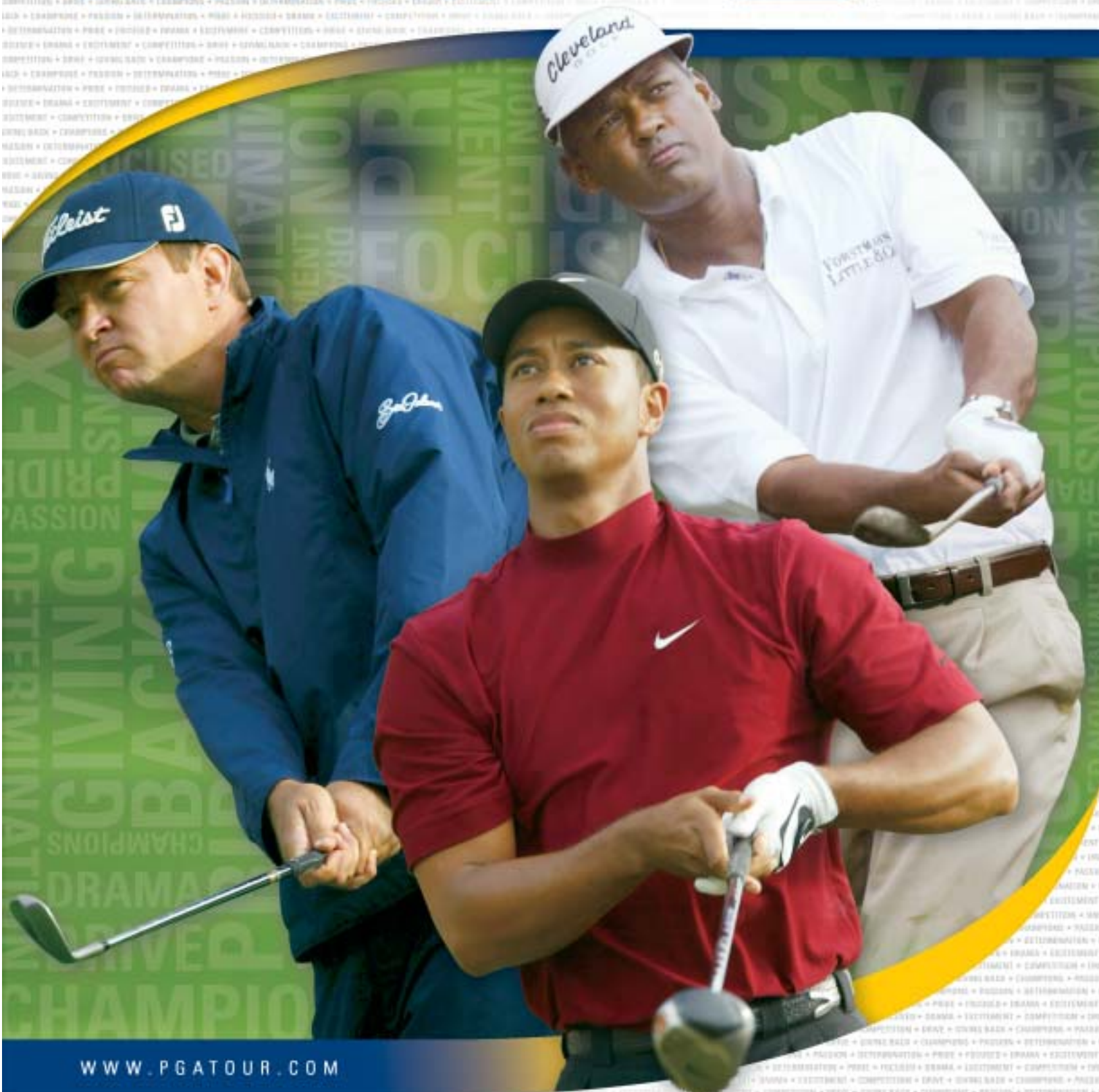

A Message to the Media

On behalf of the players and staff, welcome to the 2004 PGA TOUR season. We appreciate your continued interest in our sport, and we clearly recognize the extent to which our success is tied to the thorough and professional coverage we receive from a wide variety of global media outlets.

As the PGA TOUR begins another great season, we can truly state that the image and competitive spirit of our players has led to the healthiest state in the history of our organization.

The *Sports Business Journal* recently reaffirmed this when it published the "2003 League Report Card," a survey of corporate sponsors' opinions of their investment in sports properties. The PGA TOUR ranked first in overall satisfaction among the 16 major sports. This is important as we continue to raise the exposure of our tournaments, provide significant value to our sponsors and showcase the widespread excellence of our athletes.

The competition level on the PGA TOUR in 2003 was at an all-time high, with season-ending honors going down to the wire.

Tiger Woods recorded a season-high five victories and the lowest stroke average on TOUR and garnered a fifth consecutive Player of the Year honor. Vijay Singh won four times and captured his first money title. Davis Love III won a career-high four times, including THE PLAYERS Championship, making 2003 the first time in 30 years where three players won four or more times in a season.

However, the depth of the TOUR was never more evident. Eleven players age 40 or older combined to capture 15 PGA TOUR titles. Mike Weir, Jim Furyk, Ben Curtis and Shaun Micheel won the Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship, respectively, making for a first-timers' sweep of the major championships for the first time since 1969. The season culminated with a fantastic display of great golf and sportsmanship at The Presidents Cup in South Africa, with captains Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player agreeing to share the Cup after the match ended in a tie.

These highlights offered a unique blend of veterans, young players and an international focus that fans can continue to be excited about. The 2004 season includes 48 official events offering nearly \$240 million in prize money and includes new title sponsors such as FBR, Booz Allen and Cialis. The World Golf Championships will hold two events in the United States, one in Ireland and another in Spain. The global reach of TOUR telecasts will extend to more than 140 countries around the world, including all three major networks in the United States and the top cable carriers. This exposure includes even more feature programming to profile our players and the second year of "PGA TOUR Sunday," the one-hour preview show each Sunday on USA Network.

The competitive accomplishments get most of the attention. But it's the charitable effort that we cherish most of all. Through 2003, we will have contributed more than \$800 million to charity since the first donation in 1938. But numbers don't tell the whole story. It's players such as Tom Watson donating a portion of his \$1-million Charles Schwab Cup annuity to help his longtime friend and caddie Bruce Edwards battle ALS. Or Briny Baird teaming with his sponsor, Canon, to place the picture of a different missing child on his golf bag every week to raise awareness. It's also the tournaments and volunteers making sure their respective communities benefit from our annual events.

We look forward to working with you throughout the year. Our communications department staff at headquarters in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL and at tournament media centers each week is ready to assist you. Please do not hesitate to ask for our help at any time.

We Are the PGA TOUR

The name of our organization is the PGA TOUR, a tax-exempt membership group of professional golfers that plays more than 100 official-money tournaments on three TOURS – the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. Our headquarters are located in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL, southeast of Jacksonville.

We should never be referred to as the PGA as we are a different organization than the PGA (of America). We are the PGA TOUR. On second reference, you can call us the TOUR.

The PGA is the Professional Golfers' Association of America, a membership organization for the nation's club professionals. The PGA runs the PGA Championship, Senior PGA Championship and Ryder Cup Matches, among other championships. The PGA headquarters are located in Palm Beach Gardens, FL.

The PGA TOUR and PGA of America were affiliated until 1968, when the tournament players, a small subset of the total PGA membership, broke away to form the Tournament Players Division and gain more control of their finances

and tournament schedule. The Tournament Players Division was renamed the PGA TOUR in 1975. While the two organizations still work closely together today, the PGA TOUR and PGA of America are separate entities.

Two other American golf organizations are involved in men's professional tournament play, independent of the PGA TOUR but with their marquee events included on the PGA TOUR schedule as non-PGA TOUR cosponsored tournaments. The United States Golf Association, with headquarters in Far Hills, NJ, oversees the national championships (U.S. Open, U.S. Senior Open, U.S. Amateur, U.S. Women's Amateur, etc.) and administers the Rules of Golf, among other duties. The Augusta (GA) National Golf Club plays host to the Masters Tournament.

The Champions Tour will continue to combine extremely competitive golf for champions of the game age 50 and older with a fan-friendly platform that promotes "inside the ropes" and game-improvement for its fans. The Nationwide Tour grows as a virtual extension of the PGA TOUR. Through 2003, 137 PGA TOUR tournaments have been won by former Nationwide Tour players.

Overview:

The PGA TOUR is a tax-exempt membership organization of professional golfers. In 2004, the PGA TOUR has 48 official events offering nearly \$240 million in prize money. The mission of the PGA TOUR is to expand domestically and internationally so as to substantially increase player financial benefits while maintaining its commitment to growth in charity and the integrity of the game. In addition to providing competitive opportunities for its membership, PGA TOUR events also generate revenue for charitable causes in their communities.

West Coast Swing presented by The St. Paul:

The PGA TOUR West Coast Swing presented by The St. Paul is a points race that kicks off the PGA TOUR season, with players battling for the top prize of \$500,000. The second- and third-place finishers earn \$300,000 and \$200,000, respectively. Contested during nine PGA TOUR events in January and February, each tournament winner receives 100 points, with a gradual decline of points awarded down to 10 for a 10th-place finish.

Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers:

The PGA TOUR Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers is a points race encompassing the final 11 official PGA TOUR events of the season. The overall champion of the Fall Finish earns \$500,000. The second- and third-place finishers earn \$300,000 and \$200,000, respectively. The winner of each Fall Finish event is awarded 100 points, with a gradual decline of points down to 10 for 10th place.

A Brief History of the PGA TOUR

It is not always easy to pinpoint the exact beginning of something. So it is with the PGA TOUR. Certainly, professionals have competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in the United States.

In 1895, 10 professional golfers and one amateur played in the first U.S. Open in Newport, RI. Shortly thereafter, tournaments began to pop up across the country. There was the Western Open in 1899. But this was not "tour" golf. The events lacked continuity.

Interest in the game, however, continued to grow. American professionals were rapidly improving. And when John McDermott became the first American-born player to win the U.S. Open in 1911, interest in the game blossomed.

That interest became enthusiasm in 1913 when Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray came to the United States to play an exhibition tour and compete in the U.S. Open. When 20-year-old amateur Francis Ouimet defeated the pair in a playoff for the Open at Brookline, MA., golf became front-page news and a game for everyone.

In the early 1920s, a series of tournaments was held on the West Coast, in Texas and Florida. These events were held in the winter, and the golfers played their way east and up to Pinehurst, NC, in the spring. By the middle of the decade, the tour was doing relatively well—offering \$77,000 in total prize money.

The first "playing pros" organization was formed in 1932. Two years earlier, Bob Harlow had been named manager of the PGA Tournament Bureau. The tour became more structured following World War II and exploded in the late 1950s and early '60s. When Arnold Palmer, televised golf and President Dwight D. Eisenhower arrived on the scene in the late 1950s, the eyes of the world were on golf. This exposure inspired millions to try the game.

Most golf historians would trace the "formal" beginning of the PGA TOUR to late 1968, when the "Tournament Players Division" split from the PGA of America and hired Joseph C. Dey as its first Commissioner. That organization became the modern-day PGA TOUR. Dey served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman on March 1, 1974.

During Beman's administration, the value of tournament purses escalated at an unprecedented rate: PGA TOUR assets grew from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$200 million, and total revenues increased from \$3.9

million to \$229 million in 1993.

Timothy W. Finchem, previously the TOUR's Deputy Commissioner and Chief Operating Officer, became the TOUR's third Commissioner on June 1, 1994. In 1995, Finchem undertook a restructuring program designed to strengthen the PGA TOUR's core business, which is its competitions, expand the TOUR's international scope and prepare it to enter the 21st century. In 1996, Finchem helped spearhead formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours, as golf's five world governing bodies laid the groundwork for taking competition into the next millennium. In 1997, the Federation announced the World Golf Championships, which made their debut in 1999 with three events—the Accenture Match Play Championship, NEC Invitational and American Express Championship. The World Cup joined this group in 2000.

Since 1938, PGA TOUR events have donated more than \$800 million to charity, making a mark in the communities in which the TOUR plays through its charity campaign, "Giving Back...The Heart of the PGA TOUR."

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR also is much broader today. The Champions Tour, formerly called the Senior PGA Tour, has been labeled the most successful senior sports venture in history. An interactive element with fans and television viewers has brought new exposure to the Tour. Since starting out with just two cosponsored events and \$250,000 in prize money in 1980, the Champions Tour has grown to more than 30 events. And the Charles Schwab Cup will be competed for the fourth time in 2004. The Nationwide Tour, under that sponsorship umbrella for the first time in 2003, has been recognized as a virtual extension of the PGA TOUR with its excellent level of play that saw 55 percent of its alumni making up the 2003 PGA TOUR. The Nationwide Tour provides outstanding golf competition in 30 communities while raising significant charity dollars. Among the former players on this TOUR who have gone on to star on the PGA TOUR are David Duval, Tom Lehman, Jeff Maggert, Stuart Appleby, Stewart Cink, David Toms, 2003 U.S. Open winner Jim Furyk and 2003 PGA Champion Shaun Micheel.

Also continuing to grow is the Tournament Players Club Network. When the PGA TOUR opened the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in 1980, it introduced the era of stadium golf and record-breaking attendance. Owned and/or operated by the TOUR, these courses are the only major-league sports venues owned by the players themselves.

About the Commissioner



Timothy W. Finchem
Commissioner

Timothy W. Finchem, 56, is the third Commissioner of the PGA TOUR. Finchem succeeded Deane R. Beman as Commissioner on June 1, 1994. Beman had served for 20 years, replacing the late Joseph C. Dey, who had been the TOUR's Commissioner in its first five years, 1969-74.

Finchem, Deputy Commissioner and Chief Operating Officer of the TOUR under Beman since 1989, joined the TOUR staff as Vice President of Business Affairs in 1987.

As Commissioner, Finchem has greatly expanded the earnings opportunities for PGA TOUR players domestically and internationally. He also has taken leadership roles in the formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours and the World Golf Foundation, Inc.

His personal dedication to the success of the World Golf Foundation's First Tee initiative has helped that program achieve its initial objectives in developing facilities that will have an impact on the game for years to come.

"Our primary purpose as a membership organization is to create outstanding playing and earnings opportunities for our players," Finchem says,

"and we are proud of what our tournaments do for charity (more than \$800 million raised) and the active role we have been able to take as an organization in growing the game for future generations."

Born in Ottawa, IL, on April 19, 1947, Finchem graduated from Princess Anne High School in Virginia Beach, VA. He attended the University of Richmond on a debate scholarship, receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1969. He graduated from the University of Virginia Law School in 1973.

After practicing law in Virginia Beach for three years, Finchem served in the White House as Deputy Advisor to the President in the Office of Economic Affairs in 1978 and 1979. In the early 1980s, Finchem co-founded the National Marketing and Strategies Group in Washington, D.C.

Finchem is recipient of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America's Old Tom Morris Award for 2001 and the PGA of America's Distinguished Service Award for 2002.

Married to the former Holly Bachand, Finchem is a father of four. The Finchems live in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL.

The 254 total (26-under-par) broke Mark Calcavecchia's 72-hole PGA TOUR mark of 256 he set in winning at the 2001 Phoenix Open. The 54-hole total of 189 matched the PGA TOUR record shared by Calcavecchia and John Cook (1996 FedEx St. Jude Classic). Did not post a bogey until the back nine on Sunday. Was attempting to become the first player since Lee Trevino (1974 New Orleans Open) to win a PGA TOUR event without a bogey. The 13 years and eight months and 366 starts between victories (1990 Phoenix Open) was the third-longest time between victories in PGA TOUR history. At age 43 years, 11 months and 20 days, was one of 11 players age 40 or above to win on the PGA TOUR in 2003. In relation to par for a par-70 golf course, also broke the PGA TOUR record of 22-under-par set by Donnie Hammond at the 1989 Texas Open. Win was worth \$630,000, the largest payday of career.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: **2002:** Picked up first top-10 finish since the 2000 Byron Nelson Classic with a T7 at the Sony Open in Hawaii...Led Greater Milwaukee Open after opening-round 63, lowest round on TOUR since 60 during second round of 1999 Las Vegas Invitational. Finished T8. **2001:** Finished 161st on the final 2001 PGA TOUR money list, returned to Qualifying Tournament and finished T8 to retain his card for the 2002 season. Played in 32 PGA TOUR events and posted three top-25s. **2000:** Earned full-exempt status for the third consecutive season on the strength of two top-10s. Best finish was T5 at the Nissan Open. **1999:** Came close to winning his first PGA TOUR title since 1990 Phoenix Open when he lost a playoff to Gabriel Hjertstedt at the Touchstone Energy Tucson Open. Shared third-round lead at 10-under-par 206, but shot a closing 70 to Hjertstedt's 68. Hjertstedt won playoff on the first extra hole with a birdie. Runner-up finish was worth \$297,000, his career best...Opened with a 70 at the Las Vegas Invitational then came back with a 60 at Las Vegas CC. His 12-under-par 60 included a missed two-and-half foot putt on 14. He became the only player 40 or older to shoot a 60 on a par-72 course. **1998:** Finished among the top-60 on the TOUR money list for the first time since 1990...Shot final-round 64 and finished T2 at Phoenix Open for his first runner-up finish since 1990...Earned \$312,338 of his season earnings on West Coast in 1998. **1994:** Struggled on PGA TOUR again after 1990 season but found success on Nationwide Tour...Won Miami Valley and Cleveland Opens in consecutive weeks to become first player to win back-to-back Nationwide Tour events...Finished seventh on Nationwide Tour money list to gain spot on 1995 PGA TOUR...Played in 1994 U.S. Open at Oakmont CC, site of

grandfather's 1927 U.S. Open victory. **1990:** Enjoyed success and consistency on the PGA TOUR from 1988 through 1990, including a victory at the Phoenix Open. Phoenix was his first start of the season and he earned a five-stroke victory over Jim Thorpe...Nearly won again three weeks later, finishing second, two strokes behind Shearson Lehman Hutton champion Dan Forsman. Played on European and Asian Tours until fall of 1987. **1983:** Winner of the Mexican Open. **1982:** Qualified for the TOUR in 1981, but earned only \$4,254 in 1982. **Amateur:** Winner of the 1981 New Mexico State Amateur.

PERSONAL: Grandfather, known as "The Silver Scot," won the U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship...Started playing golf with his mom and dad when he was 10...Played golf and baseball in high school but decided to stick with golf because both seasons were during same time...After record-setting performance at the 2003 Valero Texas Open, commented on colorful career, "You only get one trip around life. Golf is just something that I love to do. I don't play for the money, I never have. I've made a lot of good friends through golf over the last 22 years playing golf professionally." Father Tommy, a surgeon and the son of "The Silver Scot," passed away on March 4, 2003.

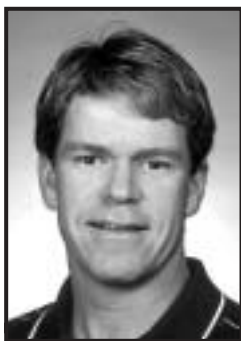

Weibring and Bobby Wadkins. 1993: Was part of a five-man playoff at Buick Southern Open won by John Inman. 1991: Won twice. Shot a closing 64 to catch Gene Sauers at Kmart Greater Greensboro Open, then parred third playoff hole for victory. Edged Robert Gamez by one stroke at Greater Milwaukee Open after opening with 63. 1988: His first TOUR victory, at Canon Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open, came with 10-foot putt on second playoff hole with Dave Barr and Joey Sindelar. **Amateur:** Three-time All-American at University of Texas... Winner of 1979 and 1981 Texas State Amateurs, 1979 Southern Amateur and 1979 Trans-Mississippi Amateur.

Slipped from 51st on the money list to 158th...Made 28 starts with best effort of the season coming at the John Deere Classic in September, a T21...Recorded the first hole-in-one of the 2003 PGA TOUR season, aicing the 176-yard fourth hole with a 6-iron at the TPC of Scottsdale. It was the third of his TOUR career...Made his fifth start in a major championship and his first at the PGA Championship, finishing 67th at Oak Hill.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: **2002:** Sixth season on TOUR proved to be the breakthrough. Won for the first time and earned over \$1 million in a single season...Became the 14th first-time winner of the Disney Golf Classic, where he held off 54-hole leader Chris DiMarco by one stroke and Tiger Woods by two. Entered the week of Disney in a precarious position on the TOUR official money list at No. 118. Held a share of the lead with Hidemichi Tanaka and Jeff Sluman after opening with a 9-under-par 63. Entered final round two strokes off the lead, but fired a bogey-free 65 that included a 4-under-par 32 on the final nine. With a career-best paycheck of \$666,000, moved from No. 118 to No. 49 on the season money list with \$1,199,802, more than he has earned in his five previous years on the PGA TOUR (\$1,119,649). Also jumped from 240th to 98th in the Official World Golf Ranking...Tied for third at the Kemper Insurance Open. **2001:** Finished T2 at 2001 PGA TOUR Qualifying School to improve his position for the 2002 season. One of only two players to card six consecutive rounds in the 60s. Only top-10 of the season, T8 at Texas Open at La Cantera. **2000:** Earned \$391,075, 125th on the money list, with two top-10s and four top-25s. **1999:** Had two top-25s and failed to regain exempt status, finishing 177th on the PGA TOUR money list. Earned exempt status for 2000 by virtue of 26th-place finish at 1999 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament. **1998:** Led Nationwide Tour in earnings with \$178,664...Captured two events, the Dominion Open and TOUR Championship. Earned Nationwide Tour Player of the Year. **1997:** Did not compete on either TOUR. **1996:** Member of the Nationwide Tour. **1995:** One of eight players to miss 1996 PGA TOUR card by single stroke at 1995 Qualifying Tournament. **1994:** First qualified for the PGA TOUR by placing T11 in 1993 Qualifying Tournament. Finished 101st on the money list. **Amateur:** Winner of 1990 NCAA Division II Championship and was an All-American selection that year.

