A Message to the Media

On behalf of the players, staff, tournaments and volunteers, welcome to what promises to be another thrilling PGA TOUR season. We are grateful to the wide assortment of global media outlets that cover our sport and for the thorough and professional coverage that has been instrumental in the PGA TOUR's continued growth.

This is an exciting time for the PGA TOUR, not only for what is currently happening, but also for the dynamic changes planned for the near future.

Last year, we surpassed the \$1-billion milestone in charitable giving in our history. But we won't rest on that achievement. We have already set a goal of reaching our second billion within the next 10 years. Our appreciation and congratulations go out to the tournaments, players, sponsors and thousands of volunteers who have made this possible.

The 2005 PGA TOUR season continued the momentum we have seen building in recent years. The season saw a number of milestone moments. PGA TOUR Player of the Year Tiger Woods returned to the top of the Official World Golf Ranking after winning six times, including victories at the Masters and British Open, as well as a pair of World Golf Championships titles. He joined Vijay Singh as the only players to earn more than \$10 million in a single season.

Phil Mickelson, who won his second major at the PGA Championship, and Singh both recorded four-win seasons and made the competition for the top spot spirited. Bart Bryant, Kenny Perry, Justin Leonard and Padraig Harrington were also multiple winners, with each entering the winner's circle twice.

Established veterans thrived on the PGA TOUR in 2005. Fred Funk made history when he became the oldest player to win our flagship event, THE PLAYERS Championship, at age 48, while Mark Calcavecchia, Brad Faxon and Robert Gamez all posted victories.

New stars made their presence felt in 2005. PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year Sean O'Hair first gained attention by finishing runner-up at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship and then went a step further two months later, capturing the title at the John Deere Classic.

The story of the summer had to be that of Nationwide Tour Player of the Year Jason Gore. After contending at the U.S. Open, Gore returned to the Nationwide Tour and promptly won three consecutive tournaments, including the Cox Classic where he fired a second-round 59. The three wins earned him an instant promotion to the PGA TOUR. He wasn't finished though, as he won the PGA TOUR's 84 LUMBER Classic just over one month later.

Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player reprised their roles as Presidents Cup captains. The World Golf Hall of Famers led their teams in a contest that came down to the final holes on Sunday before the U.S. team kept its record perfect at home.

On the Champions Tour, 60-year-old Hale Irwin continued to amaze and show no signs of slowing down. He won a Tour-best four times and finished second on the money list to Player of the Year Dana Quigley. The year-long Charles Schwab Cup competition came down to the final day of the season, with Tom Watson winning for the second time.


In addition to Gore's heroics on the Nationwide Tour, Troy Matteson had a year to remember with two victories and a Tour-record \$495,008 in earnings. They will lead a strong graduating class on the 2006 PGA TOUR.

The upcoming season promises to continue this momentum and provide many compelling story lines.

We are also looking forward to the 2007 season where we will see the debut of the year-long FedEx Cup competition and a revamped Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass, home to THE PLAYERS, which is undergoing numerous improvements this year.

We Are The PGA TOUR

The name of our organization is the PGA TOUR, a tax-exempt membership group of professional golfers that plays more than 100 official money tournaments on three Tours – the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. Our headquarters are located in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL, southeast of Jacksonville.

We should never be referred to as the PGA as we are a different organization than the PGA (of America). We are the PGA TOUR. On second reference, you can call us the TOUR.

The PGA is the Professional Golfers' Association of America, a membership organization for the nation's club professionals. The PGA runs the PGA Championship, Senior PGA Championship and Ryder Cup Matches, among other championships. The PGA headquarters are located in Palm Beach Gardens, FL.

The PGA TOUR and PGA of America were affiliated until 1968, when the tournament players, a small subset of the total PGA membership, broke

away to form the Tournament Players Division and gain more control of their finances and tournament schedule. The Tournament Players Division was renamed the PGA TOUR in 1975.

Two other American golf organizations are involved in men's professional tournament play, independent of the PGA TOUR but with their marquee events included on the PGA TOUR schedule as non-PGA TOUR cosponsored tournaments. The United States Golf Association, with headquarters in Far Hills, NJ, oversees the national championships (U.S. Open, U.S. Senior Open, U.S. Amateur, U.S. Women's Amateur, etc.) and administers the Rules of Golf, among other duties. The Augusta (GA) National Golf Club plays host to the Masters Tournament. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland oversees the British Open and administers the world's golf rules jointly with the USGA.



The PGA TOUR is the world's foremost golf Tour, with 48 official money events from January through November. The membership includes 19 of the top 25 in the Official World Golf Ranking entering 2006, including Nos. 1-5 Tiger Woods, Vijay Singh, Phil Mickelson, Retief Goosen and Ernie Els.

The Champions Tour celebrated its silver anniversary in 2005 and continues to combine extremely competitive golf for champions of the game age 50 and above, with a fan-friendly environment that allows players to be the most approachable and accessible in all of sports.

Prize Money: More than \$52 million

Membership: 24 international players, 12 countries

Tournament Sites: 17 states, 3 countries

TV: The Golf Channel, NBC, ABC, CBS, USA, ESPN

Competition Awards: Charles Schwab Cup (Season-long points competition), Jack Nicklaus Trophy (Player of the Year), Arnold Palmer Award (Leading money-winner), Byron Nelson Trophy (Scoring average), Rookie of the Year, Comeback Player of the Year



The Nationwide Tour grows as a virtual extension of the PGA TOUR. Through 2005, 175 PGA TOUR tournaments have been won by former Nationwide Tour players. The top 20 players on the money list qualify for the PGA TOUR the following season.

Prize Money: More than \$16.8 million

Membership: 49 international players, 18 countries

Tournament Sites: 22 states, 4 countries

TV: The Golf Channel

The events are aired live, tape-delayed or in a highlights-package format. The exact amount of coverage for any given event varies from country to country and coverage area to coverage area.

The second- and third-place finishers earn \$300,000 and \$200,000, respectively. Contested during nine PGA TOUR events in January and February, each tournament winner receives 100 points, with a gradual decline of points awarded down to 10 for a 10th-place finish.

Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers:

The PGA TOUR Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers is a points race encompassing the final 11 official PGA TOUR events of the season. The overall champion of the Fall Finish earns \$500,000. The second- and third-place finishers earn \$300,000 and \$200,000 respectively. The winner of each Fall Finish event is awarded 100 points, with a gradual decline of points down to 10 for 10th place.

A Brief History of the PGA TOUR

It is not always easy to pinpoint the exact beginning of something. So it is with the PGA TOUR. Certainly, professionals have competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in the United States.

In 1895, 10 professional golfers and one amateur played in the first U.S. Open in Newport, RI. Shortly thereafter, tournaments began to pop up across the country. There was the Western Open in 1899. But this was not “tour” golf. The events lacked continuity.

Interest in the game, however, continued to grow. American professionals were rapidly improving. And when John McDermott became the first American-born player to win the U.S. Open in 1911, interest in the game blossomed.

That interest became enthusiasm in 1913 when Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray came to the United States to play an exhibition tour and compete in the U.S. Open. When 20-year-old amateur Francis Ouimet defeated the pair in a playoff for the Open at Brookline, MA, golf became front-page news and a game for everyone.

In the early 1920s, a series of tournaments was held on the West Coast, in Texas and Florida. These events were held in the winter, and the golfers played their way east and up to Pinehurst, NC, in the spring. By the middle of the decade, the tour was doing relatively well—offering \$77,000 in total prize money.

The first “playing pros” organization was formed in 1932. Two years earlier, Bob Harlow had been named manager of the PGA Tournament Bureau. The tour became more structured following World War II and exploded in the late 1950s and early ‘60s. When Arnold Palmer, televised golf and President Dwight D. Eisenhower arrived on the scene in the late 1950s, the eyes of the world were on golf. This exposure inspired millions to try the game.

Most golf historians would trace the “formal” beginning of the PGA TOUR to late 1968, when the “Tournament Players Division” split from the PGA of America and hired Joseph C. Dey as its first Commissioner. That organization became the modern-day PGA TOUR. Dey served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman on March 1, 1974.

During Beman’s administration, the value of tournament purses escalated at an unprecedented rate: PGA TOUR assets grew from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$200 million, and total revenues increased from \$3.9 million to \$229 million in 1993.

Timothy W. Finchem, previously the TOUR’s Deputy Commissioner and Chief Operating Officer, became the TOUR’s third Commissioner on June 1, 1994. In 1995, Finchem undertook a restructuring program designed to strengthen the PGA TOUR’s core business, which is its competitions, expand

the TOUR's international scope and prepare it to enter the 21st century. In 1996, Finchem helped spearhead formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours, as golf's five world-governing bodies laid the groundwork for taking competition into the next millennium. In 1997, the Federation announced the World Golf Championships, which made their debut in 1999 with three events—the Accenture Match Play Championship, Bridgestone Invitational and American Express Championship. The World Cup joined this group in 2000.

Since 1938, PGA TOUR events have donated more than \$1 billion to charity, a milestone reached late in the 2005 season. This giving makes a mark in the communities in which the TOUR plays through its charity campaign, "Giving Back...The Heart of the PGA TOUR."

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR also is much broader today. The Champions Tour, which celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2005, has been labeled the most successful senior sports venture in history. An interactive

element with fans and television viewers has brought new exposure to the Tour. Since starting out with just two cosponsored events and \$250,000 in prize money in 1980, the Champions Tour has grown to approximately 30 events. And the Charles Schwab Cup will also be contested for the sixth time in 2006. The Nationwide Tour, under that sponsorship umbrella for the fourth year, has been recognized as a virtual extension of the PGA TOUR with its excellent level of play that saw approximately 60 percent of its alumni making up the 2006 PGA TOUR. The Nationwide Tour provides outstanding golf competition in more than 30 communities while raising significant charity dollars. Among the former players on this Tour who have gone on to star on the PGA TOUR are David Duval, Tom Lehman, Jeff Maggert, Stuart Appleby, Stewart Cink, David Toms, 2003 U.S. Open winner Jim Furyk and 2003 PGA Champion Shaun Micheel. Through 2005, 175 former Nationwide Tour players had gone on to win on the PGA TOUR.

Also continuing to grow is the Tournament Players Club Network. When the PGA TOUR opened the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass in 1980, it introduced the era of stadium golf and record-breaking attendance. Owned and/or operated by the TOUR, these courses are the only major-league sports venues owned by the players themselves. Of note for 2006 will be the reworking of the Stadium Course at the TPC at Sawgrass, with refurbished fairways and rebuilt greens and a new, enlarged clubhouse.

Singh's victories include his third major championship title, at the PGA Championship. Phil Mickelson wins twice, including a birdie on the 72nd hole to capture his first major title at the Masters Tournament. Retief Goosen wins a second U.S. Open title and finishes the season with a victory at THE TOUR Championship presented by Coca-Cola. Rookie Todd Hamilton also wins twice, including a four-hole playoff victory over Ernie Els at the British Open. There are eight multiple winners on the season, led by Singh's nine wins and Ernie Els' three. Adam Scott is the season's youngest multiple winner, also becoming the youngest to take home THE PLAYERS Championship title. International players capture 26 of the 48 official money events. The charity total surpasses \$900 million, with \$1 billion in giving set to be reached by 2006.
- 2005** Tiger Woods wins a season-high six times and captures the Jack Nicklaus Trophy as the Player of the Year for the seventh time. He also captures the Arnold Palmer Award and for money earnings and Byron Nelson Award for low-stroke average. The victories push Woods to 46 career PGA TOUR victories, seventh on the all-time list. Woods' wins in the Masters and British Open up his major professional championship titles to 10, third on all-time list. Vijay Singh and Phil Mickelson each win four times. Singh is selected to the World Golf Hall of Fame and will be inducted in 2006. Mickelson wins his second major championship, at the PGA Championship. Other multiple winners include Kenny Perry, Justin Leonard, Padraig Harrington and Bart Bryant, who each win twice. The United States Team wins The Presidents Cup at the Robert Trent Jones Golf Club. Fred Funk (48) is the oldest winner, capturing THE PLAYERS Championship, and Rookie of the Year Sean O'Hair (22) is the youngest after winning the John Deere Classic. The charity total surpasses \$1 billion in late October.

The FedEx Cup Coming in 2007



The 2007 PGA TOUR season will see numerous significant changes highlighted by the creation of the FedEx Cup, a season-long points bonus competition that will be the centerpiece of the TOUR season.

The PGA TOUR Championship Series, which is comprised of a four-tournament stretch beginning in late August and culminating with THE TOUR Championship presented by Coca-Cola, will provide an exciting conclusion to the FedEx Cup. THE TOUR Championship field will remain at the top 30 players, but its date will move to mid-September from its current early November slot. The other three tournaments in the 2007 final Series will be played in major markets that are still to be announced. The FedEx Cup will offer one of the largest guaranteed bonus payouts of any professional sport, as well as the largest single winner's share.

Following the completion of THE TOUR Championship, players will participate in a Fall series of events which will determine the remainder of the top 125 players on the Official Money List who will be eligible to compete for the following season's FedEx Cup.

"We are very excited to announce these fundamental changes to the structure of the PGA TOUR in 2007," said PGA TOUR commissioner Tim Finchem. "Our management team put considerable time and energy into the evaluation process of where we are and where we want to be in coming years. We challenged ourselves to consider every viable option, from maintaining the current structure to making dramatic changes that best positions the TOUR for long-term appeal and growth.

"Making this ultimate scenario work was dependent upon the creation of a meaningful season-long points race, and we are delighted to announce FedEx's sponsorship of the competition. FedEx has been a great partner of the TOUR for 20 years, and its sponsorship of this compelling enhancement to our schedule will take our sport to a completely new level."

About the Commissioner



Timothy W. Finchem
Commissioner

Timothy W. Finchem, 58, is the third Commissioner of the PGA TOUR. Finchem succeeded Deane R. Beman as Commissioner on June 1, 1994. Beman had served for 20 years, replacing the late Joseph C. Dey, who had been the TOUR's Commissioner in its first five years, 1969-74.

Finchem, Deputy Commissioner and Chief Operating Officer of the TOUR under Beman since 1989, joined the TOUR staff as Vice President of Business Affairs in 1987.

As Commissioner, Finchem has greatly expanded the earnings opportunities for PGA TOUR players domestically and internationally. He also has taken leadership roles in the formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours and the World Golf Foundation, Inc.

His personal dedication to the success of the World Golf Foundation's First Tee initiative has helped that program achieve its initial objectives in developing facilities that will have an impact on the game for years to come.

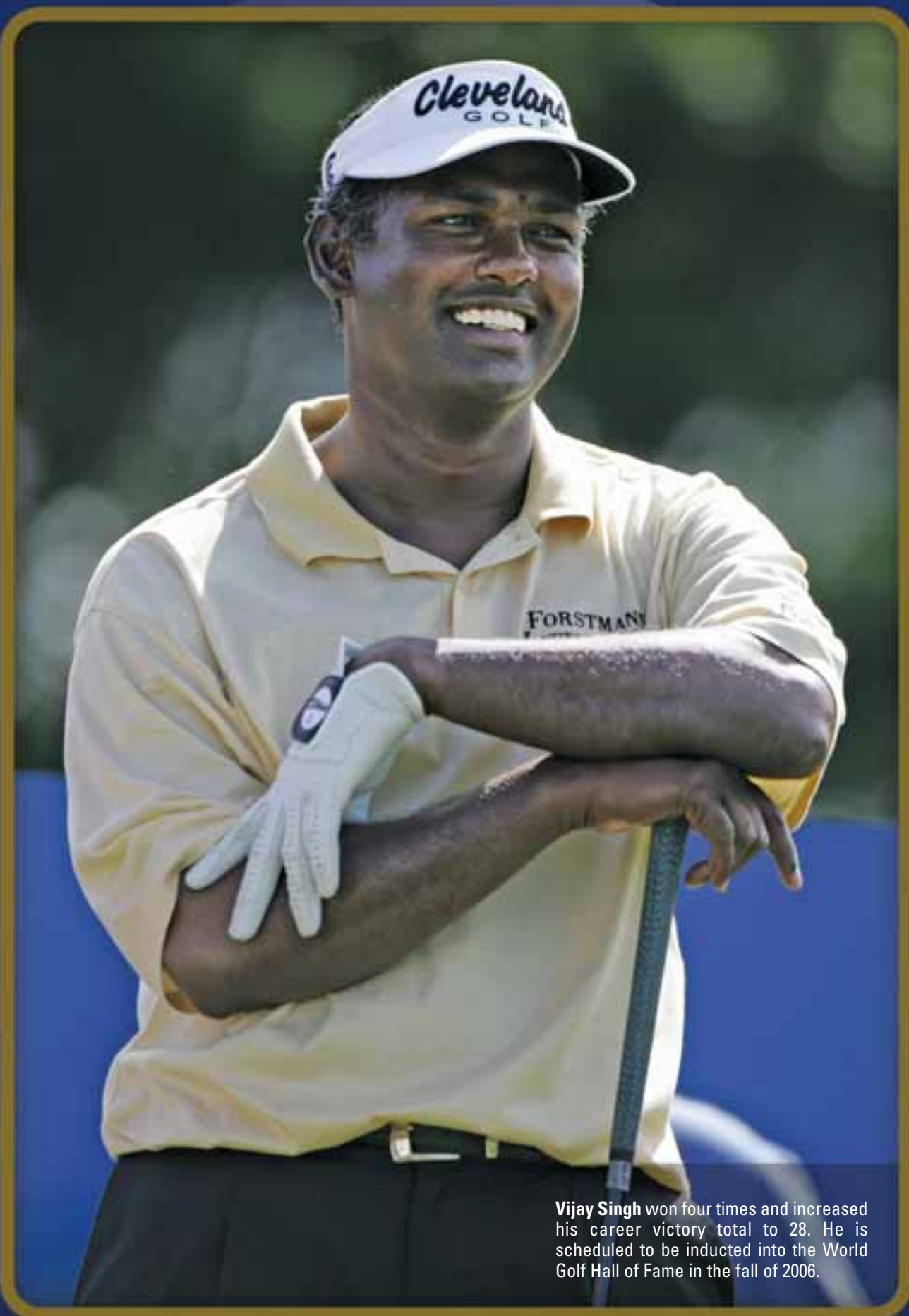
"Our primary purpose as a membership organization is to create outstanding playing and earnings opportunities for our players," Finchem says, "and we

are proud of what our tournaments do for charity (more than \$1 billion raised") and the active role we have been able to take as an organization in growing the game for future generations."

Born in Ottawa, IL, on April 19, 1947, Finchem graduated from Princess Anne High School in Virginia Beach, VA. He attended the University of Richmond on a debate scholarship, receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1969. He graduated from the University of Virginia Law School in 1973. After practicing law in Virginia Beach for three years, Finchem served in the White House as Deputy Advisor to the President in the Office of Economic Affairs in 1978 and 1979. In the early 1980s, Finchem co-founded the National Marketing and Strategies Group in Washington, D.C.

Finchem is the recipient of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America's Old Tom Morris Award for 2001 and the PGA of America's Distinguished Service Award for 2002. He was awarded the Dick Shaap Lifetime Achievement in Sports in 2005.

Married to the former Holly Bachand, Finchem is a father of four. The Finchems live in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL.



Vijay Singh won four times and increased his career victory total to 28. He is scheduled to be inducted into the World Golf Hall of Fame in the fall of 2006.

Posted even-par 71 on Friday and fell two behind 36-hole leader Chris Couch, then shared third-round lead with Furyk at 12-under after a 66 on Saturday. Final-round 3-over 74 left him five strokes behind Furyk and with his first top-10 in over a year (T8 at 2004 Memorial Tournament). It was his second top-10 in 42 starts since his win at the 2003 British Open...Finished T4 at the Buick Championship. Opened with a 6-under-par 64 to share the lead with J.L. Lewis. Posted four rounds in the 60s for the first time in his career, but came up two shots out of the Brad Faxon-Tjaart van der Walt playoff. It was his second top-10 of the season dating back to the Cialis Western Open, with four made cuts in that period and earnings of \$557,135.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

2004: Collected one top-10, a T8 at the Memorial Tournament...Held a one-stroke lead through two rounds at the MCI Heritage, but finished T25 after rounds of 75-73 on the weekend...Shared the 18- and 36-hole lead at the Memorial Tournament, only 18 miles from where he grew up in Ostrander, OH. Finished with rounds of 73-72 at Muirfield Village Golf Club for a T8 finish, the second top-10 of his career (34 events) and the first since his victory at the 2003 British Open. **2003:** Voted PGA TOUR Rookie of the Year. Pulled one of the greatest upsets in golf history, cap-

turing the British Open in first career major championship start. Rounds of 72-72-70-69--283 topped Vijay Singh and Thomas Bjorn by one shot. Entered final round tied for third, but grabbed lead with birdies on six of first 11 holes on Sunday, putting him two up on Bjorn, three ahead of Singh and four up on Tiger Woods. Went to No. 18 three behind Bjorn after bogeys at Nos. 12, 14, 15 and 17. Saved par with 10-foot putt on No. 18, and earned title when Bjorn finished 4-over par on the final four holes. First player since Francis Ouimet at the 1913 U.S. Open to win a major in his first try. First player to win first British Open start since Tom Watson in 1975. Youngest British Open winner at 26 years, 1 month, 24 days, since Tiger Woods won in 2000 at the age of 24 years, 6 months, and 23 days. Jumped from 396th to 35th in the Official World Golf Ranking, the biggest jump since the Ranking began in 1986. One of four first-time major champions in 2003, joining Mike Weir (Masters), Jim Furyk (U.S. Open), and Shaun Micheel (PGA). Qualified for the British Open via a T13 finish at the 100th Western Open, his best career finish to date and first career top-25 finish...Just one month after British Open triumph, returned to home state to play in the WGC-NEC Invitational at Firestone CC in Akron. First-round co-leader with Sergio Garcia after a 6-under-par 64. Married Candace Beatty in Kent on Saturday evening, Aug. 23 after the completion of the third round. Finished T30. **2002:** Played the Hooters Tour for a second consecutive season, finishing 10th on the money list and winning in Myrtle Beach, SC...Placed T26 at the PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament. **Amateur:** Three-time All-American at Kent State...Won the Ohio Amateur in 1999 and 2000. Became the sixth player in tournament history to post four rounds in the 60s and did it for the second time (1993)...Fourth top-10 in a major was a T4 at the PGA Championship...Added his third win on the PGA TOUR and first in a World Golf Championship at the WGC-American Express Championship in Ireland. Led by two strokes after the second and third rounds and defeated Thomas Bjorn by a stroke after a final-round 69 to collect the \$1.2 million check. Moved back into second, past Tiger Woods, in the Official World Golf Ranking...Two weeks later, won the HSBC World Match Play title on the European Tour for a record sixth time. On his 35th birthday, beat Lee Westwood 2 and 1 Sunday to capture \$1.8 million...After T10 finish at THE TOUR Championship, dropped to No. 3 in Official World Golf Ranking behind Tiger Woods. **2003:** Played 17 PGA TOUR and nine European Tour events. In addition to winning twice on the PGA TOUR in Hawaii and finishing ninth on the TOUR's money list, compiled four official European Tour wins (in Australia, Austria, Scotland) and won the European Tour Order of Merit. Also won his fifth career HSBC World Match Play Championship, a European Tour-approved special event. One of three players (along with Mike Weir and Kenny Perry) that posted three top-10s in majors. T6 at Masters, T5 at U.S. Open and T5 at PGA Championship... Became the first player since Steve Jones in 1989 to capture the first two tournaments of the season when he won the Mercedes Championships and Sony Open in Hawaii in early January. All five of his brothers became golf professionals. Brother Angel won the 1993 Dominion Open on Nationwide Tour. Appointed Minister De Deportes (Minister of Sports) in 1999. Raised more than \$700,000 for needy patients at hospitals in Asuncion, including victims from the Aug. 1, 2004 fire that claimed nearly 500 lives.

