he made money in 15 straight tournaments. "When I was hurt," he said, "I never lost confidence because I had such a good year in 1984. I knew I could play well when I was healthy again. And, I did."

Dave has always been successful in his native Canada, too. He has won 10 events on the Canadian Tour including the 1985 Canadian PGA and last year he won the Quebec Open for the second straight year. He also won the Canadian PGA Tour Order of Merit for a third time, 1977, 1985 and 1986.

He has played on six Canadian World Cup teams and in 1983 he won the individual title and in 1985 he joined with Dan Halldorson to give Canada the team championship.

When the final round started at the 1981 Quad Cities Open, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in TOUR history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his elusive triumph.

It was worth \$36,000 and that nearly equaled his entire career earnings to that point, and nearly doubled the amount he won in 1980.

"This is great," he said. "It's what we all play for out here. When things are not going well, you sometimes wonder if you made the right decision. Winning makes it all worth it."

Andy Bean has been recognized as one of the leading players in the game for more than a decade, so it was unfortunate he had to suffer through a season as he did in 1987.

He developed tendinitis in his right elbow early in the spring and was forced to miss several of his favorite tournaments. When he did try to play, it wasn't the vintage Bean.

He did play admirably in the Ryder Cup matches last fall, winning his singles against tough Ian Woosnam and, in best-ball when he was paired with Payne Stewart on the second day, Andy birdied four of the first five holes at Muirfield Village. They won easily.

Except for his rookie season of 1976 and last year, he has been one of the game's leading money winners. Even in 1981, when he missed more than half of the year due to a slight fracture near the base of his left thumb, he still went over \$100,000.

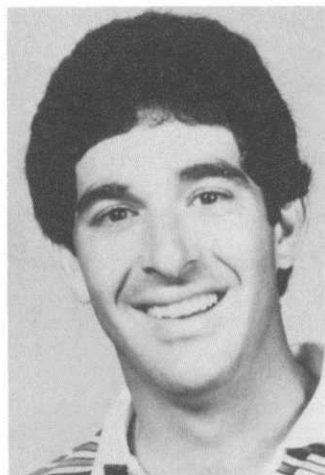
It is easy to understand why the Doral Country Club is one of his favorite stops. He won the Doral-Eastern Open three times. It was his first on TOUR in 1977 and he repeated in 1982 and 1986.

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, GA, where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, FL, where his father bought a course.

"I was lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

He is one of the biggest men in the game and he has the personality and the heart to match his size. Wherever the game is played, he always is one of the more popular men in the field.

It is easy to understand why Chip Beck smiles most of the time. The way he has been playing over the years, he has every right to be happy. He closed the official 1987 season with back-to-back second places in the Seiko-Tucson Open and then the Nabisco Championships of Golf.

He has progressed steadily up the ladder of success every year on TOUR with the exception of one and there seems to be no limit as to how high he can climb.

In 1984, for example, he finished third on four occasions. Two years ago, he was second twice and one of them was in the U. S. Open when he closed with a superb round of 65.

Last year, he had back-to-back ties for third place in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic and in the Memorial Tournament and added another in the International. He went on to enjoy his most profitable year.

He considers driving the ball and chipping as two of the stronger parts of his game and when everything is right, he prefers to play with a slight draw.

Chip well remembers the day he was introduced to golf. He was only 10-years old at the time, and his mother was going to the Highland Golf Club in Fayetteville, NC, to attend a clinic that was to be given by the head professional.

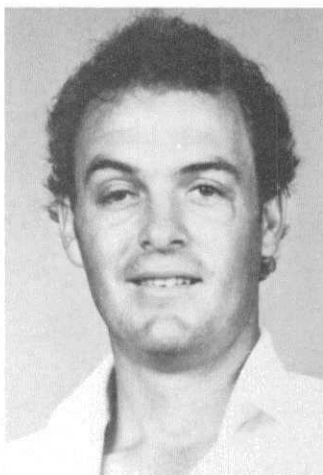
"I really didn't want to go," Chip says with a laugh, "but she woke me up at 7 a.m. so that we could go together. It was being given on the course where Ray Floyd played as a boy."

Once he started to hit balls, he was hooked. He played all summer and the golf career of Chip Beck was well under way. By the end of the summer, he won the Pee Wee division at the club.

A journalism major at the University of Georgia, he enjoyed considerable success on the Bulldog golf team before setting his sights on the TOUR. As a senior, he was named the Athlete of the Year, and that's the first time a golfer had ever been honored at Georgia. He won six collegiate events, such as the Southern Intercollegiate three times and the All-America championship hosted by the University of Houston. He also won the Dixie Intercollegiate and was an All-America choice three years, twice being on the first team.

Incidentally, in 1973 he was nosed out of the North Carolina State interscholastic title by Scott Hoch. Twice he won the Carolinas Junior title and followed with two victories in the Carolinas Amateur championship.

A few days before he headed for the Southern Open in Columbus, GA, in the Fall of 1983, Ronnie Black confided: "I know I belong on the TOUR after the year I've had. I'm not satisfied, but I know I've played even better than what the money list shows."

At that point, he had accumulated more than \$40,000 and was assured of exempt status for 1984. The finest was yet to come.

He was at his career best on the Green Island course and, when most people were cheering for Sam Torrance, the flamboyant Scot who stopped off on his way to the Ryder Cup matches, Ronnie came from three-strokes behind to tie Sam at nine-under-par 271. Then, Black gained the victory with a six-foot putt for a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

It was just a warm-up for the 1984 campaign. His biggest day came on the Kingsmill course in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He trailed Willie Wood by seven strokes entering the last round, but he shot an eight-under-par 63 to edge Wood by a stroke.

The 1985 season was a disappointing one for Black on the golf course, but it was quite a year for him overall. In addition to getting married, he also moved into a new home. It had some effect on his game.

He started to work with John Redman in 1986 and has become a better ball-striker. "My putting held me back a little last year," he said, "but I hit the ball as solid as I ever had in my career."

Ronnie was nine-years old when he first picked up a golf club. His father was the basketball coach at Lovington (NM) High School, so he grew up in a sports atmosphere. "Dad told me then that I couldn't go to the course until I was able to hit the ball from our front yard, across the road and over a fence on the other side. It was a shot of about 75 yards."

His older brother, James, became the head professional at Pinewood Country Club in Beaumont, TX, and as Ronnie came of age, James took him under his wing. "He recruited me for Lamar University and I worked in his shop for a while," Ronnie said. "Mostly, though, he let me play and practice."

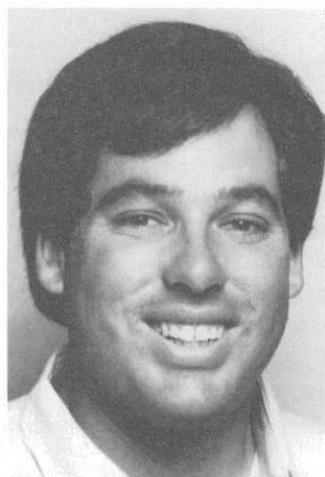
Until he went to Lamar, he had never played on a course with bunkers or one of championship caliber, but he always dreamed of someday playing on the PGA TOUR.

He went to the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1981 and made it. His first stop was the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in January of 1982 and he recalls, "That was the very first TOUR tournament I had ever seen in person. I was low qualifier at Randolph Park with a 66 and thought I was going to knock everyone dead. I have to admit, I had a rude awakening coming."

"I did a lot of watching the first year," he said, "and I definitely was intimidated. I had never seen talent like that and I had to be the greenest person ever to come on TOUR in recent years."

He only won \$6,329 for the year, so it was back to the Qualifying School in the Fall. He finished 39th in his class and headed back out for the 1983 campaign.

Phil Blackmar admits his rookie season of 1985 on the PGA TOUR was even better than he expected it would be.

He won the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open in a playoff over Dan Pohl and Jodie Mudd as he birdied the first extra hole to earn \$108,000. He went on to collect a healthy \$198,537 for the year.

"It wasn't really a surprise," he said of the victory, "but I hadn't planned on it either. I did know that if I got hot, I could win. It was just a question of being lucky and getting hot at the right time."

He was a little surprised at the way the next two seasons developed. Swing problems early in 1986 led to a slow start but he salvaged the year with a tie for third place in the Vantage Championship.

Last year, he said he wasn't into the game mentally early on, but after taking some time off in the summer, he finished strong with a tie for second place in the Pensacola Open. He had three eagles that week.

Phil started in the game as a youngster and he had a teacher with good credentials—his father. Phil's dad won the National Lefthanders title in 1965 and he introduced Phil to the game.

In fact, his dad caddied for him on numerous occasions during his first two years on TOUR.

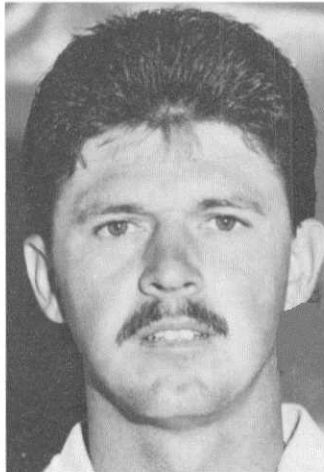
Phil was a three-time All-Southwest Conference selection while at the University of Texas and he enjoyed similar success on the mini-tour circuit after being graduated in 1979.

He performed splendidly at the 1984 Qualifying Tournament at La Quinta, CA, shooting rounds of 69-72-70-66-70-72—419 to finish one shot in back of medalist Paul Azinger.

With his TOUR card firmly in hand, Blackmar headed out on TOUR with a good attitude and a plan of attack.

"I recognize my limitations. I'm not one of the pure strikers out here," he said. "However, when I get hot I'm going to try and run the table."

When Jay Don Blake was a little boy in the Utah town of St. George, he spent much of his time on the nine-hole golf course that was adjacent to his family's home. It seemed natural, both his mother and his father and his four brothers all played the game.

By the time Jay Don was 12, he knew that he wanted to play golf for a living. With little formal instruction (he's never taken a lesson), he set out to accomplish his goal.

He attended Utah State and for the first two years, was merely content with showing a little improvement. However, his junior year "things started to come together."

He won the NCAA title his junior year and then carried over the feeling from "my first real big confidence boost" to have an outstanding senior year that saw him named as the 1981 College Player-of-the-Year.

He nearly repeated as the NCAA titleist losing by a single shot to Ron Commans after he held a six-shot lead entering the final round. Despite that disappointment, he was ready to turn pro and earn his spot on TOUR.

Another disappointment awaited him, though, in that he not only failed to find a position on TOUR, he also could not find a sponsor to help him out financially. Discouraged, he basically quit playing until 1984 when he began to play in local tournaments.

He played on the mini-tours and had a successful 1986 season on the TPA circuit before heading back to the 1986 TOUR Qualifying Tournament. A disastrous 78 on the fifth day left him in danger of once again failing to earn his card, but he showed the stuff of a champion by rallying with a five-under par 67 over the tough TPC at PGA West course the final day to secure his position on TOUR.

The year started somewhat slowly for Blake and a little doubt crept into his mind.

"I really didn't know how good I was when I got out here," said Blake. "I knew I was out here with the big boys now and I wasn't sure of where I stood."

He kept his game moving forward, though, and by the summer his game was in high gear. He posted a good five-figure finish at Anheuser-Busch and then played in the final group on the last day at the Federal Express St. Jude Classic.

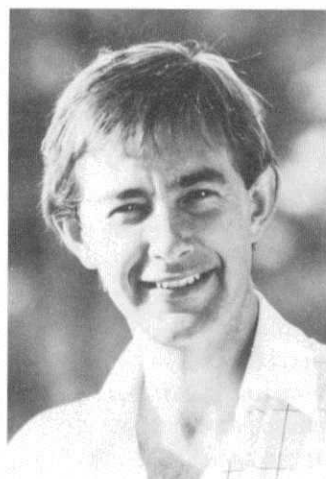
"I was disappointed with the way I played that day," said Blake. "However, it was a great learning experience for me playing under that kind of pressure with a player like Tom Kite."

He used that experience to help him post his best finish of the year, a T10 at the Provident Classic a month later. That finish boosted him into solid position on the money list and he ended the year with \$87,634 good for 106th place.

"It was a pretty consistent year for me," stated Blake. "I accomplished everything I set out to do, namely keeping my card."

It was along time in coming for Blake, but it looks like he's here to stay on TOUR now.

Ken started in the game at age 12. There was a golf course nearby his home in England, and he said, "it was a natural thing to go over there and caddy and play."

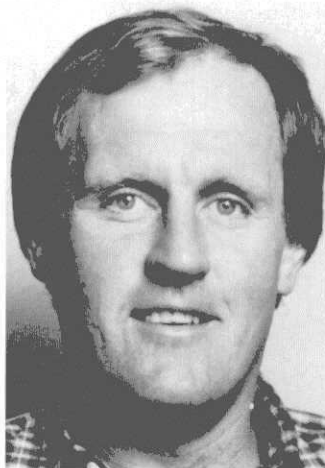
When he was 15-years old, he thought he'd like to play on the professional tour, and did turn pro when he was 18. He worked in a golf shop for a year and then headed out on the British/European circuit.

He advanced rapidly. As a 20-year old in 1977, he found himself on the Ryder Cup team for the matches against the U. S. at Royal Lytham in England. He won the Irish Open in 1978 and again played in the Ryder Cup competition in 1979.

During his first six years, he only had the one victory but a lot of good finishes. "I was putting too much pressure on myself, especially the last day," he explained.

George Burns will be enjoying the rewards of winning the 1987 Shearson Lehman Bros.-Andy Williams Open for many, many years.

He not only earned the title with a tournament record score of 22-under-par 266 and a first-place check for \$90,000, he also collected \$40,000 in zero coupon Treasury certificates that will be worth \$200,000 in 20 years.

In an effort to attract a strong field, Shearson Lehman Brothers offered the coupons to the leaders each day. If there was a tie, the certificates carried over to the next day's play.

Burns won the first day with a brilliant round of 63. He was tied by Craig Stadler the second day and Ray Floyd and J.C. Snead were tied after the third round, so the second-and-third day certificates carried over to the final round.

George was two-strokes behind entering the last round, but he used two eagles on the incoming nine to win by four strokes and had a last round of 65. As a result, he collected all four of the certificates. If held to their 20-year maturity, they will be worth \$200,000.

It provided a nice "comeback" year for George after a mediocre year in 1986. He did win in 1985 at the Bank of Boston Classic by a healthy six strokes.

George's first victory came in 1979 at the Walt Disney World National Team Play event and he had Ben Crenshaw for a partner. Early the next year, he won the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur.

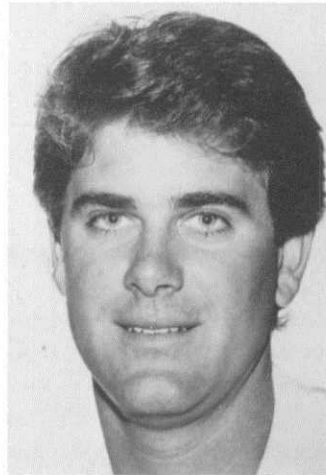
Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

However, it was a full year after his graduation before he blossomed as a force in amateur golf. While working for two years in the New York City area in sales and promotion, he had a chance to play often, and in 1973 he won the Canadian Amateur. The following year Burns won the Porter Cup, North-South Amateur and the New York State Amateur.

Burns was selected to play on the Walker Cup team in 1975 and also on the U.S. side in the World Amateur team championship.

The Oakwood Country Club in Coal Valley, IL, will always be a special place for Curt Byrum and it's all because the sponsors of the Hardee's Golf Classic chose to give him one of their exemptions.

It turned out to be the week in 1986 that turned his career around. He had lost his membership on the PGA TOUR the year before so he had spent the first six months of the season searching for games.

Hardee's was to be his first TOUR start of 1986 and he played exceptionally well. A 64 the first day left him one stroke behind Bob Lohr. A 70 the next for a 134 total kept him close to the lead but when he came back with another 64 the third day, he was in front of Mark Wiebe by two strokes.

The two of them fought their way through the final round and Curt still was leading by one going to the 17th hole. There, he bogeyed. Mark birdied to take the lead and he went on to win. Nevertheless, Curt held on to second place and collected \$43,200.

With that amount, he again was eligible to obtain special TOUR membership and he made the most of it.

A month later, he joined with Bobby Nichols in the Showdown Classic at Jeremy Ranch in Utah—a popular Senior PGA TOUR event—and he played brilliantly as they won the title. Although the \$33,750 he collected was not official money, his banker loved it and his performance proved to be a tremendous confidence booster.

He used that confidence to put together an excellent 1987 campaign in which he won \$212,450 with a runnerup finish at the prestigious Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village.

"I was very happy with the 1987 season; I accomplished all of my goals," said Byrum.

Curt and his younger brother Tom grew up in Onida, South Dakota. "We used to have a nine-hole course with sand greens there," Curt said. "It's grown over now, but when Tom and I are home, we get out the mowers and cut down a couple of the fairways so we can practice."

He was exceptional as a high school athlete. He was all-state as a quarterback in football and as a guard in basketball. His senior year in 1977, he was named the South Dakota Athlete of the Year.

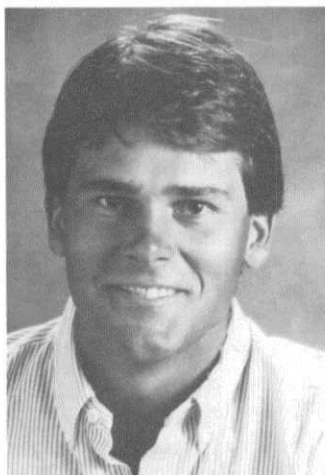
He was recruited by the University of New Mexico to play golf so that's where he decided to go.

He left school after three years and went to work at Marco Island, FL, so that he could meet Ken Venturi and get his help. Curt was still an amateur at the time but Ken took him under his wing and they still work together.

He went through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982, the first time he tried it. He played in 1983 and in 1984 without a lot of success. He had to return to the Qualifying Tournament again in the Fall of 1985, only this time he didn't make it.

He seemed to be headed for a long, lost year until the good folks at Hardee's came along.

Tom Byrum may be a first on the PGA TOUR. He went from riding bulls in the rodeo to playing golf at its highest level.

A little grin crosses his handsome face when he explains, "I used to spend my summers in the 4-H Club rodeos. Did it for seven years. I used to do a little of everything but I was best at riding the bulls."

After a slight pause, he added, "but that gets very old at a young age. That was when I started to play more golf."

It was a good move. As a rookie in 1986, he was impressive in compiling four top 10 finishes with his best being the runner-up in the Southwest Classic. Last year, he challenged several times and took a huge step up the money ladder.

A lot of hard work and patience has paid off for Tom, but he also points to the week of the Hardee's Golf Classic in July of 1986 as one that had a tremendous impact on his life on TOUR.

His older brother, Curt, who had lost his TOUR card at the end of 1985, received a sponsor's exemption and finished second and earned \$43,200. That was enough to get his playing privileges back so the Byrum brothers were a team again.

"Curt has helped me with my game more than anyone else," Tom said. "We know each other's swings and we constantly watch each other. A lot of the success I've had happened after he came back on TOUR."

After he was graduated from high school, Tom headed for New Mexico where Curt was going to the University. He took a part-time job at a country club in Albuquerque and became a walk-on for the golf team. He played for two years, one of them with Curt, and then transferred to New Mexico State where he did exceptionally well.

"That was when I decided to see how far I could go in the game," he said. After he was graduated in 1984 with a degree in Sociology, he entered the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984. He didn't make it. "I simply wasn't ready," he said, matter-of-factly.

He played in Asia in the Spring of 1985 and the experience was invaluable. He went back to the Q-Tournament in the Fall of 1985 and made it easily, finishing third.

Although his best finish was the second place in the Southwest Classic, he felt the Western Open was the one that got away. He was in position to win it and was four-under par early in the back nine the last afternoon. Then tragedy struck. He took triple bogeys at the 14th and 17th holes and finished at one-over-par 289. Incidentally, Tom Kite won the playoff after four players tied at two-under-par 286.

"I should have been more conservative the last few holes," he said. "It was an experience I won't forget and someday, it will help me."

The folks up in Onida, South Dakota — all 850 of them — are mighty proud of the Byrum boys and well they should be.

Mark Calcavecchia will tell you there is nothing quite like living a dream and then one day discover that dreams really do come true.

He lived his dream to the fullest last year when he blossomed into a true star winning the Honda Classic and finishing 10th on the money list with \$522,398.

He also had two runnerup finishes and ended the year with 9 top 10 efforts. He won the EPSON Par-Breakers stat and along the way he compiled enough points to be named to the 1987 Ryder Cup team.

After his family moved from Laurel, Nebraska, to the Palm Beach area in Florida when he was 13-years old, he discovered he could play golf every day of the year. "I couldn't believe it at first," he said, "and the greatest thing was playing golf on Christmas Day afternoon."

He enrolled at the University of Florida and played well, but after three years, he felt "it was time to move on."

He turned professional in January of 1981 and six months later, he qualified for his TOUR card. He was barely 21-years old. As he recalls, "I didn't have the mental capability to play against these guys. I was overwhelmed."

It was a big shock to him at the end of 1985 when he finished 162nd on the money list to lose his card and then he failed to get through the Qualifying Tournament.

There were a couple of weeks when he caddied for his good friend Ken Green.

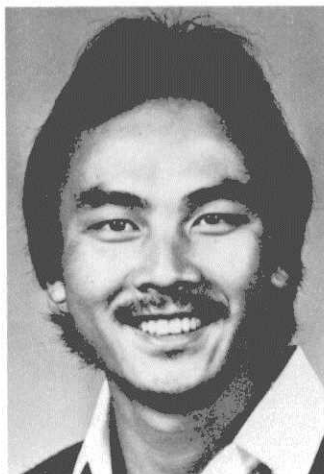
He did it at the 1985 U. S. Open at Oakland Hills. Another week was at the Honda Classic a year ago.

His move up the ladder started the week after the Honda. He entered the Open qualifier for the Doral-Eastern Open and earned one of the four-spots. His first round of 65 at Doral was good enough for the first-round lead. He went on to tie for eighth place and won \$13,500 in his first start of the year.

In September, he made his move. He tied for seventh in the Bank of Boston Classic, tied for ninth in the Greater Milwaukee Open (thanks to a third-round 63) and the next week took charge in the Southwest Classic in Abilene.

He led by five strokes after three rounds but after seven holes on Sunday, he was one-stroke behind Tom Byrum. He wouldn't let this one get away, though, as he birdied three of the last five holes to win by three strokes.

Tze-Chung Chen had several opportunities to win during his first four years on the PGA TOUR but when another came along early in his fifth season, he took advantage of it.

Ben Crenshaw was the victim in the Los Angeles Open at the famed Riviera Country Club.

T. C. (as he generally is known) and Ben were playing together the last afternoon. Ben made a marvelous birdie putt of 16 feet on the 18th green. Chen faced a putt of about 14 feet to tie — and he made it. "When Ben made that putt," T. C. said, "I thought he had won. I just told myself, 'Don't be short. Even if you three-putt, don't be short.'"

On the first extra hole, Ben was bunkered in two after driving onto a gravel path. Chen was on the green, 12 feet from the cup. T. C. managed his par, while Ben suffered a bogey.

T. C. was 17-years old when he first started to play golf and in just eight years, he found himself on the PGA TOUR.

He gained a certain level of notoriety when he tied for the lead in the 1983 Kemper Open with four other players, only to lose in the playoff to Fred Couples. He gained world-wide attention at the 1985 United States Open championship at Oakland Hills, Michigan.

He equaled the competitive course record with a first-day five-under-par 65. He added a 69 for a six-under-par 134 and held a one-stroke lead after two rounds. He increased it to two strokes over Andy North after another 69 put him at seven-under-par 203.

His dream came to a shattering halt on the fifth hole of the final day when he suffered a quadruple-bogey eight (at one point he double hit the ball trying to pitch from deep rough) and then bogeyed the next three. He finished the day with a 77 and in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Dave Barr, one-stroke behind the new champion, North.

His older brother, Tze-Ming Chen, started him in the game, and he still does very well on the Asian/Japan Tours. In the fall of 1983, Tze-Ming won the Dunlop Phoenix tournament in Japan by defeating Tom Watson in a playoff. Tze-Ming qualified for the 1984 World Series of Golf, and during the week at Firestone Country Club, T.C. caddied for his brother.

The Chens lived near a golf course in Taipei, and T.C. said, "everyday, I would watch people play golf, and then I would caddy for my brother."

He progressed so rapidly, that in 1980, he was selected to play on Taiwan's World Amateur Cup team and competition was held in Pinehurst. "I finished second to Hal Sutton," he said proudly.

He turned professional just after that, and played on the Asian Tour for two years. "I thought it would be good for me to come over here and try for the experience," he said.

When he needs help he goes to his brother, but it is difficult since he is so far away. "It takes 15 hours from Los Angeles," he pointed out.

During the Anheuser-Busch Classic at Kingsmill, VA, Bobby Clampett knew he was on the right track.

He will be the first to tell you he has not lived up to his own expectations but he challenged all the way at the Anheuser-Busch and finished in second place, just a stroke behind Mark McCumber. The keys were his middle two rounds of 66 and 65 on the par 71 course.

He worked extensively with David Rasmussen of Milwaukee and, during much of the year, David also caddied for him.

"He had a great input on how to apply what we already know," Bobby said, "and it was the application of knowledge that made the difference."

Besides, he also says, "I had the best putting week I've had in a long time" during the A-B Classic.

When Bobby joined the TOUR in the summer of 1980, he did so with considerable fanfare. His amateur credentials were rather impressive, to say the least.

He made it onto the TOUR without going through the Qualifying Tournament by earning enough money during the spring and early summer to meet the minimum money guidelines for new membership.

Bobby started to play golf at age 10, using his father's old clubs. Lee Martin, who was the pro at the Carmel Valley Ranch at the time, gave him his first lessons. "I worked at the club, doing odd jobs," he recalls, "and my pay was playing privileges. Mainly, I picked up range balls."

When he was 13, Ben Doyle assumed duties at the club, and he became Bobby's tutor.

He was successful in California Junior golf, and in 1976 and 1977, he was the state's leading point getter. In 1977, he won the California State junior title.

He moved on to Brigham Young University, where, for three years, he worked on his golfing skills and his education. "I wanted that balance," he said, "and that is why I chose BYU."

He received an associates degree in French in 1980, and speaks the language fluently.

Keith Clearwater believed he had the golf game to win on the PGA TOUR but, as he said, "when it will happen, you just don't know."

Even in his wildest dreams, however, he never pictured himself winning the way he did, first with back-to-back six-under-par 64s the final day of the prestigious Colonial National Invitation Tournament and then closed the official season by winning the Centel Classic. He became the first "rookie" in a decade to win two in a year.

Consider these figures. His total score of 14-under-par 266 equaled the Colonial record set in 1985 by Corey Pavin. And, his final two rounds of 12-under-par 128 on Sunday put him in a class by himself in the record book.

"This is just the greatest experience of my life," he said, "at least on the golf course."

Keith was five strokes out of the lead at the halfway mark and then had to face a 36-hole windup on Sunday since the second round on Friday was rained out and had to be played on Saturday.

"Bob Tway and I were talking about it on the practice tee (Saturday evening) and we figured a 65 in the morning round would put me in pretty good position."

Indeed. His 64 moved him into a tie for second place, just one stroke behind Ben Crenshaw who was leading at nine-under-par 201. He stayed close to the lead through the early going in the afternoon and then made his move on the back nine with birdies at the 11th, 12th, 13th and 15th holes. He won by three strokes over Davis Love III and collected \$108,000.

He gained more national attention at the U. S. Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco when he equaled the Open record with a six-under-par 64 in the third round.

Keith started in the game at age 12. "There was a municipal course near our home in Walnut Creek (CA), and I'd sneak across the fence with my buddies. As soon as I started to play, I knew I wanted to be a golfer."

He would read the "how to" books on golf and when he was 14-years old, he started to work under Ben Doyle at Carmel Valley.

He enjoyed success at the high school and junior level and then moved on to Brigham Young University where he was a teammate of such TOUR players as Bobby Clampett, Rick Fehr and Richard Zokol. He earned All-America status in 1981, the year he helped to lead BYU to the NCAA team championship.

He attempted to obtain his TOUR playing privileges four times without success.

He became the third player in NIT history to win on his first appearance at Colonial.

The Clearwaters have made Utah their home for nearly a decade, but when he seeks help with his game, he goes to Mike LaBauve at Alta Mesa in the Phoenix area.

Lennie Clements is another of those fellows who was so determined that he would make in onto the PGA TOUR, that he worked exceptionally hard until he did. And, when he earned his TOUR card in April of 1981, he proved he belonged.

He earned the right to play in the big time the hard way. After failing to make it in the TOUR school, he made it via the Open Qualifying, finally meeting the minimum money guideline in his 10th and final chance at the Magnolia Classic. He won \$3,150 there after a tie for fifth, and became a member the next week at the Tallahassee Open.

He blossomed into a force to be reckoned with in 1986 with four top ten finishes and \$112,642 in earnings. It was easily his best year on TOUR.

Clements was consistent all year long making the cut in 19 of 28 outings. He started the year off strong with a T9 at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and picked up a check for \$16,800 and he played well the rest of the year.

He continued his fine play last year collecting a career high \$124,989 with three top ten finishes. He was a contender until late in the game at the U.S. Open before he eventually finished tied for ninth and later in the year he tied for fourth at the Beatrice Western Open.

He had two strong finishes in 1982 on two of the toughest courses on TOUR. He tied for fourth in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open after making five straight birdies in the last round en route to a closing 66 at the Riviera Country Club.

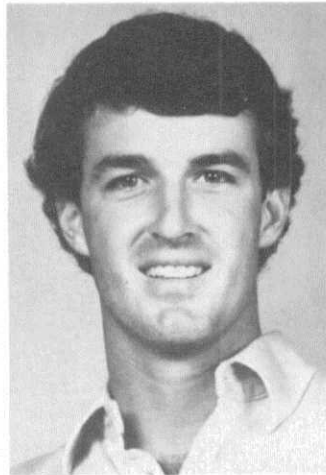
He tied for fifth place in the Colonial National Invitation. He was informed on the Tuesday morning of the tournament that he was in the field and he proceeded to shoot 66-69 at the Colonial Country Club to take the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Tom Kite.

He said it was a special treat to be paired with Nicklaus for the third round, but before play began, he was asked if he knew Jack. Grinning, he replied, "I met him once at Pebble Beach, but I'm sure he doesn't remember me."

He said he has been working to lengthen his game off the tee. "I've made a couple of other positive changes in my swing, changes I had to make to stay on TOUR."

Two fellows from San Diego, Jack Harden and Ben Stewart, have been the most instrumental in molding his game. Driving, short irons and putting are the strong points, and, when things are going well, he plays the ball left to right.

It is safe to say Russ Cochran is the finest lefthanded golfer on the PGA TOUR and probably is the best since Bob Charles of New Zealand was winning TOUR events in the 60's and early 70's.

The Tournament Players Series in 1983 gave him the break he needed for 1984 and he certainly made the most of his opportunity. He won \$133,342 with a tie for second place in the B.C. Open, his best.

"The Magnolia Classic (opposite the Masters Tournament) was the first of the Tournament Players Series. I wanted to go there to see how I would do, but if I didn't do well, I would have to go home and try to find a sponsor for the rest of the year. I was hoping to get a sponsor's exemption at Magnolia, and I did."

The result was a victory and a check for \$27,000, setting him up for the rest of the year.

He only won \$7,968 in 18 regular TOUR events, but he added another victory in the Greater Baltimore Open on the TPS circuit and won \$100,863 in eight starts. He was the leading money winner and thus gained exempt status on the regular TOUR for 1984.

Although he easily retained his exempt status through 1985 and 1986, he wasn't up to par physically and it cut into his effectiveness. He struggled early last year, but by the end of April, his game started to come around. At one stretch, he made the cut in 11 straight events.

The highlight of the season was a tie for second in the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis. He finished just one stroke behind Curtis Strange and many of his friends from Kentucky were there to see him do it.

Russ started in golf when he was about 10-years-old. He used to go to a neighboring course with his older brother. A couple of years later, when he won a state age-group tournament, he truly was hooked. He played junior golf in the area and then through high school, winning the state scholastic title in 1975. He went to the University of Kentucky and played for three more years.

Oh, yes, he does play lefthanded. "When I was younger, I used ladies' clubs because they were the only lefthanded ones I could find. Several people told me I should switch around and try to play right-handed, but no one made a real effort to change me, so I stayed with it. I do everything left-handed, anyway."

Including accepting healthy checks on the PGA TOUR.

Jim Colbert has every reason to be proud of his record on the PGA TOUR, not only as a player but also for his efforts while serving admirably for many years as a Player Director on the Policy Board.

His biggest-and-brightest smile breaks out, however, when he says, "I may be the only guy on the regular TOUR who has three grandsons."

Then he adds, "Our oldest daughter, Debbie, has two sons, Jim Colbert Fenton Dietz and Jermy Dietz; and our second oldest, Christy, has one, Kyle Yonke."

There may never be another year quite like 1983 for Jim. He set a goal of winning at least two tournaments and more than \$200,000. He had never accomplished those marks in a single season before, but he did that year.

He won the Colonial National Invitation in a playoff against Fuzzy Zoeller and towards the end of the season, he won the Texas Open in San Antonio. His numbers added up to \$223,810.

He knew that sooner or later he would win in San Antonio. It has a special place in his heart. It was there in 1966 that he won his first check as a member of the TOUR, and it was there in the 1982 Texas Open that he went over the \$1 million mark in career earnings.

Jim was an all-state football player in Kansas and went to Kansas State University on a scholarship, but he switched to golf full-time when he lost his desire for combat after his freshman year.

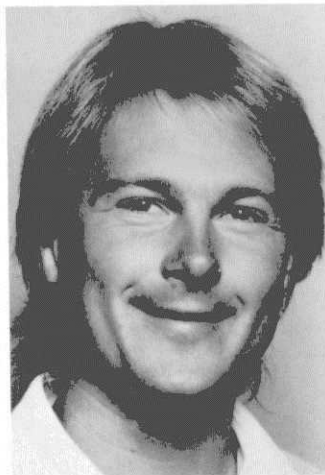
He won the Kansas State junior golf title at age 11, so he knew at an early age he could play this game, too. He was second in the 1964 NCAA tournament and won the 1965 Kansas Amateur. That fall, he went to the TOUR's Qualifying School and made it.

The first victory was a long time coming, in the 1969 Monsanto Open in Pensacola. His most memorable victory might have been in the 1974 American Golf Classic at Firestone Country Club in Akron. He had to defeat Raymond Floyd, Gay Brewer and Forrest Fezler in the playoff.

Last year was not an easy one for Jim. Severe back problems limited his schedule to 10 events. In August, however, he enjoyed a trip to Vail, CO, and won the Jerry Ford Invitational.

He has plenty to keep him busy. His golf course business now has five courses under its umbrella with two of them in his hometown of Las Vegas.

Everyone loves to see a young man rewarded for hard work, so it has been especially pleasing to see John Cook enjoy such years as he experienced in the last two. As they say, nice things do happen to nice people.

While physical problems cut into his effectiveness in 1982, 1984 and 1985, he has shown that when healthy, he's one of the best.

He was never better than he was during The International at Castle Pines near Denver in August of 1987. He went the distance in the tournament that uses a modified Stableford system for scoring and earned \$180,000. It was an eagle three at the 17th hole that put him over the top.

"I'm not much of an eagle person," he said, "and I wasn't thinking eagle at the time." He hit a 4 iron for his second shot to 12 feet and made the putt. "I turned an average year into a good one," he said.