PERSONAL: First year on PGA TOUR got off to rocky start when his home in Northridge, CA was near the epicenter of massive earthquake in January 1994.

Score of 27-under par 261 set tournament record by three strokes...A T5 at the season-ending Southern Farm Bureau Classic moved him from 41st to 39th on season-ending TOUR money list and clinched 2003 Masters Tournament appearance...Shared TOUR lead in eagles (17) with J.J. Henry and David Toms. **2001:** Earned first TOUR card by finishing eighth on the Nationwide Tour money list...Lone victory came at the BMW Charity Pro-Am at the Cliffs in Traveler's Rest, SC, not far from his hometown of Elgin, SC. Final score of 18-under-par 269, set tournament record for first-year event...Finished in top 10 in three of the main statistical categories: Total Driving (fourth), Driving Distance (sixth) and All-Around (eighth). **2000:** T36 at the Michelob Championship at Kingsmill after turning professional in September. **Amateur:** Member of 1999 Walker Cup Team...Winner of Northeast Amateur and Carolinas Amateur...Was an All-America selection in three of his four years at Clemson, including first team in 1999...First-Team Academic All-America in 1999.

His \$63,093 payday moved him from the 133rd position on the season money list to No. 115 and he remained in the top 125 the remainder of the season.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: 2002: Had best earnings year of his career with \$620,280 and regained fully exempt status a year after finishing 129th on the money list...Recorded first top-10 in five appearances at the U.S. Open with a T8 finish...Playing in 460th career TOUR event, recorded first (second of career) PGA TOUR hole-in-one in the second round of the Reno-Tahoe Open. Ace was the first in the four-year history of the tournament. **2001:** Involved in what is believed to be the first ace on a par 4 in TOUR history at Phoenix Open when Andrew Magee's drive on the 333-yard, par-4 17th hole caromed off his putter and went into the hole. Byrum was lining up a putt when the ball deflected off his putter and rolled about 8 feet directly into the hole. **2000:** Ended season with two top-10s in his last two starts worth a total of \$183,610 to secure his card for the 2001 season. **1999:** Lost to Notah Begay III in playoff at Michelob Championship, when Begay parred second extra hole. **1997:** Nominated for Comeback Player of the Year after posting the most consistent year of his career, including back-to-back runner-up finishes at the Canon Greater Hartford Open and Buick Open. **1989:** Lone PGA TOUR victory came at Kemper Open. Took two-stroke lead after third-round 65, then shot closing 68 for five-stroke win over Tommy Armour III, Billy Ray Brown and Jim Thorpe. Brother Curt won Hardee's Golf Classic that year, making them the first brothers to win in same year since Mike and Dave Hill in 1972.

Amateur: After graduating from high school in Onida, SD, joined brother Curt in Albuquerque, NM, where Tom worked at country club and was a walk-on with University of New Mexico golf team. After two years, transferred to New Mexico State in Las Cruces.

Youngest British Open winner at 26 years, 1 month, 24 days, since Tiger Woods won in 2000 at the age of 24 years, 6 months, and 23 days. Jumped from 396th to 35th in the Official World Golf Ranking, the biggest jump since the Ranking began in 1986. One of four first-time major champions in 2003, joining Mike Weir (Masters), Jim Furyk (U.S. Open), and Shaun Micheel (PGA). Qualified for the British Open via a T13 finish at the 100th Western Open, his best career finish to date and first career top-25 finish. Just one month after British Open triumph, returned to home state to play in the WGC-NEC Invitational at Firestone Country Club in Akron. First-round co-leader with Sergio Garcia after a 6-under-par 64. Married Candace Beatty in Kent on Saturday evening, Aug. 23 after

the completion of the third round. Finished T30. Semifinalist at the HSBC World Match Play Championship in England before losing to Thomas Bjorn.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: 2002: Played the Hooters Tour for a second consecutive season, finishing 10th on the money list and winning in Myrtle Beach, SC. Placed T26 at the PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament. **Amateur:** Three-time All-American at Kent State University. Won the Ohio Amateur in 1999 and 2000 — by 17 strokes, joining the PGA TOUR's John Cook and Arnold Palmer as the tournament's only back-to-back winners. That same year, Curtis finished runner-up at the Western Amateur and won the Player's Amateur to become the No. 1-ranked amateur golfer in the world by Golfweek magazine.

Winning 72-hole total of 264 broke previous Honda Classic record of 266 set by Blaine McCallister in 1989...Continued success in Texas tournaments with T9 at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship and second at the Bank of America Colonial, six strokes behind winner Kenny Perry. At Colonial, was 10-under through 17 holes in final round with a chance to get to 59 with a birdie but bogeyed the 18th hole to finish with a 9-under 61, tying the course record. Also holds a share of the course record (61) at the TPC at Las Colinas, one of the two host courses of the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. Opened with a 72 and followed with rounds of 69-70 before firing a 5-under-par 67 Sunday for a two-stroke victory over Tom Lehman and Glen Day. Victory was worth \$720,000, at that point the largest payday of his career. That propelled him to top of money list with \$946,963. Won by three strokes over Parnevik and Clarke. At age 25, was youngest British Open champion since Seve Ballesteros won in 1979 at 22...Nearly earned second major title at PGA Championship. Shared third-round lead with Davis Love III after course-record 65 and stood seven strokes in front of next-closest rival. 2003 SEASON: Won a career-high four times and surpassed the \$6-million mark in single-season earnings for first time in career. Led TOUR money list for 14 weeks and finished third overall. In second start of season, captured AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am for the second time in three years, ending 44-tournament drought. Held two-stroke lead after 54 holes over Tom Lehman, Mike Weir and Rod Pampling with rounds of 72-67-67. Opened final round with bogeys on two of the first three holes, but battled back with seven birdies and only one bogey en route to a final-round 68. Clinched one-stroke victory over Lehman with two-putt birdie on par-5 18th hole after second shot approach with 4-iron from 224 yards settled to within 15 feet of cup. Finished T2 with Chad Campbell behind Justin Leonard at The Honda Classic. Held 54-hole lead by one over Leonard and two over Chris Riley. Led all competitors on par-5 holes, finishing at career-best 14-under-par on par-5s (4.13) with three eagles. Won his second PLAYERS Championship in 11 years, joining Jack Nicklaus, Fred Couples, Steve Elkington and Hal Sutton as multiple winners of the event. Paired with good friend Couples in final round, tied the final-round record with an 8-under-par 64 in windy conditions to come from two shots behind and win. Rounds of 70-67-70-64—271 bested third-round leaders Jay Haas and Padraig Harrington by six strokes. Captured fifth tartan jacket at the MCI Heritage at Harbour Town GL. Chipped in from 67 feet on 72nd hole to force sudden death with Woody Austin after four rounds in the 60s (66-69-69-67—271). Hit 6-iron approach on fourth playoff hole (No. 18) to three feet and converted birdie putt for third win of season (also won three events in 1992). With \$810,000 payday, overtook Mike Weir and Tiger Woods for lead on Official Money List with \$3,685,645. Finished T4 at the British Open, his best finish in a major since finishing second at the 1999 Masters. Three weeks later, became second player on the year to go wire-to-wire on his way to his second victory at THE INTERNATIONAL (first came in 1990). Finished 12 points ahead of his nearest competitors—Retief Goosen and Vijay Singh. Surpassed \$25-million mark in career earnings. Joined Phil Mickelson as only two players to win the Castle Pines, CO, event twice. Finished with 46 points, two shy of Modified Stableford scoring format record held by Mickelson (1997) and Ernie Els (2000). Set the 36-hole point record with 36 points (Ernie Els/34 points/2000). Posted three eagles during the second round, the first player to do so during the year. Recorded eighth top 10 of 2003 with solo third at WGC-NEC Invitational, five strokes behind champion Darren Clarke. Recorded a 416-yard drive on the par-5 16th hole during the final round and led the field in driving distance. Next top-10 came two months later, a T5, at the FUNAI Classic at the WALT DISNEY WORLD Resort, where he was one of two players (Singh the other) to record four rounds in the 60s. Played in fifth Presidents Cup for the United States. Won second Target World Challenge in December and earned \$1.2 million.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: 2002: First-round leader at the Masters after carding bogey-free 5-under-par 67. Finished T14. First of six top-10 finishes came at the WORLDCOM CLASSIC, a T5. Closing 66 left him one stroke shy of Hoch, who finished with 64. Member of the 2001 Ryder Cup team member. 2000: A season of second- and third-place finishes. T18 at Phoenix Open, worth \$41,728, moved him past Greg Norman and into first place on PGA TOUR career money list. Hold on career money position was short-lived, taken away by Tiger Woods, who finished T2 at Buick Invitational. En route to T3 finish at MCI Classic, toured course in 95 putts, tying for third-lowest total since TOUR began keeping stats in 1980. Shared first- and third-round lead and held second-round lead outright at GTE Byron Nelson Classic. Closing 69 resulted in a berth in the three-man playoff won by Jesper Parnevik. Member of his fourth President's Cup Team. 2000 President's Cup record 4-0-0 for a four-year total of 12-5-2. Won Williams World Challenge, shooting a final-round 64. Father Davis Love, Jr. selected posthumously as the recipient of Harvey Penick Teaching Award. 1999: Though he went without a victory for the first time in four years, the season was still a success. Finished third on money list with career-high \$2,475,328. 13 top-10s included four runner-up finishes. Had to withdraw after three rounds of MCI Classic due to sore back. Was told to take week off, but as defending champion, wanted to play. Ailment diagnosed as recurring problem with lower back disk. Advised by doctors to take at least two weeks off between WGC-NEC Invitational and Ryder Cup to recover from pinched nerve in back. Injury first flared at Sprint International. Went 19 days without touching club. Pinched nerve caused pain in shoulder and back and numbness in fingers. 1998: 13th career victory came at MCI Classic, which he had won three times previously. Posted a seven-stroke win over Glen Day. 1997: Earned first major championship at PGA Championship at Winged Foot CC. Rounds of 66-71-66-66 gave him five-stroke victory over Justin Leonard. Earned second victory of year at the Buick Challenge where, after setting the 54-hole record at 189, he was a four-stroke winner over Stewart Cink. 1996: In third start of season, trailed by four after 54 holes of Buick Invitational before posting final-round 64 for three-stroke win over Phil Mickelson. Three-time runner-up that year, finishing one behind Steve Jones at U.S. Open and losing playoffs to Michael Bradley at Buick Challenge and Tiger Woods at Las Vegas Invitational. Won World Cup individual title at TPC at Mission Hills in Shenzhen, China, defeating former PGA TOUR player Hisayuki Sasaki of Japan in a playoff. 1995: After winless 1994, won Freeport-McMoRan Classic in playoff over Mike Heinen to earn place at the following week's Masters Tournament. In contention until double bogey on par-3 17th hole on Sunday when he hit tee shot over the green into water hazard...Held one-stroke lead through 36 and 54 holes at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. Went on to win by two over Nick Price. Won for the first time in his 40s and recorded his fifth multiple-win season of his career. One of 11 players to win on the PGA TOUR over the age of 40. Named PGA TOUR Player of the Month for May...Along with Jim Furyk, set the U.S. Open record for best first 36 holes with a 7-under 133. His 7-under 63 during the second round tied Johnny Miller (1973), Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf (1980) for best 18-hole score in U.S. Open history. Won by three strokes over Els...Enjoyed T8 at U.S. Open despite third-round 80...Had LASIK surgery on May 31...Placed second at Grand Slam of Golf when Tiger Woods eagled 18th hole to tie him. Woods then eagled same hole in playoff...Finished season with eight top-10s. **1999:** Earned his eighth career TOUR victory in March at the Honda Classic. Leader by five strokes through 54 holes after opening 70-69-66. Despite a quadruple-bogey eight on the 72nd hole, held off Vijay Singh, Robert Gamez and Brent Geiberger by two shots for eighth career PGA TOUR title. Final-round 1-over-par 73 was the highest final-round total for winner on PGA TOUR since Justin Leonard's 2-over-par 73 at the 2002 MCI Heritage. With the victory, exceeded the \$1-million mark in official earnings in a single season for the fifth consecutive year. Third top-10 in four starts was a T5 at the U.S. Open. It was his best career finish at the tournament, topping a T16 at the 2000 event. Carded four rounds in the 60s (68-67-65-64—264) to capture the FedEx St. Jude Classic for ninth career PGA TOUR victory. Has reached multiple TOUR victories in three seasons (1999, 2001, 2003). In overcoming 54-hole leader Richard S. Johnson with 7-under-par 64, matched low final round in winning effort (2001 COMPAQ Classic of New Orleans). With the victory and \$810,000 paycheck, moved into 10th place on all-time TOUR money list. "It was pretty special for me to win here," Toms said following the win in Memphis. "I just have so many people that I'm friends with here, my golf teacher (Rob Akins) is here, and the place is pretty dear to me." Held a share of the 36-hole lead with Chris Riley at the WGC-NEC Invitational, opening 66-67 (7-under-par) to lead Vijay Singh and Fred Funk by one stroke. Struggled on the weekend with rounds of 76-74 to finish T33. Posted a fifth-place finish

at the WGC-American Express Championship. First-time United States participant at The Presidents Cup in South Africa. Underwent surgery on his left wrist on Dec. 9 to remove bone spurs. Planned to return to action in late January 2004.

Win for Canadian-born Weir was sixth consecutive victory by an international player on the PGA TOUR, dating back to final two events of 2002. Entered final day four shots behind Tim Herron but final-round 67, tied for low final-round score, helped him edge Jay Haas by two strokes. Birdied 16 and 17 to tie Haas, and birdied par-5 18th hole to secure win and \$810,000 paycheck. Trophy was presented to Weir by former United States President Gerald Ford, a long-time Hope Pro-Am participant... Continued strong play on the West Coast at AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, finishing T3 while paired with boyhood idol and hockey legend Wayne Gretzky in pro-portion of event. After earning \$843,890 in 2002, cracked \$1-million mark in just third event with \$290,000 payday... Won for second time in four events at the Nissan Open, finishing strong with a final-round 5-under 66. Defeated Charles Howell III with a birdie on the second playoff hole after beginning the final round seven strokes behind Howell. Payday moved him past the \$2-million mark for the third time in the last four seasons... Finished T17 at the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship. His 26-hole first-round victory over Loren Roberts was the longest non-championship match in the history of the event... Named PGA TOUR Player of the Month for February... Winner of West Coast Swing presented by The St. Paul, earning a bonus of \$500,000... Captured his first major championship victory at the Masters. After recording just the fourth bogey-free final-round by a winner in the 67-year history of the Masters (first since Doug Ford in 1957), defeated Len Mattiace in a playoff with a bogey on the first extra hole. Nailed a six-footer for par on the 18th hole to force the playoff. Held a four-stroke lead through 36 holes but trailed third-round leader Jeff Maggert by two with 18 holes to play. All six of his TOUR wins have been in come-from-behind fashion. Became first lefthander since Bob Charles at the 1963 British Open to win a major. Also became the first Canadian to win a major and the first Canadian to win three times in a season. Victory jumped him from 10th on the Official World Golf Ranking to fifth. Broke Byron Nelson's long-standing record for consecutive cuts with his 114th straight at THE TOUR Championship. With victory at the WGC-American Express Championship, became the first player in PGA TOUR history to win five times in five consecutive seasons. Since 1981, Nick Price (1994) is the only other player to win five times in a single season. Captured his record fifth consecutive Byron Nelson Award and the PGA America's Vardon Trophy, based on each player's adjusted scoring average. Finished the season with an adjusted scoring average of 68.41, the second-lowest in TOUR history. Won record fifth consecutive PGA Player of the Year Award. Finished second on money list with \$6,673,413, the fourth-highest single season amount and \$900,494 behind Vijay Singh. Underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left knee on December 12, 2002 following Target World Challenge. Surgery was performed by Dr. Thomas Rosenberg at HealthSouth Surgical Center in Park City, UT. During the one-

hour procedure, fluid on the outside and inside of anterior cruciate ligament was removed, and several benign cysts were removed. Missed first five events of 2003 due to subsequent rehabilitation. Captured 35th career TOUR title in first start of season at Buick Invitational. After opening 70-66, took 54-hole lead with third-round 68, one stroke ahead of Brad Faxon. Playing with Faxon and Phil Mickelson in final group Sunday, carded final-round 68 to clinch four-shot win over Carl Pettersson. Victory marked eighth consecutive season with at least one win on the PGA TOUR, dating back to 1996. Won the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship and became the first player to complete the World Golf Championships sweep by capturing all four WGC events in his career. Beat David Toms, 2 and 1, in the 36-hole final at La Costa Resort and Spa. He becomes the highest seed (No. 1) in Accenture Match Play history to win. Career Accenture Match Play Championship record is 14-3. Won the Bay Hill Invitational for the fourth consecutive year, becoming the first player in 73 years to win the same event four consecutive times (Gene Sarazen was the last—Miami Open 1926, 1928-1930). Fought through wet conditions and a case of food poisoning during final round. After holding second- and third-round leads, set tournament record with 11-stroke victory, breaking Fred Couples' margin of nine strokes in 1992. Victory marked the quickest time period to reach three victories to start a season. Made his 100th consecutive cut in his 131st career TOUR start. His career-best streak of 10 consecutive top-10 finishes dating back to his win at the 2002 Buick Open was snapped with his T11 finish at THE PLAYERS Championship. Effort to win third consecutive Masters fell short with T15 finish. Made 102nd consecutive cut on the number and then fired a third-round 66 to move within four strokes of the lead. However, shot a final-round 75. Moved to 11th all-time in PGA TOUR victories (38) with wire-to-wire victory (fifth of career) at the 100th Western Open, carding rounds of 63-70-65-69—267 to tie Scott Hoch's 72-hole tournament scoring record. Opening 9-under-par 63 tied the 18-hole tournament record and was his lowest round of 2003. With 106th consecutive made cut, moved ahead of Jack Nicklaus into second place for all-time consecutive cuts behind Byron Nelson's 113. Led by six shots entering the final round and is now 29-2 when leading/co-leading through 54 holes. Total of 104 putts on the week tied career low (1997 GTE Byron Nelson Classic and 2000 WGC-NEC Invitational). Earned \$185,000 with his T4 finish at British Open to re-claim the TOUR Official Money List lead over Mike Weir with \$4,546,496. In defense of Buick Open title, carded four rounds in the 60s to finish T2, two strokes behind champion Jim Furyk. Posted lowest career finish at a major as a professional, T39 at PGA Championship. One week later, T4 at WGC-NEC Invitational broke streak of three consecutive NEC Invitational wins at Firestone CC (1999-01). With \$235,000 payday, surpassed the \$5-million mark for the fifth consecutive season on the PGA TOUR. Finished T7 at the inaugural Deutsche Bank Championship for 10th top-10, fifth season with double-digit top-10 finishes. Proceeds from Deutsche Bank event benefit the Tiger Woods Foundation, with all four days sold out (in excess of 30,000 spectators each day) at the Boston-area event. Successfully defended a title for the 10th time in his career at the WGC-American Express Championship where he held the second- and third-round leads. Regained the top spot on the money list after his TOUR-leading fifth victory and his seventh official WGC title in 13 events. Finished T2 to Vijay Singh at the FUNAI Classic at the Walt Disney World Resort. Played in his third Presidents Cup in November.

The firefighters, who had spent the majority of their time at Ground Zero since the initial terrorist strikes, were part of a larger contingent honored by the city of Jacksonville for their heroics.

He must play in at least 15 PGA TOUR co-sponsored or approved tournaments in each calendar year to retain voting membership. He must also attend at least one player meeting designated by the PGA TOUR during each calendar year.

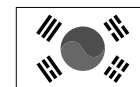

NOTES

The eight-stroke victory by **Ernie Els** was the largest on the PGA TOUR since **Mark Calcavecchia's** eight-stroke win at the 2001 Phoenix Open. That year, Calcavecchia tied the previous mark for the best score in relation to par in a 72-hole tournament (28-under par, **John Huston**, 1998 United Airlines Hawaiian Open). **Rocco Mediate** finished second behind both Els and Calcavecchia during the record-setting tournaments. The tournament record for largest margin of victory is 13 strokes by **Gene Littler** in 1955.

With his 31-under par, **Ernie Els** not only broke the 72-hole tournament record but the best first 72 holes mark as well. **Joe Durant** set that record with a score of 29-under par through the first four rounds of the 2001 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Over the last six seasons on the PGA TOUR, **Ernie Els** has begun his year with a top-five finish in five of those six seasons. He also picked up a victory in his first TOUR event of the season for the second time in his career. The first came at the 1999 Nissan Open.

The best finish by the 18 first-timers in attendance came from **K.J. Choi** who tied for second. Four of the first-timers finished in the top 10 — **Jonathan Byrd** (T6), **Chris Riley** (T6) and **Jerry Kelly** (T10).

The T6 finish by **Jim Furyk** was his fifth consecutive top-10 finish at the Mercedes Championships in Kapalua. He finished 9th, T4, 1st and 4th over the first four years. Furyk is the only player to play all five tournaments since the Mercedes Championships moved to Hawaii in 1999.

NOTES

Prior to 2003, **David Duval** was the only player in the previous four years at The Plantation Course to finish the tournament at 20-under or better. In 2003, 11 players accomplished the feat, and the winner, **Ernie Els**, broke the 30-under plateau.