2005 SEASON:

Finished in the top five (No. 4) on the TOUR money list for the fourth time in his 12-year career in a season which included his 10th TOUR win and a career-high four runner-up finishes. In July, picked up his first win since the 2003 Buick Open and since his wrist surgery in early 2004 at the Cialis Western Open. Shared the first- and third-round leads. Fell four behind leader Ben Curtis through three holes of Sunday's final round but fought back with five birdies over the remainder of the round and finished with a 2-under 69 to defeat Tiger Woods by two strokes. Led the

field in Greens in Regulation (75%). Has six top-10s, including four straight, in 10 starts at Cog Hill G&CC. Recorded his first top-10 of the season in his second start with a T8 at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Posted his fourth top-10 finish in last five appearances at the Ford Championship at Doral with a T8. The \$165,000 check moved him over the \$20-million mark in career earnings and placed him at the top of the all-time earnings list at the Ford Championship at Doral. Followed that up with a T9 at The Honda Classic to post back-to-back top-10s for the first time since his wrist surgery in early 2004. Missed the cut at the PLAYERS Championship for the first time since 1995, the first year he qualified for the tournament at TPC of Sawgrass. Best effort of the season was a T2 at the MCI Heritage thanks to a final-round 3-under 69. Only five players posted a final-round score in the 60s at the Harbour Town Golf Links. It marked his first top-5 finish on TOUR since winning the 2003 Buick Open. In next start, lost in a four-hole playoff to Vijay Singh at the Wachovia Championship. Made two birdies on the final three holes, including a 7-footer on the 72nd hole to get into the playoff with Singh and Sergio Garcia, who had a six-stroke advantage heading into the final round on Sunday. Finished T8 at the Memorial tournament, thanks to weekend rounds of 64-68. Led or shared lead through the first 54 holes of the Barclays Classic, but finished one stroke behind Padraig Harrington as Irishman drained 66-foot eagle putt on 72nd hole to clinch victory. Furyk led by two strokes with three holes remaining but made consecutive bogeys on Nos. 16 and 17. Forced to lay up on No. 18, watched Harrington clinch victory. Rounds of 67-68 on the weekend aided a T6 finish at the Buick Open, fifth straight top-10 at Warwick Hills G&CC for 2003 champion. Despite suffering from rib injury throughout the week, went undefeated in Presidents Cup play, posting a 3-0-2 (2-0-1 with Tiger Woods) record includ-

ing a Sunday singles victory over previously undefeated Adam Scott. Posted fourth runner-up finish of the season at the Michelin Championship at Las Vegas. Carded four rounds in the 60s to match Wes Short, Jr., but tee shot on second playoff hole (par-3 17th) found water hazard. Short clinched victory with tap-in par out of a greenside bunker. Finished third on TOUR in Scoring Average (69.27) and All-Around Ranking. Chipped in on the second playoff hole to beat Adam Scott, Retief Goosen and Darren Clarke at the Nedbank Challenge in South Africa. Won \$1.2 million.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

2004: Did not have a win for the first time since the 1997 season after undergoing arthroscopic surgery to repair cartilage damage in his left wrist on March 22, which sidelined him for nearly three months. First Monday finish since the 2001 Buick Classic. \$900,000 paycheck was largest of career. At beginning of the week was going to pull out of the Ford Championship due to wrist injury. **2002:** T4 at THE PLAYERS Championship was fifth top-10 there in the last six years...Did not defend his title at the Greater Greensboro Chrysler Classic due to trouble with right eye from LASIK surgery. Had two surgeries over last four months to fix an astigmatism...Tied career best with a T5 finish at the U.S. Open, closing with a 1-under-par 69. On Sunday, sporting a stars and stripes golf shirt dedicated to New York City, recorded an ace with a 3-iron on the 207-yard 17th hole, one of three holes-in-one on the week...In only fifth career British Open appearance, finished T8 for low American, aided by a final-round 66. **2001:** At 45, had a career year in money earned with \$2,875,319 (seventh on money list) and tournament titles (two) in a single season. First 45-year old to win twice in same season since Hale Irwin in 1990. Only Julius Boros (age 47 and 48

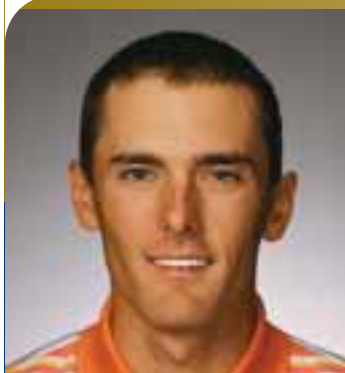

Stewart Cink's own closing 65 snatched away win...Withdrawn from INTERNATIONAL due to torn cartilage in right knee, then underwent surgery prior to PGA Championship... Participated in third Presidents Cup and compiled a 3-2 record while lending support to victorious United States team...Prior to official money season, was victorious in unofficial Williams World Challenge. **1999:** Made successful return to form from off-season shoulder surgery...Four runner-up finishes that year—Bay Hill Invitational, Greater Milwaukee Open, FedEx St. Jude Classic and Buick Open—were most ever for him in a single season. **1998:** Turned in T2 at THE PLAYERS Championship...Claimed a solo third at the Buick Classic and was a T5 at the U.S. Open, his third straight top-five finish in the event...Did not make the cut at the British Open after suffering a separated right shoulder just prior to the event while on a family outing in England. Was attempting a handstand for his children when the mishap occurred and played with the injury the remainder of the year before undergoing surgery in November in the Los Angeles area. **1997:** Tied with Tiger Woods after 54 holes at the Mercedes Championships and after final round was canceled, the two played off at the par-3 seventh hole. Led by nine after bogey-free 64, eventually winning by six over Brad Faxon. **1995:** Earned second win at Colonial National Invitation...Opened that season with second at United Airlines Hawaiian Open...After MCI Classic, missed a month of the season due to colon surgery...Third at U.S. Open after sharing 54-hole lead with Greg Norman. **1994:** First served notice of things to come with breakthrough season that included his first TOUR victory at Memorial Tournament. 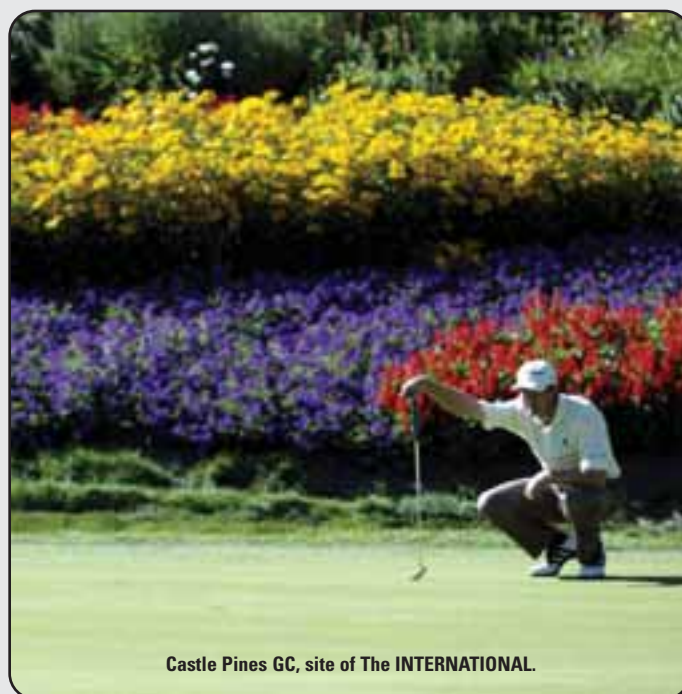

2005 SEASON:

Recorded two victories and posted a 3-1-1 record for victorious United States Presidents Cup squad...Earned his ninth career win on the PGA TOUR by firing a final-round 67 and coming from three strokes behind 72-hole leader Joe Ogilvie to win by three strokes at the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Five rounds in the 60s led to his first win in almost two years (Honda Classic, March 16, 2003) and the fifth come-from-behind win of his career. Was his first victory at the tournament in eight tries and has yet to miss a cut in the 90-hole event...Second daughter Avery Kate was born just prior to the Masters (March 29)...Finished T13 at Augusta, best finish since a T8 in 1998...Collected multiple wins in a season for just the second time in his 12-year career after winning the FedEx St. Jude Classic by a stroke over two-time defending champion David Toms. Closing 77 dropped him to T4. **2001:** After struggling early in the season with a swing change, rallied to once again qualify for THE TOUR Championship for the seventh consecutive time by earning \$1,783,842. Had a very successful year playing in Texas by winning once and added three other top-10s in as many starts. Was able to defend his title in the Texas Open at La Cantera. Became the first player to win in consecutive years at the Texas Open since

Arnold Palmer won three in a row (1960-62). Led by three strokes after 36 holes and held that lead to capture sixth victory by two strokes over J.J. Henry and Matt Kuchar. Earlier in the year, posted a T4 at Shell Houston Open, a T6 at the Verizon Byron Nelson Classic and a T5 in the MasterCard Colonial. **2000:** Returned to the winner's circle after a one-year drought...Along with a victory, also finished second three times...Earned a five-stroke victory at Westin Texas Open. Shot 66-67 and stood one back through 36 holes. Third-round 71 produced share of the lead. His 66 on Sunday ended 21/2-year victory drought and earned fifth PGA TOUR career title. First victory since 1998 PLAYERS Championship and first title in home state. **1999:** Didn't record a victory for first time in three years, but was still among the top 10 of money list for third consecutive year...Posted seven top 10s, including his first three starts...Nearly won his second British Open in July, losing to Paul Lawrie in three-way playoff with Jean Van de Velde...His 45-foot putt on 17th hole at The Country Club during Sunday singles match with Jose Maria Olazabal earned decisive half-point that regained Ryder Cup for U.S. Won four consecutive holes (12-15) to square match and set up his 17th-hole heroics. **1998:** Won a tournament for third year in a row and earned \$1,671,823 to finish eighth on money list...Nabbed one of the year's biggest prizes in March, when he came from five strokes back to overtake Lee Janzen on the final day at THE PLAYERS Championship. Opened with a 72 and followed with rounds of 69-70 before firing a 5-under-par 67 Sunday for a two-stroke victory over Tom Lehman and Glen Day. Victory was worth \$720,000, at that point the largest payday of his career. Five-stroke comeback was largest ever on Stadium Course at TPC at Sawgrass and was one shy of Raymond Floyd's tournament record established in 1981 at Sawgrass CC. **1997:** Won first major championship at British Open. After opening with 67 in blustery conditions at Royal Troon, trailed Jim Furyk and Darren Clarke by two strokes. Remained two back after second-round 66, but fell five behind Jesper Parnevik after three rounds. Closing 65 was only round in 60s by a player who began round under par. Won by three strokes over Parnevik and Clarke. At age 25, was youngest British Open champion since Seve Ballesteros won in 1979 at 22...Nearly earned second major title at PGA Championship. Shared third-round lead with Davis Love III after course-record 65 and stood seven strokes in front of next-closest rival. Closing 71 left him alone in second, five strokes behind Love...Member of U.S. Ryder Cup team. **1996:** First PGA

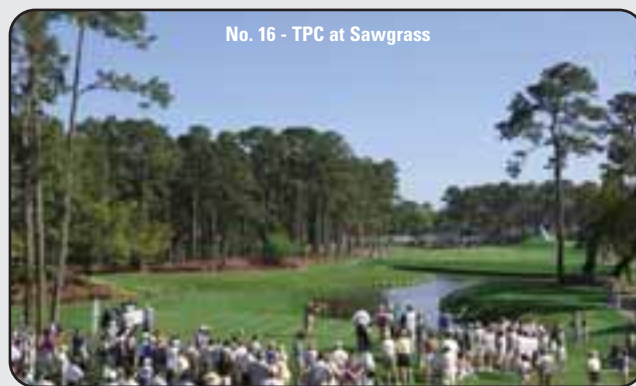

Love was given a custom-built motorcycle by his wife for his 40th birthday.

After opening with a 2-over 73, bounced back with a career-low 11-under 60 to tie the

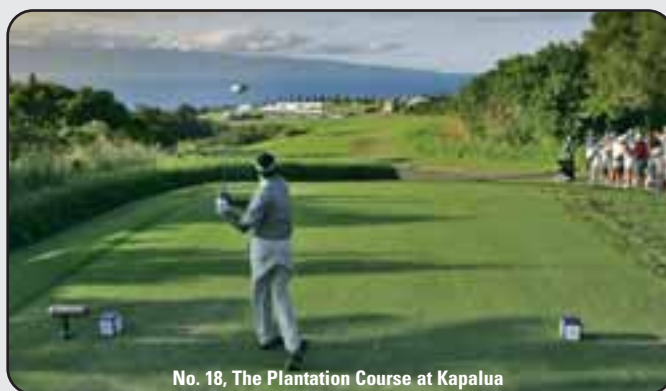

Will be inducted in the fall of 2006...Held the lead after each of the first three rounds at the Mercedes Championships, but a closing 74 at The Plantation Course at Kapalua dropped finish to T5. CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

Has won in Malaysia, France, Nigeria, Ivory Coast, Morocco, Zimbabwe, Singapore, Spain, Germany, England, South Africa, Sweden, Taiwan, Canada and U.S. **2004:** Put together one of the finest seasons in golf history, posting nine wins and earning a PGA TOUR-record \$10,905,166 while becoming No. 1 in the Official World Golf Ranking. Became just the sixth player in TOUR history to accumulate nine wins in a season and first since Tiger Woods in 2000. The others: Paul Runyan (9/1933), Byron Nelson (18/1945), Ben Hogan (13/1946, 10/1948) and Sam Snead (11/1950). Led the TOUR in top-10s for the second straight season with 18 in 29 events. The 36 over a two-year period (2003-2004) were the most since Tom Kite recorded 36 during the 1981 (21) and 1982 (15) seasons... Finished second, one stroke behind Stuart Appleby, at the season-opening Mercedes Championships for ninth consecutive top-10 dating back to the 2003 WGC-NEC Invitational. Posted a 9-under-par 64 in the second round, including seven consecutive birdies on Nos. 12-18, to take the 36-hole lead by one stroke over Appleby... The next week, finished T10 at the Sony Open in Hawaii, aided by four rounds in the 60s... Posted his 11th consecutive top-10 on TOUR, dating back to the 2003 WGC-NEC Invitational, with a T3 at the FBR Open... Picked up a victory for the third consecutive year and sixth out of the last seven with his win at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Shared third-round lead with Aron Oberholser before final-round 69 (one of just five rounds in the 60s Sunday) gave him a three-stroke victory over Jeff Maggert. Extended his consecutive top-10 streak to 12 straight, two behind Jack Nicklaus for the modern-day record and longest on TOUR since Nicklaus had 12 straight in 1975. Win jumped him to the top of the money list for the first time in 2004... Top-10 streak of 12 straight ended the next week after missed cut at Buick Invitational... Past champion recovered from opening rounds of 75-73 to finish T6 at the Masters. Top-10 was fourth in 11 appearances at Augusta National, including three straight... With rounds of 74-66-69-68-277, won the Shell Houston Open for the second time in three years. Opening 74 was highest first-round score for winner on TOUR since Mark O'Meara posted 74 in opening round en route to victory at the 1998 Masters. First player since Kenny Perry (2003) to win PGA TOUR events in back-to-back weeks, coming from four strokes back in the final round to capture the HP Classic of New Orleans for 18th career TOUR victory. Second time with back-to-back TOUR victories (1998 PGA and International) and fourth Monday finish victory (1997 Memorial Tournament, 2003 John Deere Classic, 2004 Shell Houston Open). Surpassed \$30-million in career earnings and re-took 2004 PGA TOUR Official Money List lead with \$4,267,866... Won fourth event of season at Buick Open, holding off John Daly by one shot and Tiger Woods by two. Also held a share of the 36-hole lead and entered final round with a two-stroke lead over Daly. The following week, win at the Bell Canadian Open took three extra holes versus Canadian Mike Weir. Trained Weir by three strokes through 54 holes and posted final-round, 2-under 69 but did not get into playoff until Weir bogeyed the 72nd hole... Earned wire-to-wire victory for the first time in his career at the 84 LUMBER Classic. Pulled ahead on back nine Monday morning to win by four strokes. Victory moved him to No. 1 on the money list, a position he held for three weeks... Won fourth TOUR event of season by posting four rounds in the 60s at the FUNAI Classic at Walt Disney World Resort. Held second-round lead and shared third-round lead with Stewart Cink, John Rollins and Scott Verplank. Paycheck moved him into the top spot on the money list for second time during season. To be eligible under this category, a Life Member must maintain a scoring average no greater than three strokes above the field average for the rounds of golf in which they have played during each calendar year...Spent most of the season on the Champions Tour, playing only two events on the PGA TOUR...Along with Luke Donald, played the first two rounds of the British Open at St. Andrews with Jack Nicklaus, who was making his last appearance in a major championship. Went on to make his second consecutive cut in the event and posted a 1-over 289 total to finish T41...Made his 32nd Masters appearance but did not make the cut...Ended almost a two-year official victory drought when he triumphed for the second time at the Senior British Open, this time at Royal Aberdeen, his sixth overall title in Scotland. 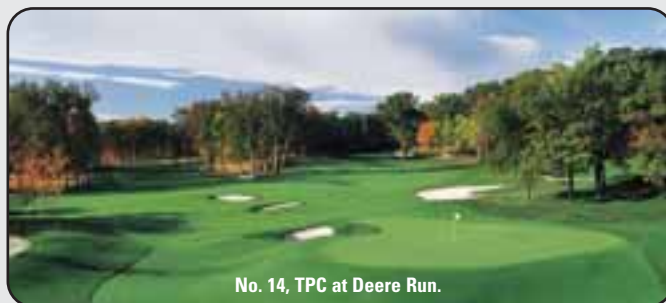

In eight starts at the Mercedes event, has two wins and eight top-10 finishes. Picked up his first win in a TOUR stroke-play event since October 2003 (WGC-American Express Championship) with a three-stroke victory over Luke Donald, Charles Howell III and Tom Lehman at Buick Invitational. made an early exit at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. Woods finished 36 holes at 1-over 141 in Dallas, TX and missed the cut by one stroke...Posted back-to-back runner-up finishes in his next two starts at the U.S. Open and Cialis Western Open, finishing two back in both. The runner-up at the U.S. Open was just his second in 40 major starts. His \$540,000 check at the Western allowed him to become the first player in TOUR history to surpass \$50 million in career earnings...Earned 10th professional major title at the British Open at the age of 29 years, six months and 17 days in his 35th major as a professional. Posted rounds of 66-67-71-70—274 at St. Andrews to defeat nearest challenger Colin Montgomerie by five strokes. The youngest and quickest to win each of the four major championships twice. Jack Nicklaus was the first to accomplish the feat at 31 years, one month and seven days of age when he won his second PGA Championship in 1971 in his 37th major as a professional. Sixth player in British Open history to win in wire-to-wire fashion—Ted Ray (1912), Bobby Jones (1927), Gene Sarazen (1932), Henry Cotton (1934) and Tom Weiskopf (1973)...In next start, finished T2 at the Buick Open, punctuated by back-to-back eagles in the second round en route to tying his career low, an 11-under-par 61. Sixth career top-10 in seven starts at Buick Open for 2002 champion...Opened the PGA Championship with a 5-over 75 but rallied to finish T4 and collect his 21st top-10 finish in 42 career major championships (36 as a professional) starts. Was T113 through the first round, his worst start in a major as a professional...Posted a 2-2-1 record at Presidents Cup despite suffering from rib injury...Picked up his fourth WGC-American Express Championship victory, the fourth tournament he has captured four times (Bay Hill Invitational, WGC-NEC Invitational, Masters Tournament) by coming from two strokes back and defeating John Daly on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff at Harding Park Golf Course in San Francisco. Won for the 10th time in 19 WGC starts and improved his career playoff record to 8-1. Was his sixth top-10 in the event in six starts. The win was his ninth in California...Missed second cut of the season at FUNAI Classic...Finished runner-up at THE TOUR Championship to surpass \$10 million in season's earnings for the first time in career...Despite a sprained ankle, beat Kaname Yokoo on the fourth hole of a playoff to repeat at the Dunlop Phoenix in Japan.

Finished the season with an adjusted scoring average of 68.41, the second-lowest in TOUR history. Won five times...Became the first player since Jack Nicklaus in 1972 to capture the Masters and U.S. Open in the same season...Earned third consecutive victory at the Bay Hill Invitational, the first player to win three different TOUR events (the Memorial Tournament [1999-2001] and the WGC-NEC Invitational [1999-2001]) three straight times. With 30th career TOUR victory, surpassed Jack Nicklaus for most wins before the age of 30...Earned third Masters title, joining Jack Nicklaus (1965-66) and Nick Faldo (1989-90) as the only consecutive winners there...Earned his eighth major title with sixth wire-to-wire victory in U.S. Open history. His 12-under 272 total tied the Open record of Jack Nicklaus and Lee Janzen and broke the Open mark in relation to par...Completed career Grand Slam with eight-stroke victory at British Open. His 19-under total at St. Andrews broke the British Open and major championship record in relation to par...In head-to-head battle with fellow California junior star Bob May, won PGA in three-hole playoff. Became first player since Denny Shute in 1936-37 to defend PGA title. Woods and May each played the final-round back nine in 31, with Woods birdieing the final two holes to force the three-hole playoff. Woods went birdie-par-par to win. Magee's drive bounded onto the green at the TPC of Scottsdale, caromed off Tom Byrum's putter and went into the hole for what was believed to be the first hole-in-one on a par 4 in TOUR history. "It looked like a hole-in-one and sounded like a hole-in-one. But I still wasn't sure it was one," Magee said. Byrum was squatting down looking over a putt when the ball deflected off his putter and rolled about 8 feet directly into the hole for a rare double-eagle ace. Earned \$500,000 in the 1999 WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship, losing to Jeff Maggert in the final. In 1998, earned career-best \$964,302 and was runner-up at the Memorial Tournament, four strokes behind Fred Couples. Most recent victory came at 1994 Northern Telecom Open. Closing 67 gave him a two-stroke margin over Loren Roberts, Vijay Singh, Jay Don Blake and Steve Stricker. In 1991, strong early-season run culminated in second career victory at rain-shortened Nestle Invitational over Tom Sieckmann. Later in 1999, shot 31-under-par 329, then the 90-hole scoring record, to force playoff with D.A. Weibring at Las Vegas Invitational. Won playoff with par on second extra hole. First TOUR victory came at 1988 Pensacola Open, where he rallied from four strokes back on final day. Three-time All-American at University of Oklahoma. Born in Paris, where his father worked in the oil business.

WGC money:

Money earned by players who are members of the PGA TOUR at the beginning of the year and by those who become Regular Members during the year (win an event or earn an immediate promotion by winning three times on the Nationwide Tour) in official World Golf Championships events (WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship, WGC-Bridgestone Invitational, WGC-American Express Championship) will be included on the Official PGA TOUR Money List. A non-voting member can become a voting member by playing in at least 15 PGA TOUR co-sponsored or approved tournaments in a calendar year. He must play in at least 15 PGA TOUR co-sponsored or approved tournaments in each calendar year to retain voting membership. He must also attend at least one player meeting designated by the PGA TOUR during each calendar year.

Rookie Eligibility:

A player's rookie year is defined as the year in which he plays his 10th official money event as a PGA TOUR member or finishes in the top 125 on the Official PGA TOUR Money List, (or earns official money equal to or in excess of 125th place on the Official PGA TOUR Money List), whichever comes first. PGA TOUR members who have played in at least 15 official money tournaments vote on this award.

Stuart Appleby is the leader in career earnings at the Mercedes Championships with \$2,268,155 in five starts.

In 2005, **Stuart Appleby** became the first player to repeat as tournament champion since **Lanny Wadkins** (1982-83) and the sixth in tournament history, joining Wadkins, **Gene Littler** (1955-57), **Jack Nicklaus** (1963-64), **Arnold Palmer** (1965-66) and **Tom Watson** (1979-80).

Stuart Appleby became the fourth consecutive foreign-born player to win the tournament — Appleby (2004, 2005), **Ernie Els** (2003) and **Sergio Garcia** (2002).

Stuart Appleby finished the 2005 tournament with 55 holes without a bogey, the second-best streak of the week behind **Vijay Singh**, who opened the event with 57 straight holes.

Stuart Appleby began the 2005 tournament with a 1-over 74 and played the final three rounds at 22-under par. He was the first player since **Johnny Miller** (75) in 1974 at La Costa CC (par 72) to win the tournament after opening with an over-par round.

The 2005 win gave **Stuart Appleby** a victory for the third consecutive season, is tied for the fourth-longest streak on TOUR. **Tiger Woods** (10/1996-2005) has the longest streak.

The four-stroke comeback by **Stuart Appleby** in 2005 was the largest comeback on the final day at the Mercedes Championships since **Sergio Garcia** overcame a four-stroke deficit to **Kenny Perry** in 2002. Garcia eventually won in a playoff over **David Toms**.

Vijay Singh's final-round 74 in 2005 broke his streak of 18 consecutive rounds at par or better in the Mercedes Championships. The last over-par round at the event came with a second-round 4-over 77 in 2000.

Ernie Els posted a 2-under-par 71 in the final round in 2005. Els has never posted an over-par round in this event, as it was his 27th consecutive round at par or better and 20th at the Plantation Course.

The 2005 third-round leader **Vijay Singh** snapped his streak of 11 consecutive wins when holding at least a share of the 54-hole lead.

Vaughn Taylor, the winner of the 2004 Reno-Tahoe Open, was the only first-time participant of the Mercedes Championships to finish in the top 10 at T8.

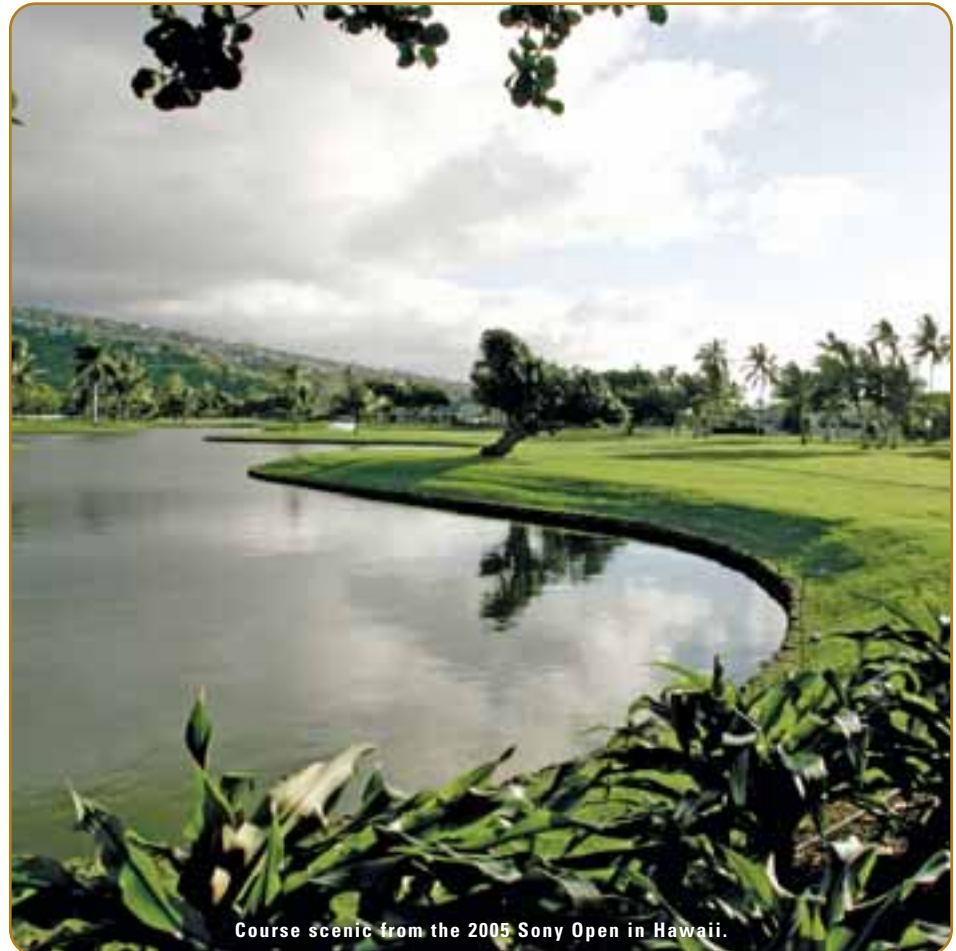

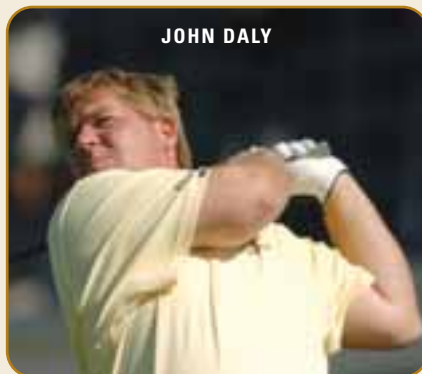

Tiger Woods (1999, 2003, 2005) joined **Phil Mickelson** (1993, 2000, 2001) as the only players who have won the Buick Invitational three times. Other multiple winners of the Buick Invitational include **Tommy Bolt** (1953, 1955); **Arnold Palmer** (1957, 1961); **J. C. Snead** (1975, 1976), **Tom Watson** (1977, 1980) and **Steve Pate** (1988, 1992).