A week after Jan presented him with Jason, their third child, in January of 1986, John played extremely well in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. It was his first start of the year and he tied with his good friend, Donnie Hammond. Unfortunately for John, Donnie won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

In 1983, when he earned \$216,868, he won the Canadian Open in a stirring six-hole playoff over Johnny Miller and accumulated seven top ten finishes. The one that got away, though, left a scar for awhile.

Hal Sutton was in the scoring tent behind the 18th green after his final round of the Tournament Players Championship with a five-under par 283. John was on the 18th tee, needing a par four to tie. Unfortunately, he hooked his tee shot into the water at the Players' Club, suffered a double bogey and tied for third place.

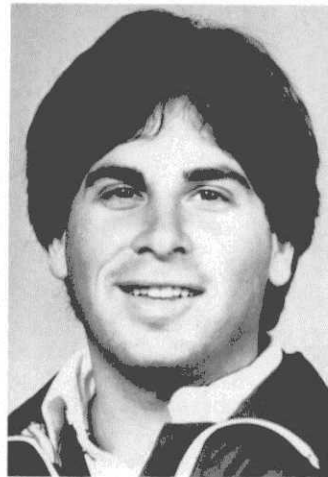
One of his best-ever efforts on TOUR came in the 1981 Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, when he was tied with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. John finally won the title on the third extra hole. Due to heavy rains, it was a 54-hole tournament.

He has always known of the thrill of victory. He tasted it early when in 1974 he defeated Gary Hallberg for the World Junior crown. John's biggest title came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur Championship. The next year, he lost in the final to Mark O'Meara.

Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf convinced him he should go to Ohio State, even though his school years were spent in southern California.

He was an All-American choice three years, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. In December of 1983, he was on the U.S. World Cup team with Rex Caldwell and they combined to win the team championship.

There are few young players in the game with the potential for greatness that is possessed by Fred Couples. During his years on the TOUR, he continually displayed an ability to rise to the occasion, especially on the more difficult courses.

It was never more clearly demonstrated than in the 1984 Tournament Players Championship on the Tournament Players Club course where every shot must be precise.

Fred took the lead the second day with a brilliant record-tying eight-under par 64 and he stayed in front the rest of the way. He had to fight off the challenges of the game's finest players to get the victory. Seve Ballesteros and Tom Watson were chasing him after the third round and the final margin was only one stroke over Lee Trevino.

The 1986 season was a forgettable one for Couples, but he returned more determined than ever in 1987. His hard work paid off with his third TOUR triumph at the Byron Nelson Classic where he beat Mark Calcavecchia in a playoff.

He ended the year with 9 top finishes and a career high \$441,025 good for 19th on the money list.

"It was a lot more fun than 1986," said Couples of last year. "I practiced harder and it paid off for me."

Fred's first victory came the hard way in the Kemper Open on the demanding Congressional Country Club course. He had to defeat Gil Morgan, Scott Simpson, Barry Jaeckel and Tze-Chung Chen in a playoff. On the second extra hole, the 211-yard 16th, he hit a splendid five-iron shot within two feet of the hole and he made it for his victory. "I felt like crying," he said. "I've never hit a shot that amounted to so much."

He convinced a lot of people at the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa that his future is very bright indeed. Fred shot a closing four-under par 66 to gain a tie for third place, but during the first round, he really had eyes popping. He birdied the last six holes for a championship record score of 29.

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. Within a few years, he was competing in junior events in the Seattle area, and then, in high school, came the big decision, one forced because the golf and baseball seasons overlapped.

As Ben Crenshaw thought about what he had accomplished in winning the Masters Tournament in the Spring of 1984, he said slowly, "It's a sweet, sweet thing. I don't think there ever will be anything sweeter for me."

His victory at the Augusta National Golf Club was one of the more popular of the year—or any year—for there probably is not a player in the game who is more loved by his colleagues.

Ben's 67 gave him the first-round lead over Lee Trevino by one stroke, but he slipped back the next two days. He was four-strokes behind Mark Lye after two days and two-strokes behind Tom Kite after the third.

Through the final round, he shot a four-under-par 68 and won by two over Tom Watson with an 11-under-par 277. "Ben deserved it," Watson said later. "He's been in the hunt in a lot of major championships. This is his first, and I know what it must mean to him."

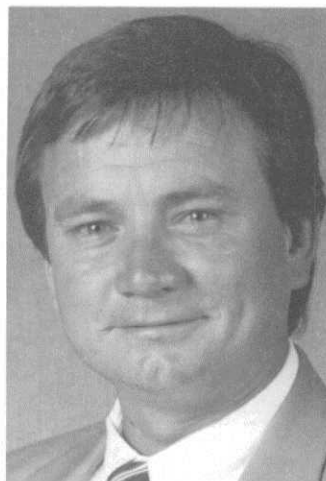
He followed the great year with a horrible season in 1985 but it wasn't diagnosed until late in the year that he was suffering from a hyperactive thyroid.

Once on the proper medication, he came back with another super year in 1986, highlighted by victories in the Buick Open and the Vantage Championship. "It feels tremendous to win," he said. "Last year (1985) was totally bleak because I didn't know what was wrong."

He only won the USF&G Classic in New Orleans in 1987 but said, "Collectively, it was a very good year. I would like to have won more, but I had a lot of top 10 finishes (14), so I played very well."

He also had the best record of anyone in the more significant events, with fourth-place finishes at the Masters, U.S. and British Opens, a seventh at the PGA and a ninth at the Tournament Players Championship.

If you are looking for a good example of what perseverance can do for you, you need look no further than to Mike Donald.

He has had to work hard in order to move up the ladder on the PGA TOUR—harder than most people—but during the last few years he has been enjoying some of the game's rewards.

For the first time in his career, he earned well over \$100,000 in 1984 and he has repeated the performance the last two seasons. "I learned to be more patient with myself and my game," he said.

A tie for third in the Canadian Open highlighted the 1986 campaign for him. Last year, it was a tie for second in the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis.

"I stood on the last tee with a chance to win my first," he said, "but I was pleased that I was able to hang in there all the way."

Well liked by his peers, Mike was elected last Fall to a four-year term as Players Director on the TOUR's Policy Board.

When Mike was in the ninth grade, he gave up baseball to concentrate on golf. It was a good move. He went on to Broward Community College and won the National Junior College championship. It earned him a Chris Schenkel scholarship to Georgia Southern College.

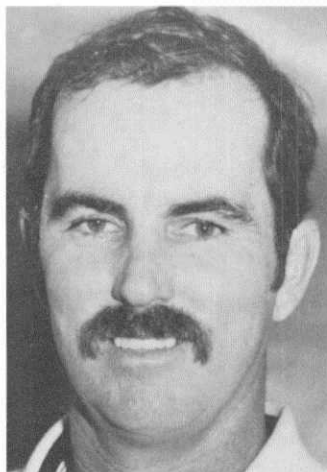
In his first tournament at Georgia Southern, he finished fifth, not bad at all when you consider the players who were 1-2 respectively were Jay Haas of Wake Forest and Chip Beck of Georgia. His parade didn't last long though, because "I had a conflict with the coach and they took my scholarship away."

So Mike headed for home. "I didn't have any money, so I delivered flowers and umpired baseball games for a year." Georgia Southern brought in a new coach the next year and Mike was back in school. Before he returned though, Mike was impressive again as he went to the finals of the 1978 North and South Amateur before losing to Gary Hallberg.

Mike started in the game at age 12. "My parents bought me a set of clubs because they didn't know what else to buy me. I loved to play baseball and I had everything I needed for that sport. They just wanted to get me something different and, even though they didn't play golf, they thought it would be a good sport for me."

In December of 1984, he joined with Vicki Alvarez of the LPGA to win the JC Penney Mixed Team Classic.

In this day of young lions on the PGA TOUR, it's not everyday that your latest success story is that of a 39-year old golfer, but Ed Dougherty is a unique story.

A TOUR regular from 1975 to 1982, Dougherty never earned more than \$27,948 in that span and had career earnings for his first eight years on TOUR of only \$138,208.

Following the 1982 season, Dougherty returned home to Pennsylvania to work at Edgemont Country Club as a club professional. During his stint there, Dougherty won the PGA Club Pro Championship in 1985 and was named that year's PGA Club Professional of the Year. He also won numerous other regional and national PGA titles and after the 1986 season ended, he decided at age 39 to return to the TOUR's Q-School.

"I'd won everything that the PGA has, the Grand Slam of club pro events," said Dougherty. "You have to decide at that point if you want to sit on your laurels or do something else."

He decided to do something else and he returned to Palm Springs for the 1986 Qualifying Tournament at the LaQuinta Dunes Course and the TPC at PGA West. He had two goals in mind—exact a little vengeance on the PGA West course for his poor performance in the 1986 Club Pro championship held there, and to regain his playing privileges on TOUR.

"I was the defending champ at the Club pro and I really played bad at PGA West," said Dougherty. "I wanted to get back at the course and that's probably the real reason I went to the Q-School."

He finished 49th in the field and narrowly earned back his player's card but at that position on the exempt list, he knew he probably would not play a lot early in the year and he remained employed on the side back at Edgemont CC.

After missing the cut in his first four outings, Dougherty suddenly posted a T6 at the Deposit Guaranty Classic and a few weeks later he earned \$16,100 for his T12 at the Kemper Open. Suddenly, things looked different.

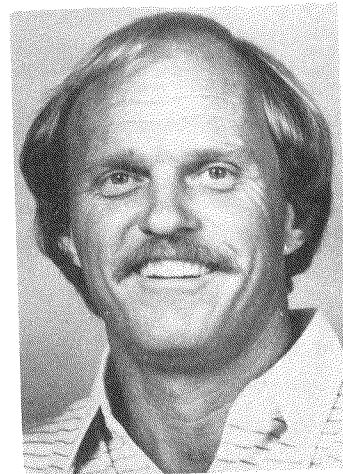
At the beginning of the year I didn't make any cuts, but all of a sudden I got into the hunt and I quit my club job back in Pennsylvania," said Dougherty who is an avid model train collector. "I re-established my goals and I set out to make the top 125."

With the year winding down to only two weeks left, Dougherty found himself in danger of losing his card. However, he showed his mettle by finishing strong at the Seiko Tucson Open and his T13 finish was worth \$11,400 and boosted him into the Top 125. He ended the year in 115th position with \$76,705.

"I made it and that's a real thrill," said Dougherty after the season. "I accomplished something, but you can't rest on your laurels in this game. The guys on TOUR are so good, you really have to work hard to earn your way out here."

Ed Dougherty's back on TOUR now and it may be awhile before he can defend his PGA club pro titles.

Bob Eastwood found it difficult to sum up his performances in 1984. So he simply said, "Incredible. I knew I was capable of winning. It was just a matter of time for me to get everything together." "Time" turned out to be in his 13th year as an active player, and he not only broke through with his first victory, but he won his second as well.

He won again in 1985 but his victory in the Byron Nelson Classic came in a rather unexpected fashion. He trailed Payne Stewart by two strokes as Payne played the last hole. Surprisingly, Payne double bogeyed the 18th to drop back into a tie with Bob. On the first extra hole, Bob won the title.

A rotator cuff problem through most of 1986 and early in 1987 gave cause for concern. Continued work in the TOUR's DP Fitness van helped considerably. Late in the summer, he was happy to say, "I feel better than I have in a long time." A couple of weeks later, he tied for second in the Southwest Classic, just one-stroke behind winner Steve Pate.

His first victory was in the 1984 USF&G Classic in New Orleans and then he won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He also tied for third in the World Series of Golf that year and said it was a "most satisfying" effort.

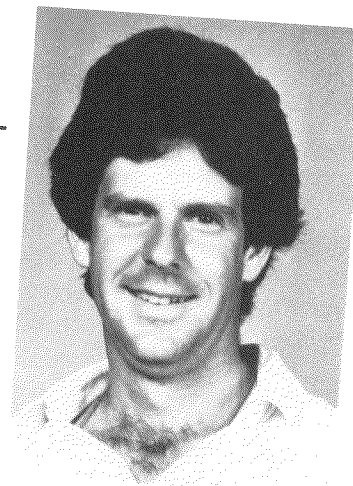
He was four years old when he started to play golf. His father was in the golf business in Stockton, CA., and helped to build the Dry Creek Ranch golf club in the 1960s. It was a family affair.

His skills surfaced early, as he won city amateur titles in Stockton and Sacramento. He won the 1966 California State Amateur and while at San Jose State, he won the West Coast Athletic Conference title.

Bob headed for the TOUR Qualifying school in the Spring of 1969 and he not only made it through, but he was the medalist. His life on the TOUR had to wait awhile, though. In October of that year, he went into the Army and was not discharged until October of 1971. So, he really didn't join the TOUR full-time until 1972.

Several people have helped him along the way, such as Bob Warner in junior golf and Tom LoPresti during his college and early days on TOUR; but in recent years, Butch Baird has been his guiding hand on the practice tee.

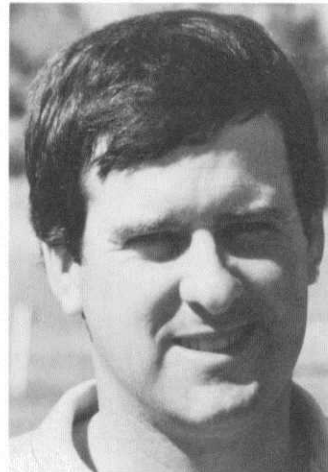

It was a strange but rather pleasant experience in 1984 for David Edwards, one he had never encountered in his golf career. "I surpassed so many of the goals I had set for myself by the end of May, that I didn't know what to do."

What he did, was take most of the rest of the year off. After the Memorial Tournament the last weekend in May, he only played in three official PGA TOUR events the rest of the year.

"It was by far my best year," he said. "After I had the good year in 1983, I wanted to build on it and keep improving. I did what I wanted to do in 1984 and more."

David's biggest week of 1984 came in the Los Angeles Open on the famed Riviera Country Club course. He shot a magnificent final-round seven-under par 64 to win by three over Jack Renner.

"Riviera always has been one of my favorite courses, and because of that, the Los Angeles Open always has been my No. 1 choice. So, to win there was something very special to me."

The victory put him in the Masters Tournament for the first time and the experience was all he expected it to be—and more. A final-round 67 boosted him into a tie for third place.

Edwards returned in 1987 to have his second straight good season highlighted by a runner-up finish to Steve Pate at the Southwest Classic. He also had one of the season's two double eagles as he holed out a driver from the fairway on the 18th hole in San Diego. All told, he won \$148,217 in 1987 for his second best year ever.

"It was a good year because I got off to a good start and that made the whole year enjoyable for me," said Edwards. "It was nice to not have to fight and grind all year long."

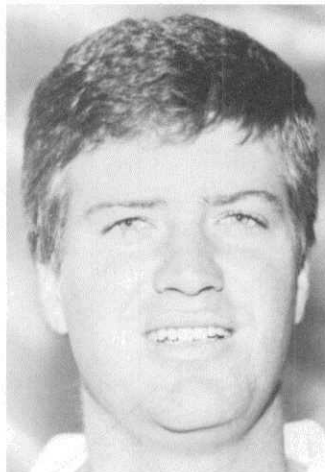
David enjoys telling people how he got started in the game. "I was about 12-years old," he said, "and I played because my brother Danny (who is five years older) played. That's all there was to it. All I did when I was growing up was tag along. I did whatever he did. He was the one who talked me into getting a set of clubs."

In the fall of 1980, they carried their brother relationship to the ultimate, winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship.

David has enjoyed his share of success during his career, but he said it hasn't been easy. "At every level, from juniors, through high school, then college and now on the TOUR, I have had to start at the bottom and work my way up. I haven't been any instant success."

He always found that success, though. He won the Oklahoma State Junior title in 1973, and won the National Collegiate championship for Oklahoma State in 1978, and twice was named to the collegiate All-America team.

He's not exactly like Crocodile Dundee, but he does come from the outback of Australia. Unlike Dundee, however, he didn't spend his youth hunting crocs, he spent them playing golf and that has turned out to be a wise choice for Steve Elkington.

Another in a long line of Australians to enjoy success here on the PGA TOUR, Elkington was a heralded rookie who lived up to his advance billing in 1987 winning \$75,738 and finishing 118th on the Official Money List.

He grew up idolizing Bruce Devlin and says that he was often compared to him back home although Steve modestly attributes that to "the fact that we were both skinny."

While winning the Doug Sanders Junior World Championship in 1981, Elkington was spotted by U. of Houston coach Dave Williams who recruited the no-longer skinny Elkington to play for the Cougars. He had an excellent career at Houston winning All-America honors twice, collecting two individual SWC titles and he helped lead the Cougars to two NCAA Championships.

It was while attending Houston that he first had thoughts of playing the TOUR, but before trying he spent a year on the European circuit as a tuneup.

"Playing in Europe was the best thing that ever happened to me," said Elkington. "It really got me ready for the PGA TOUR and I needed the experience because the TOUR is even tougher than I thought it would be."

Despite discovering an early season allergy to grass that obviously made playing golf difficult, Elkington got off to a strong start with two top ten finishes early in the year highlighted by a T8 at the Honda Classic in which he earned \$17,400. It would prove to be his best finish of the year and it propelled him to exempt status for 1988.

Good things have been expected of Elkington ever since he won the Australian-New Zealand Amateur in 1980 and the Australian Amateur in 1981. He attributes his success to playing a lot as a child.

"I grew up in the Outback and we really didn't have much to do so we spent all of our time playing, caddying, etc.," said Elkington. "I've been going at it pretty strong since I was 10 years old."

His reward was the scholarship to Houston, although he admits he almost left and he credits Coach Williams for keeping him here in the U.S.

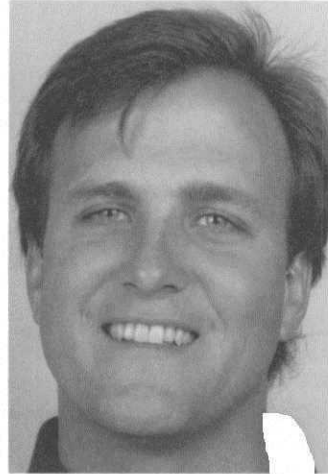
"I ended up having a great time at the University of Houston, but if it wasn't for Coach Williams I probably wouldn't have stayed at first," recalled Elkington. "I'm glad that I did."

And what about those childhood comparisons to Devlin?

"Bruce Devlin is still my favorite player, I really looked up to him and now he's a neighbor and a friend," smiled Elkington.

He might just turn out to be as good a player as Mr. Devlin as well.

It didn't take a ton of bricks to fall on his head, but it did take a life-threatening rockfall to convince Brad Fabel that life as a professional golfer wasn't so bad.

After a standout high school career in Kentucky, Fabel enrolled at the University of Houston to play golf. One season later, though, Fabel had transferred out to Brevard JC in Florida where he stayed for another year.

He then returned home to Kentucky "burned out on golf" and went to work in the coal mines of his native state. He quit playing altogether for three years before a mining accident changed his mind about the game.

"I just about got killed in a rockfall and I never went back down into the mines again," recalled Fabel. "After that, those four footers didn't look so bad."

Fabel then enrolled at Western Kentucky University and resumed playing golf with an eye on joining the PGA TOUR eventually.

He finished in a T8 at the Fall 1984 Qualifying Tournament and immediately enjoyed success on the West Coast swing picking up a check in four of his first five outings including a T11 at the Phoenix Open that was worth \$10,350 to him.

After another T11 at the Honda Classic, Fabel went into a slump that saw him miss the cut in 11 of his next 13 outings. However, he regained his stride at the Lite Quad Cities Open when his scores of 69-67-68-65—269 were good for a T3 and a check of \$17,400.

"Once I finished third at the Quad Cities Open and made over \$17,000, I figured that I was safe and would keep my card for 1986," said Fabel.

Fabel then went on to post a couple more strong finishes down the stretch including another T3, this one at the Greater Milwaukee Open and finished his rookie season with \$74,425, 100th on the Official Money List.

The 1986 season, though, was a tough one for Fabel and he found himself back at the Q-Tournament where he again earned his playing privileges.

The 1987 year, however, was a good one for Fabel despite some nagging back pains that reduced his schedule to only 25 events. He still managed to win \$90,024 and he had two top ten finishes with a solo fifth at the Hardee's Golf Classic his best effort.

Fabel's gone through some tough times, but it's not surprising that he has made it back. Anyone who can survive a rockfall in the coal mines can surely survive in the world of golf.

When Brad Faxon was enjoying a very successful season during his final year at Furman University, he started to think about the game of golf as a career. "It wasn't until then," he said, "that I realized I was good enough to play on the TOUR."

There wasn't any doubt in the minds of those who followed him through his young career that he was good enough. Brad has enjoyed success at all levels of the game.

Three times he won the Rhode Island State Junior championship. Twice he won the Rhode Island State Amateur and on two other occasions, in 1980 and 1981, he won the New England Amateur titles.

He won 11 times during his collegiate days, and in 1983, won three of the finest awards given to college golfers, the Fred Haskins, Golf Magazine and the NCAA Coaches awards as the Player-of-the-Year. He also was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team that year.

During those later years, he had a taste of TOUR competition. He played in three U.S. Opens, and in 1983 at Oakmont, was the low amateur.

At one time, Brad's grandfather owned a golf course on Cape Cod, and that's where his father, a scratch golfer, learned to play. "I was about five-or-six years old when Dad started me," Brad said, "and I played in my first tournament when I was 13."

It was with that sort of background that Brad launched his PGA TOUR career in the Fall of 1983. He entered the Qualifying School and had little trouble making the grade.

Even though Brad was able to earn exempt status after his play in 1984 and 1985, he wasn't satisfied with his performances.

Gradually, his game started to come together and it was solid the week of the 1986 Provident Classic in Chattanooga (opposite U.S. Open). He shot 67-62-69-63—261 for the victory. Even though it wasn't an official victory, the \$54,000 was official money.

"The golf swing is not natural to me," he said, "but you have no idea what winning did to my confidence."

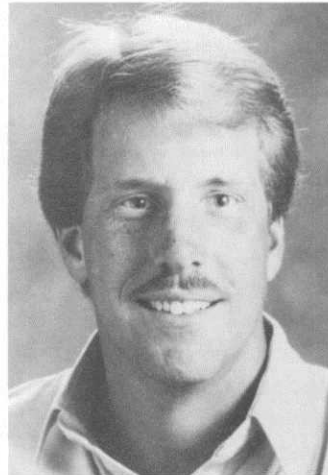
His consistency level improved last year as he enjoyed his most financially-rewarding year. "It has taken me more time to feel comfortable out here than I thought it would," he said. His stroke average for the year was more than a full shot lower than in 1986.

"When I was in college," he said, "I had an erratic swing. I could have a bad round and still win. That's not possible out here."

In the Summer of 1984, he visited with Dr. Bob Rotella, the noted sports psychologist. "I had heard of Dr. Rotella when I was in college," Brad said, "and I've always been interested in sports psychology. He has helped me with the mental aspects of the game."

Brad said his natural shot "probably is a draw," but has the ability to play the ball both ways.

When the week at the 1986 B. C. Open started, Rick Fehr had one goal in mind. He wanted to play well enough to assure his position among the leading 125 money winners for the year and thus be exempt for 1987.

He certainly did that and then some. He went all the way to win his first PGA TOUR event and he did it by two strokes over Larry Mize.

"I had won about \$48,000 going into the B. C.," he said, "and I knew that wouldn't be enough to make the top 125. Winning a tournament wasn't even in the picture at that time. I just wanted a few good finishes."

With his victory, he not only added \$72,000 to his account but he also earned an exemption through the 1988 season.

He started the 1987 campaign impressively, finishing second to Mac O'Grady in the MONY-Tournament of Champions. Three weeks later, he tied for 10th at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. For the most part, however, the season became a disappointment from that point on as he struggled to make the cuts each week.

He started to play the game at age 11 with his father in Seattle and a year later, he was in his first junior competition. Ron Hagen was the pro at Sand Point Country Club and he molded Rick's swing from the start.

He won the Greater Seattle Junior Championship three times. In 1979, he won the Washington State Junior title at age 16 and he also captured the PGA National Junior Championship at Calloway Gardens, GA, the same year.

He went on to Brigham Young University and won seven events before he was graduated in 1984. Twice he was named first-team All-American.

He played in the Masters Tournament in 1983 and 1984 along with the U. S. Open in 1984 and finished as the low amateur in both the 1984 Masters and Open.

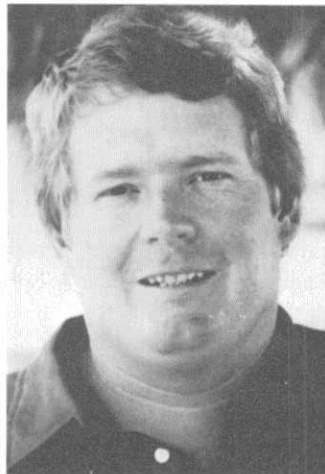
"I just kept progressing and improving," he said. "All the time, my goal was to make it onto the PGA TOUR."

He tried in the Fall of 1984 but didn't make it. He played wherever he could early in 1985 and he gained his first national attention as a pro at the U. S. Open at Oakland Hills. He had rounds of 69 and 67 the first two days and had to face the national media. Even though he finished with 73, 74 for a three-over-par 283, he still tied for ninth place and earned \$12,440.

He went on to earn \$40,101 for the year and finished 133rd on the money list. It then was on to the Qualifying Tournament again and he made it easily.

These days, he continues with the development of his swing under the watchful eye of Mike Adams of Austin, TX, the founder of the Golf Dynamics school. Adams now is Director of the Academy of Golf at the Hills of Lakeway, TX.

During his years on the PGA TOUR, Ed Fiori has demonstrated an ability to win. His first victory came in the 1979 Southern Open when he defeated Tom Weiskopf in a playoff. Two years later, he won the Western Open by four strokes. He started the week with a 74 but fought back with rounds of 67, 69 and 67 on the demanding Butler National course.

He was at his finest in the 1982 Bob Hope Classic. He played brilliantly with rounds of 70, 65, 66, 69 and 67 to tie with Tom Kite and then won it in a playoff.

He can't explain what happened in 1984 when he was never a challenger—especially after he enjoyed his best money year in 1983. The only bright spot was a victory and \$20,000 in the Jerry Ford Invitational in Vail, CO, a non-Tour event.

He returned to the leader boards early in 1985 when he had four top 10 finishes in five West Coast appearances with a tie for third in the Hawaiian Open his best effort. He has been a consistent money winner since then.

"I played well," he said of last year's performances. "I was fairly consistent but I couldn't find the real hot putting round when I needed it."

The stocky Fiori started in the game at age seven. "We lived next to a course in Downey, CA and I used to sneak through the strands of barbed wire to play. About twice a week, they would catch me and my pal and chase us off. A neighbor had given me a few clubs to use."

After high school, Ed started to work at odd jobs around southern California, mainly in construction work. He also found enough time to play considerable golf, "wherever I could find a game."

One of those golf excursions took him to a tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico. He birdied the last four holes to get into a playoff with Craig Stadler and Jack Renner. Stadler won the playoff, but a University of Houston alumnus was there and was impressed. He recommended him to the Cougars.

"I had been out of high school for four years, so I went to Wharton Junior College for a semester, sat out a semester and then transferred to Houston."

His second year, the Cougars won the NCAA team title, and Ed was named to the All-American team. "Until then, I had not thought much about joining the PGA TOUR, but that was what all the guys on the team talked about... getting on the TOUR."

He dropped out of Houston in the Spring of 1977, played in a few mini-tour events and then headed for the Q-School.

Raymond Floyd surely will be remembered as one of the most remarkable players in the history of the PGA TOUR. Just when people begin to wonder if his clubs are starting to cool, he responds by playing brilliantly.

Toward the end of the 1970s, there were indications that maybe, just maybe, he was nearing the end of his career. Instead, he came back with years that made him the envy of the TOUR. He won well over \$350,000 in 1981 and 1982 and a total of six tournaments.

Last year he continued to amaze as he came from behind on Sunday at Shinnecock Hills with a dazzling 66 to become the oldest U.S. Open champion in history. He later captured the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic title while earning well over \$300,000 for the fourth time in his brilliant career.

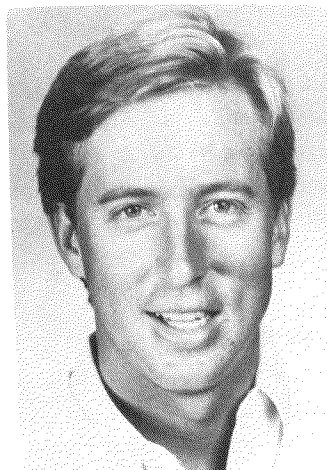
"The U.S. Open has always been one of my goals," said Floyd. "I don't think my career would have been complete without the Open."

His victory in the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa was also extremely impressive. He started with a seven-under par 63 and led all the way. He said of the 63, "without a doubt, it was the best round of golf I've ever played, anywhere in my life."

His second and third round totals of 132 and 200 respectively established PGA Championship records and he was heading for a 72-hole mark until he double bogeyed the last hole for a 272, missing the record by one. "I wasn't concerned about the record at all," he said, "I just wanted the victory."

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, N. C., the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray chose to pursue baseball until he won the National Jaycees golf title in 1960. He turned pro the following year, joined the TOUR in 1963 and won the St. Petersburg Open as a rookie. At age 20 years and six months, he was the fourth youngest ever to win on TOUR.

Dan Forsman is one of those fellows who becomes more impressive — and successful — each year.

"It's a little like college," he said. "I've been through five years and I've graduated. Now, it's time to work on my Masters degree by becoming more consistent and closer to the top each week. I know you have to be patient, but I feel good about how things have worked out."

Three years ago, Dan gained his first victory in rather impressive fashion. He was six-strokes behind Bob Tway after two rounds of the Lite Quad Cities Open. He shot a superb seven-under-par 63 the third day to take the lead and then a closing 67 gave him the victory by one over Tway.

In 1986, he struck it rich again in the rain-shortened Hertz Bay Hill Classic. Rounds of 68 and 67 gave him a two-stroke lead after two rounds and then he held off the strong challenges of Ray Floyd and Mike Hulbert in the third (and last) round to win by a stroke. He earned \$90,000.

He nearly won again last year as he was edged by Paul Azinger at the Canon Sammy Davis, Jr. Greater Hartford Open on his way to another excellent year with \$157,727 in earnings.

"I've learned a great deal this year," said Forsman at the end of the 1987 season. "My desire to learn was far greater this year. I worked hard on tapping into my mental resources because simple mechanics can only take you so far."

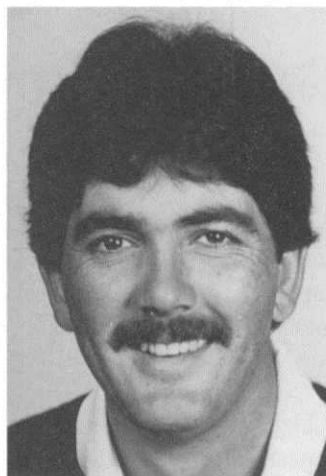
Dan started to play golf at age 13, being introduced to the game by his father, an avid golfer. Although he was born in Wisconsin, the family moved to the San Francisco area "When I was about two."

He played his golf at the Los Altos Country Club and started to play in the Northern California junior program, competing against the likes of Bobby Clampett and Joey Rasset.

When David Frost joined the PGA TOUR for the start of the 1985 campaign, he wasn't that well known on this side of the pond. It didn't take him long, though, to establish himself as one of the better young players in the game.

In fact, there were only three players who were in their first-full year in 1985 who earned more money than this handsome South African. He came close to getting his first victory in the Houston Open. He was only one-stroke away from the lead after three rounds and even though he shot a closing 69, he still finished one behind Raymond Floyd. It was worth \$44,000.

He was even better in 1986. His first playoff experience came in the Western Open. He tied with Fred Couples after three rounds, but they both dropped back into a tie with Tom Kite and Nick Price after 72 holes. Kite won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

The 1987 season was an excellent one for Frost as he posted three runnerup finishes at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic, the Canadian Open and the Southern Open en route to earning a whopping \$518,072. Still, he's searching for that elusive first win.

"I'm still learning a lot, I pick up something new everyday," said Frost. "I haven't won yet, but I've only been out here three years. That's my goal in 1988—to win a tournament."

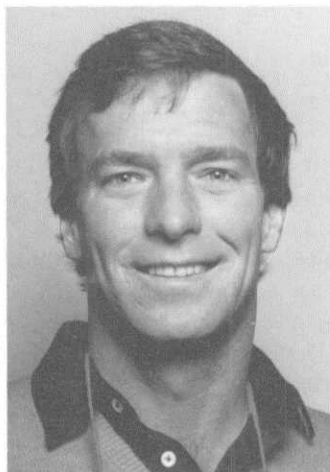
David started in the game at age 14. "I would caddy for my Dad," he said. He played in his first South African Amateur when he was 18. At age 20, he won the Western Province match play title in Cape Town as an amateur and in 1980, he still was an amateur when he lost in the final of the South African match play. He also played in the British Amateur that year. Three times he was selected to play on the South African National amateur team.

The trend was being established as he steadily refined his game. He turned professional in 1981. The following year, he ventured to the United States and "I tried to play on the mini-tour, but I didn't do much."

He went back home and, in the 1982-83 season, he finished second in the South African Order of Merit. Then he was off to the European tour and he continued to play well. In 1984, he won the Cannes Open in France as he made a 20-footer to save par at the 17th hole and another 20-footer for a birdie to win at the 18th.

He still feels that winning the 1986 South African Open was one of his most satisfying moments.

Buddy Gardner can always look at the 1987 Big "I" Houston Open as the tournament someone "took away" from him. He didn't lose it, Jay Haas simply went out and won it.

Trailing by a stroke going to the final hole, Haas, who was playing ahead of Gardner, holed a putt of 70 feet for a birdie and a 12-under par 276. A few minutes later, Buddy had to two putt from 80 feet for his par and force a playoff. Jay won it on the first extra hole.

It was a big disappointment to Buddy because it would have been his first triumph after a decade of trying. As consolation, he did use the event as the springboard to his most financially rewarding campaign.

Buddy first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1977, but in his first full year of 1978, he won only \$5,637 and lost his card. He went back to the Q-School the Fall of that year and earned it back. Starting in 1979, he failed to qualify for the first four events, and then hit paydirt. He tied for second behind Bruce Lietzke in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. It set up a very good year, winning \$71,468. He also tied for second in the Anheuser-Busch Classic in the fall.

"I wasn't ready the next year," he admits. "I didn't use the time to my advantage."

To make matters worse, at the Walt Disney World Team Championship, he was in a pick-up football game. Running for a pass, he tripped over a lawn chair and tore all the ligaments in his left wrist. He tried to play with it, but eventually had to have the wrist put in a cast for two months.

He reached a low of \$6,214 in 1982, finishing 192nd on the money list. It was back to the Qualifying School.

In the regional qualifier at Dallas, he made an adjustment in his alignment after the first round because of the high winds. "All I did was move the ball back six-seven inches in my stance and tried to hit three-quarter shots. By the time I hit the third ball, I knew it was right, and I played well all the way through the school."

The two most important changes in his life have occurred off the golf course. On May 28, 1983, he married Susan, a nurse from Birmingham, AL, and on February 1, 1987, Brooke Marie was born. "Those are the two people who mean the most," he said proudly.

Buddy started in the game at age five. "We lived about 100 yards from the first tee of the Bonnie Crest Country Club in Montgomery (AL). Everyone in the family played golf, so it was natural for me to play, too."

At one time, Buddy recalls, the juniors competition in that area was pretty tough, "with the likes of Bill Rogers, Mike Reid, Mac McLendon and myself competing against each other."