Out of the 144 rounds that were played in 2003 on The Plantation Course, just nine rounds came in over par. Despite all the sub-par rounds, only **Ernie Els** was able to record four rounds in the 60s. Els became the third player to record four rounds in the 60s at Kapalua. **David Duval** was the first to do so in 1999 and **Jim Furyk** followed suit during his 2001 victory.

The course scoring average finished in the 60s for all four rounds of the 2003 tournament. That's a first for The Plantation Course. In fact, each round's scoring average was a tournament low. The final round finished with an average of 68.333. The previous final-round low (70.031) came during the 2002 event.

The 63s by **Jonathan Byrd** and **Rocco Mediate** set a new final-round low for the tournament. The previous mark of 64 was held by six players, including last year's champion **Sergio Garcia**.

Ernie Els collected seven victories in the last calendar year, including the 2002 Heineken Classic, Dubai Desert Classic and Cisco World Match Play on the European PGA Tour, the Nedbank Golf Challenge in South Africa and his three PGA TOUR victories.

With his win, Ernie Els moved into the No. 1 spot on the 2003 money list, the highest ranking of his career on the PGA TOUR season money list.

Ernie Els has recorded a first, second (2000) and a third (2001) at the Mercedes Championships. His victory came in his sixth appearance in this tournament.

Ernie Els has now won at least once in nine of the 10 seasons he has played on the PGA TOUR. He did not win a tournament in 2001.

Ernie Els became the first player since **Steve Jones** (1989 MONY Tournament of Champions, Bob Hope Chrysler Classic) to win the first two tournaments of the PGA TOUR season. In 1974, **Johnny Miller** won the first three events of the year: Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, Phoenix Open and Dean Martin Tucson Open. There have been four other occasions where a player has won the first two events of a season: 1983, **Gil Morgan** (Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, Glen Campbell L.A. Open); 1975, **Miller** (Phoenix Open, Dean Martin Tucson Open), 1953, **Lloyd Mangrum** (L.A. Open, Bing Crosby Pro-Am Invitational), and 1946, **Byron Nelson** (L.A. Open, San Francisco Open).

Ernie Els became the first player since **Tiger Woods** (2000 Mercedes Championships, AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am) to win in his first two starts of the season.

Ernie Els posted four consecutive rounds in the 60s for the second consecutive week and has posted all 12 of his rounds at the Sony Open in Hawaii in the 60s. He opened the season with a two-event total score of 47-under par.

Ernie Els is one of only three players who currently have recorded multiple wins in consecutive seasons (2002-03). **Tiger Woods** (1999-2003) and **Vijay Singh** (2002-2003) are the others. This is the third time in Els' career that he has won twice in the same season.

Mike Weir's 30-under-par 330 total in 2003 matched fellow left-hander **Phil Mickelson's** winning total in 2002. Weir became the first lefty to win on the PGA TOUR since Mickelson won the 2002 Canon Greater Hartford Open.

Since 2000, 356 eagles — an average of 89 per year — have been made at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. In 2003, 106 eagles were carded, led by **Joey Sindelar's** four. Ironically, the champion **Mike Weir** and runner-up **Jay Haas** only posted one eagle each at the 2003 Hope.

2003 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic runner-up **Jay Haas** was looking to join **Raymond Floyd** (1960-70-80-90s) and **Sam Snead** (1930-40-50-60s) in winning TOUR events in four different decades. Haas captured his first win at the Andy Williams-San Diego Open Invitational in 1978 and also won in the 1980s and 1990s. His last win came in 1993 at the H-E-B Texas Open.

The last 11 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic winners have averaged 16-under-par on the par 5s, with **Mike Weir** 15-under-par en route to victory in 2003. **Robert Gamez** led all players in the field in 2003 on the par 5s at 22-under-par.

With the veteran **Mike Weir's** fourth TOUR victory at the 2003 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, **Donnie Hammond** (1986) remains the last player to earn his first TOUR victory at the Hope, a streak of 18 years. Hammond and **Bill Rogers** (1978) are the only two first-time winners in the 44 years of the Hope.

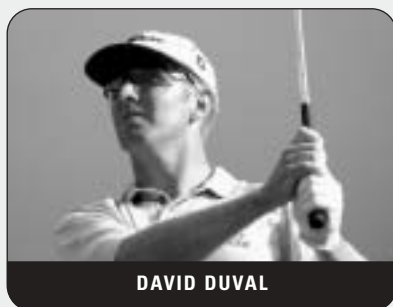

David Duval was the last player to shoot 59 on the PGA TOUR and the third in history, joining **Al Geiberger** (1977) and **Chip Beck** (1991). His feat came at the 1999 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Duval shot his 59 in the final round at PGA West's Palmer Course on Jan. 24. Duval recorded one eagle and 11 birdies in his round and won by one stroke over **Steve Pate**. He rallied from a seven-stroke deficit after four rounds.

Eligibility Requirements for the 2004 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic

Eligible players in the 128-player field are:

- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship prior to 1996.
- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship (only since 1996), Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship from 1994 to 1997 and from 1999 to 2003. Beginning with the 1998 winners of these events, winners are eligible for five years.
- Winners of the NEC World Series of Golf in the last 10 years (1994-1997).
- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winners of official money World Golf Championship events in the last three years (2001-2003).
- The leader from the final Official PGA TOUR Money List in each of the last five calendar years (1999-2003).
- Playing members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team (2002).
- Current PGA TOUR members who were playing members from the last named U.S. and International Presidents Cup teams (2003).
- PGA TOUR members who use an exemption for 2004 as one of the leaders (either top 25 or top 50) from the Official PGA TOUR Career Money List.
- Winners of the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic prior to 1999, and winners of the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in 1999 and beyond, for a period of ten years following their win.
- Either the current winner of the PGA Section Championship or the current PGA Section Player of the Year where the tournament is played, as determined by the Section.
- Eight sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Two from among the current year's PGA TOUR membership
 - Two from among the 2003 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties and the first through 20th finishers from the 2003 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
- Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.
- Life members of the PGA TOUR.
- PGA TOUR members from the current Tournament Winners category.
- If necessary to complete the field, those PGA TOUR members among the top 125 finishers on the 2003 Official PGA TOUR Money List, in order of their position on such list.
- If necessary to complete the field, PGA TOUR members from the 2004 priority ranking of eligible players after the top 125, in order of their positions on such list.

The 2003 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am was **Tom Lehman's** first runner-up finish since a T2 at the 2001 Invensys Classic at Las Vegas.

Marco Dawson's T15 finish was his highest on TOUR since a T11 at the 1997 Freeport-McDermott Classic. Dawson bounced back and forth between the PGA TOUR and the Nationwide Tour the past four years.

Spyglass Hill, Poppy Hills and Pebble Beach were ranked first, second and third on the toughest courses of the season list at the conclusion of the tournament. They were the first three courses this season to play to an over-par scoring average. All three are par-72 courses, with Spyglass averaging 74.592, Poppy Hills 74.023 and Pebble Beach 72.794.

The Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am were played in consecutive weeks in 2003. The last time two celebrity pro-ams were played in back-to-back weeks on the PGA TOUR was 1993 when the TOUR played the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in consecutive weeks.

The player either holding or sharing the 54-hole lead has gone on to victory 19 times out of 40 72-hole tournaments at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. **Davis Love III**

became the first player since **Brett Ogle** in 1993 to eventually go on to victory.

Phillip Price became the first player in 2003 to record three eagles in a round. Price eagled Nos. 4, 9 and 10 at Poppy Hills GC in the third round. Unfortunately, he posted a quintuple-bogey 10 on the par-5 12th hole, the fourth of five par-5 holes at Poppy Hills, and later withdrew from the tournament with a back injury after 14 holes. His withdrawal during the round means his round is not considered official. Had he not withdrawn, he would have become just the 13th player since 1970 to record three eagles in a round.

The score of 7-under 137 by leader **Jim Furyk** was the highest 36-hole total for a leader at the AT&T since 1990 when **Payne Stewart** and **Rocco Mediate** shared the lead at 7-under par.

NOTES

Spyglass Hill Golf Course, one of the courses utilized for the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, opened in 1966. The names given to each of the holes are derived from Robert Louis Stevenson's classic, "Treasure Island."

The par-3 17th hole has played quite a role in two of the four U.S. Opens played at Pebble Beach. In 1972, **Jack Nicklaus** hit 1-iron close and made birdie to sew up the tournament. In the 1982 battle between Nicklaus and **Tom Watson**, Watson needed birdie to win but missed the 17th green. He sank his chip shot to take a one-stroke lead and then birdied the 18th hole to win by two. **Tom Kite** won the 1992 U.S. Open at Pebble and Tiger Woods won in 2000.

The par-3 fifth hole at Pebble Beach was rebuilt and reopened in 1998. The redesign was performed by **Jack Nicklaus**, and is located along the Pacific coastline on a 50-foot cliff. At a cost of \$3 million, No. 5 is possibly the most expensive new hole in championship golf.

In May 2002, a 67-foot cypress tree was uprooted from the first hole, hauled across the famous golf layout at Pebble Beach and finally transplanted near the 18th green. The original tree near the 18th green was taken down in August 2001 after being struck by lightning and because of disease. The entire process of moving a tree from No. 1 to No. 18 was completed in three days and never disrupted play at the course.

Eligibility Requirements for 2004 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am

Eligible players in the 180-professional field are those players listed in order of priority under Section III-A of the Tournament Regulations, except that prior to such players, the following shall first be eligible:

- Winners of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am prior to 2000, and winners of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in 2000 and beyond for a period of five years following their win.
- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship prior to 2000, and winners of these events in 2000 and beyond for a period of five years following their win.
- 16 sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Four from the current year's PGA TOUR membership.
 - Eight from among the 2003 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties and the first through 20th finishers on the 2003 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
 - Four "unrestricted" that must be awarded to professionals.

NOTE: The sponsor will team each professional player with an amateur player. The PGA TOUR shall group the professional players and assign starting times. After three rounds, the field will be cut to the low 60 professionals and ties and exactly the low 25 pro-am teams. Professionals placing 61st to 70th and ties will receive official prize money normally distributed to those places.

NOTES

Tiger Woods earned his 35th career PGA TOUR victory in his eighth season as a professional and in doing so he collected at least one victory in a season for the eighth consecutive year. The record is 17 consecutive years with a victory held by **Jack Nicklaus** (1962-78) and **Arnold Palmer** (1955-71).

Tiger Woods won his first event of the TOUR season for the third time in his career (1997 and 2000 Mercedes Championships) and became the all-time money leader at the Buick Invitational with \$1,968,600.

Tiger Woods has finished in the top five in six consecutive Buick Invitionals including two victories (2003 and 1999). The other finishes: 1998 (T3), 2000 (T2), 2001 (4) and 2002 (T5). He also has recorded 17 of his 23 rounds at Torrey Pines in the 60s and carries a scoring average of 68.09 at this tournament. His Sunday scoring average on the South Course is even better than that at 67.0.

Speaking of top-10 finishes, **Brad Faxon** has now finished in the top-10 four times at the Buick Invitational. Faxon's third-place finish in 2003 was his first in the top-10 at the Buick Invitational since he finished T8 in 1991. Others included a T2 in 1989 and T5 in 1988.

When **Mike Weir** collected his second title of the season at the 2003 Nissan Open, it marked the first time since 1989 that two players (**Ernie Els**, the other) had won twice on the West Coast. In 1989, it was **Mark Calcavecchia** and **Steve Jones**.

Mike Weir's win at the 2003 Nissan Open was the first by a Canadian at that event and the first by a lefthander. The Nissan Open began in 1926.

With his second victory of the season at the 2003 Nissan Open, **Mike Weir** became the first Canadian to win twice in one season on the TOUR since **George Knudson** won Phoenix and Tucson in 1968.



FRED COUPLES

Fred Couples finished in a T7 at the 2003 Nissan Open for his 11th top-10 finish in 21 years at the event. He won it in 1990 and 1992. He was one of five age 40-plus players to finish in the top 10 in 2003 in Los Angeles, joining **Fred Funk** (T3), **Nick Price** (T3), **Dan Forsman** (T10) and **Duffy Waldorf** (T10).

NOTES

The tournament began as the Los Angeles Open in 1926 and was contested at Los Angeles CC. The name changed to Nissan Los Angeles Open in 1989 and then to Nissan Open in 1995. Over the years, the PGA TOUR event has been held at 11 different courses.

There have been 14 playoffs at the Nissan Open, including last year when **Mike Weir** made birdie on the second playoff hole to defeat **Charles Howell III**. The most memorable playoff came in 2001, when six players matched the PGA TOUR record for most participants in an extra-hole event, set at the 1994 GTE Byron Nelson Classic. **Robert Allenby** beat **Brandel Chamblee**, **Toshi Izawa**, **Dennis Paulson**, **Jeff Sluman** and **Bob Tway**.

Mike Weir looks to become the sixth golfer to win back-to-back Nissan Opens in 2004. **Macdonald Smith** (1928-29) was the first to win in consecutive years, followed by **Ben Hogan** (1947-48), **Paul Hareney** (1964-65), **Arnold Palmer** (1966-67) and **Corey Pavin** (1994-95).

Charles Howell III's 7-under-par 28 on the front nine in the third round of the 2002 Nissan Open tied the tournament record set by **Andrew Magee** in 1991. Howell's third-round 64 boosted him to a T6 finish in his first career appearance at the Nissan Open. **Brad Faxon** fired a 28 in the final round of the 1995 PGA Championship held at Riviera Country Club.

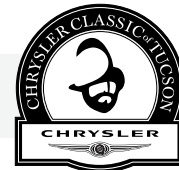

Campbell made a bogey, while Lickliter saved his par to win by two strokes.

Reigning U.S. Amateur champion **Ricky Barnes** (Senior/University of Arizona) posted a final-round 70 to wind up at 11-under par and tied for 18th. Barnes' finish was the best by an amateur since **Justin Rose** tied for fourth at the 1998 British Open. Had Barnes been a professional last year, he would have earned \$39,120. Barnes led the tournament in Driving Distance (310.5 yards), followed by third-place finisher **Brenden Pappas** (306.0).

Chad Campbell posted a 5-under 67 Sunday to move into second place. Campbell recorded back-to-back top-10 finishes for the first time in his career. Campbell had only two top-10 finishes during his rookie season on TOUR in 2002 when he finished No. 81 on the money list. In the 2003 third round, Campbell posted a career-low 9-under 63.

NOTES

The Monday playoff finish between **Scott Hoch** and **Jim Furyk** was the first Monday finish on the PGA TOUR since the 2001 Buick Classic, won by **Sergio Garcia** with Hoch finishing second, three shots behind. The 2002 Southern Farm Bureau Classic was set for a Monday finish due to weather but conditions proved to be unplayable and **Luke Donald** was crowned the champion.

With his victory at the 2003 Ford Championship at Doral, **Scott Hoch** became the oldest winner (47 years, 3 months, 17 days) on the PGA TOUR since 48 year-old **Tom Watson** won the 1998 MasterCard Colonial.

Scott Hoch improved his career playoff record to 2-2 with his playoff victory over **Jim Furyk**. He lost to **Nick Faldo** in the 1989 Masters Tournament, defeated **Robert Wrenn** in the 1989 Las Vegas Invitational and lost to **Payne Stewart** in the 1995 Shell Houston Open.

The time between **Scott Hoch's** first win (1980 Quad Cities Open) and his most recent (2003 Ford Championship at Doral) is 22 years, 7 months & 21 days – the eighth-longest span in TOUR history.

In 2003, **Tim Petrovic** birdied seven holes in a row in the third round, starting at the par-4 6th. His streak proved to be tied for second on TOUR in 2003.

Billy Mayfair put together the second-best birdie-eagle streak on TOUR in 2003 in the third round. Mayfair ran off a 7-under stretch over six holes (B-B-B-E-B-B) starting at the 5th hole and ending at the 10th.

With his victory at the 2003 Honda Classic, **Justin Leonard** has come from behind in four of his eight wins on the PGA TOUR: 1997 Kemper Open, 1997 British Open Championship, 1998 PLAYERS Championship and 2003 Honda Classic.

Five of **Justin Leonard's** eight wins have included final rounds of 67 or better: 2000 Westin Texas Open at LaCantera (64), 1997 British Open (65), 1998 PLAYERS Championship (67), 1997 Kemper Open (67) and 2003 Honda Classic (66).

The winning 2003 total by **Justin Leonard** of 24-under-par 264 breaks the previous 72-hole record at The Honda Classic of 266 by **Blaine McCallister** in 1989 at the TPC at Eagle Trace.

NOTES

Tiger Woods' 11-stroke victory in the 2003 Bay Hill Invitational bettered the tournament record for largest margin of victory, nine strokes, set by **Fred Couples** in 1992. His margin was the largest on the PGA TOUR since Woods won the 2000 WGC-NEC Invitational by 11 strokes.

Tiger Woods' 11-stroke victory margin is the fourth time in his PGA TOUR career that he has won a tournament by 10 or more strokes. Woods won the 2000 U.S. Open by 15 shots, the 1997 Masters Tournament by 12 shots and the 2000 WGC-NEC Invitational by 11 strokes.

Tiger Woods won the Bay Hill Invitational for the fourth consecutive time, becoming the first player in 73 years to win the same event four consecutive times. **Gene Sarazen** was the last, winning the Miami Open in 1926, 1928-30. **Tom Morris, Jr.** (1868-71, 72 British Opens) and **Walter Hagen** (1924-27 PGA Championship) also accomplished the feat.

At the 2003 Bay Hill Invitational, **Tiger Woods** recorded his 100th consecutive cut on the PGA TOUR.

The Bay Hill Invitational has always drawn a strong international field, but in the 37-year history of the tournament, only one foreign-born player has emerged victorious—South Africa's **Ernie Els** in 1998.

One of the more distinctive prizes in golf is the Bay Hill Invitational trophy. It is handcrafted by the Wilkinson Company, which has a tradition in sword-making extending back more than 200 years. The sword, Scottish in recognition of the home of golf, is based on the 16th century Highland Claymore. The front surface of the blade is etched with a design of American flags and laurel spray, along with a scroll bearing the legend "The Bay Hill Trophy." The reverse face of the blade is etched to contain three elements: the cross of St. Andrews, the high-swing profile of **Arnold Palmer** and the ball/eagle pommel (weight at the top of the grip) design.

- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship from 1994 to 1997 and from 1999 to 2003. Beginning with the 1998 winners of these events, winners will be eligible for five years.
- Winners of the NEC World Series of Golf in the last 10 years (1994-1997).
- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winners of the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship in the last three years (2002-2004).
- Winners of the WGC-NEC Invitational and WGC-American Express Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winners of PGA TOUR cosponsored or approved tournaments, whose victories are considered official, since the previous year's Bay Hill Invitational.
- Playing members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team (2002).
- Current PGA TOUR members who were playing members of the last named U.S. and International Presidents Cup teams (2003).
- The winner of the 2003 U.S. Amateur Championship, if still an amateur player.
- The top 50 players from the Official World Golf Ranking through the Ford Championship.
- 18 sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Two from among the 2003 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties, and the first through 20th finishers on the 2003 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
 - Eight from among the current year's PGA TOUR membership.
 - Eight "unrestricted".
- Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.
- The top 70 players from the 2003 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- Members in the Top 125-Nonmembers category whose official money for the previous year equals or exceeds the amount of official money earned by the player finishing in 70th position on the 2003 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- The top 70 players from the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the Ford Championship.
- Either the current winner of the PGA Section Championship or the current PGA Section Player of the Year where the tournament is played, as determined by the Section.
- If necessary to complete a field of 120 players, those players below 70th position from the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the Ford Championship, in order of their positions on such list.
- In recognition of his remarkable career achievements, indelible contributions to golf and his role as host of the Bay Hill Invitational, a lifetime exemption for Arnold Palmer. (Such exemption will be an addition to the field.)

NOTES

With his final-round 8-under-par 64 in 2003, **Davis Love III** tied **Fred Couples** for low final round at THE PLAYERS Championship. Couples, who played with Love in the final round in 2003, carded a 64 in his winning effort in 1996. The 64 for Love tied for his career third-lowest final round on the PGA TOUR, behind a 62 at the 1992 Kmart Greater Greensboro Open and a 63 at the 2001 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Love's final-round 64 was also his career best in 59 rounds at THE PLAYERS Championship, besting a 66 in 1997 and 1994.

En route to his win in 2003, **Davis Love III** recorded five straight birdies (Nos. 8-12) for the second time during the week.

Davis Love III became the fourth player in 2003 to capture two PGA TOUR events through 13 TOUR events, joining **Ernie Els**, **Mike Weir** and **Tiger Woods**. The last time this occurred was in 1976, when **Ben Crenshaw** (Hawaiian Open, Bing Crosby National Pro-Am), **Johnny Miller** (Bob Hope Desert Classic, NBC Tucson Open), **Hale Irwin** (Glen Campbell Los Angeles Open, Florida Citrus Open) and **Hubert Green** (Greater Jacksonville Open, Doral-Eastern Open) each won two events in the first 11.

Among his many keys to victory, **Davis Love III** was one of just seven players without a three-putt on the week and finished third in overall putting average (1.647). He entered the week 11th on the PGA TOUR in putting average (1.685).

Robert Allenby's 7-under-par 65 tied four others for second-lowest final round in tournament history, most recently accomplished by **Gil Morgan** in 1993.

For the week, the TPC at Sawgrass averaged 72.541, playing easier than the 73.500 in 2002.

Seventeen of the 30 winners of THE PLAYERS Championship have done so in come-from-behind fashion, including the last three: **Tiger Woods** (2001), **Craig Perks** (2002) and **Davis Love III** (2003).

- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship from 1994 to 1997 and from 1999 to 2003. Beginning with 1998, winners will be eligible for five years.
- Winners of the NEC World Series of Golf in the last 10 years (1994-1997).
- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winners of the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship in the last three years (2002-2004).
- Winners of the WGC-NEC Invitational and WGC-American Express Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Any player(s), not otherwise eligible, among the top 50 leaders from the Official World Golf Ranking through the Bay Hill Invitational.
- Any player(s), not otherwise eligible, among the top 10 leaders from the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the Bay Hill Invitational.
- If necessary to complete a field of 144 players, PGA TOUR members from the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List below 10th position through the Bay Hill Invitational, in order of their positions on such list.
- The PLAYERS Championship Committee may invite a player(s), not otherwise eligible, who is a current inductee of the World Golf Hall of Fame. (NOTE: Such a player would be added to the field.)

NOTES

Ben Crane became the third player to win his first PGA TOUR event at the BellSouth Classic, joining **Paul Stankowski** (1996) and **Tommy Aaron** (1970). He also became the first first-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 2003.

Ben Crane tied the course record with a 9-under-par 63 on Sunday. That tied the mark set by **Tiger Woods** in 1998 and matched by **Duffy Waldorf** in 1999. The 63 broke the record for the lowest-final-round score at the BellSouth Classic which was a 64 held by **Greg Norman** (1986), **Bob Tway** (1986), **Fred Funk** (1993) and **Kirk Triplett** (1993). He also broke the back-nine record at the TPC at Sugarloaf with a 7-under 29. Four players held the previous mark of 6-under 30.

Ben Crane broke his personal best scoring round twice during the BellSouth Classic. He shot a 64 on Saturday topping the 65 during the first round of the 2002 Buick Challenge, and then followed that with a final-round 63.

Stewart Cink, a Duluth resident, posted the top Atlanta-area finish with a T6. It was his fifth top-10 finish at the TPC at Sugarloaf in seven career starts.

Talk about length off the tee... Twenty-eight players averaged over 300 yards for their measured drives last year at the TPC at Sugarloaf. The group was led by Australian rookie **James McLean**, who averaged 329.4 yards. The top four players all averaged over 320 yards – **Brent Schwarrock** (326.6), **Hank Kuehne** (325.8) and **Mike Heinen** (322.0).

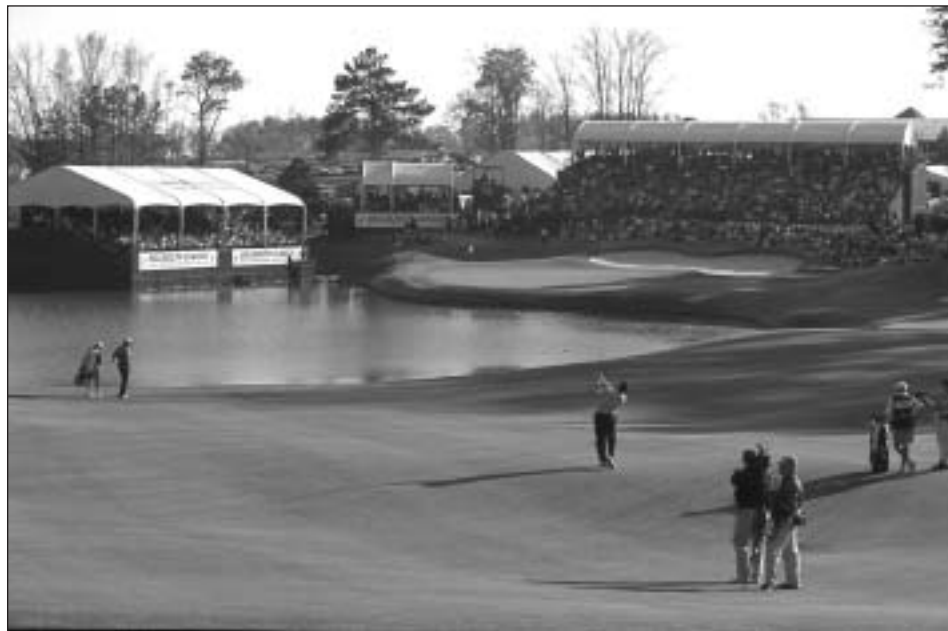

NOTES

The last time the first round of the Masters Tournament was postponed prior to 2003 was March 30, 1939. That same year was also the last time the tournament played 36 holes in one day. The last time a round was postponed at the Masters Tournament was in 1983, when round two was pushed back a day.

The first-round scoring average of 76.204 was the highest opening round on the PGA TOUR since the 1999 British Open at Carnoustie Golf Club. That year the field posted a first-round average of 78.314. It was the highest any round on TOUR since the second round of the 2002 U.S. Open at Bethpage State Park's Black Course (76.474).

The four-stroke lead held by second-round leader **Mike Weir** is the largest 36-hole lead at the Masters Tournament since **Greg Norman** held a four-stroke lead over **Nick Faldo** in 1996. The record for largest 36-hole lead at the Masters is five strokes by **Harry Cooper** in 1936, **Herman Keiser** in 1946, **Jack Nicklaus** in 1975 and **Raymond Floyd** in 1976.

Davis Love III improved his career playoff record to 2-7 with his 2003 win, his other playoff victory coming at the 1995 Freeport McMoRan Classic in New Orleans over **Mike Heinen**. **Woody Austin** dropped to 1-1. Austin defeated **Mike Brisky** in winning his only PGA TOUR event at the 1995 Buick Open.

With his victory at the 2003 MCI Heritage, **Davis Love III** recorded his 10th career top 10 at the MCI Heritage in 18 starts.

Davis Love III joins 17 other players that have won a single PGA TOUR event at least five times. The last player to win an event at least five times was **Mark O'Meara** at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am (1985, 1989, 1990, 1992, and 1997). Record-holder **Sam Snead** won the Greater Greensboro Open eight times between 1938 and 1965.



HAL SUTTON

Hal Sutton's finish (T3) in 2003 was his first top-10 finish since winning the 2001 Shell Houston Open, a span of 50 events.

At 4:18 p.m. on Sunday, there was an eight-way tie for first place when **David Gossett** converted a birdie putt on No. 18 to finish at 12-under-par and take the clubhouse lead.

Six players recorded all four rounds in the 60s in 2003, bringing the all-time MCI Heritage number to 19: **Davis Love III**, **Matt Gogel**, **Steve Flesch**, **Glen Hnatiuk**, **Peter Jacobsen** and **Tim Clark**. The six were the first since **Bernhard Langer** in 2001.

- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winners of the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship in the last three years (2002-2004).
- Winners of the WGC-NEC Invitational and WGC-American Express Championship in the last three years (2001-2003).
- Winner of the 2003 U.S. Amateur Championship, if still an amateur player.
- The leader from the final Official PGA TOUR Money List in each of the last five calendar years (1999-2003).
- Playing members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team (2002).
- Current PGA TOUR members who were playing members from the last-named U.S. and International Presidents Cup teams (2003).
- The 20 players who are leading on the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the BellSouth Classic.
- Five players not otherwise eligible who are leading on the 2004 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the BellSouth Classic.
- The top 50 players from the Official World Golf Ranking through completion of the Bay Hill Invitational.
- Eight sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Two from among the current year's PGA TOUR membership.
 - Two from among the 2003 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties and the first through 20th finishers from the 2003 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
- Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.
- Either the current winner of the PGA Section Championship or the current PGA Section Player of the Year where the tournament is played, as determined by the Section.
- Two qualifiers who are PGA members, from the PGA Section where the tournament is played.
- PGA TOUR members who use an exemption for 2004 as one of the leaders (either top 25 or top 50) on the Official PGA TOUR Career Money List.
- Life members of the PGA TOUR.
- Those PGA TOUR members among the top 125 finishers on the 2003 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- Members in the Top 125-Nonmembers category whose official money for the previous year equals or exceeds the amount of official money earned by the player finishing in 125th position on the 2003 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- PGA TOUR members from the current Tournament Winners category.
- If necessary to complete a field of 132 players, PGA TOUR members from the 2004 priority ranking of eligible players, after the top 125, in order of their positions on such list.

NOTES

The Shell Houston Open was played at Redstone Golf Club in 2003, ending a 27-year association with The Woodlands.

Fred Couples became the sixth player over the age of forty to win the Shell Houston Open, joining **Ed Oliver** (1958), **Roberto de Vincenzo** (1968), **Lee Elder** (1976), **Gene Littler** (1977) and **Hal Sutton** (2001).

During the 2003 Shell Houston Open, **Fred Couples** was the only player to record four rounds in the 60s.

Playing the fourth longest course on TOUR in 2003 season, Redstone Golf Club, 35 players finished the tournament in 2003 above 300 yards in driving distance, led by **John Daly** with an average of 322.8 yards.

Fred Couples defeated runners-up **Mark Calcavecchia**, **Stuart Appleby** and **Hank Kuehne** to win the 2003 Shell Houston Open. It wasn't the first time Couples and Calcavecchia have finished one-two in a tournament. At the 1987 Byron Nelson Classic, Couples defeated Calcavecchia in a three-hole playoff after the two were tied through regulation at 14-under.

In 2003 in Houston, lack of accuracy off the tee didn't seem to bother the leaders. Both Couples and Calcavecchia managed to hit only 29 of 56 fairways (51.8 percent). Kuehne struggled even more (42.9, 24 of 56).

With his victory at the 2002 Shell Houston Open, **Vijay Singh** ended his longest winless stretch on the PGA TOUR since he first played in 1992. Singh had not won since the 2000 Masters, a string of 50 official PGA TOUR starts. His previous longest dry spell lasted 43 tournaments, from the 1995 Buick Classic to the 1997 Memorial Tournament.

NOTES

In 2004, **Steve Flesch** will be looking to become the fifth player to repeat as champion at the 2004 HP Classic of New Orleans. The previous four were **Byron Nelson** (1945-46), **Tom Watson** (1980-81), **Bo Wininger** (1962-63) and **Carlos Franco** (1999-2000).

With **Steve Flesch's** victory in his 174th career PGA TOUR start, it marked the longest string of PGA TOUR events without a first victory since **Kevin Sutherland** won the 2002 WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship in his 184th career start.

With his 2003 victory, **Steve Flesch** became the seventh lefthander to win on the PGA TOUR. The others: **Bob Charles**, **Sam Adams**, **Ernie Gonzalez**, **Phil Mickelson**, **Mike Weir**, **Russ Cochran**.

With his seven-stroke come-from behind victory at the 2003 HP Classic of New Orleans, **Steve Flesch** tied **Mike Weir** (Nissan Open) for second-largest comeback of 2003.



BOB ESTES

Steve Flesch's final-round scoring average entering the 2003 HP Classic of New Orleans was 72.25, T154 on TOUR. He shot a 7-under 65 in the final round to move from T9 to a tie for 1st. He then bested **Bob Estes** with a 35-foot birdie putt on the first playoff hole.

With little wind in 2003 leaving the course defenseless, the field recorded 2,042 birdies. That's over 700 more than the first year the tournament was played at English Turn in 1989 when 1,337 birdies were recorded.

NOTES

David Toms carded a 6-under 66 Saturday to assume a five-stroke lead over three players heading into the final round. Toms held a six-stroke lead heading into the final hole but with a quadruple-bogey eight on the final hole, he won by two. In his six previous stroke-play wins, his largest margin had been three at the 1997 Quad City Classic and the 1999 Buick Challenge.

With his 1-over-par 73 on Sunday, **David Toms** was the first player to shoot over par and win in a PGA TOUR event since **Tiger Woods** 2-over-par 72 at the 2002 U.S. Open. His total also matched **Justin Leonard's** 73 in the final round in winning the 2002 MCI Heritage.

The par-4, 478-yard 18th hole at Quail Hollow Club ranked as the second-toughest hole on TOUR in 2003 at the completion of the event with a 4.478 stroke average, behind Spyglass Hill's 16th hole at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, which played to a 4.486 average. It finished the season tied for sixth.

The last PGA TOUR event to be played at Quail Hollow Club prior to 2003 was the Kemper Open, from 1969 through 1979, until it moved to the state of Maryland. **Peter Jacobsen**, who missed the cut playing on a Sponsor Exemption in 2003, finished T47 at the 1979 Kemper Open at Quail Hollow. **Jay Haas** and **Curtis Strange** were the only other players in the 2003 field who had played at Quail Hollow previously.

The last time a PGA TOUR event was scheduled at Quail Hollow, the PaineWebber Invitational (Champions Tour event) was to be played Sept. 22-24, 1989. It was canceled due to Hurricane Hugo.

The 2003 runner-up **Nick Price** moved into the lead as the top money winner at the EDS Byron Nelson Classic. His second-place check of \$604,800 moved him to \$1,464,808. He has made 16 of 18 cuts, recorded seven top-10s and 13 top-20 finishes in Irving, TX.



NICK PRICE

Players in their 40s fared well in 2003 in Irving, TX. Along with winner **Vijay Singh** (40) and runner-up **Nick Price** (46), **Hal Sutton** (45) finished T6 and **Andrew Magee** (40) finished T9.

Twenty-seven of the 54-hole leaders/co-leaders have gone on to win the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. The last player to win holding the 54-hole lead was **Vijay Singh** in 2003.

In EDS Byron Nelson Championship history, only five players have won the event in their 40s—**Sam Snead** (1957, 1958), **Roberto De Vicenzo** (1966), **John Cook** (1998), **Loren Roberts** (1999) and **Vijay Singh** (2003). **Snead** (46 years, 12 days) is the oldest EDS Byron Nelson Championship champion, winning in 1958.

The EDS Byron Nelson Championship increased its purse \$800,000 in 2003 to a total of \$5,600,000, with the winner receiving \$1,008,000, an increase of \$144,000 for the winner. It was the sixth purse of the 2003 season in which the winner received over \$1 million — **Ernie Els** (Mercedes, \$1,000,000), **Tiger Woods** (WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship, \$1,050,000), **Davis Love III** (PLAYERS Championship, \$1,170,000), **Mike Weir** (Masters, \$1,080,000) and **David Toms** (Wachovia Championship, \$1,008,000).

U.S. OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP

NOTES

In just his second U.S. Open appearance, **Stephen Leaney** posted a runner-up finish. Then again, he is used to overcoming obstacles. Leaney rebuilt his career after a life-threatening medical problem in 1993, when he had two ribs removed and didn't play golf for seven months. According to his doctor, chances were pretty good that he wasn't going to play golf again. With his second-place finish, the first of his PGA TOUR career, Leaney earned a spot on the 2004 TOUR.

Kenny Perry's prior best in a U.S. Open was a tie for 25th in 1993 at Baltusrol when he had a weekend finish of 68-71. In 2003, Perry finished with a 3-under 67 and a 1-under total for the championship, tied for third. It was his best finish in a major since his solo second at the PGA Championship in 1996.

Trip Kuehne, the older brother of PGA TOUR member **Hank Kuehne**, became the low amateur in the 2003 U.S. Open by one stroke over 2002 U.S. Amateur champion **Ricky Barnes**. Kuehne led the Open in driving with a 325.6-yard average, almost 10 yards ahead of **Darren Clarke**, who was second with a driving average of 315.9. Hank led the PGA TOUR in Driving Distance in 2003.

In 2002, **Tiger Woods** became the first person since **Jack Nicklaus** to win both the Masters Tournament and the U.S. Open in the same season. Three others have accomplished the feat – **Craig Wood** (1941), **Ben Hogan** (1951, '53) and **Arnold Palmer** (1960). Only Hogan in 1953 went on to win the British Open.

In 2002, **Tiger Woods** had the sixth wire-to-wire win in U.S. Open history and his second (2000). Others include: **Walter Hagen** (1914), **James Barnes** (1921), **Ben Hogan** (1951, '53) and **Tony Jacklin** (1970).

In 2002, **Tiger Woods** became the first person in history to win multiple U.S. Junior (1991-93), U.S. Amateur (1994-96) and US Open (2000, '02) titles.

In the last 50 years, American players have won 44 U.S. Opens. The only exceptions were four won by South Africans (**Gary Player**, **Ernie Els** twice and **Retief Goosen**), one by an Australian (**David Graham**) and one by an Englishman (**Tony Jacklin**).

NOTES

There have been 12 playoffs in the history of the Buick Classic, including six since 1990. In 2003, **Jonathan Kaye** rolled in an eagle putt on the par-5 18th hole, the first hole of a playoff with **John Rollins**. The last time a PGA TOUR playoff ended with an eagle was **Clarence Rose** at the 1996 Sprint International (over **Brad Faxon**).

In 2004, **Jonathan Kaye** looks to become the fifth multiple winner of the Buick Classic, joining **Jack Nicklaus** (1967, 1972), **Seve Ballesteros** (1983, 1988), **Vijay Singh** (1993, 1995) and **Ernie Els** (1996-97).

Sergio Garcia, the 2001 Buick Classic champion, put together four rounds at par or better in 2003 to improve his current streak at the Buick Classic to 15, the longest current Buick Classic streak of par or better. With his T3 finish in 2003, Garcia has three consecutive top-10s at the Buick Classic.

Jonathan Kaye became the eighth first-time winner at the Buick Classic, joining **Andy North** (1977), **Jack Renner** (1979), **Wayne Grady** (1989), **Vijay Singh** (1993), **J.P. Hayes** (1998) **Dennis Paulson** (2000) and **Chris Smith** (2002).

Six players over the age of 40 finished in the top 10 at the 2003 Buick Classic: **Joey Sindelar**, **Fred Funk**, **Jay Haas**, **Brad Faxon**, **Tom Lehman** and **J.L. Lewis**.

In 2003, **Jim Furyk** was attempting to become the first player to win the week after a U.S. Open victory since **Ernie Els** won the 1997 Buick Classic immediately after capturing the U.S. Open at Congressional Country Club. The last player to win the week after a major championship victory was **Tiger Woods**, who won the PGA Championship and the NEC Invitational in back-to-back weeks in 2000.

Jay Haas made his 25th appearance at the Buick Classic in 2003, tied with **Dave Eichelberger** for most appearances. The 49-year-old made his 19th career cut at Westchester Country Club and finished tied for fourth.

NOTES

With a final-round 64, **David Toms** matched his previous low final round in a winning effort, a 64 at the 2001 Compaq Classic of New Orleans. His career-low final round is a 63 carded at the 1992 Northern Telecom Open.

David Peoples became the second player last season, and one of five total, to finish a tournament with less than 100 putts. Peoples used 99 over the 72-hole tournament. **Chris Riley** needed 95 putts at The Honda Classic. Since the tournament moved to the Tournament Players Club at Southwind in 1989, Peoples is the third player to finish the event in fewer than 100 putts. **Jim McGovern** and **Greg Whisman** had 98 putts in 1992.

Willie Wood recorded the third ace of the tournament on Sunday in 2003. Wood used a 5-iron from 186 yards on the fourth hole. That's a record for most holes-in-one at the TPC at Southwind and the most for any tournament in 2003. The ace was part of a four-hole stretch that included three birdies, two in front of the ace and one behind.

David Peoples aced the par-3 eighth hole on Friday. Peoples used an 8-iron from 174 yards. **Joel Kribel** added another on the par-3 11th hole with an 8-iron from 182 yards.

With a second-place finish in 2003, **Nick Price** has eight top-10 finishes in Memphis and moved into a tie for fourth with **Gil Morgan** for most top-10s at this tournament. The leader in this category is **Gene Littler** with 11. It was Price's sixth top-five finish at this tournament. He's tied for second in this category with **Tom Kite**, one behind Littler. Price has two wins, two seconds, a fourth and a T5.

The 15-under 127 over **Nick Price's** last two rounds in 2003 was a tournament record. The previous best second 36-hole score was 128 by **Jay Haas** in 1992.

With his third title at the 100th Western Open, **Tiger Woods** became the fifth player with three Western Open titles, joining **Macdonald Smith** (1912, 1925, 1933), **Jim Barnes** (1914, 1917, 1919), **Ralph Guldahl** (1936, 1937, 1938) and **Tom Watson** (1974, 1977, 1984).



NICK PRICE

Tiger Woods moved to the top of the money list at the 100th Western Open, with \$1,729,307 in 10 starts and became only the second player to earn over \$1 million at the event, joining **Nick Price** who has earned \$1,054,144 in 18 starts.

Tiger Woods has won five different tournaments on the PGA TOUR three or more times — Bay Hill Invitational (2000-03); Masters Tournament (1997, 2001-02); Memorial Tournament (1999, 2000-01); WGC-NEC Invitational (1999, 2000-01) and the Western Open (1997, 1999, 2003).

Tiger Woods recorded his fifth wire-to-wire title on the PGA TOUR — 2000 U.S. Open, 2000 WGC-NEC Invitational, 2002 U.S. Open, 2002 WGC-American Express Championship, and 100th Western Open.

Tiger Woods became the first player in PGA TOUR history to win four times in five consecutive seasons. Four players had been tied with Woods at four wins in four consecutive seasons. Those tied at four: **Ben Hogan** (1945-48), **Lloyd Mangrum** (1948-1951), **Arnold Palmer** (1960-63) and **Tom Watson** (1977-1980).

SCOTT HOCH

Tiger Woods tied his personal best for fewest putts in a 72-hole tournament with 104 putts in 2003. Woods also had 104 putts at the 1997 GTE Byron Nelson Classic and the 2000 WGC-NEC Invitational.

Tiger Woods won the tournament on the front nine in 2003. He was 18-under on the front, compared to 3-under on the back.