Tiger Woods has won six PGA TOUR titles in San Diego County (1999, 2003, 2005 Buick Invitational, 1997 Mercedes Championship, 2003 and 2004 WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship). His earnings from those TOUR wins total \$4,626,000.

John Daly's 10-under 278 in 2004 was the highest Buick Invitational winning 72-hole total since **Phil Mickelson's** 278 won the event in 1993. The highest winning total in Buick Invitational history was 284 by **Jack Nicklaus** in 1969.

On Oct. 4, 2003, the United States Golf Association announced that Torrey Pines Golf Course's South Course will host the U.S. Open in 2008. Designed by William Bell, Sr. in 1957, Torrey Pines will be the second municipal facility to host the Open, following the lead of the Black Course at Bethpage State Park in New York in 2002.

The average score in the final round in 2005 was 73.049, with only nine players breaking 70. The final cumulative tournament average for the South was 73.057. The 2004 average was 73.411.

NOTES

Justin Leonard's winning score of 28-under-par 332 in 2005 marked the highest winning score in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic since **David Duval's** winning total of 334 in 1999. This was also the first time in five years the tournament champion did not reach 30-under par or better. The past three winners were all 30-under, and **Joe Durant** was a tournament-best 36-under when he won in 2001.

Only 11 times has a player reached the 30-under or less mark, including two players who have reached the mark twice, **Phil Mickelson** (30-under/2004, 30-under/2002) and **Mark Calcavecchia** (30-under/2001, 32-under/1997). The others were **Skip Kendall** (30-under), **Mike Weir** (30-under/2003), **David Berganio, Jr.** (30-under/2002), **Joe Durant** (36-under/2001), **Paul Stankowski** (32-under/2001), **John Cook** (33-under/1997) and **Tom Kite** (35-under/1993).

Bob Hope Chrysler Classic

NOTES

Justin Leonard (2005) is the third straight Bob Hope Chrysler Classic champion to win after coming off a winless season the previous year. Leonard's best finish in 2004 was a T2 at the PGA Championship. Both **Mike Weir** (2003) and **Phil Mickelson** (2004) were in similar positions when they reached the winner's circle.

At the 2005 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, **Tag Ridings** had quite a third round. Ridings had a seven-hole stretch that included a double eagle-two, an eagle-two and an eagle-three. Since the TOUR started keeping records in 1970, Ridings was the first player to record a double eagle-two and an eagle-two in the same round.

When **Phil Mickelson** won the 2004 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic it marked the fifth time in his career that he won his initial start of the season. The others were the Tucson Open (1991), Mercedes Championships (1994 and 1998) and the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic (2002).

In 2005, six players managed to finish the week without posting a round in the 70s, including **Justin Leonard** (1st), **Loren Roberts** (T4), **John Senden** (T6), **Andrew Magee** (T8), **Brian Davis** (T14) and **Tom Pernice, Jr.** (T14). In tournament history, 101 players have posted five rounds in the 60s in a single event.

Four times a player 40 or older has gone on to win the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. **Arnold Palmer** did it twice, in 1973 (44 years, 6 months, 29 days) and 1971 (42 years, 6 months, 26 days), **Tom Kite** was 44 years, 9 months, 25 days when he won in 1993 and **Bob Rosburg** was 46 years, 8 months, 8 days the day of his victory in 1972.

In 2005, **Peter Jacobsen** extended the tournament record for most cuts made (24) and finished T61. Jacobsen, the 1990 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic champion, made his 27th start in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Donnie Hammond (1986) is the last player to earn his first TOUR victory at the Hope, a streak of 19 years. Hammond and **Bill Rogers** (1978) are the only two first-time winners in the 55-year history of the event.

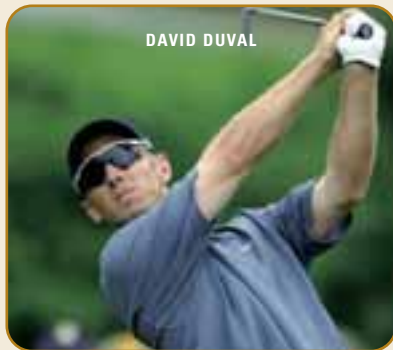

David Duval was the last player to shoot 59 on the PGA TOUR and the third in history, joining **Al Geiberger** (1977) and **Chip Beck** (1991). His feat came at the 1999 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. Duval shot his 59 in the final round at PGA West's Palmer Course on Jan. 24. Duval recorded one eagle and 11 birdies in his round and won by one stroke over **Steve Pate**. He rallied from a seven-stroke deficit after four rounds.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE 2006 BOB HOPE CHRYSLER CLASSIC

- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship prior to 1996.
- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship (only since 1996), Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship from 1996 to 1997 and from 2001 to 2005. Beginning with the 1998 winners of these events, winners are eligible for five years.
- Winners of the NEC World Series of Golf in the last 10 years (1996-1997).
- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2003-2005).
- Winners of official money World Golf Championship events in the last three years (2003-2005).
- The leader from the final Official PGA TOUR Money List in each of the last five calendar years (2001-2005).
- Playing members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team (2004).
- Current PGA TOUR members who were playing members from the last named U.S. and International Presidents Cup teams (2005).
- PGA TOUR members who use an exemption for 2006 as one of the leaders (either top 25 or top 50) from the Official PGA TOUR Career Money List.
- Winners of the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic prior to 1999, and winners of the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in 1999 and beyond, for a period of 10 years following their win.
- Either the current winner of the PGA Section Championship or the current PGA Section Player of the Year where the tournament is played, as determined by the Section.
- Eight sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Two from among the current year's PGA TOUR membership
 - Two from among the 2005 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties and the first through 20th finishers from the 2005 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
 - Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.
 - Life members of the PGA TOUR.
 - PGA TOUR members from the current Tournament Winners category.
- If necessary to complete the field, those PGA TOUR members among the top 125 finishers on the 2005 Official PGA TOUR Money List, in order of their position on such list.
- If necessary to complete the field, PGA TOUR members from the 2006 priority ranking of eligible players after the top 125, in order of their positions on such list.

NOTES

With a second-round 11-under-par 60 in 2005, **Phil Mickelson** tied the Tournament Players Club of Scottsdale record set by **Grant Waite** (1996) and later matched by **Mark Calcavecchia** (2001). The 60 was a career low for Mickelson, besting a 9-under-par 61 at the TPC at River Highlands en route to winning the 2001 Canon Greater Hartford Open.

With his victory at the 2005 FBR Open, **Phil Mickelson** became the 13th player to win the FBR Open multiple times.

The five-stroke victory at the 2005 FBR Open was the largest of **Phil Mickelson's** career in stroke-play events. Mickelson won by four over **Dave Rummells** at the 1993 Buick Invitational, by four over **Tiger Woods** and **Shigeki Maruyama** at the 2000 Buick Invitational and by four over **Mike Weir** at the 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am.

Phil Mickelson has multiple wins at nine PGA TOUR events: Chrysler Classic of Tucson (3), Buick Invitational (3), THE INTERNATIONAL, Mercedes Championships, FBR Open, Buick Championship, Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and BellSouth Classic.

Charles Warren was the only player in the field at the 2005 FBR Open to post all four rounds in the 60s (69-68-69-69). The former NCAA champion finished at 9-under-par 275, good enough for an eighth-place finish.

Three-time FBR Open champion **Mark Calcavecchia** (T9) has finished in the Top 10 nine times at the FBR Open since the event moved to the TPC of Scottsdale in 1987.

In the 19 years since the tournament moved to the TPC of Scottsdale in 1987, players who held or shared the 54-hole lead have won nine times.

Phil Mickelson put together his first career wire-to-wire victory at the 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and become the first wire-to-wire winner on the PGA TOUR in 2005. Mickelson also became the first wire-to-wire victor in the 72-hole history of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. Five players previously had held at least a share of the lead for the first three rounds before emerging victorious: **Tom Shaw** (1970) **Bert Yancey** (1970), **Lloyd Mangrum** (1953), **Jimmy Demaret** (1952), **Lloyd Mangrum** (1948) and **Ed Oliver** (1940).

At the conclusion of the 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, **Phil Mickelson** had led or shared the lead after each of his last seven rounds dating back to the second round of the previous week's FBR Open. Mickelson won the two events by a total of nine shots. His previous nine wins on TOUR had been by a total of six shots.

Phil Mickelson, the 1998 and 2005 champion, became the ninth multiple winner at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, joining **Davis Love III** (2001, 2003), **Mark O'Meara** (1985, 1989, 1990, 1992, 1997), **Tom Watson** (1977, 1978), **Johnny Miller** (1974, 1987, 1994), **Jack Nicklaus** (1967, 1972, 1973), **Billy Casper** (1958, 1963), **Cary Middlecoff** (1955, 1956) and **Lloyd Mangrum** (1948, 1953).

Five-time AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am champion **Mark O'Meara** made his 19th cut last year in his 24th career start at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, finishing T51. O'Meara has eight top-10s and 12 top-25s. **Peter Jacobsen**, set to make his 26th consecutive start at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in 2005, withdrew due to a right knee injury.

Only four players since 1970 have earned their first PGA TOUR victory at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am: **John Cook** (1981), **Steve Jones** (1988), **Brett Ogle** (1993) and **Matt Gogel** (2002).

Coupled with his win the previous week at the FBR Open, 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am champion **Phil Mickelson** won on back-to-back weeks for the first time on the PGA TOUR in his career. He had won back-to-back starts previously (1996 Nortel Open/1996 Phoenix Open) but there was a week between the victories. Mickelson became the first player to win back-to-back weeks since **Vijay Singh** won the Deutsche Bank Championship, Bell Canadian Open and 84 LUMBER Classic in consecutive weeks in 2004.

Mike Weir, with a second-place finish in 2005, has posted five top-10s in eight starts at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, including three consecutive dating back to 2003. Weir jumped into second place with the low final round at Pebble Beach Golf Links, with a 5-under-par 67, aided by a superior ball-striking day that saw him hit 14 of 14 fairways and 15 of 18 greens.

PGA TOUR rookie **Greg Owen** posted his first career top-10 on TOUR with a solo third-place finish in 2005. His previous best was a T23 at the 2001 British Open. Non-member **Graeme McDowell**, a former All-American at University of Alabama-Birmingham, posted his first career top-10 on the PGA TOUR with a T8 finish.

After missing virtually the entire 2004 season due to injury, **Paul Goydos** (T4) in 2005 recorded his first top-10 since a T7 at the 2003 Valero Texas Open and his best finish since a tie for second at the 1999 MasterCard Colonial.

Phil Mickelson posted a course-record 10-under 62 at Spyglass Hill in the first round of 2005, breaking the previous record of 64 by **Dan Forsman** in 1993 and later tied by **Steve Lowery** (1995) and **David Berganio, Jr.** (2001).

Mickelson's previous best round at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am was an opening 7-under-par 65 at Poppy Hills Golf Club in 1998 where he eventually went on to win when the players returned in August to complete the 54-hole tournament.

Phil Mickelson's 129 total at the 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am (Spyglass Hill-Poppy Hills) broke **Matt Gogel's** (2001) AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am first 36-hole record of 131 (Pebble Beach-Poppy Hills), matched by **Pat Perez** (Poppy Hills-Pebble Beach) in 2002.

Phil Mickelson has a history at all three golf courses that make up the rotation at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am:

- 1998 and 2005 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am champion.
- Poppy Hills Golf Course was the only NCAA Championship site where the three-time former NCAA champion at Arizona State failed to win the NCAA individual title in 1991 as a junior.
- Set the course record at Spyglass Hill Golf Course in 2005's first round with a 10-under-par 62.
- Played in his first PGA TOUR event as a professional at the 1992 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach, won by Tom Kite.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR 2006 AT&T PEBBLE BEACH NATIONAL PRO-AM

Eligible players in the 180-professional field are those players listed in order of priority under Section III-A of the Tournament Regulations, except that prior to such players, the following shall first be eligible:

- Winners of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am prior to 2000, and winners of the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in 2000 and beyond for a period of five years following their win.
- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship prior to 2000, and winners of these events in 2000 and beyond for a period of five years following their win.
- 16 sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Four from the current year's PGA TOUR membership.
 - Eight from among the 2005 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties and the first through 20th finishers on the 2005 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
 - Four "unrestricted" that must be awarded to professionals.

NOTE: Open Qualifying will not be held for the event.

NOTE: The sponsor will team each professional player with an amateur player. The PGA TOUR shall group the professional players and assign starting times. After three rounds, the field will be cut to the low 60 professionals and ties and exactly the low 25 pro-am teams. Professionals placing 61st to 70th and ties will receive official prize money normally distributed to those places.

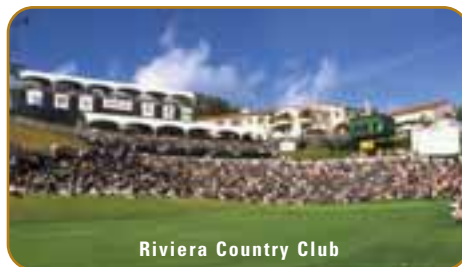

Nissan Open

NOTES

The opening round in 2005 was the only day of the tournament that did not have a weather-related suspension of play. Play was suspended that day due to darkness, however.

Adam Scott's 2005 win came in the 15th career playoff during the 79-year history of the Nissan Open. It marked his first-ever appearance in a playoff on the PGA TOUR.

Adam Scott's 2005 win marked the first Monday finish (unscheduled) on TOUR since the 2004 HP Classic of New Orleans.

Adam Scott's victory marks the sixth time out of the last eight years that an international player has won the Nissan Open. Others include **Nick Faldo** (1997), **Ernie Els** (1999), **Robert Allenby** (2001) and **Mike Weir** (2003, 2004).

Adam Scott (24 years, 7 months, 5 days) became just the second player of the last 16 winners of the Nissan Open to win the tournament under the age of 30. **Ernie Els**, at the age of 29, won the 1999 Nissan Open.

With 10 career starts at the Nissan Open (eight as a professional, two as an amateur), **Tiger Woods** has played this event more times without a victory than any other PGA TOUR event.

Two-time champion **Fred Couples** has played in every Nissan Open since 1982 and has a total of 11 top-10s in 24 starts. He finished T37 in 2005.

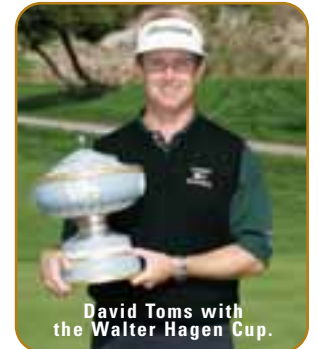

Geoff Ogilvy became the 14th player to win his first PGA TOUR event at the Chrysler Classic of Tucson, joining **Heath Slocum** (2004), **Ian Leggatt** (2002), **Garrett Willis** (2001), **Jim Carter** (2000), **Lee Janzen** (1992), **Phil Mickelson** (1991), **Robert Gamez** (1990), **Mike Reid** (1987), **Bruce Lietzke** (1977), **J.C. Snead** (1971), **Dave Hill** (1961), **Lionel Hebert** (1958) and **Skip Alexander** (1948).

The 2005 victory came in **Geoff Ogilvy's** fifth start at the tournament where he made his initial start as a member of the PGA TOUR, a T3 (2001). His other finishes: MC (2002), T44 (2003) and T17 (2004).

Geoff Ogilvy picked up his first professional victory by defeating **Kevin Na** and **Mark Calavecchia** in the ninth playoff in Chrysler Classic of Tucson history. It was the first playoff in Tucson since **Gabriel Hjertstedt** defeated **Tommy Armour III** in 1999. It marked the first three-man playoff since **Gil Morgan** outlasted **Curtis Strange** and **Lanny Wadkins** in 1983.

Tiger Woods set the tournament record in 2005 with a 24-under 264, topping the old mark of 23-under 265 set by **Greg Norman** in 1993 and matched by **Jim Furyk** in 1999.

The 27 birdies by **Tiger Woods** in 2005 matched his career best in a PGA TOUR event (1997 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am). **Phil Mickelson** also recorded 27 birdies, his personal best for a 72-hole event. He previously had 26 at the 2001 and 2004 HP Classics of New Orleans.

The final rounds of 63-69—129 posted by **Tiger Woods** in 2005 were the lowest by a winner in the 44-year history of the tournament.

By winning the Ford Championship at Doral in 2005, **Tiger Woods** returned to the World No. 1 position for the first time since the week of Aug. 30, 2004. Former World No. 1 **Vijay Singh** finished third in the event to drop to second in the Official World Golf Ranking, less than one-half a point behind Woods and more than one-half point ahead of No. 3 **Ernie Els**, who won the Dubai Desert Classic opposite the Ford Championship at Doral. The three players were within 1.05 points of each other.

Tiger Woods captured his 22nd different PGA TOUR title in his third appearance at the Ford Championship at Doral in 2005. It was his 42nd TOUR victory.

Since 1962, just 12 players have been able to record four rounds in the 60s on the fabled "Blue Monster" course at Doral Golf Resort & Spa, including three players last year. With 3,315 players having played all four rounds since 1962, less than one percent (.00275%) has accomplished the feat at the Ford Championship at Doral. In 2005, **Phil Mickelson**, **Vijay Singh** and **David Toms** managed to post four rounds in the 60s. **Jim Furyk** has done it twice. He did it in 2003 and was the last winner to accomplish the feat in 1999. The most players to go four rounds in the 60s in a single event were three in 1993, 2000 and 2005.

The three-way playoff in 2005 between **Padraig Harrington**, **Vijay Singh** and **Joe Ogilvie** was the second three-way playoff in a three-week period on the PGA TOUR after the Chrysler Classic of Tuscon two weeks earlier.

The 2005 playoff was the fifth in tournament history, but the first since 1993 when **Fred Couples** defeated **Robert Gamez**. The other Honda Classic playoffs came in 1984, 1985 and 1992.

Padraig Harrington, who was playing The Honda Classic for the first time in 2005, posted a final-round 63, his career-best score on the PGA TOUR. Harrington was 10-under for his first 13 holes before being sidetracked by a pair of bogeys on Nos. 14 and 15. Harrington's previous best score on the PGA TOUR was a 65. Harrington posted a 63 in the final round of the 1996 Trophee Lancome in Paris, France on the European Tour. The 63 at the Honda matched the course record set by **Carl Pettersson** in the opening round in 2003.

Joe Durant opened his final round in 2005 with seven consecutive birdies, a tournament record. The old mark of six in a row was set by **Fred Couples** in the first round in 1985. Durant did not make any more birdies the rest of the final round and posted a 2-under 70.

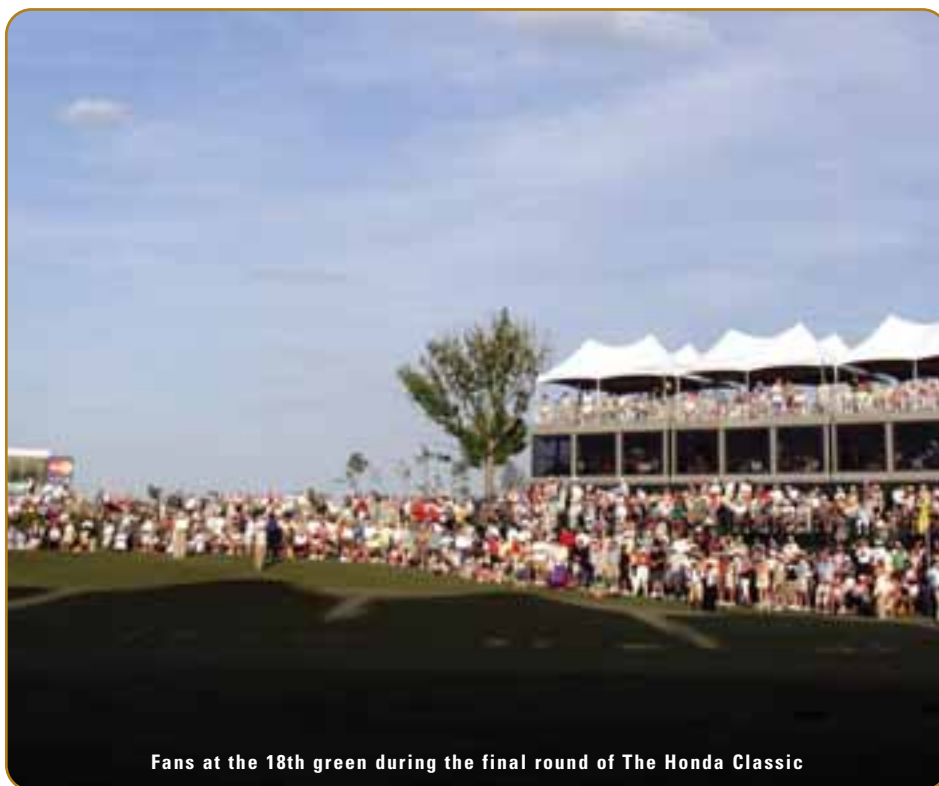

NOTES

Prior to 2005, only one player had topped the \$1-million mark in Bay Hill Invitational earnings — **Tiger Woods**. After handing out the checks in 2005, three others joined Woods (\$2,840,117) in that category. Winner **Kenny Perry** (\$1,340,068) is now second on the tournament's all-time money list. The 2004 champion **Chad Campbell** (\$1,039,873) is No. 3 while **Vijay Singh** (\$1,016,592) moved to fourth.

Proceeds from the Bay Hill Invitational benefit the Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women. This Orlando-based high-tech, high-touch facility has been serving patients since 1989 by providing quality health care, serving as a teaching campus and touching the lives and hearts of people through the state and beyond.

In the history of the Bay Hill Invitational, only three players in their 40s have won the event. They include **Ben Crenshaw** in 1993 (41 year, 2 months, 10 days), **Arnold Palmer** in 1971 (41 years, 6 months, 4 days) and **Julius Boros** in 1967 (47 years, 9 days).

Only five golfers have earned their first PGA TOUR title at the Bay Hill Invitational—**Ken Still** (1969), **Bob Byman** (1979), **Mike Nicolette** (1983), **Loren Roberts** (1994) and **Paul Goydos** (1996).

In the past 37 years, there has been only one wire-to-wire winner of the Bay Hill Invitational or Florida Citrus Open. In 1992, **Fred Couples** held the outright lead after each round of the PGA TOUR event, shooting 67-69-63-70—269 to defeat **Gene Sauers** by nine strokes.

The 2006 event will be the PGA TOUR's 41st visit to Orlando for the Bay Hill Invitational. It is the 28th stop at the Bay Hill Club and Lodge. Prior to arriving at Bay Hill, the tournament—then known as the Florida Citrus Open—was held at Rio Pinar Country Club from 1966-78.

- Winners of the Bay Hill Invitational prior to 2000, and winners of the Bay Hill Invitational from 2001 to 2005.
- Winners of THE PLAYERS Championship, Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship from 1996 to 1997 and from 2001 to 2005. Beginning with the 1998 winners of these events, winners will be eligible for five years.
- Winners of the NEC World Series of Golf in the last 10 years (1996-1997).
- Winners of THE TOUR Championship in the last three years (2003-2005).
- Winners of the WGC-Accenture Match Play Championship in the last three years (2004-2006).
- Winners of the WGC-NEC Invitational and WGC-American Express Championship in the last three years (2003-2005).
- Winners of PGA TOUR cosponsored or approved tournaments, whose victories are considered official, since the previous year's Bay Hill Invitational.
- Playing members of the last-named U.S. Ryder Cup team (2004).
- Current PGA TOUR members who were playing members of the last named U.S. and International Presidents Cup teams (2005).
- The winner of the 2005 U.S. Amateur Championship, if still an amateur player.
- The top 50 players from the Official World Golf Ranking through the Ford Championship.
- 18 sponsor exemptions, restricted as follows:
 - Two from among the 2005 PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament's top 30 finishers and ties, and the first through 20th finishers on the 2005 Official Nationwide Tour Money List.
 - Eight from among the current year's PGA TOUR membership.
 - Eight "unrestricted."
- Two foreign players designated by the Commissioner.
- The top 70 players from the 2005 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- Members in the Top 125-Nonmembers category whose official money for the previous year equals or exceeds the amount of official money earned by the player finishing in 70th position on the 2005 Official PGA TOUR Money List.
- The top 70 players from the 2006 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the Ford Championship.
- Either the current winner of the PGA Section Championship or the current PGA Section Player of the Year where the tournament is played, as determined by the Section.
- If necessary to complete a field of 120 players, those players below 70th position from the 2006 Official PGA TOUR Money List through the Ford Championship, in order of their positions on such list.
- In recognition of his remarkable career achievements, indelible contributions to golf and his role as host of the Bay Hill Invitational, a lifetime exemption for Arnold Palmer. (Such exemption will be an addition to the field.)

New clubhouse model for 2007.