He won the Alabama State high school golf championship as a senior and went to Auburn University on a scholarship.

There appear to be many bright days ahead for Bob Gilder now that he has gone back to his old swing pattern and rediscovered a new enthusiasm for the game.

"Maybe I played too much in 1982 and 1983," he said. "They were really good years but I was worn out mentally and physically. The next couple of years, I didn't care that much about playing."

"I'm excited about playing again," he said with a wide grin. "For awhile, it wasn't that way."

His game started to come around in 1986 as he once again began to move the ball from left to right with consistency.

Players dream of having years such as he enjoyed in 1982 when he won three times and earned \$308,648. He was sixth on the money list and his exceptional play earned him a position on the 1983 Ryder Cup team.

Each time he won in 1982, he put on a marvelous display of scoring. His winning total of 14-under-par 266 in the Byron Nelson Classic was the lowest ever shot in the 16 years the tournament was played at Preston Trail.

His 19-under-par 261 in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic set a tournament standard and his week was highlighted by a double eagle two on the 509-yard 18th hole the third day. He only needed a driver and three wood. Finally, he won the Bank of Boston Classic.

After the first five weeks of 1983, he was heading for another splendid year. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Rex Caldwell, Johnny Miller and Mark O'Meara.

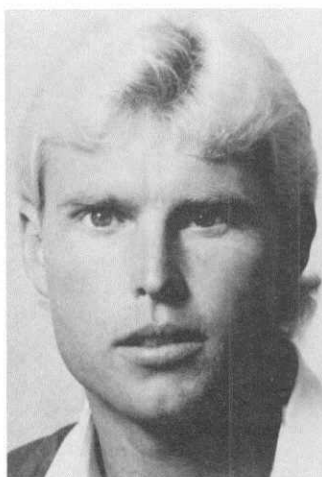
Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team—winning the 1973 Western Athletic Conference title—and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After he was graduated in 1973, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charles.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

He became only the fourth first-year player to win more than \$100,000, and would have been the "rookie-of-the-year," if Jerry Pate had not won the U.S. and Canadian Opens and \$153,102.

When Bill Glasson won the PGA TOUR's Driving Distance title in 1984 and then lost his player's card, a lot of people probably thought that this was just another long hitter who couldn't play the game.

Well, in 1985 Bill Glasson proved those people wrong.

After earning only \$17,845 in his rookie season of 1984 to finish 162nd on the money list, Glasson returned to the Fall, 1984 Qualifying Tournament in hopes of regaining his playing privileges.

At the conclusion of six grueling days of play, Glasson and five other players were forced to enter into a sudden death playoff for the final four available spots. He made it and returned to the PGA TOUR in 1985 with a renewed confidence.

"It takes awhile to get familiar with the courses and the people."

Once Glasson got more comfortable out on TOUR, there was no stopping him.

After missing the cut in his first outing of 1985, he promptly turned in the first top ten effort of his young career at the Isuzu-Andy Williams San Diego Open, grabbing eighth place and with it a check for \$11,200.

Two stops later he took home another big check, this one for \$18,250 after his tie for fifth at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic and in his next stop, he collected another \$18,050 at the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational.

Feeling instilled with confidence, and with his card all but assured for 1986, Glasson travelled to the long and difficult Congressional Country Club for the Kemper Open.

After three rounds, Glasson stood at four-under-par 212, six-shots back of Larry Mize.

However, Glasson caught fire on Sunday while Mize struggled and when Glasson reached the par-four 18th hole, he needed a 50-foot putt to claim the lead. His long putt ran true and dropped in the hole for a stunning birdie that held up as the final groups finished behind him.

His long putt was one of the most exciting moments on the PGA TOUR in 1985 and the victory was worth \$90,000 to the blonde youngster from Oral Roberts.

Pained by bad knees that have faced surgery three times, the victory had a second benefit beyond the money. It allowed Bill to pick his spots the rest of the season and to rest his knees whenever necessary, something he has continued to do.

As a result, he has become a consistent money winner and challenger. He tied for second in the Provident and Centel Classics last year and was seventh in the Tournament Players Championship after playing solidly the first three days.

This is one long hitter who indeed can play the game.

Ernie Gonzalez likes the idea of being a little different. He plays the game left handed. "There were three of us last year," he said, "with Russ Cochran and Doug Johnson. It was like we were in our own little world. I enjoyed it when people would come up to me and say, 'Hey, Ernie, I play lefthanded, too. Go get 'em.'"

He did just that at the rain-shortened Pensacola Open in 1986. He shot two marvelous rounds of 65 and 63 for a 14-under-par score of 128 and the weatherman took care of the rest. Heavy rain at Perdido Bay Golf Club made it impossible to play more than two rounds and Ernie ended up with the official victory and a check for \$40,500.

Two weeks later, he won \$48,000 when he tied for third place in the \$1-million Vantage Championship.

He became the first lefthander to win a regular PGA TOUR event since Bob Charles of New Zealand won the 1974 Greater Greensboro Open.

"I putted extremely well for those two days," Ernie said. "I only had 49 putts and I also had three chip-ins. That's a part of my game I practice a lot, so it wasn't just luck. When I practice, it's not just for today or tomorrow, it's for a long way down the road."

Ernie was in the morning segment on Thursday when he shot a six-under-par 65. Rain made it impossible to finish play that day, so the first round was completed on Friday.

He was in the afternoon segment on Saturday when the second round was played and he was nine-under-par for the round until he bogeyed the last hole in heavy rain.

The schedule called for 36 holes on Sunday. Ernie, in the last group, hit his first tee shot but "by the time we reached the green, everything was under water. The weather didn't ease up and on Monday morning, the tournament was declared official and Ernie had his victory.

Ernie doesn't remember how old he was when he started to swing a golf club. "My dad said that when I was old enough to walk I was old enough to swing a club or try to catch a ball. He was very athletic. He plays golf righthanded and he really can play. He was a Navy man for 30 years but he's retired now."

It wasn't until Ernie was in high school that he decided golf would be his game. He enjoyed early success. Only a few players have ever won the San Diego County Amateur Match Play championship in back-to-back years, and Ernie joined such distinguished company as Billy Casper and Gene Littler when he did it in 1981 and 1982. He also won the 1983 San Diego County Open as an amateur.

He only had moderate success during his first year on TOUR in 1985 but said a year can make a big difference. "It's so much easier the second time around because you know where to stay, where to eat and you're familiar with the facilities at each club."

It also helped when he was married in the Fall of 1985. "When Judy's not out, I keep thinking I'd rather be home with the family. Her being with me has made a big difference, too."

Wayne Grady made the most of his opportunities last year and as a result, he regained his full exempt status among the leading money winners.

Now, he is looking forward to a return to the form that gave him a very good season in 1985—and more. That form started to re-appear last fall when he tied for second place in the rain-shortened Bank of Boston Classic and the next week tied for 10th place in the Greater Milwaukee Open.

The runner-up finish was nothing new to this personable Australian. Prior to winning the German Open in 1984, he went through a six-year winless stretch but had 17 second-place finishes.

His first runner-up finish on the PGA TOUR came in the 1985 Buick Open. He led by two strokes with eight holes to play but Ken Green came on fast at the finish to win.

As a youngster, Wayne wanted to be a pilot in the Australian Air Force. He didn't start to play golf until he was 14 years of age and then turned professional two-years later. He worked in pro shops, but realized it was not the life he wanted, at least not at that time.

He applied to get his amateur status back and was able to do so later in the year. He played a lot of amateur golf around Queensland and then turned professional again in 1978 when he was 21-years old. During those years, he worked under the wing of Charlie Eap at Royal Queensland. He's the same man who has worked with Greg Norman for years.

Later in 1978, he did win the West Lakes Classic in Australia and collected \$12,000. "I thought this was an easy way to make a living," he says, "and I got lazy."

He continued to play on the Asian tour but with little success. Along about 1983, he realized it was time to buckle down and go to work on his game. It was the start of his success story.

He played for a short while in Europe in 1983 and showed a little profit. The next year, his earnings leaped, thanks to the victory in the German Open. The week prior to his triumph, he was second in the Benson & Hedges International after Sam Torrance birdied the last hole to beat him.

Wayne made a few appearances on the PGA TOUR in 1984 because "I wanted to see what it was like." He shot a 68 the first day in the Byron Nelson Classic and was only one-stroke out of the lead. A last-day 77, however, dropped him well off the pace.

"I played in about seven tournaments on a foreign exemption," he said, "and didn't feel all that comfortable, but I was determined to give it a try in the Qualifying School." He finished in sixth place at LaQuinta, CA.

It seems likely he will be on the TOUR for many years, following in the footsteps of Peter Thomson, Bruce Crampton, Bruce Devlin and David Graham.

There have been many highlights in the spectacular career of David Graham, too many to mention, but everyone knows his victories in the 1979 PGA Championship and the 1981 United States Open Championship would be enough to last many a man a lifetime.

David, the proud man that he is, will treasure those moments forever.

He won well over \$100,000 in six straight seasons, with the high mark being reached in 1983. He collected the tidy sum of \$244,924. One of the highlights of that year was a victory in the Houston Coca-Cola Open when he came from five strokes behind the last afternoon.

David has established a remarkable record for a fellow who started in the game with a pick-up set of left-handed clubs.

At the Merion Golf Club in the 1981 U.S. Open Championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a three-under-par 67 for a total of seven-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Not many of his eight victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Devlin, in a playoff.

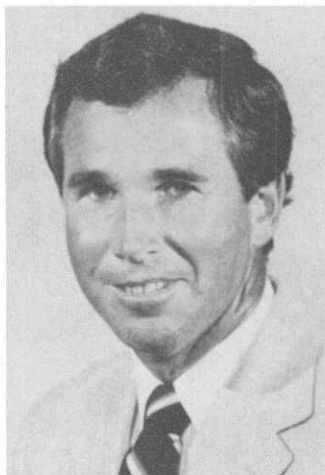
When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the 18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.

In the Memorial Tournament in 1980, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory, but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

Toward the end of 1984, when Hubert Green was asked to summarize his performance during the year, he grinned and answered, "Just say it was a little bit better."

As a matter of fact, it became considerably better before the season was over as he ended a three-year winless stretch and captured the Southern Open. His strong play continued into 1985 and the highlight of the campaign had to be his stirring victory over Lee Trevino in the PGA Championship at Cherry Hills.

He was two strokes behind Trevino after two rounds, but moved three strokes in front of Lee after the third round. Hubert was able to hold his game together on the treacherous greens and win by two over Trevino for the 19th victory of a very fine career.

He nearly made it 20 in the Spring of 1986, but Andy Bean caught him on the closing holes in the Doral-Eastern Open and then won with a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

A low point to his exceptionally fine career came during the 1983 season when he suffered with a shoulder problem. Microscopic surgery in the Fall of that year corrected the situation.

Hubert had a stretch of about seven years through the 1970s when he was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. During one three-week period in 1976, he won three straight tournaments—Doral-Eastern Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

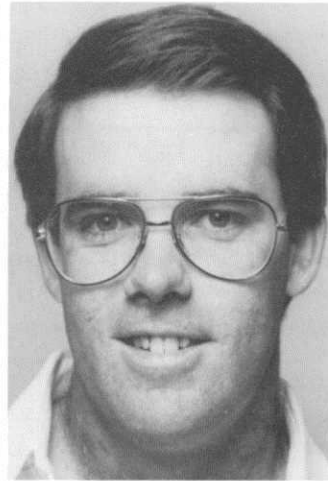
The next year, he won the United States Open in a gutty performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them." As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, PA. He qualified for his TOUR card in the fall of that year.

Success came quickly. In the Houston Champions International, he tied Don January and then birdied the first extra hole for the victory. He was named the "rookie-of-the year."

The Ken Green story is one of perseverance and in 1985 his dedication and trust in himself paid off handsomely.

After struggling for three years on TOUR and having to regain his playing privileges twice, Green broke through in a big way in 1985. He picked up his first PGA TOUR victory at the Buick Open and he did it in record style.

When Ken travelled to the Warwick Hills CC last August, he had already posted his best money winning year ever. By the end of the week he had fired rounds of 69-65-67-67—268, 20-under-par as he breezed to a four-shot victory and set a new tournament record in winning the \$81,000 first place check.

He showed that it was no fluke, though, when he came back in 1986 to win the inaugural International tournament on his way to picking up \$317,835 for the year.

It would seem obvious that the modified Stableford scoring system used at The International is good for him because last year he nearly won again. He finished second and collected \$108,000.

"The entire year was better, though," he said. "Far more consistent, I made more cuts. I've worked with Peter Kostis for three years and it has made a big difference."

Ken started playing golf at age 12 when his family moved to Honduras where his father was the principal at the American School.

"The only choices we had in Honduras were to play soccer or golf," Green recalled. "I didn't want to kick the ball, so I just went to golf."

Three years later the family moved back to Connecticut where Ken continued his interest in golf by playing and caddying whenever possible. He would sneak onto a few golf courses during those days.

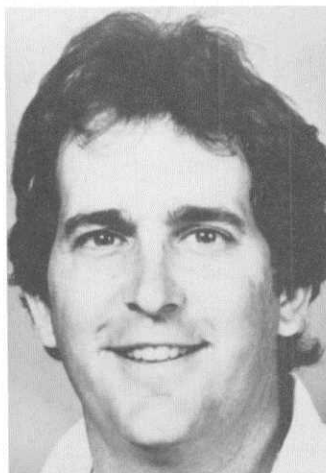
"I got kicked off the course about 800 times," Green laughed. "I didn't figure they would throw a kid in jail, so I just kept trying."

After playing a little high school golf, Green headed south for Palm Beach JC where his game started to blossom. He then headed for the PGA TOUR's Qualifying Tournament, but failed to earn his card on his first two tries. He finally succeeded in the Fall of 1981, but lost his card when he won only \$11,899 in 1982 and returned to the Q-School.

He regained his playing privileges and broke through into the top 125 in 1983 by winning \$40,263, but he slumped in 1984 to only \$20,160 and again had to re-qualify at the Q-Tournament. He did so and went on to make 1985 a season to remember and the fulfillment of a childhood dream.

"I've thought of nothing else but playing on the TOUR since I was 15 years old," said Green. "Even though I wasn't any good, I still had the dream."

Jay Haas has been one of the more highly-regarded players on the PGA TOUR for several years and one of the most popular among his colleagues.

Jay quietly goes about his business, wins a few tournaments, challenges numerous times and collects a healthy amount of money.

Two years ago, for example, he had a hot stretch in the spring when he recorded four straight top 10 finishes including a tie for seventh at the Tournament Players Championship and a tie for sixth at the Masters.

Last year, he was hot in the same stretch, but climaxed it with a playoff victory over Buddy Gardner in the Big "I" Houston Open. Jay holed a putt of 70 feet on the final hole to tie Budcy and then won it with a par on the first extra hole.

Jay's biggest seasons were in 1981 and 1982. He won twice each year, and it was his performance late in 1982 and early 1983 that earned him a position on the U. S. Ryder Cup team.

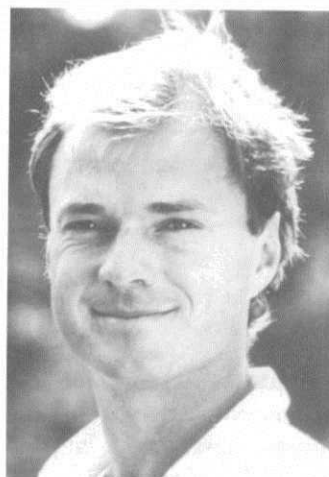
With former Masters champion Bob Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob started him early, and has helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together."

Jay was seven when he played his first tournament—and won his first trophy. It was the National Pee Wee Championship in Orlando, Fla. "We played five holes each day and I scored 26-25—52 to finish third," he said.

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

Gary Hallberg was looking for 1987 to be a "comeback year" after a bout with a mononucleosis put a serious dent in his dreams during the two previous seasons.

He made it more than a "comeback." He made it all the way to the victory stand and he did so in grand style. He won the rain-delayed Greater Milwaukee Open by two strokes with scores of 70, 66, 67, and 66 for a 19-under-par 269.

The one shot that clinched it came on Monday after the final round was interrupted on Sunday by the weather. He was in the rough short of the green at the par three 17th hole, but he chipped in from 50 feet for a birdie. It gave him all the daylight he needed.

Gary's first TOUR victory was in the 1983 Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open. He nearly won it again in 1984 but Gary Koch shot a splendid final-round 65 at the Torrey Pines Golf Club to tie him and then won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole.

He trailed Tom Kite by four strokes entering the last round in 1983 and proceeded to shoot a six-under-par 66 to edge Kite by one. He had an eight-foot birdie putt at the final hole and he made it. "My heart was pumping like it's never pumped before," he said.

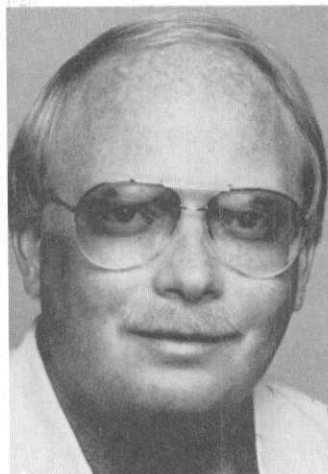
Gary was an impressive winner all through his amateur career and instant stardom was expected once he joined the PGA TOUR. He became the first player ever to earn his TOUR card by winning the minimum \$8,000 needed at the time to obtain playing privileges without going through the Qualifying School. In 11 tournaments, he won \$64,244. He finished the year with six top 10 finishes.

Gary started in the game at age nine when his father brought home a set of old clubs. He thought it would be a fine idea for his son to play golf instead of baseball.

Once he started to play, he loved the game and worked diligently at it. So much so, in fact, that his Dad finally had to tell him to ease up and not be so serious. He eventually earned a scholarship to Wake Forest, and he went on to become the first four-time, first-team All-America choice. He was the NCAA champion in 1979 and won a total of 14 college tournaments.

During his early teen years, he also played hockey, and it wasn't until he went to Wake Forest that he started to think about being a professional golfer.

Dan Halldorson was looking forward to another good year when he headed for the MCI Heritage Classic, but while on Hilton Head Island, he dislocated three ribs. It was over a month before he returned to the TOUR and, when he did so, he still wasn't physically right.

"I wore a brace for two months because I was anxious to play," he said. "Because of it, I developed some bad swing habits and it took me awhile to get everything straightened out."

He did so towards the end of the year. At the Southwest Classic, a pair of 66s gave him the halfway lead and he went on to tie for second place, just one stroke behind Steve Pate.

One of the finest players to come out of Canada, he has had to overcome nagging physical problems through most of his career.

It was in 1980 that he enjoyed perhaps his biggest year. He won the Pensacola Open and then joined with Jim Nelford to give Canada the World Cup team title. He joined with Dave Barr to give Canada another World Cup team championship in 1986.

Dan first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1974, but he only won \$619 in 1975 and lost his card. He spent the next three years playing all across Canada.

He won a few times and piled up a number of second-place finishes, but decided in 1978 that he wanted another shot at the U.S. TOUR.

He made it through the Qualifying School, and early in 1979, he tasted success. After two rounds of the Hawaiian Open, he was tied for the lead with Fuzzy Zoeller and George Burns, but finally tied for seventh.

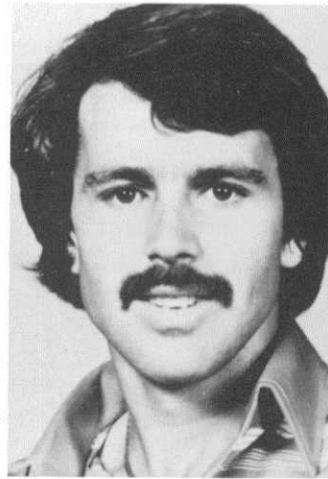
Even though he finished 116th on the 1979 money list, he believed the top 60 in 1980 was a realistic goal. After he finished second to Jim Colbert in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, winning \$32,400, he knew it was.

He already was assured of exempt status for 1981 with a position among the top 60 money winners when he headed for Pensacola. After two rounds of 68-67 at Perdido Bay, he was tied with Gary Hallberg and Tom Kite at nine-under 135. A 70 the third day left him three in back of Bob Mann, but his final-round 70 was all he needed to regain the lead.

The Halldorson family lived across the street from a golf course in Winnipeg, so he started in the game at an early age. He even built a practice range in his back yard.

In his home province, he has won the Manitoba Juniors, the Manitoba PGA and four times the Manitoba Open. In 1981 and 1982, he was honored as the Canadian Playing Professional of the Year.

When Donnie Hammond made his bid to join the PGA TOUR, he established a record that may stand forever. He was the medalist in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982 by an incredible 14 strokes.

Ben Crenshaw won by 12 strokes in the Fall of 1973 and most people thought no one would ever come close to that mark.

Donnie played his six rounds in 13-under-par 419. He opened with rounds of 66 and 68, followed with a 71, and then stunned everyone with a record seven-under-par 65 on the demanding Tournament Players Club course in Ponte Vedra, FL.

One of the keys, he said, came the first day. He started at No. 10 at the TPC and "When I walked to the 18th green (his ninth hole), I looked up and there was my Dad in the stands. I was three under at the time and I stayed pumped up all week."

His first victory came in the 1986 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. A final-round 66 moved him into a tie with John Cook at 25-under-par 335 and Donnie won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

"I didn't make as much money last year," he said, "as I did the year before, but it was a fun year. I was just a little more inconsistent, but not much. I enjoyed some time off to be with our new son and I also played a couple of times overseas."

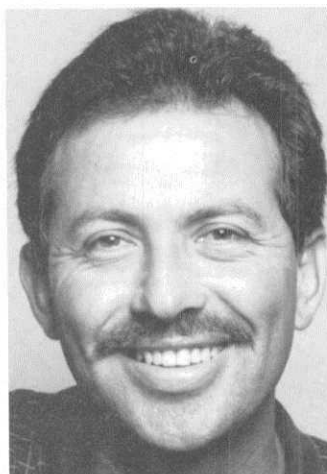
His best two weeks were back-to-back efforts in early May as he tied for eighth in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and tied for fourth in the Byron Nelson Classic.

His home was in Frederick, MD, and the old Baltimore Colts of the NFL had their pre-season training camp not too far away at Westminster College. "I would go with Dad to watch them, and then we'd play a nine-hole course there. I only had four-or-five irons, but I seemed to pick it up quickly. When he saw that, he bought me a set. I was 13 at the time."

Donnie played at Frederick High School and then went to Jacksonville University. In three years, he won five college events, including the Sun Belt Conference title in 1979 by six strokes. He played on the Space Coast tour for three years.

Morris Hatafsky knows the meaning of hard work, patience and faith. He will tell you, "to be successful, you have to be willing to pay the price to get better."

In July of 1983, he won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over George Cadle. The next week, he lost a playoff to Danny Edwards in the Miller High Life QCO and then tied for eighth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He went on to his first \$100,000-plus year.

The first time he reaped the rewards of his dedication was in the Fall of 1982 when he won the Hall of Fame Classic on the famed No. 2 course at Pinehurst, winning by two strokes over Jerry Pate and D.A. Weibring.

He nearly returned to the winner's circle again last year, but close friend Larry Nelson edged him out at the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic. Still, it was a good year for Hatafsky as he collected a career-high \$150,654.

"The season finished on a good note," said Hatafsky. "I played consistent golf from June on and that's my goal—consistency. I think I accomplished something this year in the area of consistency."

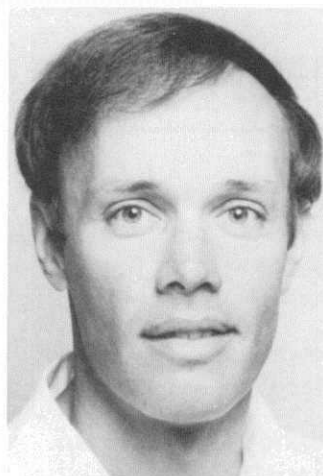
A few years ago, he started to spend considerable time working on the mechanics of his swing. As a result, his ability to score improved.

"It was something I had to do," he explains. "I've not only learned a lot about the golf swing but about myself as well. I know the work will pay off for many years."

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Mark Hayes started to play golf at age six under the watchful eye of his father, a high school physical education teacher and golf coach.

Since that time, Mark has gone about his way, dedicating himself to succeeding in the game, and he has been successful. His biggest victory came in the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass.

A few years ago, Mark started to make a major swing change, primarily getting a bigger turn and using his upper body more. He also has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. "I've always been a positive person," Mark said, "but he has taught me how to relax more. It's difficult, though, when you're not playing well."

It was a financially-rewarding year in 1986 when he went over the century mark for the first time since 1979. He did win the Tallahassee Open and while the victory was not official, the \$36,000 certainly was.

At the age of 13, the family returned to Stillwater, where Mark was born and there he came under the tutelage of Labron Harris, Sr., the Oklahoma State University coach and a close friend of Mark's dad.

"One of the reasons I was so dedicated to the game," Mark says, "was that I was small for my age and I couldn't do anything else well. I practiced every day. I never thought about doing anything else for a living but playing golf."

One highlight of his blossoming career came in the annual Texas vs. Oklahoma Junior matches, and he defeated Tom Kite in the final.

During his years at Stillwater High and Oklahoma State, he was a teammate of Doug Tewell, and it was Mark who eventually convinced Doug that he should play the TOUR for a living.

After leaving college, he went into the Army for two years and spent most of his time at Fort Jackson, SC, working in the golf shop. There at the same time was Joe Inman.

He arrived on the TOUR in the Fall of 1973 and broke through with two victories in 1976. He led the Byron Nelson Classic from wire-to-wire and closed the year with a victory in the Pensacola Open.

One of his closest brushes with victory came in the 1981 Greater Greensboro Open. He was leading Larry Nelson by two, approaching the final green, but Nelson made a near impossible bunker shot for a birdie. Mark, stunned by the turn of events, made bogey from the back fringe. Larry won it all with a birdie on the second extra hole of their playoff.

Back problems have troubled Vance Heafner for several years now, but in 1987 he was reasonably healthy and enjoyed a fine season finishing in the Top 125 with \$74,490.

Vance had three top ten finishes last year and he attributes that success after two poor seasons to improved health.

"My back was a lot better last year thanks to the DP people," said Heafner. "The trainers and the exercise facility have really helped me and they're definitely the reason I played better."

"I'm real pleased to be back on track," he added. "When you lose your exemption you realize how much it means to you."

A three-time All-American at North Carolina State, Vance Heafner had justifiably big expectations when he turned pro in 1978 and tried to earn his PGA TOUR card. Several frustrating experiences in Qualifying Schools, however, delayed his start until June of 1980. But since his 1981 campaign, he has displayed the talent that is necessary to be successful on the TOUR.

Vance has not won an individual title yet, but he has challenged frequently enough to have his name displayed on a lot of leader boards.

The strapping six-footer who is the son of the late Clayton Heafner, a noted player in the 1940's and 50's, got his feet wet with earnings of \$11,398 in 18 tournaments over the last half of the 1980 season. He was aiming directly at an exempt Top 60 spot as the 1981 season opened—and he reached that goal in dramatic fashion in the season's last two weeks.

Indeed, it came down to the last two holes at the Pensacola Open, where he ran home birdie putts to tie for 10th place, earning the \$4,433 which lifted him past Gibby Gilbert into the 60th and final exempt position.

"I think every player aims for exempt status in his first year. I'm not really a goal-oriented person, but I have to say that those last two weeks of the season were the most exciting and enjoyable times I've had in golf," he said.

Heafner's enthusiasm carried over into the next week, where he and partner Mike Holland ran off with the Walt Disney World National Team Championship. They won with a record-breaking score of 42-under par 246, leaving the second-place team five shots back.

As Clayton Heafner's son, his exposure to golf was early. But with his father's death, when Vance was six years old, his athletic interests broadened, and he became a better-than-average high school basketball and football player. Golf continually beckoned however, and he gave up the other sports to concentrate on golf in his senior year, a decision for which he was rewarded with a golf scholarship to North Carolina State.

It took a few years for Lon Hinkle to get his feet firmly established on the PGA TOUR, but he did, he became a very good player, indeed. He won a little over \$40,000 through his first five years, but starting in 1977, he has been able to collect nearly \$1.3 million.

He hit a high mark in 1979, winning \$247,693 and finishing third on the money list. His earnings dipped in 1982 when he suffered with a shoulder injury. But, he rebounded in 1983 with another \$100,000-plus year and generally has played well ever since. In 1986, he became affiliated with the Eagle Bend Country Club in Big Fork, Montana. "We're going to spend the summers up there," he said, "and it's given me a new lease on my golfing life."

Chatting about his early days on TOUR, he says, "my goals were too low. My main goal was to survive. When things would go bad over here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game."

On one of those trips, he met Edith, a Swiss beauty, and she gave him a new purpose to life.

While his first victory was in the 1978 New Orleans Open, he had his biggest year in 1979, winning the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in a playoff over Mark Hayes and Andy Bean. He also won the World Series of Golf, outlasting Larry Nelson to the wire.

Lon's father is a Professor in Literature at San Diego State University, and Lon started in the game of golf at age 13, shortly after the family moved from Granville, Ohio, to San Diego. Hed play golf every day.

There are seven Hinkle children and in the early days, it wasn't unusual for all of them to be competing in junior golf tournaments around southern California.

Lon received a mental boost in 1980 when he finished third to Jack Nicklaus in the United States Open and PGA Championships. Although Jack won both by comfortable margins, Lon learned in those two experiences that he could win the significant championships.

His biggest enjoyment in 1981 came in the National Long Drive contest. He won with a belt of 338 yards, six inches and became the first TOUR player ever to win it.

Scott Hoch is starting to be recognized as a player who can post very low numbers and it doesn't make any difference when or where he is playing.

Two years ago, he won the coveted Vardon Trophy for low stroke average on the TOUR with a 70.08 mark. He played his best golf in mid-summer when he had five top 10 finishes in seven starts. Last year, he was a contender for the Vardon again. "It was close to being a great year," he said. "I had the opportunities to win a couple."

He had a brilliant stretch of 19 tournaments, starting with the Tournament Players Championship, without missing the cut. He finished third on four occasions.

His biggest disappointment came in the Memorial Tournament. His 18-under-par 198 was a tournament record for 54 holes and he was leading by four strokes over Don Pooley, but the latter came on strong the last day to win while Scott dropped to third.

Scott qualified for the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1979 but before he had a chance to tee it up in his first start, the 1980 Phoenix Open, he jarred his back and had to withdraw. The pain became so severe he could not even swing a club. It wasn't until the Atlanta Classic in June—the 23rd tournament of the year—that he was able to play 72 holes. He went 15 weeks without even trying to enter.

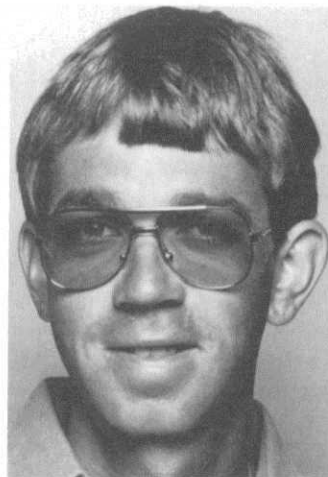
A few weeks later, in the Quad Cities Open, he shot a course-record 63 the first day and never was headed. He went on to set a tournament record 14-under-par 266 and edged two of his former Wake Forest teammates, Curtis Strange who was second, and Gary Hallberg, who finished third.

The back continued to bother him the rest of the year. In fact, there still are times when he cannot go full bore.

He was raised in an athletic family and started to play golf at age eight. His father, Art, preceded him at Wake Forest, earning All-American honors in baseball and then played professionally until injuries shortened a promising career. Scott's brother, Buddy, is a professional bowler.

At Wake Forest, he was a teammate of Strange, Jay Haas, Bob Byman and David Thore when the Demons won the 1975 NCAA team title.

Mike Hulbert will tell you his rookie season of 1985 may not have been too impressive on paper, "but I probably had more fun on the TOUR than anyone who won only \$18,000.

You can imagine how much fun he has had the last two seasons as he has earned upwards of a half-million dollars and won the 1986 Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis along the way.

What made the victory all the more exciting for Mike was the fact that he had to outduel his closest friend, Joey Sindelar, all the way to the finish. "I still can't believe it," Mike was saying long after the final putt had dropped. "I don't know when it will hit me."

The Hulbert-Sindelar relationship goes all the way back to their days as kids in Horseheads, NY. "Joey's family lived by the golf course," Mike recalls. "When I first started to go over there, I met Joey and we became friends right away. We'd play every day and we'd play as many holes as we could."

"We didn't have any formal instructions. I picked up tidbits from my dad and Joey's dad and we helped each other as much as we could."

There was no doubt in Mike's mind that Joey was the better player. As they grew older, Joey headed for Ohio State University. Mike, meanwhile, started scouting around for a smaller school with a good program and he finally settled on East Tennessee State.

He went there on his own but he soon impressed the coaches enough to obtain a scholarship. His senior year, he was named third team All-American. After he was graduated, he tried the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament four times without success.

Finally he made it in the Fall of 1984 and said, "It was the highlight of my life."

His skills started to show early in 1986. In his third start, the Shearson Lehman Brothers Andy Williams Open, he tied for third place. He pointed out, "I missed a putt of four feet on the last hole that would have put me in the (Bob Tway-Bernhard Langer) playoff." He won \$23,400.

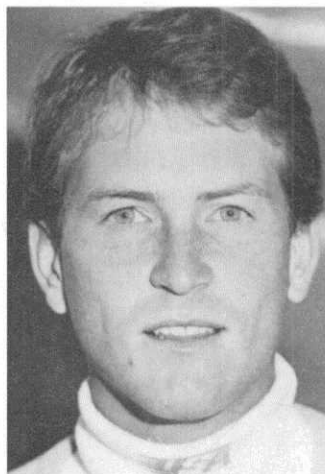
Five weeks later in the final round of the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic, he birdied five of the first six holes and three of the last four to shoot a 64. He tied with Ray Floyd for second place, just one stroke behind Dan Forsman.

His steady play continued but his next strong finish didn't come until the PGA Championship at Inverness. A 69-68 start helped him to tie for seventh place. "That was a big one," Mike said, "because it qualified me for the (1987) Masters."

Two weeks later, he earned his victory at the Colonial Country Club in Memphis with a 68-69 finish for an eight-under-par 280. It was worth \$109,064.

Last year, a second at the Southern Open and a third at The International highlighted the year.

John Inman will tell you he has had the finest teacher in the game. His older brother, Joe. "All I've ever learned about the game has been from Joe," he said shortly after winning the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN last summer. It was his first victory and paved the way to a splendid rookie season. He had rounds of 65, 67, 67 and 66 for a 15-under-par 265 on the par 70 Valleybrook course and walked away with \$81,000.

"I felt very comfortable coming down the stretch," he said, "and managed to keep my composure. That helped me to make the 15 footer I needed on the last hole to win."

John said he has been playing golf "for as long as I can remember. I've seen pictures when I was 18-months old and I had a golf club in my hand. But, I suppose I was about six-years old when I remember really trying to play for the first time.

"Playing golf is all I've ever wanted to do. Joe is 15 years older than I am, so when I came along, he took care of me.

"I'll never forget all he wanted me to do was chip and putt. He said I could beat a lot of people if I could get the ball up and-down from around the greens consistently.

"Joe also taught me to visualize the shot," John continued. "You see a picture of what you want to do and then you try to make the picture happen. The first time I tried it, it worked. I couldn't believe it."

After John was graduated from high school, he did break from family tradition. He went to the University of North Carolina instead of Wake Forest. "Everyone in the family went to Wake, but when I saw North Carolina, I knew it was the place for me."