My how the times have changed... **Tiger Woods** took home a combined \$1,620,000 for his three Western Open victories. As a matter of fact, his \$810,000 check in 2003 equaled the amount of money he earned in his first two victories in 1997 (\$360,000) and 1999 (\$450,000). The amounts earned by the other four three-time winners of the Western Open: **Jim Barnes** (\$900), **Macdonald Smith** (\$1,100), **Ralph Guldahl** (\$1,750) and **Tom Watson** (\$152,000).

Loren Roberts has played 78 rounds at the Greater Milwaukee Open, moving to third behind **Jay Haas** (86) and **Andy North** (84). Last year marked Roberts' 21st consecutive Greater Milwaukee Open and the 18th time he has played on the weekend.

Jerry Kelly (T12) was the low Wisconsin native in the field in 2003. Others included **J.P. Hayes** (T20) and **Skip Kendall** (T52).

Last year's Greater Milwaukee Open was profitable for a number of players. Seven of the Top-10 finishers earned their largest checks of the season. **Steve Allan** won \$308,000 (previous best \$8,240); **Heath Slocum** collected \$308,000 (\$182,500); **Brett Quigley** \$168,000 (\$130,000); **Jeff Gallagher** \$118,650 (\$11,342); **Dennis Paulson** \$118,650 (\$84,375); **Chris Smith** \$118,650 (\$75,000) and **Spike McRoy** \$91,000 (\$63,000) all earned their largest paydays of the 2003 season.

Jeff Sluman's 20-under-par effort through 54 holes in 2002 surpassed the Greater Milwaukee Open record of 19-under-par set by **Loren Roberts** in 2000. Sluman's 193 total topped his previous PGA TOUR career best of 197 at the 1998 Greater Milwaukee Open.

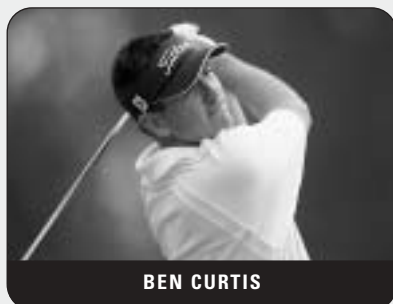

Davis Love III (1), **Tiger Woods** (8), **Vijay Singh** (2), **Nick Faldo** (6) and **Retief Goosen** (1) are five that finished among the top-10 with a total of 18 major victories. With his stunning 2003 victory, **Ben Curtis** (1) made it six players with a total of 19 majors among the top-10 finishers.

With his win at the Open Championship, **Ben Curtis** jumped from 396th to 35th in the Official World Golf Ranking, the biggest jump in the rankings since they began in 1986. Curtis also moved from 142nd to 22nd on the Official Money List with \$1,308,409.

Ben Curtis became the first player since **Francis Ouimet** at the 1913 U.S. Open to win a major championship in his first major appearance. Also the first player to win his first Open Championship start since **Tom Watson** in 1975 and the first player to earn first PGA TOUR victory at a major since **John Daly** in 1991.

NOTES

Ben Curtis joins **Rich Beem** (2002 PGA Championship), **Mike Weir** (2003 Masters Tournament), **Jim Furyk** (2003 U.S. Open) and **Shaun Micheel** (PGA Championship) as first-time major winners over the last two years. The last time there were five consecutive first-time major winners was 1986-87: **Greg Norman** (1986 British Open), **Bob Tway** (1986 PGA Championship), **Larry Mize** (1987 Masters), **Scott Simpson** (1987 U.S. Open) and **Nick Faldo** (1987 British Open).



JIM FURYK

The scoring average for the week at the Open Championship was a season-high 74.821, surpassing the Masters Tournament (74.640). It was the most difficult course on the PGA TOUR since Bethpage State Park's Black Course in 2002 (74.901)... Overall, No. 8 (4.575) and No. 17 (4.489) ranked 1 and 4 on the 2003 PGA TOUR in difficulty... On the first day, the 455-yard, par-4 eighth hole was the most difficult hole on the 2003 PGA TOUR for a single round at 4.832, eclipsing the 18th hole at the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in the final round (4.704) of THE PLAYERS Championship.

The triple-bogey seven on No. 1 in the first round was **Tiger Woods'** first triple-bogey since the sixth hole of his third round at the 2003 Memorial Tournament. Prior to that, Woods hadn't carded a triple since the first hole of the second round of the 2002 Mercedes Championships. To put it in perspective, Woods went 1,606 holes without a triple bogey and has since recorded two in his last 264 holes.

Jerry Kelly's 11 at the opening hole of the first round was the highest score at the first hole of an Open Championship since **Bobby Clampett** took an eight at Royal Birkdale's par-4 first in the opening round in 1983. Kelly withdrew after a first-round 85 due to an inflammation of the sheath covering the tendon of the ring finger on his left hand.

NOTES

From the unusual injury department, **Colin Montgomerie** tripped at his hotel on Thursday morning and injured his wrist. Due to the extent of his injury, he was not able to warm up and withdrew while playing his sixth hole during the first round.

The first-round scoring average of 76.455 was the highest single-round of 2003 on the PGA TOUR, eclipsing the 76.204 in the first round of the Masters Tournament. Only five of the 156 players that started the first round broke par, while seven players finished at level par.

Playing in the 62nd major championship of his career, 36-hole leader **Davis Love III** had never held the 36-hole lead at a major.

Sergio Garcia was the lone player to finish in the top-10 at all four major championships in 2002. Five players entered the Open Championship looking to extend major top-10 streaks in 2003 but were unable to do so. **Jim Furyk** (3), **Scott Verplank** (2) and **David Toms** (2) missed the cut while **Mike Weir** (2) and **Ernie Els** (2) both finished outside the top-10.

Nine of the 14 past Open champions competing at the 2003 Open Championship made the cut: **Greg Norman**, **Tom Watson**, **Mark O'Meara**, **Tiger Woods**, **Nick Price**, **John Daly**, **Nick Faldo**, **Tom Lehman**, and **Ernie Els**. Those five not making the cut were: **Justin Leonard**, **Sandy Lyle**, **David Duval**, **Mark Calcavecchia** and **Paul Lawrie**.

The cut of 75 players at 8-over-par was the highest at the Open Championship since 1999 when the cut came at 12-over-par at Carnoustie. The cut is also the highest on the PGA TOUR since 10-over-par made the cut at the 2002 U.S. Open. The highest cut on the PGA TOUR in 2003 before the Open Championship was 5-over-par 149 at the Masters Tournament.

Tiger Woods recorded two eagles on Saturday, on the par-5 fourth and the par-5 seventh. Woods recorded two eagles in a round three times in 2003: the final round of the PLAYERS Championship and the second round of the Buick Open. **Tom Byrum** also recorded two eagles during Saturday's third round, on the par-5 seventh hole and on the par-4 ninth hole.

NOTES

With his victory at the 2003 B.C. Open, **Craig Stadler** becomes just the second player in PGA TOUR history to win a PGA TOUR and Champions Tour event in the same season, having won the Ford Senior Players Championship the week before. The only other player to do so was **Raymond Floyd** in 1992 when he won the Doral-Ryder Open at age 49 and the GTE North Classic later in the season on the Champions Tour.

Craig Stadler, at age 50 years, 1 month, 18 days, became the fifth-oldest player to win a PGA TOUR event, and the first player over the age of 50 to win since **Art Wall** won the 1975 Greater Milwaukee Open at age 51 years, 7 months, 10 days. With his win, Stadler also claimed a check for \$540,000, the largest of his professional career.

In capturing the 2003 B.C. Open, **Craig Stadler** posted four consecutive rounds in the 60s at 67-69-68-63—267. It was the first time Stadler had done so in a PGA TOUR event since the 1995 B.C. Open when he finished T3. His 9-under-par 63 on Sunday tied him for second with three others for low final-round score by a PGA TOUR champion in 2003.

Craig Stadler's eight-stroke comeback win was the largest in B.C. Open history, surpassing the 2002 mark of seven by **Spike McRoy** over **Shaun Micheel**. The eight-stroke comeback was also the best on the PGA TOUR in 2003. **Mike Weir** (Nissan Open) and **Steve Flesch** (HP Classic of New Orleans) made up seven strokes in their wins. The PGA TOUR record is 10 by **Paul Lawrie** at the 1999 British Open.

Peter Jacobsen (1984 and 2003) became the fifth player to record multiple wins at the Greater Hartford Open, joining **Phil Mickelson** (2001-2002), **Paul Azinger** (1987 and 1989), **Billy Casper** (1963, 1965, 1968 and 1973) and **Arnold Palmer** (1956, 1960).

Peter Jacobsen waited 19 years from his first victory at the Greater Hartford Open (1984) to his next. **Hale Irwin** holds the TOUR mark for most years between victories in the same event, with no other wins in that tournament in between, at 21 at the Heritage Classic (1973-1994).



Peter Jacobsen became the 10th player to hold or share the lead during all four rounds in the history of this tournament. Two of them went wire-to-wire: **Tim Norris** (1982) and **Gene Littler** (1959). The others who shared and held the leads: **Rik Massengale** (1976), **Dave Stockton** (1974), **Bob Murphy** (1970), **Art Wall, Jr.** (1966), **Jack Burke, Jr.** (1958), **Arnold Palmer** (1956) and **Sam Snead** (1955).

Peter Jacobsen collected a first-place check of \$720,000. The check was exactly 10 times more than he earned for his first victory in 1984 (\$72,000).

Peter Jacobsen became the oldest winner on TOUR (49 years, 4 months, 23 days) since **Craig Stadler** (50 years, 1 month, 18 days) the prior week at the B.C. Open. Jacobsen also became the oldest winner of the tournament and the seventh-oldest winner in TOUR history.

NOTES

Jim Furyk increased his career earnings in the event to \$1,228,219 and moved from No. 5 to No. 1 on the tournament's all-time money list. He became the first player in tournament history to surpass \$1 million in earnings at the Buick Open and has posted top-10 finishes in four of his last five appearances in Grand Blanc, MI, with a first in 2003, T10 in 2002, T2 in 2001, T9 in 1999.

Jim Furyk has played his last 21 rounds at Warwick Hills Golf and Country Club below par, including 16 rounds in the 60s. The streak dates back to the final round of the 1997 event.

Jim Furyk is the seventh winner in tournament history to post all four rounds in the 60s and just the third in last 10 years (**Kenny Perry**/2001, **Justin Leonard**/1996).

Seventeen players who have either shared or held the third-round lead in the 39 Buick Opens have gone on to win the event, including the last three: **Kenny Perry** (2001), **Tiger Woods** (2002) and **Jim Furyk** (2003).

Last year, **Briny Baird**, **Chris DiMarco**, **Geoff Ogilvy** and **Tiger Woods** finished in a four-way tie for second. That marked the second consecutive season where four players tied for second at the Buick Open. In 2002, it was **Fred Funk**, **Brian Gay**, **Mark O'Meara** and **Esteban Toledo**.

NOTES

Shaun Micheel became the fifth consecutive player to become a first-time major winner, following **Rich Beem**, 2002 PGA Championship; **Mike Weir**, 2003 Masters; **Jim Furyk**, 2003 U.S. Open and **Ben Curtis**, 2003 British Open.

Shaun Micheel's victory made him the fourth first-time major winner of 2003, joining **Mike Weir**, **Jim Furyk** and **Ben Curtis**. This is the first time since 1969 that all of the winners in the four majors were first-time major champions. (1969 - **George Archer**, Masters; **Orville Moody**, U.S. Open; **Tony Jacklin**, British Open; **Raymond Floyd**, PGA Championship).

Shaun Micheel gained a five-year exemption on the PGA TOUR beginning in 2004. He also earned a five-year exemption into the Masters Tournament, U.S. Open and British Open and a 10-year PLAYERS Championship exemption.

Chad Campbell shot a 5-under 65 on Saturday, the best round of the tournament, to tie eventual winner Micheel for the third-round lead. Campbell came to the 18th hole in Sunday's final round one shot behind Micheel. He played to within 20 feet and watched as Micheel hit 7-iron to within inches of the cup to seal the victory. Campbell placed two strokes back, alone in second place.

Chris Riley (T4) and **Jonathan Kaye** (2) were the only two WGC-NEC Invitational "rookies" to finish in the top 10 last year. Others recording their first career top-10s at the WGC-NEC Invitational were **Vijay Singh** (T6), **Trevor Immelman** (T9) and **Brad Faxon** (T9).

Adam Scott became the first sponsor exemption to win on the PGA TOUR since **David Gossett** at the 2001 John Deere Classic.

Adam Scott became the youngest champion on the PGA TOUR at 23 years, 1 month, 16 days, since **Sergio Garcia** won the 2002 Mercedes Championship at 21 years, 11 months and 27 days.

Adam Scott became the second non-member of the PGA TOUR to win an official event during the 2003 season. The other winner was **Darren Clarke** the week prior at the 2003 WGC-NEC Invitational. He became a fully exempt member of the PGA TOUR and earned a two-year exemption on the PGA TOUR that will take him through the 2005 season. This is just the third time since 1990 that more than one non-member has won in a season. In 2001, **Jose Coceres** (WORLD COM CLASSIC), **Retief Goosen** (U.S. Open) and **David Gossett** (John Deere Classic) accomplished the feat, while in 1991 it was amateur **Phil Mickelson** at the Northern Telecom Open and **Ian Woosnam** at the USF&G Classic.

Adam Scott won the tournament on the front nine of the 7,415-yard TPC of Boston course. For the week, he was 15-under on the front, compared to 5-under on the back. Scott also took advantage of the 12 par-5 holes, which he played at 13-under, and led the field with a par-5 scoring average of 3.92.

Adam Scott set the tournament course (9-under 62), the 36-hole (11-under 131), the 54-hole (15-under 198) and the 72-hole record (20-under 264) at the inaugural Deutsche Bank Championship. Scott posted all four rounds in the 60s for the first time in his PGA TOUR career: 69-62-67-66.

Other Canadian finishes included **Derek Gilespe** (T60), **Jon Mills** (T60), **Glen Hnatiuk** (T67), **Christopher Barla** (T73), and **David Morland IV** (T73).

David Morland's T5 finish in 2001 was the highest by a Canadian-born payer in the Bell Canadian Open since **Dave Barr** tied for fourth in 1988.

The **Bob Tway-Brad Faxon** playoff at the 94th Bell Canadian Open marked the 17th time the tournament has needed extra holes, including the last two years.

Brad Faxon played in his first Bell Canadian Open in 1984. That year he tied for 22nd. With last year's appearance at Hamilton Golf and Country Club, Faxon has now played in 11 Bell Canadian Opens, making the cut every time.

Canadian **Mike Weir** has played in 13 Bell Canadian Opens. After missing the cut in his first nine tournaments, Weir has made the cut in his last four starts. His 10th-place showing in 2003 is his best finish in the tournament, eclipsing the T22 he enjoyed in 2001.

At 44 years, 4 months and 3 days, **Bob Tway** became the fourth player over the age of 40 since 1970 to win the Bell Canadian Open. Others over 40 since 1970—1972, **Gay Brewer** (40 years, 3 months, 20 days), 1986, **Bob Murphy** (43 years, 4 months, 15 days) and 1999, **Hal Sutton** (41 years, 4 months, 14 days).

Bob Tway's win in 2003 came 8 years, 4 months and 21 days from his last victory at the 1995 MCI Classic, a span of 233 events.

With his victory at the 2003 Bell Canadian Open, **Bob Tway** won in a playoff for the fourth time in his career and improved his career playoff record to 4-4. His last three PGA TOUR titles have been won in playoffs — 1990 Las Vegas Invitational over **John Cook** and 1995 MCI Classic over **Nolan Henke** and **David Frost**.

It was a week for the experienced player at the 2003 Bell Canadian Open. In addition to Tway, Top-10 finishes were posted by six players 40 or older, including **Brad Faxon** (2), **Tom Pernice Jr.** (3), **Fred Funk** (T6), **Vijay Singh** (T6) and **Loren Roberts** (T8).

Tommy Armour III broke the 72-hole scoring record on the PGA TOUR en route to capturing the Valero Texas Open. Armour's 254 total (26-under-par) broke **Mark Calcavecchia's** mark of 256 in a winning effort at the 2001 Phoenix Open.

In relation to par for a par-70 golf course, **Tommy Armour III**, at 26-under-par, also broke the PGA TOUR record of 22-under-par set by **Donnie Hammond** at the 1989 Texas Open. The all-time under-par record, regardless of par, is 31-under-par by **Ernie Els** at the 2003 Mercedes Championships, on a par-73 golf course.



TOMMY ARMOUR III

Tommy Armour III, with his 254 total, bested the Valero Texas Open's 72-hole record total of 257 set by **Mike Souchak** at Brackenridge Park Golf Club in 1955. Souchak posted rounds of 60-68-64-65. Five of the lowest 13 72-hole totals in TOUR history were recorded at the Texas Open in San Antonio: Armour, Souchak, **Chandler Harper** in 1954 at Brackenridge, and **Corey Pavin** in 1988 and **Donnie Hammond** in 1989 at Oak Hills.

With **Tommy Armour III's** victory at the Valero Texas Open, 11 players over the age of 40 won 15 times on the PGA TOUR in 2003: **Vijay Singh** (4), **Kenny Perry** (3), **Kirk Triplett**, **Peter Jacobsen**, **Craig Stadler**, **Fred Couples**, **Scott Hoch**, **Bob Tway**, **J.L. Lewis**, **Tommy Armour III** and **John Huston**. Singh also won the 2003 Phoenix Open at the age of 39.

When the final round began, the field had a large obstacle to overcome in addition to **Tommy Armour III's** six-stroke lead – history. The largest lead where the 54-hole leader did not go on to win was six by four different players: **Bobby Cruickshank** at the 1928 Florida Open, **Gay Brewer** at the 1969 Danny Thomas-Diplomat Classic, **Hal Sutton** at the 1983 Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic and the most recent, **Greg Norman** at the 1996 Masters Tournament.

Tommy Armour III's victory marks the third-longest time between victories in PGA TOUR history at 13 years and eight months and 366 starts between victories. **Butch Baird** had 240 starts and 15 years, five months and 10 days between wins at the 1961 Waco Turner Open Invitational and the 1976 San Antonio Texas Open. **Ed Fiori** had 409 starts and 14 years, eight months and two days between wins at the 1982 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and the 1996 Quad City Classic.



BUTCH BAIRD

Tommy Armour III is now 2-for-5 when holding the 54-hole lead/co-lead on the PGA TOUR. He led through 54 holes in his maiden victory at the 1990 Phoenix Open.

The streak began on the ninth hole of his first round at the 84 Lumber Classic of Pennsylvania. He was looking to become the first player since **Lee Trevino** (1974 Greater New Orleans Open) to play 72 holes without a bogey and win.

NOTES

The 2003 WGC-American Express Championship marked the 32nd time that **Tiger Woods** held or shared the 54-hole lead in a PGA TOUR event and the 30th time Woods had won after being in this position, including the last 11 straight. The only times he has been overcome in the final round was the 1996 Quad City Classic (by **Ed Fiori**) and the 2000 TOUR Championship at East Lake Golf Club in Atlanta, where he was tied with **Vijay Singh** for the lead entering the final round but finished second to **Phil Mickelson**.

At the 2003 WGC-American Express Championship, **Tiger Woods** collected his eighth World Golf Championships title in 15 events played (seven of 13 Official PGA TOUR events) and his 14th top-five finish. **Darren Clarke** is the only other player with multiple WGC victories (2000 Accenture Match Play Championship and 2003 NEC Invitational).

In the 10 years since the tournament became an official PGA TOUR event, five players, have captured their first TOUR victory at Annandale GC: **Brian Henninger** (1994), **Ed Dougherty** (1995), **Willie Wood** (1996), **Cameron Beckman** (2001) and **Luke Donald** (2002).

Two-time champion **Brian Henninger**, who finished T54 in 2002, remains the all-time money-winner at the Southern Farm Bureau Classic, with \$554,932. **Cameron Beckman**, who won in 2001, is second with 508,950 and **Fred Funk**, whose last TOUR win came in Mississippi in 1998, is third with \$488,465.

Last year's final-round scoring average of 69.141 is the lowest recorded single-round scoring average at Annandale Golf Club for the Southern Farm Bureau. It also marks only the sixth time that the single-day scoring average has been in the 60s out of 36 rounds played, since 1994. The highest scoring average ever posted was 73.632 in the second round in 1999.

This year's tournament is the 37th edition of the Southern Farm Bureau Classic. It was played as the Magnolia State Classic at Hattiesburg (MS) CC from 1968-85, then became the Deposit Guaranty Golf Classic and continued to be played at Hattiesburg CC through 1993. It was an unofficial event from 1968-82 and 1986-93; money earned counted on the money list, but a victory wasn't an official PGA TOUR win. From 1983-85, the event was part of the Tournament Players Series (forerunner to the current Nationwide Tour). As such, it wasn't considered official in any capacity on the PGA TOUR. In 1994, the event moved to its present location, the Annandale GC in Madison, MS, and became an official PGA TOUR event. In 1999, the name changed to Southern Farm Bureau Classic.

Shigeki Maruyama sets the low 36-hole mark for his career with 15-under 129, topping the 10-under 130 during his victory at the 2002 EDS Byron Nelson Classic.

Shigeki Maruyama matched the low 72-hole mark for his career (266), which he posted in both his first two victories. It was his best score in relation to par though (22-under). Previous best: 18-under 266 at the 2001 Greater Milwaukee Open.