Significant improvements to the Stadium Course's infrastructure and construction of a new clubhouse highlight a comprehensive renovation program the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass will undergo in 2006. Work will begin upon the conclusion of the 2006 PLAYERS Championship and will be completed in time for the 2007 tournament. The Stadium Course is scheduled to re-open late in 2006 after undergoing a three-year program to upgrade its infrastructure that includes continued improvement of the irrigation and drainage systems; rebuilding of greens with an advanced sub-surface mechanical drainage system installed; continued stripping and resodding of fairways, leveling of tees and renovation of bunkers; and replacement of bulkheads where necessary. The clubhouse will be rebuilt and enlarged.

Steve Jones' first-round 8-under-par 64 in 2005 was one stroke off the course record of 63 set by **Fred Couples** in 1992 and later matched by **Greg Norman** in 1994.

In 2005, **Brad Faxon** extended his longest consecutive cut streak at THE PLAYERS Championship to 13, the best in tournament history. Faxon shared the record of 12 in a row with **Tom Kite** and **Bernhard Langer**, neither of which was a current streak. **Tiger Woods** owns the next-best current streak with nine in a row.

Tim Herron tied the tournament record in 2005 with six birdies in a row in the second round. Herron is the sixth player in THE PLAYERS Championship history to run off six in a row and the first since **Rocco Mediate** birdied Nos. 13-18 in the final round back in 1996.

NOTES

Of the seven 54-hole tournaments since 1998 on the PGA TOUR, **Phil Mickelson** has won three (1998 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am, 1999 and 2005 BellSouth Classics).

Dating back to 1980, there have been 42 Monday finishes on the PGA TOUR. The 2005 BellSouth Classic was the third Monday finish of the 2005 season and the second in as many weeks (THE PLAYERS Championship). The last time the PGA TOUR had consecutive Monday finishes due to inclement weather was in 2004 at the Shell Houston Open and the Zurich Classic of New Orleans.

The 54-hole BellSouth Classic was the second weather-shortened event of the 2005 season, joining the 36-hole Nissan Open. The last time the PGA TOUR had a season with a 36- and 54-hole event was in 1996 at the Buick Challenge (36 holes), B.C. Open (54 holes) and Bell Canadian Open (54 holes).

The last tournament prior to the 2005 BellSouth Classic with a five-man playoff was the 1996 Buick Challenge. **Michael Bradley** won that tournament, which was also weather shortened (36 holes).

The 2005 playoff for **Phil Mickelson** was the eighth of his career, while **Jose Maria Olazabal**, **Arjun Atwal**, **Rich Beem** and **Brandt Jobe** were all making their first playoff appearance.

The last player to win a PGA TOUR event and win a major the following week was **Sandy Lyle** in 1988, when he won the Kmart Greater Greensboro Open and the Masters Tournament.

During the summer, Augusta National altered six holes (Nos. 1, 4, 7, 11, 15 and 17). With the changes, the course yardage for the 2006 tournament will increase to approximately 7,445 yards (3,735-3,710) from 7,290.

Chris DiMarco's four-shot lead through 36 holes in 2005 over **Thomas Bjorn** was one off the Masters record of five by **Herman Keiser** (1946), **Jack Nicklaus** (1975) and **Raymond Floyd** (1976).

Fred Couples extended his Masters cut streak to 21 straight in 2005, the longest current streak at the Masters. He did not compete in Augusta in 1987 and 1994. The 21 is tied for second all-time with **Tom Watson**, who made 21 straight cuts from 1975-1995. **Gary Player** made 23 consecutive cuts from 1959-1982.

All four left-handers in the field made the cut at the 2005 Masters: **Phil Mickelson** (10), **Nick O'Hern** (T45), **Mike Weir** (T5) and **Steve Flesch** (T29).

Tiger Woods' third-round 65 in 2005 matched his career low at Augusta National Golf Club, a third-round 65 en route to his first Masters win in 1997.

In the third round of the 2005 Masters, **Tiger Woods** took the lead for the first time all week at 8:43 a.m. on Sunday when he rolled in a birdie putt on the par-3 12th hole for his sixth consecutive birdie to move to 12-under-par to lead **Chris DiMarco** by one stroke.

Completing the suspended third-round on Sunday morning in 2005, **Tiger Woods** reeled off four straight birdies to extend his streak to seven straight (Nos. 7-13), matching **Steve Pate's** 1999 record. Pate birdied the identical holes in the third round en route to a 7-under-par 65.

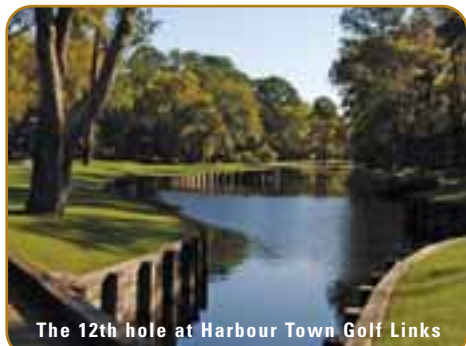

NOTES

The cumulative field scoring average for the 2005 MCI Heritage, 73.246, was the highest in the history of the event since statistics were first kept in 1983. The previous highest scoring average at Harbour Town was 72.757 (+1.757) in 1986. That year, only 18 players were under par after 72 holes.

In 2005, **Peter Lonard** became the first Australian player to win the tournament since **Greg Norman** in 1988 and the first international player since **Jose Coceres** in 2001.

Peter Lonard tied the first-round course record with a career-best 9-under 62 (Davis Love III – 2002) in 2005. His opening-round 62 topped the previous best low start by a winner by three strokes

(65 by **Graham Marsh** in 1977 and tied by five others). Also, Lonard set the tournament record for high finish by a winner with his final-round 4-over 75 (**Arnold Palmer**, 3-over 74, 1969).

Peter Lonard's 7-under 277 72-hole total in 2005 was the highest winning score at the MCI Heritage since **Tom Watson** won with a score of 4-under 280 in 1980.

David Frost set the PGA TOUR's all-time 72-hole putting record with 92 putts over four days at Harbour Town this year. The old mark was also set at Harbour Town when **Kenny Knox** had just 93 putts in the 1989 MCI Heritage Classic. Frost one-putted his first 11 greens on Thursday and had 49 one-putts for the week, along with 20 two-putts and two no-putts. His lone three-putt of the tournament came on the third hole in the second round. Only one of Frost's rounds was under par (68/Round 1) and he finished T38.

NOTES

The Tournament Course at Redstone Golf Club will be the site of the 2006 Shell Houston Open. The par-72 daily fee layout was designed by architect **Rees Jones** with TOUR member **David Toms** serving as the player consultant. The Member Course at Redstone served as the tournament site the past three years.

Vijay Singh's first-round 64 in 2005 tied the course record set by **Hank Kuehne** and matched by **Jeff Maggert** and **Greg Chalmers** in 2003. Singh's 64 was also 10 strokes better than his first-round 74 in a winning effort in 2004.

With his 2005 SHO victory, **Vijay Singh** joined **Curtis Strange** (1980, 1986, 1988) as a three-time winner of the Shell Houston Open, having won in 2002, 2004 and 2005. He also surpassed \$40 million in earnings with a \$900,000 paycheck for a total of \$40,596,502, second all-time behind **Tiger Woods**.

The 2005 playoff between **Vijay Singh** and **John Daly** was the 19th in the 58-year history of the Shell Houston Open and the first since 2000 when **Robert Allenby** defeated **Craig Stadler**.

The second-place finish by **John Daly** in 2005 was his third straight top-10 at Redstone Golf Club. Prior to the move to Redstone GC in 2003, he had just one top-10 in nine trips to The TPC at The Woodlands, the previous home of the Shell Houston Open.

Stephen Leaney and **Jason Allred** posted aces on the par-3 third hole at the 2005 Shell Houston Open, the first time since 1995 that two players have recorded aces at the SHO. Leaney used a 6-iron from 199 yards in the third round, while Allred used a 5-iron from 208 yards in the final round. There have been four holes-in-one since the tournament moved to Redstone Golf Club in 2003, all on the third hole.

English Turn Golf & Country Club, the tournament's home from 1989 through 2004, will be the site of the 2006 tournament. Extensive damage from Hurricane Katrina caused the TPC of Louisiana, the site in 2005, to be unplayable.

Tim Petrovic became the 14th player to win his first PGA TOUR event at the Zurich Classic of New Orleans, joining **Bill Collins** (1959), **Bo Wininger** (1962), **Larry Hinson** (1969), **Jim Simons** (1977), **Lon Hinkle** (1978), **Bob Eastwood** (1984), **Ian Woosnam** (1991), **Mike Standly** (1993), **Scott McCarron** (1996), **Lee Westwood** (1998), **Carlos Franco** (1999), **K.J. Choi** (2002) and **Steve Flesch** (2003).

Five of the last eight Zurich Classics of New Orleans have been won by international players. They are England's **Lee Westwood** (1998), Paraguay's **Carlos Franco** (1999, 2000), South Korea's **K.J. Choi** (2002) and Fiji's **Vijay Singh** (2004).

New Orleans has played host to a PGA TOUR tournament since 1938, when the Greater New Orleans Open Invitational was introduced at City Park Golf Club. The tournament was not held from 1949-57 then resumed at City Park before moving to Lakewood Country Club in 1963. English Turn Golf and Country Club became the tournament's home in 1989, where the event remained until it moved to TPC of Louisiana in 2005.

Six players over age 40 have gone on to win the Zurich Classic of New Orleans – in 2004, **Vijay Singh** (41 years, 2 months, 12 days), **Ben Crenshaw** in 1994 (42 years, 2 months 22 days), **Calvin Peete** in 1986 (42 years, 8 months, 5 days), **Billy Casper** in 1975 (43 years, 10 days, 24 days), **Gary Player** in 1972 (42 years, 6 months, 16 days) and 1965, **Dick Mayer** (40 years, 8 months, 17 days).

Ted Purdy became the sixth player in tournament history to capture his first victory at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship. The others: **Don January** (1956), **Charles Coody** (1964), **Mark Hayes** (1976), **Neal Lancaster** (1994) and **Robert Damron** (2000).

Six of the last seven winners at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship have began the tournament on the Cottonwood Valley Course – **Ted Purdy** (2005), **Sergio Garcia** (2004), **Shigeki Maruyama** (2002), **Robert Damron** (2001), **Jesper Parnevik** (2000) and **Loren Roberts** (1999).

The 5-under 65 by 2005 winner **Ted Purdy** on Sunday matched the best final-round score by a winner since the tournament moved to the TPC at Las Colinas in 1986, recorded by **Jodie Mudd** (1989) and **John Cook** (1998). The tournament record is a 63 by **Peter Thomson** in 1956 at Preston Hollow CC. (**Tom Watson** closed with a 65 in 1975 at Preston Trail GC).

The Fort Worth/Dallas area set a record-high temperature for the date of May 21 topping out at 99 degrees in 2005. The previous high of 96 came on this date in 1996.

When **Kenny Perry** captured the 2005 Bank of America Colonial, it was the 15th time a player over age 40 has won the tournament and second time for Perry (2003). The others: **Ben Hogan** (1953, 1959), **Tommy Bolt** (1958), **Julius Boros** (1960, 1963), **Gardner Dickinson** (1969), **Gene Littler** (1971), **Al Geiberger** (1979), **Jack Nicklaus** (1982), **Jim Colbert** (1983), **Tom Watson** (1998), **Olin Browne** (1999) and **Nick Price** (2002).

With his 2005 victory, **Kenny Perry** became the 10th player in tournament history to win the Bank of America Colonial more than once. **Ben Hogan** captured the title five times while **Billy Casper**, **Julius Boros**, **Al Geiberger**, **Ben Crenshaw**, **Bruce Lietzke**, **Lee Trevino**, **Corey Pavin** and **Nick Price** are all two-time winners.

Kenny Perry set tournament 36- and 54-hole records with totals of 12-under 128 and 18-under 192, respectively, in 2005. Along the way, he matched the tournament record of 19-under 261 that he set in 2003. Perry also holds a piece of the 18-hole record after his 61 during round three of the 2003 tournament.

The 2005 win came in **Kenny Perry's** 16th appearance in this tournament, and was his third top-three in the last four years at Colonial CC (T2-2002, 1-2003, T12-2004). He remained the all-time leader in career earnings at Bank of America Colonial with \$2,598,389.

Kenny Perry posted four rounds in the 60s on the way to his 2005 victory and has posted 12 of his last 16 rounds at Colonial CC below par.

Last year, **Justin Leonard** earned the first wire-to-wire win of his professional career. He is only the third player in tournament history to lead from start to finish (no ties), joining **Dave Hill** (1967) and **Bob Estes** (2001).

Justin Leonard fired a final-round 73 in 2005 and failed to make a birdie for his 3-over-par round. The previous player to win on the PGA TOUR without making a birdie in the final round was **Vijay Singh** (4-over-par 76) at the 2004 PGA Championship. It was the second time in Leonard's career that he has won a tournament without making a birdie in the final round. He did the same thing in 2002 when he carded a 2-over 73 at the WORLDCOM Classic at Hilton Head, SC.

Justin Leonard's final-round 73 in 2005 matches the highest final-round score by a winner in FedEx St. Jude Classic history. Leonard joined **Dave Hill** (73/1967) and **David Toms** (73/2004) in that category.

With his second-place finish in 2005, 2003/2004 FESJC champion **David Toms** added a check of \$529,200 to his tournament-leading total. Toms is the FESJC's all-time leading money winner and the first player to go over the \$2-million mark. Toms has won \$2,467,967 in this event.

David Toms became the third player to win back-to-back titles at the FedEx St. Jude Classic. **Dave Hill** (1969-70) and **Lee Trevino** (1971-72) both won in consecutive seasons. Toms also won the Michelob Championship at Kingsmill in back-to-back seasons (2000 and 2001).

NOTES

2005 winner **Bart Bryant** closed with a 4-under 68 to record four rounds in the 60s at Muirfield Village Golf Club. It was just the eighth time in the 29-year history of the Memorial Tournament that a player has managed to record four rounds in the 60s. The others are **Tiger Woods** (2001), **Fred Couples** (1998 and 2004), **Steve Elkington** (1995), **Tom Lehman** (1994), **Paul Azinger** (1993) and **Hal Sutton** (1986).

With his T3 finish and \$286,000 paycheck in 2005, **Tiger Woods** remains the top money winner at the Memorial Tournament with a total of \$2,670,148. **Fred Couples** jumped from fifth on the list to second after his second-place finish with \$1,868,000.



The Memorial Tournament's Captains Club announced the 2006 honoree, five-time British Amateur Champion **Sir Michael Bonallack**. The 2006 Memorial Tournament will also be played in honor of **Charlie Coe**, **Lawson Little**, **Henry Picard**, **Paul Runyan** and **Denny Shute**.

In the history of the Memorial Tournament, only five times has a player won the event in their 40s. They include: **Jack Nicklaus** (1984), **Greg Norman** (1995), **Tom Watson** (1996), **Kenny Perry** (2003) and **Bart Bryant** (2005). Watson is the oldest champion at 46 years, 271 days.

There have been four playoffs in the 30-year history of the Memorial Tournament. After posting a final-round, 4-over-par 76, **Roger Maltbie** went extra holes to edge **Hale Irwin** at the 1976 inaugural event. **Jack Nicklaus** defeated **Andy Bean** in the next playoff in 1984. **Kenny Perry** topped Irwin on the first extra hole in 1991 and, in the process, earned his first PGA TOUR title. The following year, **David Edwards** went two holes to defeat **Rick Fehr** in the most recent playoff.

Sergio Garcia matched the low nine- and 72-hole totals at Congressional Country Club in 2005 with his 6-under 30 and 14-under 270, respectively.

Jack Nicklaus (1982) and **Bobby Clampett** (1986) were the first to post 30s at Congressional CC, while **Craig Stadler** posted a 10-under 270 to win the 1981 tournament. The Booz Allen Classic was held at Congressional CC from 1980-1986 before returning in 2005.

Sergio Garcia also matched the low finish by a winner with his 6-under 65, posted by **Bill Glasson** (1985) and **Greg Norman** (1986) at Congressional Country Club.

Sergio Garcia led the 2005 tournament in Putting Average (1.647) for the first time since his win at the 2004 Barclays Classic after entering the event ranked T168 on TOUR. He one-putted eight consecutive greens (Nos. 4-11) with a total of 12 one-putts in the final round.

Five of **Sergio Garcia's** six wins on the PGA TOUR have come in the months of May (2) and June (3) and his win at the 2005 Booz Allen Classic was the second time that he had won the week before the U.S. Open (2004 Barclays Classic).

PGA TOUR rookie **Joey Snyder III** posted his first career top-10, a T9, in his 17th career TOUR start in 2005. Snyder played in the last group of the day on Friday and made the cut on the number (1-under 141) by birdieing the 18th hole. In doing so he knocked 11 players out of the weekend.

Rory Sabbatini set the tournament record in 2005 with 11 consecutive rounds in the 60s, dating back to his win at the 2003 tournament. Sabbatini's string ended with a final-round, 1-under 70. **Adam Scott** takes the longest current streak into the 2006 tournament with eight straight.

NOTES

Michael Campbell became the first come-from-behind winner at the U.S. Open in the last seven years when he rallied from four strokes behind third-round leader **Retief Goosen**. The last player to come from behind at the Open was **Lee Janzen**, who came from five back of **Payne Stewart** in 1998 at the Olympic Club to win.

Michael Campbell posted the highest-winning total (even-par 280) at a U.S. Open since **Lee Janzen** won in 1998 with a score of even-par 280 at the Olympic Club in San Francisco.

Michael Campbell became the first player to win a major on TOUR with a total score of even-par since **Mark O'Meara** won the 1998 British Open at even par.

Michael Campbell became just the second New Zealander to win a major championship following left-hander **Bob Charles** at the 1963 British Open.

Twenty-three international players have won the U.S. Open on 29 different occasions. Campbell was the first non-South African international player to win the Open since Australia's **David Graham** in 1981.

For the second straight Open, the winner posted double-digit one putts during the final round.

Michael Campbell had 10 one-putts on Sunday, while **Retief Goosen** had 12 in 2004 at Shinnecock Hills GC.

Michael Campbell's win came in his first start on the PGA TOUR in 2005, and he became the first non-member to win on the TOUR since **Darren Clarke** won the 2003 World Golf Championships-NEC Invitational.

Tiger Woods led the U.S. Open in Greens in Regulation (54 of 72/75%) for the third time in 11 starts at the tournament. In his career through the U.S. Open, Woods had won 12 out of 20 times when he led a tournament in GIR. It was the ninth time he led a major in GIR and the third time he didn't win (1999 Masters/T18, 2001 British/T25).

NOTES

The win by **Michael Campbell** gave him just his second top-10 finish in 29 major starts. His previous best was a T3 at the 1995 British Open, his second start in a major. It was the 12th time in the 29 starts that he had made the cut.

The three-stroke lead lost by 54-hole leader **Retief Goosen** was the largest at a U.S. Open since **Payne Stewart** lost a four-stroke lead in the 1998 Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco, CA.

The 11-over 81 by **Retief Goosen** was the highest final round by a third-round leader of a U.S. Open since **Gil Morgan** posted an 81 during the final round of the 1992 tournament at Pebble Beach after holding a one-stroke lead through 54 holes. The 81 was Goosen's second-highest score in a major after an 82 during the second round of the 1999 U.S. Open, also at Pinehurst No. 2.

Stewart Cink's streak of 351 consecutive holes without a three-putt in 2005 came to an end in the final round on the par-4 third hole at Pinehurst Resort's No. 2 course on Sunday, 12 shy of matching **Brad Faxon's** 362-hole streak in 2003 for the longest since ShotLink began tracking this information in 2001. Cink's three-putt streak in majors ended at 68, while his streak at the U.S. Open stopped at 110.

Davis Love III bounced back from a first-round 7-over 77 which left him tied for 113th with rounds of 70-70-69 to finish T6. It was his fourth top-10 finish in 17 U.S. Open starts and his first since a T7 in 2001.

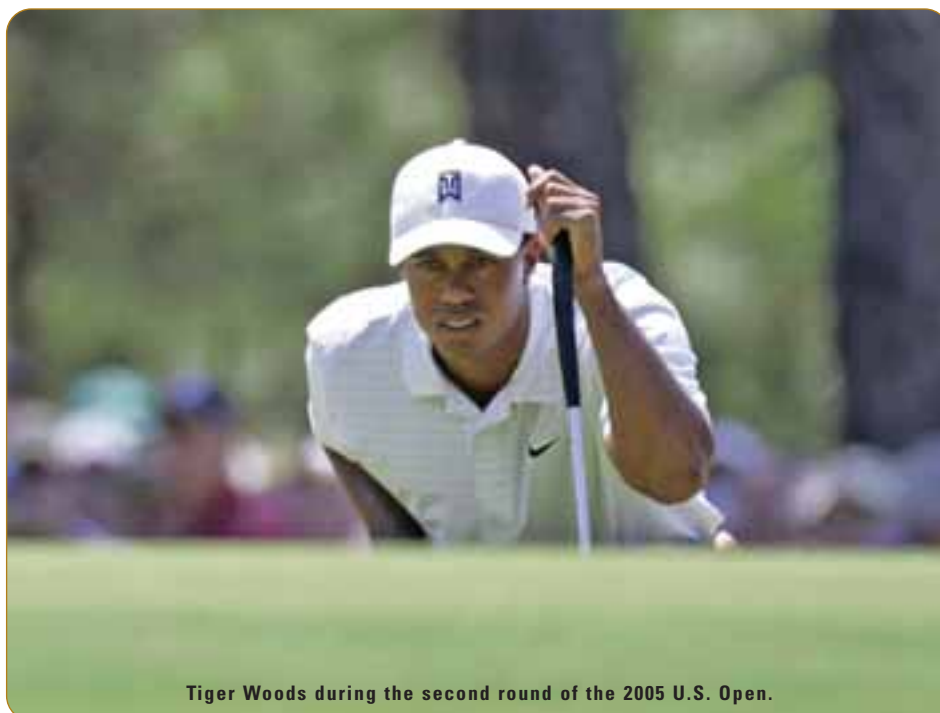

NOTES

A year after his runner-up finish at the Barclays Classic, **Padraig Harrington** earned his second PGA TOUR victory in the 70th start of his career at the age of 33 years, 9 months, and 25 days. His second victory came just three months and 13 days after his first PGA TOUR victory at The Honda Classic.

2005 Barclays Classic champion **Padraig Harrington** entered the week having missed the cut at his previous two PGA TOUR events, the Booz Allen Classic and the U.S. Open. Those marked the first time Harrington missed two consecutive cuts in 69 PGA TOUR career starts.

Padraig Harrington's career stroke average at the Barclays Classic in eight rounds is 68.25, the lowest in tournament history for any player with eight or more rounds.

Ireland's **Padraig Harrington** became the ninth different international champion of the Barclays Classic, joining Australia's **Bruce Crampton** (1970), Australia's **David Graham** (1976), Spain's **Seve Ballesteros** (1983 and 1988), Australia's **Wayne Grady** (1989), South Africa's **David Frost** (1992), Fiji's **Vijay Singh** (1993 and 1995), South Africa's **Ernie Els** (1996 and 1997) and Spain's **Sergio Garcia** (2001 and 2004).

Padraig Harrington's winning 2005 total of 274 was the highest 72-hole total at the Barclays Classic since **Dennis Paulson's** 276 total in 2000.

Padraig Harrington drained a 66-foot eagle putt on the 72nd hole in 2005 to become the first player since **Craig Parry** to win a PGA TOUR event with an eagle on the final hole. Parry posted an eagle in a playoff at the Ford Championship at Doral in 2004, holing out from the fairway on No. 18 to defeat **Scott Verplank**. **Jonathan Kaye** won the 2003 Barclays Classic in a playoff on the first hole of sudden death with an eagle on No. 18 to top **John Rollins**.

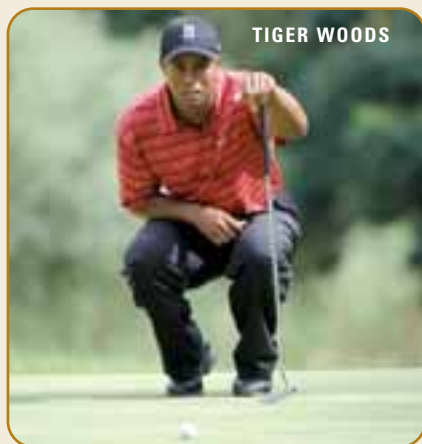

The key to victory at the 2005 Cialis Western Open for **Jim Furyk**? He led the field in Greens in Regulation, hitting 54 of 72 greens (75 percent).

The 2005 Cialis Western Open champion **Jim Furyk**, who also captured the Western Junior in 1987, has six career top-10s at the Cialis Western Open, including four consecutive (2002-05).

Three players earned exemptions into the 2005 British Open via the 2005 Cialis Western Open. The first two exemptions were given to those, who were not otherwise exempt, who earned the most PGA TOUR Official Money from the 2005 PLAYERS Championship and the five cosponsored and approved events leading up to and including the Cialis Western Open. **Bart Bryant** (\$990,000) entered the week as the front-runner and remained there in the money category, having taken the week of the Cialis Western Open off. **Billy Mayfair** finished solo fourth and collected \$240,000 and moved into the second spot on the six-tournament money list (\$464,599), but elected not to play the British Open. The third exemption went to the leading player at the 2005 Cialis Western Open, not otherwise exempt. **Pat Perez** tied with **Brett Quigley** for fifth, but had the low third round after the two posted matching final-round 70s. Quigley recorded a third-round 69 while Perez fired a 67.



TIGER WOODS

Tiger Woods, who finished second, was the only past champion of the Cialis Western Open to finish in the top 10 in 2005. With his check of \$540,000, Woods has made a tournament-record \$2,413,906 at the Cialis Western Open.

Entering the week of the 2005 Cialis Western Open, **Tiger Woods** needed to win \$56,974 to become the first player in TOUR history to reach the \$50-million mark in career earnings. He surpassed that total with his second-place finish and \$540,000, for a total of \$50,483,026 in official money.

Shaun Micheel's T7 finish at the 2005 Cialis Western Open was only his second top-10 performance in 50 starts since his 2003 PGA Championship victory. He finished ninth at the 2004 PLAYERS Championship.