During his years there, he won 10 collegiate events including the 1984 NCAA Championship at Bear Creek Golf World in Houston. His 17-under par score broke the previous mark of 15 under set by Ben Crenshaw.

During his final two years, he was a teammate of Davis Love III.

During those days, he knew the TOUR was his destination. He tried the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1985 and did not make it. He missed by a stroke. He played on the TPA tour for a year and then was successful in obtaining his TOUR card in the Fall of 1986.

"I was well prepared for TOUR life," John said. "I saw it a lot as a spectator, watching Joe and everyone else play. I caddied for Joe on a few occasions and I also played in a couple of events before I got my card."

"Joe prepared me well for it, but it was tough early in the year. You know about all the traveling, but it was difficult at first."

Now that he has settled in, you can expect John to carry on the fine golfing tradition of the Inman family.

The great players always seem to find a way to win, to keep a good round going, to keep a streak alive. Even during those moments when the situation appears near impossible, they have the skills to execute.

Hale Irwin has been known as one of the brilliant shotmakers in the game, and when you mix in the competitive heart he possesses, you have a man who knows no boundaries.

As an example of his consistency, he went from early 1975 through the 1978 schedule—covering 86 tournaments—without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in TOUR history.

He went the distance in all 20 starts in 1983, and one resulted in a most satisfying victory in the Memorial Tournament. He said of it, "I've always wanted to win the Memorial Tournament. My desire has been very high ever since the first year.

In 1985, he won the Memorial again by outdueling Lanny Wadkins down the stretch but 1986 proved to be a disappointment. He had opened the season, though, by winning the Bahamas Classic, an unofficial event.

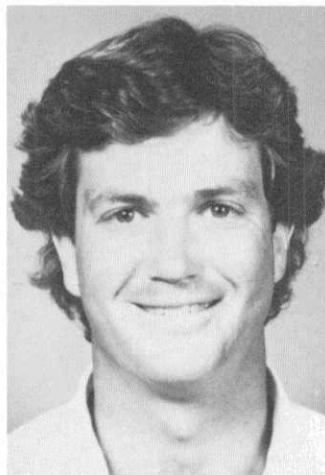
The 1987 season was a better one for Irwin as he collected over \$100,000 for the 15th time in his career.

In 1981, after going for nearly 20 months without a victory, he won twice in impressive style, the Hawaiian Open and the Buick Open and both came after spending a week vacationing with his family at the resort he represents, Kapalua on Maui in Hawaii.

In 1984, he gained a victory in a rather unusual fashion. In the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, he needed a birdie on the testy 18th at Pebble Beach to tie Jim Nelford, who already had finished his round. Hale's tee shot went far to the left, hit a rock on the Carmel Bay beach and ricocheted back onto the fairway. He made his birdie. On the second extra hole of the playoff, he hit a poor three wood into a bunker, but then struck one of the great two irons of his career to nine feet and he made it for the victory.

His first victory was in the 1971 Heritage Classic, but two of the highest points of his career came in triumphs in the 1974 U. S. Open at Winged Foot and the 1979 Open at Inverness.

Many years ago, someone coined the phrase, "Nice things happen to nice people." Whoever said it first, must have had Peter Jacobsen in mind.

His victory at the Colonial came in a playoff over Payne Stewart and came just the week after Peter's father had undergone a rather serious operation. When he dropped a birdie putt on the first extra hole, Peter said, "Well, this one's for you, Dad."

He followed with another strong year in 1985, going well over the \$200,000 mark. He went over the century figure for the fifth straight year in 1986, although he had physical problems early in the year and it wasn't until the latter half of the season that he started to play the way you expect Peter Jacobsen to play.

Peter battled a ruptured disc in his back in 1987 and admitted, "I'm swinging and playing well only when the back allows." He's rehabilitating the back without surgery and hopes to return to his prior form in 1988.

His first victory was in the 1980 Buick-Goodwrench Open. The next year, he nearly won it again, only to lose in a playoff to Hale Irwin. Two years ago, he finished third in the PGA Championship at Riviera Country Club and the effort was especially satisfying. "It showed me I do have the ability to be a factor in major championships."

Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

He went to the University of Oregon and won the PAC-8 Conference championship in 1974. He was named to the collegiate All-America team three years. In 1976, he won the Oregon Open and the Northern California Open.

Along with his playing skills, Peter also is in demand for clinics and exhibitions.

Steve Jones knows there is no substitute for experience. "The more you play, the more experience you have but the important thing is to learn from your experiences, good and bad."

He was leading the 1987 MCI-Heritage Golf Classic by one stroke as he stood on the 18th tee the last afternoon on the Harbour Town golf links. Obviously, he was playing very well with rounds of 67, 66 and 67 the first three days.

All he wanted to do now was put his tee shot in the middle of the fairway. As he took the club back, the wind changed slightly and he proceeded to come off the ball and hit it out-of-bounds to the right.

The double-bogey six followed and he lost the coveted title by one stroke to Davis Love III.

"I've tried to use the Heritage as a positive," he said.

And he has. At the Bank of Boston Classic last September, he opened with a 77. "I had a good attitude because I knew I was playing well," he continued, "so I was determined to go back out and do my best."

He did, and shot an 8-under-par 64.

That is the Steve Jones who has come along to be one of the fine young players on the TOUR.

Steve started in the game at age 12 under the watchful eye of his father on the nine hole course in Yuma, CO. He went on to play in small junior tournaments around Yuma and also a few elsewhere in the state.

"The first time I played," he said, "I shot a 56 and each year I would drop from three-to-six strokes."

Golf was fun in those days, but the Jones boys went into other sports as well. Steve ran track and played golf in high school, but he earned all-state honors for basketball.

He knew at an early age that his career would be in golf, so when he moved on to the University of Colorado, he concentrated on the game.

He grew up reading golf magazines for tips and instruction. "When I'd see a tip in the magazine, I'd go right out and try it," he said, smiling. "I developed my putting stroke and my chipping style from reading those tips. They all came from the magazines."

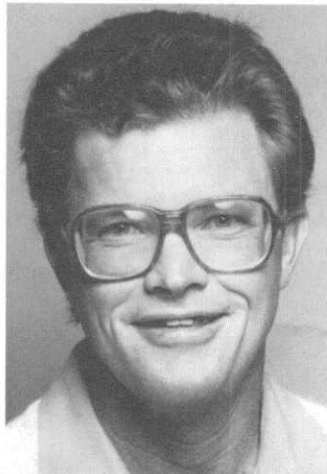
These days, Paul Purtzer, who is the Director of Golf at Gainey Ranch Golf Club in Scottsdale, AZ, has been Steve's tutor. Paul played on the TOUR several years ago and is the older brother of Tom Purtzer.

Steve's first Qualifying Tournament was in the Fall of 1981. He played with a jammed thumb but made it. He tried to play in early 1982 but finally had to stop in June of that year and underwent corrective surgery in September.

He went back through the Q School in the Fall of 1984 and was successful. He returned in the Fall of 1986 in an effort to improve his position on the exempt list after finishing 136th for the 1986 season.

This time, he played superbly, winning medalist honors by four strokes. It was a sign that Steve Jones had arrived as a solid player.

It may be a long time before anyone has a year quite like the one Tom Kite enjoyed in 1981, but he keeps getting close to a repeat.

You remember how brilliantly consistent he was in 1981, winning the inaugural PGA TOUR Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner; capturing the Vardon Trophy for his 69.80 stroke average; and compiling an incredible 21 top 10 finishes in 26 starts. He was eighth or better in his last 10 starts and later was honored by the Golf Writers of America as the Player-of-the-Year.

Just as in 1981, Tom claimed only one victory in 1982, as he defeated Jack Nicklaus and Denis Watson in the Bay Hill Classic, but he also lost another, the Bob Hope Desert Classic, in a playoff to Ed Fiori. He did win his second straight Vardon Trophy with a 70.21 average; and only missed the cut once in 25 starts. When he missed it in the Canadian Open, it ended a string of 53 successful tournaments.

A victory at Pebble Beach in 1983 came courtesy of a course record 62 and he returned in 1984 to win twice. In addition, wife Christy presented him with twin sons.

The 1987 season was a return to form for Kite as he won the Kemper Open by seven shots to extend his TOUR leading streak of consecutive years with at least one win to seven. He made the Ryder Cup team for the fifth time and won a career high \$525,516.

"Overall, it was a good, solid year," said Kite. "I played very well in the summer.

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to take a swipe. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, Tex. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

Before his 21st birthday in 1970, Tom was medalist in the Western Amateur, runnerup to Larry Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, second in the Southern Amateur and was named to the four-man U. S. team in the World Amateur Team Championship.

The following year he was chosen on the U. S. Walker Cup team and, in 1972, he shared the NCAA title with his University of Texas teammate, Ben Crenshaw.

A few months after Kenny Knox started to play golf at age nine, he knew this was the game for him. "I never thought about anything else," he says. "My family is in the construction business, but when I was in high school, they wouldn't let me touch a hammer."

It was his dedication that led to his success in high school golf, and then at Florida State University and finally all the way to becoming a winner on the PGA TOUR. He won the 1986 Honda Classic the hard way, by refusing to buckle under the pressure and turning back the challenges of such players as Andy Bean, John Mahaffey, Clarence Rose and Jodie Mudd, to name a few.

He followed with another fine season a year ago with the highlight being the victory in the Hardee's Golf Classic in July. He won by a stroke over Gil Morgan with a tournament record 15-under-par 265.

This is another one of those heart-warming success stories. He started to play when his parents joined the Columbus (GA) Country Club. A year later, he was participating in junior tournaments in the area.

As a sophomore in high school, the team won the Georgia State championship and Kenny finished third in individual play. The next year, the family moved to Tallahassee, FL. When he was graduated, he moved on to Florida State and attained more success.

In those days, his only thought was to play on the PGA TOUR but he found it a difficult goal. He first went to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1978 and he tried a total of seven times before he succeeded in the Fall of 1981.

He found himself bouncing on and off the TOUR through the next four years. By the end of 1985, he was in 146th position on the money list. He retained a membership, but would be well down the priority list for entry in the 1986 season.

He did not play at all on the West Coast. It didn't appear as if he would get into the Honda Classic either, so he shelled out \$100 entry fee and took his chances in the Open qualifier. He shot a 67 and gained the fourth-and-last position.

He surprised a few people by taking the first-day lead on the TPC at Eagle Trace course with a 6-under-par 66. The next day, he birdied the final two holes for a 71 and a 137 total. He led by one over Bean.

The third day, the wind blew extremely hard. On a day when the average score for the field was more than 79 strokes, Kenny shot an 80. It wasn't surprising that his one-over-par 217 was only two strokes out of the lead being shared by Bean and Rose.

The last afternoon, he was amazingly calm under the pressure. While others fired and fell back, Kenny made the critical shots when he had to make them. His 70 for a one-under-par 287 was one better than Bean, Mahaffey, Rose and Mudd. He continued to play very well the rest of the year to establish his position as one of the better players in the game.

Bill Kratzert was one of the most promising young players on TOUR during his first few years in the late 70's, but injuries set him back in the early 80's. However, the Indianan is completely back on his game now.

He encountered physical problems shortly after his victory in the 1980 Greater Milwaukee Open, and through the next three years, he developed bad swing habits. He even gave some thought to leaving the TOUR, but he started to spend some time on the practice tee with Phil Rodgers and, gradually, the pieces started to fit together again.

He completed the cycle in grand style in the 1984 Pensacola Open, coming from two strokes behind with four to go with a string of three birdies to win it all by two strokes. "I can't tell you the importance of this to me," he said.

The 1985 season was one of his best ever as he collected \$180,331 with six top ten finishes. The following year, though, was a tremendous letdown for Kratzert as he fell to 139th on the money list with only \$47,421.

The 1987 season started slowly for Kratzert, but a strong finish with a T6 at the Greater Milwaukee Open put him into position to regain his full exempt status. However, he needed a good final event to secure that spot and he had just that, finishing in a T2 at the Centel Classic. The second place effort was worth \$33,000 to Kratzert and boosted him to 114th on the money list with \$78,232.

Bill obtained his TOUR card in the Spring of 1976 and a few months later, he was a winner. He joined with Woody Blackburn and they won the Walt Disney World National Team title in a playoff over Bobby Nichols and Gay Brewer.

His father has been the head professional at the Fort Wayne, IN. Country Club for more than 20 years, so it was natural for him to play the game.

"I didn't start to play until I was about 13," Bill says. "My dad never pushed me into it. It was just always there. It wasn't until I was 14 or 15 years old that I decided that golf was my game."

He won the Indiana State Amateur at age 16 and the Indiana Open a year later. Allen Miller, who befriended Bill when he became ill during the Sunnehanna Amateur, influenced him to go to the University of Georgia, where he was chosen All-Southeastern Conference all four years and All-American his last two.

After he failed in his first try in the TOUR Qualifying School, Kratzert quit the game in frustration, went home to Fort Wayne and worked six months as a fork-lift operator. But in the Spring of 1975, he accepted an assistant pro's job at a club and returned to the game to stay.

Bernhard Langer moved from out of the shadows and into the sunshine as one of the world's outstanding players in 1985, especially after his back-to-back victories in the Masters Tournament and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

Bernhard was six-strokes off the pace at the halfway mark at the Augusta National Golf Club, and he was at his brilliant best during the final two rounds. He shot a pair of 68s to overtake a struggling Curtis Strange and won by two strokes over Strange, Raymond Floyd and Seve Ballesteros.

The next week, Langer took the lead after the third round on the Harbour Town links and then was tied by Bobby Wadkins, but the German star won it all on the first extra hole with a par.

Bernhard already was considered one of the better players on the European Tour when he headed for the United States and the 1981 World Series of Golf at the Firestone Country Club.

It was his first exposure to life on the PGA TOUR and he wanted to make a good impression. He did that—and more. "At one point early in the back nine the last day," he recalls vividly, "I was tied for the lead. It was a good feeling because I knew then that I could play over here. Until you do it, you never can be certain." He went on to finish in a tie for sixth place.

In the Spring of 1984, he played in eight PGA TOUR events, made the cut in all eight and had three top 10 finishes. He earned \$82,465, easily enough to qualify for his TOUR card.

Bernhard started in the game as a caddy at age nine at the Augsburg Country Club in his hometown of Anhausen, West Germany. After a few weeks, he decided he wanted to play. With a laugh, he said, "They made me play up-and-down the practice range until I reached a certain standard and then they let me on the course."

For the next seven years, he would play, practice and caddy whenever he could. In 1972, when he was finished with his formal schooling at age 15, he headed for Munich and went to work as an assistant professional at the Munich Golf and Country Club. Heinz Fehring was the head pro, and he became Bernhard's first and only teacher.

Wayne Levi has a good reason to be proud of his record. He averaged a victory a year through his first eight full years on the TOUR and played in the MONY Tournament of Champions on eight straight occasions.

The string was broken in 1986 mainly, he said, because of his putting. "I hit the ball well enough. I didn't have the consistency on the greens."

He came on strong in the latter half of 1987 to enjoy a profitable season. He said with a laugh, "In the early part of the year, I spent too much time studying the stock market and it affected my game. I hit the ball as well as ever, but it was my putting that let me down again."

The eighth victory on his string came in the 1985 Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic when he defeated young Steve Pate in a playoff.

He has been able to reach these goals without devoting 100 percent of his efforts to the game. His family is very important and he spends as much time as possible with them.

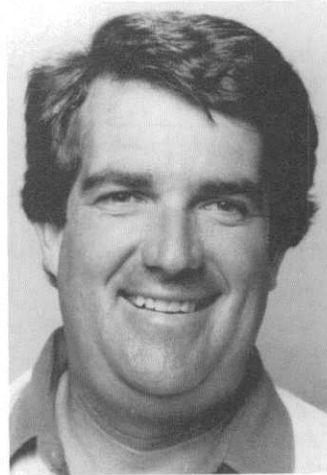
As an example, prior to his victory in the 1983 Buick Open, he skipped five of the preceding six events, saying, "I wanted to be home to see Lauren crawl (their second-born) and I want to be there to see her walk. There will be many more tournaments, but you get to see that only once."

On a historical note, when he won the 1982 Hawaiian Open, he did so using Wilson's Optic Orange ball. He thus became the first player to win a TOUR event while using a colored golf ball.

Wayne started to play golf at age 13, mainly because his pals were playing the game. He fell in love with it almost immediately. During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and won the 1970 New York State Interscholastic title. During his two years at Oswego State College, he lost only once.

In the summer of 1972, he headed for Florida so that he could devote 12 months of the year to his game. After two years of mini-tour action, he tried for his TOUR card, but didn't make it on his first two attempts. Meanwhile, he played wherever he could find a game throughout Florida and, during the summer months, on the New England circuit. He won numerous events, and his first was the 1973 New Hampshire Open.

When Bruce Lietzke's game is right—and it usually is—he is one of the finest players in the game. It has been said, and rightly so, that he is capable of winning anywhere at any time under any condition.

So, it wasn't a surprise when he came from four strokes behind during the last round of the Honda Classic in 1984 to tie Andy Bean and then win the tournament on the first extra hole.

While he hasn't won since then, Bruce has managed to play consistently and what appears to be effortlessly. He has taken considerable amounts to the bank and thus has been able to enjoy more time with his family.

During the week of the 1982 Canadian Open, even though he was playing well, he kept insisting that he didn't expect to win. He held a two-stroke lead going into the final round at Glen Abbey, and told everyone he felt he had a good chance to win, but didn't expect to win. He did, of course, by two strokes over Hal Sutton.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the Spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston.

"I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get back to it."

Six months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR, but he made it in the Spring of 1975.

He played well on TOUR almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kan., gave him a cut-down set of clubs. While at Beaumont Forest Park High School in Texas, he won the Texas State Scholastic title as a sophomore and helped his team to one championship and three seconds in his four years. While at the University of Houston—where he roomed with Bill Rogers—he won the 1971 Texas State Amateur.

Robert Lohr is one of the better young players in the game today and he has displayed the skills necessary to become one of the really outstanding players in the game.

It is interesting to note that during his first three years, he was off to a slow start but by the time the TOUR hit Texas, he was in high gear.

In his rookie season of 1985, he tied for second in the Houston Open and then tied for eighth in the Byron Nelson Classic. Two years ago, he was eighth again in the Byron Nelson.

Last year, he struggled until he reached Dallas and the Nelson Classic. A second-round 62 propelled him to a third-place finish and \$40,800. He closed the official season with a tie for second in the Centel Classic.

After he came out of the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1984, he didn't set any specific goals, "except to finish among the 125 money winners." I've never been a goal-oriented person," he explained. "Sometimes you can reach a goal and where do you go from there? I just want to continue to improve and learn what I can."

He played on the Tournament Players Series in 1984 and says he learned a valuable lesson. "I realized more than ever that you have to play the course itself and not the other players. When I came out on the regular TOUR, it was easy to look at a leader board and think, 'How can I ever beat these guys.'"

"If you play your own game and put a good score on the board, it doesn't make any difference what the other people do. It sounds simple enough, but it is something you have to learn and adjust to it."

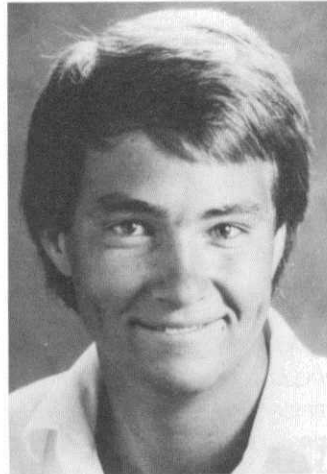
Robert started to play the game at a relatively young age, but he also was an outstanding baseball pitcher as a youngster. He continued to pitch through high school, but when he went to Miami University in Ohio, he had to make a decision, since both sports were played in the Spring. It wasn't an easy decision, but he decided to stay with golf.

Now that he is on the TOUR, he said there are special advantages. "Everything is for free," he said with a grin. He explained, "I'm not talking about material things. I used to pay \$10-or-so to watch Jack Nicklaus and Tom Watson hit balls on the practice range. Now, I can watch all the great players for as long as I want for nothing. I can see the way they act, the way they swing and the way they manage their games."

Is there pressure on the TOUR? He says there is some but adds, "Pressure is when you're on the mound, the bases are loaded, it's the bottom of the ninth and you have a 3-and-0 count on the batter."

Wherever the "pressure" is found, he's managed to handle it well.

Davis Love III said, "I started to play golf as soon as I could walk. As long as I can remember that's all I've wanted to do. When I was nine-or-10 years old, there wasn't any doubt in my mind. I wanted to be a pro."

It was a natural happening. When Davis was just a tot, his father was playing on the TOUR. For many years, Davis Love Jr. has been regarded as one of the premier teachers/technicians in the game.

"Whenever I would be doing something with Dad," Davis said of his early days, "it would be playing golf."

"I didn't have a lot of success in junior golf," he said, "but when I went to the University of North Carolina, I was ready for it. Dad worked with me a lot and we built a swing that would last."

Since he had spent all of his life in the golfing environment, he knew it wouldn't be an easy road to travel. He knew it would take hours of hard work to stay one stroke ahead of the next guy.

"What I didn't realize," he said, "was how much fun it would be. I've met so many nice people, made good friends and done things I never would have been able to do if it wasn't for the TOUR."

It was a good first year for the three-time All-American and former Walker Cup player. He was in position to win on a couple of occasions and it was disappointing not to get the victory, but looking at the season as a whole, it was a good one.

He established himself early as one of the longest hitters in the game and went on to finish first in the EPSON driving distance stats, averaging 285.7 yards.

In 1987, Love proved that he's also one of the best players in the game, winning the MCI Heritage Classic on the Harbour Town Golf Links. He was also second at the Colonial NIT and went on to win \$297,378.

"Winning at Harbour Town was special because it was so close to home and on a course where you need to hit it straight and putt well," said Love. "The win also got me into all the special events that I always dreamed of playing in."

Love points to a round in the 1986 Tournament Players Championship as a big turning point in his development.

"I was paired with Ben Crenshaw the last day. I had a really good round (67) while playing in front of a lot of people with one of the stars in the game."

"That day, something told me I belonged. I'm not certain I would have had the year I've had without that experience."

"Ben was so pleasant all day," he continued. "He tried to help me the best he could in the situation. He inspired me to play better."

And, thus, a bright young star was born.

As long as Mark Lye is playing golf, there never will be another afternoon such as the hot-and-humid one at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in Sutton MA, in September of 1983.

After seven years of battling on the TOUR, he finally won his first tournament, coming from eight strokes behind the last day with a brilliant eight-under-par 64 to win by one shot over John Mahaffey, Jim Thorpe and Sammy Rachels. He finished birdie, par, birdie, birdie.

An emotional sort, Mark said, "I was beginning to believe winning was out of my reach. It isn't that you're not good enough, it's just that some people can't rise to it."

He came back with another very good year in 1984, with his performance in the Masters Tournament standing out. He led by two strokes after two rounds and was the center of national media attention. He finally finished tied for sixth.

He had the finest round of his career in the third round of the 1984 Walt Disney World Classic. He shot a course record 11-under-par 61 at the Lake Buena Vista Country Club.

He has been working on a few new swing thoughts the last couple of years but his progress was slowed slightly in 1986 due to back and rib problems. He has always been one of the game's more active players but he was forced to cut back on a few tournaments because of the injuries.

Although he now resides in Ft. Myers, FL, he grew up on the fairways of the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA and it was there in the 1979 Kaiser International that he nearly won his first tournament. With the cheers of his hometown friends ringing in his ears, he was tied with Lor Hinkle for the third-round lead, but finally had to settle for something less as several others came on strong at the wire.

As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year old, and he played every day, all day.

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the states point system. As a 12-and-13-year old, he was winning tournaments.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After being graduated from San Jose State, he set his sights on the TOUR, but first headed for Europe for more experience. He tried the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975 and missed and again in the Spring of 1976 and missed. He was off to Europe, and then Australia after that, and blossomed a winner. In fact, he won the 1976 Australian Order of Merit. In the Fall of 1976, he was back in the Qualifying School, and he made it.

Sandy Lyle never will experience another week quite like the one at the Open Championship on the Royal St. George's course in England in the Summer of 1985.

He became the first "home" winner of the Championship since Tony Jacklin won at Royal Lytham in 1969, and only the second since Max Faulkner won it in 1951.

He was three strokes off the lead after three rounds. He commented, "Things just hadn't clicked for me. My swing wasn't quite right and the putts weren't dropping."

"Then, bingo, suddenly I had achieved my life's ambition. The birdie putts I holed at the 14th and 15th holes were the key."

He won by a stroke over Payne Stewart.

Following the victory, Sandy was looking for more success and he found it in abundance in the Spring of 1987. He won the Tournament Players Championship and, with it, a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events.

It wasn't easy. His rounds of 67, 71, 66 and 70 for 14-under-par 274 only tied him with Jeff Sluman and then he had to go to the third extra hole on the TPC at Sawgrass course to win it with a par to Jeff's bogey.

"This tournament still is fairly new to Britain," he said, "but it's one of the majors in my mind right now."

It was his second TOUR victory. He also won the 1986 Greater Greensboro Open.

Sandy was born in Scotland but has made his home in England for many years. It was logical for him to be attracted to the game at an early age. His father, Alex, was a golf professional for many years, although he is retired now.

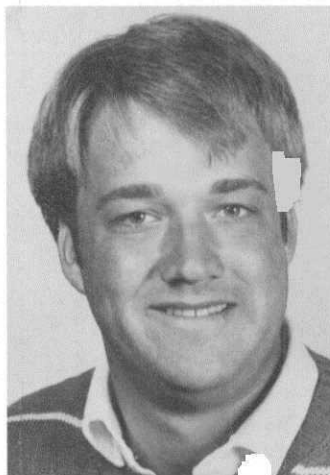
At the age of 10, Sandy broke 80 for the first time. He progressed rapidly and in 1977 played against the United States as a member of the British Walker Cup team. He turned professional later that year and was the medalist in the European Tour qualifying tournament.

His first pro victory came a year later in the 1978 Nigerian Open and he posted a brilliant 61 along the way.

Since then, he has won numerous tournaments, such as the 1979 European Open, the 1981 French Open, the 1983 Madrid Open and then enjoyed a big year in 1984 when he won the Italian Open, Lancomb Trophy, Kapalua International and the Casio World (Japan) titles.

Andrew Magee was more than satisfied with his first year on TOUR, but he was not as pleased with his second when he felt he lacked some of the consistency of the year before.

"When I started on TOUR, I had to learn how to play every day. I never did that as an amateur," he pointed out. "I knew the travelling would be a grind, but you have to be able to adjust to it.

I worked hard on my game when I first came out because I thought it was the thing to do. I know you have to practice but you have to learn how and when to practice and coordinate it with the rest of your schedule."

The 1987 season was again not as consistent as he would have liked, but he did have two top ten finishes and earned a respectable \$94,598. He also got married and moved, two areas that he is happy about, but took a bit away from his game.

"I had a lot of off the course items to take care of in 1987," said Magee. "Now it's time to get down and play a little harder in 1988."

There were several highlights during his rookie year of 1985.

"The first one was being paired with Jack Nicklaus during the third round of the Doral-Eastern Open. I'll never forget it." Andrew tied for 10th place and it was his first healthy check of the year.

The second one was two weeks later in the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic. After rounds of 73, 69 and 68, he was only two strokes out of the lead which was being shared by Fuzzy Zoeller and Curtis Strange. He was paired with them the last afternoon, but Andrew didn't fare as well as he had hoped. "The experience of being there with them was great," he said.

The next one was in the Byron Nelson Classic when he shot a first-round seven-under par 64. It also was the day Mac O'Grady set a course record at Las Colinas with a 63. It was especially satisfying because he spent many of his growing up years in the Dallas area.

Finally, he played some of his finest golf of the year at the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. He had a 65 the third day en route to a tie for sixth place and he earned his biggest check of the year—\$19,425. "It was the check that put me over the hump for my exemption," he said.

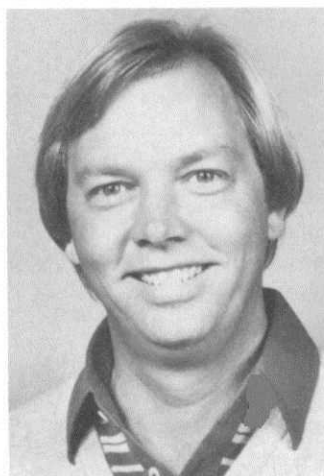
Andrew started to play at about age 11 after being urged to do so by his older brother. So, it was a special week for the Magee boys at the Bank of Boston Classic. "He's a Captain in the Army now," Andrew said, "and he caddied for me that week."

He progressed gradually until he reached the University of Oklahoma. He had a good Spring as a sophomore and then his game took the quantum leap. He became a three-time All-America choice.

"I started to think about the TOUR because I had a few older friends who were going to the Qualifying Schools and making it, fellows such as Willie Wood and Mark Brooks."

When John Mahaffey's game is right, there are few who can strike the ball with the same crispness. Such has been the case the last few years.

Certainly one of the highlights of his splendid career came in the 1986 Tournament Players Championship. He came on strong during the final round to overtake Larry Mize and win by a stroke on the TPC at Sawgrass course. A seven-under-par 65 the third day put him in position to make the last-day charge.

The check for \$162,000 helped him to his best financial year ever on TOUR.

He also enjoyed profitable years in 1984 and 1985. He won the Bob Hope Classic in 1984 after defeating Jim Simons in a playoff and he won the Texas Open in 1985 by defeating Jodie Mudd in a playoff.

Last year was something of an experimental season as he tried to break in a new set of clubs, but it took awhile to find the ones that felt just right. As he said, "My other clubs just wore out."

Part of his success is related to a swing change he made in 1983. "I made some positive changes to help my longevity on TOUR. I added some distance without jeopardizing a lot of accuracy. It gave me a more positive outlook."

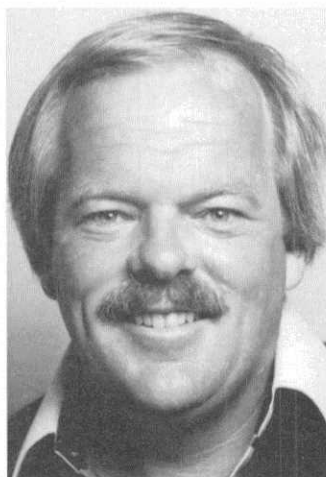
John joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970 NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978, and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate, and the next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sutton, Mass.

If there was an award for hard work, Roger Maltbie would be one of the leading contenders.

The personable Californian was one of the brightest young stars in the game in 1976, but three years later, he was almost a forgotten man and he fell to 155th on the money list. With hard work and dedication, he pulled himself back into the front line in 1981, and came close to winning twice.

He challenged again the next three years without breaking through, but in 1985 Maltbie returned to the top of the golf world with victories at the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and the NEC World Series of Golf.

He still was on his game in 1986 as he narrowly missed winning twice. He lost in a playoff at Hartford to Mac O'Grady and he was edged by Fuzzy Zoeller at Hilton Head.

"It was a year of nearly—I nearly won at Hilton Head and Hartford," said Maltbie. "If I'd won those two, it would have been a heck of a year."

There were several highlights to the 1987 season. He was tied for the lead after three rounds of the Masters Tournament but finished tied for fourth. He was third in the Westchester Classic.

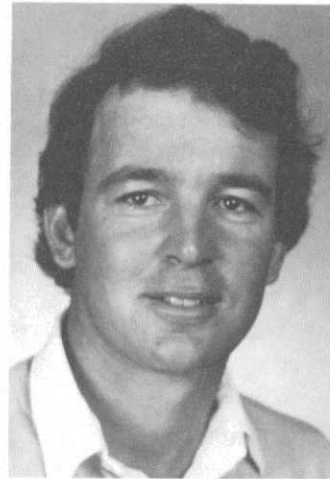
"The real highlight," he said smiling, "was on March 3. That's when Spencer Davis was born."

Roger was as amazed as anyone by his startling performances midway through his rookie year of 1975. He won back-to-back tournaments, the Ed McMahon-Quad Cities Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic. After the latter, he left his winner's check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one, and at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

Roger was teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, Calif. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

Even before he had his first lesson in the ABC's, Dick Mast was learning how to swing a golf club. "I don't know how old I was when I first started to play," he said, "but I probably was about four years old."

His father, Ken Mast, built the public course in Bluffton, OH, and was the head professional there for years. "I wanted to be just like him," Dick adds, "and I know that all I ever wanted to be was a pro."

Just like his dad, Dick became a fine player but the skills needed to be a PGA TOUR player seemed to be just a whisper away. He was a dominant player on the mini-tours but, until 1986, success on the TOUR was just a dream.

"I probably tried the Qualifying School a dozen times," he said. He was successful on four occasions but until 1986 he never was able to make the best of it.

"In the early years, I qualified a lot on Mondays but couldn't get past the cut on Friday," he said. "It took a lot of maturing. I lost a lot of confidence and the psychological damage was great because of failing."

He lost his playing privileges for the third time at the end of the 1979 season and, for the most part, spent the next five years playing wherever he could find a game. He did so with tremendous success, winning more than two dozen events.

"I learned how to win," he said, "and after all of that, I now have a different perspective of life. Even though I still love the game as much as ever, I can get over the bad times easier."

"Now, I want to play, instead of having to play. I used to go out each week thinking I had to win and it put extra pressure on me. Now, I've learned to say, 'I'll win this week, the Lord willing.' There's a big difference."

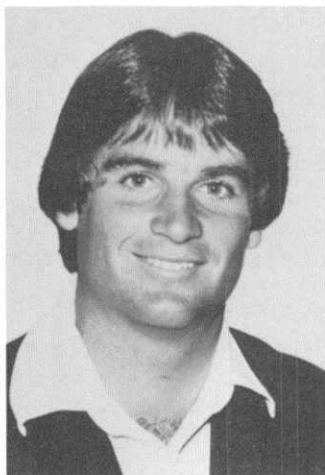
With his new outlook came regained confidence. He gained national attention in the regional qualifying tournament in the Fall of 1985 at Palmdale in Sarasota, FL. His final round of 12-under par 60 gave him a spectacular 32-under par score of 256 for the week.

His game showed a little more consistency last year than in 1986 but he said he still needs to work on his short game. He has been working mostly with Ralph Mann and Fred Griffin of the Jack Nicklaus Golf Academy at Grand Cypress near Orlando, FL.

The Mast family moved to St. Petersburg, FL, when Dick was a sophomore in high school and he played against the likes of Gary Koch and Andy Bean.

He went on to St. Petersburg Junior College but his heart was in the game. He went to work as an assistant to his dad in the summers at Lost Creek Country Club in Lima, OH in the early 1970's. His first success in the TOUR's Qualifying School was in the Fall of 1973.

His good friend, Gene Sauers, won the playoff in the 1986 Bank of Boston Classic, but as far as Blaine McCallister was concerned, his runner-up finish was just about as satisfying as a victory.

He earned a \$48,600 that Sunday afternoon and it easily pushed his earnings for the year up with the leading 125 money winners to give him exempt status for the first time in 1987.

That performance helped to pave the way for another good season last year when he went over the \$100,000 mark for the first time. "It definitely was a carry-over from 1986," he said.

Blaine had a couple of great opportunities to win it at the Pleasant Valley Country Club.

He missed a five footer for a birdie at the 18th hole for the victory. On the first extra hole, he missed a birdie from eight feet after Sauers had chipped in to save his par. He missed a two footer for birdie on the second extra hole and then Sauers won it with a birdie on the third.

"On the first hole," he said, "I was thinking all I had to do was make an easy two-putt par to win. The heat was on Gene because he had a tough chip (after coming out short from a bunker) but he made it for his par. It was a great shot."