With his win at age 40 years, 8 months, 4 days, **Vijay Singh** became the fourth player age 40 or older to have won the FUNAI Classic at Walt Disney World Resort. The others include **Raymond Floyd** in 1986 (44 years, 1 month, 15 days), **Larry Nelson** in 1987 (40 years, 1 month, 8 days) and **Brad Bryant** in 1995 (40 years, 9 months, 27 days). The cut of 3-over-par 145 at the 2003 Chrysler Championship matched the high cut on the PGA TOUR in 2003, not including the four major championships. The others at 3-over-par were the Nissan Open, Bay Hill Invitational and Bell Canadian Open. Overall, there were 17 over-par cuts on the PGA TOUR in 2003. In 2000 and 2002, the cut was 1-over-par 143 at the Chrysler Championship.

With **Retief Goosen's** victory in his first career appearance at the Chrysler Championship, he became the fifth player to record a PGA TOUR victory in each of the last three seasons. The others: **Tiger Woods**, **Justin Leonard**, **Jim Furyk** and **Shigeki Maruyama**.

Defending champion **K.J. Choi** (T40) and 2000 winner **John Huston** (T34) made the cut in 2003, but both failed to finish in the top 25.

The Chrysler Championship also had an impact on the field at THE TOUR Championship Presented by Coca-Cola. **Briny Baird's** season included seven top-10s, including a solo third at the Chrysler Championship to earn \$326,400 and jump to 22nd on the money list. **Rocco Mediate**, who had rallied late in the year with three top-10s in six events, missed the cut to fall from No. 30 to No. 31.

Chad Campbell is the first player to earn his first PGA TOUR victory at THE TOUR Championship, and became the seventh first-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 2003.

With his 10-under-par 61, **Chad Campbell** set THE TOUR Championship 18-hole record as well as the Champions GC Cypress Creek course record. Both were 62 by **Jim Furyk** in the third round of the 2001 TOUR Championship. Campbell's 61 matched seven other players for low round on the PGA TOUR in 2003, and was his personal best 18-hole score on the PGA TOUR. His previous career low was 63 in the third round of the 2003 Chrysler Classic of Tucson.

Chad Campbell narrowly missed tying the tournament 72-hole record by one stroke, finishing at 16-under-par 268. The record was set by **Phil Mickelson** in 2000 at East Lake Golf Club in Atlanta.

Chad Campbell was not the only TOUR Championship "rookie" making a splash at the 2003 TOUR Championship. **Jonathan Kaye** finished seventh. The other three making their first appearance in THE TOUR Championship were **Darren Clarke**, **J.L. Lewis** and **Briny Baird**.

WORLD GOLF CHAMPIONSHIPS—WORLD CUP

NOTES

Six players have competed in all four World Cups since the inception of the World Golf Championships in 2000: **Angel Cabrera** and **Eduardo Romero** (Argentina), **Thomas Levet** (France), **Padraig Harrington** and **Paul McGinley** (Ireland) and **Shigeki Maruyama** (Japan).

When Wales' **Phillip Price** was forced to withdraw due to injury, **Ian Woosnam** joined **Bradley Dredge**. **Thomas Bjorn** of Denmark withdrew due to illness and was replaced by **Anders Hansen** and joined **Soren Kjeldsen**.

The winning South African team of **Trevor Immelman/Rory Sabbatini** shared \$1,400,000 (\$700,000) in prize money. Immelman's largest payday before was \$460,045 when he finished second at the 2003 Volvo PGA Championship, while Sabbatini's best payday came early in 2003 when he won the FBR Capital Open and collected \$810,000.

The winning South Africa Team of **Rory Sabbatini/Trevor Immelman** can return and represent South Africa this year in Sevilla, Spain, provided they enter as a team. If the defending champions enter the World Cup as a team, then a second team from the same country would be eligible, provided there is a player from the same country ranked ahead of at least one of the two defending champions. If such a second team from the same country becomes available, then an additional spot will be allocated to the World Qualifying Competition (seven spots instead of six) raising the World Cup field size to 26 teams.

The "young guns" of the event representing England, **Paul Casey** (26)/**Justin Rose** (23) finished alone in second in their second appearance at the WGC-World Cup. The two were the youngest team in the 2002 and 2003 World Cup. The next-youngest team was the winning team of South Africa's **Trevor Immelman** (23)/**Rory Sabbatini** (27).

International Federation of PGA Tours/World Golf Championships



At the 1996 Presidents Cup, golf's five world governing bodies—the European Tour, Japan Golf Tour Organization, PGA TOUR, PGA Tour of Australasia and Sunshine Tour—reached agreement on several key elements of professional golf designed to create new international events, beginning in 1999.

Three major initiatives were outlined at Robert Trent Jones Golf Club, site of the second Presidents Cup:

- Formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours.
- Joint sanctioning by the members of the International Federation of PGA Tours of significant competitions, including some at the world-championship level for the game's top players.
- A structure for a generally accepted worldwide ranking system.

Those "significant competitions" were announced in October 1997 when the Federation introduced the World Golf Championships.

The first three jointly sanctioned championships—the Accenture Match Play Championship, the NEC Invitational and the American Express Championship—were launched in 1999 with Jeff Maggert winning the first event and Tiger Woods the latter two. The addition of the World Cup was announced in December 1999 and debuted in December 2000.

The 2004 World Golf Championships will begin in February, with the Accenture Match Play Championship at La Costa Resort and Spa in Carlsbad, CA. In August, the NEC Invitational will be held at Firestone CC's South Course

in Akron, OH. The final two events for the year will be in Europe as the American Express Championship returns to Ireland's Mount Juliet Estate in October and the World Cup is held in November at Real Club de Golf de Sevilla in Sevilla, Spain.

The World Golf Championships events feature players from around the world competing against one another in varied formats (match play, stroke and team). The championships rotate through a variety of outstanding venues worldwide. Roughly half of the golf courses are in the United States, with the other half in venues represented by the International Federation of PGA Tours. World Golf Championships events have been contested on five continents.

The World Golf Championships were developed to enhance the competitive structure of professional golf worldwide while preserving the traditions and strengths of the individual Tours and their events.

The Asian PGA joined the International Federation of PGA Tours as a full-fledged member in November 1999, while the Canadian Tour was named an associate member in March 2000.

Accenture, NEC and American Express are the umbrella sponsors of the World Golf Championships. Michelob Ultra, JELD-WEN and Kohler are official sponsors.

Fields for the World Golf Championships are filled primarily through the Official World Golf Ranking, which is endorsed by all the sport's major professional organizations and governing bodies, and individual Tours' Official Money Lists/Orders of Merit.

The Presidents Cup



The Presidents Cup will return to the United States and the Robert Trent Jones Golf Club in Lake Manassas, Virginia for the fourth time in 2005.

The Presidents Cup, which will be played for the sixth time in 2005, was developed to give the world's best non-European players an opportunity to compete in international team match-play competition.

A biennial event played in non-Ryder Cup years, the first Presidents Cup was played Sept. 16-18, 1994 at Robert Trent Jones Golf Club. The United States Team, captained by Hale Irwin, defeated the International side of David Graham, 20-12.

The United States also won the second Presidents Cup, held Sept. 13-15, 1996 and played again at Robert Trent Jones GC. Arnold Palmer, no stranger to high-level international competition, had the reins as the U.S. edged Peter Thomson's International Team, 16½-15½.

The 1998 Presidents Cup was played Dec. 11-13 at Royal Melbourne Golf Club in Melbourne, Australia. The International Team won 20½-11½. Nicklaus served as Captain of the U.S. Team, while Thomson repeated his role for the International Team.

In 2000, The Presidents Cup returned to Robert Trent Jones GC, with the United States avenging its 1998 loss with a 21½-10½ victory over the International Team. Thomson captained the International Team for a third time, while Ken Venturi was victorious in his debut.

The 2003 Presidents Cup was originally scheduled for November 2002, but was postponed one year in the wake of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States.

In 2003 at The Links at Fancourt Hotel and Country Club Estate in George, South Africa, The Presidents Cup ended in a tie. After both teams completed regulation tied at 17 points, Ernie Els of the International Team and Tiger Woods of the United States were designated to represent their teams in a sudden-death playoff. After three playoff holes, and as darkness was descending, Captains Gary Player and Jack Nicklaus, in the spirit of the competition, decided that the two teams would share the cup.

Former U.S. President Gerald Ford presided over the first Presidents Cup as Honorary Chairman. Former President George Bush, like Ford an avid golfer, served as Honorary Chairman for the 1996 Presidents Cup. Australian Prime Minister John Howard was Honorary Chairman for the 1998 event. In 2000, President Bill Clinton made history when he became the first sitting president to serve as Honorary Chairman. In 2003, Thabo Mbeki, President of the Republic of South Africa, was Honorary Chairman. Current United States President George W. Bush will be the Honorary Chairman of the 2005 Presidents Cup.

Members of the 2005 U.S. Team will be selected based on official earnings from the start of the 2004 season through the 2005 PGA Championship. International Team players for the 2005 Presidents Cup will be chosen on the basis of the Official World Golf Ranking. International Teams do not include players eligible for the European Ryder Cup Team.

The eligibility rankings are used to select 10 members for both squads. Two Captain's Choices round out each 12-man team.

The Presidents Cup competition consists of 34 matches - 11 foursomes and 11 four-ball matches. There are 12 singles matches involving all players on the final Sunday. All matches are worth one point each, for a total of 34 points. There are no playoffs for foursome, four-ball or singles matches all square after 18 holes. Each side will receive ½-point.

If a Presidents Cup match is deadlocked at the end of singles play, there will be a sudden-death playoff between two players designated in advance by the respective Captains.

As is the case with virtually all activity involving the PGA TOUR, charity is the ultimate winner of The Presidents Cup. There is no purse for the players. Net revenues are divided into equal shares that the players and Captains designate for charities or golf-related projects of their choice. Contributions in their names are made through PGA TOUR Charities, Inc. The first four Presidents Cups generated \$7.25 million for charities worldwide. Proceeds generated by the 2003 Presidents Cup are expected to be announced in early 2004.

Ryder Cup Matches



The 35th Ryder Cup Matches are scheduled for September at Oakland Hills Country Club in Bloomfield Hills, MI.

The Ryder Cup will use a revised three-year system for qualifying,

with a return to a two-year system beyond that. The top 10 United States players for 2004 will be chosen based on placing in top-10 finishes, with the following points breakdown: 37.5 points (in 2002), 75 points (in 2003) and 150 points (in 2004) to the winner of a PGA TOUR tournament; and 150 points (in 2002), 225 points (in 2003) and 300 points (in 2004) to the winner of major championships. The teams will be captained by PGA TOUR members Hal Sutton (U.S.) and Bernhard Langer (International).

The 34th Ryder Cup Matches were played Sept. 27-29, 2002, at The De Vere Belfry in Sutton Coldfield, England, after the matches were postponed from Sept. 28-30, 2001 because of the terrorist tragedies in the United States. The European Team won 15½-12½.

PGA of America officials determined that future Ryder Cup Matches will be played in even-numbered years. The Presidents Cup was moved from 2002 to 2003 and will be played in odd-numbered years.

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from informal matches between American and British professionals in the early 1920s. Following an exhibition match in 1926 at Wentworth, England, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant and golf enthusiast, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name in time for the inaugural matches in 1927 at Worcester, MA.

Official World Golf Ranking



The Official World Golf Ranking, which is endorsed by the four major championships and six professional Tours that make up the International Federation of PGA Tours, is issued every Monday following the completion of the previous week's tournaments from around the world.

Results from events on the world's leading professional tours — the Asian PGA, PGA Tour of Australasia, European Tour, Japan Golf Tour, PGA TOUR, Nationwide Tour, Sunshine Tour, Canadian Tour and European Challenge Tour — are evaluated, and points are awarded according to the players' finishing positions. Tournaments are "rated" according to the strength of field based on the number and ranking of the world's top players in respective tournament fields (event "ratings").

In addition, some strength-of-field weighting is given to the inclusion in each field of a significant percentage of the top 30 on the host Tour's prior year Official Money Lists. The four major championships and THE PLAYERS Championship are rated separately to reflect the higher field quality of the events. In addition, the Volvo PGA Championship in Europe and the Australian, Japanese and South African Open Championships are allocated higher minimum point levels to reflect their status.

The Official World Golf Ranking points for each player are accumulated over a two-year "rolling" period, with the points awarded in the most recent 13-week period doubled. Each player then is ranked according to his average points per tournament, which is determined by dividing his total number of points by the tournaments he has played over that two-year period. There is a minimum requirement of 40 tournaments for the two-year period.

The winners of the Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship are awarded 50 points (30 points for second place, 20 for third, 15 for fourth, down to 0.75 points for a player completing the final round), and the winner of THE PLAYERS Championship is awarded 40 points (points are awarded down to 60th place).

The Volvo PGA Championship has a minimum of 32 points for the winner (points down to 56th place). In addition, the Open Championships of Australia, Japan and South Africa have a minimum of 16 points for the winner (points awarded down to 37th place).

Minimum points levels of all the other official Tour events have been set at three points for the Nationwide, European Challenge and Canadian Tours; six points for the Sunshine (points to 14th place); eight points for Australasia and Japan (points to 19th place); and 12 points for Europe and the United States (points to 27th place).

Beginning in September 2001, a new feature was added to the ranking system — any applicable two-year time period is divided into eight 13-week segments. Ranking points in each player's record will be reduced in value by one-eighth at the conclusion of each segment, thereby cutting the sudden and sometimes dramatic impact of the reduction of one-half that previously occurred at the one- and two-year anniversaries of events in which players earn points. Full Ranking points are awarded for tournaments reduced to 54 holes because of inclement weather or other reasons. For events completing only 36 holes, Ranking points are reduced by 25 percent.

Glossary of Statistics

Driving Distance

The average number of yards per measured drive. Driving distance is measured on two holes per round. Care is taken to select holes which face in opposite directions to counteract the effects of wind. Drives are measured to the point they come to rest, regardless of whether they are in the fairway or not.

Driving Accuracy

The percentage of time a player is able to hit the fairway with his tee shot.

Greens in Regulation

The percentage of time a player was able to hit the green in regulation (greens hit in regulation/holes played). Note: A green is considered hit in regulation if any part of the ball is touching the putting surface and the number of strokes taken is two or less than par.

Putting Average

Measures putting performance on greens hit in regulation. For each green hit in regulation, the total number of putts is divided by the number of greens hit in regulation. By using greens hit in regulation, we are able to eliminate the affects of chipping close and one-putting in the computation.

Total Driving

Total Driving is computed by totaling a player's rank in driving distance and driving accuracy.

Eagles (holes per)

The average number of holes between each eagle.

Birdie Leaders

The average number of birdies made per round played.

Sand Saves Percentage

The percentage of time a player is able to get up and down once in a greenside sand bunker. Note: This up and down is computed regardless of score on the hole.

All Around

This statistic is computed by totaling a player's rank in each of the following statistics: Scoring Leaders, Putting Leaders, Eagle Leaders, Birdie Leaders, Sand Saves, Greens in Regulation, Driving Distance and Driving Accuracy.

West Coast Swing Presented By The St. Paul



Mike Weir won twice on the West Coast in 2003 to capture the nine-event West Coast Swing presented by The St. Paul.

He became the Swing's fifth winner, joining two-time "King of the Swing" Tiger Woods (1999, 2000), as well as Phil Mickelson (1998), Davis Love III (2001) and Chris DiMarco (2002).

Weir, who won the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and the Nissan Open, earned a \$500,000 winner's bonus presented to the player who accumulated the most points during the West Coast Swing. With two wins in three weeks, Woods vaulted past Ernie Els to finish second and earn \$300,000. Weir, Woods and Els won six of the West Coast Swing's nine tournaments.

Scoring is based on top-10 performances, from 100 points for a victory to 10 for 10th place. The competition begins at the Mercedes Championships and concludes with the World Golf Championships-Accenture Match Play Championship and Chrysler Classic of Tucson.

As part of its sponsorship of the West Coast Swing, The St. Paul also supplements the purse of eight other TOUR events by \$300,000.

Fall Finish Presented By PricewaterhouseCoopers



On the strength of two wins and top-10s in all seven starts, Vijay Singh wrapped up his second consecutive Fall Finish Presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers at the PGA TOUR's 2003 season-ending TOUR Championship Presented by Coca-Cola. With the Fall Finish title, Singh received a bonus of \$500,000.

Now in its fifth year, the Fall Finish Presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers is an 11-tournament series (beginning at the Deutsche Bank Championship and ending at THE TOUR Championship Presented by Coca-Cola) that includes enhanced purses and bonus awards totaling \$1 million. Points are awarded for each top-10 finish, from 100 points for first place to 10 for 10th. Previous winners include Tiger Woods in 2000, Bob Estes in 2001 and Singh in 2002 and 2003.

Singh finished the 2003 series with 442.5 points to earn the \$500,000 first-place bonus. Stuart Appleby finished second with 220 points and \$300,000, while Woods finished third with 182.5 points for \$200,000. In seven starts, Singh compiled wins at the John Deere Classic and the FUNAI Classic at the WALT DISNEY WORLD RESORT, with top-10s at the Deutsche Bank Championship (4), Bell Canadian Open (T6), WGC-American Express Championship (T2), Chrysler Championship (2) and THE TOUR Championship Presented by Coca-Cola (T5).

Byron Nelson Award

The Byron Nelson Award is based on each player's adjusted scoring average. The adjusted score is computed from the average score of the field at each tournament. As a result, a player's score may be higher or lower than his actual score. Actual scoring average was used to determine the scoring leader prior to 1988.

In order to qualify for the Byron Nelson Award, a player must compete in a minimum of 50 official rounds on the PGA TOUR.

Payne Stewart Award

The award is named for Payne Stewart, an 11-time winner on the PGA TOUR, including three major championships. Stewart died the week of THE TOUR Championship in 1999. The award was created by the PGA TOUR Policy Board to perpetuate Stewart's memory. It is presented annually at THE TOUR Championship to a player sharing Stewart's respect for the traditions of the game, his commitment to uphold the game's heritage of charitable support and his professional and meticulous presentation of himself and the sport through his dress and conduct.

In addition to a sculpture presented to the recipient, the Payne Stewart Award is accompanied by an annual Payne Stewart Award Grant presented by Southern Company. The

\$300,000 grant will support several initiatives in Stewart's name and be distributed as follows: \$100,000 to Payne and Tracey Stewart's primary charity, The Stewart Family Foundation; \$100,000 in Stewart's honor to The First Tee facility in Missouri, located at Camp Kanakuk, which is affiliated with the "Kids Across America" program; and \$100,000 to a charity designated by the recipient

PGA Player of the Year

The PGA Player of the Year Award is given by the PGA of America to the top PGA TOUR player based on a mathematical formula that weighs tournament wins, official money standing and scoring average.

The point system for selecting the Player of the Year was amended in 1982, as follows: 30 points for winning the PGA Championship, U.S. Open, British Open or Masters Tournament; 20 points for winning THE PLAYERS Championship; 10 points for winning all other designated PGA TOUR events. In addition, there is a 50-point bonus for winning two majors, 75-point bonus for winning three, 100-point bonus for winning four.

For top-10 finishes on the PGA TOUR's official money list and scoring average list, the point value is: first, 20 points, then 18, 16, 14, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 2. Any incomplete rounds in the scoring average list will result in a .10 penalty per incomplete round.

Vardon Trophy

The Vardon Trophy, named in honor of famed British golfer Harry Vardon, is awarded annually by the PGA of America.

From 1947 to 1987, the Vardon Trophy was awarded to the professional golfer with the lowest scoring average. In 1988, the criteria were adjusted to award the Vardon Trophy to the touring professional with the lowest adjusted scoring average based on a minimum of 60 official rounds in events cosponsored or approved by the PGA TOUR.

Any player with an incomplete round is ineligible to win the Vardon Trophy. The Card Walker Award is presented annually to a person or organization which makes significant contributions in support of junior golf. It is named in honor of the former chairman of the Executive Committee of Walt Disney Productions. Mr. Walker served for several years on the PGA TOUR Policy Board and maintained a keen interest in the development of junior golf.

The Hawaii/TOUR relationship represents a first for the PGA TOUR in that no other state has established such a comprehensive agreement. The three main components of the agreement are:

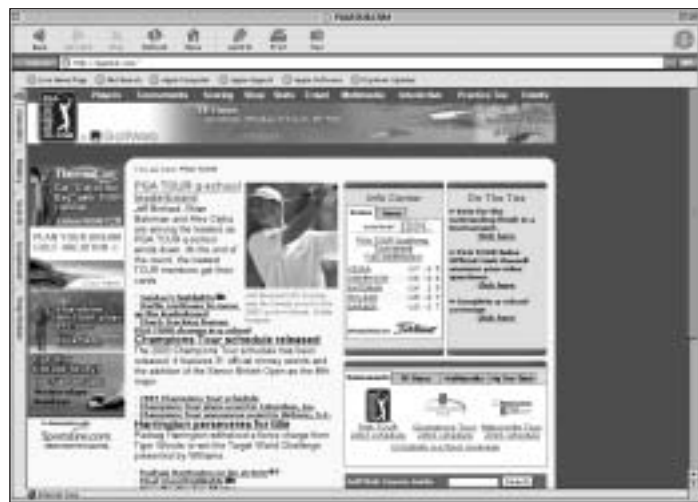

Charity: Giving Back...The Heart of the PGA TOUR



Success on the PGA TOUR can be seen in the true mission of the organization: Giving back in the communities where we play.

This is evidenced by the efforts of tournaments, volunteers and players in raising money and awareness for charitable giving which has benefited countless people and programs.

The beneficiaries come from programs such as Children's Healthcare of Atlanta (BellSouth Classic) and the Boys and Girls Club of Assabet Valley (FleetBoston Classic),

the 2002 PGA TOUR and Champions Tour Charities of the Year, respectively.

Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, one of the largest pediatric healthcare systems in the country, has received in excess of \$10 million from the BellSouth Classic since 1981. The Boys and Girls Club of Assabet Valley serves over 600 youth in the Concord, MA, area, an average of 90 children per day between the ages of 5 and 18, and thrives just nine years after closing.

The impact is also made by volunteers such as Dick Searle at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and Mary Wright at the Kroger Classic, the 2002 PGA TOUR and Champions Tour Volunteers of the Year, respectively. Searle has served at the Pebble Beach tournament for almost 60 years, following in his father's footsteps as a volunteer. Wright has donated her efforts for more than 20 years coordinating volunteers at professional golf events in the Cincinnati area, including the Kroger Classic since its 1990 inception.

Tournaments make a great contribution in this area also, led by the EDS Byron Nelson Championship on the PGA TOUR, the BMW Charity Pro-Am at The Cliffs on the Nationwide Tour and the Toshiba Senior Classic and 3M

Championship on the Champions Tour, which provided the largest donations to charity in 2003.

"Giving back to the communities in which our events are held is at the heart of the PGA TOUR," PGA TOUR Commissioner Tim Finchem said. "It reflects directly on a number of entities, namely tournaments, sponsors, players, volunteers and communities, all working together toward a common goal. Charity is what drives and motivates those involved to make the commitments and sacrifices they do."

"In addition, the individual players add charity dollars at their own charity events and contribute significantly to the overall mix."

Players enthusiastically reach out to help the needy through charitable efforts in their own home communities.

Tom Watson served as a great example in 2003, helping to raise approximately \$3 million to support friend and caddie Bruce Edwards in his fight against ALS, including donating the \$1-million annuity from winning the Champions Tour's Charles Schwab Cup to the cause. Watson also was honored with the Card Walker Award, which recognizes a player's contribution to junior golf, for his work with young golfers in his hometown of Kansas City.

"This charitable effort is a tribute not just to the players and to the tournaments but to the thousands of volunteers who make TOUR events so successful each year," said Frank Houseman, the president of the PGA TOUR Tournaments Association. "We look forward to continuing these worthy contributions in 2004 and beyond."

Since the first donation of \$10,000 by the Palm Beach Invitational in 1938, the combined charitable effort from all three Tours has reached more than \$800 million. All three Tours contributed in excess of \$70 million to charity in 2003.

Golf 20/20: Vision For the Future



In November 2000, senior members of the golf industry came together at World Golf Village for a conference called Golf 20/20: Vision for the Future, and embarked on an unprecedented collaborative effort to enhance the future of the game. The spirit of unity was so strong, and the commitment to make a difference so universal, that the decision was made to address some very specific issues and to make GOLF 20/20 an ongoing industry effort.

GOLF 20/20 is a World Golf Foundation initiative that was started with the following stated mission: To align the golf industry behind a plan that addresses the future of golf in a strategic manner, with an emphasis on accelerating growth and participation, and creating new avenues of access into the game. The focus of the conference was not only on participation but also on interest, and three major targets were established with the goal of fulfilling them by the year 2020:

- Golf would be at a level of popularity in the United States equal to the National Football League.
- There would be 55 million participants in golf in the U.S.
- There would be one billion rounds of golf played each year.

Over the past several years a number of research projects have been undertaken, several communications initiatives started, and a variety of programs tested or implemented. The main areas of focus for GOLF 20/20 include the following:

Adult Player Development—The goal of 20/20's adult player development activities is to introduce new adult players into the game, bring former players back to the game, and encourage greater levels of play by infrequent golfers. At the 2003 conference the PGA of America announced an umbrella concept called Play Golf America, under which the industry's major adult development initiatives will fall. This effort will commence in the spring of 2004 and receive unprecedented support from all areas of the golf industry.

Junior Golf—The USGA and its Foundation have overseen GOLF 20/20's efforts in junior golf, most notably the establishment of the ultimate junior golf Web site, juniorlinks.com, which includes a database of junior programs around the country. The Web site is a resource for youngsters, their parents and for junior golf program administrators. In 2003, GOLF 20/20 focused on developing a National School Golf Program, which will be tested in 150 elementary

schools in eight locations during the 2003-2004 school year. In 2003-2004 GOLF 20/20 is testing a school program through which physical educators teach the game in elementary school as part of a PE curriculum. This program will be aggressively expanded in the future.

Communication—In 2002 an industry Web site was established at www.golf2020.com; it houses all 20/20 research, reports and databases. In 2002, GOLF 20/20 presented its first Industry Report, a global look at the state of the game.

Research—To supplement existing information GOLF 20/20 commissioned in 2001 an unprecedented study of segments within the game, information that was instrumental in formulating strategies. In 2002, two other studies were commissioned. The first revealed that golf is responsible for more than 3.2 billion dollars being generated for charities in the U.S. each year. The second estimated the total golf economy in this country to be more than \$60 billion annually. In 2003 major research studies were done on frequency of play, and on minority participation in golf. All research information is available at golf2020.com.

In its first three years the GOLF 20/20 Executive Board consisted of seven people, six of them representing associations. In an effort to bring more business diversity to the Board, it has been expanded to include 15 members. The new Executive Board includes:

The First Tee is a World Golf Foundation initiative introduced in November of 1997 for the purpose of providing affordable golf access to everyone, especially children, who otherwise may not have the opportunity to play the game.

Over the past six years, The First Tee has evolved into a credible youth initiative where participants are positively influenced through exposure to important values and life skills while learning and playing the game of golf.

The First Tee Life Skills & Golf Experience is a program based on a set of Nine Core Values and developed around a curriculum that seamlessly incorporates life skills, such as goal setting, self discipline and self awareness, into each session. Children learn about themselves and others through exercises that teach lessons and skills that can be used both on and off the golf course.

Much of The First Tee's success is directly attributed to the support and guidance of five leading golf institutions in America that are The First Tee Founding Partners—the PGA TOUR, PGA of America, Ladies Professional Golf Association, United States Golf Association and Augusta National Golf Club. The support of these organizations, along with various individuals, associations, corporations, cities, counties and states, has helped The First Tee to develop facilities and programs where The First Tee Life Skills & Golf Experience can be delivered in communities across the country.

Building upon the accomplishment of achieving its initial goal of over 100 facilities in development by the end of the year 2000, The First Tee has set out to fulfill several new objectives by the end of 2005, which include:

- Establishing 500 affiliate relationships with existing golf courses or other golf facilities that will provide access to The First Tee Experience.

The PGA TOUR LINKS program is the technology solution that links together PGA TOUR and Champions Tour players, TOUR staff and tournament organizations. Along with IBM, the TOUR's technology partner, the PGA TOUR and its players worked hand-in-hand to design a solution that fits their communications and management needs.

As part of the TOUR LINKS program, each player receives an IBM ThinkPad computer and Internet access, allowing him to log onto the PGA TOUR LINKS Web site from anywhere in the world. Within the site itself, players are able to access information, including vital PGA TOUR announcements, tournament information, tee times, personal statistics and PGA TOUR policies. Players also are able to send and receive e-mail, commit

to tournaments, submit survey responses and vote in player elections.

In addition, eligible players are also provided with a Palm handheld device unit, with wireless access. From their individual units, players are able to access their tee times, pro-am times, commitment information, tournament phone numbers, tournament results and live scoring. Players can also surf thousands of Web-clipping applications, as well as keep electronic address books and calendars.

To date, more than 400 players are involved in the PGA TOUR LINKS program. As the program enters its fifth year, it continues to evolve to meet changing technological advances and player needs.

Also in 2003, a managers version of the Links program was developed to enhance the communications between the PGA TOUR staff and player representatives.

Regulations – Media

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the media:

1. A daily decal is necessary to walk inside the gallery ropes. All members of the media with such decal must remain not more than an arm's length from the ropes, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their rounds.
3. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions before a round, except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player, up against the ropes and not in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.
5. Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards. Media are not allowed in the scoring tent.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day — and others requested — will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

1. All tape recorder and/or video recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or clubhouse.

2. Tape recorders and/or video recorders are not permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders and/or video recorders are not permitted within the playing area of the golf course unless written permission has been granted from PGA TOUR.

Weather Delay Guidelines

1. During weather-delay situations, no one other than players and essential staff will be permitted in the locker room. This means the media are not permitted in the locker room in such situations. However, whenever possible, arrangements will be made to provide players for interviews during such situations.
2. Fully accredited members of the news media will be welcome in the locker room at all other times to carry out their assigned duties. (Note: Cameras and tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.)

The media person set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – On-Line Services

Media credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized golf or legitimate news Internet sites, as determined by PGA TOUR in its sole discretion. Coverage obtained in accordance with these regulations can only be used on the credentialed website. Individuals representing multiple interests (such as a recognized golf magazine and an internet site) must agree to be bound by all applicable media regulations.

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including but not limited to network, cable, Internet, home video) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No audio or video coverage of any event is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR. Scores and statistics may be distributed only in accordance with these regulations.

1. Coverage must be part of the news portion of the Internet site identified below (the "Credentialed Site") and must not purport to be live, play-by-play or real-time coverage from the course.
2. Scoring and statistical information may only appear in the editorial news portion of the Credentialed Site and may be provided no sooner than 30 minutes after the actual occurrence of the shots, or after the time such information is legally available as public information if sooner than thirty minutes after the actual occurrence of the shots. No scoring or statistical information may be used by, sold, given, distributed or otherwise transferred to any party other than the Credentialed Site in any manner whatsoever, without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR.
3. Photographic images of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour players may be used on the Credentialed Site for legitimate news coverage

only, and may be used together with news stories during the day's play, so long as such photographs are not used with other real-time or near-real-time information to create a "shot-by-shot" account of the day's play. Commercial exploitation of these images without written consent of the players and PGA TOUR is prohibited.

4. The Credentialed Site has rights only with respect to website media and has no rights with respect to any other media (including, without limitation, cellular or wireless devices) without the prior approval of the PGA TOUR.

The media person set forth below and the Internet Site set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Photography

Photo credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized and accredited publications or news services. Requests for photo credentials must be made by the appropriate news agency, not by the photographer. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to photography and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

Photographic likenesses of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour players and tournament courses may be used only by the news agency which the photographer represents for legitimate news coverage only. Any other use must be approved in advance in writing by the PGA TOUR. Photographs taken hereunder may not be archived nor sold or distributed in any manner without PGA TOUR's prior approval.

Photographs taken at any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour tournament may not be sold or commercially exploited in any manner without the prior written consent of the PGA TOUR and the applicable course(s) and player(s).

Credentialed photographers will receive one of two types of photo credentials. A limited number of inside the rope photo credentials will be issued daily by the PGA TOUR Media Official on site and will permit the wearer access inside the ropes. Photographers who do not have an inside the ropes photo credential must stay outside the gallery ropes but are still required to check in with the on site PGA TOUR Media Official to receive the proper outside the ropes photo credential. Photographic assistants will not be issued photo credentials of any type.

Cameras must have at least a 300mm lens, and may be used only by accredited media representatives who have been issued photo credentials, and such use is subject to the following conditions:

1. Photographers with inside the ropes photo credentials must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all time. Photographers without inside the ropes photo credentials are not permitted inside the ropes at any time.
2. Photographers are not permitted on the teeing ground, as determined by PGA TOUR.

3. The use of carts is prohibited at all times.
4. Photographers must not position themselves in the line of play. If requested to move by a player, his caddie or an official, the photographer will do so without delay or discussion.
5. No photograph shall be taken until a player has completed his stroke.
6. Players should not be asked to pose during a round.
7. Noise-free equipment must be used at all times.
8. Cameras are not permitted in the scoring tent or in the locker rooms.
9. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to photography and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

The Photographer set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organization and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorneys fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the Photographer set forth below or the use of any photographs other than as set forth in these Photography Regulations.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Print

Media credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized and accredited publications, as determined by PGA TOUR in its sole discretion. Individuals representing multiple interests (such as a recognized golf magazine and an Internet site) must agree to be bound by all applicable media regulations.

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour.

1. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be permitted into the media center and locker room areas.
2. Tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.
3. Players shall not be interviewed during play or after the round until the player has signed his scorecard.
4. Coverage shall be only for the News Agency set forth below and may not be sold or distributed to any other entity or party.
5. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
6. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be allowed inside the gallery ropes, and they must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. All support personnel must remain outside the ropes.

7. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to print publication media and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

The media person set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

Regulations – Radio

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including, but not limited to, broadcast, cable, home video, Internet) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No live or tape-delayed broadcast of any portion of any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour event is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR.

All radio media are permitted to broadcast highlights coverage of such events only under the following conditions, unless otherwise approved in writing by PGA TOUR:

1. Coverage shall not be in excess of three minutes of highlights and may not purport to be live, play-by-play coverage from the course.
2. All highlights coverage must be part of regularly scheduled news programs and may not be broadcast after 48 hours from the conclusion of the applicable tournament.
3. As the exclusive rightsholder, PGA TOUR may request copies of any coverage of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events. Such coverage will be provided to PGA TOUR upon request (PGA TOUR will pay industry standard copying and shipping costs).
4. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
5. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be permitted into the media center and locker room areas.
6. Tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.
7. Radio broadcasters are not permitted inside the gallery ropes at any time.

8. Broadcasters are not permitted to talk to players during play or after the round until the player has signed his scorecard.
9. Broadcasters shall not sell or distribute any highlights coverage to any third party without PGA TOUR's prior approval.
10. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to radio broadcast and has no rights with respect to any other media (including, without limitation, audio via the Internet) without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

The media person set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Television

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including, but not limited to, broadcast, cable, home video, Internet) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No live or tape-delayed broadcast of any portion of any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour event is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR. Coverage obtained by the credentialed entity below in accordance with these regulations can only be used by the credentialed entity for its television coverage and only with respect to television media. The credentialed entity has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

All television media are permitted to broadcast highlights coverage of such events only under the following conditions unless otherwise approved in writing by PGA TOUR:

1. Televised coverage shall not be in excess of three minutes of highlights daily from each TOUR (and six minutes total for all three TOURs) and may not purport to be live, play-by-play coverage from the course. Requests for expanded coverage must be submitted in writing to PGA TOUR.
2. All highlights coverage must be part of regularly scheduled news programs.
3. Highlights from any day's play may not be broadcast or used for any other purpose after 48 hours following the conclusion of the applicable tournament.
4. No action footage of any day's play may be broadcast until that day's live or tape-delayed coverage by the television network is concluded.
5. Live coverage or reporting in excess of three minutes from a tournament site, including, without limitation, the course, media center, press room and interview room, is prohibited without the prior approval of PGA TOUR.
6. No footage may be used in any commercial manner or sold to any other broadcast entity or agency.

7. As the exclusive rights holder, PGA TOUR is the absolute owner of all footage shot at the tournament site (golf action or other footage) and may request copies of any footage shot at PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events. Such footage will be provided to PGA TOUR upon request (PGA TOUR will pay industry standard copying and shipping costs).
8. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
9. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be allowed inside the gallery ropes, and they must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. All support personnel must remain outside the ropes.
10. All uses of footage hereunder shall be made with a courtesy credit to PGA TOUR.

The media person set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

Tournament Players Clubs

Tournament Players Club



The PGA TOUR's Tournament Players Club network has maintained a reputation for operating high-quality clubs since its inception 24 years ago. The TPC network continues to grow, with more than 30 facilities currently open or under construction, including several overseas.

TPCs encompass all forms of golf-related operations—resort facilities, corporate/private membership clubs and daily fee courses—and, as such, PGA TOUR Golf Course Properties, Inc. is able to match the type of facility with the demands of each market in which a club operates.

The network represents the highest standard in the golf course industry, commensurate with the members of the organization it represents, the players of the PGA TOUR. Each Tournament Players Club embodies the trademark of excellence first established with the flagship TPC at Sawgrass, which opened its world-famous Stadium Course in the fall of 1980 in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL. This commitment to overall excellence serves as the foundation for the network's overall success.

The TPC network was born through former PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane Beman's desire to provide TOUR players with quality golf courses that also would offer spectators enhanced viewing areas. Beman also reasoned that development of quality facilities would alleviate the TOUR's dependency

on the television dollar, while providing rent-free venues for tournaments. The savings in rent, in turn, would generate both increased purses and greater charitable contributions by the tournaments held at TPCs.

The TPC at Sawgrass was the first Tournament Players Club to hold a PGA TOUR event, becoming the permanent home of THE PLAYERS Championship in 1982. In 2003, 15 tournaments were conducted on TPC courses, bringing the total number of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events held at TPC facilities to 220.

Many of the top golf course architects are connected with Tournament Players Club projects, including Pete Dye, Tom Fazio, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player, Arthur Hills, Jay Morrish, Tom Weiskopf, Greg Norman, Bob Von Hagge and D.A. Weibring. The Tournament Players Club of Boston, which opened in 2002, was the fourth TPC course designed by Palmer Course Design Co. Weiskopf has designed his second TPC course for the new Tournament Players Club at Craig Ranch near Dallas, TX, scheduled to open in the fall of 2004.

Moreover, in recognizing the importance of player input for tournament courses, TOUR members have served as design consultants, working closely with the lead architect. Mark O'Meara, for instance, served as the player design consultant on the Tournament Players Club at Valencia (CA), which opened in June 2003, while Steve Elkington is the player consultant and Kelly Gibson the associate player consultant working with architect Pete Dye on the Tournament Players Club of Louisiana in New Orleans, scheduled to open in the spring.

ShotLink



The PGA TOUR has collaborated with IBM, the TOUR's Official Worldwide Information Technology Partner, on the PGA TOUR ShotLink System. The ShotLink System is a revolutionary platform for collecting and disseminating scoring and statistical data on every shot by every player in real-time during every tournament round.

The development of ShotLink started in 1997 when the TOUR decided to update its current scoring system, which was based on 1987 technology. The TOUR, in conjunction with IBM, conducted an extensive review process to formulate its strategy for the development and implementation of ShotLink. Following an evaluation of more than 30 companies, additional technology and implementation partners were identified: Information and Display Systems (IDS), Palm, Electronic Arts, Daktronics and two mapping vendors: GeoGolf and Geodetic Services. IBM provided overall project management, consulting services and server and networking technologies. ShotLink was introduced during the 2001 Buick Classic and represents the TOUR's scoring system for the future.

The accumulation, packaging and presentation of expanded shot and course information provides the basis for numerous fan enhancements. Current uses of ShotLink data include:

- Enhanced graphics and statistics in television broadcasts

- Expanded information and statistics for use by media
- Powering on-site and PGATOUR.COM tournament leaderboards
- Providing on-site media and hospitality access to live tournament information through Tournament Tracker, developed by IBM
- Powering PGA TOUR Mobile Link, the PGA TOUR's wireless application for use on PDAs and cell phones (available on PGATOUR.COM)
- Powering the exclusive AT&T Wireless #121 golf service
- Powering the TOURCast application on PGATOUR.COM, which launched in 2003

In addition to current uses, ShotLink provides unlimited potential to develop fan enhancements and products over the next several years, including:

- Enhanced and interactive television
- On-site wireless and kiosk applications for tournament patrons
- Internet, PC and console games

Besides fan enhancements, ShotLink creates an ongoing historical archive of statistical information. This information is available to players through the PGA TOUR Links program, also built by IBM.

The ShotLink data is collected by volunteers utilizing a combination of Palm handheld devices and laser range finders.

Tour Wives Association



TOUR Wives Association, Inc. is a Florida not-for-profit corporation organized to render support for and provide assistance to needy children and their families through the means of charitable events. The Association is comprised of the wives of professional golfers on the PGA TOUR and Nationwide Tour, as well as individuals and corporations that support the TOUR Wives Association's many charitable endeavors.

Since its incorporation in 1988, the TOUR Wives Association has supported children's charities across the country by raising money for child-related charities and given much back to the game of golf through personal and monetary contributions. In addition to the funds that are raised, the wives visit different charities in the communities where golf tournaments are held, spending time and playing with children supported by the charities.

The TOUR Wives Association conducts numerous fundraisers to support its charities. These include tasting events, concerts, live and silent auctions and other activities.

The Association's favorite (and longest-running) fundraiser is the biannual TOUR Wives Golf Classic, a nine-hole tournament where the wives play golf and their husbands caddie. The TOUR Wives Golf Classic, first played in 1987, has been held at different courses around the country.

The TOUR Wives Association is currently selling its cookbook, Taste of the TOUR. The cookbook is a compilation of recipes from your favorite golfers and consists of 144 pages of recipes submitted by the families of players on TOUR, from their homes and their favorite restaurants at tournament sites. From simple to gourmet, the cookbook contains recipes for appetizers, soups and salads, breads and muffins, poultry and meat dishes, seafood, vegetables, rice and pasta dishes and desserts. This project is providing a continuing source of funds for its charities.

While its membership varies from year to year, the commitment of the TOUR Wives Association to making a difference in the lives of needy children stands strong. The Association's dedicated members, past and present, have reached deep into their resources to balance the demands of family, work and travel and have given generously of themselves to realize their ideals.

Weather Guidelines

Every effort will be made to finish each round as scheduled by Sunday. The first priority is always the competition and completion of 72 holes.

In an effort to achieve this objective by Sunday, 36 holes may be played on Sunday following a reduction of the field to the score which has the closest number of professionals to 60. If an equal number of professionals are at scores above and below the 60th position, the higher score will be used.

If conditions exist which prevent 72 holes from being completed by Sunday, play will always be extended to Monday if golf course conditions and the weather forecast permit. Play on Monday could include 36 holes.