Ben Curtis picked up his first top-10 of 2005 with a solo third at the Cialis Western Open. It was his second top-10 in 42 starts since the 2003 British Open Championship.

Three-time champion **Tiger Woods** is 8-for-8 as a professional in made cuts at the Cialis Western Open and 9-for-10 overall, having missed the cut in 1995 as an amateur. Other notable cut streaks that continued at the Cialis Western Open in 2005:

Making his 18th career start, **Sean O'Hair**, the TOUR's youngest rookie, just one day short of his 23rd birthday, earned his first PGA TOUR title in 2005. He became the first player in his 20s to win the John Deere Classic since 1988 when **Blaine McCallister** won at 29 years, nine months. O'Hair supplanted 1975 winner **Roger Maltbie** (24 years, 13 days) as the tournament's youngest winner.

In 2005, **Sean O'Hair** became the youngest champion on the PGA TOUR at 22 years, 11 months, 29 days, since **Sergio Garcia** won the 2002 Mercedes Championships at 21 years, 11 months, 27 days.

Sean O'Hair's 2005 victory came in his first start at the John Deere Classic. He became the eighth player to win the John Deere Classic in the first visit to the Quad Cities. He joined **Deane Beman** who won the inaugural event in 1972, **Roger Maltbie** (1975), **Scott Hoch** (1980), **Payne Stewart** (1982), **Michael Clark II** (2000), **David Gossett** (2001) and **Vijay Singh** (2003).

Sean O'Hair became the 17th first-time winner of the John Deere Classic in 2005, joining **Sam Adams** (1973), **Roger Maltbie** (1975), **John Lister** (1976), **Mike Morley** (1977), **D.A. Weibring** (1979), **Scott Hoch** (1980), **Dave Barr** (1981), **Payne Stewart** (1982), **Dan Forsman** (1985), **Blaine McCallister** (1988), **Curt Byrum** (1989), **David Toms** (1997), **J.L. Lewis** (1999), **Michael Clark II** (2000), **David Gossett** (2001) and **Mark Hensby** (2005).

Sean O'Hair came from five strokes behind to win, the largest come-from-behind victory since this event moved to the TPC at Deere Run. In 2004, **Mark Hensby** came from four strokes back to win in a playoff. In 1975, **Roger Maltbie** came from a tournament-record seven strokes back to win.

NOTES

Each time **Jack Nicklaus** announced that he would be playing a major championship for the last time, **Tiger Woods** won the tournament. It first happened at the 2000 PGA Championship, followed by the 2000 British Open, 2000 U.S. Open, the 2005 Masters Tournament and the 2005 British Open.

Three-time British Open winner **Jack Nicklaus**, playing in his last British Open in 2005, went out in grand fashion after a final-round even-par 72, making a 15-foot putt for birdie on his final hole of the second round. Unfortunately for Nicklaus, he finished the tournament at 3-over 147 and missed the cut by two strokes.

Tiger Woods became just the second player in history to win each of the four major championships more than once. **Jack Nicklaus** was the first to accomplish the feat with six Masters, four U.S. Opens, three British Opens and five PGAs.



Tiger Woods became the youngest and quickest to win each of the four major championships twice. **Jack Nicklaus** was the first to accomplish the feat at 31 years, one month and seven days of age when he won his second PGA Championship in 1971. It was his 37th major as a professional. Woods is 29 years, six months and 17 days and in his 35th major as a professional.

Tiger Woods became the third player in history to reach the double-digit victory mark in professional major championships (10) following **Jack Nicklaus** (18) and **Walter Hagen** (11).

Tiger Woods (2000, 2005) became the 25th player to have won the British Open more than once and the fifth player to win more than one at St. Andrews Golf Club following **James Braid** (1905, 1910), **J.H. Taylor** (1895, 1900), **Jack Nicklaus** (1970, 1978) and **Bob Martin** (1876, 1885).

Tiger Woods became the 28th player to win two major championships in a season and did so for the third time in his 10-year PGA TOUR career. In 2000, he won the final three majors, while in 2002 he captured the first two. **Jack Nicklaus** is the leader in the category with five multiple major championship seasons (1963, 1966, 1972, 1975, 1980).

Tiger Woods (2005) became the eighth player in major championship history to win the Masters and the British Open in the same year. The last to do so was **Mark O'Meara** in 1998. The others: **Ben Hogan** (1953), **Arnold Palmer** (1962), **Jack Nicklaus** (1966), **Gary Player** (1974), **Tom Watson** (1977) and **Nick Faldo** (1990). Faldo is the only other to do so at St. Andrews.

Tiger Woods (2005) became the sixth player in British Open history to win in wire-to-wire fashion — **Ted Ray** (1912), **Bobby Jones** (1927), **Gene Sarazen** (1932), **Henry Cotton** (1934) and **Tom Weiskopf** (1973).

Tiger Woods' opening-round 66 in 2005 matched the lowest opening round by a winner at the British Open — **Peter Thomson** (1958), **Nick Faldo** (1992) and **Greg Norman** (1993).

Tiger Woods has made the cut 11 times in 11 starts at the British Open, his longest current streak in the majors (10-U.S. Open).

Tiger Woods' 36-hole total of 11-under 133 in 2005 matched his career best in a major and was his lowest opening rounds in a major since he posted 66-67 during the first two rounds of the 2000 PGA Championship, an event he also won.

In 2005, **Fred Couples** posted his best finish in a major since a T2 at the 1998 Masters with his T3. In 16 British Open starts, he has nine top-10s.

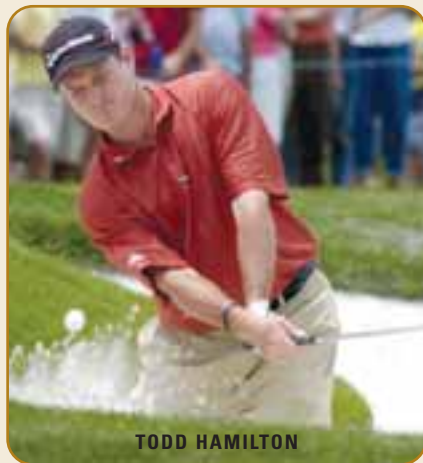
2005 U.S. Open champion **Michael Campbell** had just one top-10 in his first 28 major starts. With his T5 in the 2005 British Open, and T6 at the PGA Championship he carries a streak of three straight top 10s in majors into 2006.

1995 British Open winner **John Daly** finished T15, his best finish in a major championship since the win in 1995 at St. Andrews GC.

The cut came at 1-over-par 145, the lowest at the British Open since an even-par cut in 2000 at St. Andrews GC. Eighty players advanced to the week-end.

PGA TOUR rookie **Sean O'Hair**, who grabbed the final exemption into the British Open by winning the John Deere Classic the week prior, followed up his win with a T15 in his first appearance in a major championship.

Defending champion **Todd Hamilton** posted rounds of 74-74 to become just the sixth defending champion in the last 50 years at the British Open to miss the cut the following year. The others: **Ben Curtis** (2004), **Paul Lawrie** (2000), **Mark O'Meara** (1998), **Mark Calcavecchia** (1989) and **Tom Watson** (1975).

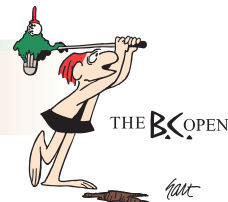

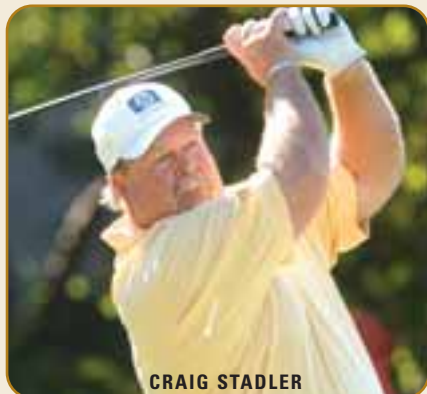
NOTES

With his victory last year, **Jason Bohn** became the 13th player to make the B.C. Open his first PGA TOUR win. He was the first since **Spike McRoy** in 2002. First-time winners at the B.C. Open include Bohn, McRoy, **Chris Perry** (1998), **Gabriel Hjertstedt** (1997), **Nolan Henke** (1990), **Rick Fehr** (1986), **Pat Lindsey** (1983), **Don Pooley** (1980), **Howard Twitty** (1979), **Gil Morgan** (1977), **Bob Wynn** (1976), **Don Iverson** (1975) and **Richie Karl** (1974).

Jason Bohn's 264 total was one better than **Calvin Peete's** all-time tournament 72-hole total record of 265. Peete's mark was set in 1982 when the course played to par 71.

The field averaged 69.252 for the week in 2005 and there were 226 rounds under 70, and 325 rounds under par for the event. Fourteen players recorded four straight rounds in the 60s and 12 players finished at 20 under or better.

Tight finishes have been the norm at the B.C. Open in recent years. The previous four winners – **Jonathan Byrd**, **Craig Stadler**, **Spike McRoy** and **Jason Bohn** – were all one-stroke winners. **Jeff Sluman's** victory in 2001 came in a playoff over **Paul Gow**, as did **Brad Faxon's** title in 1999 over **Fred Funk**. In all, in the previous 10 years, three have ended in playoffs and seven others were decided by one stroke. The last time the margin has been greater than one stroke was in 1998 when **Chris Perry** beat **Peter Jacobsen** by three strokes.

Ben Crane's first-round, 8-under-par 62 at the 2005 U.S. Bank Championship was his career low, besting a final-round 63 en route to victory at the 2003 BellSouth Classic. It also marked the low start for a U.S. Bank Championship winner – topping a 63 by **Mark Brooks** in 1991. The 62 was also one stroke off the course record of 61 set by **Ken Green** (Round 3, 1988) and later matched by **Robert Gamez** (Round 1, 1991) and **Steve Lowery** (Round 4, 1999).

Ben Crane in 2005 became the second wire-to-wire winner in the history of the U.S. Bank Championship in Milwaukee. **Ed Sneed** did so in 1974 at Tuckaway Country Club, winning by four strokes over runner-up **Grier Jones**.

The four-shot win for **Ben Crane** in 2005 was the largest at the U.S. Bank Championship since **Jeff Sluman** topped **Tim Herron** and **Steve Lowery** by four in 2002. In the process, Crane became the eighth consecutive winner of the U.S. Bank Championship to post four rounds in the 60s.

The five-shot lead held by **Vijay Singh** entering the final round of the 2005 Buick Open marked the largest 54-hole lead of his career. Four times he had held a three-shot lead with wins at all four events – the 2000 Masters, 2002 Shell Houston Open, 2002 TOUR Championship and 2004 84 LUMBER Classic.

Vijay Singh became the first three-time winner of the Buick Open and only the second back-to-back winner in 2005, joining **Tony Lema** (1964-65). In his PGA TOUR career, Singh has three wins in two events, the Buick Open and the Shell Houston Open. He won the Shell Houston Open for the third time earlier in 2005 in a playoff over **John Daly**.

2005 Buick Open champion **Vijay Singh** tied the 54-hole record for the Buick Open with his 22-under-par 194 total, set in 2001 by **Kenny Perry**.

With his win at the 2005 Buick Open, **Vijay Singh** became the tournament's all-time leading money winner with \$2,152,949.

Vijay Singh led the 2005 Buick Open field in birdies with 28, the most in his PGA TOUR career. Three times Singh has posted 26 birdies – at the 2005 Genuity Championship at Doral, 2004 Mercedes Championships, and the 2003 National Car Rental Golf Classic at the WALT DISNEY WORLD RESORT.

In 10 starts at the Buick Open, three-time champion **Vijay Singh** has made nine cuts with three wins and five top-10 finishes.

In the final round in 2005, **Robert Allenby** aced the 179-yard, 11th hole with a 6-iron, the 17th hole-in-one in Buick Open history. Allenby fired a 7-under-par 29 on the back nine en route to a 7-under-par 65 and a fourth-place finish.

Five past PGA Championship winners finished among the top-10 at the 2005 PGA Championship:

Steve Elkington (1995), **Tiger Woods** (1999, 2000), **Davis Love III** (1997) and **Vijay Singh** (1998, 2004) and **David Toms** (2001).

Baltusrol Golf Club boasted the second-longest par 4 on TOUR in 2005. Measuring 505 yards, the seventh hole was the third-toughest hole on the PGA TOUR and the second-toughest par 4.

Tiger Woods (first at Masters Tournament; second at U.S. Open, first at British Open, T4 at PGA Championship) and **Vijay Singh** (T5 at Masters Tournament, T6 at U.S. Open, T5 at British Open, T10 at PGA Championship) were the only two players to finish in the top-10 in all four major championships

Tiger Woods became the first player to win the tournament four times (1999, 2000, 2001, 2005). It was the third of four tournaments that he has won four times (Bay Hill Invitational, Masters Tournament, and WGC-American Express Championship later in 2005). **Sam Snead** and **Jack Nicklaus** each have at least five victories in three different tournaments.

The 6-under 274 by **Tiger Woods** in 2005 was the highest 72-hole winning total at the WGC-NEC Invitational tournament. He also held the previous high at 10-under 270 in 1999.

Tiger Woods is the only player in tournament history to record top-10 finishes in all seven appearances at the tournament. Along with four wins, Woods has finished T2 in 2004, T4 in 2003 and fourth in 2002.

The \$1.3 million payday in 2005 pushed **Tiger Woods** over the \$5-million mark (\$5,302,500) in tournament earnings, the first tournament in which he had surpassed that mark.

Tiger Woods has won seven times in 16 starts in Ohio (four WGC-NEC Invitationals, three Memorial Tournaments).

The 4-under 136 two-round total by leaders **Luke Donald** and **Tiger Woods** was the highest second-round total in the seven-year history of the tournament. The previous high was 5-under 135 by **Paul Lawrie** and **Carlos Franco** in 1999.

During the six WGC-NEC Invitationals at Firestone CC, **Tiger Woods** has posted total scores of 62-under par on the South Course, 24-under of that coming on the two par-5 holes. Woods is 17-under on the 526-yard, par-5 second hole. He is 6-over on the par-4 18th.

Brad Faxon tied the course record in 2005 after a final-round 9-under 61 (**Kirk Triplett**/Rd 3/2000, **Phil Mickelson**/Rd 3/2001, **Scott Verplank**/Rd 4/2001) and missed the tournament course record by one (**Tommy Bolt**/Rd 2/1954 at Wethersfield CC).

Brad Faxon's weekend scores of 65-61—126 in 2005 were the lowest in tournament history (128—**Tom Kite**/1973, **Dana Quigley**/1982, **Kirk Triplett**/2000).

Brad Faxon defeated **Tjaart van der Walt** on the first extra hole in 2005 to win the 18th playoff in tournament history and the second consecutive in Cromwell, CT. In doing so, he improved his playoff record to 3-6.

Brad Faxon won in his 22nd appearance at the Buick Championship tournament in 2005, recorded his third top-10 (T8/1988, 8th/1996, W/2005) and surpassed the \$1-million mark in tournament earnings with \$1,009,858. In doing so, he became just the second player in tournament history to surpass the \$1-million mark (**Phil Mickelson**—\$1,295,320).

2005 winner **Brad Faxon** became the first player on TOUR to make the cut on the number and win the tournament since **Jose Maria Olazabal** at the 2002 Buick Invitational.

The weekend total of 65-61—126 by 2005 champion **Brad Faxon** was one off the best final 36 holes total in PGA TOUR history. **Ron Streck** set the mark of 125 (63-62) during his win at the 1978 Texas Open at Oak Hills CC and that was matched by **John Cook** during rounds 4-5 (62-63) of the 1997 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic.

Brad Faxon's 61 in 2005 was the lowest final round by a winner on TOUR since **David Duval** won the 1999 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic with a 13-under 59.

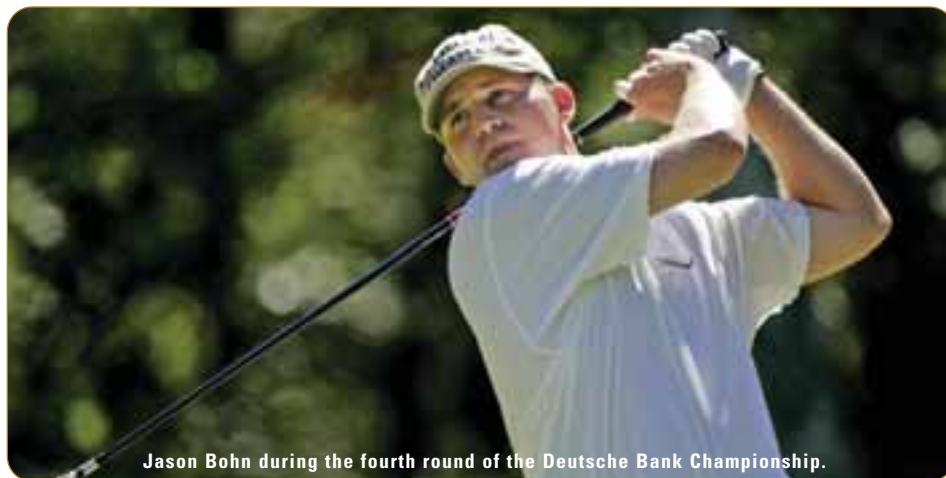

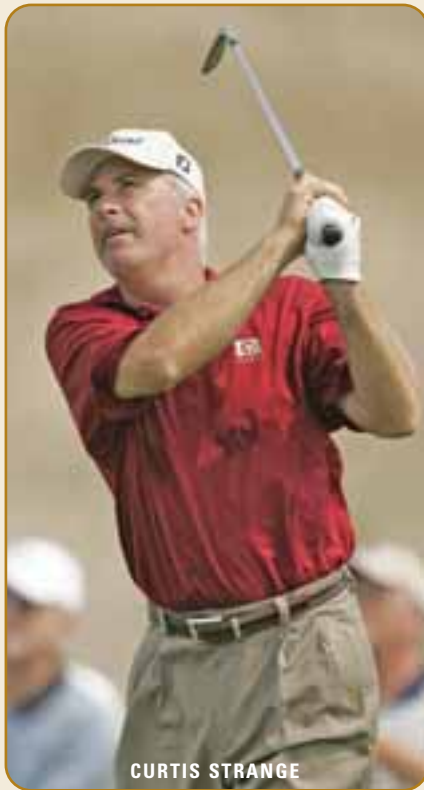

Mark Calcavecchia made only one birdie in his final 36 holes while winning last week's Bell Canadian Open. He is the first winner to have only one birdie in his final 36 holes since **Curtis Strange** at the 1989 U.S. Open.



At 45 years, 2 months and 29 days, **Mark Calcavecchia** topped **Bob Tway** (2003/44 years, 4 months and 3 days) as the oldest champion in the 101-year history of the tournament.

Mark Calcavecchia's winning score of 5-under par is the highest winning score (in relation to par) in the Bell Canadian Open since **Steve Jones' 5-under** total won the 1997 tournament at Royal Montreal GC.

Mark Calcavecchia's weekend of 72-71 made him only the second player to be over-par on both weekend rounds and still go on to victory on the 2005 PGA TOUR. **Phil Mickelson** shot 2-over-par 72s in the final two rounds but still won the PGA Championship.

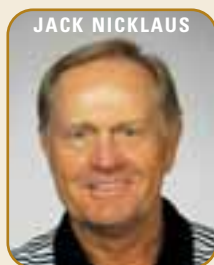

Jack Nicklaus won 70 PGA TOUR titles in his career, but despite a number of close efforts he never won the Bell Canadian Open. He did finish second seven times, including his nearest brush with victory, a 1975 playoff loss to **Tom Weiskopf** at Royal Montreal.



Seventeen players have won the Bell Canadian Open more than once. **Leo Diegel** leads the list with four wins, followed by **Tommy Armour**, **Sam Snead** and **Lee Trevino**, with three each. Thirteen players have won the event twice.

Only 30 players have completed four rounds in the 60s in a single event in the 96 Bell Canadian Opens. Of that total, nine went on to victory—**Lawson Little** (1936), **Bobby Locke** (1947), **Johnny Palmer** (1952), amateur **Doug Sanders** (1956), **Wes Ellis** (1958), **Art Wall** (1960), **Bobby Nichols** (1974), **Jerry Pate** (1976) and **Billy Andrade** (1998).

Robert Gamez claimed his third career victory on the PGA TOUR and first since the 1990 Nestle Invitational at the 2005 Valero Texas Open. His win last year ended a victory drought

of exactly 15 years and six months, the longest time between victories in PGA TOUR history. **Butch Baird** held the old mark, winning the 1976 San Antonio Texas Open 15 years, 5 months and 10 days after winning the 1961 Waco Turner Open.

Robert Gamez also ended a victory drought of 395 consecutive appearances on the PGA TOUR, but that's not the longest number of events between wins. **Ed Fiori** went 409 starts (14 years, eight months and two days) between his victories at the 1982 Bob Hope Desert Classic and the 1996 Quad City Classic.

Last year marked the 75th edition of the Valero Texas Open. First played in 1922, it is the fifth-oldest North American tournament on the PGA TOUR (U.S. Open, 1895; Cialis Western Open, 1899; Bell Canadian Open, 1904; and PGA Championship, 1916). In addition, the Texas Open is the oldest PGA TOUR tournament to have been held in the same city, San Antonio resort.

The Resort Course at LaCantera, a public course, is in its 12th year of hosting the tournament and is the seventh local course to host the event. Others include Oak Hills Country Club (23 times) 1961-66, 1977-94; Brackenridge Park Golf Course (21 times), 1927-28, 1941-49; Willow Springs GC 8 times, 41-42, 44-49; Woodlake Country Club (5 times) 1972-76; Fort Sam Houston (4 times), 1950-51, 1956, 1960 and Pecan Valley Golf Club (3 times) 1967, 1969-70.

Bart Bryant set the current course record when he fired a third-round 60 in 2004 at the LaCantera Golf Club's Resort Course. He was the fourth player to shoot a 60 in the tournament's history and first since **Mike Souchak** did it in 1955.

K.J. Choi matched the tournament record for low start by a winner with his first-round 8-under 64 in 2005 (**Tom Weiskopf**/1975, **Mike Springer**/1994).

In 2005, **K.J. Choi** posted his fourth consecutive top-10 finish (T4/2001, T7/2002, T5/2003, W/2005) at Forest Oaks CC and has made the cut in four of five starts.

In 2005, **K.J. Choi** missed the tournament record for total birdies in a 72-hole event at Forest Oaks CC by one with 26 birdies (Jesper Parnevik, 27, 1999). It was also one shy of his personal best of 27 at the 2002 Disney Golf Classic.

The 62 by **Charles Warren** in 2005 set the course record since the redesign in 2003.

Peter Jacobsen posted a first-round 63 at the 2003 tournament. The 62 tied the overall tournament record which was set by

Davis Love III during the final round of the 1988 tournament and matched by **Mark O'Meara** (1996) and **Jeff Maggert** (1999). Warren's round was the best opening round in tournament history and the best since **Mike Springer** opened with a 64 in 1994.

Thirty-two players since 1950 have held/shared the third-round lead at the Chrysler Classic of Greensboro and gone on to victory, including the last seven **Jesper Parnevik** (1999), **Hal Sutton** (2000), **Scott Hoch** (2001), **Rocco Mediate** (2002), **Shigeki Maruyama** (2003), **Brent Geiberger** (2004) and **K.J. Choi** (2005).

NOTES

World No. 1 **Tiger Woods** and World No. 2 **Vijay Singh** missed the cut at last year's FUNAI Classic for the first time each in the history of the tournament. Woods had made eight consecutive cuts without a miss, while Singh had made six. It was the first time that the two players missed the cut in the same event and only the second time that Nos. 1 and 2 had missed the cut in the same event since the Official World Golf Ranking was formed in 1991. **Ian Woosnam** and **Nick Faldo** each missed the cut at the 1992 Nestle Invitational.

The second-round scoring average of 67.586 (4.414-under par) on the Disney Palm Course was the lowest in tournament history and on the PGA TOUR in 2005. In relation to par, it was lower than the fourth round played at Tamarisk CC during the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, which had a scoring average of 67.935 or 4.065-under par.

The third-round scoring average of 68.836 for the Disney Magnolia Course was the lowest in tournament history on that course. The previous low came during the final round of the 2002 event when it averaged 68.959.

Second-round leader **Carl Pettersson** tied **Chris DiMarco's** (2002) 36-hole tournament record with a 17-under 127. It also matched the low first 36 total for the 2005 season, which was accomplished by **Joe Ogilvie** (Bob Hope Chrysler Classic), **Ben Crane** (U.S. Bank Championship) and **Justin Leonard** (FedEx St. Jude Classic). Crane and Leonard went on to win their events.

Lucas Glover became the 16th player since the tournament began in 1971 to earn his first career title at the event. Others include **Mac McLendon** (1974, team event), **Woody Blackburn** and **Bill Kratzert** (1976, team event), **Wayne Levi** and **Bob Mann** (1978, team event), **George Burns** (1979, team event), **David Edwards** (1980, team event), **Vance Heafner** and **Mike Holland** (1981, team event), **Hal Sutton** (1982), **Bob Lohr** (1988), **Jeff Maggert** (1993), **Brad Bryant** (1995), **Bob Burns** (2002) and **Ryan Palmer** (2004).

Lucas Glover became the youngest player (25 years, 11 months, and 11 days) to win the tournament since **Tiger Woods** (23-9-24) captured the 1999 event.

Lucas Glover holed a bunker shot on 18th hole for birdie to win the tournament after entering event 185th (39%) on TOUR in Sand Save Percentage. He was the first player to hole out to win on the final hole since **Craig Parry** holed out from the fairway in a playoff at 2004 Ford Championship at Doral.

Tom Pernice, Jr. set the FUNAI Classic all-time 72-hole putting record with 95 total putts over four days. The previous low at the FUNAI Classic was 101 by **Payne Stewart** in 1984 and **Jim Furyk** in 2003. He became the fourth player in 2005 to record under 100 putts in a single event, including **David Frost** (92, MCI Heritage), **Paul Goydos** (95, FedEx St. Jude Classic), **Tom Pernice Jr.** (FUNAI Classic at Walt Disney World Resort) and **Tag Ridings** (96, Reno-Tahoe Open). Pernice needed just 19 putts in the third round, including 15 one-putts, one off the PGA TOUR record. Eight of those putts came on the back nine, two off the TOUR record for putts over nine holes.