Blaine started to play golf at age 14 in Fort Stockton, TX, with a couple of friends. "I thought it was neat how far you could hit the ball," he recalls.

He went on to win the 1977 Texas State High School championship. Ken Wright, who was the pro at the Fort Stockton Golf Club, helped him through those early years.

He received a scholarship to the University of Houston and became a four-year letterman. He roomed with Fred Couples one year and with CBS sportscaster Jim Nantz the other three.

He qualified to play on the TOUR in 1982 and 1983 but had little success. He missed in his attempts to regain his playing status in 1984 and 1985.

Charlie Epps, the head pro at the Houston Country Club, helped to turn his game around. Putting was one of Blaine's weaknesses because "I seemed to see too much break when I putted righthanded.

"I do everything lefthanded except play golf," Blaine recalls. "Charlie suggested I try putting lefthanded."

It took awhile to get used to the feel but gradually more putts started to drop. "I can see the line a lot better," he said, "Now I believe I'm more of an all-around player."

With his new stroke, he has added more consistency to his game and is not throwing away shots as he said he did in the earlier years on TOUR.

Mike McCullough wasn't trying to prove anything special when last season started, but by the time the year was over, he had proven a lot to himself and his friends.

Mike enjoyed his most financially-successful campaign in a decade and he credits it to an "inner-contentment. I didn't try to force the golf game on my life. When I was on the course, golf came first, but away from it, my family and friends came first."

Because of that, he found he was under less pressure on the course and by the end of the year, he had returned to total exempt status among the leading 125 money winners.

His first breakthrough in 1987 came in the Canadian Open. Late in the tournament, he found himself in the lead, and he finally finished tied for fifth place.

"When that happened," he said, "I had a piece of mind that carried over the rest of the year." In September, he tied for third in the B.C. Open.

Mike earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1972 and even though victory on the regular TOUR has eluded him, he has derived considerable satisfaction from the fact that he has made the cut in more than 250 tournaments. It's a sign of good, consistent play for many years.

As a youngster, Mike played in whatever sport was in season around his hometown of Coshocton, Ohio. It wasn't until after he was graduated from Bowling Green State University in 1968 that he decided to devote more time to golf.

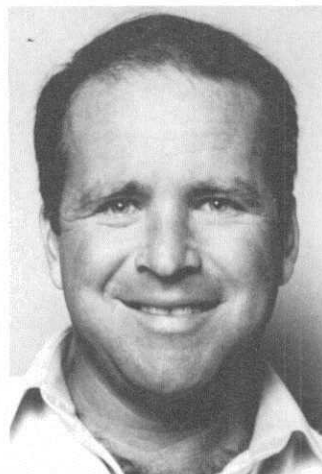
His first experience with the game came as a six-year-old mainly because his home bordered the eighth hole of a country club.

His first year out of college, he taught physical education in the Monroe (Mich.) system and then headed for Florida to play the mini-tours. Before doing so, he won the 1970 Ohio Amateur Championship.

He progressed slowly—but steadily—through his early years on TOUR. His big breakthrough came when least expected. In the 1977 Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass, he was the first-round leader with an exceptional score of six-under-par 66. Despite the extremely-windy condition he finished 74, 76 and 75 to wind up two strokes behind the winner, Mark Hayes. He won \$34,200 for the runner-up effort.

He played well in the 1978 TPC, as well. He tied for 12th place but his third round of 69 was the only sub-70 round in the entire tournament.

Mark McCumber has so many reasons to be proud of 1987, not only for his performances as a player but as a course designer as well.

He won the Anheuser-Busch Classic with a 66 on the last day, but he came within a whisker of winning on a few other occasions. The week before the Anheuser-Busch he was fifth in the Canadian Open and the week after he was third in the Hardee's Classic.

In mid-August, he battled to the wire in the PGA Championship but finally finished fifth.

During one stretch, he had 19 rounds at par or better and that was the best on TOUR all year. "I was 67-under par for that period," he said "and had 14 rounds in the 60s."

It was his best money year, by far, and he joined the ranks of \$1-million winners.

He started on TOUR in the Spring of 1978 and was a winner of the Doral-Eastern Open twice, in 1979 and 1985. He enjoyed a banner year in 1983, winning the Western and Pensacola Opens.

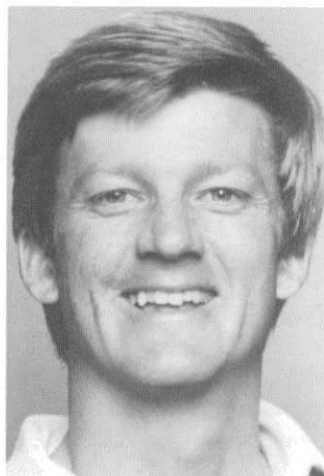
Until last year, 1983 was his best as he collected \$268,294. Since he only won \$ 31,684 the year before, it represented an increase of \$ 236,610 in a year.

He credits part of his success in recent years to his work with Bert Yancey and the importance of a "pre-shot routine."

He also is extremely proud of the work of Mark McCumber and Associates, the design-arm of McCumber Golf the company he helps to operate with his brothers.

They have 11 courses either completed or in the design stage, but one that opened last fall was Summer Beach on Amelia Island, FL. All toll, they have worked on more than 40 courses, but as he says, "the last 11 have been Mark McCumber design courses."

Pat McGowan recalls with a laugh how he received his introduction to the game. "I was about eight-and-a-half years old," he said, "and I used to play tennis four or five hours a day with my two older brothers at the Colusa (CA) Golf and Country Club. We were crazy about tennis.

"Then one day the pro at the club, Warren MacCarty, had a putting contest for all the kids and we did reasonably well. The next day, one of my brothers, Mike, and I asked for jobs picking up golf balls at the range. We did that for the next eight years. The tennis racquets went into the closet to stay as soon as we started to work."

He won several junior titles and went to Brigham Young University where he played on teams with the likes of Mike Reid, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Mike Brannan. He continued to win through college with one of his big victories being the 1977 Pacific Coast Intercollegiate.

He made it onto the TOUR after his first attempt at qualifying in the Fall of 1977 and had an excellent rookie year, winning \$47,091. That was his best money year until he went over the \$100,000 mark in 1983 and in 1986, he once again reached a new high.

He earned the biggest check of his career in the 1986 USF&G Classic in New Orleans. He shot four rounds in the 60s to finish second to Calvin Peete and collect \$54,000.

One of the great thrills of his career came in the 1984 Sacramento Classic in the Tournament Players Series. He won by defeating Steve Hart in a playoff, but there were many, many of his close friends in the gallery from his hometown of Colusa.

His first strong showing on the TOUR came in the 1978 Canadian Open when he finished second to Bruce Lietzke. In the Quad Cities Open in 1982, he was tied with Calvin Peete and Jeff Mitchell after three rounds and eventually tied for second. He had a final-round 67, but Payne Stewart won it with a closing 63. It was especially pleasing since his father had flown in from Sacramento the night before to see the final round.

Karl Tucker, the head golf coach at BYU, had a big influence on his game, but in recent times, Peggy Kirk Bell, his mother-in-law who is one of the leading instructors in the game, has helped him at their Pine Needles course in Pinehurst.

While in high school, Pat was named all-conference in both football and basketball for three years, and in 1973, was Valedictorian of his class.

Rocco Mediate was too busy pitching baseballs as a youngster to even think about pitching golf balls. "I didn't get my first set of golf clubs until I was 16-years old," he said. "I always played baseball and I was a pitcher for about 12 years."

Once he started to play a little golf, however, he was hooked. "My Dad never pushed me, but he encouraged me," Rocco said. "I only played in three tournaments as a senior in high school and then I went to California (PA) State College for 18 months. After that, I transferred to Florida Southern and that is where I really learned to play."

Jim Ferree, a prominent member of the Senior PGA TOUR, was the head professional at Westmoreland Country Club near Rocco's home in western Pennsylvania. He credits Jim with "getting me started," and he still sees Ferree on occasions.

During his years at Florida Southern, Coach Charlie Matlock "was a heck of an influence on me." Rocco's home in Greensburg, PA, is only a few miles from Latrobe, the home of Arnold Palmer, and he'll never forget the day he first had the opportunity to play with Arnold at the Latrobe Country Club. "I was only 19 and a friend of my family had set it up. When I went over there, I thought it was to play the course. I had no idea Mr. Palmer would be there."

Even today, their friendship remains strong and Rocco occasionally has the opportunity to play a leisurely round with Arnold. "He has given me a lot of encouragement and that means a lot to me."

He admits he didn't have a lot of amateur experience when he attempted to qualify for the TOUR in the Fall of 1985, but he made it. He finished 174th on the money list in 1986. He lost his player's card but returned to the Q-Tournament in the Fall of 1986 and finished fourth.

"My first year was a success even though I only won about \$20,000," he said. "I learned where I needed to improve and I learned so much about life on the TOUR, you know, travelling, how to handle everything."

A lot of hard work on his golf game helped considerably and he came along to enjoy a truly fine season in 1987. His best finish was a tie for second to John Inman in the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN. Oddly enough, Rocco's best in a major amateur event was in the 1984 Western Amateur and he lost in the final there to John Inman.

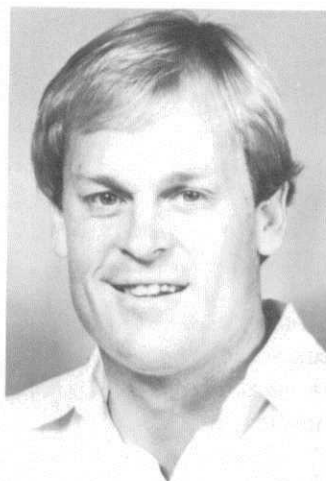
"My goal at the start of last year was to win \$85,000. I thought it was realistic. I played well enough to have about \$68,000 going to the Provident. Then, I won nearly \$40,000 and it blew away all my goals. I was 14-under-par there and that's by far my best."

"I lost, but I also feel I won," he said. "I played in the last group the last two rounds and that was a great experience. I shot 68 the last day but John shot 66 and just beat me."

The last couple of years, Rocco has been working with Rick Smith of the Gaylord (MI) Treetops Resort. "He is the one who has helped me to reach this level," he said.

At the rate he is going, it appears likely Rocco will be on the TOUR for many years to come.

Throughout his career, when Johnny Miller has been playing well, he has been awesome. He always has been able to make the game appear so easy, driving the ball long-and-straight; rifling his irons dead on the flagsticks and holing putts from all corners of the greens.

Miller's arrival as a star always has been tied to his final-round 63 and victory in the 1973 U.S. Open at Oakmont, but it was in 1974 that he won eight times and set what was then a record of \$353,021. He won the first three events of the year.

The next year, Johnny's clubs were blazing again. He won the Phoenix Open to start the year with a 24-under-par score, and the next week won the Tucson Open with a 25-under score. In each tournament, he had a round of 61.

No one has touched back-to-back efforts like that since.

Johnny won for the 23rd time in the 1987 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and it was something special. It was his first victory in four years and was especially satisfying because "it was in front of a lot of friends, since I grew up in San Francisco."

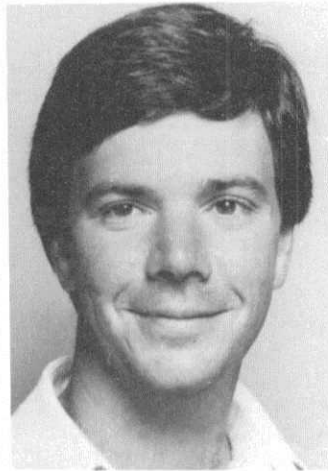
Leg problems forced him to cut back on his schedule. He only played in five events after the U. S. Open in late June.

He came close to having a banner year in 1983. He did win the Honda-Inverrary Classic but he lost two others in playoffs—the Phoenix Open to Bob Gilder and the Canadian Open to John Cook. In mid-December, he joined with Jack Nicklaus and they won the Chrysler Team Invitational. It was especially significant since Johnny is the tournament's official host.

In 1966, Johnny first gained national notoriety when he signed up to caddy in the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club in his native San Francisco. However, he eventually qualified to play in the tournament, and went on to an eighth-place finish.

He started in the game at age five, and one of his first titles was the U.S. Juniors in 1964. He went to Brigham Young University and was graduated in 1969. Later that year, he qualified for the TOUR.

Larry Mize will be known forever in golf history as the man who made the "impossible" shot to win the 1987 Masters Tournament.

Setting the stage, Larry made a gutsy eight-foot putt for a birdie on the final hole to tie with Greg Norman and Seve Ballesteros at three-under-par 285.

The playoff started at No. 10, but Seve was quickly eliminated when he three putted. Larry and Greg parred.

On the 11th, Larry's approach sailed far to the right of the green, some 140 feet from the cup. Norman was on the right fringe.

Using a sand wedge, Larry's chip was absolutely perfect and rolled dead center for a birdie. Slightly dazed by the turn of events, Norman missed his long putt for a birdie.

It was the second victory of his TOUR career. The first was in the 1983 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he made a birdie putt of 25 feet to edge the likes of Fuzzy Zoeller, John Mahaffey and Chip Beck.

He lost the 1986 Kemper Open to Norman in a playoff that lasted six holes.

Larry has improved his money winnings dramatically every year he has been on the TOUR, and he showed what he's made of at the end of his rookie year in 1982.

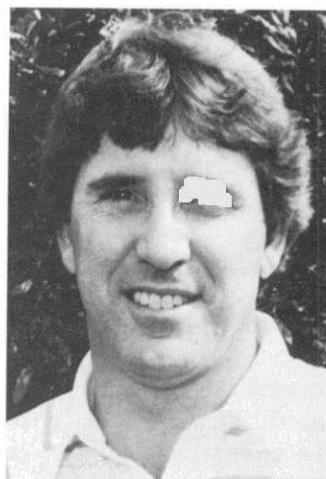
Just when it appeared as if Larry had no chance to make the exempt list for 1983, he fooled everyone. He had won \$14,787 with two tournaments remaining on the 1982 schedule, so his chances were slim, indeed, of making the top 125 money winners.

However, he proceeded to tie for ninth in the Pensacola Open and then tie for 11th in the Walt Disney World Classic to win \$14,000 and finish the year in 124th place with \$28,787.

Since the first time he picked up a club at the age of nine, Larry Mize has been totally in love with the game. He only had a few lessons in the formative years, as his father, a scratch handicapper, pointed him in the right direction.

He went to Georgia Tech, where he was No. 1 for three years and captain of the team for two. Along the way he also won an Atlanta Amateur championship.

Gil Morgan was absolutely delighted with his play in 1987 even though he has had several more productive years since starting on TOUR in the Fall of 1973.

He underwent surgery for a torn rotator cuff in early September of 1986. Dr. Frank Jobe of the Centinela Hospital Medical Center performed the operation and while it was declared successful, he couldn't be certain how well he would perform in the heat of battle.

It was nearly nine months before Gil was back on the firing line as he returned for the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational in early May. During the middle of summer, he was near the top of his game again.

At the Hardee's Classic, a third-round 63 gave him the lead, but he finally finished second to Kenny Knox. He also finished in the top 10 in his next two starts, as well.

"Maybe I played at a higher level than I had anticipated I would," he said. "I really feel good about the way I came back."

Through the years, Gil has been one of the more personable players in the game. He is quiet by nature but he always has been able to create excitement on the course with his exceptional play.

In 1983, for example, he won the first two tournaments of the year - the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins and then the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

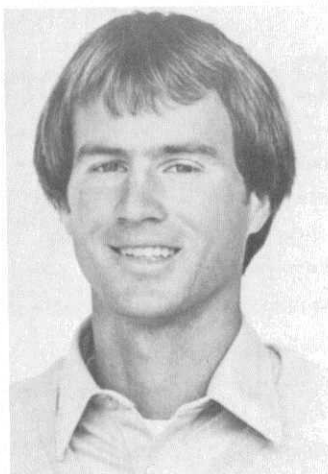
His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson. With his powerful, fluid swing action, he always has been able to play the more difficult courses well.

Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma, he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship in 1967, but waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

Although he did not gain a lot of national amateur attention, Danny Edwards said that the players around Oklahoma knew all about him. "Oh, yeah, we knew all about the fellow named Morgan who lived in Wewoka."

He progressed steadily up the ladder on the TOUR until he won the 1977 B.C. Open by five strokes over Lee Elder.

Those who have followed Jodie Mudd throughout his career knew he had the game to be successful. He was only 22-years old when he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1982 and it took him a couple of years to become comfortable with life on the road.

His game started to fall into place in the latter half of 1984 and in 1985, he blossomed out as a genuine contender. He finished second three times and on two of those occasions, he lost in playoffs.

Phil Blackmar emerged as the victor in the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open as he birdied the first extra hole to leave Jodie and Dan Pohl in a tie for second place. Jodie appeared to have the Texas Open in San Antonio in his hip pocket, but John Mahaffey birdied three of the last four holes to tie him and then Mahaffey won the playoff on the second extra hole.

He was close again to winning in 1986 finishing in a T2 at the Honda Classic and again this past season when he was T2 at the Canadian Open. All in all, 1987 was his best year yet with over \$200,000 in earnings.

"I'm real pleased with this past year, although I'm still looking for my first win," said Mudd. "I know it's going to happen sooner or later."

He said he is more at ease with himself, having realized that "golf is not a do-or-die situation. You have to learn how to take advantage of the good shots and save strokes and wash the bad ones out of your mind. I've learned a lot about myself and how to handle the good and the bad."

Jodie became an official member of the PGA TOUR in April of 1982, the week after the Masters Tournament. As an amateur, he tied for 20th at Augusta that year. His first pro start was the Tallahassee Open and he tied for 30th, winning \$675. The next week, he played in the USF&G Classic and tied for fifth place, pocketing \$10,537.

That was sufficient for him to meet the minimum money guideline that was in effect at that time, and he was a TOUR regular the next week in the Houston Open.

Jodie came from a golfing family, and in the early days, he caddied for his father. He continued to play golf in high school but also excelled in basketball. "I gave up basketball in my senior year, though," he said, "so I could concentrate on golf."

After playing in a couple of events in Florida, he accepted a scholarship to Georgia Southern College. There, his game blossomed. Twice he won the United States Public Links Championships, in 1980 and 1981. He won the prestigious Sunnehanna Amateur in 1981 and was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team the same year. He won eight collegiate events.

There certainly is every reason to believe that life on the PGA TOUR can begin anew at age 43. Just ask Bob Murphy.

One of the more popular players ever to be a member of the TOUR, Bob found a new secret to success in the 1986 Canadian Open as he won by three strokes over Greg Norman. It was the fifth victory of his career but also his first since the 1975 Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic.

"You certainly think you might never win again," he said on the victory stand, "and you wonder why. After I took the lead on Saturday, I felt my chances were fantastic but I didn't want to say anything in case I'd have to bite my tongue. I've been in that position a few times."

He collected \$108,000 at Glen Abbey near Toronto and that single check was for more than he had won in an entire season since his \$127,471 in 1975.

Three years ago, he finished second to Corey Pavin in the Colonial National Invitation, but through much of the last decade until the Canadian victory, he has had to fight hand and back problems.

Frequently, Bob will serve as a color analyst for CBS telecasts and his work is well received.

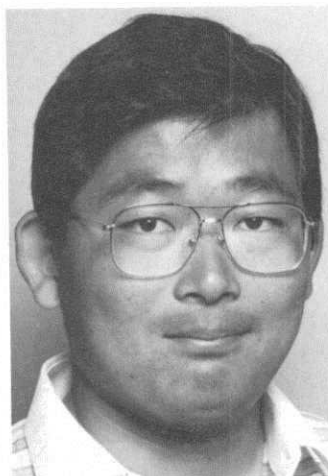
Bob's career started in a rather unusual fashion. He went to the University of Florida on a baseball scholarship as a pitcher, but he injured a shoulder in a pick-up football game as a freshman.

He took up golf as a physical education course and it was love at first sight. He said he would even skip class to practice.

Before he was graduated with a degree in physical education, he won the 1965 United States Amateur championship, the 1966 NCAA title for the Gators, two Florida Amateur titles, the 1967 Florida Open, and played on U.S. World Amateur Cup and Walker Cup teams.

He turned professional and went to the PGA TOUR School in 1967, and passed easily. In his rookie year of 1968, he set a goal of winning \$40,000. He won \$105,595, a record for a first-year player at that time, and two tournaments, the Philadelphia and Thunderbird Classics, back-to-back. Just prior to his first victory, he was second in the Westchester Classic.

Tsuneyuki (Tommy) Nakajima is recognized around the world - along with Isao Aoki - as one of the finest players in the history of golf in Japan.

He has been the leader in the Japan Order of Merit four times and by winning nine tournaments in 1983 and seven more in 1986, he has become a dominate player in his homeland.

Certainly, winning the Japan Amateur Championship in 1973 at the age of 19 ranks as one of the highlights of his splendid career, but his impressive record also shows he has won the Japan PGA on three occasions and the Japan Open Championship twice.

In all, he has won 40 times on the Japan Tour. He has a right to be proud of his efforts in the Nissan Cup matches in the Fall of 1986. He won individual honors by two strokes over Bernhard Langer with an 18-under-par 270 and he also led the Japan PGA team to victory, defeating the European PGA team in the final.

He obtained the nickname Tommy while playing in the 1981 Australian Masters. The television announcers had a problem trying to pronounce Tsuneyuki and Tommy seemed to be close enough.

Tommy started to play golf as a nine-year old with the help of his father. Through the early years, his father was his only teacher. He turned professional in 1975 at the age of 21 and his progress was steady all the way to the top.

In 1981, he was second only to Aoki on the Japan Order of Merit and the following year he became the leader with five victories and collected what was then a record \$270,000. He was the leader again in 1983, 1985 and 1986.

As you might expect, he still says Aoki and Jack Nicklaus are his two "most admired" people in the game. An extremely personable-and-pleasant fellow, he has attracted a large following worldwide.

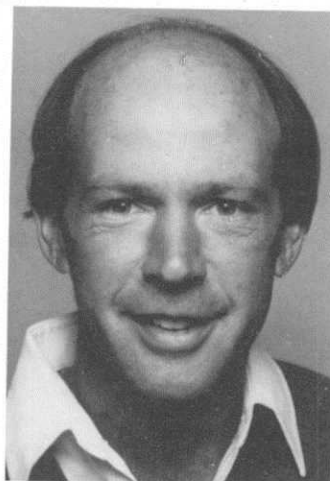
Tommy's first full year on the PGA TOUR was in 1983. He wanted to win enough money to become a member without having to go through the Qualifying Tournament. He did so, with \$45,351 in a limited number of events. A big boost came when he finished fourth in the Greater Greensboro Open that year.

He put together three top 10 finishes — including a tie for 10th in the PGA Championship — the next year to give his bank account an extra boost. He did not play that much in the U. S. in 1985 and 1986, but came back last year with another respectable year and reached his highest money total.

He was tied for the second round lead in the U. S. Open and still was contending until he finished bogey-bogey-double bogey. On the latter, he hit his second shot into a cedar tree near the 18th green. It became a lost ball.

The next day, he finished tied for ninth place.

Larry Nelson enjoyed a superb season in 1987 and he said it was because of two factors — patience and the desire to work harder on his game.

"It was a discouraging first half," he said, "but it turned out to be my best year."

Indeed it did, starting with his playoff victory over Lanny Wadkins in the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, FL. Two months later, his brilliant nine-under-par 63 the last afternoon gave him the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic title.

It also turned out to be his best money year by far and he easily went over the \$2 million mark in career earnings.

Larry's first major championship was in the 1981 PGA before thousands of his hometown followers at the Atlanta Athletic Club. He won by four strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller.

The 1983 U. S. Open at Oakmont has to go down as one of his great performances. He was seven strokes off the pace after two rounds but his six-under-par 65 the third day lifted him to within a stroke of the co-leaders, Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros.

The last day, it turned out to be a battle between Larry and his good friend Watson. When severe thunderstorms stopped play for the day, Larry was on the 16th tee and Watson on the 15th.

The next morning, Larry hit a four wood shot to the back of the green, some 62 feet from the cup. Incredibly, he made it for birdie and went on to win by one. His 10-under-par 132 for the last two rounds set an Open record.

There are not many stories on the PGA TOUR more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he had his Approved Tournament Players card.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried college again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, GA. He turned pro six months after that.

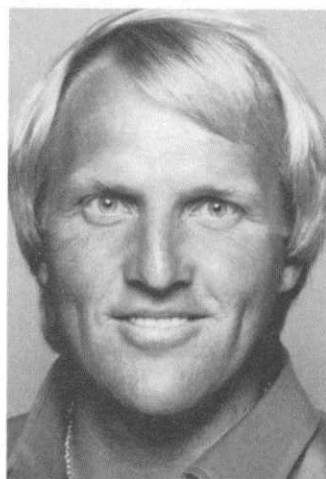
As long as the game of golf is played, there never will be another Jack William Nicklaus. He represents all that is great in the game and in the world of sports.

He has won six Masters Tournaments, five PGA Championships, four U.S. Opens, three Tournament Players Championships and British Opens and two U.S. Amateur Championships.

His greatest effort may have been in the 1986 Masters when he played the last 10 holes in seven-under par for a 35-30—65, a nine-under-par 279 and a one-stroke victory. On the PGA TOUR, since starting in January of 1962, he has won 71 times, but he also has had an astonishing 58 second-place finishes.

He readily admits one of his greatest satisfactions came in the Fall of 1983 when he captained the U. S. Ryder Cup team to a thrilling one-point victory over the European team. He was Captain again last Fall.

Greg Norman has always set high standards for himself but even he admits that 1986 was something special. He blossomed into one of the dominant players in the game.

He won twice on the PGA TOUR as he captured the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and the Kemper Open. He also was second four times and collected 10 top 10 finishes in 19 U.S. starts. It is interesting to note that he had one top 10 in his first seven starts and then had nine in his final 12 outings.

Overseas, he was incredible, once again. He won the British Open, European Open and the Suntory World Match Play. He then went home to Australia and won three in a row.

In all four of the more significant championships, he was in the lead going into the final round. He led by one stroke going into the last day of the Masters Tournament and finished tied for second. He led by one after three days at the U.S. Open and finally tied for 12th place. He led by four at the PGA Championship and finished second. He led by one after three days of the British Open.

All of the performances in the States led to his being the No. 1 money winner with a record \$653,296. He was \$516 ahead of Bob Tway.

After all that success, last year was a disappointment to him since he didn't win on TOUR. He lost a playoff to Larry Mize in the Masters Tournament and also tied for second in the Beatrice Western Open. He closed the season with a third place in the Nabisco Championship of Golf.

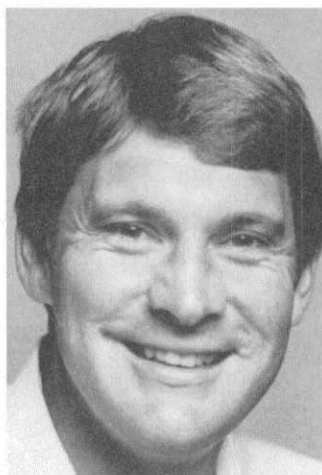
His first official year on the Tour was 1984 and he won twice, in the Kemper Open and the Canadian Open. In a six week stretch in mid-summer, he won those two events, lost the U.S. Open and Western Opens in playoffs and tied for 10th place in Atlanta.

The handsome Australian never played the game until he was 16, and then one day, he caddied for his mother, a three handicapper. When she finished the round, he borrowed her clubs and played a few holes on his own. In two years, this son of a mining engineer went from a 27 handicapper to scratch. His secret to success came from two books his mother gave him, both written by Jack Nicklaus—"Golf My Way," and "55 Ways to Play Golf."

His first appearance in the United States was in the 1977 Memorial Tournament.

In the 1981 Masters Tournament, he finished fourth, but he gained considerable attention with his "shark-hunting" stories, and thus became known as the "Great White Shark." He says he actually never went hunting for sharks, only shot at a few when "I became irritated because they were eating my fish."

Andy North has had many wonderful days on the PGA TOUR and he always thought there never would be another week like the one he enjoyed in 1978 when he won the United States Open Championship at Cherry Hills in Denver.

But there was another. It came in the Summer of 1985 at Oakland Hills in Birmingham, MI, when he won the Open Championship again, this time in a tense duel with several players who had opportunities to win. At the end, it was Andy at one-under-par 279 and one stroke better than Tze-Chung Chen of Taiwan, Dave Barr of Canada and Denis Watson of South Africa.

At Cherry Hills, he led by four strokes with five holes to play. There were some anxious moments before he was through, though. When he hit his tee shot on the 18th hole, he needed a bogey to win—and that's what he scored. After being bunkered in three, he blasted to four feet and he made it to gain the victory.

It was a struggle for Andy in 1983 and 1984, due mainly to a painful right elbow. It was thought to be tendinitis, but closer examination revealed a bone spur. He underwent an operation and had it removed in the Fall of 1983. As it turned out, it was "about the size of a piece of gravel."

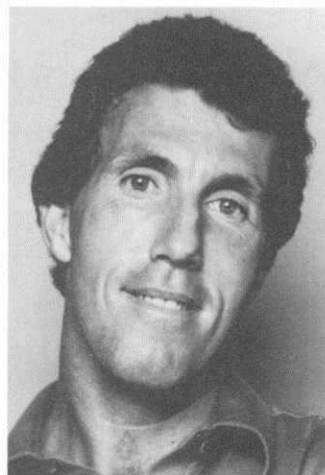
An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, WI. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf—if he rode in a cart.

Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

During the last year or so, his knees started to bother him again and last fall—October 8, to be exact—he underwent surgery to "clean the joint surfaces. There was a lot of junk in there," he said. Because of it, Andy played most of last year in considerable pain.

Mac O'Grady has reached the point in his career where he is now being recognized as one of the truly fine strikers of the golf ball in the game.

Victories in the 1986 Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and in the season-opening MONY Tournament of Champions last year proves he has the game to win, as well. At Hartford, he shot a final round of nine-under-par 62 to tie Roger Maltbie and then won with a birdie on the first extra hole.

As he says, "My five-year residency program on the TOUR is over and I now can shake hands with corporate America. I hope to maximize the efficiency ratio of my management resources."

Mac believes he set a TOUR record even before he became a member of the family. "I went through the Qualifying School 17 times before I made it," he said. "The first time was in October of 1971."

After he finally succeeded in the Fall of 1982, he has made the most of his opportunities. In 1985, he broke through and established himself as a solid contender. He finished third three times; one of them being at the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and it was worth \$64,000. That one week, he won more than he had in either of his first two years.

A high note was hit during the 1985 Byron Nelson Classic when he set a course record of eight-under-par 64 the first day at Las Colinas. He finished tied for third place.

He once said, "I've played so many places around the world during the last 10 years or so, being on the PGA TOUR is like celebrating Christmas every day."

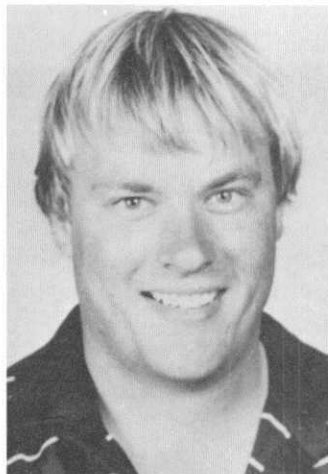
The Mac O'Grady story is an intriguing one. Actually, his real name is Phil McGleno, but in 1978, for a variety of reasons, he changed it to Phillip McClelland O'Grady. McClelland is for Bob McClelland, a fellow who has been like a father to him for years; and O'Grady was his mother's maiden name.

Mac was one of seven children and they lived in Minneapolis, MN, until moving to Los Angeles in 1960. He started to caddy when he was 12, both at Riviera and Bel-Air Country Clubs. Later, several of the men for whom he caddied, would serve as his sponsors.

As a youth, he was filled with frustrations, and in an attempt to wash them away, he did everything from ride a bike for great distances, practice yoga and even worked hard on being able to play the game right-and-left handed. Of course, he plays right-handed now, but still putts left-handed.

He said he loves marathoning, and misses those long, peaceful runs on the beach of Malibu.

David Ogrin came close to getting his first official victory on the TOUR in the 1985 St. Jude Memphis Classic but Hal Sutton had other ideas.

"I felt I finally played to my potential," David said. "I played an entire tournament my way and found out it was good enough. Except for Hal's great putt, I might have been the winner."

Sutton came on strong the last afternoon with a seven-under-par 65 at the Colonial Country Club to tie Ogrin at nine-under-par 279. On the first extra hole, Sutton rolled in a long birdie putt from the back fringe to win it.

He enjoyed a taste of victory last year in the Deposit Guaranty Classic in Hattiesburg, MS. A final-round 64 gave him a one stroke margin over Britain's Nick Faldo. It was worth \$36,000, and while the victory is considered "unofficial," the money definitely counted.

Late in the season, he had final rounds of 66 and 66 to tie for fourth place in the Pensacola Open.

If you ask David when he was introduced to the game, he'll smile and tell you, "Legend has it I was born with a club in my hands. When I was two-years old, my dad had one of his clubs break, so he sawed off the shaft, put a grip on it and I started to swing away."

"By the time I was five, I was breaking 60. I still have some scorecards from when I was five; and I was in my first competition at seven."

There was a time when David was considering baseball as a career. "I had dreams of being a switch-hitting catcher," he says with a laugh, "but my love of golf was too much."

In 1975, David won the Illinois State Interscholastic title. Then he went to Texas A&M on a scholarship. "Bob Ellis is the coach at A&M and he originally was from Illinois. He kept in touch and wanted me to go there, so I did."

He won three collegiate events, including the 1979 Harvey Penick Invitational in Austin. Hal Sutton was the runner-up.

"I wanted to go as far as I could in the game," he said, "and I made it through the TOUR's Qualifying School on my fourth attempt." That was in the Fall of 1982 at the Tournament Players Club.

"It isn't often one dreams a dream" he said, "and then when he reaches the dream, realizes it is even better than the dream. The TOUR is all I dreamed it would be, and more."

Following in the footsteps of his heroes, Isao Aoki and Tommy Nakajima, Aki Ohmachi made his first venture onto the PGA TOUR a successful one as he earned his card on his first try (1986 Q-School) and then retained his playing privileges by finishing 126th on the money list with \$65,695.

Ohmachi decided seven years ago that he'd like to play on the PGA TOUR after he came to West Palm Beach, FL, to work with Jack Grout, the man who taught Jack Nicklaus the swing.

While studying with Grout, Ohmachi had the opportunity to see a few TOUR events and he decided that eventually he would like to try his hand at competing here in the U.S.

"I saw a few tournaments and I was very surprised at how good all the players were," said Ohmachi.

Aki began the game at the tender age of six under the tutelage of his father who owns a driving range and a pro shop in Japan and after his later sessions with Grout, he returned to play on the Japan PGA circuit.

He enjoyed some success on his home circuit winning two events and finishing 23rd on the JPGA money list in 1986. However, he had a big dream that would require him coming to America.

"I want to play at Augusta National," said Ohmachi with a smile. "I have a very big dream—I'd like to win a green jacket."

He made strides towards that goal in 1987 with three top ten finishes in his initial year on TOUR and he showed his mettle by making the cut in seven of his last eight starts to secure the next-to-last spot on the all-exempt list for 1988.

The PGA TOUR is much more difficult than the JPGA, but it's been a very good experience for me," said Ohmachi, who is beginning to handle the English language much better, too. "The cut here is always under par and back home it's usually plus-four or plus-five, that's a big difference."