If conditions exist which make the completion of 72 holes impossible, the next priority is to complete 54 holes; thereby the winner is credited with an official victory. Again, play in this situation will always be extended to Monday if conditions and weather permit.

If conditions exist which make the completion of 54 holes impossible, the next priority is to complete 36 holes; thereby players receive official money, although the winner is credited with an unofficial victory. Again, play in this situation may be extended to Monday.

In making decisions to extend play beyond Sunday or to reduce the tournament to fewer than 72 holes due to inclement weather, the on-site Tournament Director discusses the situation and conditions with a number of parties, including the host organization, title sponsor, host site (general manager and/or golf course superintendent), on-site weather forecaster, television representatives and the other members of the Rules Committee. Players typically have not been included in these discussions as the TOUR believes it is inappropriate for the Rules Committee to discuss matters directly affecting the competition with contestants.

World Golf Foundation, a not-for-profit, 501(c)3 organization, was created in 1994 to unite the golf industry and those who love the game.

Members are honored in the 75,000 square-foot museum located at World Golf Village in St. Augustine, FL.

The First Tee—Announced in November of 1997, The First Tee is dedicated to providing affordable access to golf and strives to instill in young people life-

enhancing values such as honesty, integrity, sportsmanship and respect. These values are seamlessly taught through The First Tee Life Skills & Golf Experience, one of the unique features that differentiates The First Tee from many other successful junior golf programs. The intent is to offer opportunities for improvement in the quality of life and create a platform where children can increase their potential for success. The First Tee partners with local not-for-profit entities and municipalities to form The First Tee Chapters, which are responsible for developing The First Tee golf learning facilities. Currently, there are more than 135 open facilities spanning 40 states and two continents, including programs in Canada and Singapore.

GOLF 20/20: Vision for the Future—Initiated in 1999, it is devoted to aligning the golf industry behind a plan that addresses the future of golf in a strategic manner, with an emphasis on accelerating growth and participation and creating new avenues of access into the game.

National Minority Golf Program—Coming under the World Golf Foundation umbrella in 2001, it is primarily focused on developing career opportunities in golf for minorities.

Open since 1998, the World Golf Hall of Fame is the ultimate destination for the celebration and recognition of golf's greatest players and contributors and serves as an inspiration to golfers and golf fans worldwide. Supported by all of the world's leading golf organizations, the Hall of Fame honors its members through a creative, interactive and compelling guest experience. The World Golf Hall of Fame is located at World Golf Village in St. Augustine, FL.

The Members

The 71 players and contributors inducted into the former Hall of Fame in Pinehurst, NC, and the LPGA Hall of Fame were "grandfathered" into the World Golf Hall of Fame at the first induction ceremony held at World Golf Village in May 1998.

Nick Faldo and Johnny Miller were the first new players to be inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame, and Amy Alcott, Seve Ballesteros and Lloyd Mangrum entered in 1999. Beth Daniel, Juli Inkster and Judy Rankin were inducted as part of the 2000 induction ceremony, along with Deane Beman, Sir Michael Bonallack, Jack Burke Jr., John Jacobs and Neil Coles. Donna Caponi, Karsten Solheim, Judy Bell, Allan Robertson, Payne Stewart and Greg Norman were inducted in 2001 and were followed by Tommy Bolt, Ben Crenshaw, Marlene Hagge, Tony Jacklin, Bernhard Langer and Harvey Penick in 2002. In 2003, Leo Diegel, Hisako "Chako" Higuchi, Nick Price and Annika Sorenstam were brought in, pushing the total number of inductees to 100.

The Museum

The World Golf Hall of Fame includes memorabilia from its members as well as interactive exhibits and historical artifacts. In October of 2003, four new exhibits were unveiled to pay tribute to the Class of 2003, including the PGA TOUR's Nick Price. The exhibits follow the lives and careers of the most recent inductees through memorabilia and photos.

The museum also includes a life-size replica of the famous Swilcan Burn Bridge, an artificial 1880s-style putting green, with a hickory-shafted putter and gutta-percha ball from the era, and a state-of-the-art golf simulator, which allows guests to experience any one of more than 40 famous courses found around the world. The experience is never the same, with the museum's Wachovia Gallery featuring a new exhibit each year.

Guests visiting the Hall of Fame have the opportunity to take a fascinating one-hour behind-the-scenes tour with one of its knowledgeable volunteers. Visitors wishing to tour at their own pace can use a hand-held Acoustiguide®, with self-guided tours available in five languages.

Education

As part of its mission to be an inspiration to golfers and fans throughout the world, the World Golf Hall of Fame offers several initiatives to educate and connect children with the game. Three programs, sponsored by Shell Oil Company, are offered to teach children about various principles involved in the game: "Science of Golf," "Great Scot! Who Thought Up This Game Anyway?" and "The Grass is Always Greener on the Other Side." The fourth program, "Community Field Trip Fund," was established to provide area schools and children's charities the opportunity to see educational films at the World Golf Hall of Fame's IMAX® Theater.

World Golf Hall of Fame PGA TOUR Pioneers/Members

Willie Anderson (1975)

The son of a Scottish greenskeeper, Anderson emigrated to the U.S. at age 15 and became the first dominant player in America. He won the U.S. Open four times before age 27, including three consecutively from 1903 to 1905. Anderson finished in the top five 11 of the 14 times that he competed in the national championship.

Tommy Armour (1976)

A native of Edinburgh, the "Silver Scot" won the 1927 U.S. Western Open, the 1930 PGA Championship and the 1931 British Open. One of golf's most respected instructors, Armour excelled despite injuries suffered in World War I that left him with one eye and with metal plates in his head and arm.

Jim Barnes (1989)

An assistant pro in England at age 15, Barnes came to America at 19, and between 1916 and 1925 won all the major tournaments of his day: the Western Open in 1914, 1917 and 1919; the first two PGA Championships in 1916 and 1919; the 1921 U.S. Open; and the 1925 British Open.

Deane Beman (2000)

Commissioner of the PGA TOUR from 1974-1994, he created the Champions Tour, the Nationwide Tour and developed the "stadium golf" concept. As a player, Beman won the 1959 British Amateur, the 1960 and 1963 U.S. Amateurs, competed on four U.S. Walker Cup Teams and captured four PGA TOUR titles.

Tommy Bolt (2002)

Bolt was best known for his impeccable ball striking, colorful personality, stylish clothes and occasional temper tantrums. He did not join the U.S. tour until 1950 when he was 32. Bolt won the U.S. Open at age 40 and captured 15 TOUR titles. He was a founding member of the Champions Tour.

Julius Boros (1982)

An accountant by trade, Boros turned professional at age 30. Just two years later, in 1952, he won the U.S. Open and was named PGA Player of the Year. He claimed a second U.S. Open in 1963 at The Country Club in Brookline, MA, and in 1968 captured the PGA Championship at age 48.

Jack Burke, Jr. (2000)

A member of five U.S. Ryder Cup teams, serving as captain twice, Burke captured 15 PGA TOUR titles, including the 1956 Masters Tournament and 1956 PGA Championship. He won four consecutive tournaments in 1952. Burke is co-founder and president of the Champions Club in Houston, TX.

Billy Casper (1978)

A brilliant putter, Casper won the Vardon Trophy for lowest scoring average five times and was a member of eight Ryder Cup teams. Of his 60 career victories, three were major championships, including the 1966 U.S. Open, when he came from seven strokes back with nine holes to play to tie Arnold Palmer, then won their playoff.

Harry Cooper (1992)

Known as "Lighthorse Harry" for the speed at which he played, Cooper won more than 30 professional tournaments between 1926 and 1942. He was never able to capture a major championship, finishing second on three occasions. In 1937, he won nine tournaments and was the first winner of the Vardon Trophy for lowest scoring average.

Fred Corcoran (1975)

As tournament manager of the PGA of America from 1936 to 1947, Corcoran more than doubled the number of tour events. Working with Babe Zaharias and Patty Berg, and with financial support from Wilson, he was instrumental in forming the LPGA Tour in 1949. Also a promoter and agent, he founded the Golf Writers Association of America in 1946.

Ben Crenshaw (2002)

With one of the best putting strokes of all time, Crenshaw won 19 times on the PGA TOUR, including the Masters twice. He was on the 1971 and 1972 NCAA championship teams at the University of Texas and won three straight individual NCAA crowns. Crenshaw also has participated on four Ryder Cup teams and in 1999 captained the U.S. Ryder Cup team.

Roberto De Vincenzo (1989)

De Vincenzo, a native of Argentina, turned professional in 1938 at age 15. He joined the PGA TOUR in 1947 and collected nine victories. A truly international champion, he won more than 200 tournaments worldwide, most notably the 1967 British Open. In 1980 at Winged Foot, De Vincenzo won the inaugural U.S. Senior Open.

Jimmy Demaret (1983)

With a personality as colorful as his wardrobe, Demaret was one of golf's most popular figures for four decades. The Texas native once quit professional golf to become a nightclub singer but returned in 1938 and won the 1940 Masters. After serving in the Navy during World War II, he won the Masters in 1947 and 1950.

Joseph C. Dey (1975)

Golf's most respected administrator, Dey was named Executive Secretary of the USGA in 1934, a position he held for 34 years. As the first commissioner of what became the PGA TOUR, he guided the tournament players in their split from the PGA of America. In 1975 he became the second American to captain the Royal and Ancient.

Leo Diegel (2003)

A native of Detroit, MI, Diegel won consecutive PGA Championships in 1928 and 1929. In total, he won 31 PGA TOUR events during his career, including four Canadian Opens. Diegel was a member of the first four U.S. Ryder Cup teams between 1927 and 1933. After retiring in 1935 due to a hand injury, Diegel became a respected teacher.

Nick Faldo (1997)

In 20 years, Faldo has won more than 40 tournaments worldwide, including three British Opens and three Masters Tournaments, and competed on 11 European Ryder Cup Teams. In 1990, Faldo was the first international player to be named PGA of America Player of the Year.

Raymond Floyd (1989)

With the 1969 and 1982 PGA Championships and the 1976 Masters Tournament to his credit, Floyd was already a player of renown when he won his fourth major championship title. In 1986, at age 43, he captured the U.S. Open at Shinnecock Hills. His steely competitiveness carried over to a successful career on the Champions Tour.

Ralph Guldahl (1981)

In 1938, Guldahl quit tournament golf in frustration to sell cars in Dallas. He returned one year later and, with victories at Oakland Hills in 1937 and Cherry Hills in 1938, became one of the few players to capture consecutive U.S. Open titles. He also won three consecutive Western Opens and the 1939 Masters Tournament.

Walter Hagen (1974)

Flamboyant and charismatic, Hagen was the first professional to make a living playing golf, rather than teaching it. Wild off the tee, but superb at recovery, his fame mirrored his lifestyle. Captain of the first six American Ryder Cup teams, he won two U.S. Opens, four British Opens and five PGA Championships, including four consecutively.

Bob Harlow (1988)

Harlow, a newspaperman from Massachusetts, was best known as the founder of *Golf World*. As manager for Walter Hagen from 1921 to 1929, and later for Joe Kirkwood, he arranged exhibitions both nationally and abroad. From 1930 to 1935, he served as tournament manager for the PGA of America.

Ben Hogan (1974)

Hogan was legendary for his intensity and dedication to perfection. Having already claimed two PGA Championships and the U.S. Open by 1948, he suffered a life-threatening auto accident in 1949. Miraculously, he returned to win the U.S. Open in 1950, 1951 and 1953; the Masters Tournament in 1951 and 1953; and the 1953 British Open.

World Golf Hall of Fame PGA TOUR Pioneers/Members (cont.)

Hale Irwin (1992)

An All-American in golf and All-Conference in football at the University of Colorado, Irwin won the 1967 NCAA Golf Championship. Between 1974 and 1990, he captured three U.S. Open titles, the last at age 45 in a 19-hole playoff. After 1995, he devoted himself to golf course design and the Champions Tour.

Tony Jacklin (2002)

In 1969, Tony Jacklin became the first British player in 18 years to win the British Open. He followed that with the 1970 U.S. Open title, the first victory in that tournament by a British player in 50 years. Jacklin may be best remembered as Captain of the victorious European Ryder Cup teams in 1985, 1987 and 1989.

Bernhard Langer (2002)

Langer is the most accomplished golfer in German history. He accumulated more than 50 worldwide victories and won the Masters twice. Langer competed for Europe in 10 Ryder Cup competitions and amassed one of the best records for the European Team.

Lawson Little (1980)

Stocky and powerful, but renowned for his short game, Little's greatest achievements came as an amateur. In 1934 and 1935, he captured the "Little Slam," winning both the U.S. and British Amateur Championships. After turning professional in 1936, he won seven events, most notably the 1940 U.S. Open in a playoff with Gene Sarazen.

Gene Littler (1990)

Littler's first PGA TOUR win came in 1954 as an amateur. His last was in 1977 at age 47. He won the U.S. Amateur in 1953 and the U.S. Open in 1961, but lost both the Masters Tournament and the PGA Championship in playoffs. Littler amassed a total of 29 career PGA TOUR victories.

Lloyd Mangrum (1998)

Known as a tough competitor with an aggressive style of play, Mangrum competed in an era that also included Hall of Famers Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, Jimmy Demaret and Sam Snead. He counted the 1946 U.S. Open among his 36 career victories.

Cary Middlecoff (1986)

After becoming the first amateur to win the North and South Open, Dr. Middlecoff abandoned a career in dentistry and turned professional in 1947. A brilliant analyst of the game and the golf swing, he won the U.S. Open in 1949 and 1956 and the Masters Tournament in 1955. He retired with 37 career victories.

Johnny Miller (1996)

Miller dominated international golf in the early 1970s, winning 20 tournaments in six years. A remarkable 63 in the final round secured his victory in the 1973 U.S. Open at Oakmont. Winner of the 1976 British Open at Royal Birkdale, Miller gained renown as a television commentator.

Byron Nelson (1974)

"Lord Byron" won two Masters Tournaments, two PGA Championships and the 1939 U.S. Open. He is best remembered for his 1945 season, when he won 19 tournaments, including 11 consecutively, finished second seven times and compiled a remarkable stroke average of 68.33. In 1947, at age 34, Nelson retired to his ranch in Texas.

Jack Nicklaus (1974)

The legendary Bobby Jones said of him: "He plays a game with which I am not familiar." In his monumental career, Nicklaus amassed 18 professional major championship victories, far surpassing any golfer before or since. With more than 100 victories around the world, "The Golden Bear" is arguably the best golfer of the modern era.

Greg Norman (2001)

The "Great White Shark" won the 1986 and 1993 British Opens in a professional career that has produced some 90 victories worldwide, including 20 PGA TOUR titles. He captured the Arnold Palmer Award as the TOUR's leading money-winner in 1986, 1990 and 1995. He won the 1994 PLAYERS Championship with a record 24-under-par total.

Arnold Palmer (1974)

The most charismatic player in history, Palmer's emergence in the late 1950s coincided with televised golf to generate unprecedented interest in the game. Palmer won the U.S. Amateur in 1954 and the U.S. Open in 1960. Also among the more than 80 professional victories he collected were four Masters Tournaments, two British Opens and five major championships on the Champions Tour.

Gary Player (1974)

This South African made up for his diminutive size with a rigorous schedule of fitness training and persistent practice unequaled in golf. His career victories numbered more than 120 worldwide and included all four major championships. Player found later success as a dominant force on the Champions Tour.

Nick Price (2003)

One of the more dominant players of the 1990s, winning two PGA Championships (1992, 1994) and a British Open (1994) among his 16 PGA TOUR victories in that decade, and 18 total. The South African, winner of more than 40 titles worldwide, is also a two-time PGA TOUR Player of the Year (1993, 1994) and a two-time Vardon Trophy winner (1993, 1997).

Chi Chi Rodriguez (1992)

Rodriguez won eight PGA TOUR events and collected more than 20 Champions Tour titles in his career. But it is his charitable work that will be best remembered. His pro-am tournament helped fund the Children's Hospital in his native Puerto Rico, and his Youth Foundation has raised millions for disadvantaged children in Florida.

Paul Runyan (1990)

Although one of the shortest hitters of his time, Runyan won more than 50 professional tournaments. After joining the tour in 1933, he captured 16 events in two years and was leading money-winner in 1933 and 1934. A highly regarded short game and putting instructor, he won the PGA Championship twice, in 1934 and 1938.

Gene Sarazen (1974)

Sarazen was the first golfer to win all four major championships. He won the U.S. Open in 1922 and 1932: the PGA in 1922, 1923, and 1933; and the British Open in 1932. But his victory in the 1935 Masters Tournament is best remembered for a remarkable final-round double-eagle on the 15th hole at Augusta National.

Horton Smith (1990)

In 1929, at age 21, Smith played in 19 professional events, winning eight and finishing second four times. He remained a top professional throughout the 1930s, winning the first and third Masters Tournaments in 1934 and 1936. His last tournament win came in 1941, the year before he left golf to join the army.

Sam Snead (1974)

"Slammin' Sam" is renowned for his classical swing and the longevity of his career. The winner of three PGA Championships, three Masters Tournaments and the British Open, he made eight Ryder Cup appearances and was captain of the U.S. Team three times. Snead recorded 82 TOUR victories, his last in 1965 at age 52.

Payne Stewart (2001)

Before his tragic death in a 1999 plane crash, Stewart had won 18 tournaments around the world, including three major championship titles: 1989 PGA Championship, 1991 and 1999 U.S. Open. While known for his trademark knickers and tam o'shanter cap, his love for the game and passion with which he played made him one of the most respected players of his time.

Peter Thomson (1988)

One of the most intriguing players the game has known, the Australian-born Thomson captured five British Open titles between 1954 and 1965, including three consecutively from 1954 to 1956. With wide interests that ranged from politics to music, Thomson maintained successful careers as a writer and golf course architect outside of competition.

World Golf Hall of Fame PGA TOUR Pioneers/Members (cont.)

Lee Trevino (1981)

The ultimate self-made champion, Trevino made the transition from assistant professional at a Texas driving range to U.S. Open champion. He captured that title twice, in 1968 and 1971. With two British Opens, two PGA Championships and six Ryder Cup appearances to his credit, he later had a dominant career on the Champions Tour.

Tom Watson (1988)

Watson's major championship victories include five British Opens and two Masters Tournaments. His victory in the 1982 U.S. Open featured a dramatic chip-in on the 17th hole at Pebble Beach. Arguably the most consistent player for a decade, he was the PGA TOUR's leading money-winner and Player of the Year four consecutive times from 1977 to 1980.

World Golf Village



World Golf Village is a 6,300-acre golf resort and residential community located 10 minutes northwest of historic St. Augustine, FL, and 30 minutes south of Jacksonville. Named one of the "Top 75 Golf Resorts" in the United States by Golf Digest, World Golf Village draws guests from all over the United States and from around the world, offering a wide variety of recreational, entertainment, corporate meeting and residential options.

The centerpiece of the Village is the World Golf Hall of Fame, a sports museum that pays tribute to the greatest players and contributors of the game. The

World Golf Hall of Fame features memorabilia from its members, as well as historical and interactive exhibits that enable visitors to see and experience some of golf's most exciting elements from the sport's infancy in Scotland to the present day.

Adjacent to the museum is the World Golf Hall of Fame IMAX® Theater, offering a variety of films that are both educational and entertaining on an 80-foot-wide-by-6-story-high screen. Along the Hall of Fame's Walk of Champions, a half-mile track built with more than 100,000 bricks that may be purchased by visitors through the Commemorative Brick Program, guests can attempt to hit a ball 132 yards to the Challenge Hole's island green or play a round on the 18-hole, real-grass putting course.

Encompassing nearly 400 acres, the World Golf Village championship golf courses include the King & Bear, the first course co-designed by World Golf Hall of Fame members Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, and the Slammer & Squire, built by Bobby Weed, with design consultants and World Golf Hall of Fame members Sam Snead and Gene Sarazen. Both courses, which have hosted 10 nationally televised broadcasts, combine challenging obstacles with playability for all levels of golfers.

The PGA TOUR Golf Academy opened in January 2002. Top-rated instructors, including Director of Instruction Scott Sackett, a Golf top 100 teacher, and resident PGA TOUR instructor Calvin Peete, a 12-time PGA TOUR winner, incorporate three teaching and video analysis systems into the lessons.

Set to open in the winter of 2004 the Spa at Lateral will be the first-ever PGA TOUR Spa. The world-class, full-service spa will be located in the King & Bear at World Golf Village as part of the Lateral resort community.

Dining options include the Murray brothers' Caddyshack, the flagship restaurant of actor-golfer Bill Murray and his five brothers, and Sam Snead's Tavern, loaded with memorabilia from Snead's life.

PGA TOUR STOP, one of the largest golf stores in the country, anchors the retail area of World Golf Village.

Accommodations at World Golf Village include the World Golf Village Renaissance Resort, a 10-story resort that features 301 guest rooms and the adjacent St. Johns County Convention Center. Comfort Suites offers an additional 162 suites.

PGA TOUR Productions and The First Tee® national headquarters are located on the Walk of Champions, as is The Learning Curve, where visitors can learn more about The First Tee program and how it impacts the lives of kids.

The Neighborhoods of World Golf Village is a distinctive residential community that blends world-class amenities with the convenience of shopping, healthcare, entertainment, first-rate schools and incredible golf. Each neighborhood offers individual amenities, such as pools and recreational facilities.

As sole founding partner of World Golf Village, Shell Oil Company provides financial support to the World Golf Foundation and supports its charitable initiatives aimed at introducing golf to young people, thereby promoting scholastic achievement, community service and those values intrinsic to the game of golf.

Ernie Els won the Mercedes Championships and Sony Open in Hawaii to begin the 2003 season and captured seven titles worldwide.