Defending champion **Ryan Palmer**, who finished T3, gave it his best shot to win back-to-back at the FUNAI Classic with his closing 8-under 64. He collected \$198,440 and improved his earnings at the FUNAI Classic to \$954,400. In 2004, defending champion **Vijay Singh** finished second behind Palmer.

Hole No. 5 played particularly difficult for players in 2005, averaging 4.281. While 77.8% (224/288) of the players hit the fairway on this long par 4, only 30.9% (89/288) of the players were successful hitting the green.

The 2005 final-round scoring average of 68.853 was the lowest in tournament history since the event moved from Hattiesburg CC to Annandale CC in 1994. The previous low was 69.141 during the final round of the 2003 tournament. Fifty-two of the 75 players who made the cut posted rounds in the 60s on Sunday.

Heath Slocum matched the low final round by a winner at Annandale CC since the tournament became official in 1994 (**Ed Dougherty**/1995, **Fred Funk**/2004) with his 6-under 66.

Heath Slocum led the tournament in birdies with 25. His previous career high in a 72-hole event was 24 during his victory at the 2004 Chrysler Classic of Tucson. He also finished the 2005 Southern Farm Bureau Classic with 43 consecutive holes without a bogey.

Carl Pettersson captured the 2005 Fall Finish Presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers and the \$500,000 check that accompanied it. Pettersson played well throughout the entire 11-event series, finishing T4

at the Deutsche Bank Championship in the first event and T2 at the last event, the Southern Farm Bureau Classic. He also won his first TOUR event at the Chrysler Championship.

The six players tied for the second-round lead at the Southern Farm Bureau Classic were the most on the PGA TOUR since eight players tied for the 36-hole lead at the 2001 Canon Greater Hartford Open. **Tom Pernice, Jr.** (finished T12), **Tag Ridings** (T5), **Jonathan Byrd** (T17), **Kevin Na** (T17), **John Cook** (T5) and **Bob Tway** (T5) were all at 10-under 134.

Due to Hurricane Katrina the 2005 event was moved back one month - opposite THE TOUR Championship presented by Coca-Cola.

The team of **Angel Cabrera** and **Eduardo Romero** is a combined 97-under in five events playing as a team representing Argentina. The duo's best finish is a tie for second in 2000. Ireland (**Padraig Harrington** and **Paul McGinley**) is a combined 83-under, with its best finish a tie for fifth in 2003.

There are 165 players, including 22 players that made their first start in the 2005 Algarve World Cup, who have played in the World Cup since it became a WGC event in 2000. They have represented 41 countries, including Argentina, Australia, Austria, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Denmark, England, Fiji, Finland, France, Germany, Holland, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Myanmar, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Paraguay, Philippines, Portugal, Scotland, Singapore, South Africa, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand, Taiwan, Trinidad and Tobago, United States, Venezuela, Wales and Zimbabwe.

Portugal, the host country in 2005, participated in its first WGC-World Cup, but the country made its 29th overall appearance in the event. Portugal played in the first World Cup in 1956 and every subsequent tournament until 1980. Portugal again played in 1987, 1989 and 1991, the year of its best finish when the team of **Daniel Silva** and **David Silva** finished 22nd at the tournament held at Le Querce in Rome. Portugal was represented in 2005 by **Jose-Filipe Lima** and **Antonio Sobrinho**.

Twelve PGA Grand Slam of Golf competitions have been conducted at Poipu Bay Golf Course on the Hawaii's garden isle of Kauai. The 550-yard 18th hole has been a dramatic conclusion to the event. In 1995, Masters champion **Ben Crenshaw** sank a 50-yard wedge approach for an eagle to defeat PGA champion **Steve Elkington** by one stroke. Crenshaw's ball struck the flagstick square and fell in the hole, and earned the largest paycheck (\$400,000) of his career. Woods eagled the 18th twice, once in regulation on the final day in 2000 and then on the first playoff hole to defeat **Vijay Singh**. In 2004, **Phil Mickelson** set a PGA Grand Slam of Golf and Poipu Bay record with his first competitive 59. Mickelson had 11 birdies, and narrowly missed a nine-foot eagle putt for a 58 on the 18th hole.

Jim Furyk finished fourth on the PGA TOUR money list and captured his 10th career PGA TOUR title at the 2005 Cialis Western Open, giving him a victory in seven of his last eight seasons on TOUR.

Tiger Woods is the only player to capture all four World Golf Championships titles in his career.

At the 1996 Presidents Cup, golf's five world-governing bodies—the European Tour, Japan Golf Tour Organization, PGA TOUR, PGA Tour of Australasia and Sunshine Tour (South Africa)—reached agreement on several key elements of professional golf designed to create new international events, beginning in 1999.

Three major initiatives were outlined at Robert Trent Jones Golf Club, site of the second Presidents Cup:

- Formation of the International Federation of PGA Tours.
- Joint sanctioning by the members of the International Federation of PGA Tours of significant competitions, including some at the world championship level for the game's top players.
- A structure for a generally accepted worldwide ranking system. Those "significant competitions" were announced in October 1997 when the Federation introduced the World Golf Championships.

The first three jointly sanctioned championships—the Accenture Match Play Championship, the NEC Invitational (now Bridgestone Invitational) and the American Express Championship—were launched in 1999. Jeff Maggert won the first event and Tiger Woods the latter two. The addition of the World Cup was announced in December 1999 and debuted in December 2000.

The 2006 World Golf Championships will begin in February with the Accenture Match Play Championship at La Costa Resort and Spa in Carlsbad, CA. In August, the Bridgestone Invitational will be held at Firestone CC's South Course



in Akron, OH. In September, the American Express Championship will return to Europe for the fifth time when it is held at The Grove in Hertfordshire, England. The series will conclude in December as Barbados will play host to the Barbados World Cup.

The World Golf Championships events feature players from around the world competing against one another in varied formats (match and stroke play and team competition).

The championships rotate through a variety of outstanding venues worldwide. Roughly half of the golf courses are in the United States and half at venues represented by the International Federation of PGA Tours. World Golf Championships events have been contested on five continents.

The Asian Tour joined the International Federation of PGA Tours as a full-fledged member in November 1999, while the Canadian Tour was named an associate member in March 2000.

Accenture, American Express, Barbados and Bridgestone are the umbrella sponsors of the World Golf Championships. JELD-WEN is an official sponsor of all four events, while Kohler is a sponsor for all except the WGC-Bridgestone Invitational.

Fields for the World Golf Championships are filled primarily through the Official World Golf Ranking, which is endorsed by all the sport's major professional organizations and governing bodies and individual Tour's Official Money Lists/Orders of Merit.

The Presidents Cup



The seventh Presidents Cup will be contested at The Royal Montreal Golf Club in Montreal, Canada on Sept. 27-30, 2007. It will be the third international venue for the biennial event, following Australia (1998) and South Africa (2003).

History

The Presidents Cup was developed to give the world's best non-European players an opportunity to compete in international team match-play competition.

A biennial event played in non-Ryder Cup years, the first Presidents Cup was played Sept. 16-18, 1994 at Robert Trent Jones Golf Club. The U.S. Team, captained by Hale Irwin, defeated Captain David Graham's International side, 20-12.

The 2003 Presidents Cup was originally scheduled for November 2002, but was postponed one year in the wake of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks on the United States. Played at The Links at Fancourt Hotel and Country Club Estate in George, South Africa, the competition ended in a tie. After both teams completed regulation tied at 17 points, Ernie Els of the International Team and Tiger Woods of the U.S. were designated to represent their teams in a sudden-death playoff. After three playoff holes, and as darkness was descending, Captains Gary Player and Jack Nicklaus, in the spirit of the competition, decided that the two teams would share the Cup.

The 2005 Presidents Cup, played for a fourth time at the Robert Trent Jones Golf Club in Prince William County, VA, came down to the final hole. When American Chris DiMarco birdied the 18th hole in Sunday's singles to defeat Stuart Appleby, 1-up, he gave the Americans an 18½-15½ victory. DiMarco finished with a 4-0-1 record in the competition and was joined by teammates Jim Furyk and Phil Mickelson (both 3-0-2 records) in leading the way. Retief Goosen went 4-0-1 for the International side. The victory gave the United States a 4-1-1 edge in Presidents Cup matches.

Former U.S. President Gerald Ford presided over the first Presidents Cup as Honorary Chairman. Former President George H.W. Bush, like Ford an avid golfer, served as Honorary Chairman for the 1996 Presidents Cup. Australian Prime Minister John Howard was Honorary Chairman for the 1998 event. In 2000, President Bill Clinton made history when he became the first sitting president to serve as Honorary Chairman. In 2003, Thabo Mbeki, President of the Republic of South Africa, was Honorary Chairman. Current President George W. Bush served as the Honorary Chairman of the 2005 Presidents Cup.

Eligibility

Members of the 2007 U.S. Team will be selected based on official earnings from the start of the 2006 season through the 2007 PGA Championship. International Team players for the 2007 Presidents Cup will be chosen on the basis of the Official World Golf Ranking. International Teams do not include players eligible for the European Ryder Cup Team.

The eligibility rankings are used to select 10 members for both squads. The 12-man teams are rounded out by two Captain's Choices per team.

Structure and Scoring

The Presidents Cup competition consists of 34 matches—11 foursomes (alternate shot) and 11 four-ball (better ball) matches. There are 12 singles matches involving all players on the final Sunday. All matches are worth one point each, for a total of 34 points. There are no playoffs for foursomes or four-ball, with each side receiving ½-point. Singles matches all square after 18 holes will go to extra holes until a team winner is determined. In a change inspired by the events of the 2003 Presidents Cup, if the match is deadlocked at the end of singles play, the competition will be deemed a tie and the teams will share The Presidents Cup.

The Presidents Cup follows the PGA TOUR creed of giving back. There is no purse for the players. Net revenues are divided into equal shares that the players and Captains designate for charities or golf-related projects of their choice. Contributions in their names are made through PGA TOUR Charities, Inc. The first six Presidents Cups generated more than \$13 million for charities worldwide.

Official World Golf Ranking



The Official World Golf Ranking, which is endorsed by the four major championships and six professional Tours that make up the International Federation of PGA Tours, is issued every Monday following the completion of the previous week's tournaments from around the world.

Results from events on the world's leading professional tours—the Asian Tour, PGA Tour of Australasia, European Tour, Japan Golf Tour, PGA TOUR, Nationwide Tour, Sunshine Tour, Canadian Tour and European Challenge Tour—are evaluated, and points are awarded according to the players' finishing positions. Tournaments are "rated" according to the strength of field based on the number and ranking of the world's top 200 players in respective tournament fields (event "ratings").

In addition, some strength-of-field weighting is given to the inclusion in each field of a significant percentage of the top 30 on the host Tour's prior year Official Money Lists. The four major championships and THE PLAYERS Championship are rated separately to reflect the higher field quality of the events. In addition, the Volvo PGA Championship in Europe and the Australian, Japanese and South African Open Championships, the Nationwide Tour Championship and Volvo Masters of Asia are allocated higher minimum point levels to reflect their status as each Tour's flagship event.

The Official World Golf Ranking points for each player are accumulated over a two-year "rolling" period, with the points awarded in the most recent 13-week period doubled. Each player then is ranked according to his average points per tournament, which is determined by dividing his total number of points by the tournaments he has played over that two-year period. There is a minimum requirement of 40 tournaments for the two-year period.

The winners of the Masters Tournament, U.S. Open, British Open and PGA Championship are awarded 50 points (30 points for second place, 20 for third, 15 for fourth, down to 0.75 points for a player completing the final round), and the winner of THE PLAYERS Championship is awarded 40 points (points are awarded down to 60th place).

The Volvo PGA Championship has a minimum of 32 points for the winner (points down to 56th place). In addition, the Open Championships of Australia, Japan and South Africa have a minimum of 16 points for the winner (points awarded down to 37th place). The Nationwide Tour Championship and Volvo Masters of Asia winners receive 10 points (points awarded down to 22nd place).

Minimum points levels of all the other official Tour events have been set at three points for the Canadian Tour; six points for the Sunshine and European Challenge (points to 14th place); seven points for the Nationwide Tour and Asian Tour (points to 17th place); eight points for Australasia and Japan (points to 19th place); and 12 points for Europe and the United States (points to 27th place).

Beginning in September 2001, a new feature was added to the ranking system—any applicable two-year time period is divided into eight 13-week segments. Ranking points in each player's record will be reduced in value by one-eighth at the conclusion of each segment, thereby cutting the sudden and sometimes dramatic impact of the reduction of one-half that previously occurred at the one- and two-year anniversaries of events in which players earn points. Full Ranking points are awarded for tournaments reduced to 54 holes because of inclement weather or other reasons. For events completing only 36 holes, Ranking points are reduced by 25 percent.

Mark H. McCormack Award

The Mark H. McCormack Award has been presented annually since 1998 to the player who holds the No. 1 position on the Official World Golf Ranking for the greatest number of weeks in each calendar year. Tiger Woods has won the award every year since its inception. He held the top position for 28 weeks in 2005, with Vijay Singh standing No. 1 on three occasions for a total of 14 weeks. The award was created in 1998 by the Governing Board of the Official World Golf Ranking to honor McCormack for the significant role he played in founding a world ranking system for professional golf. McCormack founded IMG, a premier worldwide sports and lifestyle management and marketing firm in the early 1960s. He passed away May 16, 2003.

Glossary of Statistics

Driving Distance

The average number of yards per measured drive. Driving distance is measured on two holes per round. Care is taken to select holes which face in opposite directions to counteract the effects of wind. Drives are measured to the point they come to rest, regardless of whether they are in the fairway or not.

Driving Accuracy

The percentage of time a player is able to hit the fairway with his tee shot.

Greens in Regulation

The percentage of time a player was able to hit the green in regulation (greens hit in regulation/holes played). Note: A green is considered hit in regulation if any part of the ball is touching the putting surface and the number of strokes taken is two less than par or fewer.

Putting Average

Measures putting performance on greens hit in regulation. For each green hit in regulation, the total number of putts is divided by the number of greens hit in regulation. By using greens hit in regulation, we are able to eliminate the effects of chipping close and one-putting in the computation.

Total Driving

Total Driving is computed by totaling a player's rank in driving distance and driving accuracy.

Eagles (holes per)

The average number of holes between each eagle.

Birdie Leaders

The average number of birdies made per round played.

Sand Saves Percentage

The percentage of time a player is able to get up and down once in a green-side sand bunker. Note: This up and down is computed regardless of score on the hole.

All Around

This statistic is computed by totaling a player's rank in each of the following statistics: Scoring Leaders, Putting Leaders, Eagle Leaders, Birdie Leaders, Sand Saves, Greens in Regulation, Driving Distance and Driving Accuracy.

Phil Mickelson won his third overall and second consecutive PGA TOUR West Coast Swing Presented by Allianz trophy in 2005.

Mickelson, who won the FBR Open and AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am in consecutive weeks in February, received a \$500,000 winner's bonus, presented to the player who accumulates the most points during the nine-tournament West Coast Swing, based on top-10 performances. Adam Scott was second and collected \$300,000, while third-place finisher David Toms earned \$200,000. Mickelson finished with 203.125 points, while Scott had 160.416 and Toms, 157.500.

"I am pleased now to have won this award for the second consecutive time," said Mickelson, the fourth-ranked player in the world. "The players appreciate all that Allianz has done to help strengthen the West Coast events."

Mickelson previously won the "King of the Swing" title in 1998 and 2004. Tiger Woods earned the title in 1999-2000, Davis Love III captured the 2001 title, Chris DiMarco in 2002 and Mike Weir won in 2003.

On the strength of a win in the Chrysler Championship and a runner-up finish in the Southern Farm Bureau Classic, Carl Pettersson of Sweden won the PGA TOUR's Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers and the \$500,000 bonus.

Entering its seventh year, the Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers is an 11-tournament series (that begins at the Deutsche Bank Championship and ends with the conclusion of THE TOUR Championship presented by Coca-Cola) that includes enhanced purses and bonus awards totaling \$1 million. Points are awarded for each top-10 finish, from 100 points for first place to 10 for 10th. Vijay Singh won the title three consecutive years from 2002-2004; Bob Estes won the series in 2001 while Tiger Woods won in 2000.

Pettersson led the series with 201.250 points accumulated in the eight Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers events he played. Olin Browne finished in second with 170.000 points while Tiger Woods finished in third with 170.000 points. Browne finished ahead of Woods by virtue of playing in more Fall Finish presented by PricewaterhouseCoopers events. Browne earned \$300,000 and Woods earned \$200,000.

PricewaterhouseCoopers is the Official Professional Services Firm of the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. PricewaterhouseCoopers is also the TOUR's official tabulator of the votes for all annual player awards.

Byron Nelson Award

The Byron Nelson Award is based on each player's adjusted scoring average. The adjusted score is computed from the average score of the field at each tournament. As a result, a player's score may be higher or lower than his actual score. Actual scoring average was used to determine the scoring leader prior to 1988.

In order to qualify for the Byron Nelson Award, a player must compete in a minimum of 50 official rounds on the PGA TOUR.

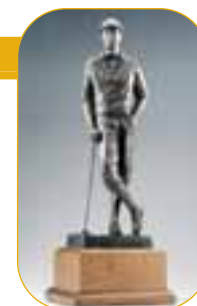
Payne Stewart Award

The award is named for Payne Stewart, an 11-time winner on the PGA TOUR, including three major championships. Stewart died the week of THE TOUR Championship in 1999. The award was created by the PGA TOUR Policy Board to perpetuate Stewart's memory. It is presented annually at THE TOUR Championship presented by Coca-Cola to a player sharing Stewart's respect for the traditions of the game, his commitment to uphold the game's heritage of charitable support and his professional and meticulous presentation of himself and the sport through his dress and conduct.

In addition to a sculpture presented to the recipient, the Payne Stewart Award is accompanied by an annual Payne Stewart Award Grant presented by Southern Company. The \$300,000 grant will support several initiatives in Stewart's

name and be distributed as follows: \$100,000 to Payne and Tracey Stewart's primary charity, The Stewart Family Foundation; \$100,000 in Stewart's honor to The First Tee facility in Missouri, located at Camp Kanakuk, which is affiliated with the "Kids Across America" program; and \$100,000 to a charity designated by the recipient.

PGA Player of the Year

The PGA Player of the Year Award is given by the PGA of America to the top PGA TOUR player based on a mathematical formula that weighs tournament wins, official money standing and scoring average.

The point system for selecting the Player of the Year was amended in 1982, as follows: 30 points for winning the PGA Championship, U.S. Open, British Open or Masters Tournament; 20 points for winning THE PLAYERS Championship; 10 points for winning all other designated PGA TOUR events. In addition, there is a 50-point bonus for winning two majors, 75-point bonus for winning three, 100-point bonus for winning four.

For top-10 finishes on the PGA TOUR's official money list and scoring average list, the point value is: first, 20 points, then 18, 16, 14, 12, 10, 8, 6, 4, 2. Any incomplete rounds in the scoring average list will result in a .10 penalty per incomplete round.

Vardon Trophy

The Vardon Trophy, named in honor of famed British golfer Harry Vardon, is awarded annually by the PGA of America.

From 1947 to 1987, the Vardon Trophy was awarded to the professional golfer with the lowest-scoring average. In 1988, the criteria were adjusted to award the Vardon Trophy to the touring professional with the lowest adjusted scoring average based on a minimum of 60 official rounds in events cosponsored or approved by the PGA TOUR.

Any player with an incomplete round is ineligible to win the Vardon Trophy.

This licensee is revolutionizing the golf retail industry through its network of 65,000-100,000 square foot TOUR-branded stores it plans to build across the U.S. with a focus on service, education and good value. There are two stores in Myrtle Beach, S.C., and the first Superstore in suburban Atlanta opened in early 2005, with a second one planned for early 2006.

The Paradises Shops, licensee for the 44 PGA TOUR Airport Shops throughout the U.S., continues to expand the TOUR's retail presence in this well-targeted environment. Each year, more than 200 million travelers pass by these shops.

Our apparel licensee Perry Ellis International continues to expand the presence of TOUR-branded apparel in JC Penney stores, a key player in the mid-tier department store market. The apparel will be available in more than 600 stores by the end of 2006.

In late 2005, PGA TOUR Wines introduced a collection of several varietals of premium handcrafted wines from some of the finest California appellations. Also, the PGA TOUR Grill, a restaurant appealing to the "upper casual" market, opened in suburban Washington, D.C., with additional locations planned for 2006.

Internationally, TOUR-branded merchandise continues to grow as consumer products of choice in golf retail, and our licensee base throughout the U.K., Europe and Asia continues to progress. Charity: Giving Back...The Heart of the PGA TOUR



The smiles on faces and lives positively affected are sure signs that the charitable mission of the PGA TOUR is successful in giving back in the communities where we play.

This effort was celebrated in late 2005 when the PGA TOUR and its tournaments reached the Drive to a Billion milestone. The more than \$1 billion raised for charity since 1938 has allowed PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events to annually help more than 2,000 charities and countless individuals worldwide.

"Thanks to the incredible generosity of the tournaments, players, fans, volunteers and business partners who support the PGA TOUR, our goal of giving a billion dollars to charity is a reality," PGA TOUR Commissioner Tim Finchem said. "We hope the focus on this event inspires a continued enthusiasm for giving that ensures more and more money is donated every year. Our goal is to give our next billion in less than 10 years."

Structure

Unlike any other professional sport, the PGA TOUR relies on 80,000 volunteers a year to run its events, and nearly all of its 100-plus tournaments are structured as non-profit organizations designed to donate 100 percent of net proceeds to local charities. Beneficiaries include a wide variety of local organizations such as hospitals, youth development organizations, growth-of-the-game programs and food banks.

The beneficiaries include programs such as the Evans Scholars Foundation (Cialis Western Open) and Miracle Camp of Sacred Heart Health System (Boeing Championship at San Destin) and the benefiting charities of the National Mining Association Pete Dye Classic, the 2004 PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour Charities of the Year, respectively. The impact is also made by volunteers such as Peggy Nelson (Byron's wife) at the EDS Byron Nelson Championship, Paul Ross of Birmingham, AL, and Sam Purdy at the Canadian PGA Championship, the 2004 PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour Volunteers of the Year, respectively.

Tournaments

Tournaments provide the leadership, led by the EDS Byron Nelson Championship on the PGA TOUR, the Toshiba Classic, 3M Championship and the Wal-Mart First Tee Open at Pebble Beach on the Champions Tour and the BMW Charity Pro-Am at The Cliffs on the Nationwide Tour, which provided the largest donations to charity in 2005 on each Tour.

"This effort is a tribute to the tournaments, thousands of volunteers and the players who make PGA TOUR events so successful," said Kym Hougham, president of the PGA TOUR Tournaments Association. "We look forward to the continuation of this worthy cause as we push to make a true difference in people's lives."

Disaster relief in 2005 was met with terrific support throughout the golf world. The U.S. Golf Hurricane Katrina Relief Fund expects to exceed its \$5-million goal, with the PGA TOUR's 84 LUMBER Classic, its fans and players giving approximately \$1.1 million in 2005. The U.S. Golf Tsunami Relief Fund effort earlier in the year, also among the leading golf organizations, raised more than \$2 million.

Players

Players also reach out to help considerably through charitable efforts in their home communities and across the nation. Billy Andrade and Brad Faxon have teamed over the years to raise more than \$5 million for Andrade-Faxon Charities for Children, assisting at-risk children in Rhode Island and southeastern Massachusetts. Phil Mickelson, Frank Lickliter II and Rory Sabbatini all contributed more than \$400,000 to three funds for injured soldiers during the year. Champions Tour player Jim Thorpe gave his first-place check of \$247,500 at the FedEx Kinko's Classic to his home church in Lake Mary, FL, for additional facilities. Champions Tour Player of the Year Dana Quigley gave his second-place earnings of \$500,000 in the Charles Schwab Cup to various charities. In early 2006, the Tiger Woods Foundation will open the Tiger Woods Learning Center in Anaheim, CA, a state-of-the-art educational facility built at the public course where Woods played his high school golf. Tim Clark gave his winner's share of approximately \$20,000 at the Nelson Mandela Invitational in South Africa to a deaf girl he had met before the tournament who needed ear surgery.

"It put into perspective what life is all about—and it's not about all those putts I'm able to put away or miss at the crucial stages of an event, but life in general," Clark said of his contribution.

Golf 20/20: Vision For the Future



In November 2000, senior members of the golf industry came together at World Golf Village for a conference called GOLF 20/20: Vision for the Future and embarked on an unprecedented collaborative effort to enhance the future of the game. The spirit of unity was so strong, and the commitment to make a difference so universal, that the decision was made to address some very specific issues and to make GOLF 20/20 an ongoing industry effort.

GOLF 20/20 is a World Golf Foundation initiative that was started with the following stated mission: To align the golf industry behind a plan that addresses the future of golf in a strategic manner, with an emphasis on accelerating growth and participation and creating new avenues of access into the game. The focus of the conference was not only on participation but also on interest.

Among the accomplishments of GOLF 20/20 over its first five years are the following:

Research—20/20 has undertaken a number of unprecedented research projects, including golf's largest segmentation study ever in 2001; a study quantifying golf's annual economy at \$62 billion; and in 2005 two studies focusing on golf's best customers.

Program Incubation—GOLF 20/20 has successfully piloted a number of programs. The first was Link Up 2 Golf in the summer of 2001; this adult player development program is now an integral part of the PGA of America's Play Golf America program. In 2003, 20/20 created the National School Golf Program, a unique approach to introducing elementary school kids to the game through the physical education structure; that program is now under the management of The First Tee. This past year 20/20 created Women's Golf Week, which took place in June at 230 facilities across the country and impacted 10,000 women; the 2006 goals are 500 facilities and 25,000 women.

Industry Alliances—GOLF 20/20 not only brings industry leaders together each fall to discuss relevant issues, but it has helped foster a number of important alliances within the industry. 20/20 partners with the USGA and its Foundation on the creation of juniorlinks.com, the ultimate junior golf website; it has partnered with the PGA of America on the creation and promotion of Play Golf America.