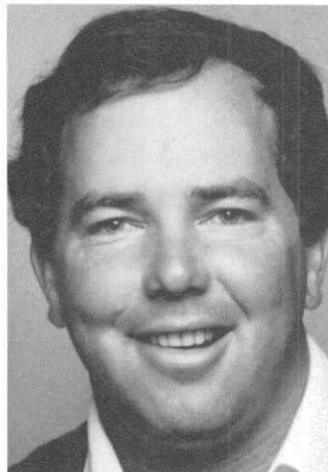
Ohmachi got off to a strong start with over \$40,000 in earnings at the halfway point of the year mostly on the strength of a T6 at Houston and a T9 at Westchester, but a prolonged drought in which he missed seven straight cuts left him in danger of losing his card.

His strong showing down the stretch, though, insured him of a spot on TOUR this year and he's looking forward to playing more and playing more consistently.

"I need a lot more practice and I'd like to play more tournaments this year," said Ohmachi. "I'm looking forward to this year because I think I'll be a little more comfortable this year. Maybe I can even win this year."

A win on TOUR is not out of the question for Ohmachi and it would move him one step closer to his dream of a green jacket.

As long as Mark O'Meara plays the game, he probably will never experience another year quite like 1984. He won his first TOUR title, the Greater Milwaukee Open, but victories—such as the back-to-back triumphs in the 1985 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and the Hawaiian Open—are expected of this talented young man.

What made 1984 so unusual was the rest of the story. He finished second five times, third three times and had a total of 15 top ten finishes—high on the TOUR. He earned \$465,873 and finished second to Tom Watson in the race for the Arnold Palmer Award as the year's leading money winner. He only trailed Watson by \$10,387.

Every time he was asked to explain his sudden rise to the top, he always pointed the finger at Hank Haney, the man from Houston who turned his game around.

"I've always played on natural instincts," Mark has said, "but I knew I needed something better. Hank had me swinging more on a plane. I was always too upright and that led to inconsistency.

Even though he has not won on TOUR since the 1985 Crosby and Hawaii events, he has been a winner. He won the 1985 Kapalua International in a playoff over Corey Pavin and then went to Japan to win the Fuji Sankei Classic. Early in 1986 he won the Australian Masters and last year he won the Lawrence Batley International in England.

He had a good, solid year on TOUR 1987, too. He tied for second in the Southwest Classic and was third in the Tournament Players Championship with a 65 the second day, his best effort.

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo, CA. A golf course was next to their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University. His next goal was to be classified as an All-American, and he made the third team as a freshman and second team as a senior.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals.

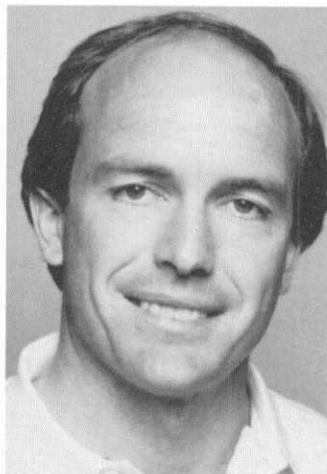

Arnold Palmer has been honored by many people from many nations during his distinguished career as an athlete and businessman but one of his most cherished moments came late in 1980 when it was announced by Commissioner Deane R. Beman that, starting in 1981, the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR would receive the Arnold Palmer Award.

Since Arnold was the TOUR's leading money winner for so many years, the first player to reach the \$1 million mark in winnings and, generally, did so much to popularize the game, Commissioner Beman said it would be appropriate to give the 1980 inaugural award to Arnold himself. Palmer won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1954 and joined the TOUR the next year.

Jerry Pate has a flair for the dramatic and it never was more evident than during the closing stages of the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, which was being held for the first time on the demanding Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass course.

He was battling Brad Bryant, Bruce Lietzke and Scott Simpson for the lead and the coveted victory. Just when it appeared a playoff was imminent, Pate birdied the treacherous little 17th hole with a 15-foot putt; and then birdied the 440-yard 18th by lofting a five iron brilliantly to within two feet for another birdie. On one of the more difficult courses on TOUR, he played the final seven holes in four-under par.

Then, as he stood on the final green at the awards ceremony, he coaxed TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman and course architect Pete Dye to the edge of the bulkhead and pushed them both in the lake. Finally, he dove in himself.

It was his second such act of showmanship. He did it the first time after winning the 1981 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, diving into the large lake to the left of the 18th green.

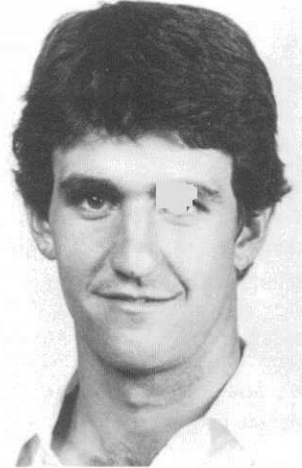
A severe neck/shoulder injury in mid-1982 seriously affected his once-brilliant career. He has had three operations to repair damage to the shoulder, the last one being in mid-July of last year by Dr. Frank Jobe. "I'll be back," he said confidently.

Meanwhile, he also has developed a blossoming golf course design business and has done impressive work on several courses. One of his latest was the Valley Course at the TPC at Sawgrass with Pete Dye and it was opened for play last fall.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a two-shot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie until Hal Sutton bettered it in 1982.

Conrad Rehling, who developed Bob Murphy while coaching at the University of Florida in the early 1960s, "discovered" Pate while coaching at a small college near Pensacola. Pate was still in high school when he came under Rehling's wing. When Rehling moved to the University of Alabama, Pate followed.

Steve Pate knocked on the door on several occasions and close followers of the game knew it was just a matter of time until the former standout at UCLA claimed his first victory.

It happened last fall in the Southwest Classic in Abilene, TX when he came from four-strokes behind the final afternoon to win by one shot. It wasn't easy. He had to make a par putt of five feet on the final green to clinch it.

His 15-under-par 273 at the Fairway Oaks Club gave him the slim margin over Mark O'Meara, who missed an eight footer to tie, Dan Halldorson, David Edwards and Bob Eastwood.

"I played well the last three weeks," he said, "and everything seemed to come together here. You have to play well to win, but you also have to play well at the right time."

Steve came close to winning during his rookie season of 1985 at the Georgia Pacific Atlanta Classic. But Wayne Levi had other ideas.

As they were heading down the home stretch, Steve birdied the 15th hole to move in front. Levi tied him with a birdie at the 17th hole and they both birdied the par 5 18th hole at the Atlanta Country Club. Levi made a 15-footer and Steve dropped a 12-footer on top of it.

After they parred the first extra hole, Levi claimed the victory with a birdie on the second. Steve was short of the green in two and chipped six-feet beyond the hole. Levi had a 12-footer and he made it.

"Yes, I'm a little disappointed," Steve said, "but Wayne had to birdie three of the last four holes we played to beat me. I was having fun and it was a blast being on television."

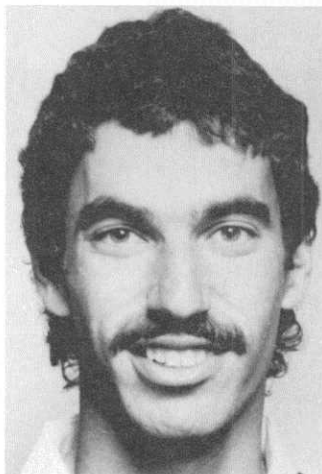
Steve started to play golf at the age of nine, mainly because his parents played and they encouraged him. In his first competition, at age 11, he recalls shooting a 107. He progressed well enough to make his high school team in Santa Barbara as a freshman. In his senior year, he won the California Interscholastic Federation title.

He moved on to UCLA and it was a good decision. He came under the wing of noted teacher and professional Eddie Merrins, the head pro at Bel-Air Country Club who also coaches the Bruins. He still works with Eddie.

Jim Petralia of the Annandale Country Club in Pasadena also has been a big help. "He was in Santa Barbara for awhile and I started to work for him when I was 16," Steve said.

Oh, yes, he does get asked frequently if he is related to Jerry Pate. The answer is no.

Each year, Corey Pavin takes one more step toward stardom. Already, he is regarded as one of the truly fine young players of the game and there appears to be no end to what he is capable of accomplishing.

He won in his rookie year of 1984 and he won again in 1985. Last year he stepped up the production and won twice, in the Hawaiian Open and the Greater Milwaukee Open. A last-day 66 made the Hawaii victory possible and he closed in Milwaukee with rounds of 67-67.

This past season was more of the same for Pavin as he won the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic with a dramatic final hole birdie and then successfully defended his title with a playoff win at the Hawaiian Open.

He won a career high \$498,406 and had eight top ten finishes, but still he was not quite satisfied. "It wasn't a bad year, but it was my worst performance since I've been out here," said Pavin. "My lack of consistency bugged me more than anything."

In his first year of 1984, the young man from UCLA not only won the Houston Coca-Cola Open, he also earned far more than any other first-year player in the history of the TOUR. He collected \$260,536 as he had five top 10 finishes and missed the cut on only three occasions.

In 1985, he had more top 10 finishes than any other player with 13 of them and his earnings of \$367,506 put him in sixth place. His victory was an impressive one in the prestigious Colonial National Invitation. He opened with a 66, added a 64 and then finished with a pair of 68s to win by four strokes. His 266 established a tournament record.

Before joining the TOUR, Corey gathered considerable experience playing around the world and, so, it didn't take long for his skills to surface here.

Three months after gaining his TOUR card, Pavin found himself at The Woodlands where he posted a one-shot victory in the Houston Coca-Cola Open for his first title.

Corey started in the game at age eight and it wasn't long before he was receiving his first taste of competition. It was in 1977 that he won his first two important titles. As a 17-year old, he captured the Junior World crown and also became the youngest ever to win the Los Angeles City Men's Amateur.

He was very successful during his years at UCLA, winning 11 tournaments including the PAC-10 championship in 1982. He also received the Fred Haskins award as the outstanding collegiate player that year.

When Corey failed to get his TOUR card in his first attempt, he took his golf game overseas in 1983. He was successful, to say the least. He won the South African Open, the German Open and the Calberson Classic in France.

The Calvin Peete success story continued through 1986 as he added two more titles to his growing list of accomplishments highlighted by his romp at the MONY Tournament of Champions.

"I look at 1986 as a very satisfying year although I didn't reach my goal of being the Player of the Year," said Peete. "But that was only due to the great play of Tway and Norman. Otherwise, I was very satisfied."

He has won 12 times in the last nine years but his greatest accomplishment came in March of 1985 when he won the prestigious Tournament Players Championship. It assured him of exempt status for the next 10 years.

Four of his victories came in a brilliant 1982 campaign and he has been a leader in such statistical categories as driving accuracy and greens in regulation almost from the beginning of the program. He has played on two Ryder Cup teams as well.

Lower back problems put him on the sidelines for much of last year. There were some weeks when he tried to make an adjustment in his swing so he could play, but that only made matters worse. The result was his poorest season in a decade.

He won the Golf Writers' Ben Hogan award in 1983. It goes annually to the individual who had to overcome a physical handicap or illness to play the game. As a youngster, Calvin suffered a broken left elbow and even today, he cannot extend the arm. So much for golf's straight-left arm principle.

In 1984, when Calvin won the Texas Open in San Antonio, he had two rounds of 67 and two rounds of 66. It assured him of his first Vardon Trophy for low stroke average—70.56.

Born in Detroit, Mich., Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters—through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

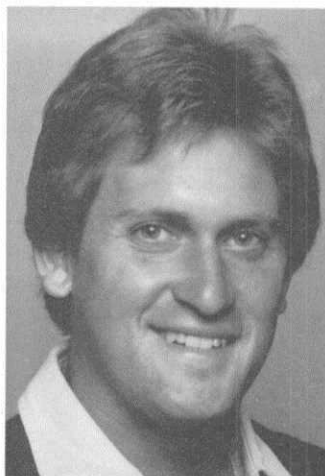
While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, N.Y.

Peete had friends in Rochester, and each year his buddies would invite him to play golf. "I always turned them down," Peete said, "I thought the game was silly. Who wants to chase a little ball around under the hot sun?"

Finally, in 1966, when he was 23 years old, Calvin tried the game with his friends and he was hooked. He recalls, "Just about that same time I saw a tournament on television and learned that Jack Nicklaus was making around \$200,000 a year chasing that ball. I figured I could be happy with one-third that amount, so I decided to give it a try."

Peete improved rapidly and he began to play in amateur tournaments wherever he could. Eventually he entered the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School. Like so many others, Peete failed on his first try. And the second. But he made it the third time, in the Spring of 1975.

There was a time when Chris Perry had to make a very big decision. As a strong-armed righthander, he compiled a 9-0 pitching record as an ninth grader with a 0.91 earned run average and he also carried a healthy .325 batting average.

But, he also loved to play golf.

"My Dad never said I had to follow him," Chris remembers, "but he did say things are so specialized in sports today that I would have to make a decision. I couldn't do everything."

His dad, Jim Perry, knew something about such things. He was an outstanding pitcher for many years in the major leagues, starting for Cleveland, Minnesota, Detroit and finally with Oakland.

"By the time I was 13-or-14-years old," Chris adds, "I knew I wanted to play professional golf. In Minnesota (his dad pitched for the Twins for 10 years), you play golf and baseball for six months and skate for six months." And skate he did. High school ice hockey is a big, big sport there and Chris was captain of his team his senior year. "I played hockey for eight-or-nine years as a defenseman," he said.

When it was time to move on to college, he selected Ohio State University "because of its great tradition. Being from the north, I didn't want to go south and play golf 12 months of the year. As soon as I saw Ohio State, I fell in love with everything about it."

The feeling was mutual. Chris went on to win 14 collegiate events, shattering the "victory" record of Jack Nicklaus. He was a first-team All-America choice for three years.

After he was graduated in 1984, he made his first attempt at the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall and he made it easily.

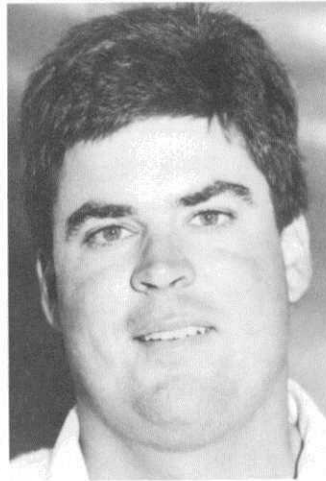
His first two years were successful ones in the development process of a young player as he earned exempt status as one of the leading 125 money winners.

He started slowly in 1987, but once he began to put his game together, he performed very well, indeed. During one stretch early in the summer, he had four top 10 finishes in six starts with one of them being a tie for second place in the Kemper Open.

He prefers to play the ball from right to left, "but I like to work it both ways. My iron game improved a lot during the year."

Oh, yes, his dad played a major role in his development as a young player. "Wed go to spring training with him and play the courses in Florida. He's still a good player and carries about a 4 handicap now, but I sure wouldn't give him two strokes a side."

Kenny Perry will always look at the 1987 Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational as the tournament that started him on the road to success.

"It was a turning point," he said of his tie for fourth place. "I was tied for the lead after three rounds (with Hal Sutton, Ken Brown and Dan Pohl). I played in the last group on Sunday and I shot a 69. It gave me a lot of confidence."

Paul Azinger had a final round of 64 and won the tournament, while Sutton finished second, Curtis Strange third and Kenny tied with Brown for fourth place. He earned \$55,000.

"I had to learn how to play in front of so many people," he went on. "It's hard to concentrate, but I learned how to go out and play my own game and not think about them. It isn't easy."

He went on to have a successful year, topping the century mark in earnings.

"My goal when I started the year was to make the top 125 money winners and be exempt," he said. "It was a realistic goal but I also wanted to win. Money is great but you also want to be one of the best and that means you have to win."

Kenny started to play golf when he was seven under the encouragement of his father. "Dad used to be a scratch golfer and he still is my biggest fan," Kenny said.

His first competition came when he was 11 and he went on to have a fine high school career — he won the 1978 Kentucky State High School Championship — and also played well while at Western Kentucky University.

Norman Head of Bowling Green, KY, who now is retired, has been Kenny's teacher since he was a freshman in college. "I really believe in his theories and owe a lot of my success to him."

"He stressed ball striking more than chipping and putting but he never lets you forget you have to work on all aspects of the game."

Kenny tried the TOUR Qualifying Tournament three times before he made it in the Fall of 1986.

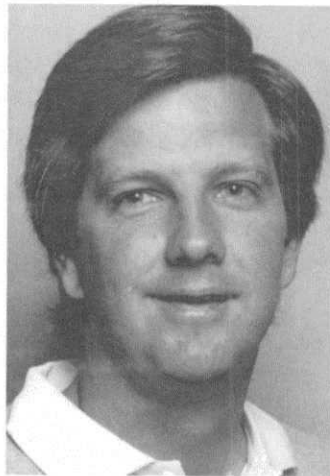
"The TOUR was what I expected in a lot of ways," he said, "but there is more travelling than I anticipated. It's tough being away from Sandy and the kids but I can see the hard work paying off."

He believes his driving is above average but his iron play is the strongest part of his game. "I usually hit from 13-to-15 greens a round," he said.

"The biggest change in my game is in the putting. I've learned to make more of the three-and-four footers when I have to make them. I always told my Dad that when I learn to putt, I'll make it on the TOUR. Now, I believe I have."

There can be no question about that. Kenny Perry has made it.

Mark Pfeil certainly has left his "mark" all around the PGA TOUR as one of the more personable people in the game. He has always been a welcomed addition to any tournament or special outing.

His biggest year financially was in 1984 when he collected \$101,878 and his three best finishes came in three important events—a tie for third in the Canadian Open, tie for fourth in the Colonial National Invitation and a tie for sixth in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational.

His only TOUR victory was in the 1980 Tallahassee Open. In 1983, he earned \$85,477 on the regular TOUR, plus \$36,000 for his victory in the Anderson-Pacific Classic in Sacramento, CA, on the Tournament Players Series.

He nearly won again in the 1983 Texas Open but Jim Colbert was too strong for everyone that week. Mark had back-to-back 63s for the middle two rounds and the 126 total represented the lowest 36 holes on TOUR that year. He finished in second place.

While 1985 was not as good financially as some of the others, he did pocket an extra \$20,000 for winning the Jerry Ford Invitational in Vail, CO, a special non-TOUR attraction.

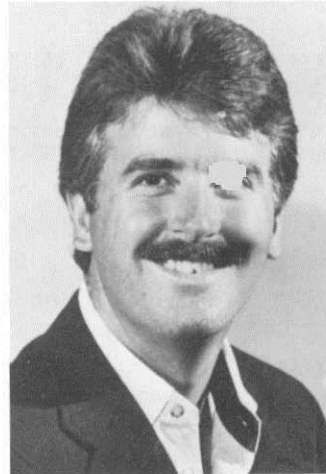
Mark was able to compile strong finishes in the 1986 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and also the Western Open, but last season was a frustrating one for him. Physical problems cut deeply into his effectiveness and, as a result, he labored to his poorest money finish in the past decade.

Pfeil comes from good golfing stock. Both of his parents are fine players and it was with them, at the Palos Verdes Country Club, that he first started to play the game at age 10. Over the years, Bud Oakley at the Palos Verdes Club has been his primary teacher.

Mark played little competitive golf as a junior, but at Palos Verdes High he made rapid progress and, in his junior year, won the California Interscholastic Federation title. After two years at El Camino Junior College, he moved on to Southern Cal where he achieved All-America honors twice. He captained the Trojans in 1974 and won such titles as the Pacific Coast Amateur twice and the Southern California Amateur.

He turned professional in 1974 and graduated from the Fall, 1975, Qualifying School. After earning less than \$500, he returned to the Q-School in Fall, 1976 and regained his card.

Dan Pohl waited a long time for last year to happen. He had been successful through his first seven full years on the PGA TOUR, but he had not been able to win.

In 1986, he won twice — in the Colonial National Invitation and the NEC World Series of Golf. He also finished second to Greg Norman in the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational. In those three events, he won \$358,200.

While victory eluded him in 1987, Pohl added another feather to his cap by making the Ryder Cup team and by winning the prestigious Vardon Trophy.

He earned a career high \$465,269 and also won the first EPSON stats All-Around title, indicative of the strength of his overall game.

"To have had a good year (1986) and come back with another one is very satisfying," said Pohl. "The Ryder Cup selection was a real honor; anytime you represent your country and your fellow players, it's a real thrill."

As for his length off the tee, Dan was the TOUR leader the first two years such statistics were kept. In his best year, he averaged 280.1 in 1981.

His zest for power made him an outstanding baseball hitter for Mt. Pleasant High in Michigan, although he was a pitcher. When he first started to play golf, he continued to swing viciously, but soon realized it also was important to keep the ball on the course, somewhere.

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves. He was so competitive, though, that he wanted to play everything.

He earned his TOUR card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing privileges.

With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the green on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them."

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

Don Pooley has been waiting for a year such as 1987 to come along. It was easily was his best season on TOUR with the victory in the Memorial Tournament serving as the highlight.

"It was my best year in a lot of ways," he said. "It was pleasing because I played well when I was in contention."

He also will be remembered for his million-dollar hole-in-one at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. The \$1 million was offered as a prize for an ace on the 17th hole during the final round.

Pooley used a 4 iron for the 192-yard shot and the ball hit the flagstick about two feet above the cup and dropped straight down. The Arnold Palmer Children's Hospital in Orlando received \$500,000. Don gets the other half — in monthly installments of \$2,083.33 for the next 20 years.

At the Memorial, Scott Hoch was on a tear, setting tournament records for three rounds, but Don stayed close with 67-65 the second and third days. When Scott faltered the last afternoon, Pooley claimed the victory with a two-under-par 70 for a 16-under-par 272.

It 1985, he won the coveted Vardon Trophy with a 70.36 scoring average for 97 rounds.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a faithful God.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendinitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on TOUR that year.

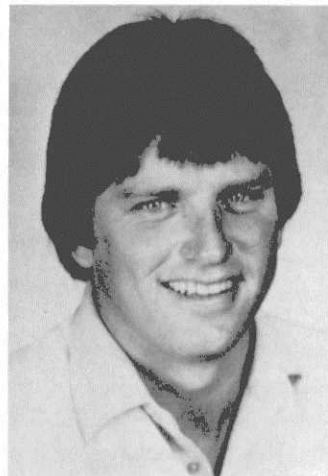
His first victory came at the B.C. Open in 1980. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, while Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card.

Nick Price was extremely impressed with everything he saw when he arrived at the Firestone Country Club for the 1983 World Series of Golf. He qualified as the leader on the South African Order of Merit.

As his first round started, he parred the first and second holes, but bogeyed the third and fourth, missing the greens in each case. "At that point, I was just trying to hold the round together."

What happened from that point on was, he not only held the round together, but he nearly put his entire golf career together.

Nick birdied the sixth hole that day, and then birdied five of the first seven holes on the second nine for a 36-30—66. He was in the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Bobby Clampett. And, that's where he stayed the rest of the week, winning by four strokes over Nicklaus with a 10-under par 270.

The victory was worth \$100,000, but more important, it gave him a 10-year exemption for all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events. Since he qualified for the World Series by virtue of his play on the South African Tour earlier in the year, his \$100,000 did not count in official earnings. Thus, his record only shows \$49,435 won in 1983.

He made a big jump on the money list two years ago when he had six top 10 finishes. He lost the Western Open in a playoff to Tom Kite. Fred Couples and David Frost also were involved.

In the third round of the 1986 Masters Tournament, he shot a course record 63 and eventually finished tied for fifth place.

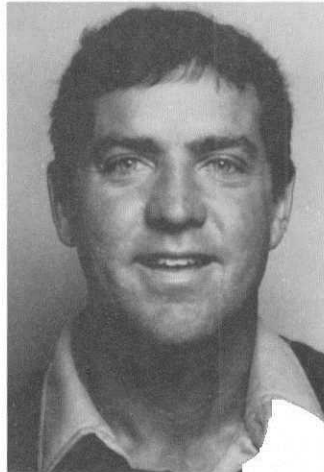
Last year, his tie for second in the Canadian Open was his best. He said, "My game is more consistent now and I really feel comfortable with the TOUR."

Nick started in the game as an eight-year old caddy for his brother in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). He progressed rapidly as a player, and by the time he was 17, he had an invitation to compete in the Junior World tournament at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. "Everyone said I should go," he recalls, "so my mother and brother paid my way. They figured that if I didn't do well, I would get competitive golf out of my system." He fooled them. He not only played well, but he won.

He played on the South Africa and the European Tour as an amateur in 1975, and then went into the Rhodesian Air Force for the next two years. He was out in time to play on the South African Tour as a professional in the Fall of 1977. The next year, he was second in the Dutch Open.

His greatest disappointment came at Royal Troon in Scotland in the 1982 British Open. He led by three strokes with six holes to play but dropped four shots on his way to the clubhouse, letting Tom Watson slip in with the victory.

Tom Purtzer will tell you that no matter what else he accomplishes in the game, it isn't likely to give the satisfaction he experienced when he won the 1984 Phoenix Open.

He has spent most of his life in the Phoenix area and through the final round at the Phoenix Country Club, there wasn't any doubt about who most of the thousands in the gallery wanted to win.

He won in rather spectacular fashion, too. On the par 5 18th hole, he put his second shot into a bunker on the right, but he played a brilliant explosion shot. The ball stopped about two feet from the cup. He made the putt for a birdie and a one-stroke victory over Corey Pavin.

It gave Tom a six-under-par 65 for the sunny afternoon and a total of 16-under-par 268.

He enjoyed his best money year in 1986 when he collected \$218,281, showing his usual consistency with 10 top 10 finishes. "I didn't do anything spectacular," he said. "I just didn't have too many dry spells."

While his earnings dropped off last year, he continued to be consistent, especially early in the season when he made the cut in his first 17 starts. His only top 10 finish, however, was a tie for ninth in the Tournament Players Championship.

One of the longest drivers on TOUR, he has averaged nearly 270 yards through each of the last seven seasons. Over the years, some of his finest performances have been on the more difficult courses.

His first victory was at Riviera, for example, in the 1977 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

Tom got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball when we were eight or nine."

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

It's not every rookie who is good enough or tough enough to win in his first year on TOUR, but Sam Randolph is not your average player either.

Randolph has been a dominating player since the Santa Barbara, CA, native took up the game at age eight. He won the 1981 Junior World title, the California State Amateur and then capped his amateur career by winning the 1985 U.S. Amateur Championship.

He continued that line of success in his rookie season on the PGA TOUR with a victory at the Bank of Boston Classic and earnings of \$180,378. He was consistent, too, making the cut in 18 of 24 starts with six top 25 finishes to his credit.

Randolph opened with rounds of 67-68 at Pleasant Valley CC in Sutton, MA, and then added a brilliant third round 64 to take the lead heading into the final round. He was awarded his first title when rain washed out efforts to play the fourth round. He collected \$90,000 and a two-year exemption on TOUR for his efforts.

"My goal this past year was to win and make over \$100,000," said Randolph. "Halfway through the year that seemed a little out of reach, but I just got hot at the right time."

His father is the club pro at LaCumbre CC in Santa Barbara and Sam took up the game on his own initiative saying, "My dad didn't force me, he encouraged me to play everything."

At age 14, Randolph began to get serious about the game and began to think about the possibility of playing on the TOUR. His brilliant junior record earned him a scholarship to USC where he earned second-team All-American honors as a frosh and then won three-straight first-team honors. He won 13 collegiate tournaments along the way.

Randolph left USC in 1986 and unlike many before him, he earned his card at his first PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament with rounds of 69-72-70-72-72-71—426 over the difficult Dunes Course at LaQuinta Hotel and the TPC at PGA West.

His success on the amateur ranks had another benefit for him; he was able to play in a few professional tournaments before joining the TOUR.

"I was lucky enough to be able to play in the Masters and the Open as an amateur, so I got to know a lot of guys before I came out on TOUR," said Randolph. "It was still tough, though; I improved as the year went along and I learned how to make cuts."

A solid striker of the ball, Randolph did indeed struggle in his first few months on TOUR, but a T4 at the USF&G Classic in New Orleans earned him \$20,667 and gave him the boost of confidence he needed to be a success in his rookie year.

"Winning makes everything look a little different to me now," said Randolph. "Now when I see my name on the leaderboard I'll try and climb it instead of wondering if I can."

There's no doubt that we're going to see Sam Randolph's name on the leaderboard many times in the years to come.

There was a tear in Mike Reid's eye as he proudly accepted the winner's check in the Seiko-Tucson Open on the TPC at StarPass course last October and for good reason.

Mike has been one of the TOUR's more consistent players for many years but as good as he was, he could not break through and win. So, as his 11th season was coming to a close, he played brilliantly and won by four strokes. His victory also was extremely popular with his peers. He easily enjoyed his best money year, winning \$365,334.

Mike enjoyed a treat in August of 1983 when he teamed with Bob Goalby for the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Park City, UT. This was a Senior PGA TOUR event, and the elder statesmen of the links were to choose a player from the regular TOUR.

Well, Mike and Bob teamed perfectly and they won by a stroke over the Billy Casper-Jim Nelford combination. While Mike collected \$99,135 in official money on the regular TOUR, he added another \$25,000 from the Shootout.

Two of the best weeks of his TOUR career came in September of 1985. He finished second in the B.C. Open, just one stroke in back of Joey Sindelar. He skipped the next two tournaments and then came back to tie Hal Sutton in the Southwest Golf Classic, only to see Sutton win it with a 30-foot birdie putt on the first extra hole. Nevertheless, he won \$75,600 in those two events.

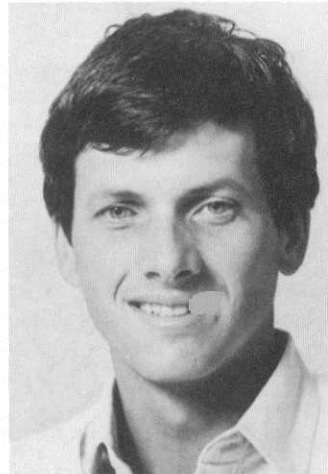
Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

His older brother, Bill, is head professional at the Tournament Players Club of Scottsdale, AZ, and has been Mike's biggest teacher. He also credits the John Geerstens, Senior and Junior, with assisting him.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Mike Brannan, Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his TOUR card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978 Pensacola Open. He lost in a playoff to Mac McLendon.

In December of 1979, he took a major step. He was married, and ever since, he has said that Randolyn has played an important role in his success.

Jack Renner has enjoyed success all through his golf career. One of the reasons is because he always has set lofty goals and then worked tirelessly to meet them.

In 1981, he was having what he considered his most consistent year on TOUR as he headed for the Pleasant Valley-Jimmy Fund Classic. "I told my Dad that unless I won, though, people would think I was having a mediocre year."

A few days later, he had his victory, the second of his nine-year career as he edged Scott Simpson by two strokes.

In the 1983 Hawaiian Open, he thought he had won for the third time on TOUR. He was one-stroke ahead of Isao Aoki of Japan as he sat in the scoring tent, checking his card. Aoki was in the left rough on the par five 18th hole, some 128 yards from the flagstick.

Then Jack heard the tremendous roar. "At first, I thought he must have hit it close and if he made the putt for a birdie, we would have a playoff." Instead, Aoki HOLED the pitching wedge shot for an eagle and the victory.

Jack had his reward in the Hawaiian Open the next year. He birdied four of the last seven holes—including the 18th—at the Waialae Country Club to tie Wayne Levi, and then won the title in a playoff. The next week, he was second in the Los Angeles Open and went on to his best money year, earning \$260,153.

He started on TOUR as a 20-year old and his first victory came in the 1977 Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic. His performances slipped slightly in 1980 after suffering mononucleosis early in the year. It was several months before he regained his full strength.

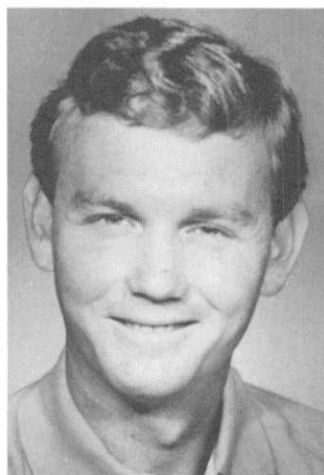
Jack is easily identified. Rail thin, he always wears a white cap, similar to the type Ben Hogan wore for years. However, Jack says he has always worn that style because it is lightweight, comfortable, and during his years of growing up around Palm Springs, "I needed something to protect my head from the sun."

As a youngster, he was the king of the junior tournaments in the San Diego area. He won such titles as the 1972 World Junior and the 1973 United States Junior. His short game always has been excellent, and he believes he refined it by playing so many par three courses as a youth.

During his school days, he chose not to play varsity golf because he felt he could progress more rapidly by working on his own game, rather than spending the time travelling to matches.

Larry Rinker started to play the game at the age of six when his brother, Laine, began taking him to junior golf clinics. Larry played in his first Florida State Junior tournament at the age of 12 and continued to play through high school and at the University of Florida.

While playing for the Gators, he won the 1978 Southeastern Conference championship and, upon graduation, was presented the Doug Beldon Award for athletic/academic excellence.

His last two seasons have been below expectations, but he did manage to turn in several strong performances. He indicated that he is trying to develop outside interests and they tended to distract slightly from his game.

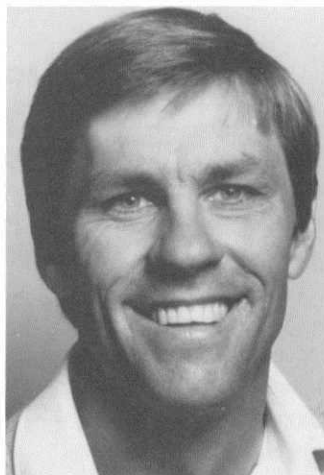
He would like to continue developing his role as an entertainer, singing and playing the guitar. He has played at a few TOUR events the last few years.

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on TOUR, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open in Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

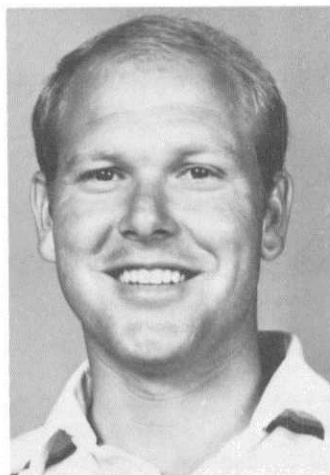
The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

Bill started to play at age nine in Montgomery, AL. The family moved to Texarkana, TX, shortly after that and Bill began to play competitive golf by the time he was 13. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkan, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything."

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa. "Dad retired as a colonel and he still is a good player. He played in a lot of major Air Force tournaments when he was in the service."

Clarence Rose has been making steady progress since he joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1981 and believes his higher level of patience has led to better course management.

The result is he has shown improvement in his game every year. He made a big jump on the money list in 1985, going over the \$100,000 mark for the first time and his upward trend has continued.

He enjoyed the first big week of his career at the 1985 Southern Open when he started with a 64 and added three more rounds in the 60s to finish in second place, just two strokes behind his good friend, Tim Simpson.

In 1986, he had the two finest weeks of his TOUR life when he posted 66-68 for the last two rounds of the Los Angeles Open to finish as the runner-up to Doug Tewell; and the next week he tied for second place in the Honda Classic just one stroke behind Kenny Knox.

He had the fourth runner-up finish of his career in April of 1987 in the Greater Greensboro Open. He was two strokes in back of Scott Simpson.

"My level keeps going up and up," he said. "I've been getting in contention more often and if I can keep knocking on the door, everything will be fine."

He has shown an ability to play the more difficult courses well. On the tough Glen Abbey course in the Canadian Open four years ago, he had a tie for fifth place which was his best finish until the Southern Open.

Regarding course management, he said, "I do try to go for birdies and I make a lot of them, but I'm also trying to cut back on my mistakes." He has had well over 300 birdies in each of the last five years. He's also one of the longer drivers on TOUR.

Clarence's father was a "very good golfer," and he started him at about age 12. "I played baseball all the time, but once I started into golf, that ended my days in baseball," he said.

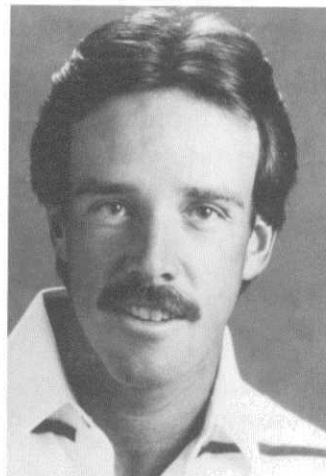
He won his first junior tournament at age 14, the North Carolina State Jaycees. He went on to win the North Carolina State Amateur, too.

He gained All-American status while at Clemson and in June of 1981, he entered the PGA TOUR School. He qualified easily, gaining a tie for fourth at Walt Disney World. "My last year at Clemson," he said, "I started to think about the possibility of being on the TOUR. I knew that's what I wanted, so I left school and spent about eight months just getting ready for it."

Until he started on TOUR, he played from right to left, but he changed his game over and now favors the fade.

Dave Rummells is probably on the PGA TOUR today because he grew up in the small Iowa town of West Branch.

How did that help?

"My hometown was too small to really sponsor any sports," recalled Rummells. "About the only thing to do in town was play golf since we had a nine-hole course."

His father introduced him to the game at age five, but it was really his childhood friends that helped teach him the game.

"We had about three or four guys who played together and we sort of taught one another how to play," said Rummells.

A golf scholarship sent him to the University of Iowa and after he graduated in 1981, he turned professional and headed south to Florida.

He failed in three attempts to gain his PGA TOUR card, but he played the mini-tours and continued to practice every day outside his mobile home.

"I bought a mobile home in Iowa and had a friend tow it down to Orlando," said Rummells. "I've got a big open field next to it where I can hit balls. That's why I moved there."

A good showing at the 1985 Qualifying Tournament earned Rummells his PGA TOUR card and he struck paydirt quickly finishing in a tie for ninth at the Hawaiian Open and cashed a check for over \$11,000.

A few weeks later he finished a strong tie for 10th at the Tournament Players Championship and picked up another \$21,600 and he was on his way. During the course of his week at the difficult TPC, Rummells equaled Tom Watson's course record when he posted six straight birdies during his second round en route to a seven-under-par 65.

He also collected a big paycheck at Las Vegas, but he suffered an injury during that event and was forced to take six weeks off after he completed the tournament.

"Las Vegas was the turning point in my year," said Rummells. "I was near the lead all week and it was great to see my name on the leaderboard. I also won enough that I felt like I was safe for next year. On the other hand, I got hurt there and had to take a lot of time off and I didn't really play very well after that."

He set a goal of winning at least \$100,000 in 1987 and he easily achieved it. "The year was really consistent," he said. "Since I saw most of the courses for a second time, I know when and when not to be aggressive."

Dave Rummells has certainly come a long way from that nine-hole course in West Branch, Iowa.

When Bill Sander joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1978, he thought "here we go. This is going to be fun."

He had won the U. S. Amateur Championship the summer before at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles. At age 19, he was one of the youngest in modern times to do so. The next year, he played on the Walker Cup and World Amateur Cup teams.

He did miss in his first attempt to obtain his TOUR card in the Fall of 1977 but made it easily the next Spring.

"My first tournament," he recalls vividly, "was the Western Open. I played beautifully and on the last day, I was paired with Andy Bean. Andy won the tournament and I won a nice check. I thought it was great.

"The next week in Milwaukee, I played well again and was one-under par after 36 holes but I was shocked to discover I had missed the cut. The next week, I shot a 69 in the Monday qualifier for the Quad Cities Open and didn't make it.

"That's when I said to myself, 'Welcome to the TOUR'."

The years that followed were not too kind to Bill. It wasn't until 1985 when he tied for fourth in the Canadian Open and tied for seventh in the St. Jude-Memphis Classic that he finally broke through and earned exempt status.

However, he continued to struggle. After falling to 151st on the money list in 1986, he returned to the Qualifying Tournament, made it, and went on to a good year in 1987 to become exempt again.

"I had a good start last year with two top 10s on the West Coast," he said. "I did well at Greensboro and Atlanta but for some reason, I started to fiddle with my swing and lost a lot of confidence."

Toward the end of the year, he reverted back to his old swing and the results were better. "It's improving," he said of his game, "but I need to become a more consistent ball striker, a better driver of the ball."

Bill started to play at age 13 when he was caddying at Inglewood Country Club in Seattle. In high school, he went from shooting in the high 70s as a sophomore to consistently breaking par as a junior. He won three straight Seattle City Amateur titles, the first as a 17-year old.

During his early years, Billy Derrickson, who was the head pro at Inglewood, helped him the most. When he came on TOUR, he started to listen to suggestions from everyone. It took him awhile to realize he had to play his own game.

When everything is going right, he prefers to play right to left. Iron play, plus chipping and putting, are the strongest parts of his game.

Quietly, Gene Sauers has been elevating himself into the position of being one of the better young players in the game.

The last couple of years, his name has appeared more frequently on the leaderboards of the PGA TOUR. He went all the way in the Fall of 1986 when he won the Bank of Boston Classic in a playoff over Blaine McCallister.

Interestingly enough, his best finish last year was in the same tournament and he tied for second behind Sam Randolph.

The one that got away last year was in his own backyard. He has lived all his life in Savannah, GA, and on nearby Hilton Head Island in the MCI-Heritage Classic, he was tied for the lead going into the final round. A third-day 64 put him in that position, but a 73 the last afternoon dropped him into a tie for third place.

He takes his successes in stride. "I'll go out again next year and play as if I don't have an exemption. My goal now is to win again."

Gene went through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1983. He was the youngest player on the circuit when he started in 1984, but during the early weeks of the season, he didn't get into many tournaments.

Once the three-time Georgia State Open champion got his chance to play consistently towards the end of the season, he made the most of his chances.

His steady play down the stretch was highlighted by a tie for fifth at Pensacola in the final event of the season. However, his \$36,537 left him about \$1,200 short of making the top 125 money winners and put him in a position of being well down on the priority rankings for 1985.

"It was frustrating not to make it in 1984, but it was my first year and I thought I did well," said Sauers. "I was a little disappointed, but I figured I was the youngest guy out here and I was doing pretty well. I knew I had played well at the end of the year."

The 1985 season started out in similar fashion as the former Georgia Southern star didn't get to play often in the early going. In mid-season, though, Sauers got his chance to play regularly and capitalized with a strong three-week stretch that saw him finish in a tie for 16th at Quad Cities, a tie for 4th at Buick and a tie for 11th at the B. C. Open. His check for \$18,000 at Buick was the largest of his career and propelled him into the top 125 money winners, a position he would not relinquish.

Gene started in the game at age nine when he would tag along with his father and brother out to the golf course on the weekends.

"They'd bring along an extra club and I'd hit it around," Sauers recalls. "My brother was a good golfer (played collegiately at Columbus College) and I'd go out to practice with him and beat balls around."

If there ever was an award given for perseverance, surely Tony Sills would be a prime candidate.

He attempted to qualify for the PGA TOUR six times before he made it at the Tournament Players Club in the Fall of 1982. Twice, he remembers vividly, he missed in the finals by two shots. "That just told me I wasn't ready," he says.

"All through those years," he continued, "I was living on a dream. Playing on the TOUR was something I knew I was going to do. Now, I know dreams do come true."

He made a huge jump up the money list in 1986 as he went over the \$200,000 figure for the first time. Consistency was the key and, at the end of the year, he played 15 straight tournaments without missing a cut.

Personal problems cut into his effectiveness early in 1987, but toward the end of the year, he was firing at the flagsticks again. His marriage to LeAnn McDaniel helped considerably.

Despite his successes, he makes it clear, "My goal is to win and then win again. I'm not out here just to make checks. I'm here to win."

His first exposure to the game was as a five-year old. "My father started to play for health reasons. The doctor encouraged him because of the exercise he needed, so I started to follow him around."

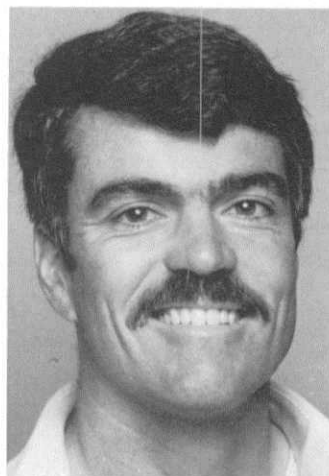
During those years when he was attempting to get on the TOUR, he said, "I had a lot of different jobs. I stayed at home with my parents to keep expenses down, but I did everything from delivering pizzas to grinding clubs in Jerry Barber's golf factory."

"I even worked for a beer distributor, but my best job was at the Los Angeles Country Club. I worked part time on the driving range, so that I could have a half day to practice. During those years, I lived on practically nothing money-wise. I was determined to see this thing through."

He has had to overcome serious physical problems even to play the game, so serious, in fact, that many others would have turned and gone in another direction.

When he is playing well, he prefers a slight draw. "I'm not long off the tee," he said, "but I've always been pretty accurate. My putting needs to improve and it has improved."

Scott Simpson has been a strong, steady player for many years so it wasn't surprising to those who follow the game closely that he could win the grandest prize of them all—the U.S. Open Championship.

He did it last year at the Olympic Club in San Francisco, winning by one stroke over Tom Watson. He did it with a brilliant final nine holes as he registered three birdies and saved par on three other occasions with splendid recovery shots.

His birdies came in succession, starting at the 14th hole where he hit a seven iron to four feet and made the putt. Then he made putts of 30 feet at the 15th and 15 feet at the 16th. He finished the day with a 2-under-par 68 and a total of 3-under-par 277.

"I feel overwhelmed that I could win a tournament such as the U.S. Open," he said. "This totally is a dream come true for me."

Earlier in the year, he braved the wind and cold to win the Greater Greensboro Open. By season's end, he had earned \$621,032 and was ranked fourth. He had 10 top 10 finishes in 25 official starts.

His first victory on TOUR was in the 1980 Western Open and he admitted it came as something of a surprise. He took the lead after the second round and finished with all four rounds at par or less. He also won the 1984 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic, thanks to a 6-under-par 65 the final afternoon.

Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the TOUR's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the Fall of 1978.

There may never be another week on the PGA TOUR for Tim Simpson to compare with the one he experienced during the 1985 Southern Open. It was the week when he took the final step and won his first tournament after eight years of trying.

Tim has always had the talent to succeed—and he has been successful—but if there was any one thing that kept him from the winner's circle, it probably was his putting.

A keen student of psychology, he has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. It was Rotella who told him, "from my observations and from what I've heard from others, the one missing link in your game now is your putting." He stressed the need for Tim to relax more. "You get over the ball," he said, "and you grind on every one. You're too intense."

During the week of the Southern Open at the Green Island Country Club, the hard work and dedication paid off. In fact, after he shot 12-under-par 64-64—128 the first two days, he said, "In the 22 years I've been playing golf, I've never hit the ball better. I haven't missed a shot in two days."

He held the Southern Open lead through the third and fourth rounds, holding off the challenge of Clarence Rose.

He nearly won the Southern again last year. He tied for second place with a splendid 66 the final afternoon. His most impressive performance of the year came in the Tournament Players Championship. A third-round 66 helped him to a solo third place.

Tim's father, Jack, started him in the game as a seven-year old and he went on to win junior championships of Atlanta and Georgia. "I owe a lot to my father," he said. "He worked hard so I could afford to play and he has always stood behind me. He has been the guiding force in my life."

Another who helped to mold his game is Art Kraft Jr., the pro at the Ansley Country Club in Atlanta. "I've been working with Art since I was 15-years old," Tim said.

Tim went on to the University of Georgia and earned all-Southeastern Conference and All-America honors. He won the Southern Amateur in 1976. In the Spring of 1977, he earned his player's card.

Those who know Tim also know there are three other people who have helped turn his career around — his wife, Kathy, son Christopher and daughter Katie. "They gave purpose to my life," he said.

When he talks of his golf game and his goals, he always says, "we." He'll tell you, "We talked it over and decided . . ." The other party in the "we" is his father, the man who first put a club in Joey's hands when he was six-years old.

"My Dad always stressed that if anything is worth doing, it's worth doing right. He's always been behind everything I've done.

Through high school, Joey knew that if he was going to go to college, it would have to be on a scholarship, so he worked extra hard on his golf game. There were offers, but he decided on Ohio State because "I had met a few of their players when I would go to amateur tournaments, and they were really nice to me.

"The fact that Jack Nicklaus, Tom Weiskopf and Ed Sneed had played for Ohio State helped to influence me, too," he added with a smile.

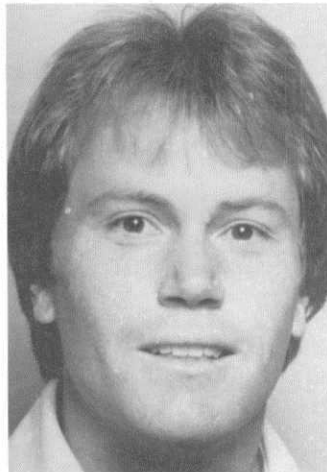
He was devastating for the Buckeyes. He won 10 collegiate events and in 1981, he won the Big Ten championship by 12 strokes. He was named Ohio State's Athlete-of-the-Year in 1981.

Along the way, he managed to sweep the New York State titles — Junior, Amateur and Open championships.

The PGA TOUR was his goal, though, and he made it through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1983, finishing in a tie for third.

His first win came at the Greater Greensboro Open when he holed an eight-foot par-saving putt on the 72nd hole to win by one and then later in the year he won again at the B. C. Open edging Mike Reid for the title in front of his hometown fans.

He didn't win in 1987, but Jeff Sluman earned world-wide acclaim as a tough player with a bright future with his playoff loss to Sandy Lyle at the Tournament Players Championship.

The heartbreaking three-hole sudden death loss didn't slow down the 30-year old New Yorker as he earned \$335,590 and posted six top ten finishes along the way.

"I had a very good year and I'm very happy with the way I played," said Sluman.

When introduced to the game of golf at an early age, he had no goals or aspirations to be a professional golfer. In fact, he didn't decide to become professional until much later in his life.

Started in the game by his family at age four, Sluman didn't even think about turning pro until after his senior year at Florida State University. After a solid collegiate career that saw him win the Metro Conference title, Sluman opted for a career in golf.

"I didn't really decide to turn pro until I graduated from Florida State," remembered Sluman. "I had played well at FSU and had qualified for the U.S. Open as an amateur, so I decided to give it a try. I didn't want to be 35 and wonder what if, so I turned pro."

Sluman turned professional in 1980 and in the Fall of 1982 he earned his PGA TOUR card. However, he won only \$13,643 in 1983 and finished 171st on the money list and lost his playing privileges.

After sitting out the 1984 season, Sluman returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984 and posted rounds of 74-74-69-70-74-72—433 to finish 23rd and regain his player's card.

The start of the 1985 season was a slow one for the Rochester, NY, native, but at the Greater Greensboro Open, his fortunes changed. He led the field through 36-holes and eventually finished in a tie for fifth picking up the largest check of his career, \$13,560.

Approximately one month later, Sluman demolished the Killbuck G&CC course to win the Tallahassee Open on the Tournament Players Series with a score of 19-under par 269. During that tournament he fired three rounds of 65 and beat Gary Player and former FSU teammate Kenny Knox by one stroke.

Sluman went on in 1985 to have several other strong finishes including a T5 at the South-west Golf Classic and a T7 at the Kemper Open and easily kept his playing card by winning \$100,523 and finishing 78th on the 1985 Official Money List.

In 1986, Sluman again topped the \$100,000 mark while picking up six top ten finishes. A frequent name on the leaderboard, Sluman is gradually becoming one of the game's best young players.

J. C. Snead may remember it as the most satisfying week of his fine career. It was the week of the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and, at age 46, he won it in a playoff over Seve Ballesteros. It was his eighth victory since starting on the TOUR in the Fall of 1968, but it also was his first since he won the 1981 Southern Open in a playoff over Mike Sullivan.

J. C. moved in contention at Westchester with a six-under par 65 the third day and it put him three strokes in back of Mike Reid.

The last afternoon, he fashioned a one-under-par 70 for an eight-under-par 276, while Seve's 72 left him with the same score.

"I birdied the last two holes," J. C. said, "and Seve came along behind me and did the same thing."

On the first extra hole, Ballesteros drove the ball behind a pine tree and that was the start of his problems, while J. C. routinely parred it for a victory.

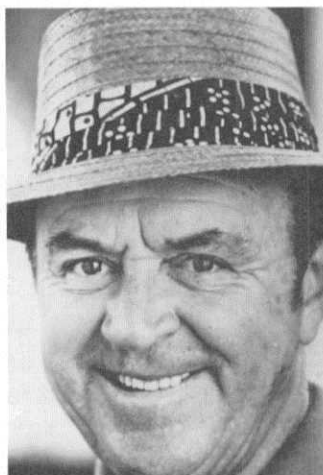
Those who know J. C. well, know him as a fellow with a great sense of humor and a heart as big as all-outdoors. However, with a touch of brusqueness and a sly smile, he'll deny it all.

He has a wonderful sense of humor. Several years ago, he decided he wanted to go by his full name, Jesse Carlyle. After a few weeks of not playing well, he informed everyone he was going back to using J. C. because "Jesse Carlyle hasn't been playing worth a damn."

Jesse Carlyle, although constantly mentioned as the nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, stands on his own performance record. He was a superb athlete in other sports while growing up in Hot Springs, and at one time, sought a career in baseball. He was in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a career in 1964.

He worked for a couple of years as an assistant pro at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, NY, before obtaining his TOUR card. He burst into prominence in 1971 by winning twice in a three-week period at Tucson and Doral immediately before and after the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, FL.

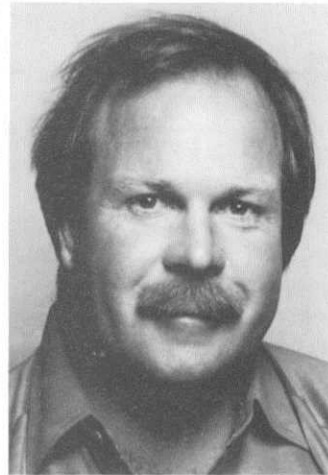

Whatever Craig Stadler accomplishes during the rest of his career, his followers will fondly remember 1982. It was the year he broke away from the field and went from being a good player to a superstar.

He won four times, starting the year by capturing the first event, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He won two of the year's more significant events, the Masters Tournament in a playoff over Dan Pohl and the World Series of Golf in a playoff over Raymond Floyd. His other victory was in the Kemper Open by an impressive seven strokes.

He won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner, as he earned \$446,462. Until 1985, only Tom Watson and Mark O'Meara had won more in a single season. He said there were two keys to his improved play. First, he drove the ball better than ever, and he putted much better.

In 1985, he led the Bob Hope Classic through the third and fourth rounds but Lanny Wadkins tied him the last afternoon with a 65 and then Lanny won the playoff with a birdie on the fifth extra hole. He also finished second in the Hawaiian Open. It's interesting to note that he was 47-under par in the Hope and Hawaiian tournaments, yet finished second twice.

One of these years, he figures to win the Hawaiian Open. Last year he tied the course record with a 62 in the third round to take the lead, but Corey Pavin shot a 64 the last afternoon to tie him and then Corey won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole.

Although he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1976, he didn't get his first victory until the Bob Hope Desert Classic in January of 1980. Later in the year, he added the Greater Greensboro Open title to his laurels.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U. S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team.

Craig first played the game at age five with the assistance of his father and really became interested at age "eight or nine."

There should be a place in the history book of golf for what Payne Stewart did after he won the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic in March of 1987.

To the surprise of everyone, he donated his entire check of \$108,000 to the Florida Hospital Golden Circle of Friends Home "in memory of my father," William Louis Stewart, who died of cancer two years previous to the day.

"I had set a goal of winning," he said, "and I wanted to do something special in my father's name. He was the man who helped me more than anyone else to play this game."

It was a long time between victories although few people knocked at the door more often. He won the 1982 Quad Cities Open and then the 1983 Walt Disney World Classic, but nothing else until Bay Hill. Interestingly enough, his home is on the Bay Hill course.

Two years ago, for example, Payne had 16 top 10 finishes in 29 starts and earned \$535,389. That's the most ever collected by a player without a victory.

In his pastel plus-fours, socks and cap, Payne certainly has become the most colorful dresser on TOUR. It has reached the point where people now ask him what he is going to wear each day.

Payne's golfing career progressed in an orderly fashion through junior programs, high school and finally to a golf scholarship at Southern Methodist University. While there, Payne won several collegiate events, including the 1979 co-championship of the Southwest Conference. Quite simply, he was on a roll when he finished school, and he felt confident he was ready to conquer the PGA TOUR.

As so many others before him, Payne failed at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979.

A two-year stint in Asia (1980-81) proved to be just what the doctor ordered.

With victories in the 1981 Indian and Indonesian Opens under his belt, plus his marriage to Tracey Ferguson, an Australian girl he met while in Malaysia, Payne returned to the U. S. to attend the 1981 Spring Q School. This time he was successful, and it was off to the "main event."

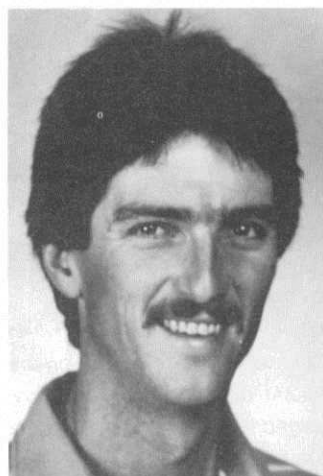

When you read through the biographies of the players on the PGA TOUR most look remarkably similar in one regard, they all played a lot of amateur and intercollegiate golf.

Occasionally, though, a player comes along who has a completely different background and one such refreshing change from that pattern is Canadian native Ray Stewart.

Stewart has a bit of Larry Nelson or Calvin Peete in him in that he didn't get serious about golf until he was in his 20's and he's not ever sure that his University of British Columbia even has a golf team.

"I really didn't begin playing at all until I was 16 or 17 and I didn't get serious about golf until I was 23," said the personable Stewart. "I finally bought a full-set of clubs at 23, drove into Vancouver and saw sand traps on golf courses and thought this game is kind of neat."

Largely self taught, Stewart picked up the game from reading golf magazines and says, "ask me about any tip ever written, I've probably read it."

Finally, at age 26, Stewart played in his first tournament in British Columbia and decided that the PGA TOUR might be a great way to make a living. He earned his card in 1983, but won only \$7,577 and lost his playing privileges.

Undaunted, Stewart played on the Asian circuit for four years and the European circuit for another year before regaining his TOUR card in the 1986 Q-School. The time spent overseas was definitely a positive step in his development.

"I've been everywhere playing this game," said Stewart. "Asia was such a big help character-wise—if you can travel over there you can handle anything. It really taught me a lot about patience."

For the first two-thirds of 1987, patience was a virtue he needed as he had won only about \$16,000, but a T10 at the Provident Classic gave him a confidence boost and then two weeks later at the Bank of Boston Classic he turned his career around in three short days.

He opened at Pleasant Valley with a fine 65, but a second round 73 left him well back of the lead. However, he used two eagles to post another 65 in the third round and when Sunday's finale was washed out due to rain, Stewart found himself tied for second and he collected \$37,333.

He then finished out the year in good fashion and eventually ended the 1987 season in the 124th spot on the money list, with \$72,136.

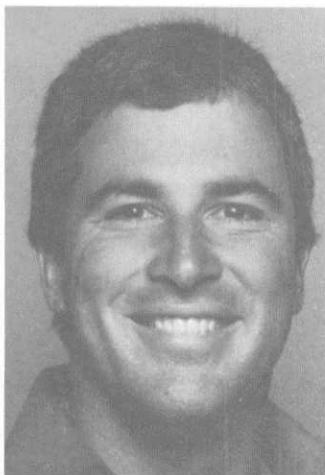
"My whole future looks great," said Stewart after the season. "Once you get into the Top 125 it seems like it's harder to get knocked out than it was to get in. I'll be able to play a lot more relaxed and aggressively in 1988."

His late start in the game has one other benefit, too, he's not tired of competitive golf.

"I'm a lot more enthusiastic than most of the 25 or 26 year olds because I didn't get serious until so late," said the 34-year-old Stewart. "Of course, if I could do it differently I'd like to be a rich, burned out 24 year old."

Now that he's made that all important breakthrough, don't be surprised at what Ray Stewart may do in the future.

Curtis Strange has established himself as one of the finest players in the game today and certainly seems on the verge of true greatness. He has all the necessary ingredients to reach such lofty status.

During the last three campaigns, he won seven times on the PGA TOUR and twice set money-winning records. He won three times in 1985 and added three more last year while sandwiching in a lone victory in 1986.

When he collected a \$542,321 in 1985, it broke the mark set by Tom Watson in 1980. Greg Norman came along to pass Curtis in 1986, but last year, he won the Arnold Palmer award for a second time with a record \$925,941.

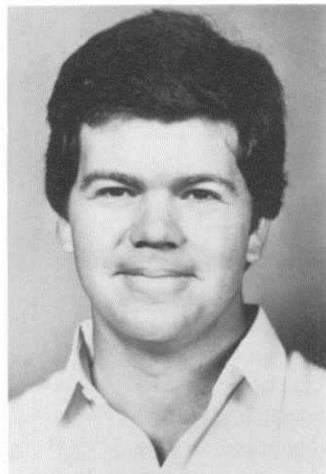
His three victories came in a span of five starts—Canadian Open, Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis and NEC World Series of Golf. With the latter also came a 10-year exemption to all TOUR co-sponsored events.

In 1982, Curtis set a TOUR record for the most money won in a calendar year without a victory. He earned \$263,378. In one stretch late in the season, he finished fourth or better five straight weeks.

Curtis has been a winner in the game for most of his life, starting back in his days as a junior golfer in Virginia. He started to play at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va.

His father passed away when Curtis was 14, and then, as Curtis explained, "Chandler Harper, the Hall of Famer, became my teacher." His first taste of success came when he won the Virginia State Junior at age 15 and he won his first important title in 1973, the Southeastern Amateur. However, he said his biggest thrill came when he won the 1975 Eastern Amateur. "My father won the very first Eastern in 1957, so that had special meaning to me."

Mike Sullivan is one of those fellows with considerable potential and when he has been physically ready to go, he has played some marvelous golf. He has had some problems with his back and that doesn't help his big, powerful swing.

His only TOUR victory came in the 1980 Southern Open at Columbus, GA. A second-round 63 gave him the lead he never relinquished and he won by five strokes. The next week, he nearly did it again, finally finishing in a tie for second at the Pensacola Open.

In 1981, he almost made it two Southern titles in a row, as a last-day 64 placed him in a tie with J. C. Snead but Snead won it in a playoff on the second extra hole. He won nearly a quarter-of-a-million dollars in those two years.

Another victory came his way in 1984 when he teamed with Don January to win the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Utah on the Senior PGA TOUR. "I went to the University of Florida with Don's son Tim, and that's when I first met him."

Two years ago, the sun was shining on the big, friendly fellow. He won more than \$150,000 and only missed three cuts in 25 starts. During one stretch, he made 12 in a row.

His back simply would not let him perform up to his expectations in 1985 and it was the same story last year. He was off to a good start and then hurt his back at the Tournament Players Championship. He was off the TOUR for six weeks.

His fastest start was in 1980 when he opened the season like a superstar. He tied for second in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and finished third the next week in the Phoenix Open, earning \$44,600 for those two splendid efforts. He had won, in those two outings, more than he had won in any full season prior to that. Three weeks later, Mike suffered severe back muscle spasms and was off the TOUR for five weeks.

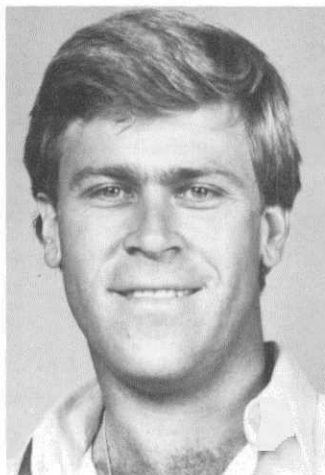
Mike played a lot of golf with his father when he was a youngster. "He was a scratch amateur, and taught me everything in those days."

Living in Ocala, Fla., his father took him to see the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, and the old Greater Jacksonville Open. He went to the University of Florida briefly—and had Andy Bean for a roommate—but he wanted to play golf, and not go to school.

He missed twice in attempting to qualify for the TOUR, but made it in the Fall of 1976.

His first brush with victory came in the 1978 Buick Open when he tied with Jack Newton of Australia but lost the playoff.

Hal Sutton keeps searching for ways to get better but true to the mark of a great competitor, he says he isn't as good as he knows he can be and expects to be.

His first victory was in his rookie season of 1982. He won twice in 1983, added two more in 1985 and was a double winner again in 1986. During the "non-win" years, he knocked at the door constantly, but something always seemed to happen to keep him out.

Last year, a superb final round of 64 at the new TPC of Scottsdale nearly was good enough to catch Paul Azinger, but the Zinger held on to win his first.

In early May, at the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational, Hal was closing in on victory again, but Azinger came roaring from out of the pack, made eagle at the final hole with a long, long putt, and won by a stroke over Hal. He also was second to Mike Reid in the Seiko-Tucson Open.

His greatest season had to be 1983. He won the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA Championship and went on to be the No. 1 money winner with \$426,668.

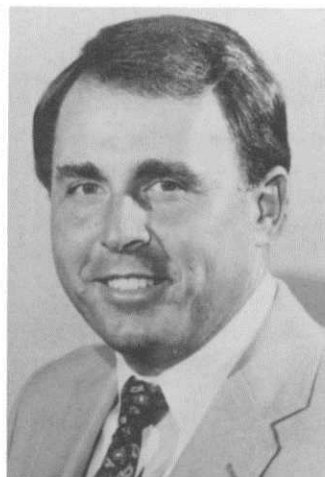
Although his father did not play the game, Hal said he always was the "moving force behind me." A friend of his father's sent him a set of clubs when he was 11, and that was the start. "I played some team sports, but it was discouraging because I never seemed to be on a good team. I decided I wanted to win or lose on my own ability and that's why I chose golf."

As a 12- and 13-year old, he would take his father's cart and "sometimes play 72 holes a day." He said he only had mediocre success until his junior year at Centenary College, although he did win the Louisiana State Junior title in 1974.

Hal won the 1980 U. S. Amateur at the Country Club of North Carolina and was named Golf Magazine College Player of the Year, also in 1980. At the time, there was talk that he might forever remain an amateur.

"I went to work for my Dad and would go as long as a month without playing at all," he said. "When I did try to play, I didn't have any feel. I had put so much into the game to that point, I felt it was senseless to give it all up. I could always go back into business, but in later years, I couldn't go back to the game at the level I wanted. So I decided to turn professional and go on TOUR."

There were many memorable accomplishments on the PGA TOUR in 1986 and Doug Tewell's performance in the Los Angeles Open has to rank with the best of them.

Playing the great Riviera Country Club course, Doug shot rounds of 66 and 63 the last two days and won by seven strokes over Clarence Rose. He took the lead the third day when he birdied the first six holes and then set sail for the victory.

He went on to have the finest year of his career by far, winning well over \$300,000. He had 10 top 10 finishes.

Last year, he saved his best until near the end. After taking a month off the TOUR, he went to the Pensacola Open. It was close until the final nine holes, then he ran away from the field and eventually won by four strokes.

Doug said he "will remember forever" his first round in the 1985 PGA Championship at Cherry Hills Country Club. He shot a course record 64 and went on to a respectable tie for 12th place.

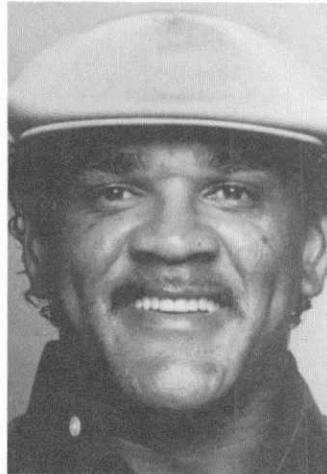
Unfortunately, he occasionally is bothered by a bad back. He said it's a "herniated disc."

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won twice, in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff over Jerry Pate; and in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. In the latter event, he was 10-strokes behind after two rounds but closed brilliantly with 65-67 to win by one over Tom Kite.

Doug started to play golf at about age 12 and his first teacher was Labron Harris, Sr. at the Lakeside club in Stillwater, Okla. The Tewell family had a membership there.

After being graduated from Oklahoma State University, he worked as an assistant professional for two years and then moved on as head pro at the Pinetop Country Club in Pinetop, Ariz. Jim Thorpe may be in the record book for a long time as the last player to win back-to-back match play championships.

He capped a brilliant 1985 season by defeating Jack Renner in the final of the Seiko-Tucson Match Play event and he followed with a repeat victory in Tucson in 1986 when he defeated Scott Simpson. Each victory was worth \$150,000.

Tucson was a stroke-play event last year but Jim had to miss it. He underwent an operation on his left thumb joint on September 30. The hand bothered him all year and he simply could not perform up to normal standards. The doctors told him he had a slight fracture.

Three years ago, Jim even went beyond his own dreams as he compiled an outstanding record. He won twice, in the Greater Milwaukee Open when he outdueled Jack Nicklaus down the stretch and then in Tucson.

He nearly won for a third time. In the Western Open, he came from behind the last afternoon to tie amateur Scott Verplank. Unfortunately for Jim, Verplank won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole.

He is the ninth of 12 children. He grew up in a large home off the second fairway at the Roxboro (NC) Golf Club where his father, Elvert, was the greens superintendent. He says with a laugh, "We used to go out after dark and hit shots by the back porch light."

Jim was quite a football player in high school and earned a scholarship to Morgan State. He was a running back, and a powerful one at that, but after a year, he abandoned the sport and then left school after two years to devote more time to golf.

"There were five boys in the family," Jim says, "and my father was the one who started me playing golf, but in those days, I would rather play football. My brother, Chuck, was the best go fer in the family."

Chuck was on the PGA TOUR in the early 1970s and it was Chuck who gave Jim some sound advice regarding the TOUR. "I couldn't hit my long irons very well, so one day Chuck said we should go to Pinehurst and he would help me with my game. We played and practiced and played some more. Finally, one day, Chuck said, 'You're ready.'"

Jim obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1975, but he only won \$2,000, the next year, so he went home again. In the Fall of 1978, he was back in the School, this time better prepared, and was co-medalist with John Fought in the Q-School. Early the next year, he let everyone know he was indeed ready, as he tied with Tom Watson for second place in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, two strokes behind Bruce Lietzke.

It would take a book this size to tell the Lee Trevino story but, briefly enough, he already has left his mark as one of the great players and personalities in the history of golf.

He has won 27 times on the TOUR. As entertaining as he has been on the golf course for the last two decades, he now has developed into one of the leading golf analysts as he sits in the booth for NBC telecasts.

When Lee won his second PGA crown in 1984, it was one of the outstanding sports stories of the year. At age 44, he outlasted Gary Player and Lanny Wadkins at Shoal Creek, AL, by shooting all four rounds in the 60's.

Three years ago at Cherry Hills, CO, when he was defending his title, he came within two strokes of winning again. He shot a four-under-par 280, but his good friend Hubert Green won it with a 278 score. The last man to win back-to-back PGAs was Denny Shute in 1936 and 1937.