Communication—In June 2005, GOLF 20/20 relaunched its Web site, golf2020.com, with updated content including all research and report, and a new section that, in concert with the PGA and Play Golf America, presents best practices relating to the growth of the game. There is no shortage of creative ideas that can enhance a golf facility's ability to generate additional revenue while creating new players or encouraging more frequent play from existing players, and now there is one location where those ideas are available. The Web site also contains all GOLF 20/20 research and other information of value to those with an interest in ensuring the future vitality of golf.

Regulations – Media

The following regulations are to be followed by all members of the media:

1. A daily decal is necessary to walk inside the gallery ropes. All members of the media with such decal must remain not more than an arm's length from the ropes, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their rounds.
3. Do not interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions before a round, except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by prior arrangement with the player, up against the ropes and not in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.
5. Do not disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards. Media are not allowed in the scoring tent.

WORKING PRESS REGULATIONS

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day — and others requested — will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All audio recording device and/or video recorder work should be done in the proximity of the press room, media center and/or interview room.
2. Video Recorders are not permitted in the locker room. Audio recording devices are permitted in the locker rooms subject to the following regulations:
 - Audio recorded interviews are intended to be one-on-one and not group interviews.
 - Audio recorded interviews are for reference only and the audio cannot be used for any other purpose.
 - The reporter must clearly ask a player, and permission must be granted, in order for the audio recording device to be used.
 - The reporter is responsible for making other players in the vicinity aware that an interview is being recorded.

- PGA TOUR staff may designate, depending upon need and availability, an area within the locker room for the purpose of conducting interviews that are recorded.
 - Use of audio recorded interviews must be limited to the person being interviewed.
3. Audio recording devices and/or video recorders are not permitted within the playing area of the golf course unless written permission has been granted from PGA TOUR.

WEATHER DELAY GUIDELINES

1. During weather-delay situations, no one other than players and essential staff will be permitted in the locker room. This means the media are not permitted in the locker room in such situations. However, whenever possible, arrangements will be made to provide players for interviews during such situations.
2. Fully accredited members of the news media will be welcome in the locker room at all other times to carry out their assigned duties. (Note: Cameras and tape recorders are not permitted in the locker room.)

The media person set forth below and the News Agency set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organizations and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the media person set forth below.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Radio

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including, but not limited to, broadcast, cable, home video, Internet) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No live or tape-delayed broadcast of any portion of any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour event is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR.

All radio media are permitted to broadcast highlights coverage of such events only under the following conditions, unless otherwise approved in writing by PGA TOUR:

1. Coverage shall not be in excess of three minutes of highlights per day and may not purport to be live, play-by-play coverage from the course.
2. All highlights coverage must be part of regularly scheduled news programs and may not be broadcast after 48 hours from the conclusion of the applicable tournament.
3. Live coverage or reporting in excess of three minutes per day from a tournament site, including, without limitation, the course, media center, press room and interview room, is prohibited without the prior approval of PGA TOUR.
4. As the exclusive rightsholder, PGA TOUR may request copies of any coverage of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events. Such coverage will be provided to PGA TOUR upon request (PGA TOUR will pay industry standard copying and shipping costs).
5. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
6. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be permitted into the media center and locker room areas.
7. Radio broadcasters are not permitted inside the gallery ropes at any time.
8. Broadcasters are not permitted to talk to players during play or after the round until the player has signed his scorecard.
9. Broadcasters shall not sell, distribute or syndicate any highlights coverage to any third party without PGA TOUR's prior approval.
10. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to radio broadcast and has no rights with respect to any other media (including, without limitation, audio via the Internet) without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All audio recording device and/or video recorder work should be done in the proximity of the press room, media center and/or interview room.
2. Video Recorders are not permitted in the locker room. Audio recording devices are permitted in the locker rooms subject to the following regulations:
 - Audio recorded interviews are intended to be one-on-one and not group interviews.
 - Audio recorded interviews are for reference only and the audio cannot be used for any other purpose.
 - The reporter must clearly ask a player, and permission must be granted, in order for the audio recording device to be used.
 - The reporter is responsible for making other players in the vicinity aware that an interview is being recorded.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.



Regulations – Photography

Photo credentials will be issued only to photographers on assignment from recognized and accredited publications, news services and other organizations approved in advance by the PGA TOUR. Requests for photo credentials must be made by the appropriate publisher, news agency or organization and not by the photographer. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to photography and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

Photographs taken at any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour tournament may not be commercially exploited in any manner without the prior written consent of the PGA TOUR and the applicable course(s) and player(s).

Photographic likenesses of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour players and tournament courses may be used for legitimate news coverage only unless approved by the PGA TOUR. Where appropriate, the credentialed publications and news services shall use reasonable efforts to use photographic likenesses of players and tournament courses containing current sponsors and endorsers.

Credentialed photographers will receive one of two types of photo credentials. A limited number of inside the ropes photo credentials will be issued daily by the PGA TOUR Media Official on site and will permit the wearer access inside the ropes. Photographers who do not have an inside the ropes photo credential must stay outside the gallery ropes but are still required to check in with the on site PGA TOUR Media Official to receive the proper outside the ropes photo credential. Photographic assistants will not be issued photo credentials of any type.

Professional grade cameras and lenses must be used and may be used only by accredited media representatives who have been issued photo credentials, and such use is subject to the following conditions:

1. Photographers with inside the ropes photo credentials must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. Photographers without inside the ropes photo credentials are not permitted inside the ropes at any time.
2. Photographers are not permitted on the teeing ground, as determined by PGA TOUR.

3. The use of carts is prohibited at all times.
4. Photographers must not position themselves in the line of play. If requested to move by a player, his caddie or an official, the photographer will do so without delay or discussion.
5. No photograph shall be taken until a player has completed his stroke.
6. Players should not be asked to pose during a round.
7. Noise-free equipment must be used at all times.
8. Cameras are not permitted in the scoring tent or in the locker rooms.
9. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to photography and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

The Photographer set forth below and the Requesting Organization set forth below shall jointly and severally indemnify, defend and hold the Event, its host organization and PGA TOUR and their respective officers, agents, representatives, successors and assigns harmless from and against any and all expenses, lawsuits, damages, costs and liabilities (including reasonable attorneys fees and expenses) incurred by, arising from, or in connection with, any actions of the Photographer set forth below or the use of any photographs other than as set forth in these Photography Regulations.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – On-Line Services

Media credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized golf or legitimate news Internet sites, as determined by PGA TOUR in its sole discretion. Coverage obtained in accordance with these regulations can only be used on the credentialed website. Individuals representing multiple interests (such as a recognized golf magazine and an internet site) must agree to be bound by all applicable media regulations.

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including but not limited to network, cable, Internet, home video) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No audio or video coverage of the event competition is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR. All other audio and video coverage must comply with the regulations below. Scores and statistics may be distributed only in accordance with these regulations.

1. Coverage must be part of the news portion of the Internet site identified below (the "Credentialed Site") and must not purport to be live, play-by-play or real-time coverage from the course.
2. Audio and video coverage shall be limited to those areas designated by PGA TOUR (e.g., press room, media center and interview room) and shall not contain video footage or audio call of tournament play. Requests for expanded coverage must be submitted in writing to PGA TOUR for PGA TOUR's prior approval.
3. Audio or video coverage from PGA TOUR designated areas shall not be in excess of three minutes per day from each Tour (and six minutes total for all three Tours).
4. Audio and video coverage shall not be made available on the Credentialed Site until that day's live or tape-delayed coverage by the television network is concluded and shall not be used for any purpose after 48 hours following the conclusion of the applicable tournament.
5. As the exclusive rights holder, PGA TOUR is the absolute owner of all video footage shot and audio recorded at the tournament site (golf action or other footage) and may request copies of any footage shot or audio recorded at PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events. Such footage and audio will be provided electronically to PGA TOUR immediately upon request.
6. Scoring and statistical information may only appear in the editorial news portion of the Credentialed Site and may be provided no sooner than 30 minutes after the actual occurrence of the shots, or after the time such information is legally available as public information if sooner than thirty minutes after the actual occurrence of the shots. Scoring and statistical information may not be archived on the Credentialed Site and cannot be used for any purpose after 48 hours following the conclusion of the applicable tournament unless such information is legally available as public information.
7. No coverage, including, without limitation, scoring information, statistical information, video coverage and audio coverage may be used by, sold, given, distributed or otherwise transferred to any party other than the Credentialed Site in any manner whatsoever, without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR.
8. Photographic images of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour players may be used on the Credentialed Site for legitimate news coverage only, and may

be used together with news stories during the day's play, so long as such photographs are not used with other real-time or near-real-time information to create a "shot-by-shot" account of the day's play. Commercial exploitation of these images without written consent of the players and PGA TOUR is prohibited.

9. The Credentialed Site has rights only with respect to website media and has no rights with respect to any other media (including, without limitation, cellular or wireless devices) without the prior approval of the PGA TOUR.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All audio recording device and/or video recorder work should be done in the proximity of the press room, media center and/or interview room.

The credentialed entity assumes all risk and danger incidental to the game of golf and releases PGA TOUR, Inc.-sanctioned tournaments and competitions and their host sites, title sponsors, host organizations, PGA TOUR, Inc., participating players, and all agents thereof from any and all liabilities resulting from such cases. The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Print

Media credentials will be issued only to personnel on assignment from recognized and accredited publications, as determined by PGA TOUR in its sole discretion. Individuals representing multiple interests (such as a recognized golf magazine and an Internet site) must agree to be bound by all applicable media regulations.

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour.

1. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be permitted into the media center and locker room areas.
2. Players shall not be interviewed during play or after the round until the player has signed his scorecard.
3. Coverage shall be only for the News Agency set forth below and may not be sold or distributed to any other entity or party.
4. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
5. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be allowed inside the gallery ropes, and they must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. All support personnel must remain outside the ropes.
6. The credentialed entity has rights only with respect to print publication media and has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

TAPE RECORDER REGULATIONS

1. All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the press room, media center and/or interview room.
2. Video Recorders are not permitted in the locker room. Audio recording devices are permitted in the locker rooms subject to the following regulations:
 - Audio recorded interviews are intended to be one-on-one and not group interviews.
 - Audio recorded interviews are for reference only and the audio cannot be used for any other purpose.

- The reporter must clearly ask a player, and permission must be granted, in order for the audio recording device to be used.
 - The reporter is responsible for making other players in the vicinity aware that an interview is being recorded.
 - PGA TOUR staff may designate, depending upon need and availability, an area within the locker room for the purpose of conducting interviews that are recorded.
 - Use of audio recorded interviews must be limited to the person being interviewed.

The holders of the media credential grant permission to PGA TOUR, Inc., to utilize the holders' images or likenesses incidental to any live or recorded television or other transmission or reproduction in whole or in part of any PGA TOUR event they attend.

PGA TOUR MAY REVOKE CREDENTIALS AT ANY TIME FOR ANY REASON INCLUDING VIOLATIONS OF ANY OF THE FOREGOING REGULATIONS.

Regulations – Television

PGA TOUR retains exclusive media rights (including, but not limited to, broadcast, cable, home video, Internet) to all events on the PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour. No live or tape-delayed broadcast of any portion of any PGA TOUR, Champions Tour or Nationwide Tour event is permitted without the prior written consent of PGA TOUR. Coverage obtained by the credentialed entity below in accordance with these regulations can only be used by the credentialed entity for its television coverage and only with respect to television media. The credentialed entity has no rights with respect to any other media without obtaining the proper and valid credentials for such media.

All television media are permitted to broadcast highlights coverage of such events only under the following conditions unless otherwise approved in writing by PGA TOUR:

1. Televised coverage shall not be in excess of three minutes of highlights daily from each Tour (and six minutes total for all three Tours) and may not purport to be live, play-by-play coverage from the course. Requests for expanded coverage must be submitted in writing to PGA TOUR.
2. All highlights coverage must be part of regularly scheduled news programs. Highlights may not be sold, distributed, syndicated or provided in any manner to any other entity.
3. Highlights from any day's play may not be broadcast or used for any other purpose after 48 hours from the conclusion of the applicable tournament.
4. No action footage of any day's play may be broadcast until that day's live or tape-delayed coverage by the television network is concluded.
5. Live coverage or reporting in excess of three minutes per day from a tournament site, including, without limitation, the course, media center, press room and interview room, is prohibited without the prior approval of PGA TOUR.
6. No footage may be used in any commercial manner or sold, distributed, syndicated or provided to any other entity or agency.
7. As the exclusive rights holder, PGA TOUR is the absolute owner of all footage shot at the tournament site (golf action or other footage) and may request copies of any footage shot at PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events. Such footage will be provided to PGA TOUR upon request (PGA TOUR will pay industry standard copying and shipping costs).
8. The use of golf carts is prohibited at all times.
9. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be permitted into the media center and locker room areas.
10. Only personnel with appropriate credentials will be allowed inside the gallery ropes, and they must stay within one arm's length of the ropes at all times. All support personnel must remain outside the ropes.
11. All uses of footage hereunder shall be made with a courtesy credit to PGA TOUR.

Tournament Players Clubs

Tournament Players Club



The PGA TOUR's Tournament Players Club network has maintained a reputation for operating high-quality clubs since its inception 25 years ago. The TPC network continues to grow, with more than 30 facilities currently open or under construction.

TPCs encompass all forms of golf related operations—resort facilities, corporate/private membership clubs and daily fee courses—and, as such, PGA TOUR Golf Course Properties, Inc. is able to match the type of facility with the demands of each market in which a club operates.

The network represents the highest standard in the golf course industry, commensurate with the members of the organization it represents, the players of the PGA TOUR. Each Tournament Players Club embodies the trademark of excellence first established with the flagship TPC at Sawgrass, which opened its world-famous Stadium Course in the fall of 1980 in Ponte Vedra Beach, FL. This commitment to overall excellence serves as the foundation for the network's overall success.

The TPC network was born through former PGA TOUR Commissioner Deane Beman's desire to provide TOUR players with quality golf courses that also would offer spectators enhanced viewing areas. Beman also reasoned that development of quality facilities would alleviate the TOUR's dependency on the television dollar, while providing rent-free venues for tournaments. The savings in rent, in turn, would generate both increased purses and greater charitable contributions by the tournaments held at TPCs.

The TPC at Sawgrass was the first Tournament Players Club to hold a PGA TOUR event, becoming the permanent home of THE PLAYERS Championship in 1982. In 2005, 16 tournaments were conducted on TPC courses, bringing the total number of PGA TOUR, Champions Tour and Nationwide Tour events held at TPC facilities to 252.

The TPC at Sawgrass will be refurbished in 2006, with the fairways being redone and the greens rebuilt to create a "fast, firm and fair" course in time for the 2007 PLAYERS. A new, larger clubhouse will also be built.

Many of the top golf course architects are connected with Tournament Players Club projects, including Pete Dye, Tom Fazio, Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus, Gary Player, Arthur Hills, Jay Morrish, Tom Weiskopf, Greg Norman, Bob Von Hagge and D.A. Weirbring. The Tournament Players Club of Boston, which opened in 2002, was the fourth TPC course designed by Palmer Course Design Co. Weiskopf has designed his second TPC course for the new Tournament Players Club at Craig Ranch near Dallas, TX, which opened in the fall of 2004.

Moreover, in recognizing the importance of player input for tournament courses, TOUR members have served as design consultants, working closely with the lead architect. Hal Sutton, for instance, is currently serving as the player design consultant on the Tournament Players Club at Treviso Bay (Naples, FL), which will open in early 2007, while Steve Elkington was the player consultant and Kelly Gibson the associate player consultant working with architect Pete Dye on the Tournament Players Club of Louisiana in New Orleans, which opened in April 2004.

The TPC of San Antonio, scheduled to break ground this year, will be a 36-hole facility. Pete Dye and Greg Norman will be the architects, and Sergio Garcia and Bruce Lietzke will be the player consultants of the course.

ShotLink



The PGA TOUR has collaborated with IBM, the TOUR's Official Worldwide Information Technology Partner, on the PGA TOUR ShotLink System. The ShotLink System is a revolutionary platform for collecting and disseminating scoring and statistical data on every shot by every player in real-time during every tournament round. This data asset creates improved live coverage and more meaningful analysis. The new data creates great potential to enhance entertainment and image of the sport across all platforms.

The development of ShotLink started in 1997 when the TOUR decided to update its current scoring system, which was based on 1987 technology. The TOUR, in conjunction with IBM, conducted an extensive review process to formulate its strategy for the development and implementation of ShotLink. Following an evaluation of more than 30 companies, additional technology and implementation partners were identified: Information and Display Systems (IDS), Palm, Electronic Arts, Daktronics and two mapping vendors: GeoGolf and Geodetic Services. IBM provided overall project management, consulting services and server and networking technologies. ShotLink was introduced during the 2001 Buick Classic and represents the TOUR's scoring system for the future.

The accumulation, packaging and presentation of expanded shot and course information provides the basis for numerous fan enhancements. Current uses of ShotLink data include:

- Enhanced graphics and statistics in television broadcasts
- Expanded information and statistics for use by media
- Powering on-site and PGATOUR.com tournament leaderboards
- Providing on-site media and hospitality access to live tournament information through Tournament Tracker, developed by IBM
- Powering the Emmy Award-winning TOURCast application on PGATOUR.com, which launched in 2003
- Powering PGA TOUR Mobile Link and TOURCast Mobile, the PGA TOUR's wireless application for use on PDAs and cell phones
- Analysis of how each golf course is played to assist in course setup and in design changes
- Increased data mining to create more interesting entertainment and insights on how the game is played across all platforms on PGATOUR.com today

In addition to current uses, ShotLink provides unlimited potential to develop fan enhancements and products over the next several years, including:

- Enhanced and interactive television
- On-site wireless and kiosk applications for tournament patrons
- Internet, PC and console games

Besides fan enhancements, ShotLink creates an ongoing historical archive of statistical information. This information is available to players through the PGA TOUR Links program, also built by IBM.

The ShotLink data is collected by volunteers utilizing a combination of Palm handheld devices and laser range finders. Each week a team of approximately 350 volunteers dedicate approximately three man years of effort to perform this data collection. In the course of the entire season, more than 10,000 volunteers contribute to the success of this program.

Weather Guidelines

Every effort will be made to finish each round as scheduled by Sunday. The first priority is always the competition and completion of 72 holes.

In an effort to achieve this objective by Sunday, 36 holes may be played on Sunday following a reduction of the field to the score which has the closest number of professionals to 60. If an equal number of professionals are at scores above and below the 60th position, the higher score will be used.

If conditions exist which prevent 72 holes from being completed by Sunday, play will always be extended to Monday if golf course conditions and the weather forecast permit. Play on Monday could include 36 holes.

If conditions exist which make the completion of 72 holes impossible, the next priority is to complete 54 holes; thereby the winner is credited with an official victory. Again, play in this situation will always be extended to Monday if conditions and weather permit.

If conditions exist which make the completion of 54 holes impossible, the next priority is to complete 36 holes; thereby players receive official money, although the winner is credited with an unofficial victory. Again, play in this situation may be extended to Monday.

In making decisions to extend play beyond Sunday or to reduce the tournament to fewer than 72 holes due to inclement weather, the on-site Tournament Director discusses the situation and conditions with a number of parties, including the host organization, title sponsor, host site (general manager and/or golf course superintendent), on-site weather forecaster, television representatives and the other members of the Rules Committee. Players typically have not been included in these discussions as the TOUR believes it is inappropriate for the Rules Committee to discuss matters directly affecting the competition with contestants.

These values are seamlessly taught through The First Tee Life Skills Experience™, one of the unique features that differentiates The First Tee from many other successful junior golf programs. The intent is to offer opportunities for improvement in the quality of life and create a platform where children can increase their potential for success. The First Tee partners with local not-for-profit entities and municipalities to form The First Tee Chapters, which are responsible for developing The First Tee golf-learning facilities. Currently, there are more than 215 open facilities spanning 40 states and five countries, including Australia, Canada, Ireland, New Zealand and Singapore.

GOLF 20/20: Vision for the Future—Initiated in 1999, it is devoted to aligning the golf industry behind a plan that addresses the future of golf in a strategic manner, with an emphasis on accelerating growth and participation and creating new avenues of access into the game.

National Minority Golf Foundation—Coming under the World Golf Foundation umbrella in 2001, it is primarily focused on developing career opportunities in golf for individuals of all backgrounds.

Supported by all of the world's leading golf organizations, the Hall of Fame combines historic artifacts and personal memorabilia with interactive exhibits to tell the stories of the Hall of Fame members and the history of the game. The World Golf Hall of Fame is located at World Golf Village in St. Augustine, FL.

The Museum

Guests of the World Golf Hall of Fame will be greeted with the fascinating and comprehensive tale of golf's history and its development from the cradle in Scotland through its growth to the far reaches of the world. An exhibit in this area focuses on the role of The Royal & Ancient, the history of the British Open, golf's longest-running major, and the Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews.

The Hall of Fame members' stories are referenced throughout the museum, though their true home is in the center of the museum, Shell Hall, named for the Hall of Fame's founding partner, Shell Oil Company. An extraordinary "Wall of Fame" donning hand-crafted bronze relief plaques of each member extends an entire wall, representing the current 109 members. And, guests can search for statistics, sound bites, photographs and video clips in a comprehensive database developed by our technology partner, IBM.

As a fitting tribute to the highest achievement in golf, significant tournament trophies, including men's and women's majors, are artfully displayed in the Hall of Fame Tower. Special Exhibits

The World Golf Hall of Fame opens various temporary exhibits throughout the year, many featuring its members. A major exhibit opens each spring, during THE PLAYERS Championship, and at each year's Fall Induction Ceremony, when special displays highlighting the current year's class is unveiled.

Avenues for Induction

There are five avenues for a player or contributor to enter the World Golf Hall of Fame: PGA TOUR/Champions Tour ballot, International ballot, LPGA Point System, Lifetime Achievement category and Veteran's category.

Various criteria is set up for players to be eligible for the PGA TOUR/Champions Tour and International ballots, including an age requirement of at least 40 years old and a necessary performance that includes a substantial amount of regular tournament majors and victories.

The LPGA Point System requires a player to be an active member of the LPGA Tour for 10 years and to have won either an LPGA major tournament, Vare Trophy or Rolex Player of the Year honors, plus a number of other tournament victories.

Nominations for the Lifetime Achievement category are made by the international voting body members. The category is designed for any male or female supporter of the sport whose primary role in the game has come outside the playing arena. The World Golf Foundation Board of Directors' Selection Committee decides this category each year.

Any male or female professional or amateur whose career concluded at least 30 years ago is eligible for selection through the Veteran's category. The World Golf Foundation Board of Directors' Selection Committee also determines this category each year.

Founding Partner

As sole founding partner of World Golf Hall of Fame, Shell Oil Company provides financial support to the World Golf Foundation and supports its charitable initiatives aimed at introducing golf to young people, thereby promoting scholastic achievement, community service and those values intrinsic to the game of golf.

Amy Alcott [1999]

Kansas City, Missouri (Feb. 22, 1956-)
Captured the 1973 USGA Girls Junior as an amateur. Turned pro in 1975 and claimed 29 LPGA titles including five major championships.

Willie Anderson [1975]

Nothe Berwick, Scotland (1878-Oct. 25, 1910)
Emigrated to U.S. at 15 and dominated early American golf. Won U.S. Open four times between 1901-1905. Has 11 top-5s in the national championship.

Isao Aoki [2004]

Abiko, Chiba, Japan (Aug. 31, 1942-)
First Japanese player to triumph on the PGA TOUR. Owns 73 titles worldwide on six Tours. Hole-out for eagle won him the 1983 Hawaiian Open.

Tommy Armour [1976]

Edinburgh, Scotland (Sept. 24, 1894-Sept. 12, 1968)
One of golf's most respected instructors and players. Won the U.S. Open, Western Open, PGA Championship and the British Open. Nicknamed the 'Silver Scot.'

John Ball [1977]

Hoyleake, England (Dec. 24, 1861-Dec. 2, 1940)
Considered England's greatest amateur. Compiled eight British Amateur titles. Became the first Englishman and amateur to win the British Open.

Severiano Ballesteros [1999]

Pedrena, Spain (April 9, 1957-)
Won first of three British Opens at age 22. Added a pair of Masters titles in 1980 and 1983. Played on eight Ryder Cup teams.

Jim Barnes [1989]

Lelant, Cornwall, England (1886-March 25, 1966)
Englishman came to the U.S. at age 19. Won era's major tournaments at least once between 1916-1925: Western Open, PGA Championship, U.S. Open and the British Open.

Judy Bell [2001]

Wichita, Kansas (Sept. 23, 1936-)
First woman elected USGA President. Member of USGA Women's and Executive Committees. Impressive amateur record included three straight Kansas State Amateurs.

Deane Beman [2000]

Washington, D.C. (April 22, 1938-)
PGA TOUR Commissioner 1974-1994. Created Champions Tour, Nationwide Tour and stadium golf concept. Won two U.S. Amateurs, a British Amateur and four PGA TOUR events.

Patty Berg [1974]

Minneapolis, Minnesota (Feb. 3, 1918-)
Claimed 28 amateur titles and won the first U.S. Women's Open. 60 career wins including LPGA record 15 majors. An original LPGA founder.

Tommy Bolt [2002]

Haworth, Oklahoma (March 31, 1918-)
Won 1950 U.S. Open at age 40. Captured 12 senior titles in the U.S. and Australia. A Champions Tour founding member. Well known for personality and flair.

Sir Michael Bonallack [2000]

Chigwell, Essex, England (Dec. 31, 1934-)
Former Secretary of the Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews. Won five British Amateurs and five English Amateurs between 1961 and 1970. Competed in nine Walker Cups.

Julius Boros [1982]

Fairfield, Connecticut (March 3, 1920-May 28, 1994)
Won two U.S. Opens and, at age 48, PGA Championship. Named PGA Player of the Year in 1952.

Pat Bradley [1991]

Westford, Massachusetts (March 24, 1951-)
Amassed 31 career LPGA victories including six majors. Winner of career Grand Slam, two Player of the Year Awards and two Vare Trophies.

James Braid [1976]

Earlsferry, Fifeshire, Scotland (Feb. 6, 1870-Nov. 27, 1950)
Member of The Great Triumvirate with Harry Vardon and J.H. Taylor. Won five British Opens in 10 years. Known as Britain's professional match-play champion.

Jack Burke, Jr. [2000]

Fort Worth, Texas (Jan. 29, 1930-)
Five-time U.S. Ryder Cup member. Captured 17 career titles, including 1956 Masters and PGA Championship. Won four straight tournaments in 1952.

William Campbell [1990]

Huntington, West Virginia (May 5, 1923-)
Qualified for 37 U.S. Amateurs, winning in 1964. Two-time U.S. Senior Amateur champion. Eight-time Walker Cup member. USGA President 1982-85.

Donna Caponi [2001]

Detroit, Michigan (Jan. 29, 1945-)
First win came at 1969 U.S. Women's Open. 24 LPGA titles include four majors. Won 10 times in two years beginning in 1980.

JoAnne Gunderson Carner [1985]

Kirkland, Washington (April 4, 1939-)
Owns more than 40 career victories. Won five U.S. Women's Amateurs and two U.S. Women's Opens. Vare Trophy winner 1981-1983. Three-time LPGA Player of the Year.

Billy Casper [1978]

San Diego, California (June 24, 1931-)
Winner of 60 titles, including three PGA TOUR majors. Claimed five Vardon Trophies. Eight-time Ryder Cup member. Won 1966 U.S. Open playoff after seven-shot comeback.

Neil Coles [2000]

London, England (Sept. 26, 1934-)
Claimed 22 PGA European Tour victories and twice led its money list. Eight-time Ryder Cup member. Pioneered formation of the PGA European Tour.

Harry Cooper [1992]

Leatherhead, England (Aug. 4, 1904-Oct. 17, 2000)
"Lighthorse Harry" won 31 professional tournaments from 1926-1942. Won nine times in 1937. Winner of first Vardon Trophy.

Fred Corcoran [1975]

Cambridge, Massachusetts (April 4, 1905-June 23, 1977)
Instrumental in forming the LPGA Tour, World Cup and Golf Writers Association of America. PGA Tournament manager from 1936-1947. More than doubled the number of Tour events.

Henry Cotton [1980]

Holmes Chapel, Cheshire, England (Jan. 28, 1907-Dec. 22, 1987)
Dominated European professional golf from mid-1930s to early-1950s. Captured 14 national championships in that span, including three British Opens.

Ben Crenshaw [2002]

Austin, Texas (Jan. 11, 1952-)
Compiled 17 PGA TOUR victories, including two Masters. Captained victorious 1999 U.S. Ryder Cup team. Won three straight individual NCAA crowns at University of Texas.

Bing Crosby [1978]

Tacoma, Washington (May 2, 1904-Oct. 14, 1977)
Crooner's golf interest began as pre-teen caddie. Formed 1937 pro-am at Pebble Beach. "The Clam Bake" remains a top PGA TOUR event.

Beth Daniel [1999]

Charleston, South Carolina (Oct. 14, 1956-)
Counts 1990 LPGA Championship among 32 LPGA titles. Claimed Player of the Year and Vare Trophy on three occasions. U.S. Women's Amateur champ in 1975 and 1977.

Bernard Darwin [2005]

Downe, Kent, England (Sept. 7, 1876-Oct. 18, 1961)
Credited with inventing daily golf writing. Covered golf for *The Times of London* (1907-53) and *Country Life* (1907-61). Respectable playing resume includes Walker Cup and British Amateur appearances.

Jimmy Demaret [1983]

Houston, Texas (May 24, 1910-Dec. 28, 1983)
Colorful and popular golf figure won 1940 Masters after becoming a nightclub singer. Added Green Jackets in 1947 and 1950 following action in Navy during WW II.

Roberto De Vincenzo [1989]

Buenos Aires, Argentina (April 14, 1923-)
Turned pro at 15 and won more than 200 tournaments worldwide. Has eight PGA TOUR titles and the 1967 British Open. Won inaugural U.S. Senior Open.

Joseph C. Dey [1975]

Norfolk, Virginia (Nov. 17, 1907-March 3, 1991)
USGA's Executive Secretary for 34 years and the first PGA TOUR Commissioner. Second American to captain at the R&A.

Leo Diegel [2003]

Detroit, Michigan (April 27, 1899-May 8, 1951)
Member of first four Ryder Cup teams from 1927-1933. Won consecutive PGA Championships in 1928 and 1929. 29 career titles include four Canadian Opens.

Chick Evans [1975]

Indianapolis, Indiana (July 8, 1890-Nov. 6, 1979)
First player to win U.S. Open and U.S. Amateur in same year (1916). Played U.S. Amateur regularly from 1907-1962, winning twice. Established Evans Scholars Foundation for caddies, affiliated with Western Open.

Nick Faldo [1998]

Welwyn Garden City, Hertfordshire, England (July 18, 1957-)
Won more than 40 worldwide tournaments, including three British Opens and three Masters. Competed in 11 Ryder Cups. First international player named PGA of America Player of the Year.

Raymond Floyd [1989]

Fort Bragg, North Carolina (Sept. 4, 1942-)
Owner of more than 35 combined PGA TOUR and Champions Tour titles. Won 1986 U.S. Open at age 43 to claim fourth major.

Herb Graffis [1977]

Logansport, Indiana (May 31, 1893-Feb. 13, 1989)
Journalist contributed widely to golf's growth. Founding member of the Golf Writers Association of America and co-formed National Golf Foundation.

Ralph Guldahl [1981]

Dallas, Texas (Nov. 22, 1911-June 11, 1987)
Among few players to win successive U.S. Opens (1937-1938). Also won three consecutive Western Opens and the 1939 Masters.

Walter Hagen [1974]

Rochester, New York (Dec. 21, 1892-Oct. 5, 1969)
First professional to make a living playing golf. Captained first six American Ryder Cup teams. Won two U.S. Opens, four British Opens and five PGAs.

Marlene Bauer Hagge [2002]

Eureka, South Dakota (Feb. 16, 1934-)
Founding member of the LPGA. Claimed first USGA Girls Junior in 1949. Youngest player to win an LPGA event. Resume includes 25 professional victories.

Bob Harlow [1988]

Newburyport, Massachusetts (Oct. 21, 1899-Nov. 15, 1954)
Founded *Golf World*. Managed Walter Hagen and Joe Kirkwood and arranged exhibitions for both. Served as PGA tournament manager from 1930-1935.

Sandra Haynie [1977]

Fort Worth, Texas (June 4, 1943-)
Won 39 tournaments in 16 years, including the U.S. Women's Open and the LPGA Championship in 1974. Captured the 1958 and 1959 Texas Women's Amateur.

Hisako "Chako" Higuchi [2003]

Kawagoe City, Saitama Prefecture, Japan (Oct. 13, 1945-)
Charter member of the LPGA of Japan. Counts 1977 LPGA Championship among her 72 worldwide victories. One of Japan's most successful athletes.

Harold Hilton [1978]

West Kirby, England (Jan. 14, 1869-March 5, 1942)
Four-time British Amateur champion and two-time British Open winner. First Englishman to win the U.S. Amateur in 1911.

Ben Hogan [1974]

Dublin, Texas (Aug. 13, 1912-July 29, 1997)
Claimed three majors prior to life-threatening auto accident in 1949. Returned to win three U.S. Opens, two Masters and a British Open. Owns 64 titles worldwide.

Bob Hope [1983]

Eltham, England (May 29, 1903-July 27, 2003)
Revered personality united golf, entertainment and politics. This Presidential playing partner's namesake tournament was among first to make significant charitable donations.

Dorothy Campbell Hurd Howe [1978]

Edinburgh, Scotland (March 24, 1883-March 20, 1945)
Winner of more than 750 matches worldwide. Won British Ladies Championship twice and U.S. Women's Amateur thrice.

Juli Inkster [2000]

Santa Cruz, California (June 24, 1960-)
Career highlighted by 26 LPGA wins, including six majors. Won three consecutive U.S. Women's Amateurs. Competed on 1982 U.S. Curtis Cup Team.

Hale Irwin [1992]

Joplin, Missouri (June 3, 1945-)
Claimed three U.S. Opens and 17 other PGA TOUR titles. Dominated Champions Tour 1997-99, winning 21 times, and is the Champions Tour's all-time victories leader. Won 1967 NCAA Championship.

Tony Jacklin [2002]

Scunthorpe, England (July 7, 1944-)
Won 1969 British Open. 1970 U.S. Open saw him become first British player to win event in 50 years. Captained victorious Ryder Cup teams in 1985, 1987 and 1989.

John Jacobs [2000]

Lindrick, Yorkshire, England (March 14, 1925-)
Co-founder of the PGA European Tour. Played on 1955 Ryder Cup Team. Was captain in 1979 and 1981. Pioneer of Europe's approach to modern game.

Winner of Southern Amateur, two U.S. Women's Amateurs and two Western Amateurs. Captured 1942 Western Open and 1947 U.S. Women's Open as amateur. Founding LPGA member.

Robert Trent Jones, Sr. [1987]

Ince, Lancashire, England (June 20, 1906-June 14, 2000)
Most prolific golf course architect of modern era. Notable courses include Peachtree, Spyglass Hill, Firestone South, Sotogrande and the New Course at Ballybunion.

Bobby Jones [1974]

Atlanta, Georgia (March 17, 1902-Dec. 18, 1971)
Won 1930 Grand Slam, then promptly retired from competitive golf. His five U.S. Amateurs, four U.S. Opens, three British Opens and British Amateur came in eight years. Established Augusta National Golf Club and the Masters.

Betsy King [1995]

Reading, Pennsylvania (Aug. 13, 1955-)
34 career victories, including six majors. Won three tournaments in 1984 and was leading money winner and Player of the Year.

Tom Kite [2004]

Austin, Texas (Dec. 9, 1949-)
Won 18 PGA TOUR titles and 1992 U.S. Open. Played in seven Ryder Cups and captained 1997 U.S. Team. Two-time Vardon Trophy winner. Co-NCAA champ in 1972.

Bernhard Langer [2002]

Anhausen, Germany (Aug. 27, 1957-)
Most accomplished German golfer with more than 50 worldwide victories. Two-time Masters winner. Won German National Open record 12 times. Completed in 10 Ryder Cups.

Lawson Little [1980]

Newport, Rhode Island (June 23, 1910-Feb. 1, 1968)
Captured both U.S. and British Amateurs in 1934 and '35. Won seven events as a pro, including 1940 U.S. Open.

Gene Littler [1990]

San Diego, California (July 21, 1930-)
First PGA win came in 1954 as amateur. 37 total career titles. Won 1953 U.S. Amateur and 1961 U.S. Open.

Bobby Locke [1977]

Germiston, Transvaal, South Africa (Nov. 20, 1917-March 9, 1987)
Won both South African Amateur and Open by age 18. Captured four British Opens between 1949 and 1957. Retired with more than 80 victories worldwide.

Nancy Lopez [1989]

Torrance, California (Jan. 6, 1957-)
Won nine times in rookie year, including five consecutive. Named Rookie of the Year and Player of the Year in 1978. Amassed more than 50 career victories.

Alister MacKenzie [2005]

The Orchard, Normanton, England (Aug. 30, 1870-Jan. 6, 1934)
Architect of many famed courses including Augusta National, Cypress Point, Royal Melbourne and Lahinch. His 1920 treatise *Golf Architecture* codified 13 features of an ideal golf course.

Lloyd Mangrum [1998]

Trenton, Texas (Aug. 1, 1914-Nov. 17, 1973)
Captured more than 50 titles, including 1946 U.S. Open. Five-time Ryder Cup member and twice a captain. Won Vardon Trophy in 1951 and 1953.

Carol Mann [1977]

Buffalo, New York (Feb. 3, 1941-)
Earned 38 career victories with two majors. Amassed 10 titles and won Vare Trophy in 1968. Only player to make Women's Western Open first LPGA title. Former LPGA President.

Cary Middlecoff [1986]

Halls, Tennessee (Jan. 6, 1921-Sept. 1, 1998)
First amateur to win the North and South Open. 37 career victories included 1949 and 1956 U.S. Open and 1955 Masters.

Johnny Miller [1998]

San Francisco, California (April 29, 1947-)
Dominated international golf in 1970s. Won 20 tournaments in six years. Final-round 63 secured 1973 U.S. Open. Won 1976 British Open and totaled 25 PGA TOUR titles.

Tom Morris, Jr. [1975]

St. Andrews, Scotland (April 1851-Dec. 25, 1875)
Won first tournament by age 16. Won first British Open at age 18 in 1868. Only player to claim four consecutive British Opens.

Tom Morris, Sr. [1976]

St. Andrews, Scotland (June 16, 1821-May 24, 1908)
Most revered figure in Scottish golf history. Career greenskeeper captured four British Opens. Designed legendary courses Lahinch, Muirfield and Royal County Down.

Byron Nelson [1974]

Long Branch, Texas (Feb. 4, 1912-)
Best remembered for 1945 record season, when he won 19 tournaments, including 11 consecutively. 52 career titles include two Masters, two PGAs and a U.S. Open.

Jack Nicklaus [1974]

Columbus, Ohio (January 21, 1940-)
Arguably best golfer of modern era. Amassed 20 major championship victories (pro and amateur). Has more than 100 victories around the world. One of five players to win career Grand Slam.

Greg Norman [2001]

Mt. Isa, Queensland, Australia (February 10, 1955-)
Winner of three Arnold Palmer Awards and three Vardon Trophies. Owns nearly 90 titles worldwide. British Open winner in 1986 and 1993.

Ayako Okamoto [2005]

Hiroshima, Japan (April 2, 1951-)
Compiled 62 worldwide titles, including 44 on the LPGA of Japan and 17 on the LPGA Tour. First international player to win LPGA Player of the Year Award (1987).

Francis Ouimet [1974]

Brookline, Massachusetts (May 8, 1893-Sept. 2, 1967)
Brought golf to new levels in America. Former caddie defeated heralded British professionals Harry Vardon and Ted Ray at 1913 U.S. Open. Two-time U.S. Amateur champ.

Arnold Palmer [1974]

Latrobe, Pennsylvania (Sept. 10, 1929-)
Game's most charismatic player. Generated unprecedented interest in the game. 80-plus professional victories include four Masters, two British Opens and a U.S. Open.

Willie Park, Sr. [2005]

Wallyford, Scotland (June 30, 1833-July 25, 1903)
Winner of four British Opens, including the first one in 1860. Equally noted for his Challenge Match performances against Old Tom Morris. Prodigious driver and skilled putter he was also an instrumental ball and clubmaker.

World Golf Hall of Fame Members (cont.)

Harvey Penick [2002]

Austin, Texas (Oct. 23, 1904-April 2, 1995)
One of game's greatest teachers. Pupils included Tom Kite, Ben Crenshaw and Kathy Whitworth. Led University of Texas to 20 Southwest Conference titles and 19 individual crowns.

Gary Player [1974]

Johannesburg, South Africa (Nov. 1, 1935-)
Victories number more than 120 worldwide. Winner of career Grand Slam. Rigorous fitness program helped him win in five different decades. Global ambassador for golf.

Nick Price [2003]

Durban, South Africa (Jan. 28, 1957-)
Dominated international golf in the early 1990s. Has more than 40 tournament wins worldwide. 1994 season saw him win six times, including the British Open and PGA Championship.

Judy Rankin [2000]

St. Louis, Missouri (Feb. 18, 1945-)
Winner of 26 LPGA events. Two-time Player of the Year and three-time Vare Trophy winner. Former LPGA President and U.S. Solheim Cup captain.

Betsy Rawls [1987]

Spartanburg, South Carolina (May 4, 1928-)
Counts eight majors among 55 career LPGA victories. First player to win U.S. Women's Open four times. Claimed 1959 Vare Trophy. Former LPGA President.

Clifford Roberts [1978]

Morning Sun, Iowa (March 6, 1894-Sept. 29, 1977)
Co-founded Augusta National Golf Club. Chairman of the Masters from its 1934 inception until his death in 1977.

Allan Robertson [2001]

St. Andrews, Scotland (Sept. 11, 1815-Sept. 1, 1859)
Credited as game's first professional. First to break 80 on The Old Course at St. Andrews, shooting a 79 in 1858. Known as a premier feather ball maker.

Chi Chi Rodriguez [1992]

Rio Piedras, Puerto Rico (Oct. 23, 1935-)
Owns more than 30 career titles. Two-time Byron Nelson Award winner as Champions Tour scoring leader. Arnold Palmer Award winner in 1987.

Donald Ross [1977]

Dornoch, Scotland (Nov. 23, 1872-April 26, 1948)
Premier golf course architect in America during early 20th century. Directed over 500 design projects, including Pinehurst No. 2, Oak Hill, Inverness and Oakland Hills.

Paul Runyan [1990]

Hot Springs, Arkansas (July 12, 1908-March 17, 2002)
Won over 50 professional tournaments, including 16 in two years. Leading money winner in 1933 and 1934. Two-time PGA Championship winner.

Gene Sarazen [1974]

Harrison, New York (Feb. 27, 1902-May 3, 1999)
First golfer to win all four major championships. Has seven majors in all. Remembered for 1935 Masters win that featured double-eagle on No. 15. Invented sand wedge.

Patty Sheehan [1993]

Middlebury, Vermont (Oct. 27, 1956-)
First to capture the U.S. and British Women's Opens in same year. Won 35 tournaments, including six majors. 1983 Player of the Year. Winner of 1984 Vare Trophy.

Dinah Shore [1994]

Winchester, Tennessee (Feb. 29, 1916-Feb. 24, 1994)
Famed entertainer became celebrity host of the Colgate-Dinah Shore Winners Circle. Her support of women's golf was critical to LPGA Tour's growth.

Charlie Sifford [2004]

Kingwood, Texas (June 2, 1922-)
First African-American to play full time on PGA TOUR, winning twice. Claimed 1975 Senior PGA Championship. Original member of the Champions Tour in 1980.

Horton Smith [1990]

Detroit, Michigan (May 22, 1908-Oct. 15, 1963)
Burst onto professional golf scene in 1929, winning eight times and finishing second four times. Claimed two Masters titles, including inaugural 1934 tournament.

Sam Snead [1974]

Hot Springs, Virginia (May 27, 1912-May 23, 2002)
PGA TOUR's career victory leader with 82 victories. Winner of three PGA Championships and Masters and one British Open. Eight-time Ryder Cup member.

Karsten Solheim [2001]

Bergen, Norway (Sept. 15, 1911-Feb. 16, 2000)
Initially known for PING putter. Developed concepts of heel-toe weighting and perimeter weighting. Founded The Solheim Cup to advance international women's golf.

Annika Sörenstam [2003]

Stockholm, Sweden (Oct. 10, 1970-)
Won more than 60 LPGA titles, including 11 in 2002. Captured career Grand Slam in 2003. Multiple Player of the Year and Vare Trophy winner. Shot a 59 in 2001.

Payne Stewart [2001]

Springfield, Missouri (Jan. 30, 1957-Oct. 25, 1999)
Won 11 PGA TOUR events and 18 victories worldwide. Claimed the 1989 PGA Championship and the 1991 and 1999 U.S. Opens. Five-time U.S. Ryder Cup member.

Marlene Stewart Streit [2004]

Cereal, Alberta, Canada (March 9, 1934-)
Only golfer to have won Australian, British, Canadian and U.S. Women's Amateur championships. Owns 11 Canadian Ladies Open Amateurs, nine Canadian Ladies Close Amateurs.

Louise Suggs [1979]

Lithia Springs, Georgia (Sept. 7, 1923-)
50 professional victories include two U.S. Women's Opens, one LPGA Championship and four Titleholders. LPGA Founder and former President.

J. H. Taylor [1975]

Northam, North Devon, England (March 18, 1871-Feb. 10, 1963)
Member of "Great Triumvirate" that dominated golf at the turn of the 20th century. Five-time British Open winner. Founded first professional golfers' association.

Peter Thomson [1998]

Melbourne, Australia (Aug. 23, 1929-)
Captured five British Opens between 1954 and 1965. Won 11 Champions Tour titles and 1988 British Seniors Championship. Three-time International Team Presidents Cup captain.

Jerry Travers [1976]

New York, New York (May 19, 1887-March 29, 1951)
From 1906-1915, won five Metropolitan Opens, four U.S. Amateurs and was second amateur to win U.S. Open.

Walter Travis [1979]

Malden, Victoria, Australia (Jan. 10, 1862-July 31, 1927)
Three-time U.S. Amateur champ and six-time medalist. First foreigner to capture the British Amateur. Founder and editor of American Golfer.

World Golf Hall of Fame Members (cont.)

Lee Trevino [1981]

Dallas, Texas (Dec. 1, 1939-)
Career victories totaled nearly 80, including six majors. Played on six Ryder Cups. Champions Tour career saw him win 29 times, three Jack Nicklaus Trophies, two Arnold Palmer Awards.

Richard Tufts [1992]

Medford, Massachusetts (March 16, 1896-Dec. 17, 1980)
Managed Pinehurst Resort from 1930s to 1960s. Helped introduce modern handicap system, standardized course setup and worked to unify the Rules of Golf.

Harry Vardon [1974]

Grouville, Isle of Jersey, England (May 9, 1870-March 20, 1937)
Revolutionized and dominated the game for 25 years. Won a record six British Opens and a U.S. Open. Popularized the overlapping Vardon Grip.

Glenna Collett Vare [1975]

New Haven, Connecticut (June 20, 1903-Feb. 3, 1989)
Won unprecedented six U.S. Women's Amateurs between 1922 and 1935. Represented U.S. on six Curtis Cup teams. LPGA's Vare Trophy named for her.

Tom Watson [1988]

Kansas City, Missouri (Sept. 4, 1949-)
Player of the Year four consecutive years. Has 31 PGA TOUR victories, five British Opens, two Masters and a U.S. Open, where he had a dramatic chip-in at No. 17 at Pebble Beach.

Karrie Webb [2005]

Queensland, Australia (Dec. 21, 1974-)
Counts six majors among nearly three dozen LPGA titles. Youngest winner of the LPGA career grand slam. First LPGA player to surpass \$1 million in single-season earnings.

Joyce Wethered [1975]

Devon, England (Nov. 17, 1901-Nov. 18, 1997)
Dominated women's golf in Britain in the 1920s. Won five consecutive English Championships and four British Ladies Championships.

Kathy Whitworth [1982]

Monohans, Texas (Sept. 27, 1939-)
Record 88 LPGA titles, including six majors. Dominated LPGA in late 1960s and early 1970s. Awards include seven Players of the Year and Vare Trophies.

Mickey Wright [1976]

San Diego, California (Feb. 14, 1935-)
Amassed 82 career LPGA victories, including 10 in 1961 and 13 in 1963. Winner of four U.S. Women's Opens. Won five Vare Trophies.

Mildred "Babe" Didrikson Zaharias [1974]

Port Arthur, Texas (June 26, 1914-Sept. 27, 1956)
Olympic gold medalist turned exclusively to golf in 1934. Won 1946 U.S. Women's Amateur and three U.S. Women's Opens.

World Golf Village



The World Golf Hall of Fame is located at World Golf Village, a 6,300-acre golf resort and residential community located 10 minutes northwest of historic St. Augustine, FL, and 30 minutes south of Jacksonville. Named one of the "Top 75 Golf Resorts" in the United States by *Golf Digest*, World Golf Village draws guests from all over the United States and from around the world, offering a wide variety of recreational, entertainment, corporate meeting and residential options.

As the centerpiece of the Village, the World Golf Hall of Fame celebrates and recognizes the game's greatest players and contributors and serves as an inspiration to fans worldwide. The Hall of Fame features personal memorabilia and special exhibits highlighting its members, as well as historical and interactive displays that enable visitors to see and experience some of golf's most exciting aspects. Part of the Hall of Fame experience includes a round on the 18-hole natural grass putting course and a film at the adjacent IMAX® Theater, which offers a variety of films that are both educational and entertaining on an 80-foot-wide by 6-story-high screen.

World Golf Village championship golf courses include King & Bear, the only course co-designed by World Golf Hall of Fame members Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, and the Slammer & Squire, built by Bobby Weed with design consultants Sam Snead and Gene Sarazen, also World Golf Hall of Fame members. Both courses, which have hosted 10 nationally televised broadcasts, combine challenging obstacles with playability for all levels of golfers.

The PGA TOUR Golf Academy offers private lessons, clinics and golf schools by top-rated instructors, including Director of Instruction Scott Sackett, a *Golf Magazine* Top 100 Teacher, who incorporates three teaching and video analysis systems into the lessons.

PGA TOUR Spa Laterra—the first such facility to bear the PGA TOUR name—is located at the King & Bear, at World Golf Village and offers golf-enhancement services and fitness programs comparable to those used on TOUR. The full-service spa, part of the Laterra resort community, offers signature treatments and full, half and multi-day packages.

Dining options along the Walk of Champions include Murray Bros. Caddyshack, the flagship restaurant of actor-golfer Bill Murray and his five

brothers, and Augustinos, an Italian steakhouse. PGA TOUR STOP, one of the largest golf stores in the country, anchors the retail area of World Golf Village. Also along the Walk of Champions, which is a half-mile track featuring engraved Hall of Fame member signatures in granite, guests can attempt to hit a ball 132 yards to the Challenge Hole's island green.

Accommodations at World Golf Village include the flagship Renaissance Resort at World Golf Village, a 10-story resort that features 301 guest rooms and the adjacent St. Johns County Convention Center. Grande Villas at World Golf Village, a Bluegreen Vacation Club resort, offers country club vacation homes that overlook the 17th and 18th holes of Slammer & Squire golf course. Laterra Resort & Spa offers 72 well-appointed condominiums with immediate access to the adjacent PGA TOUR Spa.

The Neighborhoods of World Golf Village offer distinctive residential communities that blend world-class amenities with the convenience of shopping, healthcare, entertainment, first-rate schools and incredible golf. Each neighborhood offers individual amenities such as pools and recreational facilities.