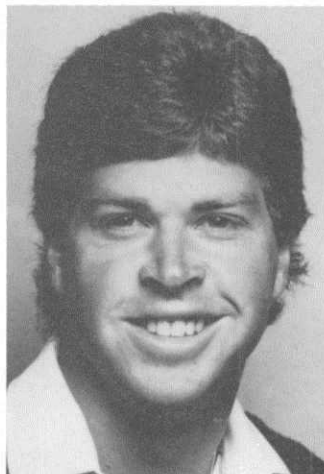
Until he won the 1984 PGA, Trevino had gone three-and-a-half years without a victory. His problem had been his back. He suffered with pain, sometimes severe, but never complained publicly. He always maintained his "Merry Mex" attitude. Some believe his problems originated when he was struck by lightning at the 1975 Western Open. In November of 1976, he underwent an operation for a herniated disc.

Lee's greatest year on TOUR was 1980 when he collected three titles, \$385,814, and won his fifth Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.73 for 82 rounds. His average was the lowest on TOUR since Sam Snead's 69.23 in 1950.

Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco. A year later at Baltusrol, he placed sixth in the U. S. Open, and was on the TOUR to stay. Twelve months later, he was entertaining everyone at the marguerita party at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open.

Lee won the U. S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff at Merion, and in a span of five weeks that summer he added the Canadian and British Open titles to his fast growing collection. He was named "Player of the Year" practically by acclamation.

It was a year to remember for Bob Tway but after the talent he displayed in a magnificent 1986 season, he could go on to have many more. He certainly is one of the more skilled players to come along in several years.

He was the TOUR's leading winner with four victories. He highlighted the season by dramatically holing a bunker shot on the final hole to win the PGA Championship after a tense duel with Greg Norman.

He went on to be named the PGA Player-of-the-Year. He finished as the No. 2 money winner with \$652,780 and remarkably, was only \$516 behind Norman. However, he added another \$500,000 to his account at the end of the season as the winner of the inaugural season-long Vantage Cup competition.

He broke through for the first time in the 1986 Shearson Lehman Brothers-Andy Williams Open. Due to weather, only 54 holes were played and Bob found himself tied with Bernhard Langer but he went on to win with a par on the second extra hole.

A second-round 63 set the stage for his triumph in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and he passed Hal Sutton the last afternoon in the Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic with a closing 64.

During his years at Oklahoma State University, Bob earned All-American status three times. He won the 1981 Fred Haskins award as the outstanding college-player-of-the-year.

Working under the watchful eye of Mike Holder, the golf coach at OSU, his game matured rapidly. However, it seemed he could play well until it came time to tee it up in the Qualifying School. The first three times he tried to get through it, he missed.

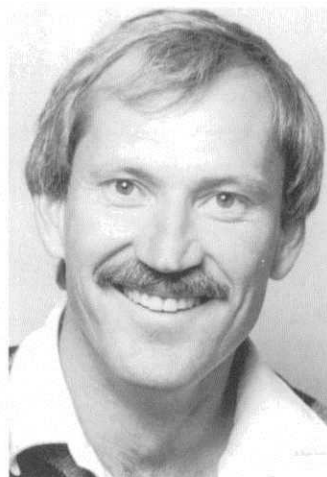
Bob started to play golf at age five. "I'd follow my grandfather and father around the course," he said. He was "about seven" when he played in his first junior tournament.

The family moved to Marietta, GA, when he was a youngster and Bob played basketball during his first two years in high school. Golf was his game, though.

"When I was growing up, I patterned my swing after Tom Weiskopf's. He was a great one and since we have about the same build, I copied his as best I could."

He prefers to play right to left and over the years he has been considered an excellent striker of the ball. His putting also has come along to be a strong part of his game.

Howard Twitty is pleased with his progress the last couple of years saying "my game isn't where I want it to be but it's much better than it was for a few years. It's just taken a lot of hard work on my swing and my putting."

He put together his two best years since 1979 and 1980. He had five top 10 finishes in 1986 and last year was highlighted by a tie for second place in the Kemper Open.

He knows, though, he may never again play the game as well as he did in a stretch of 3½ tournaments in mid-summer of 1980. He went through 14 rounds with 13 of them being in the 60's and was 57-under-par.

One of those weeks ended in a victory, as he defeated Jim Simons on the sixth extra hole in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the others, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, fifth in the Quad Cities Open, and, after the victory, he started 64-66 in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic but then the bubble burst.

Howard's first TOUR victory came the year before in the B. C. Open when he outplayed two close friends, Tom Purtzer and Doug Tewell on the 72nd hole. They were tied through 71, but Howard managed a par on the home hole and that gave him the victory.

One of the biggest men on the TOUR at six-feet-five, 200 pounds, he once was asked why he didn't concentrate on football. With a grin, he replied "I like to keep my blood in my body."

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at an early age. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6'3" when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed."

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when he was a senior, he finished right behind the co-champions of the NCAA championship, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite from the University of Texas.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and twice failed in the PGA TOUR Qualifying School before meeting success in June, 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

Bobby Wadkins is now in his 14th year on the PGA TOUR and it is interesting to see how vastly improved his game has become during the last two seasons or so.

He has won more than a half-million dollars in the last two years and has accumulated numerous top 10 finishes.

"Hopefully, I'm a late bloomer," he said smiling, "and my best years are still to come. If I keep knocking on the door, I'll win."

Strangely enough, as well as he has played, he is winless on the TOUR, although he has lost twice in playoffs and has been a winner overseas.

In 1985, he lost the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff to Bernhard Langer. In 1979, he lost a playoff in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic to Lou Graham after Graham came from six-strokes behind with a 64 on the last afternoon to catch him.

Overseas, he won the 1978 European Open and has won the 1979 and 1986 Dunlop Phoenix event in Japan.

Bobby is approximately 20-months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and now during his years on the TOUR, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

Through the years, Bobby and Lanny have worked on their games together, but a couple of years ago, Bobby went to Peter Kostis for extra help. The results have been dramatic. For example, in three years, he has knocked nearly a stroke-and-a-half off of his scoring average.

After high school—where he also was a standout basketball player—Bobby headed for the University of Houston and his two closest friends there—and now—were Bill Rogers and Bruce Lietzke.

After one year, though, he transferred to East Tennessee State and earned All-American status in 1972 and 1973.

He earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1974.

Lanny Wadkins has compiled such a brilliant record during his years on the PGA TOUR that it is difficult to single out his greatest achievements. Chances are, he will tell you one of his greatest moments came in the fall of 1985 when he was acclaimed as the PGA Player-of-the-Year.

He earned the honor by winning three times and finishing second on the money list with \$446,893, and second in scoring average with a 70.44 mark.

Last year, he established a personal money record with a victory in the Doral-Ryder Open highlighting the season. He also lost the PGA Championship in a playoff to Larry Nelson. And, Penny presented him with a son, Travis, on August 25.

Lanny's approach to the game is quite simple, really. He attacks the course constantly. "I get a big kick out of playing that way," he says. "You know, going for the green in two on a par five when the second shot is over water, but I never take a chance if it's a bad risk."

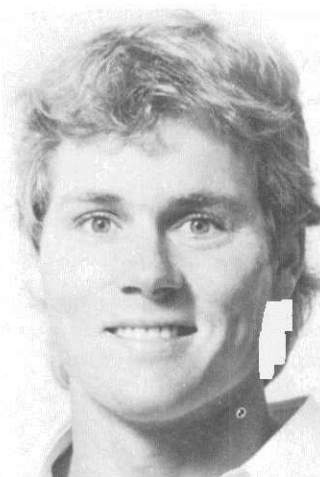
While others must look for the safe way home, Lanny can be bold because he has the shots, possibly more shots than anyone in the game. With a grin, he says, "Some people don't know I have those shots. They see me lashing away but don't understand what I'm doing. I'm always working the ball. Every shot is calculated."

When he is on his game—which is most of the time in recent years—there isn't a more feared competitor on the TOUR. That's why he has been able to win some big ones on the most demanding courses.

For example, he won the 1977 PGA Championship in a playoff over Gene Littler at Pebble Beach; and later that summer, won the World Series of Golf in a marvelous performance on the tough Firestone South course.

Two years later, when weather conditions bordered on the unplayable, with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass with a five-under par total of 283—five better than runner-up Tom Watson.

It is hard to imagine how anyone could have been happier than Fred Wadsworth was one evening in early October of 1986 when he became the winner of the \$350,000 Southern Open golf tournament.

"Unbelievable," he kept saying over-and-over again. "Can you believe this?" he added as he looked around a roomful of his friends at the Green Island Country Club in his hometown of Columbus, GA.

Fred Wadsworth, a handsome, slender 6' 3" former All-American from the University of South Carolina, had progressed from the mini-tours of Florida to one of the highest rungs in the PGA TOUR and he did it in a very impressive style.

He came from two-strokes behind the last afternoon and turned back a solid group of veteran players to win by two over George Archer, John Cook, Jim Thorpe and defending champion Tim Simpson.

In the Fall of 1985, Fred attempted to obtain his TOUR card, but he missed in the final Qualifying Tournament by a stroke. Until the week of the Southern Open last year, he spent his time following the sun on the Florida mini-tours. Each week, he was hoping to play well enough to re-coup his entry fee.

He did qualify for the U.S. Open for a second time but Shinnecock Hills was a little too much and he missed the cut.

Determined to get on the TOUR, he started the qualifying process again. A couple of weeks before the Southern, he comfortably made it through the first step, the sectional qualifier.

Fortunately, the Southern Open fell several days before he would have to move on to the regional qualifier.

In order to get into the Southern, he had to enter the weekly open qualifier and make his bid for one of the four available spots. He made it with a 68.

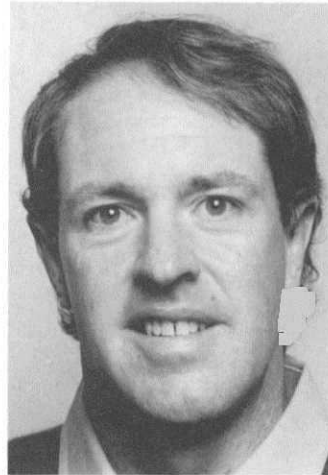
During the final round, there were numerous players fighting it out at the top. Fred made his move with birdies at the ninth, 10th and 12th holes to take the lead. He was two strokes in front when he played the par 3 17th hole. He hit an eight iron shot to within 12 feet and made it to gain a three-shot lead.

"That's when I knew I would win," he said. The bogey at the final hole gave him a 67 on the day, a total of 11-under par 269 and a two-shot victory.

He made good use of his exemption in 1987 playing in 35 events and winning \$80,585. He had only one top ten finish—a T8 at the Hardee's Golf Classic, but overall he was pleased.

Fred played some football and basketball during his school days, but golf was his game. His father, now retired, was an officer in the Army at the time, so the Fort Benning course in Columbus was his home track.

When Denis Watson was asked to give an assessment of his performance in 1984, he smiled and said, "It was an incredible result to a lot of hard work; a couple of years of hard work."

He joined Tom Watson as the only three-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 1984; came within a whisker of winning PGA Player-of-the-Year honors; and finished fourth on the money list with \$408,562. Compare that, if you will, with his 1983 total of \$59,284, which was his previous best.

Actually, his brilliant performance was centered on three tournaments in a seven-week span late in the summer. He broke through with a victory in the Buick Open, thanks to a 63-68 finish.

After he was 33rd in the PGA Championship, he won the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club. He shot a course record eight-under-par 62 the second day and stayed in front the rest of the way to collect a check for \$126,000. He missed the cut in his next two outings, and then won the TOUR's richest payoff of \$162,000 in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational.

While he enjoyed a good season in 1985, he said, "I was within a couple of shots of an unbelievable year." True enough. He finished tied for second in the U.S. Open, just one stroke behind Andy North. Trying to defend his World Series of Golf title, he was tied with Roger Maltbie after three rounds, but Roger shot an exceptional 66 the last day to win it and Denis finished second.

An injury to his right hand curtailed his effectiveness in 1986 but, healthy again last year, he responded with a splendid season.

There were several factors that boosted him into prominence. First of all, he has been working for several years with David Leadbetter on his golf swing; and has worked on the mental aspects of the game with Dr. Bob Rotella of the University of Virginia. He gives them both considerable credit.

Denis earned his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981. The next year, his first start was the Bay Hill Classic, and he tied with Tom Kite and Jack Nicklaus, but Kite won the playoff.

His father started him in the game when they lived in Rhodesia. He was 14-years old at the time, and two years later, his handicap was down to a one. "That's when I started to think about turning professional."

He played all sports, including cricket, rugby, tennis and competed in track and field, but golf was his love, no doubt about it. He turned pro when he was 19.

"Gary Player and Dale Hayes said I should give the TOUR a try," Watson said. "Then Gil Morgan told me he thought my game was well suited for the American courses and even Howard Twitty encouraged me to come over here. So, I did."

Tom Watson's position as one of the all-time greats in the history of golf is unquestioned. For many years, he was the dominate player in the game. The fact that he was the PGA Player-of-the-Year a record six times and the leading money winner five times attests to that.

He has won five British Opens, two Masters Tournaments and one United States Open. He has won 32 times on the PGA TOUR. His career earnings of over \$4.7 million rank him behind only Jack Nicklaus.

Possibly, the sweetest victory of all came last Fall in the Nabisco Championships of Golf in San Antonio, TX. He was vintage Watson as he led all the way to capture the \$360,000 winner's check. As he said, "I'm probably the happiest man in the world today."

As long as the game is played Tom will be remembered for the brilliantly-executed pitch shot he made from off the 17th green at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open.

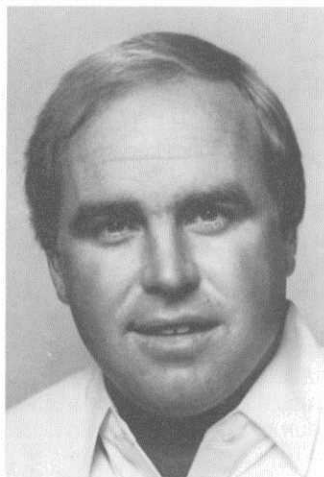
As you recall, his two iron off the tee on the par three hole bounced in heavy rough on the left side of the green. He was tied with Nicklaus, who already had completed his round. Par seemed the absolute best Tom could do. Instead, he hit the perfect shot, and holed it for a birdie two. He went on to birdie the last hole and win his first Open by two over Nicklaus.

Last summer, he nearly won his second Open, but lost by one stroke to Scott Simpson in a stirring duel at the Olympic Club.

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won six times on TOUR, plus the British Open, and won a record \$530,808. He was the first player to break the half-million dollar mark.

Tom was only six years old when his father, a scratch golfer, exposed him to the game. He became a four-time winner of the Missouri State Amateur and played for three years at Stanford University before graduating in 1971 with a degree in psychology.

D. A. Weibring is one of the more popular players on the PGA TOUR, so there were plenty of cheers when he won the rain-shortened Beatrice Western Open title in August of 1987.

It was the high point to his most successful season but it should be noted that D. A. has been on a definite upswing since the end of 1983.

The PGA Championship has become one of his favorites. He tied for fourth in it two years ago and tied for third last year, missing the Larry Nelson-Lanny Wadkins playoff by a stroke.

He also is entering the business world, joining forces with Chuck Hogan, Byron Nelson and Dave Pelz in the marketing and promoting daily fee courses.

Three years ago, he finished second to Calvin Peete in the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass as his 11-under-par 277 was worth \$97,200. It took a final round of six-under-par 66 by Calvin to beat him.

D. A. has had his good years but he also has suffered through a few, too, because of injuries. He injured his left wrist at the 1983 Phoenix Open. He said, "I never could get going, even though I tried to play with it." Finally, he had to take two months off in the early spring.

"I played well after I came back in early June, but still wasn't 100%, he continued.

He did his therapy with the Dallas Cowboys physical staff and adds, "They also helped me to get in the best shape of my life."

The setback was frustrating since he was coming off his best money year, winning \$117,941 in 1982, and anticipated even greater returns in 1983.

His first victory came in the 1979 Quad Cities Open. He was tied with Calvin Peete through 14 holes the last day, but D. A. took charge at the par five 15th, registering an eagle and taking the lead to stay.

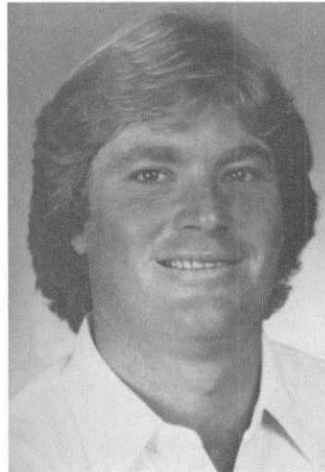
It was a popular victory. A graduate of Illinois State University, D. A. had a number of his followers from his hometown of Quincy, IL, there to cheer him on. He said, "If I had to pick a place to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

In the 1980 Andy Williams San Diego Open, he fired a final round 65 to tie Tom Watson, but Watson went on to win on the first extra hole.

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

Mark Wiebe has come along to be one of the solid young players in the game and, at his current rate of progress, there appears to be no limit to what he can accomplish.

After a relatively poor rookie season in 1984, he came on strong in 1985 to win the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff over John Mahaffey. Two years ago he won the Hardee's Golf Classic with rounds of 69, 65, 66, and 68 for a 12-under-par 268.

It was a good year in 1986 for other reasons, too. He had four rounds in the 60s as he finished second in the Byron Nelson Classic and tied for third place in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His earnings, obviously, increased significantly.

"The best part of the year was in September," he said. "That's when Taylor Lynn was born and she is a special one for us."

His victory in the Anheuser-Busch Classic came after he three-putted the final hole for a bogey and dropped back into a tie with Mahaffey. On the first extra hole, however, he ended it quickly with a long birdie putt.

"The first win changed my schedule around completely and that's the most significant thing that's happened," said Wiebe. "It's allowed me to plan ahead and I haven't always been able to do that."

A two-time high school player of the year, Wiebe attended Palomar Junior College in California and won the state junior college title before going on to star at San Jose State.

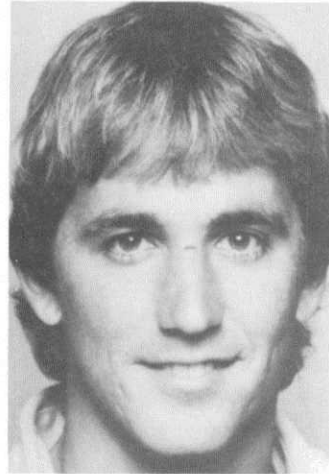
Upon leaving the Spartans for whom he earned All-America honors, he decided to join the PGA TOUR. He would be frustrated in his attempts more than once, but finally made it at the Fall, 1983 Qualifying Tournament.

His rookie year, though, was like that of many other newcomers to the world of the PGA TOUR, a disappointment. He earned only \$16,257 and finished 166th on the Official Money list and once again had to return to the Qualifying Tournament.

A solid fourth place finish in the 1985 Q-Tournament allowed Wiebe to play in a number of early season events, but it was not until his fourth place finish at Westchester at mid-season that he collected a big check. One month later he claimed his victory and his future was set.

A considerable part of the credit, he says, goes to Carl Welty of the LaCosta staff. They have been working together for the last couple of years.

When Willie Wood came on the PGA TOUR in January of 1984, he carried with him an impressive list of credentials. After he played in five West Coast tournaments, his peers knew he was for real. He won more than \$27,000 and his name seemed to be on the leader board every week.

With a smile, he said, "When I started, I was really fired up. I was excited to be on the TOUR and I was still playing well from the Qualifying School."

Those who have followed Willie's career, know it was a typical performance.

Willie started in the game at age nine and it was a natural sport for him. His father, Willard, was the head professional at the Shreveport (LA) Country Club at the time. "He's a teaching pro in Lake Charles now," Willie said, "and he still is my only teacher. And, my older sister Deanie has been playing on the LPGA tour."

Willie accepted the challenge of competition immediately and he has been successful at every level of the game. He won numerous junior titles, the most impressive being the 1977 USGA Junior; the 1978 PGA National Junior and the 1979 Western Junior.

He went on to Oklahoma State University and proceeded to win nine collegiate events. In 1982, he was named the College Golfer-of-the-Year. In 1983, he was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team.

His performance early in his first year on TOUR shouldn't have been a surprise to anyone. He said, "I set one goal for myself when the year started. I wanted to play well enough to never have to go back to the qualifying school. You can't believe how tough that was."

Willie was pleased with his efforts in 1985 because "It was a consistent year. I didn't have any really outstanding weeks, but generally I played well." He did have four top 10 finishes with a third place in the Honda Classic being his best. As a result of his play, he increased his money winnings significantly.

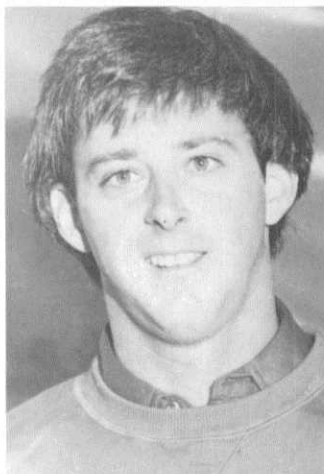
Fresh from his best season ever in 1986, Wood was disappointed with his 1987 play that saw him win only \$95,917 with only one top ten finish, that coming in Memphis where he tied for eighth.

"I'm not happy with the way I played in 1987, but the future looks bright and things can only get better," said a philosophical Wood.

In the 1984 Anheuser-Busch Classic, he was leading by four strokes after three rounds but Ronnie Black came from seven strokes back with a brilliant 63 to win by one. "I had an even-par 71 which wasn't too bad," Willie said, "but Ronnie just played great the last day."

His all-time low score was a 61 at the 49ers Club in Tucson. He was in senior high school at the time, and had two eagles, nine birdies and two bogeys.

Every year on the PGA TOUR seems to bring with it at least one storybook tale. In 1987, Robert Wrenn became the latest player to suddenly and unexpectedly leap into the limelight.

A third-year professional out of Wake Forest, Wrenn first earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1984 and in 1985 had a moderately successful rookie season collecting \$36,396 to finish 135th on the Official Money List.

His ninth place effort at the Kemper Open was his best outing of the year and showed his promise, but the 1986 season was a disappointing one for Wrenn as his earnings fell off to only \$22,869.

It was back to the Q-Tournament for the personable Virginia native and once again, he was successful in earning his playing privileges.

The early part of 1987 began slowly for Wrenn, but at the Deposit Guaranty Classic in Hattiesburg, MS, he fired a second round 62 and led after 54 holes. However, he struggled the final round and finished in a tie for ninth.

With only a little more than \$15,000 in earnings for the year, Wrenn entered the Buick Open and when people drew up their list of pre-tournament favorites, his name was nowhere to be found.

An opening round of seven-under-par 65 drew him a little attention, but after all, it was only Thursday. His second round of nine-under-par 63 tied the course record and people sat up and took strong notice that this young man could indeed play the game.

Still, though, many expected the 27-year old to fade under the pressure of the weekend. They were wrong, very wrong.

A third round score of 67 put him at 21-under-par 195 for 54 holes and eliminated virtually any doubt that here was the tournament winner. He started the final round with a six-shot lead and quickly extended it with birdies on two of the first three holes. He then took dead aim at the PGA TOUR's All-Time record of 27-under par for 72 holes.

A birdie on the 17th hole got him to 26-under and he hung a chip for birdie on the lip on the final hole to finish at 262 and win by seven shots over his nearest competitor. He collected \$108,000 for his efforts, over \$30,000 more than he had won in his first two and a half years alone.

"This week was one dream after another," said a smiling Wrenn afterward. "Everyday it was like some outer force took over for me. It's just one of those weeks where everything came together for me."

Robert (it is Robert, not Bob) was introduced to the game at age 12 by his father Bob (his mother is Bobbie) and he eventually progressed well enough to earn a scholarship to Wake Forest where he earned a degree in Communications in 1981.

He showed his promise by winning the 1981 Trans-Mississippi Amateur and then enjoyed some success on the Asian circuit winning the 1983 Indonesia Open.

Until the 1984 PGA Championship at Shoal Creek, AL, few people really knew what Fuzzy Zoeller had to endure to play golf on the TOUR. Few people knew he constantly suffered with severe back pains because Fuzzy always was smiling and joking with those around him.

He arrived in Shoal Creek amid a torrent of publicity because of his magnificent performance in winning the United States Open Championship a few weeks earlier at Winged Foot. In the Open, he was tied with Greg Norman after 72 holes, and then the next day, Fuzzy was at his brilliant best, winning the 18-hole playoff by eight strokes, 67 to 75.

The morning he was to play his first round in the PGA, his back was so painful he barely could move. He was rushed to the hospital and remained there for nearly a week.

A month later, he was in Las Vegas to defend his title in the Panasonic Invitational, but his back condition worsened and he went to the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City. The diagnosis was that a "couple of discs had ruptured" and surgery was necessary.

Fuzzy was back on TOUR in 1985 for the Doral-Eastern Open at the end of February. He was delighted to tie for 46th place. The next week, he tied for 20th in the Honda Classic and then he won the Hertz Bay Hill Classic by shooting 66-67 the last two days. He went on to enjoy one of his best money years.

"The back problem started when I was playing high school basketball," he explains. "I was submarined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since."

Fuzzy blossomed as a superstar in 1979 when he won the Andy Williams San Diego Open and also the Masters Tournament. He was six strokes in back of Ed Sneed starting the last round at Augusta National, and when he finished, he was thinking second place. As he sat in the scorers' tent at the 18th green, with Tom Watson, he watched Sneed bogey the last hole to force a three-way playoff. Fuzzy defeated Ed and Tom on the second extra hole.

Fuzzy was back with a vengeance in 1986 winning three times and collecting well over \$300,000 for the second time in his career.

"Anytime you beat these guys once is gratifying," said Zoeller. "To win three times is really something."

Zoeller grew up alongside a fairway at the Valley View CC in New Albany, Ind., and it seemed natural when he started swinging a golf club at age three. He entered his first tournament two years later.

When Richard Zokol had his best career year in 1985, he was anxious for the season to start. That year, though, would prove to be a big disappointment for Zokol and he was forced again to return to the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament.

"Having a bad year in 1986 was very scary," said Zokol. "Then I only made it through the Q-School by a shot and things didn't look too good for me."

Zokol, though, went on to have an excellent 1987 season winning a career high \$114,406. He ended the year on a high note collecting five-figure checks in six of his last seven starts. His wife, Joanie, then proceeded to present him with twin boys in early October.

"I feel like everything is coming together," said Zokol. "The twins coming into the family has put everything into a different perspective."

When Richard was working on his golf game during his teenage years in his native Canada, he always kept an eye on Jim Nelford.

"I didn't know him then," Richard said, even though they both were from the Vancouver area. "Jim was a couple of years ahead of me and he seemed to win everything. When he went on to Brigham Young University, I could see how much his game improved, so I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

When it was time for Richard to head for college, he wrote to Karl Tucker, the golf coach, to inquire about the possibilities of going there. "He told me that since I didn't have a good amateur record, they couldn't offer me a scholarship," he recalls.

Soon afterwards, Zokol and Nelford were competing against each other in the British Columbia Amateur and after three rounds, Zokol was leading. "We talked about it, and Jim said he would call the coach and recommend me. The next thing I know, Coach Tucker said I should come down to Provo."

"The day after the tournament, I drove 24 hours straight through, and entered the school without a scholarship, but I was there. I made the team and for three years, I roomed with Bobby Clampett."

He gained national attention at the 1982 Greater Milwaukee Open. He showed up the first day with a small portable tape player and headset. Between shots, he would listen to soothing music. "It helps me to relax," he explained. He continued to use it through his second year on TOUR, but now says, "It helped me get over the concentration block, but I don't need it now."

He enjoyed an especially proud moment at the 1984 Canadian Open. He tied for fifth place, and that represented the best finish by a Canadian in their national championship in 26 years.

Richard started in the game as a 12-year-old caddy. "We lived right across the street from a golf course, and I'd caddy every weekend and also do some work in the golf shop."

CURTIS STRANGE WINS PALMER AWARD

Curtis Strange became the first player in TOUR history to win two Arnold Palmer Awards as he claimed the 1987 trophy with an astounding TOUR record \$925,941.

Strange, who also won the Palmer Award in 1985, had a better than \$100,000 final margin over his closest challenger, Paul Azinger, to capture the coveted trophy of "Arnie."

Strange's record shattering year included three victories and broke Greg Norman's year-old record for single season earnings by \$272,645.

Since its inception in 1981, no one had been able to claim the elusive Palmer Award more than once until Strange this past season.

The trophy, a bronze casting of "Arnie," will be awarded to Strange at the PGA TOUR's National Awards Show in early January.

The past recipients of the award are Tom Kite (1981), Craig Stadler (1982), Hal Sutton (1983), Tom Watson (1984), Curtis Strange (1985) and Greg Norman (1986).

MERRILL LYNCH SHOOT-OUT SERIES

A real winner in its initial season last year, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will return bigger and better than ever in 1988.

A 10-man competition covering nine holes of play, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will be held at 17 different PGA TOUR events in 1988 with the top players collecting \$3,000 from the \$10,200 purse.

What is a Shoot-Out? The format is easy to understand and a pleasure to watch. Ten players begin and on each hole, the player with the highest score is dropped from the field. Should ties exist, a sudden death playoff is held requiring each of the players involved to execute a pitch shot, or a chip or a long putt. The player farthest from the hole is eliminated.

The field for each Shoot-Out consists of that tournament's defending champ, the six leading money winners entered into that tournament and three sponsor selections.

At season's end, a Shoot-Out championship will be held (date and place TBA) in which 10 players will vie for \$250,000 in prize money with \$90,000 going to the winner. Fuzzy Zoeller won the title last year at Ventana Canyon in Tucson, AZ.

The field for the final competition consists of the top five money winners on the 1988 PGA TOUR Official Money List, the top three money winners from the season-long Shoot-Out Series and two sponsor selections.

The 1988 Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series Competition's will be held on the Tuesday of tournament week. Schedule not determined at press time.

REVISED MCI LONG DISTANCE PROGRAM FOR 1988

A part of the PGA TOUR since 1986, the MCI Long Distance Competition will undergo a dramatic overhaul in 1988 with 20 pro-celebrity competitions scheduled for this season.

The year's competition will feature 10 pros hitting two balls each with \$10,000 in prize money at stake and six local media celebrities also taking two shots at producing a long drive. The amateurs will be competing for trophies only.

The field for these Tuesday events will consist of the defending champion of that event, the top two entered players from the 1987 MCI Long Distance Competition and the seven leading players in the field from the 1988 Driving Distance statistical category.

The weekly winners will receive \$3,500 with the runnersup earning \$2,000 and the third place finisher collecting \$1,000 on down to 10th place which will be worth \$200.

The MCI Long Distance Competition will actually extend into 1989 with the grand finals of the 16-month long competition taking place at the 1989 MCI Heritage Classic. At that event, the top ten players from the year-long plus competition will compete for \$50,000 in prize money with the winner taking home \$15,000.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

The 1989 Ryder Cup Matches will be played September 22-24 at The Belfry, Sutton-Coldfield, England.

THE RYDER CUP

The USA squad is selected based upon an accumulation of Ryder Cup points from the beginning of the calendar year 1988 through the PGA Championship in 1989. Points are awarded to the first 10 positions in each PGA TOUR event on the following basis:

PGA Championship, U. S. Open and The Players Championship: 1st-115; 2nd-70; 3rd-45; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-10.

All other events: 1st-70; 2nd-42; 3rd-28; 4th-21; 5th-18; 6th-14; 7th-11; 8th-10; 9th-8; 10th-6.

If a player who is ineligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position. In order to be eligible, a player must be a U.S. citizen and a member of the PGA of America. The PGA Champion and the U.S. Open Champion automatically make the team, provided they are U. S. citizens and are members or apprentices of the PGA of America.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The Vardon Trophy is awarded each year by the PGA of America to the PGA TOUR player who posts the season's best scoring average. The system has been amended in 1988 to allow all TOUR members to compete for the prestigious award provided they have played in 60 rounds. The new system will also use an "adjusted" score for purposes of computing the scoring average. The adjusted score will be computed based upon the average score of the field at each tournament. As a result, a player's adjusted score may be higher or lower than his actual score. For example, a player shoots 70 each day at a tournament while the field average was 73. His 280 total would then be adjusted to 268 since he actually played 12 shots better than the field did during the tournament. The Vardon Trophy is a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" by 27".

MEDIA REGULATIONS

The General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by *all* members of the Media:

1. Remain close up against gallery ropes in such a way as to appear to be a part of the gallery at all times. An ARMBAND is necessary to walk inside the gallery ropes.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
3. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.
5. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by PRIOR ARRANGEMENT WITH THE PLAYER and up against the ropes and NOT in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day—and others requested—will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

1. All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
2. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted within the playing area of the golf course.

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only ACCREDITED PHOTOGRAPHERS for RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am).

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and videotape cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General – All Photographers

A photographer must not ask a player to pose or in any way verbally distract a player during a round.

If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.

A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.

At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disqualified.

Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.

Use of golf carts or other means of transportation on the course during tournament play is prohibited.

Still Photographers

Only still photographers to whom armbands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery ropes. They must station themselves immediately inside such ropes, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE ROPES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open. Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to working inside the ropes and possibly to work at the tournament.

Close-up action shots are prohibited.

All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

When working at a green, photographers must not position themselves directly in a player's putting line.

Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Television/Videotape Cameramen

Television and videotape filming may be done from inside the gallery ropes, or from areas approved by the PGA TOUR. All camera personnel who have been issued PHOTO armbands will be permitted inside the gallery lines but this does not include other members of the crew. Camera personnel must station themselves immediately inside the gallery lines, not more than an arm's length from those lines, so as to blend into the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.

Filming may be done from such locations during a player's stroke, provided modern equipment that produces a minimum of noise is used.

Post-round interviews must be filmed far enough away from the arena of play to eliminate the possibility of distraction to those competing.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.

MASTERCARD ENCOURAGES Q-SCHOOL GRADS TO MASTER THE POSSIBILITIES

The initial year of the MasterCard program was very well received by recent TOUR school graduates and is expected to grow even stronger in 1988.

"We created this one-of-a-kind program to help these young men become masters in golf and strengthen their competitive edge," said Richard F. Holpp, MasterCard International Vice President for Business Card Programs. "They have never before had an opportunity to receive assistance through a formal PGA TOUR program as they begin their careers. We're giving them this chance."

Keith Clearwater, the 1987 MasterCard Rookie-of-the-Year, is one player who mastered the possibilities on the PGA TOUR winning two events and collecting a rookie record \$320,007.

KIRIN WORLD MONEY LIST

The Kirin World Money List consists of all official money won in co-sponsored events on each of the four participating golf circuits (U.S. PGA TOUR, PGA European Tour, Japan PGA, Australia/New Zealand PGA Tour).

The Kirin World Money List was initially formulated as a qualification vehicle for the 1985 World Championship of Golf. It has become evident since then, however, that the list provides a standard by which world-class players could be compared, regardless of whether or not they competed regularly in head-to-head competition.

Since the initial Kirin World Money List was compiled, many have come to believe that this list will ultimately become the world standard for judging professional golfers' performances on an international basis.

The 1988 Kirin World Money List will be compiled from Sept. 1, 1987 through August 30, 1988 in order to best accommodate the various start and finish times of the four circuits involved. On the PGA TOUR, the 1988 Kirin World Money List will end at the NEC World Series of Golf and the Provident Classic on Aug. 28, 1988.

The 1988 Kirin World Championship of Golf will be held at the Kapalua Bay Club in Maui, HI, on Dec. 15-18 with the PGA TOUR set to defend its team title won in Japan last year.
